Hale Area School's Millage Election Scheduled Tuesday

An important operational millage election is to be held Tuesday, April 2, by Hale Area School District. Voters are being asked to approve 12.5 mills for renewal and 2.5 additional mills for the next two years.

A number of factors have caused the need for additional operational millage, the most notable being a \$51,000 loss in state aid caused by the district's poor standing in the state aid formula due to the high valuation behind each child.

Other causes for the need for additional millage include a 130 percent increase in gasoline and fuel oil; a 100 percent increase in the cost of

paper, books and other materials. Fixed operational charges and salaries have also increased.

"I think most of us can realize that, with the inflation we have today, everything is costing more. The same thing applies to operating a school district," states Supt. Paul Keene.

"In the three years that I have been superintendent at Hale, I have found that the people of the district are proud of their educational system. When the chips are down, they have always come through. I still believe this.

"I think we can look with pride at

the type of education our children are receiving and, can be assured that when they graduate, they will be productive in our society," said Keene. "I feel the greatest investment that we have in life is our children and, unless they are properly trained in today's world, their inadequacies can become a handicap throughout their lifetime."

The superintendent said that no one wants to pay more taxes than what are already being paid and taxes have to be paid at a great sacrifice, "but nothing in life that is worthwhile comes to us as a gift."

No Races Listed on ET Spring Ballot

No races are listed on next Monday's city election ballot at East Tawas, but Clerk Clyde Soper said there had been rumors of sticker candidates and "anything can happen on April 1."

Only new candidate on the ballot is Gerald J. Klenow, who is running for the position of First Ward alderman to replace Richard Moss, who retires after eight years in office.

Candidates to succeed themselves are Robert Bolen, mayor; Mrs. Grace Pelton, treasurer, and Soper.

One probationary teacher was denied tenure, a second was placed on a third year of probation and one teacher was released from tenure contract at the completion of the school year.

