County Equalization Delayed Until May 1

Three different equalization reports were accepted for study Thursday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, but action will not be taken until May 1 on the final property valuation figure.

Adoption of one of two reports being considered could result in a factor added to the county total by the state tax commission. In the past, such penalties have been spread across valuations of all taxing units without regard to the ratio of assessments being used by the units.

A recommendation of the state tax commission, which has had a crew in this county during the past year conducting a sales study and checking real and personal property assessments, calls for a total valuation of \$188,226,950, or a \$24,014,768 increase over the current valuation.

The recommendation of Robin Allain, county tax director, is to equalize the county at \$170,446,613, or \$17,780,337 less than the state's recommendation. A third report, agreed to earlier this year by the county commission and local assessors, would adopt the same valuation base as used last year, plus losses and gains as brought in by boards of review.

The total under this report for both real and personal property would be \$167,711,435, or \$20,515,515 below the state's recommendation.

Allain told members of the county board of commissioners that he

believed his recommended equalized valuation would have a better chance of being accepted by the state tax commission than the earlier plan to use last year's base valuation, plus new and adjustments. He noted a 2.2-million-dollar loss in Oscoda Township's troubled Lakewood Shores Subdivision.

Based on the state tax commission's ratio of 50 percent of the true cash value for real property, Allain equalized real property at 45 percent for a total of \$150,494,247 and assessed valuation of \$141,865,007.

The tax director said that all new construction and losses had been brought in at the 50 percent ratio under his report. He recommended that factors be applied to seven units which did not bring in adjustments based on the state tax commission's study. Factors proposed by Allain include: Reno Township, 33 percent; Sherman Township, 20 percent; Oscoda Township, 14 percent; Burleigh, Wilber and Tawas Townships, 13 percent; Plainfield Township, 10 percent.

After adoption of the equalization report last year, the state tax commission stepped in and boosted the county's valuation by adding a factor to each assessing unit. Whittemore was the hardest hit with a penalty of 29 percent, followed by 22 percent for Plainfield Township, 17 percent in Tawas City, East Tawas and Wilber Township, Tawas Township, Oscoda Township and Baldwin Town-

ship had factors of 15 percent, while other units ranged from 10 to four percent.

In its new recommendation, the state tax commission recommends a whopping 48 percent factor for Reno Township, 33 percent for Sherman Township, 27 percent for Oscoda Township and Wilber Township, 22 percent for Plainfield Township and 10 percent for Alabaster Township. Factors for Baldwin Township and Whittemore are listed at eight percent, while Ausable Township, East Tawas and Tawas City have factors of seven percent.

By adding last year's factor with this year's proposed factor by the state tax commission, taxpayers can determine the percentage of increase the state tax commission has recommended during the past two years. In addition, assessing officers and boards of review in units showing lower factors have brought valuations closer in line with the state recommendations.

What the outcome will be on legislation being proposed to freeze assessments at last year's level, or to use a 45 percent assessment ratio, is uncertain at this point. Indications from Lansing have been that the state will follow the constitution which provides that property assessments are to be based on one-half of the true cash value. Although there always is a difference of opinion between the tax assessor and the property owner over the true cash value, the state has placed great emphasis on using sales studies for a determination.

Regardless of what equalization report is adopted, personal property taxpayers, mainly commercial and industrial, will receive approximately the same factor recommended by the state. This penalty ranges to a high of 12 percent in Burleigh Township.

Alternate Parking Proposal Sent to Tawas City Planners

Revival of a plan considered several years ago to utilize the west end of the city park for automobile parking purposes has been turned over to the city planning commission for study and recommendations.

In view of the possible removal of parking from Lake Street (US-23), the planning commission is presently studying the feasibility of a plan considered by the city council for establishment of a special assessment district parking lot on the opposite side of the highway.

Proposed by Ald. Robert N. Rollin and Jerry Snoblen, who represents a group of concerned citizens, Snoblen presented a sketch of the plan at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

The plan proposes to construct a paved parking lot on city park property acquired a number of years ago through financial assistance from state recreational bond funds. The proposed parking lot would extend along the shore from the city park entrance on US-23 to Rainbow Service.

Snoblen said the plan calls for raising the park grade about two feet, although he believed the lot could be flooded at times by Tawas Bay. A green belt area would extend along the present Lake Street parking lane in that area and space for approximately 72 cars would be provided back from the lake shore. Snoblen pointed out that the sketch showed installation of parking meters on each lot, but said he was in favor of free parking.

