## TC Sewer Districts Await Bid Opening

Bids from contractors to construct sanitary sewers in three special assessment districts are to be opened Monday, October 7, 7:30 p. m., by the Tawas City Council.

Contracts would not be awarded that night as all proposals would be studied by the city's engineering consultant before any action would be taken by the city council.

It was reported that approval of bonds to finance the construction was about two weeks away. The city's application to sell special assessment bonds in the amount of \$244,121.68 and general obligation bonds of \$60,878.12 is now before the Municipal Finance Commission.

City Mgr. Reginald Blublitz told councilmen that work of the city's bonding attorney had taken longer than anticipated and the application was not made until early in August.

Should the construction bids fall within the scope of the city's price agreement, a 60-day hold would be placed on the bids until bonds are sold.

The three districts are located in the Spring Street - River Street area, from the Hobby Lot to Hale Street along the north side of US-23 and the US-23-Margo Street area.

In other business, the council authorized the department of public works to utilize the service of a private contractor to furnish excavation work on a sewer-water extension to the residence of Lyle Healey. At the present time, the city's construction crew is preparing streets for blacktop later this month.

Healey was present at the meeting and said he was in desperate need for water and sewer. He expressed the opinion that property owners within the city should receive priority over extension of a water main outside the city.

The city manager said that Dr. James Jacques had applied to the water board two years ago to extend an existing water main which crossed Townline Road in Alabaster Township. He said that this extension was accomplished in one day, while work on the extension to serve Healey would require about one week due to the need for construction of a manhole.

The city manager said that, under the water agreement with East Tawas, extension of the water main was only authorized to a point 1,000 feet beyond the city limit and that the authorized stopping point had been reached. He

felt that there should be no further extension of water or other utility service outside the city unless property annexation takes place.

Three sample ordinances pertaining to the responsibility of riparian owners in removal of dead trees in the Tawas River are to be studied by the council committee. Members of the committee are Ald. Robert Rollin, James Lansky and William Ezo.

Authorization was given to proceed in a cooperative project with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for reconstruction of the city park dock. A proposal to install sheet steel piling on both sides of the dock has been received from a private contractor. Cost of the work would be approximately \$26,000.

The sheet steel would extend 200 feet toward shore from the present steel piling on the outer end of the dock. The remaining 190 feet toward shore would be protected by broken concrete until such time as additional steel can be obtained.

Tentative approval has been received from the DNR for \$15,000 in federal funds to assist with the work. The proposal is being studied this week by DNR officials. It is not known at the present time if engineering will be required.

Several methods of financing the city's portion of the project are to be studied, should the work be approved by the state.

The week of September 15-21 was proclaimed by the mayor for the observance of Constitution Week.

## Two-Day Event A Success Tawas River Race Had Good Field

There were 78 entries participating in various events during the 20th annual Tawas River Canoe Race held over the week-end. The change in dates from June to September, along with the incorporation of several fun events in the program, met with enthusiastic acceptance from participants and spectators.

The team of Jeff and Jerry Kellogg of Morley and Twin Lakes won the 20-team professional division in a time of 58 minutes. The Kelloggs, who won the pole position in Saturday's preliminary, jumped off to a quick lead during the mass start of canoeists near the US-23 bridge and then led the field along the 10-mile course to Tawas Lake and back to the Ninth Avenue boat launching ramp.

Winning second prize money was the team of John Baker and John Schwartz of Ann Arbor, 59 minutes, 30 seconds, followed by John Buckley of Mt. Pleasant and Bob Welsh, Southgate, 61 minutes.

Four teams were entered in the women's professional division and receiving top prize money were Donna Buckley of Mt. Pleasant and Jane Morrison of Glennie. Trudy Gilbert and Kathy Mitchell of Lansing won second place, while Frances Jones and Sharon Thompson of Tawas City won third place.

Winners in the professional division split a purse of \$1,000, which amounted to \$100 per mile paddled. Entry fees were donated by sponsors to the campaign against cystic fibrosis. The goal of \$200 was achieved for the cystic fibrosis campaign.

Winners in races held Saturday included Buckley and Verlin Kruger of DeWitt, first place in the senior division; Kim Bergeron and Jackie Dixon, Tawas City, first place in junior girls; Jeff and Mark Kolka, Pinconning, first

place in junior men; Gilbert and Schwartz, first place in mixed doubles.

