

Petition Seeks to Dismiss Township Officers from Suit

A motion to dismiss three township officers from a suit brought by an Oscoda resident against both the township and township officers over issuance of a building permit is to be heard September 26 by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Named in the suit were Supervisor Charles Smith, Clerk Harry Samotis and Norman Mather, zoning administrator.

Genevieve Paslaski, acting individually and "as a representative of a common class," petitioned the court for a writ of mandamus to stop work on a housing project started by Aldersgate Limited Dividend Housing Association.

Following approval earlier in the year by the township board amending the zoning ordinance, a permit was issued June 26 to allow the firm to construct 11 two-story multiple dwellings containing a total of 75 housing units. Zoning of the property in question was changed by the township board from one-family residential to multiple family residential.

In the meantime, eight percent of the voters petitioned to have a referendum on the zoning change, which is permissible in townships. At the state primary election on August 6, voters of the township opposed the zoning amendment, 391-387.

The township board has petitioned the county for a recount of ballots, but this has not been done as yet.

Since issuance of the permit in June, the housing association has

commenced construction work on foundations for the multiple family dwellings.

Would 'Peg' Iosco County Tax Millage

A resolution to place a "pegged millage" proposal before voters at the November general election was adopted Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Commissioners.

Raising the state tax limitation from 15 to 17 mills and establishing the tax rates for the county, schools and townships was recommended last spring by the Iosco Allocation Board.

The proposed tax rate would be for a period of five years, or until altered by voters of the county.

The proposal would establish rates of 5.5 mills for county operation, 10 mills for schools, 1.2 mills for townships and .3 of a mill for the intermediate school district.

Under the present split of the 15-mill limitation, schools receive 9.1 mills, the county receives 4.6, townships receive one mill and the intermediate school district receives the same .3 of a mill.

In other business, a bid from Harry Curley to replace roofs on the county building and jail was accepted. Cost of the work would be \$23,067 for the jail and \$47,000 for the county building.

New Equalization Director for Iosco

Robin D. Allain of Oscoda, president of Landmark Title Corporation, has been appointed Iosco County equalization director effective October 1. The appointment was made Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Allain, who holds a three level certificate with the Michigan Tax Commission, is to succeed William

Wereley, who was nominated in the August primary election as the Republican candidate for Fifth District commissioner.

Allain resigned Monday night as an officer and employee of Landmark Title Company effective immediately. The firm is to continue under different ownership.

Following notification by Wereley that he intended to resign, the county board of commissioners received three applications to fill the vacancy. The resolution adopted by the commission stated that it was the opinion of members that Allain was the best qualified person for the job.

A native of St. Anne, Illinois, Allain served in the United States Air Force from July 27, 1948, to August 1, 1969. In 1972-73, he was the top student in his one-year course in assessing at Michigan Technological University, Houghton.

Wereley, who had formerly served on the board of supervisors, was appointed tax equalization director two years ago following the death of Henry Oates.

Engineers Study Expanded Water Service to School

Expanded water service along Harris Avenue to serve needs of the Iosco Medical Care Facility and Tawas Area School is now being studied by Edmonds Engineering Company, consultant for the City of Tawas City.

At the September 3 meeting of the city council, Supt. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area School said that the present water distribution line serving that area was inadequate to meet water pressure needs.

As a result of the low water pressure, he said that toilets in restrooms do not operate properly and the school building often has a severe water shortage during peak times of usage.

The city constructed a four-inch water line along Harris Avenue and Plank Road in 1956 to serve the then new school building. At the time, there were approximately 650 students in the school building. With additions to the building and enrollment increases, the building now houses about double the original number of students.

City Mgr. Reginald Publitz said a six-inch line was constructed on school property to connect with the four-inch city water main.

Publitz said that a loop system being planned for the city's water

distribution main serving that area of the city would provide additional water for the school and medical care facility, but the city water main may have to be increased from its present four-inch size to fully correct the problem.

Reconstruction of Harris Avenue from Second Street to the city limit on Plank Road has been delayed until the water main work is completed.

The engineering firm is to study the possibility of installing a booster pump to force water through the main as an alternate to building a new line.

