

# ESY Probably Not Workable for Tawas Area

Discussion by board of education members and administrators Monday night indicated that an extended school year (ESY) proposal, which has been under study here for three years, probably would not provide a workable solution to Tawas Area School District's classroom space problems.

According to principals of the high school, middle school and two elementary units, a split session would still be needed, regardless if the school year was extended from the present 180 days to 229 days and theoretically, only 75 percent of the student body would be in school at one given time.

Because of the lack of classroom space to offer a minimal program, the school district switched to a split session last

year with high school grades attending school in the morning and grades six through eight forming a middle school with afternoon classes.

As a result of this change, adequate space is provided for high school grades and the middle school curriculum has been improved with such additions as home economics, vocational training, gym, etc. In addition, the lower grades have been completely separated from the high school.

Although the high school building is open to the middle school concept under the present split session arrangement, space limitations would require returning to the former system of combining the junior high school with high school grades under the extended

school year program. Without a split session under the extended school year plan, the high school building would again be bulging at the seams with nearly the same number of students in the building as when the district switched to a split session last year.

The change to extended year would require the addition of seven classrooms at the Tawas City Elementary Unit for the return of the sixth grade and moving the fourth grade back to the East Tawas Elementary Unit, where the new library and special education room would have to be eliminated to accommodate fourth grade classes. This classroom addition at Tawas City would be required due to the fact that fifth and sixth grades are departmentalized with

students moving from class to class rather than remaining in one room for instruction.

Other drawbacks to the extended school year program under study would include an increase in transportation costs, an increase in operational expense, complication of the building maintenance program in summer months, an increase in instructional expense with specialized teachers working 229 days instead of 180.

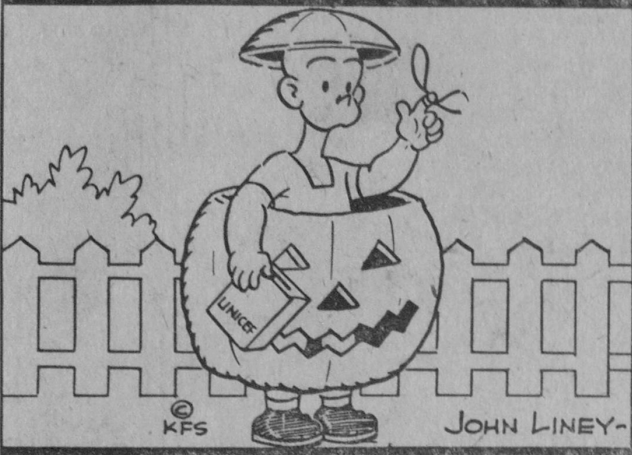
Although complaints have been received over the present split session due to the disruption of family life through the different classroom time schedules for elementary, middle school and high school students, it was felt that the curriculum had been improved greatly for the middle school and

high school students through the split session. The elementary curriculum, too, has seen some much needed improvement.

Mrs. Charles Schreck, board of education president, said she could see no sense in changing to a year around concept (45-15) combined with a split session as it would only compound the disruption of family life. She believed the community should eventually come up with a building program to solve the district's total needs.

Another important aspect of the year around concept is that the board of education would have to divide the district into four quarters and mandate starting times for the extended school year. This would be complicated by the fact (See SCHOOL, page 6.)

## Tawas Area Board Adopts New Budget

Following a public hearing a week ago, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night adopted an operational budget for the 1974-75 school year reflecting revenues of \$1,943,674.26 and expenditures of \$1,939,416.10.

Major revenue for the operation is derived from property taxes. With a total valuation of \$69,113,185 and a levy of 20.25 mills, the total received from taxes is \$1,399,542. This compares to \$1,109,505.74 received during 1973-74, which came from 18.7 mills and a state equalized valuation of \$59,331,858.

The school district receives state membership aid of \$257,361.66, based on an enrollment of

2,098 students with a state equalized valuation of \$32,942 behind each child.

Other major revenue items include \$87,187.50 from transportation, \$35,523 from vocational education, \$30,747.25 from special education, \$15,074 from remedial reading.

Expenditures include \$405,172.60 for elementary instructional expense, \$299,429.60 for middle school instruction, \$591,545.70 for secondary instructional expense, \$47,182 for community education and \$76,235 for administration. Transportation costs amount to \$181,621, operational expense is \$137,338, maintenance of buildings is listed at \$39,614 and there are fixed charges of \$99,467.66 (heat, lights, telephones, etc.).

Remainder of the expenditure budget includes \$4,500 for community services, \$32,000 for capital outlay and outgoing transfers from other funds of \$24,610.54.