He said that the proposal would provide off street parking for use of businesses on the opposite side of Lake Street as well as providing parking for persons using the city park.

Rollin appeared before the city park board last week with this plan and the park board recommended that the council study the matter. No indication was given Monday night if the plan would be financed entirely with city funds, but it was suggested that the city seek a state grant for its implementation or study the possible use of a low-interest loan from Farmers Home Administration.

Rollin and Snoblen said they were open to suggestions on the plan as it was only in a tentative stage.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the council had considered such a plan when the property was acquired. The city had included \$5,000 for developing a parking lot in its original application, but was deleted when the state said that a parking lot would not qualify for the money.

An alternative to locating a parking lot several feet below the grade of US-23, which would require a steep incline for cars, was the suggestion that the city continue its long range plan to extend parking from its present lot along the city park, separated from Lake Street by a concrete sidewalk divider, along the highway to Rainbow Service.

In the meantime, the planning commission Thursday night turned a plan for construction of a parking lot on the north side of Lake Street over to the city's planning consultant for study and recommendations.

This plan would develop a parking lot on property owned by Roy Bergeron and under option to purchase by the city. It would be financed by benefited property owners through establishment of a

special assessment district. The Bergeron residence and office, along with the residence of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Prescott, also under option, would be removed. The Prescott property would be purchased by Carl Babcock and Brent Babcock for location of an office building.

Estimated cost of this parking lot is \$50,000 and would be apportioned to property owners in the special assessment district according to benefit received.

Application is to be made to the state for a grant to assist in the purchase of commercial buildings on the south side of Lake Street for expansion of the city park. The buildings presently house Iosco Abstract Office, Tri-County Agency, Incorporated, and the Herbert Hertzler law office.

Property behind those buildings fronting on Tawas Bay, along with frontage on Lake Street to the north, was purchased several years ago through assistance of state funds.

Public hearings would be required to establish the proposed special assessment district to finance this proposal.

Ask MSU Students to Conduct Survey

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council Monday night authorized implementation of a plan proposed by Thomas Jacques to utilize Michigan State University forestry students to conduct a survey of shade trees on city streets.

The council authorized an expenditure of up to \$400 to pay the expense of transportation, cost of one meal and housing for the students during the week-end survey expected in June. The students would be housed in a public building or possibly a church.

Jacques, a graduate forester and a resident of Tawas City, proposed a plan to the council two weeks ago whereby MSU students would be invited to conduct a survey of existing trees and to make recommendations concerning removal of diseased trees, pruning and planting of new trees.

He told the council that information gained through the survey would be invaluable for incorpora-

tion into a city forestry program. Students of MSU recently completed a similar survey at Petoskey.

It was the recommendation of the planning commission that the garden club and other local service and social organizations be invited to participate in the planning once the survey is completed. Jacques would evaluate information gained through the survey for presentation to the council.

In other business, the council approved a proposal from Tawas Chamber of Commerce to pay \$540 as its share in a cooperative program with East Tawas Council and Tawas Area Promotions to finance the Tawas area's one-third share in a new advertising sign on I-75 south of the US-23 exit at Standish.

Appearing before the council were Roger McIntosh, president of the chamber of commerce, and W. D. Nunn, executive director. McIntosh said that the Tawas area (See COUNCIL, page 6.)

Gas Tax Revenue to Build Garage

Authorization to issue motor vehicle highway fund bonds not to exceed \$900,000 for construction of a new central garage and office facility for Iosco County Road Commission was given Thursday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

To be located near the Sand Lake Road-M-55 intersection, the new headquarters building would contain 34,000 square feet of floor space, including a 90 by 220-foot truck storage area, 56 by 90-foot repair shop, equipped with three overhead doors, two maintenance

hoists, welding shop and grease racks.

The building would be of concrete block and steel construction with brick veneer on the north side. The structure would house all administration offices of the road commission.

Included would be an 18 by 30-foot general office, a 24-foot by 24-foot conference room, two vaults for engineering records, plus offices for the clerk, engineer-manager, drafting, superintendent-foreman, men's lunch room and rest rooms.

In addition, space would be provided for a parts storage room, laboratory for soil sampling, central supply, tire storage and a sign shop. A building for storage of 2,000 tons of salt would be located on the property.

When completed, the new headquarters would replace the present garage and offices at East Tawas, along with road commission garages at Whittemore and Hale.

In other business conducted during the busy three-day April session, the board authorized rental of a building from Roy Bergeron for temporary quarters of the county building inspector and CE-TA director. The building was formerly the location of the branch office of the secretary of state's office.