In other business, the council set a hearing by the zoning appeals board for Thursday, September 26, 7:30 p. m., to hear objections to rezoning Lots 13-19 in Ferguson's Addition from residential to business. This property is located on M-55 at the intersection with German Street. Dr. Thomas A. Dawson proposed to construct an office building on the property.

In order to meet a September 15 deadline to be eligible for possible grant money available, the city council authorized the city manager to file an application with federal agencies for financial consideration in construction of waste water treatment facilities.

Voters Reject Skill Center by Narrow Margin

Proposed construction and operation of an Iosco area skill center was narrowly defeated Monday by voters of Iosco Intermediate School District.

Proposition No. 1, calling for an annual operational tax limited to 1.98 mills, was defeated, 1,729 to 1,666, a difference of 63; Proposition No. 2, asking the district to issue general obligation bonds for the purpose of constructing a skill center, lost, 1,771-1,610, a difference of 161 votes.

Both propositions were approved in only one of the four school dis-

tricts voting in Monday's election, Whittemore-Prescott Area School. One precinct of Oscoda Area School District favored both propositions.

"We were naturally disappointed by the final outcome of the vote, but we are not discouraged as the total number of 'yes' votes indicates that citizens of the district are definitely interested in a skill center," said John Tafelski, intermediate school district superintendent.

Tafelski said he did not want to "second guess" electors at this

point, but he believed that there may have been confusion among voters concerning the reimbursement from state and federal funds for construction of the vocational skill center.

"Reimbursement from state and federal sources for construction is not easy to understand unless a person is directly involved in the program. We probably should have concentrated more in that area," he stated.

Tafelski said, too, that two of the four school districts have had numerous operational millage votes

this year, which would have had a bearing on the thinking of voters. Tawas Area School District passed its operational millage proposal in June, but three votes were required at Hale Area School and a fourth vote is to be held September 30 at Oscoda Area School.

"I think one of the best things to come out of the election is that people are becoming acquainted with the intermediate school district and this is important to our organization," said Tafelski.

At Whittemore - Prescott Area, the operational proposal passed,

188-149, while the bonding proposal passed, 180-155.

The operational proposal was turned down by Tawas Area School District voters, 609-555, while the bonding proposal lost, 595-552.

The operational proposal was rejected, 290-196, by Hale Area School District voters, while the bonding proposal was defeated, 303-189.

Voters in Precinct No. 1 at Oscoda accepted both proposals, but voters in the other two precincts of that school district rejected the

proposals. The operational vote in Precinct No. 1 was 590 "yes" and 416 "no." In the second precinct, voters defeated the proposals, 120-59 and 124-55, while the third precinct gave about the same margin of defeat, 145-78 and 147-76.

A total of 1,100 voters out of a registration list of 4,470 showed up at polls of Tawas Area School District, located at the high school.

An analysis of voting in the entire district is to be discussed at Wednesday night's meeting of Iosco Intermediate School District Board of Education.

TAHS Enrollment Shows Decrease

A drop of 34 students from the fourth Friday enrollment count last fall was noted Monday by Prin. John Alexander of Tawas Area High School. He told members of the board of education Monday night that he expects the final count to be about the same as last year.

Alexander said that his greatest concern was to insure that returning students are on hand for the Friday, September 27, count. The enrollment count on that day is used to compute the state aid membership return. The school would receive no state aid for students registering after that date.

A screening of the enrollment shows that 33 students attending high school last year at the end of the term have not returned this fall. Some of the students have moved away and the administration is attempting to locate them all to determine if some will be coming in late.

There are 41 students new to the school who have moved here from other communities and 15 students, who were potential dropouts at the end of the last term, have not returned. The principal said that some of those students may return before September 27.

As of Monday, enrollment in the senior class sets another new record. On the fourth Friday count a year ago there were 183 12th graders; as of Monday, the senior class numbered 193. The present 12th grade class has shown a slight drop over the past three years. As sophomores, the class numbered 204 and the number jumped to 208 in the junior year.

The junior class presently numbers 194 students, a drop of 14 from last year. Enrollment in this class has remained constant. As ninth graders, the class numbered 196

students. In the 10th grade, the class had 195 enrolled.