## Two Children Hurt in Crash On Minibike

Two youngsters riding on a minibike were injured Saturday in a crash on Bischoff Road, Baldwin Township.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Toni Lynn Penman, 1585 North Bischoff Road, and Peggy L. Holmes, East Tawas, both nine years of age.

Investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said that the minibike operated by the Penman girl crossed Bischoff Road from the east and a car driven by Frederick M. Francis Jr., 40, 408 Anderson Road, could not avoid the crash.

One other personal injury accident was investigated by officers. Paul N. Seppania, 52, Plymouth, was treated at Tawas Hospital after his car struck a tree Sunday on Cooke Dam Road.

The sheriff's department reported that officers investigated 10 car-deer crashes on Iosco highways during the past week.

## Candidate Miller Challenges State Supreme Court on Law and Order

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas, campaigning for a seat on the state supreme court on the basis of better law enforcement and restoring a proper balance between the rights of the public and the rights of the accused, participated in a television debate this week between the four supreme court candidates.

The debate was heard Monday over the Wayne University television station and is to be heard Thursday, October 31, 9:30 p. m., over Channel 41, East Lansing.

Issues in the campaign have developed over state court financing and technical reversals in criminal cases. Participating were

Chief Justice Thomas M. Kavanagh, Justice John W. Fitzgerald and challengers, Circuit Judges Miller and Blair Moody Jr.

Miller has taken particular issue with the 65-year-old chief justice, who is eligible for retirement and has stated that he does not intend to complete another term. Justice Kavanagh states he wants to be re-elected to push complete state financing of the courts.

Miller has contended that this is a radical step with little or no public benefit. "Not only will it mean loss of local control and increased costs at a time when the state is facing a 200-million-dollar loss in revenue, but it threatens due procedure

by linking the power of the purse to the power to reverse," states Miller.

Miller has also taken issue with the high number of supreme court reversals in criminal cases. He said that the reversals were on extremely technical grounds and did not pertain to the guilt or innocence of the defendants. Six of the reversals concerned convicted murderers.

"It is extremely difficult, as it should be, to get a jury to find an accused guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, but once that has been found by a jury, it should not be lightly set aside," Miller states.

## Local Officials to Seek EDA Position on Grant

A delegation from Iosco and a representative of Edmands Engineering Company are traveling to Chicago, Illinois, Thursday to determine the true position of federal officials concerning an Economic Development Act grant to aid with a water construction program to serve the Tawas area.

Under consideration for the past three years and blowing "hot and cold" from time to time, the plan was developed by Edmands Engineering Company to increase the water storage capacity in the Tawas area and to improve the distribution system. Organized under a regional concept to serve two industrial parks in the area, application was made for EDA funds to aid in financing about 80 percent of the project.

At a joint meeting Monday night of the Tawas City water board and city council, a representative of the engineering firm said that negotiation and discussion on a possible federal grant should not be dragged on any longer as some serious questions must be answered by the communities involved.

Attending the meeting Thursday will be Robert Foster, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, and James Campbell, president of the Tawas Industrial Development Corporation.

A meeting between EDA officials, the Upper Great Lakes Commission and representatives of East Tawas, Tawas City, Baldwin Township, Tawas Chamber of Commerce, the IDC and Iosco County was held last Thursday.

Purpose of that meeting was to determine the reason for the delay in obtaining federal funds for this project, designed to cure most of the current water problems in the Tawas area. The proposed plan would extend from the Tawas City

industrial park on Ninth Avenue to the industrial park in Baldwin Township and would provide elevated water storage of 500,000 gallons at each end of the system, plus underground storage of 500,000 gallons at East Tawas. It would also provide a larger transmission main to connect East Tawas' water filtration plant with Tawas City's distribution system.

Although it is felt that storage of 1 1/2-million gallons of water is necessary in this area, it was reported last week that EDA may fund only a portion of the project, or nothing at all.

It was reported by the Michigan Office of Economic Expansion that an industry is interested in locating at the industrial park in Baldwin Township which would require 960,000 gallons of water a day in its operation. Production capability of the East Tawas water treatment plant is 1 1/2-million gallons of water daily if the plant is operated around the clock. Except during peak summer periods, the plant presently operates at about one-half its capacity.

Although it was pointed out that serious consideration would have to be given for the final discharge of this huge volume of water, with the possibility of recycling of water by the industry, adequate water storage would be necessary to meet both community and industrial needs.