A new building permit fee schedule was adopted for local units being served by the new building and safety inspection department. Base price for residential construction up to \$500 valuation would be \$8; from \$500 to \$1,000, \$10; \$1,000 to \$10,000, \$10, plus \$1 per \$1,000 over \$1,000; \$10,000 to \$100,000, \$19, plus \$1 per \$1,000 over \$10,000; \$100,000 and up, \$109, plus \$1 per \$1,000 over \$100,000.

The basic fee for commercial construction is \$8 up to a valuation of \$500; \$500 to \$1,000, \$10; \$1,000 to \$10,000, \$10, plus \$2 per \$1,000 over \$1,000; \$10,000 to \$100,000, \$28, plus \$2 per \$1,000 over \$10,000; \$100,000 and over, \$208, plus \$1 per \$1,000 over \$100,000. An additional charge of \$25 would be assessed per structure for multiple family and other multiple units.

The demolition fee schedule is \$8 for sheds, private garages, accessory structures; \$15 for one and two-family structures; \$15, plus \$10 per \$1,000 of the cost of demolition for multiple family structures.

Owners starting work before obtaining a permit would be assessed double the permit fee.

Mrs. Howard Burdett was appointed to replace Carl Libka on the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board.

The Iosco Senior Citizens Advisory Council was allotted one of the excess sheriff's department vehicles for use as a substitute for the vehicle presently leased by the council. All cost of operation and insurance would be borne by the users and title would remain with the county.

A bid of \$4.75 per folio for publication of county commission proceedings was accepted from The Tawas Herald.

Iosco Tax Allocators Organize

Iosco County Tax Allocation Board opened its annual juggling contest Monday, but it would take a magician to stretch the 15 mills of taxes under its jurisdiction into an amount large enough to meet operational budgets submitted by the county and schools.

Three schools of the county submitted budgets for 1975-76 which would require 10 mills of taxes to meet, or three-quarters of a mill more than the slice received during the current year; the county submitted a budget requiring one mill of taxes above the 4½ mills allocated last year.

The allocation board accepted the budgets and sent an invitation to all schools and the county to be on hand Monday, May 19, for discussions prior to adoption of a preliminary allocation. Although representatives of townships have been invited to that meeting, state law provides that one mill of taxes be allocated to any township showing a budget need and it is not expected that budgets from those units will be questioned.

Apparently heading for trouble with the allocation board are new programs being proposed by the county and schools. Two members of the allocation board expressed the opinion that it would be most difficult to meet regular programs under the 15-mill limitation, without even considering new programs contained in budgets.

Tawas Prepare for Cleanup Days

It is spring cleanup time in the Tawas and city councils of both communities urge residents to cooperate in this annual campaign.

Tawas City will hold its cleanup day on Thursday, May 1, while Monday, May 5, has been designated as the cleanup day at East Tawas.

Rubbish and discards should be placed next to streets on the days preceding the cleanup.

Expect Approval of Federal Grants

Two federal agencies are expected to award grants totaling \$960,000 for the Tawas area water expansion project, Cong. Philip E. Ruppe, 11th District, announced Thursday.

Ruppe said the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission is expected to approve a \$240,000 allocation for the system at its meeting in Wausau, Wisconsin, April 22.

In addition, Ruppe said, the Economic Development Administration (EDA) is expected to grant \$720,000 towards construction of the project. The local share is pegged at \$790,000.

The expansion project is necessary, according to local leaders, in order to service the Tawas area's two industrial parks, located in Tawas City and Baldwin Township.

Construction will include two 900,000-gallon above ground storage tanks, one in Tawas City and one in Baldwin Township. A million-gallon capacity tank will also be constructed in East Tawas at ground level.

Ruppe said the storage system's capacity will permit industrial park users to install sprinkler systems. The sprinklers will help lower insurance rates for residents of the parks.

"This substantial federal commitment, which my office has been pursuing since last year, is the result of long labors on the part of Tawas area leaders," Ruppe said. "I am hopeful the water storage and feeder system will enable both industrial parks to attract the industry which will keep economic expansion moving ahead in Iosco County."

East Tawas OK's Its Share of Project

East Tawas Council voted Monday night to bind the city to its share of the \$1,780,000 water expansion project to serve industrial development parks in the area.

The cooperative project between East Tawas, Tawas City and Baldwin Township is to receive federal funding representing 55 percent of the total cost. The city is to pay the remaining 45 percent of the cost of work within its boundaries.

