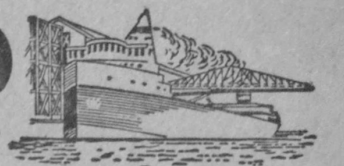

Order Materials for Dock Repair

As a precautionary measure to avert injury to unsuspecting persons, the second "dogleg" on the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock has been barricaded to foot traffic and closed to the public. An unusually heavy build up of ice and snow on the deck of the dock during the past winter caused the structure to collapse. Keith Wilson, director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, told the Herald Monday that necessary lumber and hardware for repair of the structure had been ordered and work is expected to be completed before the start of the boating season.

"Damage to the dock is of a minor nature and our field men tell us the collapsed structure looks worse than it actually is," said Wilson. He emphasized that work on the repair would start as soon as materials are received. The Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas is one of the most popular fishing piers and harbor facilities in the state. The East Tawas City Park was jammed with campers last weekend and fishermen enjoyed the start of the spring perch run as well as dipping for smelt.

School Penalized for Milk Charges

Tawas Area School has rolled back the price of milk served in its lunch program to conform to a state-federal directive which penalized the district \$430 for making a profit on sales. Actual price per one-half pint was not established as the price is to be based on the rate charged by the supplier. The school had overcharged milk sales from 1½ to three cents on each one-half pint carton. Last fall, the school was unable to obtain a firm bid from its milk supplier due to the fluctuating market price. As a result, the school charged a flat rate of 10 cents per one-half pint of milk served in its lunch lines. Actual price of the milk to the school has ranged from around seven cents to more than nine cents per one-half pint. The federal government reimburses the school for its milk program and a profit is not permissible. As a result of action taken Monday night, school lunch lines will return to the former system of selling milk tickets at school of selling rather than charging the flat rate of 10 cents per one-half pint. The move will require additional administrative work by the school staff. Supt. Edward J. Barry said Monday night that the 1974-75 school year had been the first time in history of the school that it had been unable to obtain a firm milk price in its bidding procedures. Bids on furnishing other food supplies were also based on fluctuating market prices, but no reimbursement from the federal government is involved.

TA Can't Count on Reimbursement for Special Education

John Tafelski, superintendent of Iosco Intermediate School District, told members of Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night that the school should not count on receiving any reimbursement for hiring special education teachers next term.

Tafelski said that the intermediate district plans to expand its program for trainable mentally impaired, which would preclude reimbursement to local districts. During the current school term, Tawas Area School was reimbursed \$6,000 to assist in paying special education teachers.

The intermediate district superintendent said that state funds for this training, which had been cut by about 50 percent, had been returned through the efforts of the state's intermediate district superintendents. He pointed out that an increase in state equalized property valuation does not mean an increase in funds for schools, only that local districts assume a larger share of the operational costs.

Tafelski said that the state department of public instruction is now studying a new plan to reduce the number of intermediate districts. He said that should this action take place, he could not foresee the immediate effect in Iosco County, which had been aligned with the Bay-Arenac Intermediate District in previous plans.

Facilities of the intermediate school district are "tight," according to Tafelski, due to the addition of seven persons to the staff during the past year. He said that adjustments would be required in special education as the voted allocation of .75 of a mill in local taxes had not changed since its inception in the mid-1960s.

Tafelski said that the intermediate district's responsibilities were growing and internal roles were changing, pointing out that his office now had responsibility for testing all school bus drivers in the county. He said the intermediate staff is now composed of 37 persons and the expenditure for operating the trainable mentally impaired, alone, amounted to \$225,000.

An explanation on state provisions to implement career education in grades kindergarten through 12 was given by Donald Curry of the intermediate staff. Tafelski said that the intermediate school district's proposal to construct a vocational training center, which was defeated by voters last year, had not been shelved and that a new proposal was being studied.

In other business Monday night, the board of education authorized the alphabetizing of school voter registration records in order to eliminate confusion on election day. Appointed as a committee to bring school board policies up to date were Trustees David Kennedy, Clare Herriman and Helen Payea.