Because of the small size of the main currently connecting East Tawas and Tawas City, the latter must resort to use of deep wells during peak summer periods. One of the results of using well water is that a major industry, Tawas Plating, suffers in its operation because of the high mineral content of well water. Because of the high demand from Tawas City, merely increasing the size of the main

from the water filtration plant would not solve the problem as the increased flow could negate water pressure at East Tawas.

It was stated that the true position of EDA in regard to the grant must be determined as some other alternative would have to be used in the event that federal funds are not available. One alternative might be to use a Federal Home Administration loan and, at one time, consideration was given to a regional plan to purchase water from the Saginaw-Midland Water System if a filtration plant was constructed at Whitestone Point.

One of the problems faced by this area is that federal financing is limited and EDA has committed nearly half of its \$20,000,000 allocation. Applications presently total about \$40,000,000.

Edmands Engineering presented an update to the council and water board on a current study with East Tawas, Tawas City, Baldwin and Tawas Townships concerning a regional concept for secondary sewage treatment.

Currently under consideration is a zero discharge plan whereby all waste water would be pumped to a lagoon system in the national forest and the water would be returned to the soil with no discharge into a stream. One of the problems with this plan is that primary treatment plants at both East Tawas and Tawas City would become mere pumping stations. An evaluation of the concept by East Tawas' engineering firm is currently being awaited.

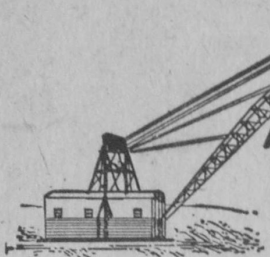

## Iosco Waste Plan Got Sidetracked

Iosco's long-range engineering representatives plan to recycle solid waste or burn rubbish as fuel apparently got sidetracked last summer during the county board of commissioners' talks on operation of a county sanitary landfill.

Following publication of a news story last week from Lansing, which stated that this county is among seven in the state that may face legal action for failing to file plans to update waste disposal systems, Robert Foster, commission chairman, said that a plan was now being updated and would be submitted in the near future.

Foster said, however, he believed the news story may have been premature as legislation concerning implementation of such plans has passed the senate but is still in a committee of the house of

representatives. The commission chairman said he checked with the DNR office heading the state's solid waste program and was told that there must have been some misunderstanding concerning the news release.

All counties are to file plans to recycle solid waste or burn rubbish as fuel, or suggest suitable alternatives. Any program will be an expensive one and it is expected that, should the waste disposal become mandatory, several counties in a region would band together to lessen the burden.

Iosco County developed a solid waste disposal plan two years ago with the aid of professional advice. It is expected that this plan will be updated and submitted to the DNR.