It is expected that the Tawas City Council and Baldwin Township Board will follow suit by approving payment of 45 percent of the cost within boundaries of those two units.

In other business, the finance committee reported that money was not available this year for the annual banquet of the volunteer fire department. It was recommended that funds be specified in next year's budget for a volunteer

firemen's banquet. The council approved payment of \$540 as the city's share of financing an advertising sign on I-75 south of Standish promoting the Tawas and Oscoda areas.

The council approved an offer from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for turning over a 5,000-gallon tank truck for fire fighting purposes. Cost to the city is \$50. The truck is to be used in a cooperative effort with the DNR for fighting grass fires.

The superintendent of public works is to investigate a complaint from an East Franklin Street resident concerning the settling of a residential foundation. Mrs. Laura McLean said that since a sewer had been constructed by the city along the street, the foundation of her home had gradually settled and has caused problems with her roof and other parts of the structure.

and county will be asked to justify proposed new programs as well as provide data on actual revenue received, actual expenditures, tax levies and property valuations over the past two years.

Complicating the allocation procedure this year is the fact that the Iosco County Board of Commissioners has not adopted an equalized value for the county and does not expect to take action until May 1. Estimated valuations were used in preparing the budgets.

Following the preliminary order on May 19, representatives of the schools and the county would have an opportunity to make a second appearance before the allocation board. The final order is to be drawn no later than June 1.

was cooperating with Wurtsmith Air Force Base and Oscoda in an 18-month contract to rent the 14 by 48-foot illuminated sign. A one-third share offered by the air base is to be matched by Oscoda and the Tawas.

Besides identifying and promoting use of US-23, the sign would list important events and dates in the Tawas-Oscoda area. As its share, the chamber of commerce is paying for rental of other advertising signs throughout the state.

A bid to construct fencing around the new tennis court on First Avenue at the athletic field was awarded to Humpert Fence Company, Reese, which submitted the low bid of \$3,150.50. The contract calls for construction of 280 feet of 10-foot chain link fencing, along with 192 feet of five-foot fencing with two gates. One other bid was received from Iosco Fence and Remodeling Company, \$4,623.90.

Acting in the absence of Mayor John Brugger, James Lansky, mayor pro tem, appointed Aldermen William Groff, William Ezo and Clark Tanner to serve as a committee to meet with a committee from the East Tawas Council to discuss the possibility of a joint police force for the two communities. The committee is to meet April 29 to discuss the proposal before meeting with the council as a whole on May 5. The Tawas City committee would then meet with the East Tawas committee to discuss the matter.

Authorization to pay the regular rate of \$25 per day for election board workers and \$2.50 per hour for counters was given by the council for the special election Wednesday (today) on the Consumers Power Company franchise. Cost of the election is being paid by the power company.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that T. A. Forsberg Construction Company, Okemos, was running ahead of schedule on its contract to construct special assessment sewer mains in the city. Although the contract has a September 30 completion date, Bublitz said the project would be completed ahead of schedule. Payment of \$41,846 to the contractor, representing the first phase of the project, was authorized. Money received through the sale of special assessment and general obligation bonds to finance this project is to be invested at the highest interest rate possible.

A resolution authorizing a payroll deduction plan for cancer care insurance, being proposed by Herbert Cholger to city employees on a voluntary basis, was adopted by the council.

On recommendation of Ald. Robert N. Rollin, the council is to study the city charter for possible amendments. Rollin said he was of the opinion that the charter provision prohibiting members of the city council from serving on the volunteer fire department or to other city positions for pay should be deleted. The city attorney is to be requested to outline steps for a charter amendment, which would require a vote of the people.

It was announced that Tuesday, June 17, is the deadline for filing nominating petitions for city offices in the August primary election.

Rick Storms was the losing pitcher in Friday's game against Alpena. Scales had a double and a single and Haglund had a triple and a single to lead the Braves in hitting.

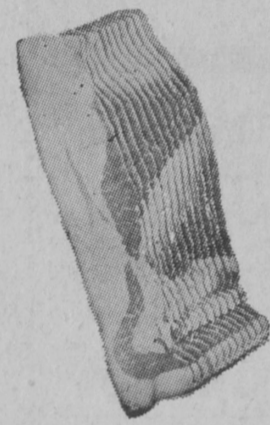

Commission Cut Requests, but Budget Requires Extra Mill

Adoption of a \$1,378,589 preliminary budget for 1976 was approved Thursday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. The budget is nine percent higher than last year's county operational expenditure, plus \$60,000 in new programs.