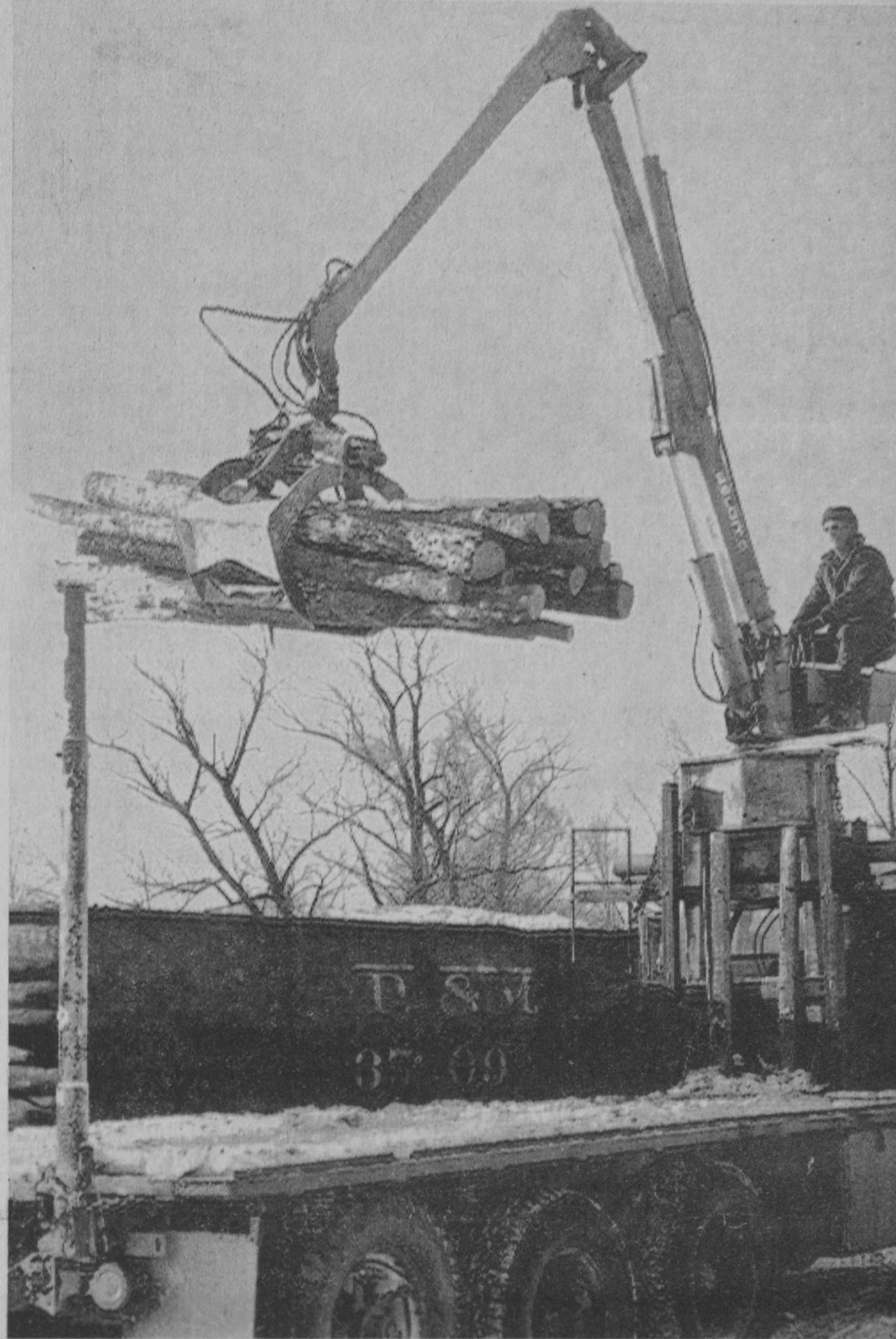

Sewer Objections Considered; Expect Districts to Stand

Consideration of recent objections voiced by a few property owners after required hearings have been held on special assessment districts for sanitary sewer construction was held Monday night by the Tawas City Water Board.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the board had considered a number of areas which dealt with several property owners who now state they do not want sanitary sewer because of the cost and two other owners who constructed private sewer lines, but are included in the special assessment district.

The city manager said that possible alternatives would be discussed with the council and the city's bonding attorney, along with various methods of charging new sewer rates to protect the city bond issue.

Bublitz said that the city must evaluate all of the current objections in relation to the over-all growth potential and best interest of the entire city. He said that one reason that the council and water board had felt justified in adopting the special assessment district is that construction of new septic tank systems are currently prohibited by the health department in some areas of the city because of the high water table. He did not believe any property would be removed from the special assessment districts.

At the last meeting, the water board was of the opinion that water users who paid the minimum rate were being penalized when they exceeded the minimum during only one quarter of the year. There are 242 users currently paying the minimum rate of \$10 per quarter.

Because of the current inflationary factor, consideration would be given to revising the water purchase contract with East Tawas.

Tawas School Would Lump Voter Lists

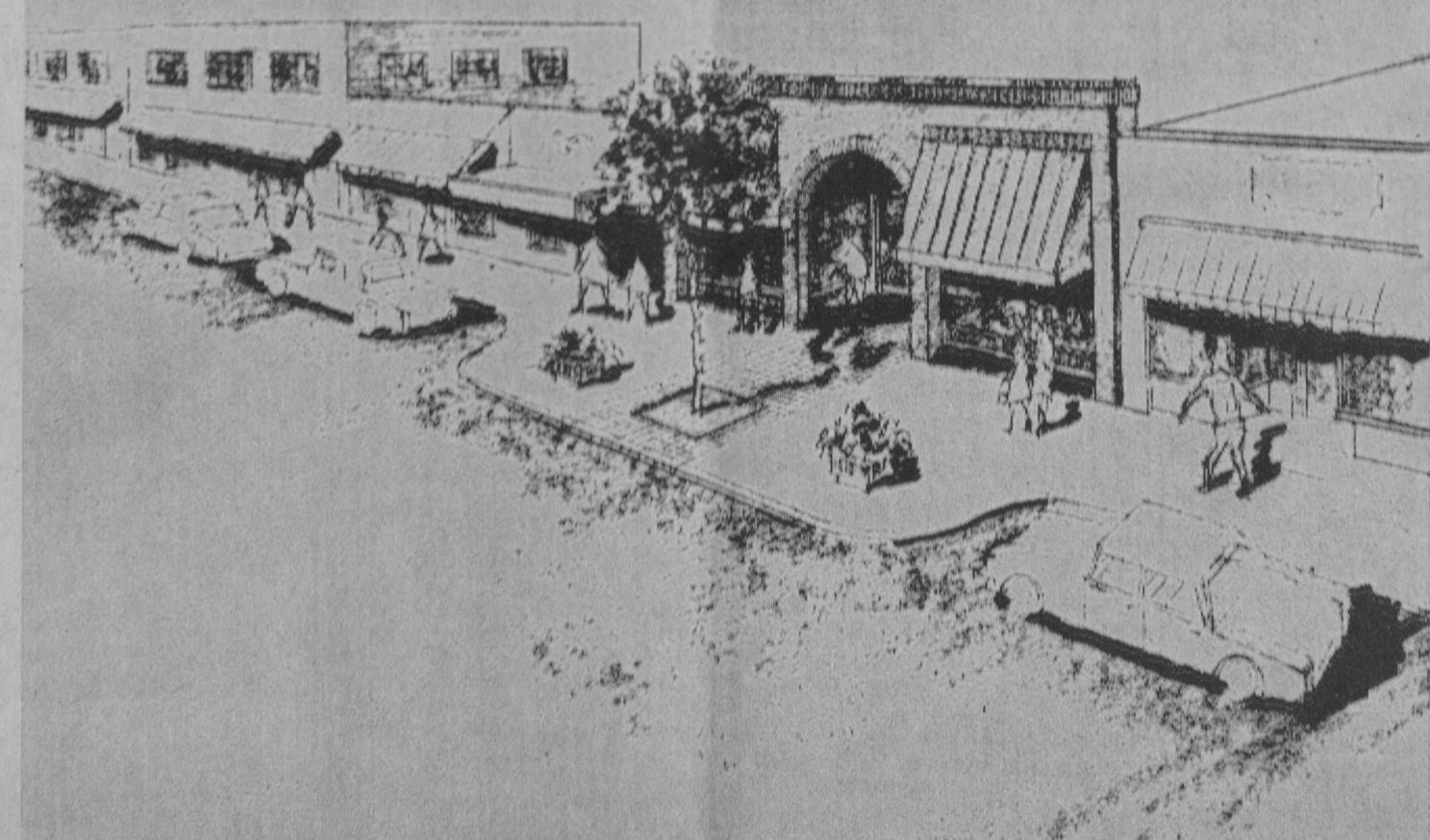
As a means of speeding voting procedures, Tawas Area Board of Education is to study the possibility of alphabetizing voter registrations throughout the district, rather than to maintain registration for three separate precincts.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told board of education members Monday night that adoption of one central polling place for all three precincts at the high school last year had speeded election procedures, but there was a 25-minute wait for voters in the East Tawas precinct during the last election.

He believed that arranging the voter list in alphabetical order would spread the work load throughout the election board and would simplify voting.

In addition, the superintendent believed that lumping registrations into one file system would bring voters to identify themselves with Tawas Area School District, rather than the present governmental boundary lines. Counting ballots by precincts would be eliminated.

Action on the proposal is to be considered by the board of education at its next meeting.

Board Considers Expansion of Site for Future Utilization

Purchase of additional property near the Newman Street athletic field at East Tawas for expansion as a possible future school construction site is now being considered by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Should the additional property become available, it was stated that recreational use of the present athletic field would be retained in plans for future school construction.

Discussion on the possibility of exchanging the athletic field for another city-owned parcel, possibly the old fairgrounds, has been held between school and city officials for several months. It was reported Monday night that the city was not interested in a property exchange, as had been suggested by the board of education, and that the city was now considering development of a new athletic field on property obtained several years ago when its waste water treatment plant was constructed.

It was reported Monday night, however, that the city had indicated it would maintain the present recreational facilities on Newman Street, but would not expand those facilities.

Property for the Newman Street athletic field was purchased by the East Tawas School in 1927-28 and developed for recreational purposes. After reorganization of area schools into Tawas Area School District, the property was turned over to the City of East Tawas in 1957. Actual ownership of the property was retained by the board of education, however, as a reverter clause was inserted in the agreement which would allow the property to be used for school purposes.

It was stated Monday night that the athletic field was owned by all people of the school district and legally could not be disposed of unless there was a property exchange or some form of authorization. The opinion was expressed that additional property to expand the site should be purchased now, rather than to wait until some future time when the expansion portion might not be available because of residential construction.

In other business, guidelines for establishment of student representatives to the board of education were adopted. At its last meeting, two delegates representing the student council were seated as unoffi-

cial members of the board of education.

An election is to be held by the student council each May with the member elected to be seated in July. A junior would be elected to serve two terms and an alternate would be elected to serve in the event that the regular member is not present.

The student representative would serve as a liaison among other board members, students and parents. He would relate pertinent student matters to board of education members and representatives would be present at and allowed to contribute to the discussion at regular or informal board meetings. The student representative would not participate in executive meetings of the board of education.

Because of statutory prohibition, student representatives would not be allowed to exercise a formal vote on any board matters. However, in all areas pending before the board, with the exception of matters relating to school or administrative personnel, contract negotiations, land acquisitions and matters of similar import, student representatives would be asked and expected to express opinions and views. Upon completion of the board's formal vote, the student representatives would be asked to indicate the manner in which he would have cast a vote and the result would be noted in board minutes.

Present student delegates are Timothy Sergeant and James Lansky.

Authorization was given the school's Keyette chapter to attend the national convention at Washington, D. C., on April 5-8. The local chapter will join the Standish-Stirling chapter on the trip by chartered bus.

The board of education authorized use of school buses next summer, if gasoline is available, for transporting children to Sand Lake to participate in the American Red Cross swimming program.

Less Formal Proof Needed for VA Benefits

Veterans Administration advises veterans not to allow loss of a birth certificate or marriage license to deter them from applying for benefits. Officials cited a regulation in effect since October 1971 under which less formal proof of marriage and birth are acceptable in establishing claims for higher benefits. A veteran's or widow's certified statement of marriage is sufficient on applications for compensation and education benefits for veterans, widows and orphaned children, provided neither he nor his wife has been married before and as proof of age and relationship in disability cases. Before the regulation change, it was noted that a certified statement now is acceptable regarding birth of a child of a veteran's marriage and as proof of age and relationship in disability cases.

VA required all statements of marriages and births to be supported by formalized documentary evidence. Certified statements also are sufficient in death cases where a claimant's statements corroborate those of a veteran in connection with a claim for any VA benefit, officials added.

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: I got a notice from social security showing that I need two more quarters of coverage to qualify for retirement payments. May I pay the social security contributions for these two quarters without working so I can qualify?

Answer: No. You can earn quarters of coverage only by working at a job covered by social security or by being self-employed. A "quarter of coverage" is any calendar quarter in which you are paid \$50 or more in wages in covered employment. Net income of \$400 or more in a year from covered self-employment will give you four quarters of coverage.

Question: I am a 20-year-old student and I get social security payments. Since I need to find a part-time job, I will have to cut down the number of classes I am taking. Will I still be able to get my social security checks every month?