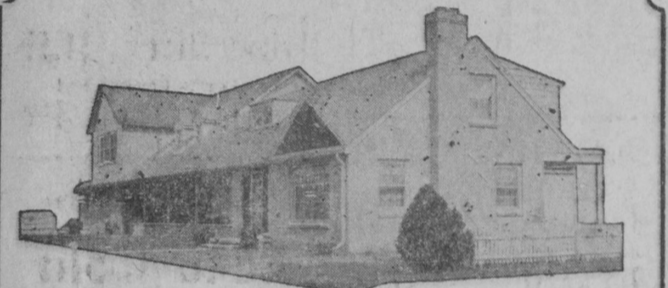

## Senior Citizens Heard Talk on Tax Legislation

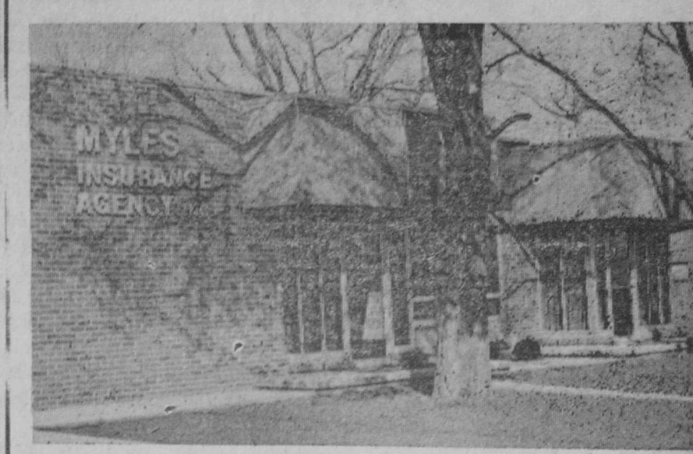

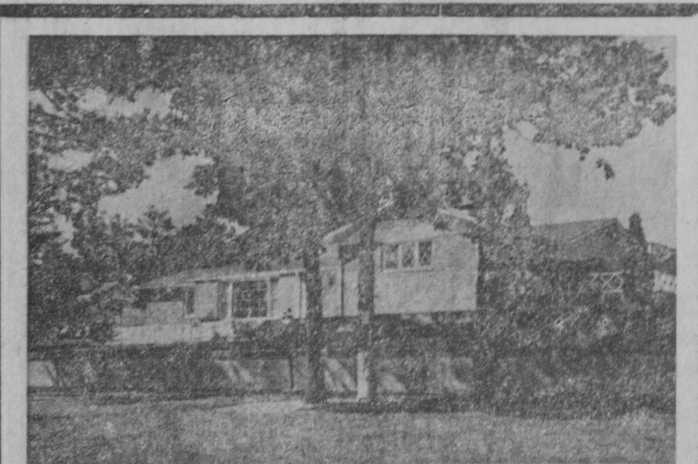

that East Tawas and Baldwin Township contain about one-half of the total school enrollment and one of the dividing lines would have to be drawn at some point through East Tawas.

Trustee David Kennedy said he would like to see the extended year program explored to the fullest extent in order to answer any question that an extended school year plan would be feasible for this district. He believed that ESY discussion had a great deal to do with defeat of the school's bonding program two years ago.

Study of the extended school year program, which was started last spring by administrators, is to continue with hard facts on divisions of the school district, operation of bus routes and continued exploration into cost comparisons here and in other districts experimenting with ESY.

## EMU Students Aided by Special Speaking Program

Public speaking—the idea causes many people a great deal of anxiety.

But to college students, the problem is crucial to academic survival, according to Eastern Michigan University's assistant dean of counseling. And that, says Milton Sankar, is why the counseling center is offering a program to help ease that anxiety.

The program, called "Stage-fright," is offered to all EMU

students free of charge on a non-credit basis.

"Most students come in because of a fear of asking questions in class," Sankar says. "Or maybe the words do not come out the way they want them to."

He has found that some students even go to the extent of changing their curriculums to avoid situations where public speaking is required. One wound up dropping a children's literature course because she "just froze" when she

had to discuss an assignment in front of the class.

Sankar tries to keep his groups small—usually between six to 12 students. He begins by measuring their "anxiety levels" with "easy speaking situations" such as reading while seated.

The student next speaks standing while looking at his audience in an exercise labeled as having "a greater dimension of difficulty." Students' anxiety levels are again measured on their own "anxiety scales" ranging between one and 100.

Throughout the 10-week program, Sankar works on developing the student's confidence. His students first prepare discussions, then move into role-playing, joking, extemporaneous speaking, interviewing and other more sophisticated forms of public speaking. Anxiety levels are checked frequently.

The student has the opportunity to "see himself as others see him" through the use of video-tape equipment. But Sankar goes further than that. He sees the use of the camera as a means to develop stronger eye contact and better delivery.

As a final exercise, students are required to talk to a group of 20 or more for about 10 minutes. Sankar says he is not particular about what group the student addresses, but does specify it must be a group of "unfamiliar faces."

## Heart Association Lists Tips for Deer Hunters

Going hunting? Then ask yourself this question: Do I have the heart and body to stand the strain? It is not sentiment or ethics—just the simple question of physical fitness, especially for people over 40 years of age.

The Michigan Heart Association says hunting often demands a level of energy output which may quadruple the level at which most sport hunters live during the rest of the year. Extremes of weather, change of altitude, rough terrain and the stress of the chase can levy heavy tax on the heart's capacity.

In a unique series of experiments, the Minnesota Heart As-

sociation measured the heart stress of a deer hunter who killed a deer and dragged it out alone. The exertion was too much for 11 percent of a prescreened group of men over 40 who had no evidence of heart trouble. The men who underwent the test had previously been examined and found to have apparently normal hearts. It is obvious, therefore, that the hazards to an unexamined cross section of hunters over 40 would be higher.

The Michigan Heart Association, a United Way of Michigan agency, says: "Don't drag the bag!" When a hunter downs large game, let it

lie until one can get help. And if a hunter has a heart condition, get friends to do this job—make a contribution to the hunt in a less strenuous way.

If a hunter has a heart condition, tell at least one member of the party what medicine is taken, how it is given and the symptoms which indicate the need for the medication. The hunter's companion should know in which pocket the medication is kept and the container should carry clearly typed instructions.

The heart may be a lonely hunter, but you should not be. Never hunt alone; get a good rest—preferably a full night's sleep—before going out to hunt.

the city to discharge water from its disposal plant into the Tawas River.