Authorization was given to advertise for bids on repairing the gymnasium roof at the high school. An engineering report indicated that no structural damage had resulted to the building due to leaks in the roof, but recommended that flashings be waterproofed and that repairs be made to the roof as part of a regular maintenance program.

Approval was given to advertise for bids on blacktopping the two entrance drives into the high school parking lot and the bus driveway in front of the school. Estimated cost is \$8,000.

The school is to study the possibility of allowing the Knochole League to use an old van truck owned by the school for hauling equipment during the summer baseball program. Use of buses to transport youngsters to Tiger Stadium was authorized.

The board of education authorized use of school buses to transport approximately 175 seventh

grade students to Greenfield Village on May 10 or May 17.

Legality of using the school for holding a bingo game as a fund raising project for the Iosco Association of Retarded Citizens is to be investigated. Permission was granted to this organization to use the parking lot for a carnival, but school policy and state laws are to be studied concerning the use of school property for gambling.

A request to include the eighth grade cheerleading coach and middle school yearbook sponsor in the schedule for extra pay has been turned over to the school's negotiator for recommendations.

Authorization was given to hire the middle school counselor for two additional weeks after the end of the school term and two weeks prior to the start of the next term for preparing scheduling and report cards.

Seek Emblem Design for Bicentennial

A \$25 savings bond is to be awarded to the person submitting the best design for a bicentennial emblem for Iosco County. This contest is to kick off the bicentennial program in the county.

Plans for the contest were announced at Monday's bicentennial committee meeting at Hale. Deadline for entries is Friday noon, June 20.

Mrs. Charles Rosenberg of the bicentennial committee said that the emblem should have a theme concerning the heritage of Iosco County, including such sketches as Indians, lumbering, fishing, ships, etc.

The contest is limited to residents of this county and entries should be mailed to Mrs. Rosenberg, American House, 601 East Fox Street, East Tawas. Members of the bicentennial committee are to serve as judges.

The committee was named by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners to co-ordinate and approve bicentennial events in the county as proposed by individual units of government, clubs and other organizations.

Tentative plans at Hale call for establishment of a museum, beautification of M-65, crafts exhibits and demonstrations. Senior citizens plan to make a quilt as a money raising project, along with making bonnets.

Mrs. James Delahanty offered to lend assistance and advice to communities desiring to start a project to paint fire hydrants, similar to the one at East Tawas where faces were painted on the hydrants.

The Ladies Literary Club at East Tawas plans to establish a gallery of old pictures and to exhibit old quilts and shawls.

The Paul Bunyan Festival will be a major project for Oscoda and the Shoreline Players are planning a program for presentation during the 1976 observance.

Offer of the American Association of Retired Persons to purchase a bicentennial flag for the county building was accepted by the committee.

The next meeting is to be held at the officers' club at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Thursday, May 29, 1:30 p. m.

Schools Drop Move to Contest Seat on Iosco Co. Tax Allocation Board

Tawas Area School has again backed off on its proposed move to contest the seating of a township supervisor on the county tax allocation board.

At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, Supt. Edward J. Barry said that this board's efforts had been supported in a letter from Hale Area Board of Education, but lacked the support of Oscoda Board of Education. Whittemore-Prescott Area School District is controlled by the pegged millage of Ogemaw County.

A telephone communication from the Oscoda School indicated it was not interested in a circuit court challenge of the tax allocation board seat held by Charles Smith, supervisor of Oscoda Township.

Smith is serving his third year on the allocation board through an interpretation of state law that a charter township with a population of 10,000 or more persons is a municipal corporation within the meaning of the property tax limitation act.

Following his appointment by the Oscoda Township Board, Smith's seat appeared to be more firmly established when Probate Judge William McCready also appointed the veteran township supervisor to the tax allocation board. The judge said he was taking this action to resolve any question which might come up this year over the township's appointment.

The secretary of the Michigan Department of Treasury stated in a letter to D. Keith Papas, county clerk, that state law defines municipal corporations to mean villages and cities and that a charter township, or any township in the county with the required population, is not a municipal corporation. The judge was of the opinion that a letter from the secretary of the state department of the treasury did not constitute a legal opinion.