Answer: It will depend on what your school considers full-time attendance. If you cut your class attendance below this level, your social security checks will stop. You must be attending school full time to be eligible for student payments. For more information, contact any social security office.

Question: My husband, who had been severely disabled for the last five years, died last month. He did not know about social security disability benefits and he had never applied for them. Is there any possible way to apply now for benefits that he might have been entitled to?

Answer: Yes, you can fill out an application to see if any benefits might be payable. You should call or visit any social security office as soon as possible since the application must be made within three months after the month of your husband's death.

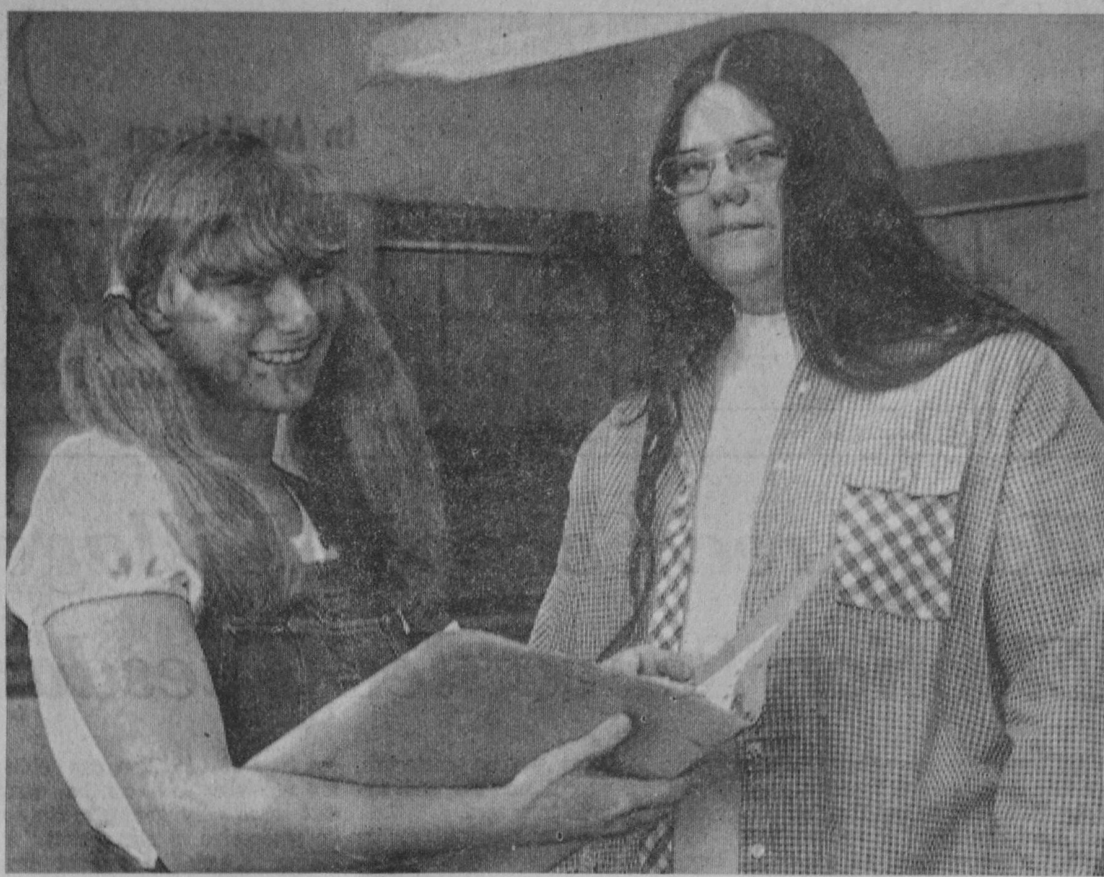

Sixth Annual Draft Lottery Held March 20
Sixth annual selective service draft lottery was held Wednesday, March 20, in Washington, D. C., to determine the sequence of vulnerability for young men born in 1955, it was announced last week by state selective service headquarters.
The annual draft lottery, held since 1969, underscores the role selective service continues to play by law in the nation's defense program. Approximately 75,000 Michigan 19-year-olds had their lottery numbers established in the drawing. These registrants will comprise the available manpower pool during 1975. Even though no one is being inducted at this time, selective service continues to maintain an available pool of manpower in event of a national emergency declared by congress.
Every male citizen and resident alien is still required by law to register with selective service on his 18th birthday or within 30 days before or after that date. Registration is accomplished at any local draft office or by more than 900 volunteer draft registrars located in high schools and colleges throughout the state. Young men may register by mail if they are unable to visit a local board office or registrar by requesting a "mailer" from any draft office or registrar.
Registrants born in 1955 who end up after the lottery drawing with sequence number one through 95 will be subject to reclassification from their present holding classification of I-H. They would be most vulnerable to induction during the year in which they reach 20 if congress renews induction authority.