Donald Griffin, county finance chairman, said that the budget would require an allocation of 5.5 mills in local taxes, one mill higher than received for 1975 operation. He said that about .3 of a mill would be required to meet new programs alone.

The county commission received requests from the various departments totaling \$1,516,542, but \$138,000 was lopped off that amount for the final budget to be presented to the tax allocation board this week.

The \$60,000 in new programs represented \$8,333 to the senior citizens council, \$25,000 for airport expansion, \$15,700 to relieve local units of government of the burden of financing the hospital ambulance service and \$5,000 each to Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce, Tawas Chamber of Commerce and Hale Chamber of Commerce.

The supplement to the ambulance service has been requested by the Iosco Townships Association and city councils of East Tawas, Tawas City and Whittemore.

The figure includes a \$3,000 supplement to Oscoda Township, which pays two funeral directors to provide ambulance service to Oscoda and AuSable Townships.

Five percent of the nine percent increase is for salary increases to department heads and county employees. There is a 25.9 percent increase in fringe benefits to employees.

The proposed budget by departments is as follows:

Probate court: Judge, \$15,645; register, \$5,000; substitute clerk, \$500; department expense, \$9,015. Total \$30,160.

Cooperative Extension: Deputy, \$7,248; part-time clerk, \$3,200; department expense, \$20,150. Total \$30,598.

Treasurer: Treasurer, \$13,125; deputy, \$6,734; clerk-secretary, \$6,224; assistant bookkeeper, \$2,500; assistant clerk, \$2,500; department expense, \$8,662. Total \$39,745.

Register of deeds: Register, \$13,125; deputy, \$6,224; two clerks, \$10,010; part-time clerk, \$500; microfilm operator, \$6,734; department expense, \$11,739. Total \$48,332.

Cite Benefits of Central Garage for Iosco County

In answer to a petition from Plainfield Township residents expressing concern over the proposed consolidation of three county road garages, Iosco County Road Commission said Wednesday that it would retain the option of stationing a plow truck at Hale for winter emergencies.

Following announcement in November that the road commission plans to construct a new facility on M-55 at Sand Lake Road, Plainfield residents were concerned that closure of the garage at Hale would result in a hardship if a plow was needed to open roads for fire trucks and the ambulance.

The road commission's letter stated that while it was retaining the option of stationing a plow at Hale, it felt that night personnel operating out of the new facility could offer faster service as it is only a 15-minute drive from Hale.

"Our forces will report to work at a more central location and this will spread the cost of travel time to projects more evenly among the various townships," stated the letter. "With the move being in the direction of Hale, your district will receive a greater benefit than those areas on the eastern side of the county."

The road commission said the new location would mean no decrease in the level of service to the Plainfield Township area. "Rather, through centralization and modernization, we can assure

you an increase in our efficiency and service capability."

The proposed new \$750,000 garage-office headquarters, to be financed from fuel taxes and license plate money with no county property tax involved, would replace the present garage and office at East Tawas, along with garages at Whittemore and Hale. The garage at Oscoda would be retained.

Route of the state's proposed new US-23 expressway, expected sometime in the 1980s, is expected to fall somewhere in the corridor between Sand Lake Road and Kobs Road. The southern interchange to the Tawas, along with one to serve Western Iosco County, would be M-55 and the new headquarters building would be centrally located for expressway maintenance.

Road Commission Reports on Work During Past Year

Iosco County Road Commission, which has responsibility for maintaining 886.8 miles of roadway in this county, had a total expenditure of \$1,330,595 during 1975, according to a report submitted Wednesday to the county board of commissioners.

With receipts balancing expenditures, the total included \$556,866 for new construction, \$426,773 for maintenance, \$72,447 for winter maintenance (snowplowing) and \$22,923 for traffic control.

Administrative expense during the year amounted to \$76,515, equipment expense totaled \$20,516 and capital outlay was \$62,324.

Major portion of the commission's receipts, \$1,088,445, came through the state's Act 51 allocation from gas and weight taxes. Federal aid secondary funds amounted to \$12,339 and \$2,665 came from the national forest reserve. Township contributions amounted to \$192,416.

