

Council Accepts Low Sewer Bid Subject to Bond Approval by Municipal Finance

On recommendation of its engineering consultant, Tawas City Council Monday night accepted the low bid of T. A. Forsberg of Okemos for construction of 10,400 feet of sanitary sewer in three special assessment districts.

Forsberg's bid of \$264,090 was lowest among six different contractors at the bid opening two

The bid was over estimated construction cost by approximately \$12,800, but the engineer's estimate had included a contingency item of approximately \$21,800 and it should be possible to complete the project within the proposed bond issue with a contingency fund of approximately \$8,400.

Total project cost of the construction would be \$305,000, which include's the above contractor's cost, engineering and inspection of \$30,000, legal and administration of \$2,510 and contingencies of \$8,-

The contractor's bid is effective for 60 days from the date of acceptance and was awarded contingent upon approval of special assessment and general obligation bonds now before the Municipal Finance Commission.

Approval of the bonds has required a longer time than originally anticipated by city officials. It was stated Monday night that the Municipal Finance Commission approval, but a state spokesman told the city manager that Tawas City's proposed bond issue was to have been considered Tuesday (yesterday).

A number of property owners in the three special assessment districts attended Monday night's meeting. Among those speaking were Vernon Eckstein, Fred Wright, Andrew Oberla and Richard Powers, all of whom believed it was an inopportune time for sewer construction because of inflation and possible recession.

Eckstein stated the belief that the work could be handled by a local contractor and said he would

It was pointed out by the mayor that no local contractors had entered bids on the project and that the city had asked for a perform-

ance bond to protect the interest

of the city at large.

The mayor said that he felt the engineering firm had done an outstanding job in estimating within one percent of the total cost of the project, despite national inflationary trends. He said that as soon as bonds were sold, the contractor could immediately go to work on the project. Pending approval of the Municipal Finance Commission, the project could be started in 60 days.



PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

(AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 8 OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION TO REPEAL THE SALES TAX ON FOOD AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS AND TO COMPENSATE LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL UNITS FOR THE RESULTING LOSS OF REVENUE)

Article 9, Section 8 will read as follows, if the proposed amendment is adopted:

Sec. 8. The Legislature shall not impose a sales tax on retailers at a rate of more than 4% of their gross tangible personal property.

No sales tax or use tax shall be charged or collected from and after January 1, 1975 on the sale or use of prescription drugs for human use, or on the sale or use of food for human consumption except in the case of prepared food intended for immediate consumption as defined by law.

This provision shall not apply to alcoholic beverages.

To compensate units of government other than the state for loss of revenue resulting from repeal of the sales tax on food and prescription drugs, each present allocation of sales tax revenue to such units shall be increased by 1/5.

Article 9, Section 8 now reads as follows:

Sec. 8. The legislature shall not impose a sales tax on retailers at a rate of more than 4% of their gross taxable sales of tangible personal property.

Article 9, Section 10 and Article 9, Section 11 would be altered by this amendment if adopted:

Article 9, Section 10 now reads as follows:

Sec. 10. One-eighth of all taxes imposed on retailers on taxable sales at retail of tangible personal property shall be used exclusively for assistance to townships, cities and villages, on a population basis as provided by law. In determining the population the legislature may exclude any portion of the total number of persons who are wards, patients or convicts in any tax supported institution.

Article 9, Section 11 now reads as follows:

Sec. 11. There shall be established a state school aid fund which shall be used exclusively for aid to school districts, higher education and school employees' retirement systems, as provided by law. One-half of all taxes imposed on retailers on taxable sales at retail of tangible personal property, and other tax revenues provided by law, shall be dedicated to this fund. Payments from this fund shall be made in full on a schedule basis, as provided by law.

REMOVAL OF SALES TAX ON FOOD AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS