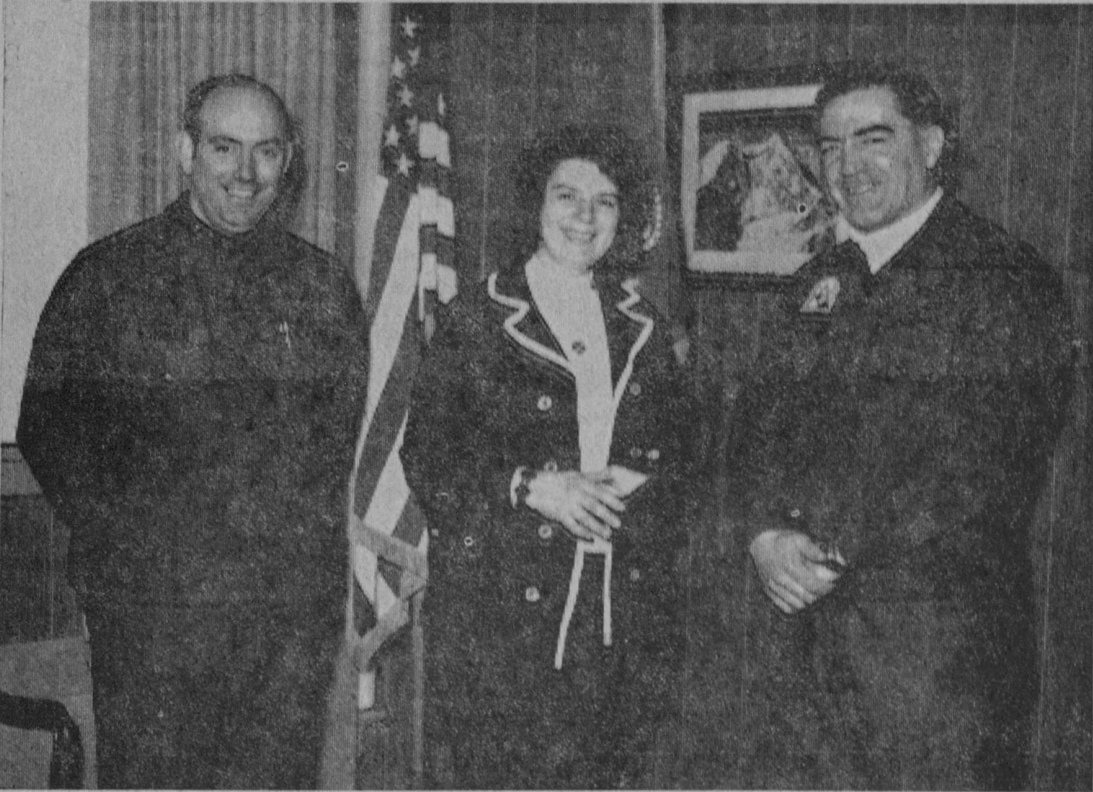

New Tower and Transmitter

CMU Unveils Plans to Extend Public Television in State

Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, unveiled plans Tuesday, March 26, to extend public television to 24 Northern Lower Michigan counties that are currently unable to receive public television signals.

At a recent luncheon in Gaylord, William B. Boyd, CMU president, and other university officials said the university plans to construct a 1,349-foot tower and transmitter nine miles north of Atlanta in Montmorency County by the end of 1974.

The tower, to be the tallest in Michigan, and transmitter would beam full-color public television to the 24-county area from main studios on the CMU campus, from which the

university now operates WCMU-TV (channel 14).

The new Northern Michigan channel would operate with the call letters WCML-TV (channel 6). The satellite station would telecast about 125 hours of programming a week to a potential audience of some 300,000 people, about 60,000 of whom are elementary and secondary school students.

Channel 6 will cover a radius of about 80 miles, reaching to Traverse City on the west, to Gladwin on the south, just beyond the Straits of Mackinac on the north and beyond the shores of Lake Huron to the east.

Commissioners Tell Problems Facing County

Robert Foster, Carl Libka, Arthur Aulerich and Fred Lomas, Iosco County Commissioners, were present at the Monday, March 18, quarterly meeting of Iosco Township Association, held at the Oscoda Yacht Club. Richter Lixey presided over the meeting.

Forty-two township board members, representing Alabaster, Ausable, Baldwin, Burleigh, Grant, Oscoda, Plainfield, Wilber and Tawas Townships, attended.

Following dinner was a question and answer period concerning taxation structure used in Iosco County, lack of communications, decline in sale of dog licenses, ambulance service deficit, explanation of Land Use Act bill and a summarization by commissioners of the county's most pressing issues.

FRS Allocation Proved Major Topic of Session

Allocation of federal revenue sharing funds for the current year was one of the principal business matters handled Wednesday by Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Categories approved for revenue sharing funds included land acquisition, parks and recreation and regional library. Other allocations to be considered in April include county sanitary landfill, dog pound and a new furnace at the jail.

The commission authorized transfer of \$50,000 from FRS funds to the parks and recreation commission for dispersal to local units for requested recreational projects. All projects would be cleared through the parks and recreation commission, including handling of bids for requested and approved projects. Actual expenditures of funds would be delayed until June 14.

Projects to be considered in the county's population centers include a \$10,000 appropriation to Oscoda Township for tennis courts, tennis courts in Tawas City and East Tawas and a recreational center at Sand Lake.

Representatives of Grant Township appeared before the commission and outlined plans for a proposed recreational center at Sand

Lake, which would include quarters for a new senior citizen center. The commission gave its approval to participation with development of recreational facilities there, but indicated that federal revenue funds from the county should not be used in the proposed construction of a building.

The commission authorized transfer of \$60,000 to a special land acquisition account for the purchase of 160 acres of land from Edward S. Davison for proposed airport expansion. The land acquisition would represent the county's share of a one-half-million-dollar federal program.

It was reported following the session that the county's offer of \$48,000 for the property and \$15,000 for the lodge constructed on the property had been rejected by the owner. It was stated that the price being sought was \$67,000. Negotiation on the purchase is to be continued in April.

Wilbur C. Roach, airport manager, said that the county is studying an application for federal funds to construct a north-south runway to handle jet aircraft and expansion of the present east-west runway.

The commission authorized transfer of \$14,912 for the probate judge. Under terms of recent state legislation, the county is reimbursed \$4,359 as the state's share of the probate judge's salary.

On recommendation of the safety committee, the commission approved entering into a one-year contract with the City of Tawas City for the sheriff's department to provide police protection. Two members of the present city police department would become members of the sheriff's department. Cost to the city would be \$23,340. The proposal was adopted on a three to two roll call vote. Approving the contract were Carl Libka, Arthur Aulerich and Fred Lomas. Voting against the contract were Robert Foster and J. Berkeley Smith.

A resolution proposed by Aulerich, calling for the ambulance service presently operated by Tawas Hospital to be coordinated and subsidized by the county, was withdrawn following discussion. Oscoda's representatives of the commission objected to the proposal as that township has its own ambulance service provided by funeral directors. Aulerich reported that local units of government in the remainder of the county, which are involved in the ambulance service, had requested that the commission take over the responsibility. Discussion is to be continued in April.

Ruth Samotis of Oscoda was ap-

pointed to fill a vacancy on the regional library board, replacing Laurel E. Whitford, who resigned.

Dennis Distributors, which entered the low bid of \$12,790, was awarded a contract for furnishing a new ambulance for Tawas Hospital. The county acted as the agent for an application for federal funds to be used in the purchase.

County Budget Requests High; Cuts Are Anticipated

Budget requests presented Wednesday by department heads to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners add up to a projected county operational expense of \$1,344,130 for 1975, as compared to the current year's operational cost of \$1,046,000.

Between now and the commission's April 9 meeting, the county finance committee will be studying individual budgets of each department to determine justification for adoption into a final budget to be presented in April to the county allocation board.

The allocation board determines the share county operation will receive out of the 15 mills to be split with schools. Additional taxes re-

quired by the proposed budget requests would require a larger slice of millage than received this year.

Except for the sheriff's department request, budgets of all departments reflected an eight to 10 percent increase over the current year. A proposed budget submitted by the sheriff's department requested \$362,921 for 1975 operation, which is \$112,921 higher than the current operational budget of that department.

Included in the sheriff's budget was the addition of six new officers, including four new road patrolmen (includes two officers from the Tawas City Police Department), an additional detective and a school liaison officer.

As examples of other budget re-

quests, the District Health Department's budget is up \$18,000, mental health seeks an additional \$10,000, the budget for the regional library is up \$10,000, employee retirement and hospital insurance would cost an additional \$13,000, there would be a \$2,000 increase for social security, child care would require an increase of \$4,000 and the circuit court has requested establishment of an assignment court requiring an additional expenditure of \$4,000.

The above increases are just seven categories in the county budget and the list does not include the other major departments in the county building.

The county treasurer has projected a figure of \$229,000 as the amount of fees to be received through county offices and a figure of \$122,000 has been established as the income tax return to be received this year. The latter figure is strictly a guess as income tax is expected to see a reduction this year because of the downsizing in the national economy.

Based on the above two items of receipts, \$963,130 in local taxes would be required to meet all budget requests. During the current year, \$573,504 in local taxes are being raised based on a 4.1-mill allocation.

The county's current valuation of \$139,879,111 is expected to be increased to about \$160,000,000 this year, which includes new construction, upward adjustments based on sales and a valuation study currently being made by the state tax commission.

Based on that new valuation, more than six mills of taxes would be required to meet budget requests. A finance committee member said Thursday that it was not being realistic to expect that amount of millage and requests would have to be shaved accordingly to meet available money.

