Dear Editor: I, like a number of other concerned taxpayers in Plainfield Township, attended the informative meeting at the Hale school on Wednesday on the increased millage coming up for another vote in June. The speakers were trying to be convincing enough on the proposed millage and tax valuation increase, but, in my opinion as with others, and it was brought to their attention, the school board should (1) have an open meeting to the public, like Wednesday's meeting, (2) the school board should publish a complete breakdown on how this new increase will be spent, namely: (A) How many teachers employed, their salaries and how many children do they have to teach in each class; (B) How many administrators, aides, custodians, etc. What is their rate of pay or salaries? How much percent raise is included in millage increase? It was stated there are 80 employees of which 35 are teachers and the number of children in school is 810; (C) Are school board meetings open to the public? These questions, I believe, were on the minds of most people there and until they get the answers this increased taxation and millage question will remain. No one likes to pay taxes of any kind and, with inflation with no end to it, maybe now it is time to tighten our belts a little and not use the words "quality education" for our children as a stepping stone or as a screen for some of their own goals. 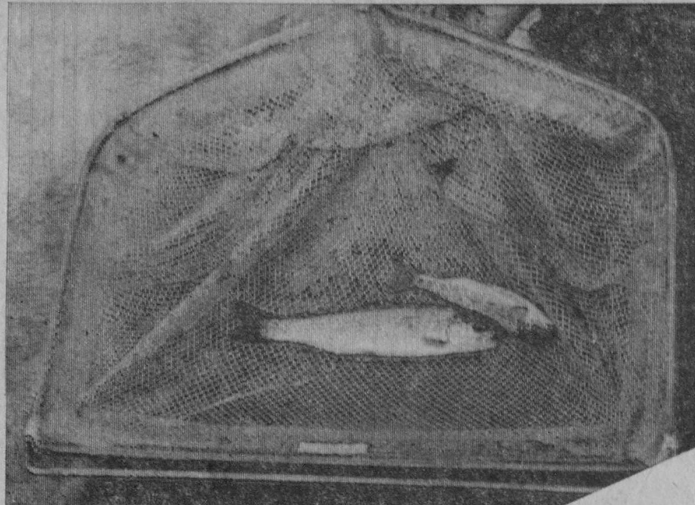

Only Speculation At This Time

Gaylord-Cheboygan Rail Link Via D&M? Maybe in Future

Should the Detroit and Mackinac Railway ever operate over the 47 miles of Penn Central Railroad tracks between Cheboygan and Gaylord, it probably would be a number of years in the future. A D&M spokesman said Thursday that any report to the contrary was mere speculation.

Edward Goodman, president and

general manager of the D&M, said Thursday that recent newspaper reports indicating that the D&M had offered to purchase the 47 miles of tracks linking Gaylord with the Huron Shore Route's northern terminus at Cheboygan were not true.

"During the United States Department of Transportation's (DOT) hearings in February concerning the proposed abandonment of Penn Central tracks between Bay City and Mackinaw City, the D&M offered written and verbal testimony that it would be willing to operate, with reservations, between Gaylord and Cheboygan should the remainder of Penn Central's Mackinaw Division be abandoned," said Goodman.

He said, however, that DOT recommendations for abandoning some 2,000 miles of track in Michigan had not received support of the Interstate Commerce Commission and that hearings were to be held next month in various locations of the state. In addition, stockholders have enjoined Penn Central officials to prevent abandonment of trackage and the litigation may take years to settle in the courts.

The cutbacks in Michigan railroad trackage, mostly in the sparsely settled northern half of the Lower Peninsula, were recommended by DOT to help several bankrupt railroads keep their heads above water. Included was Penn Central.

Many communities between Standish and Mackinaw City are expected to oppose the proposed abandonment of the Penn Central's Mackinaw Division. However, 85 percent of the division's revenue is generated from Gaylord north and the route from Gaylord south is an unprofitable operation.

In the event that the 47-mile stretch linking Gaylord with the D&M's northern terminus at Cheboygan does become available, one of a number of methods could be utilized to acquire the property: Interested shippers could purchase the tracks or the D&M could purchase the tracks, to name two methods. Another al-

ternative would be governmental ownership of the tracks.

"But this is only mere speculation at this point in time. The United States Railroad Association is to issue its report on October 29 and the ICC is to conduct its hearings next month," said Goodman.

In the meantime, Goodman stressed that the "D&M was here to stay" and that it would continue to operate its profitable 230-mile line between Cheboygan and Bay City.

The D&M invested two-million dollars in new rolling stock last year, has been engaged for a number of years in modernizing and improving its roadbed along the entire route and has always been actively engaged in promoting industrial growth in the area which it serves.

State Tax Commission Adopts Iosco's Equalization as SEV

According to a preliminary order received Thursday, the state tax commission has adopted the \$164,812,182 tax base equalized two weeks ago as the state equalized valuation of Iosco County for 1974 taxing purposes.

The state equalized valuation theoretically represents approximately one-half of the true cash value of real and personal property for taxing purposes. The real property valuation is \$147,940,068 and the personal property valuation is \$16,872,114.