Special conditions of the permit require the city to develop by March 31, 1975, an industrial surveillance report containing a plan for obtaining information on the quality and quantity of effluents introduced into the municipal sewer system from industrial users. This will require hiring of a technician to perform tests and expansion of laboratory facilities.

The engineering firm is to study the new permit and is to report back to the city council and water board with its recommendation toward meeting state requirements.

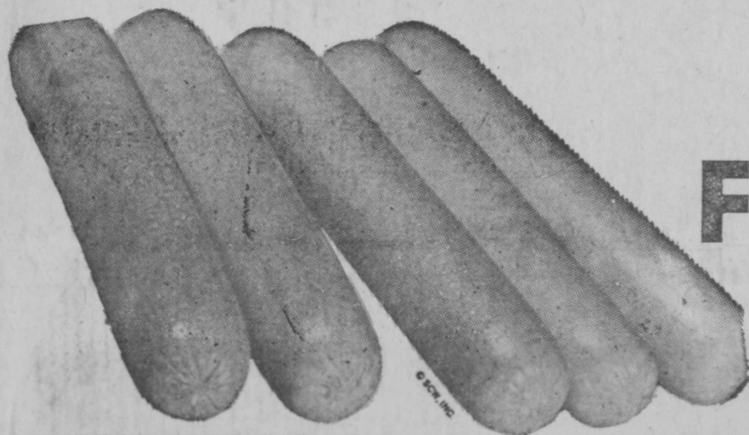

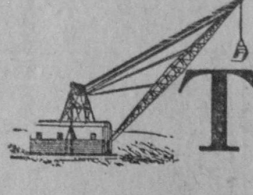

## ELECTION



# General Election Next Tuesday Is Important

*Only Mild Interest, but—*

Only mild interest is expected to be shown by Iosco voters in next Tuesday's "off year" election, with limited campaigning by local candidates for offices to be decided November 5, but each person turning out at the polls will receive a handful of ballots.

Two of the four ballots should hold interest for each voter with a referendum on four state proposals and one county proposal, all of which ask for an increase in taxes or a decision on how taxes are to be spent. For this reason alone, voters should find time to be at the polls on election day.

In the presidential election two years ago, nearly 9,000 Iosco voters went to the polls to join the national landslide win for the now deposed president, Richard Nixon. In the state election four years ago, in which William Milliken defeated Sander Levin for the governor's chair and the final result was not known until two days later, a little more than 6,000 Iosco voters went to the polls.

Only 34.8 percent of Iosco's registered voters showed up at the primary election in August, but the four proposals, some local contests and another Milliken-Levin race is expected to bring out about 7,000 voters.

### STATE BALLOT

The general election ballot lists nine different parties, but only the Republican and Democratic tickets are recognized by most voters. Other tickets include American In-

dependent Party, Socialist Workers Party, Socialist Labor Party, Human Rights Party, Conservative Party, Communist Party and United States Labor Party.

Running mate with Governor Milliken on the Republican Ticket is James J. Damman. N. Lorraine Beebe is candidate for secretary of state and Myron H. Wahls is candidate for state attorney general.

Levin's running mate on the Democratic Ticket is Paul Brown, while Richard H. Austin and Frank J. Kelley, both incumbents, are candidates for secretary of state and attorney general, respectively.

Philip E. Ruppe, incumbent Republican congressman in the 11th District, is opposed by Francis D. Brouillette. Robert W. Davis, incumbent Republican state senator for the 37th District, is opposed by Prentiss M. Brown, Democrat. George A. Prescott of Tawas City, incumbent Republican state representative for the 105th District, is opposed by Patrick G. Flynn of Ogemaw County, Democrat.

Each party lists candidates for state educational offices. Candidates for the state board of education include James F. O'Neil and Florence F. Saltzman, Republicans, and Barbara Roberts and Roger Tilles, Democrats; candidates for the board of regents of the University of Michigan are Dona Scott Parker and David F. Upton, Republicans, along with Sarah Power and Thomas A. Roach, Democrats; candidates for

the board of trustees of Michigan State University are Frank Merriam and Ken Thompson, Republicans, opposed by John B. Bruff and Raymond W. Krolkowski, Democrats; candidates for the board of governors for Wayne State University are Norman O. Stockmeyer and Frank B. Walker, Republicans, being opposed by Mildred Jeffrey and Michael Einheuser, Democrats.