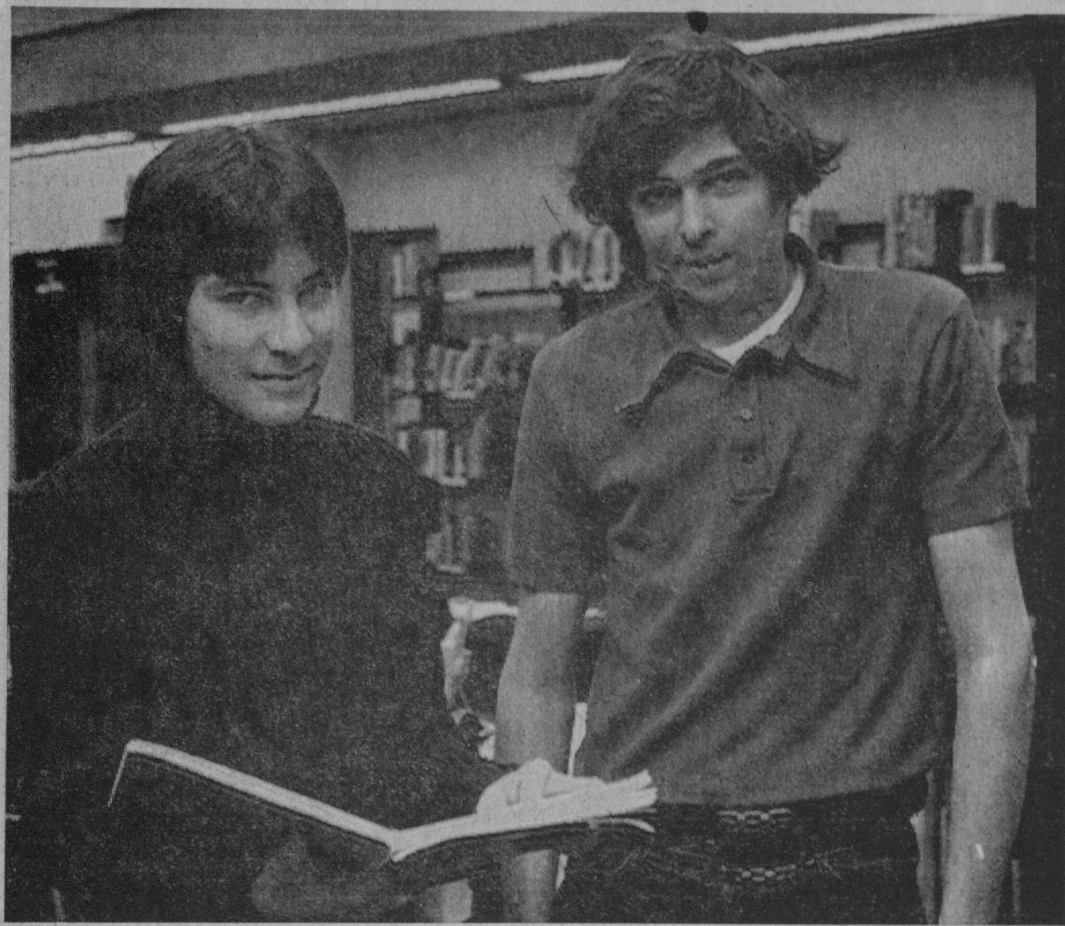

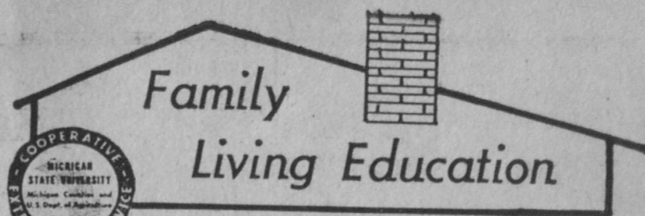
Estate Planning Meeting Scheduled by County Agent

SAFE CYCLING

Now that signs of spring are all about us, we can expect bicycles to be popping up like crocuses; all colors, sizes and types will be seen. We will see the little folks and senior adults on their three-wheelers, the bigger little folks to adults on the

two-wheelers with one to 10 speeds and the "experts" on racing bikes of Olympic fame. But no matter, everybody is doing it and that is good! Good for circulation—good for muscles—good for breathing but even more, it's fun!

To keep it fun for everyone, all who ride should have some basic information on what to do if something happens and, as important, what to do to avoid accidents. This brief article will not tell you all but it will help your children to become safety-minded first and first-aid-minded secondly.

Make sure that the bicycle is equipped for maximum safety: Headlight, tail light or reflector, warning bell, chain guard, coaster brake. (A small child should not have a handbrake. Wait until he is stronger.)

Now the vehicle is ready. But what about the driver? Remember you will not see him doing most of his driving! Better give him a few instructions. (P. S.—Be sure that you give the lessons away from traffic.) Stress the following points: Ride with the traffic, keep to the right of

the road, use all hand signals, obey all stop and go signals, use caution around parked automobiles, never take on a passenger, obey all local bicycle regulations.

If an accident should occur, keep calm, assess the extent of the injuries you are able to detect: Breathing difficulties, bumps, bruises, lacerations, bleeding, pain, bones at wrong angle. Send another rider to the nearest home or gas station

or send for police, who have special training and can be expected to carry on after your first-aid measures.

As bicycles increase in popularity, more bicycle paths will be provided. But there will always be times when the bicyclist must share the road with motor vehicles or the sidewalk with pedestrians, and he must learn as they must learn, to do just that—share the space available. Happy pedaling!!

Fire Proves Coup de Grace to Old Ship

15 Years Ago—

March 26, 1959—The old Great Lakes passenger cruise ship, Western States, suffered her coup de grace here last Saturday night as she met a fiery death. Once known as the nation's first flotel, the 350-foot-long ship was destroyed in a flash fire. Undergoing scrapping operations at her berth at the Tawas City Park dock, the huge ship burst into flames about 5:45 o'clock and raged out of control in a few minutes. Four workmen on board at the time reached safety on the dock.