The above total had been adopted by county commissioners following discussions with county assessing officers, the county tax equalization director and a representative of the state tax commission.

The new state equalized valuation total represents a compromise between the county and state over a sales study being conducted here by the state. William Weresley, county tax equalization director, said Thursday that, with apparent acceptance in the state's preliminary SEV order, he could see no reason why the valuation would change when the state tax commission adopts its final order later this month.

There had been a question in the minds of county commissioners two weeks ago if the tax commission would accept the local equalization figure. The county had accepted the state's recommended factors boosting residential property valuations, but had rejected the state's suggested factors for two other categories—commercial and agricultural. The state had not questioned county equalized valuations in timber cutover and industrial categories.

Following its sales study which increased residential property valuations in Iosco by \$8,744,918, the district director of the tax commission had recommended that factors be added to commercial and agricultural categories because a partial sales study in those categories had indicated that valuations were too low.

The county commission and county tax equalization director pointed out, however, that the state's sales study had been conducted only in the Tawas, Burleigh Township and Oscoda and that it would be unfair to the rest of the county to raise valuations without a complete study.

Had the county not taken a firm stand to explain its position, Iosco would have been saddled with a real property valuation increase of \$22,576,480 rather than the \$8,744,918 increase shown in last Thursday's preliminary order.

What next year will hold at equalization time is something else. Incomplete sales studies conducted by the state have indicated that county valuations on agricultural property in Burleigh Town-

ship, as well as commercial valuation in Oscoda and the Tawas, were too low.

It may mean that commercial property, as well as agricultural property, throughout Iosco County is in for a substantial valuation

boost. Local officials are of the opinion that the new sales study will show a slump in the price being paid for business property, particularly in the service station-automotive field, due to the energy crunch and a slowdown in the na-

tional economy. In the meantime, the county tax equalization department and local assessing officers will be conducting independent sales studies for comparison purposes with the state's sales study now under way.

Michigan Draft Boards Are Being Consolidated Again

Further consolidation of Michigan's draft boards in June will result in the closing of offices at Traverse City, Mt. Pleasant, Alpena, Sault Ste. Marie, Escanaba and Houghton, announced Arthur A. Holmes, state director of selective service.

Only 14 area administrative offices will remain of the original 97 before the draft was placed on a "standby" basis. Area offices will continue at Detroit, Allen Park, Livonia, Roseville, Pontiac, Flint, Ann Arbor, Lansing, Kalamazoo,

Grand Rapids, Cadillac, Saginaw, Cheboygan and Marquette.

Earlier this year offices were closed at Benton Harbor, Battle Creek, Jackson, Muskegon, Royal Oak, Midland and Port Huron. The original field staff of over 300 will be reduced to 62.

Congress directed selective service to maintain registration and classification actions after inductions were stopped in 1973. All male citizens and resident aliens continue to be subject to registra-

tion at age 18. Michigan local boards are prepared to deliver 20,000 men each year for induction processing in case of any national emergency declared by congress.

Almost 1,000 volunteer registrars in high schools and other public offices throughout the state are assisting local boards in registering more than 7,000 18-year-olds each month. Individuals unable to appear in person may request registration by mail from any draft board office.

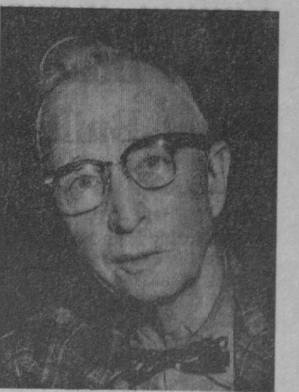

LLOYD S. LITTLE

Veteran Iosco Official Served State, County and Township

Lloyd S. Little, 82, a former state, county and township official, died Wednesday, May 15, at Tawas Hospital. Funeral services were held Saturday, May 18, at Forshee Chapel, Hale, with the Rev. William Wright of Hemlock Road Baptist Church officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

Born February 20, 1892, at Argyle, Little had lived 50 years in the Sand Lake area of Grant Township. During those years, he had been in the insurance and real estate business as well as operating a beef cattle ranch at one time.

He and his wife, Lula, were married March 14, 1912, at Booneville, Missouri.

He was known throughout the Northeastern Michigan region for his role in government, having represented this district in the state legislature for two terms in the 1920s.

Elected to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors in 1950 to represent Grant Township, he served as a supervisor until 1968, when the county commission form of government was adopted in January of 1969. During that time, he served as the county finance chairman for 14 years.

He served two terms as Fourth District president of the Michigan Association of Supervisors and was an active member of the Alpena Mental Health Board of Directors.

Little came out of retirement in 1970 to again enter politics, being elected to the nine-man county board of commissioners in 1970. He served two years on the commission and retired from active role in government on January 1, 1972.

He was a member of Hale Masonic Lodge No. 518, Free and Accepted Masons. A 32nd degree Mason, he was a member of the Bay City Consistory, Masonic memorial services were held Friday evening at the funeral chapel.

Besides his wife, he is survived by four grandchildren; four great grandchildren; one brother, Frank Little of Alpena; two sisters, Mrs. Edith Seator of Oscoda and Mrs. Eva Yarger of Pontiac.