### COUNTY OFFICES

Most of the campaigning for county offices came in the August primary election, when there were eight candidates for three county commission posts. Notwithstanding the usual flurry of sticker candidates, it can be expected that the successful candidates for county commissioner in the August primary election will be elected on November 5.

Candidates include: Robert Foster of Oscoda, District No. 1; Donald Griffin of Oscoda, District No. 2; Mary Jane Burdett of Baldwin Township, District No. 3; Joseph Fox of Tawas City, District No. 4; William Weryles of Plainfield Township, District No. 5.

### TOWNSHIP RACES

Plainfield Township lists two races for township offices. Kenneth Salisbury was nominated by Republicans as the candidate for supervisor and Bruce Hewitt received 55 written ballots in the primary election and will be the

Democratic candidate. Both will be seeking the position of Dennis Chrvia, veteran supervisor, who retires at the end of his present term.

The second race in Plainfield is for township clerk. Mrs. Frances I. Hansen, Republican incumbent, is opposed by Sandra M. Baldwin, Democrat.

Two announced sticker candidates are Peter A. Lichtfus, Republican, who seeks to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Loretta Klenow, deceased Baldwin Township treasurer, and Mrs. Leona Benson, incumbent Alabaster Township treasurer, who was defeated in the primary election by Ralph Rohrbach.

Two other township races are listed on the ballot. In Burleigh Township, Dolores Grezeszak, Republican candidate for treasurer, is opposed by Peggy Bassi, Democrat; in Grant Township, Olen Herriman, Democratic candidate for supervisor, is opposed by Basil S. Duncan, Republican.

### JUDICIAL RACES

The candidacy of Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas for a seat on the state supreme court should offer local interest on the nonpartisan ballot. Two justices are to be elected and the other candidates include John W. Fitzgerald, Thomas M. Kavanagh and Blair Moody Jr.

Four judges in the Third Appellate Court District are to be elected. Glenn S. Allen and Thomas Burns are candidates for the two regular terms while Donald E. Holbrook of Clare, John T. Letts of Grand Rapids, Robert Richardson of Saginaw and Daniel F. Walsh of Gaylord are candidates for the two new seats.

### STATE PROPOSALS

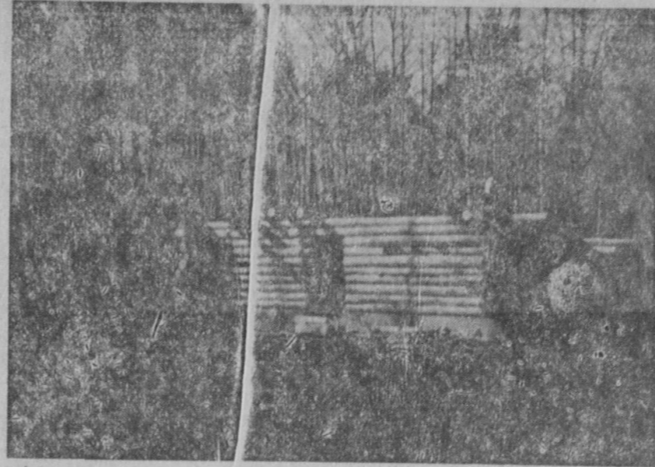
Complete texts of the four state proposals were printed by this newspaper in last week's issue. Proposal A would prohibit the use of motor fuel tax funds by law enforcement agencies for highway patrol purposes and limit the use of motor fuel tax funds for public transportation to 1-18th of the amount received; Proposal B would authorize the state to provide veterans of the Vietnam and other conflicts who served between January 1, 1961, through September 1, 1973, with a service bonus; Proposal C would remove the sales tax on food and prescription drugs and compensate units of government, other than the state, for the resulting loss of revenue by increasing each present allocation of sales tax revenue to such units by one-fifth; Proposal D would authorize the state to borrow the sum of 1.1-billion dollars to finance the planning, acquiring, construction and equipping of various land, air and water transportation systems, other than operating and maintenance expense.

### COUNTY PROPOSITION

Listed on a separate ballot is the question of increasing the tax limitation from 15 to 17 mills and "pegging" allocated millage for county operation at 5.5 mills, 1.2 mills for townships, .3 of a mill for the intermediate school district and 10 mills for schools.

This proposal came on petition from the Iosco Tax Allocation Board to the County Board of Commissioners and has been discussed each year at tax allocation time. The proposal has not received the support of the county board of commissioners and the Iosco Township Officers Association has gone on record opposing it.

