Last week, the court of appeals ordered an evidentiary hearing into the claims made by the defendants and subpoenas were ordered by Judge Miller, who handled the original trial. In the first phase, only the two jurors, the alleged lip reader and the juror, Margaret Eady, to whom she communicated her comments, will be interrogated. Judge Miller reserved the question as to whether the others would be quizzed.



AN EXPERIMENTAL beach nourishment program conducted at the Tawas City Park by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, in cooperation with the city council, appears to be an effective method of controlling shore erosion where littoral drift of sand is of a minor nature. The last segment of the project is construction of a groin extending into the bay from the east end of the park, which is to be completed this week. As the city's part of the cooperative project with the state, the groin is ex-pected to provide a blocking force against littoral drift of sand

caused by wave action. In January, a contractor for the state hauled in sand and placed it in piles along 435 feet of beach frontage. This sand replaces frontage about 75 feet deep which had been lost through wave action. More than 7,000 cubic yards of sand were trucked in from an inland source and piled along the shoreline of parks in both Tawas City and East Tawas. Work was to start Tuesday on filling the outer end of the groin with rock and large mounds of sand on the beach are to be leveled by a bulldozer .- Tawas Herald Photo.

Notify SS of Higher Pay For Benefits

Question: When I started getting monthly social security retirement checks, I was only working part time and my earnings were so small that they did not affect my checks. Now, I have started working more hours, but I do not know how long this job will last. Should I report this change in my work to social security?

in my work to social security? Answer: Yes, If you earn more than expected and do not notify social security promptly, you could have to repay some of your monthly benefits. If you think your total earnings for this year may exceed \$2,400 and you have not reported this to social security, you should do so promptly.

Question: I have been getting social security retirement payments since I was 62. I will be 65 in another couple months and I just got a notice in the mail telling me I would be enrolled for both parts of medicare. I do not want the medical insurance part. I just want hospital insurance. What should I do?

Answer: Check the box on the back of the card that came with your notice, sign your name and return the entire card in the enclosed envelope. Social security will send you a medicare card showing that you are covered for hospital insurance only. If you change your mind later, you can still sign up for medical insurance but you will have to pay a higher premium if you wait too long.

too long. Question: I am 67, but I have always worked and I have never received social security retirement payments. I have heard that I can get credit for all the months past 65 that I work and do not get benefits. And I also heard that this credit will increase my monthly payments when I start getting them. Must I keep a record of those months?

Answer: No, you do not have to keep any records. When you start getting monthly payments, the added amount you will get because you delayed retirement past 65 will be figured automatically and included in your checks.

Question: I am 46 and just found out I have a kidney disease which requires dialysis. Can I apply for medicare coverage to help me with the expense of this treatment?

Answer: Yes. You will be eligible for medicare coverage if you worked long enough under social security. You can check at any social security office to get more information.

If you are eligible, your medicare coverage would begin with the third month after the month in which you started dialysis. Your medicare coverage would end 12 months after the month you have a kidney transplant or your dialysis treatment has stopped.

nearly every school district in the northern half of the state faced the same situation following sales studies and valuation increases by the state tax commission. He did not behieve that computerized sales studies raising valuations gave a true picture of the financial climate in this part of the state.

While the state supreme court reoffirmed the tax commission's equalization powers, some local residents and officials are of the opinion that the legislature should take a new look at the laws governing tax assessing procedures. It is an old question, but it is one of great importance to the northern half of the state.