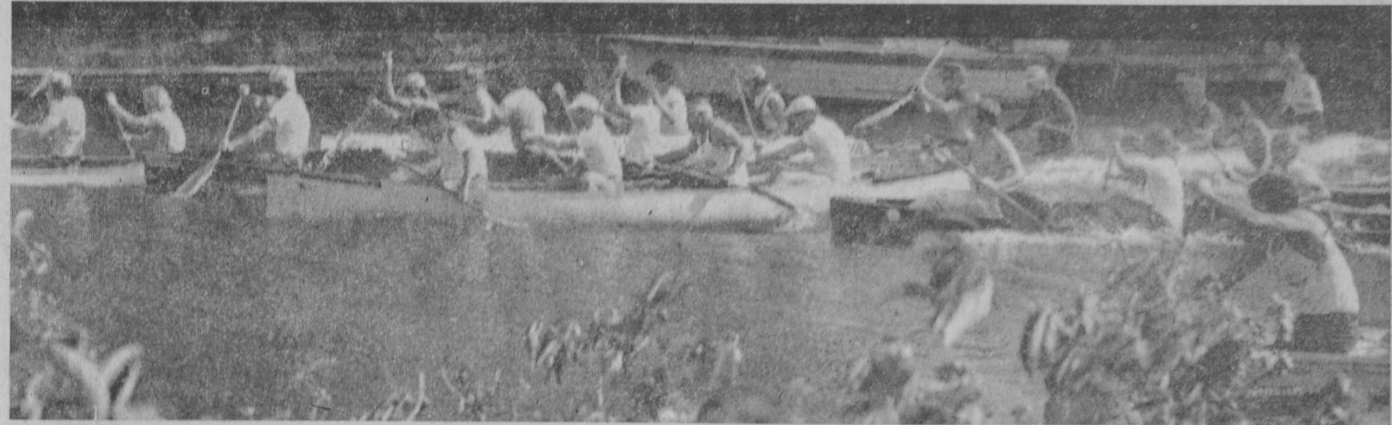

## TC Board of Review to Study Tax Rolls

Authorization to call in the city's board of review to make adjustments to the property tax rolls was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council. At the present time, the city does not have an assessor.

The three-man board is to make adjustments to the tax rolls according to increases prescribed by sales studies conducted during the past six or seven months by the state tax commission.

Earlier this year, a 17 percent across-the-board increase in Tawas City's property assessments was ordered by the state tax commission when a sales study revealed that assessments had not kept pace with actual sales. The city has now received a copy of the latest sales study for commercial property.

It has been pointed out by city officials that various residential and commercial property in the city is assessed at or near the required 50 percent of true cash value and it has been felt that an increase to those properties would be unfair to owners.

A major readjustment of valuations is in the offering and work of the board of review probably will be extensive. The county's tax equalization department is to be requested to offer some assistance.

In other business, the city manager is to contact officials of the county board of commissioners to determine what action other local governmental units are making to adopt a building code. Local units have until November 6 to adopt a code or, by law, the county would have responsibility for enforcing the state code.

The city manager stated that adoption of any new building code would place a burden on small communities, which must meet the same regulations prescribed for metropolitan areas.

Authorization was given to the city manager to make arrangements with the city's garbage contractor to have residential and commercial pickups on the same day. At the present time, residential pickups are made on Wednesdays and the commercial pickup is made on Mondays.

## New Contract Ratified At Hale School

A new contract was ratified Monday by Hale Area Education Association and adopted Monday night by Hale Area Board of Education. The 39 teachers on the staff are represented by Michigan Education Association.

The contract, which had been under negotiation since July, calls for a six percent increase in salaries. In addition, the board of education agreed to pay teacher retirement, which becomes mandatory for public schools in 1977.

Under the new agreement, the base salary for a teacher with a bachelor degree is \$8,100 and ranges to \$12,826 in 12 steps. Base salary for a teacher with a master degree is \$8,800 and ranges to \$13,568 in 12 steps.

Fringe benefits contained in the former agreement remain basically the same in the new contract.

Negotiations are continuing with bus drivers and custodians, represented by United Steelworkers of America, along with a local union called The Association, which represents cooks, secretaries and teacher aides.

## High Rise Housing Pact Signed by ET

John C. Elliott, East Tawas housing administrator, reported to the city council Monday night that a contract has been signed with the federal government for construction of a high-rise building to contain 41 housing units for the elderly.

This long-delayed project is to be constructed at the corner of Bay and Church Streets. Under the new contract, scattered housing units for low income families have been eliminated.