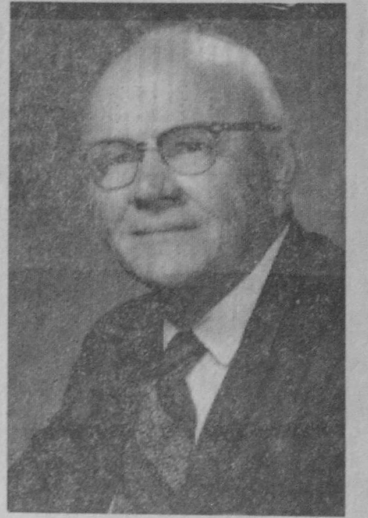

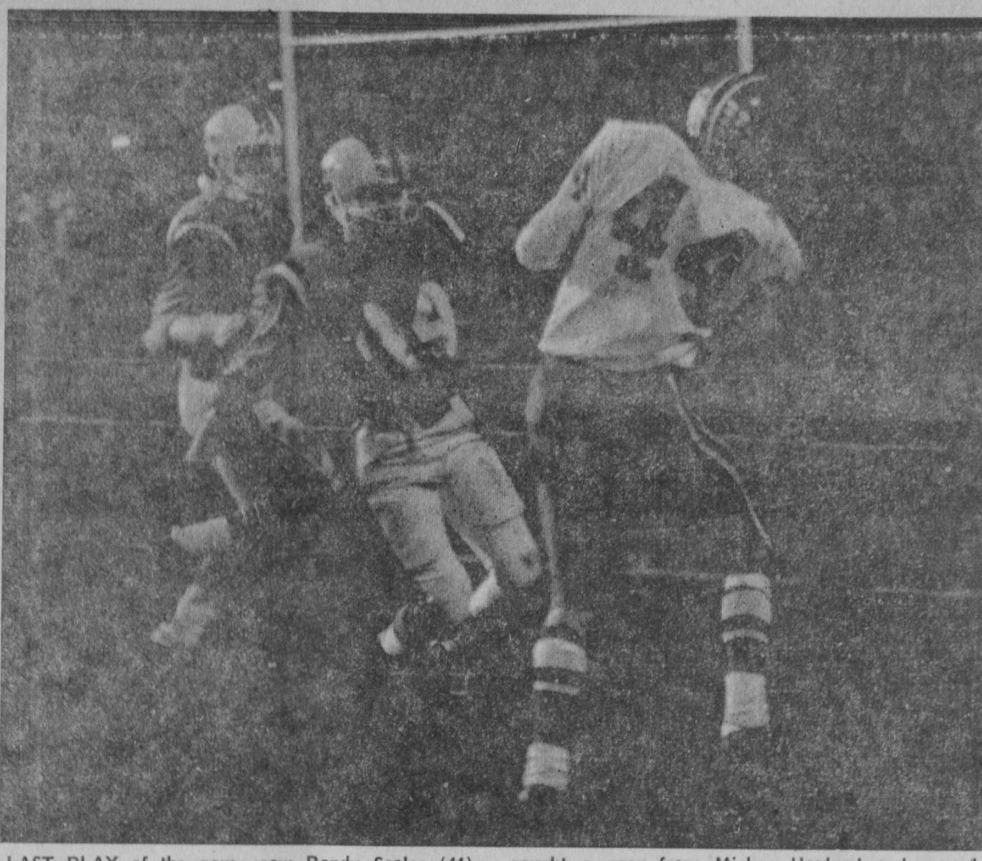

*Dukes On Top of NBC*

**Garber Defense Stopped Tawas Braves' Running Game, 20-7**

If any plaudits were handed out in the Bay City area following Friday night's game which saw Essexville Garber defeat the Tawas Area Braves, 20-7, most of them should have gone to the great defensive unit of the Dukes. Garber defenders demonstrated early in the game they are the best in the league and why other opposing NBC offenses have rarely penetrated scoring territory this season.

For example, Tawas was presented with a golden scoring opportunity early in the first quarter, but the Dukes' defense stopped the Braves' running game short of a touchdown. Tawas came close to capitalizing on two Garber fumbles, anyway, but a fourth down pass fell short of the mark in the endzone and that ended the threat.

Both of these undefeated teams were strung as tightly as wires in this showdown battle and it showed early in the game. The Braves recovered a fumble on the Garber 36 on the third play from scrimmage. Tawas moved smartly to the 12 in three plays and fumbled, but Garber had the ball for only two plays before Tawas recovered another fumble on the 16-yard line.

This was the aforementioned point where the Dukes' defense stood the acid test. A penalty against Garber gave Tawas the ball on the seven. The first play went for no gain, but Garber was offside again on the second play. The Dukes then stopped one running play and closed the door on

two passes and that ended the Tawas offensive threat during the remainder of the first half. Mike Mooney, the intended receiver on the final pass, had his man beat by three steps but the ball fell short of the mark.