In the meantime, it is expected that legislation will be introduced at Lansing to clarify wording of the tax limitation act to firmly establish the right of the township with the required population to have a seat on the tax allocation board.

Smith was appointed chairman of the tax allocation board at its organizational meeting last week. Under an amendment to the state

law, one additional member has been named to represent schools in deliberations over dividing 15 mills of taxes between schools, the county and townships. As a result, it appears that the eight-member board is balanced nearly equally between county government and school interests.

Last year, Tawas Area School challenged the seating of Smith on the then seven-member tax allocation board. The matter was later dropped because the tax allocation board had completed its work in dividing the 15 mills of taxes.

The tax allocation board is scheduled to meet again on Monday, May 19, to review budgets submitted by schools and the county. Townships are assured of a one-mill allocation. Record expenditure budgets have been submitted and a compromise will be necessary as not enough taxes are available under the 15-mill limitation to meet requests from the county and schools.

It is expected that new programs included in budgets will be cut in order to allocate millage to meet existing programs. It appears, however, that not enough taxes are available to meet existing programs.

Annual School Elections to Name Board Trustees

Annual school elections will be held on Monday, June 9. There will be two vacancies on the boards of education of three school districts of Iosco County and one board of education has a single vacancy.

Terms of Mrs. Joan Schreck and Clare Herriman expire on the Tawas Area Board of Education. A number of petitions have been secured at the school office, but only one person, Mrs. Louis Pfeiffer, has definitely announced her candidacy, according to the school administration office.

Trustees whose terms expire at

Whittemore-Prescott Area School are Archie Howe and Howard Wilkins. The terms of Josephine DeLoretto and Dr. Richard Wheeler of the Oscoda Board of Education, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Richard Miller, expire at the end of the term. The position presently held by Wheeler is for one year.

One person is to be elected to the Hale Board of Education to fill the vacancy of Frederick L. Wallace, whose term expires at the end of the school year.

Only one school district will place a millage proposal before voters. At the present time, Oscoda Area Board of Education is studying a levy of 7.3 mills of taxes for two years. A decision on the millage is to be reached by May 12.

Terms of office on the board of education are for a period of four years. Deadline for filing nominating petitions for the vacancies is May 12.

Petitions must have at least 25 signatures of qualified school electors. Deadline for a candidate to withdraw his name from the ballot is May 15.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I am sorry to see the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and the road commission taking steps to build a new central garage and offices. The estimated cost of \$900,000 plus interest by the time the bonds are paid off must amount to more than 1 1/2-million dollars. This means there will be 1 1/2-million dollars less work done on our roads because money will have to be used to pay for the bonds and interest instead of building and maintaining roads.

I disagree with the road commission that we would get better service than we do now. The operator of the truck at the Whittemore garage has to drive only across M-65 and he is on a county road working. I believe Hale would be much the same way. In case of a severe storm, it would be a problem for operators to get to a central garage through plugged roads to get their equipment. In a county south of us during a severe storm this past winter, their biggest problem was getting their workers to the garage to start equipment rolling.

After working for the Michigan State Department of Highways and road construction contractors for over 15 years, I know Iosco County has been one of the best at building and maintaining our roads with the money they have available. One of our neighboring counties has a central garage and several times I have observed their equipment heading for the garage an hour before quitting time at 45 miles per hour. If they have to work in the far corners of the county, they spend as much time getting to work and back to the garage at night as they do working on the roads.

I believe the central located garage idea would be a backward step instead of improving our road construction and maintenance.

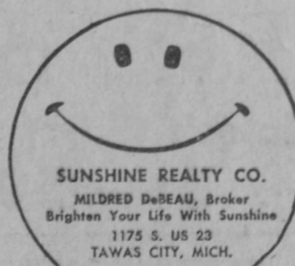

Tawas City Adopts Water-Sewer Budgets

An operational budget of \$75,880 was adopted Monday night for the Tawas City Water Department and an expenditure budget of \$38,300 was authorized for the sewer department.