Cecil Cabbie has resigned as president of Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Cabbie said he reached this decision because "I do not believe a program now under way for the new dynamic Tawas Chamber of Commerce, presented by the Rev. O. James Crews, is workable. . . I hope my decision will help to protect the future of this organization."

March 25, 1949—Representatives of the state highway department are here purchasing the right-of-way for the improvement of M-55. The M-55 program announced for this year will be the improvement of the highway from Tawas City to Sand Lake corner. This improvement will include a relocation of its entrance into Tawas City and the construction of a bridge over Tawas River. Starting near the Inglish Sawmill on the Hemlock Road in Tawas City, the highway will enter US-23 at J. Barkman Lumber Company near Lake Street.

Tawas Hospital Association announces that the entire cast and chorus for the hospital benefit show, "Hearts and Gowns," will be volunteers from Tawas City and East Tawas. First tryouts will be held at the East Tawas Community Building.

Four Plainfield Township residents found guilty last December in a fish dynamiting case were placed on two years probation by Judge Herman Dehnke.

Virgil Case and Louis Burr, owners of the Log Cabin Alleys of Detroit, purchased the Tawas City Recreation from W. A. Sias.

An ordinance regulating the sale of milk and cream in Tawas City was adopted by the Tawas City Council. The ordinance provides for

the licensing of processing plants selling milk in the city and requires a regular periodical inspection of plants and dairies furnishing the milk and cream.

Mexico has relented, the animosity of the old expropriation days are over and American interests were to set up again in the oil business south of the border.

An Illinois bank, pillaged by hold-up men three times in the last few months, has decided to "call it quits."

Prescott and Zubeck announce they have been appointed authorized dealers for the new Ferguson Tractor and Ferguson System Implements for this area. The firm is doing business at West Side Super Service, 1 1/4 miles west of Tawas City on M-55.

An air corps B-50 bomber has flown non-stop around the world in 94 hours. The bomber, "Lucky Lady II," was refueled in the air at four points on the flight and a top officer of the air corps has declared that the flight had definitely established the fact that the United States was now in position to deliver the atom bomb "wherever it might be required." Where that might be remained unknown.

35 Years Ago—

March 24, 1939—In a vote yesterday of more than four to one, Tawas City and Tawas Township electors emphasized their intentions of having a school auditorium and gymnasium. There were 276 votes cast with 219 "yes," 52 "no" and five spoiled. At the election held February 2, the bond issue carried by a little more than three to one, but the election had to be held again because of a technicality. One citizen said yesterday evening after the votes had been counted, "If we have to vote again, we will make it unanimous."

Plans to observe the 10th anniversary of the District Health Unit, Alcona, Iosco, Oscoda and Ogemaw Counties, are now being formulated.

Chris Green of East Tawas leaves this week for Romania on the Bremen to visit his old home. Mr. Green, who is 78 years of age, will make this trip alone. It is more than 51 years since he left there to come to the United States.

J. E. Steinhurst Electric Shoe Repair announces it has been dealer for Hosmer's Harness Oil for years and has a new supply to meet the spring needs of farmers.

To be on his own, a North Dakota freshman, the son of a farmer, refused to ask for NYA assistance when he started school at Grand Forks and built his own eight-by-eight tarpaper-covered house rather than accept a room in Camp Depression, the university's free dormitory. It cost him \$60 to build the home. Cooking his own meals, his living expenses are approximately \$10 a month. He bought the lot on an open prairie for \$5.

L. W. Ross of Reno Township said that, with proper weather conditions, his sugar bush would soon be under production.

"A good citizen should receive vocational, economical, recreational and moral training; citizenship must be thrashed out between parents and teachers; teach the child to do and to think—much can be done at home," declared Miss Doris Boone, commercial teacher at Tawas City High School, at a meeting of the Tawas City Parent-Teacher Association. The program featured a panel jury represented by various faculty members who presented trends in modern education.

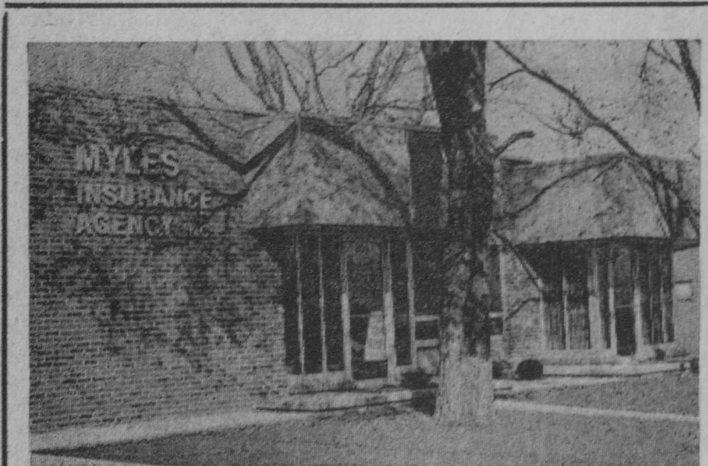