The major decrease came in the ninth grade, which numbered 178 as of Monday. This was 38 fewer freshmen than last year.

Total enrollment in the four high school grades is 768, as compared to 802 last year. The fourth Friday count in 1972 was 745.

Three Hurt Last Week in Iosco Crashes

Three personal injury accidents were investigated last week by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

A 14-year-old Garden City girl, Karen Justin, was treated at Tawas Hospital on September 2. She was a passenger in a car operated by Jeffrey B. Jenkins, 17, Livonia. Jenkins was east bound on Curtis Road and swerved his car to avoid a rut in the road. He lost control of the vehicle and it tipped over.

William E. Richardson, 37, Rockwood, was hospitalized Saturday night following a crash in front of the jail. Richardson was southbound on Lake Street and apparently took his eyes off the roadway. His motorbike crashed into a sheriff's department patrol car which was parked in front of the jail.

Richard Ashmore, 18, East Tawas, was treated Sunday at Tawas Hospital for injuries received when he lost control of his motorbike on Esmond Road east of Hale and ran into a ditch.

Alfred A. Ladell, 19, and Harold A. Boyd, 18, both of St. Clair Shores, were arrested Saturday and charged with larceny. A witness observed the two men stealing a tackle box from a station wagon parked at Foote Dam. Officers recovered the tackle box, along with a .22 caliber rifle, a knife and a quantity of food which had been stolen.

Two vandalism complaints were investigated by officers. A rock was thrown through a plate glass window sometime early Wednesday at the Graham Oil Company service station, Whittemore. On Friday, officers investigated a vandalism complaint at the Grover Kurtz cottage, Long Lake.

James D. Stadden of Jose Lake reported the larceny of an outboard motor on Saturday.

Four Sentenced in Circuit Court

Four persons were sentenced on criminal violations last week by Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Larry L. Gaddy, convicted of breaking and entering, was sentenced to at least one year and not more than 10 years in the state prison at Jackson.

Jeffery Wellman, convicted of possession of phenylhydrazine, was placed on probation for two years and is to serve the first 15 days in jail.

Mark D. Hacker and D. Laskowski, convicted of breaking and entering, were placed on probation for two years.



THEFT of an 800-pound yearling steer and the killing of a Hereford brood cow owned by George Strauer of Sherman Township is being investigated by Michigan State Police. Approve Hiring Teacher Aides

Approval to hire two teacher aides for the East Tawas Elementary Unit was granted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

The present kindergarten enrollment in that unit numbers 61 pupils and it was felt that an aide would benefit the instructional program. In addition, an aide would be hired to assist the classroom teacher in the elementary reading group.

Financing for both positions was included in the 1974-75 budget. The two openings are to be posted with the union, according to terms of the contract.

In other business, the board of education adopted handbooks as prepared for middle school and high school students. The handbook gives general information about the school and regulations in effect.

Supt. Edward J. Barry reported that the senate education committee is scheduling two public hearings on a bill which would change the state aid formula for 1975-76. He said it was expected that the bill would be supported by most schools in the outstate area, but would be opposed by metropolitan areas.

Under the present state aid act, a school levying a total of 20 mills of taxes for operation receives \$40 per pupil per mill or \$800 per pupil. Under Senate Bill 1290, this district would receive \$60 per pupil per mill, but only if the tax rate is lowered to 14-mills. The district would receive \$840 per pupil and the loss in local property taxes would be made up by a one percent increase in the state income tax.

The new funding level would be offered as an option and an alternative only to those school districts which roll back local property taxes.

The resignation of Virginia A. Sloan from the high school teaching staff was accepted.

Named as the board's vocational education committee were Carl Babcock, Clare Herriman and Earl Davis.

Theft of a school-owned band instrument from the bandroom is presently under investigation by the sheriff's department. It is the first time in 10 years that an instrument has been stolen. The board of education is to study its

current policy requiring the parent and student to be responsible for any loss not covered by school insurance.

Two new school buses ordered two weeks ago are to be delivered shortly and are to be operating on routes within two weeks.

A formal policy to serve as a guideline for citizens advisory committees is to be adopted by the board of education. Seven different committees were appointed two years ago and it is hoped that new committees would be active throughout the year.