The water department has a proposed operational expense of \$61,800, plus \$14,000 for bonds and interest on a \$75,000 project to finance the water loop system. Last year's budget for the water department was \$54,380 and actual expenditures amounted to \$63,193.

The sewer department's budget for 1975-76 is \$6,500 higher than the expenditure budgeted last year. The department had an actual expenditure of \$29,128.23.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the water department's new budget does not include the city's share for participation in the water expansion project in the Tawas and Baldwin Township being financed partially through federal funds. He said that when the city's share of the actual cost is determined, financing would be considered.

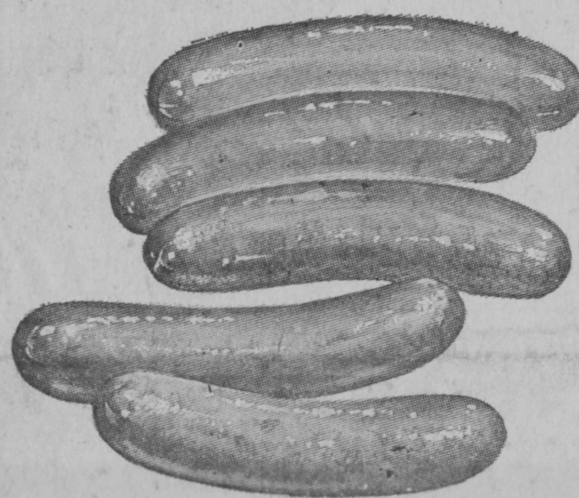

TC Voters OK 30-Year CP Franchise

Tawas City voters avoided the polls in Wednesday's special election, but approved a 30-year franchise for Consumers Power Company. There were 119 ballots handed out by election board workers and the proposition was approved, 75-44.

Voters approved an ordinance adopted March 3 by the city council granting Consumers Power Company the right to do a local electrical business in the city.

State Building Code Meeting at Plainfield Hall Drew 135

A special meeting April 22 called by the Plainfield Township Board to discuss provisions of the state's building code drew 135 persons at the township hall. Attending were local contractors, township officials and interested citizens.

An explanation of provisions of the building code was given by representatives of the Michigan Construction Code Commission.

Considerable discussion was held on the state prohibition against utilization of ungraded lumber by

contractors in residential construction. It was reported that only the actual homeowner may use ungraded lumber and he must do his own work. Ungraded lumber may be used for construction of barns and outbuildings on farms.

Another important point discussed was that all roof trusses must have approved engineering.

Two inspections are to be required for construction of sheds and garages while residential construction requires four inspections.

Following the 3 1/2-hour session, both Bruce Hewitt, township supervisor, and Kenneth Salisbury, township zoning administrator, said they did not foresee any problems for compliance with the state building code in Plainfield Township.

The two township officials said that construction in the past had been basically sound in Plainfield Township and that required inspections would only serve to improve all construction.

The new building inspector for Plainfield Township is Earl Slosser of Hale, a veteran building contractor. Hewitt and Salisbury are deputy inspectors.

The state ordinance adopted April 21 by the township board specifies applications and inspections for all construction work, as well as a fee schedule based on the total value of construction work for which a permit is issued. This includes all finished work and any other permanent work or permanent equipment.

The fee for one and two-family residential construction in Plainfield Township is \$12 for work up to \$1,000. The fee for work from \$1,000 to \$10,000 is \$22, plus \$1 for every \$1,000 over \$10,000; \$31 for work valued from \$10,000 to \$100,000, plus \$1 per \$1,000 for every \$1,000 over \$10,000; \$121 for construction valued at over \$100,000, plus \$1 for each additional \$1,000.

Fees for all other construction starts at \$12 for work up to \$1,000; \$22 for valuation ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, plus \$1 per \$1,000 for work over \$1,000; \$40 in the \$10,000 to \$100,000 category, plus \$2 per \$1,000 over \$10,000.