Elliott told councilmen that he was in hopes that construction work would commence in a few weeks.

In other business, it was reported that the park board has authorized installation of a new fence at the Newman Street athletic field. A new tennis court is to be constructed adjacent to the two present courts and the playing surface of the three courts is to be capped with blacktop.

## License Money Stolen Thursday

An undetermined amount of money was stolen last Thursday at Tawas Hardware in Tawas City. Michigan State Police said that a clerk in the store had sold a fishing license to a customer and later discovered that other proceeds were missing.

## Recount Shows No Change in Oscoda's Close Primary

A recount of ballots last week by the Iosco Canvassing Board resulted in no change in the final outcome of two close races in Oscoda Township's primary election last month.

A key recount of ballots on a proposal to change property zoning picked up one additional "no" vote and it lost, 391-388.

The above proposal, placed before voters on petition of township citizens, was an advisory vote on township board action in changing zoning on a parcel of land from residential to multiple family dwelling.

The question of zoning and issuance of a building permit to construct an apartment building complex is now before Iosco Circuit Court as the township board approved the zoning change and a building permit was issued prior to receipt of the citizens' petition. Action by a citizen seeks to stop construction due to the negative vote of the electorate.

The two successful candidates running for two vacancies on the township board as trustees received one extra vote apiece, but the loser last August received the same number of votes as tallied on election night. Rex Walters received 258 votes and William Steiert tallied 226 votes, as compared to 224 for Richard McKnight.

Members of the canvassing board conducting the recount were

K. Berkeley Smith, Mrs. Wilma and Kilmaster. County Clerk Keith McGill, Mrs. Irene Oates and Richard Papas was clerk of the board.

The Tawas Area Schools today announced its policy for FREE MEALS and FREE MILK for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk Program, and U. S. D. A. Donated Foods Programs.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown above are eligible for free meals and milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms have been sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy Superintendent of Schools Edward J. Barry will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Iosco Intermediate School District, John Tafelski, 513 West Bay, East Tawas, Michigan, phone 362-2461, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