Moving from its own six-yard line, Garber then marched straight down field in 13 plays to score the first touchdown of the night. Tailback Jim Mackey demonstrated during this series why he is the leading NBC ground gainer, carrying the ball to the Tawas one-yard line in 10 of the 13 plays. Quarterback Bill Romp went the final distance for the touchdown. The Tawas defense held on the try for a two-point conversion and Garber had a 6-0 lead.

Tawas just could not find the right blocking combination after Mark Hintz was sidelined for the night with an ankle injury and a wobbly punt by Brad Potts on fourth down had Tawas in trouble as the ball went out of bounds before reaching the line of scrimmage on the Garber 45.

The Dukes again put together a good drive, but two penalties stopped that effort and the final call nullified a fourth down touchdown pass play in which a Garber player got behind the Tawas secondary.

The Braves were still in trouble as Tawas blockers just could not stop the Garber defense from pouring into the backfield and, on fourth down on the Tawas 14, a Garber defender blocked Potts' punt. Mackey picked up the ball and rolled in with the second

touchdown of the night. Tawas stopped the conversion and Garber had a 12-0 lead.

Tawas still could not get an offense rolling on the next series, but Potts punted beautifully to the Garber one-yard line, the play covering 56 yards. Tawas' defense finally stiffened at that point, but not before Mackey picked up a few more yards to bring the first half total to 103 yards rushing. He needed only four yards during the night to push his rushing record for the season beyond the 1,000-yard mark.

Tawas' offense came to life in the third quarter and the Braves penetrated into Garber territory when Quarterback Mickey Haglund passed to Randy Scales. The play covered 54 yards and Tawas had the ball on the Garber 16. The Dukes' defense stopped that threat in four plays.

Essexville had the ball for seven plays before Earl Parsons intercepted a pass on the Tawas 36. The Braves had the ball for six plays and penetrated to the Garber 39 before giving up the ball short of a first down.

Tawas' defense did everything right in the next series and recovered a third down fumble late in the third quarter. This play set up Tawas' only touchdown of the night. After two passes were wide of the mark, Mark Elliott picked up a first down on a 10-yard run to the Garber 24. Elliott was stopped on the next running play, but Haglund passed beautifully to End Jeff Hemphill on the 20. A pass interference call against Garber gave Tawas a first down on the 13 and Haglund quickly passed to Mooney, who spun away and ran seven yards for the touchdown. Jim Lansky booted the ball between the uprights to slice the lead to 12-7.

Tawas fans had visions of watching the Braves battling back to another victory, ala the Oscoda game two weeks ago, but it was not to be in this one.

The Dukes marched to another touchdown with Tom Trimble sharing the running chore with Mackey. Tawas had two key offenses penalties which helped Garber in this drive, the last coming on the 11 after the Braves had stopped a third down pass play. This gave the Dukes the ball on the six and Mackey picked up a first down on the Tawas one-yard line, where Trimble went the final distance for the touchdown. The conversion pass was good and the Dukes had a 20-7 lead.

Despite the now commanding lead held by the Dukes, the Braves still did not give up and had the ball for two more series before time ran out. Haglund hit on passes to Potts, Mooney and Scales in the final series before time ran out on the Garber 13.

Although the loss was a big let-down for the Braves, who had been undefeated in seven straight games, it has been an exciting season for Tawas fans. The Braves close out the schedule this Friday night by playing host to Carrollton and the visiting Saginaw County team is not expected to be any pushover.

## Failure to Report Could be Costly

People who do not report changes in circumstances that affect their supplemental security income payments may have a penalty deducted from future payments, according to John Carr, social security district manager, Bay City.

The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 and over, blind or disabled. Eligibility for payments and payment amounts can be affected by changes in income, places of residence, marital status and other circumstances.

"People have 30 days to report such changes to any social security office," Carr said. "Under the law, failure to report changes—or delay in reporting changes—can mean reductions in supplemental security income payments."

The penalty is \$25 for the first failure or delay, \$50 for the second and \$100 for each subsequent failure or delay.

The penalty is not applied if people could not help reporting late or were not at fault for not reporting changes in their circumstances, Carr said.

"Also, people who make a false

statement that causes them to get money not rightfully due may be prosecuted for fraud," he said.

People getting supplemental security income payments can get information about reporting changes in their circumstances by calling or writing any social security office.

The supplemental security income program is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