The board of education adopted a charge of 45 cents per mile traveled for extra bus trips. Organizations sponsoring trips through the community educational program would be charged the above rate. In the event that the gasoline price increases, the rate would be adjusted accordingly.

Schaaf Lumber Company was low bidder on furnishing materials for the building trades house and a contract was accepted by the board of education. Students participating in the class assisted in preparing a bill of materials, which would completely frame in the house before cold weather.

Work has commenced on the project under Robert Reasner, instructor. Two-hour classes for seniors are held daily from 7:45 to 9:45 a. m. and from 10:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon.

The board of education accepted a contract with Daniel Bergh to teach vocal music in the elementary grades, middle school and high school. He has 12 years of experience and formerly taught at Oscoda Area School and Hale Area School.

All building principals reported that the present school term was off to a good start with only a minimum amount of confusion regarding bus routes and the split session arrangement for the high school and middle school. Prin. John Alexander said, however, that about 25 students attending school here last year did not bother to register prior to the start of the term, which caused some problems in the counseling office.

Authorization was given to hire a senior student participating in the cooperative educational program to work in the middle school office as the enrollment accountant.

Expect Top Field for Canoe Race

An outstanding field of professional competitors is expected in the men's and women's divisions of the 20th annual Tawas River Canoe Race on Saturday and Sunday.

Michael Reed and Robert Jones, co-chairmen for the 1974 event, said that more than 20 teams will compete in the men's professional division while the women's division, new to Michigan racing this year, will have five canoe teams.

The program starts at 11:00 a. m. Saturday with a canoe parade in the river from the boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue to the US-23 bridge and return.

The men's amateur division will hold a pole race starting at 12 o'clock noon, followed by the junior men's race at 12:45 p. m. The pole race for the professional men's division starts at 1:45 p. m., to be followed by a race for junior women at 2:00 p. m.

Other races Saturday include mixed doubles at 3:30 p. m., senior race at 3:35 p. m. and canoe jousting at 3:45 p. m.

The program Sunday starts at 12 o'clock noon with the men's amateur canoe race, followed by the men's novice division at 12:15 p. m.

The men's professional race is to be held at 1:00 p. m. and the course will be from the boat ramp to Tawas Lake and return. Cash prizes in the amount of \$100 per mile are to be offered, along with trophies.

The women's professional race starts at 1:05 p. m. along a shorter river course. Prize money of \$175 is to be divided among the first three places.

The women's novice or amateur race starts at 1:15 p. m., to be followed by a four-man war canoe race at 2:15 and a "little pro" race for children five years of age at 2:20 p. m.

A corn roast and trophy presentation ceremony is to be held starting at 3:30 p. m. at the Tawas City Park.

All racing takes place in the river this year as a means of providing better viewing by spectators. In addition, the chance of injury to participants is lessened by eliminating the lap in Tawas Bay from the river mouth to the city park.

Bus Route Changes Blamed on Bridges

Complying with posted load limits on three old bridges has resulted in the addition of about 10 additional miles daily on Tawas Area School's bus routes.

Robert H. Crawford, transportation director, told members of the board of education Monday night that all bus routes must be certified with the state as being safe for travel and violation of load limits on the three bridges would not be in compliance.

As a result, buses do not cross bridges on Alabaster Road, Sherman Township; Carpenter Road across the East Branch of the Augres River, Grant Township; Sixth Avenue across Dead Creek, Tawas

City. Crawford said that a loaded school bus weighs approximately 14 tons. The posted limit on the Sixth Avenue bridge, for instance, is seven tons.

The transportation director said he had checked with the city manager and learned that engineers could make an accurate appraisal of the Sixth Avenue bridge. While it was felt that the bridge would have a much greater load capacity, the lower figure was recommended by engineers to be on the "safe side."

The county road commission has presently closed the Sherman Township bridge to all traffic.