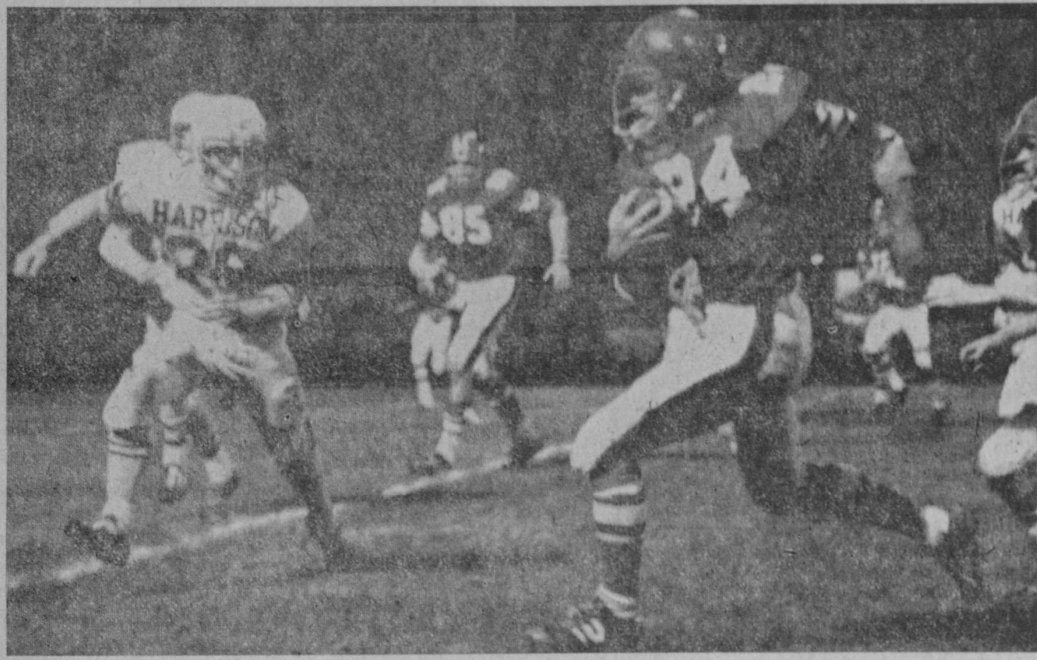

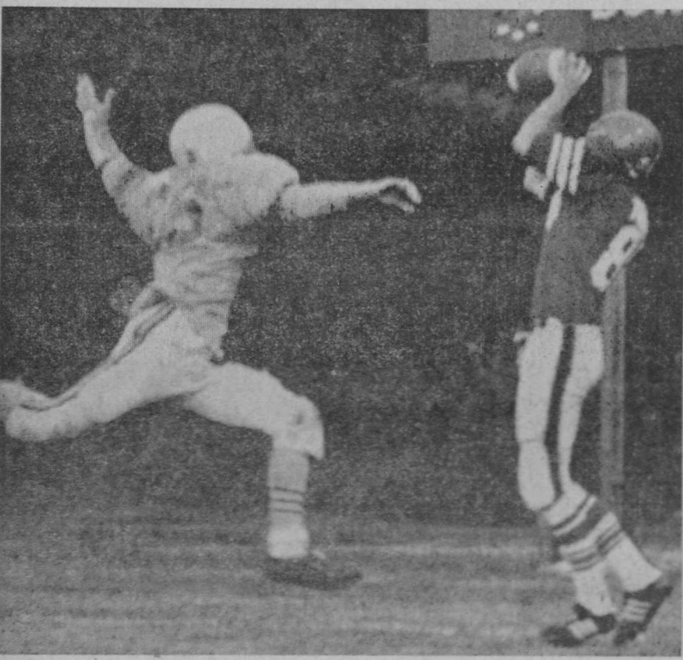

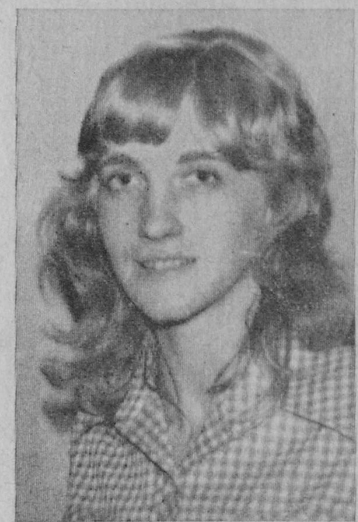

It is the goal of the intermediate district to assist local schools and parents in assuring that the educational, social, emotional, physical and vocational needs of the handicapped individual are met.

The intermediate district teaches consultants for the emotionally impaired and learning disabled persons, as well as supportive reading services.

A program for blind and visually impaired will be handled by Kathi Hubel, a graduate of Michigan State University, East Lansing. Miss Hubel has worked at Cody High School in Detroit and the Michigan School for the Blind.

A program for the deaf and persons with hearing impaired is to be handled by Shirley Haislip. An Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti, graduate, she has worked in the Ida School District and is from Ortonville. In addition, Mary Fronczak comes to the district from Mt. Pleasant. She is a Michigan State University graduate and has taught the physically handicapped and mentally impaired with the Midland School District. She will be working with the hospitalized and physically handicapped.

Marjorie Freel and Julie Charters are both graduates of Whittemore-Prescott High School and Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant. Miss Freel is the new teacher consultant for the emotionally impaired and has taught at Holland. Miss Charters will be working with speech impaired children as a speech therapist. She has taught at Beaverton and has worked at the CMU summer remedial clinics.

Mrs. Kathi Sheck, a school social worker, is a graduate of Jamestown College. She has had experience as a social worker in a day care center in North Dakota and as a school social worker in New York.

Alice McKenna will be handling the area of learning disabilities for the district. A Central Michigan University graduate, she taught three years at Coldwater.

Cheryl Greenfield, a graduate of Adrian College, is a new addition to supportive and remedial reading service. She has four years of experience at Mason County Central Schools, has taught basic adult education and high school completion classes.

Timothy Wendler of Kent, Ohio, is a school psychologist with four years of experience. He is a graduate of Kent State University.

Iosco Intermediate School District has been selected as an intern site for CMU's school psychology program and Gloria Johnson will be working as a half-time school psychologist intern. She is a native of Minnesota and has three years of experience. She is presently finishing a specialist degree in school psychology.

With the advent of Public Act 198 (mandatory special education), local school districts are obligated to provide minimum services for the educable mentally impaired, learning disabled and the emotionally impaired.

## Gas Sales Decline, Road Money Drops

While Michigan's road revenues from gasoline taxes continue to decline, the state's general fund is being enriched through sales taxes on higher-priced motor fuel, the County Road Association of Michigan reported.