Owners are reminded that a penalty double the cost of the entire permit for the completed building will be charged for work started before a permit is issued. When an estimated cost is not given, or is unsatisfactory, the cost of the structure is to be estimated at \$6 per square foot for sheds and garages and \$18 per square foot for residences.

Enforcement of the state building code, which also applies to plumbing and electrical work, is being enforced both at the county and township level.

Francis J. Block, administrator of the county's new department of building and safety inspection, will direct inspections in those units which chose not to adopt the state code. Included in this category is the City of Tawas City.

As of Thursday, only two units, Oscoda and AuSable Townships, had been approved by the state construction code commission for enforcing the state code. On Monday, Block received word that five additional units had been certified. Included were Tawas Township, Plainfield Township, Alabaster Township, Grant Township and East Tawas. Other units have adopted ordinances and submitted applications to Lansing.

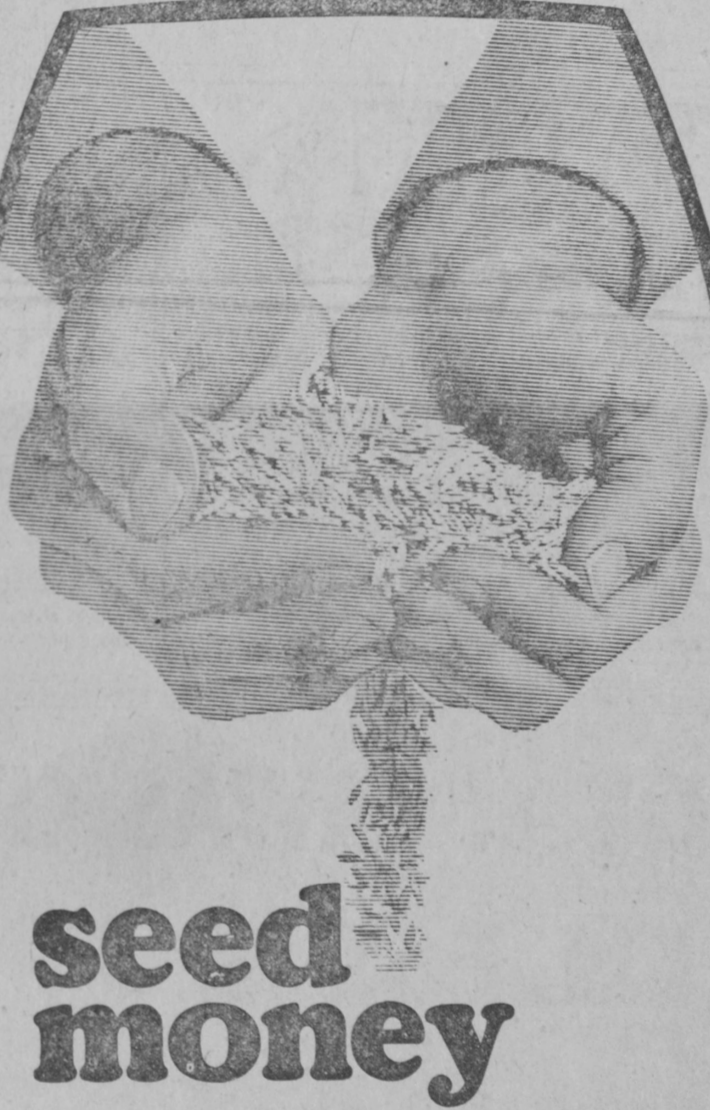

12: BUYING & PREPARING PORK

It's All Tender

Hog farmers are now producing pork with 57% less fat, 36% fewer calories and 10% more protein than in the past. Here are pork buying and cooking suggestions from Michigan State University Consumer Marketing Specialist Sheila Morley: "Grade means little when

buying pork," Mrs. Morley says. "Hogs are marketed young, so they're almost always tender." To choose fresh pork, look for light rose or grayish-pink meat; the bones should have red, porous centers. There should be little fat covering. Because the amount of lean in pork cuts varies widely, the number of servings per pound differs. Here's a general buying guide:

PORK CUT	SERVINGS/LB.
Boston Shoulder (Butt) boneless	4
Picnic	2
Ham (Regular)	2½
Ham (Center Cut)	4
Ham (Canned)	4
Loin (Roast)	2½
Loin (Chops, bone-in)	2½
Rib (Chops, bone-in)	2.2½
Spare ribs	1½
Bacon	5

(A standardized serving = 3½ oz. cooked lean meat.)