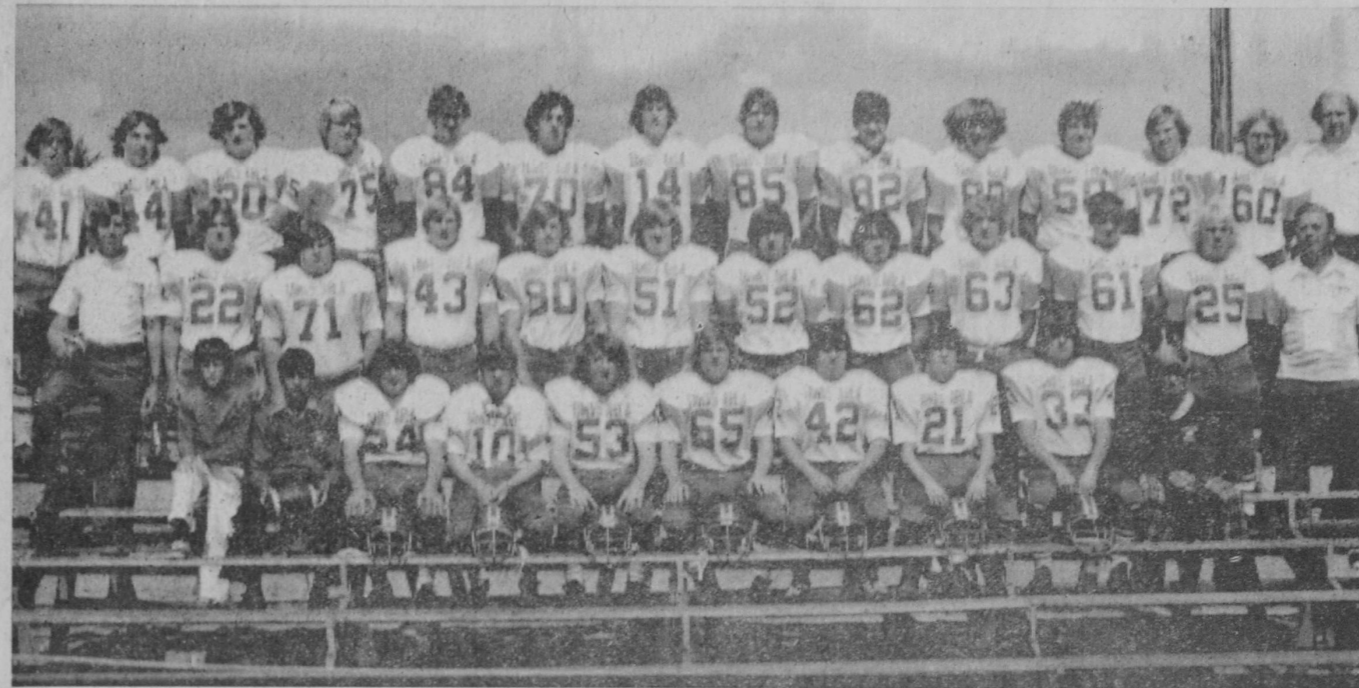

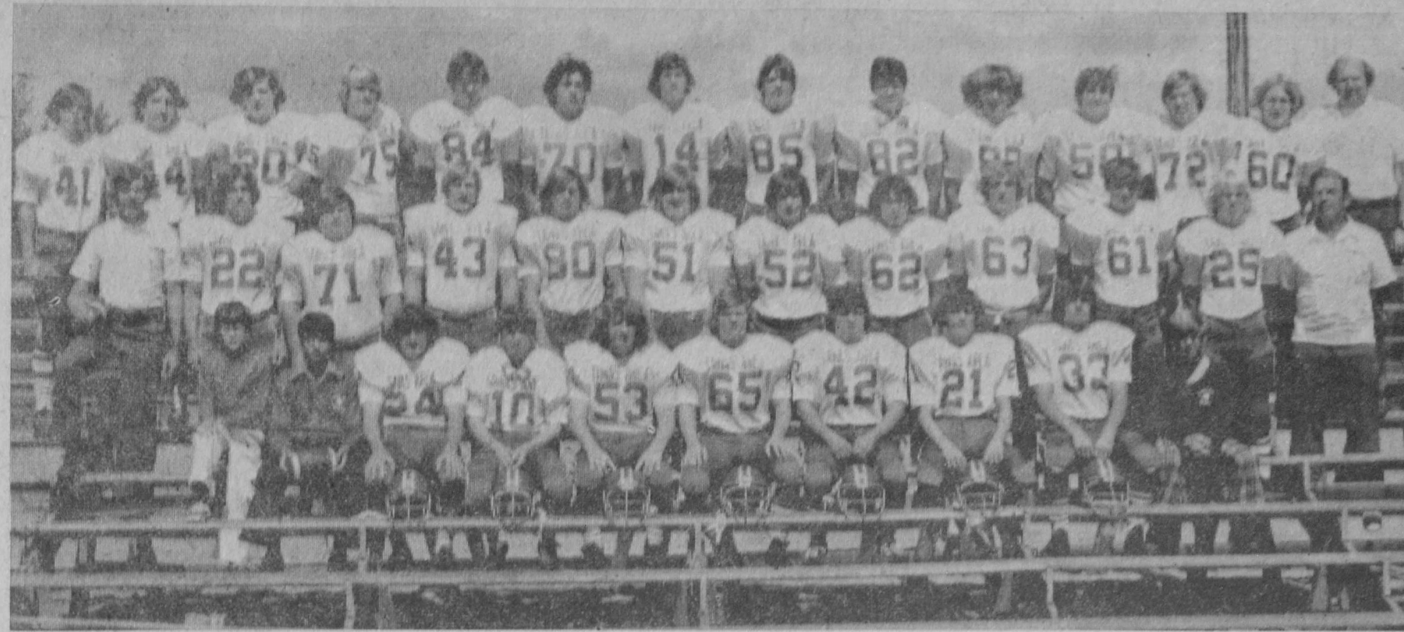

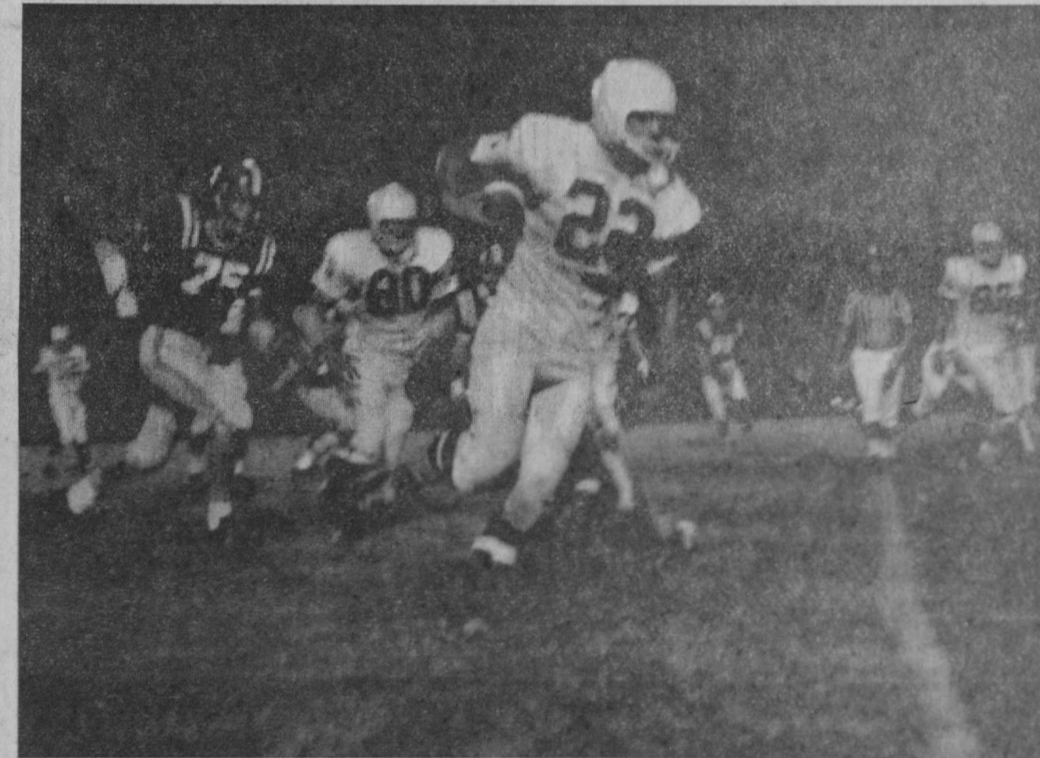
The Eagles had a good scoring drive nullified in the third quarter when the ball was fumbled on the five-yard line.