State gasoline taxes in July declined 6.7 percent below the same month in 1973 according to official figures, Earl F. Rogers, engineer-director of the association, noted.

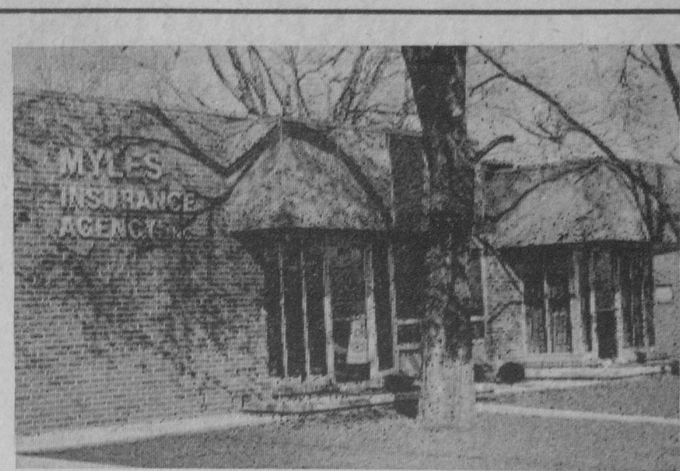
July gasoline use by motorists dropped from 375.2-million gallons in 1973 to 349.9-million gallons this year.

Despite the drop in gallonage use, sales tax income to the state from gasoline has increased 28.3 percent, reflecting higher prices which determine the sales tax charged, Rogers said. The 3.5-million-dollar increase in sales tax income was for the first four months of 1974, the latest figures available, while gas use in the same period dropped 105-million gallons.

The continuing decline in returns from the fixed nine-cents-per-gallon highway user tax has Michigan road officials worried because this revenue drop in road funds is coming amid a period of sharply higher construction and maintenance costs due to inflation.

Sales taxes on motor fuels, which is collected on top of highway user

tax, all go into the state's general fund. Thus, higher pump prices for gasoline are a bonanza to the state while road revenues are dropping, Rogers said.



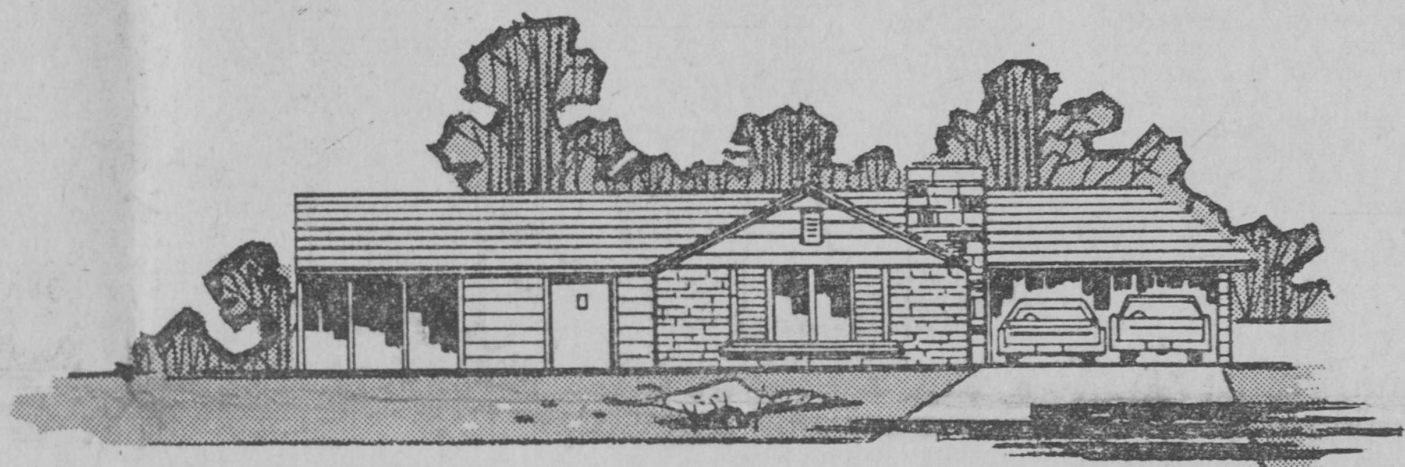

## Family Living Education

Here are some answers to your questions on pickles:

Question: Why can you not make pickles in a galvanized metal container?

Answer: Acidic foods like pickles, fruits, juices, tomatoes and punch should never be placed in galvanized metal containers because the acid in them dissolves the zinc coating on the metal and this makes the foods poisonous.