The pork loin is divided into rib end, center and loin end cuts. Heavier loins are often boned and cut into boneless pork roasts, butterfly pork chops, tenderloins, Canadian-style bacon, back ribs and backbones.

Loin chop has a T-shaped bone. Rib chop has a rib bone in each chop when cut thick. When cut thin, every other chop has a rib bone.

When center loin chops are advertised in your newspaper as a special, you'll likely also find end cuts (shoulder, blade, rib end roasts, chops) at lower-than-usual prices. The reason: the butcher must buy the whole loin.

When buying a blade end (shoulder or rib end) loin roast, ask for a 7-rib roast; there's more edible meat than on a shorter roast.

Shoulder cuts (Boston shoulder and picnic) often cost less per serving than loin cuts. Unless the ad says "whole Boston shoulder (butt)," a few pork steaks may have been removed.

When fresh, the low-cost Boston butt is sold as a roast or steaks.

Some pork shoulder butts are cured and smoked like hams. The flavor is similar, but there is more fat and the texture is less appealing.

Selecting Spare Ribs

Butchers cut and trim spare ribs from a whole rib slab that weighs from 2 to 5 pounds. Ribs cut from 2-lb slabs are the most choice; they come from a younger animal and have less bone, more tender meat and cost more. Ribs from 3-lb slabs offer a good buy; the meat is lean and tender and the bones are suitably small. Heavy, mature ribs are bony and offer little for your money.

Country-Style Ribs

For meaty country-style ribs, buy a part or whole loin. Have the backbone removed and the ribs separated from loin muscle, leaving about 1" of meat attached to ribs. One loin

yields three meals for a family of four — a roast, boneless chops and country-style spare ribs.

Four Ham Types

The label usually identifies ham as "smoked," "fully-cooked" or "cook before eating." If there is no label, however, you should assume the ham is smoked only and should be cooked before eating.

Although fully-cooked hams are safe to simply slice and eat, you can improve the flavor and tenderness by cooking them before eating.

Here are the ham choices you'll most likely find at the grocer's: 1) Skinned ham bone-in: sold as whole ham, shank portion, butt portion or center slices; 2) Skinned ham semi-boneless: shank and aitch bone are removed and leg bone remains; or, boneless except for shank bone; 3) Boneless ham; and 4) Canned ham: boneless cured ham; vacuum-sealed and fully cooked.

Some canned hams, especially those in smaller cans, have been cooked and sterilized, so they don't have to be refrigerated. They're usually offered along with canned meats on the grocer's shelf.

With canned hams labeled "gelatin added," the gelatin helps the ham retain its shape, protects it during transportation, and makes it easier for you to slice when it's cold.

Werth Calls for Appraisal of County

15 Years Ago—

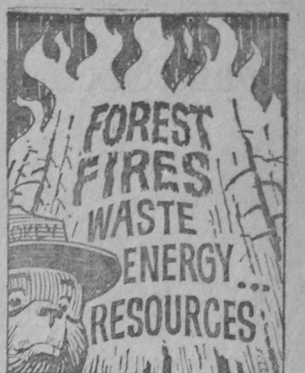
One person was sentenced and five were arraigned in Iosco Circuit Court last week on felony charges.

David A. Willard, Saginaw, entered a plea of guilty to larceny from a building. He was released on personal recognizance and was referred for presentence investigation.