Richard Durfee scored the Cardinals' touchdown on a one-yard end sweep. The two-point conversion came on a pass to Joe Smith.

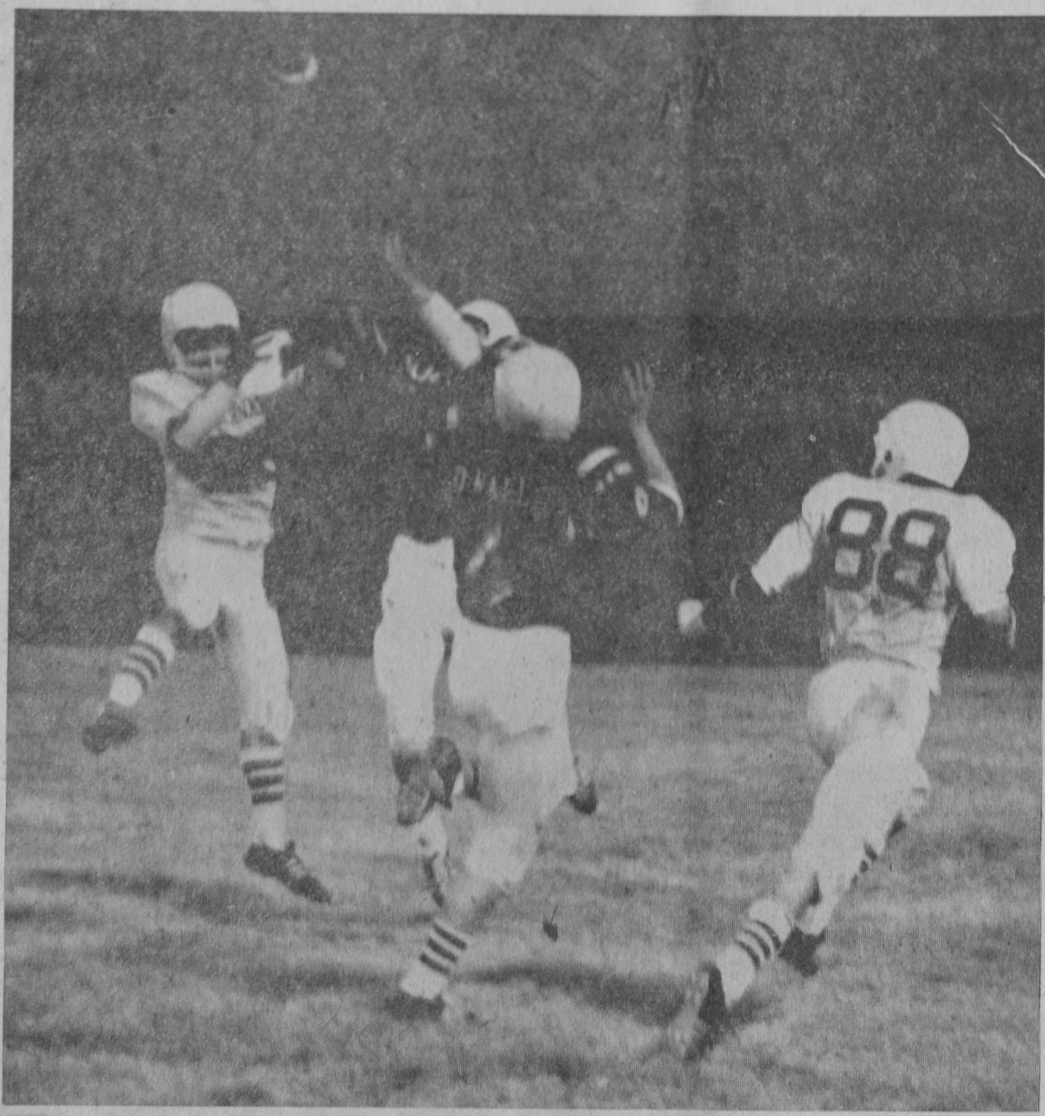
The Wolverines came back to tie the game on a pass to Mark Smith and a two-point conversion.