Expenditures in the various units were as follows: Alabaster, \$14,884 for maintenance and \$2,440 for local construction; AuSable, \$16,598 for maintenance and \$55,588 for new construction; Baldwin, \$46,243 for maintenance and \$41,000 for local construction; Burleigh, \$33,269 for maintenance and \$25,664 for local construction; Grant, \$33,218 for maintenance and \$114 in local construction; Oscoda, \$97,804 in maintenance and \$102,039 for local construction; Plainfield, \$88,893 in maintenance and \$40,775 in new construction; Reno, \$21,278 in maintenance and

\$16,959 in local construction; Sherman, \$21,983 in maintenance and \$963 in new construction; Tawas, \$43,146 in maintenance and \$14,101 in new construction; Wilber, \$48,569 in maintenance and \$9,518 in new construction.

The road commission has a \$3,195,000 construction program planned for 1975-76. The work is as follows:

Camel Road, from Monument Road to Essex Road, 2.20 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$120,000; Essex Road, from Indian Lake Road to Plank Road, 1.01 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$50,000; Old State Road, from Britt Road to Sand Lake Road, 3.97 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$350,000; Alabaster Road, from US-23 to Lorenz Road, 2.14 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$150,000; Britt Road, from Turtle Road to Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks, 1.20 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$40,000; Esmond Road, from west County Line to Putnam Road, 2.92 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$140,000 (to be graded this year and hard surfaced in 1976);

Bridge on old M-171 over Van Etnan Creek, 56 feet wide, four lanes, two-span steel and concrete, \$180,000; old M-171, from US-23 to Wurtsmith Air Force Base, widen to four lanes with curbing, 1.31 miles, \$1,000,000; River Road and Monument Road from East Tawas to M-65, 16.69 miles, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$750,000; railroad crossing reconstruction, \$100,000; South Branch Road bridge, 28-foot wide, precast concrete, \$50,000; Alabaster Road, Binder Road to Sand Lake Road, one mile, 22-foot wide bituminous surface, \$75,000.

County Building Inspector Named

Francis J. Block, 56, who has been associated with the mechanical construction field since 1939, was hired last week as Iosco County's new building and safety inspector.

In this new capacity, Block will be immediately enforcing provisions of the state building code in Tawas City, Whittemore and the Townships of Baldwin, Burleigh, Grant, Reno, Sherman and Wilber. Other units of the county have adopted the BOCA construction code and will provide their own inspection and enforcement.

Although permanent office space has not been provided as yet, Block is now in the process of setting up this new county department, which is required under state law. Once the department is fully operational, units other than those listed above may request inspection work from the county.

In addition to handling building applications in the above units, the county's new department of buildings and safety inspection will also be responsible for enforcement of the state soil erosion and sedimentation control act.

Members of the county board of commissioners expressed pleasure in securing the services of a person with such an extensive background in the construction field.

Block is licensed as a residential maintenance and alteration contractor and holds state licenses in the fields of electrical, excavation and sewer, heating and air conditioning, plumbing and sheet metal work.

Block was appointed to serve a 90-day probationary period at this position before consideration is given by the board of commissioners for final certification.

A resident of Wilber Township since 1956, he has operated as a licensed building, electrical and plumbing contractor; served 13 years with the Iosco Sheriff's Department, and is a former county civil defense director. He is owner of the Wilber Rifle Range and presently serves as Wilber Township treasurer.

In taking over his new duties Wednesday, Block said he believed that the building code should be enforced at the local level. "There is a time element involved when someone from out of the county is called to make an inspection and a local person is closer to the problems of the people," said Block.

Throughout his extensive career in the building trades, Block has worked closely with state inspection personnel, particularly in the electrical field.

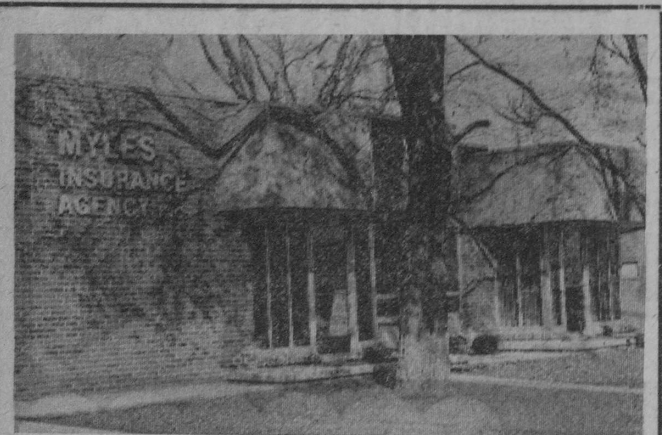

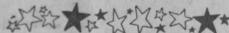

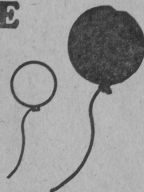