For the same reason, do not use galvanized containers for brining pickles, processing olives or making sauerkraut. Acid forms during the processing of these foods.

Question: My homemade pickles have darkened. Are they safe to eat?

Answer: Darkening may be caused by corrosion of the metal lids on the jars, by the iron present in your water or by iron utensils used in making the pickles. Using ground spices rather than whole ones, packing spices in with pickles or using too much of one or more spices can also cause pickles to darken. Though not attractive, they are safe to eat.

Question: The garlic in my pickles turned green. In my sister's it turned blue. What happened? Are the pickles safe to eat?

Answer: Green garlic in the jar is the result of a reaction between the acid in the vinegar and the coloring agent in the garlic. This often happens when the garlic is not fully mature or thoroughly dry. It is not harmful.

Blue garlic occurs when enzymes in the raw garlic react with copper in your water. Only a very little copper needs to be present. Using a copper utensil or getting your water through copper pipes will provide enough to cause this reaction. There is no health hazard.

Question: I found an old pickle recipe my grandmother used and it calls for alum to be added. Why?

Answer: Alum was used to help

make pickles crisp. If other conditions are controlled, you do not need to use it.

# Michigan Has Revolution In Road Building

15 Years Ago—

September 16, 1959 — "Michigan today is experiencing a revolution in roads," State Highway Commissioner John Mackie told members of the Northern Michigan Road Commissioners Association, who held their annual convention in the Tawas last Thursday and Friday. "Today we are at work building a modern highway system for Michigan which will be second to none

in America," he asserted.

Alarmed over an increase in the number of liquor law violations involving minors, area law enforcement agencies warned this week of a "get tough" policy regarding such cases. Effective immediately, when minors are convicted of transporting alcoholic beverages in automobiles, the owner of the car will have to show cause in court why his car should not be impounded.

Total enrollment at the start of the 1959-60 fall term at Tawas Area School shows an increase of 47 students over the starting enrollment last year at this same time. The major increase came in the kindergarten, which numbers 185 pupils.

25 Years Ago—

September 16, 1949 — Tawas Township has purchased a new fire truck and arrangements are being made with the City of Tawas City to house the fire truck at the city hall and to provide fire protection for the township. The purchase of this equipment is a progressive move on the part of Tawas Township and will give farm homes and buildings in the area protection lacked in the past.

A special campaign to raise money in the continuing fight against polio is being conducted by Tawas Kiwanis Club. During the past two months there have been five cases of polio reported in Iosco.

Work started last week near the McArdle Store on reconstruction of nearly seven miles of M-55. A five-inch compacted stabilized aggregate will be placed over existing surface on a portion of the road, which is to enter Tawas City east of Wilber Road and is to join US-23 at Lynn Street.

The measure aims at simplifying the registration process so that, when a voter registers with his city or township clerk to cast his ballot in general elections, he automatically qualifies at the same time to vote in school elections.

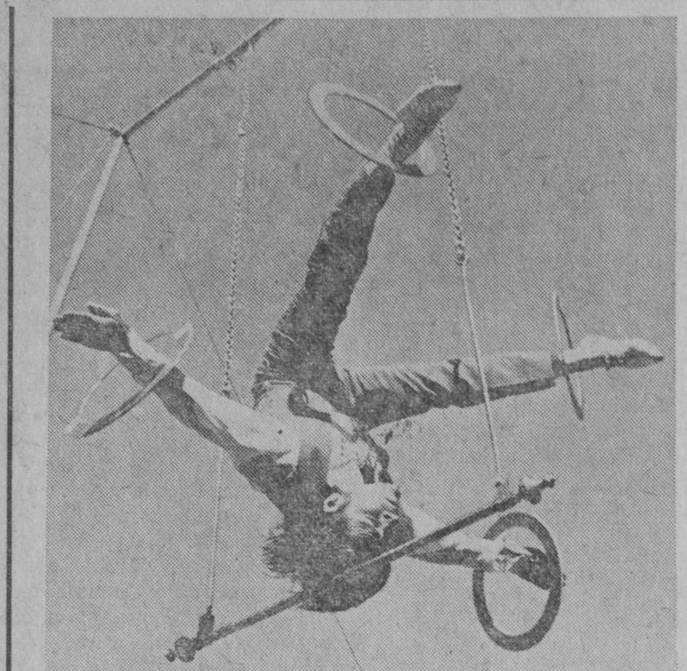