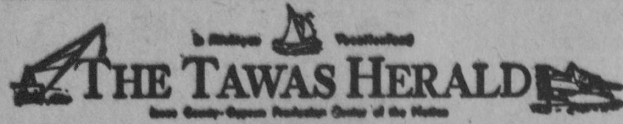

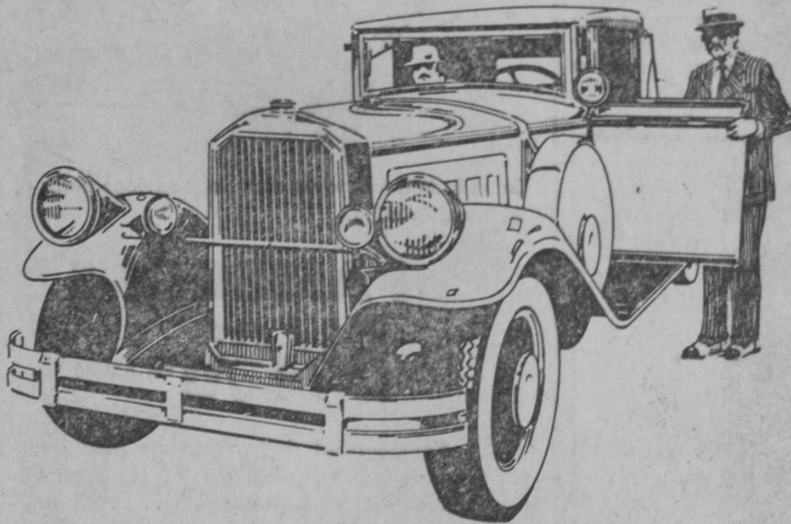

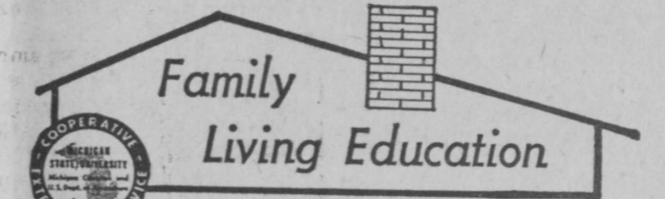

Ever had one batch of pickles turn out fine and the next batch, made from the same recipe, turn out differently? Do not blame your kitchen gremlin. Weather, growing conditions and the time that passes between picking and pickling can make for pickle problems.

Using vinegar with more or less than four to six percent acidity will throw your recipe off. Table salt is not to be used; use only pure kosher or pickling salt.

The recipe may be the source of your problem. Some methods just seem to work better than others.

Mistakes in measuring ingredients are easy and common mistakes. So is failure to process pickles in a boiling water bath. A boiling water bath is needed to kill spoilage organisms and inactivate enzymes that cause undesirable changes in color, flavor and texture.

Even the way you store pickles can make them turn out badly. Temperature is a key factor. Pickles should be stored at room temperature in a dry, dark place until the jars are opened. Then, keep them in the refrigerator.

Is the high cost of sugar threatening to keep you from canning or freezing fresh fruit this year? Then you ought to know that you can cut sugar costs without sacrificing quality. You will cut calories, too. That is an extra bonus.

To reduce the amount of sugar you use for preserving fruit, try using a thin syrup instead of a medium or heavy one. Using a thin syrup rather than a medium one

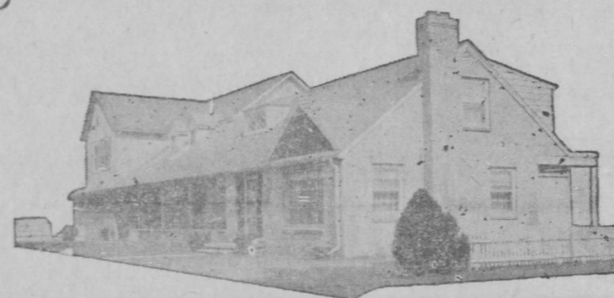