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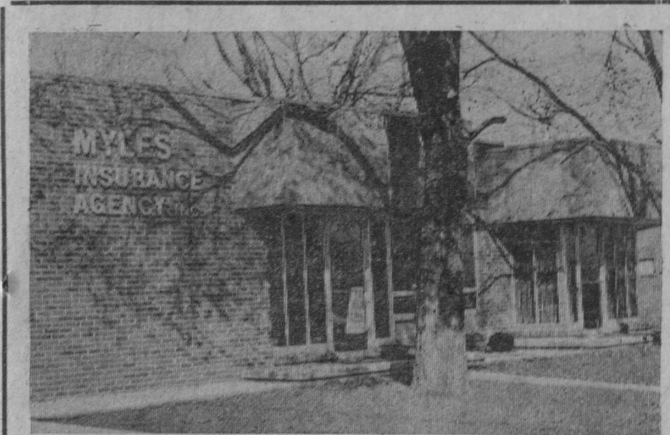

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Social Security Questions Are Answered

Question: My neighbor is severely disabled, so it is very difficult for her to do any housework. She cannot afford to hire someone because her only income is a supplemental security income payment. Is there some place she can get help?

Answer: States provide social services to people getting supplemental security income payments. These services can include help with household chores, meal preparation, laundry and marketing. Tell your neighbor to contact your local public assistance office for more information.

Question: I know medicare helps pay most hospital and doctor bills, but what are some of the things that it does not cover?

Answer: Medicare does not pay for custodial care, drugs and medicines you buy yourself with or without a doctor's prescription, routine eye and hearing examination, homemaker services and meals delivered to your home, preventive medicine such as routine physical checkups and certain other services. "Your Medicare Handbook" contains a list of services and supplies medicare does not cover.

Question: Last year, I worked for two different employers and made social security contributions on more than \$13,200 of my wages. How can I reclaim the extra contribution I paid?

Answer: You can claim it as a credit against your federal income tax. Add the social security contributions withheld by all your employers as shown on your W-2 forms. Then subtract \$772.20, the maximum social security contribution for 1974. The balance is your credit, which you can claim on your Form 1040 income tax return.

Question: Starting next month, I am going to be out of the country for eight or nine months. What should I do about my social security checks?

Answer: You can probably have your checks mailed to your foreign address or have them deposited directly in a bank. Call or write any social security office as soon as possible. Tell them the name of the country or countries you plan to visit so they can tell you exactly how your absence from the United States will effect your checks.

List Regulations Under Burning Permit Law

United States Forest Service has released portions of the State of Michigan burning permit law to acquaint individuals with some of its requirements: (1) Persons must have a permit to have an open fire unless the ground is snow-covered, (2) any person who negligently allows a fire to escape is liable for all expenses incurred by the State of Michigan or the United States Forest Service in the suppression of such fire, (3) any permit issued may be revoked if conditions are such that burning may not be done safely.

Burning permits are available from the forest service office, Federal Building, East Tawas, and at markets and resorts throughout Iosco County.

East Tawas forest service office has been assigned by the State of Michigan the responsibility of forest fire protection in that part of Iosco County north of Kokosing Road and east of M-65. Policy in issuing burning permits will be as follows: (1) Permits will require that all burning be done after 6:00 p. m., except as noted in item two; (2) issue burning permits on raining and drizzling days, but limit the permit for that day only; (3) issue burning permits to farmers and commercial contractors if they have sufficient help and tools standing by and weather is such that it will be safe with proper precautions.

Persons needing further information may contact the forest service office, Federal Building, East Tawas, by phoning 362-4477.

East Tawas Received Federal Money Promised Previously

The City of East Tawas has been awarded a \$19,700 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for its sewer system, Cong. Philip E. Ruppe, eleventh district, announced last week.

The grant is part of 1.9-billion dollars in reimbursement funds recently released by EPA. The funds are for sewer systems already completed. The projects were constructed with the promise of federal assistance.

Ruppe emphasized that the money is not for additional construction. "This is a repayment to East Tawas for money promised by the federal government when the project was started," Ruppe said.

The Northern Michigan lawmaker noted that East Tawas has now received a total of \$230,164 in EPA grants for its waste water treatment system.

The above money has been earmarked by the city council for development of sewer service to the Tawas Lake area.

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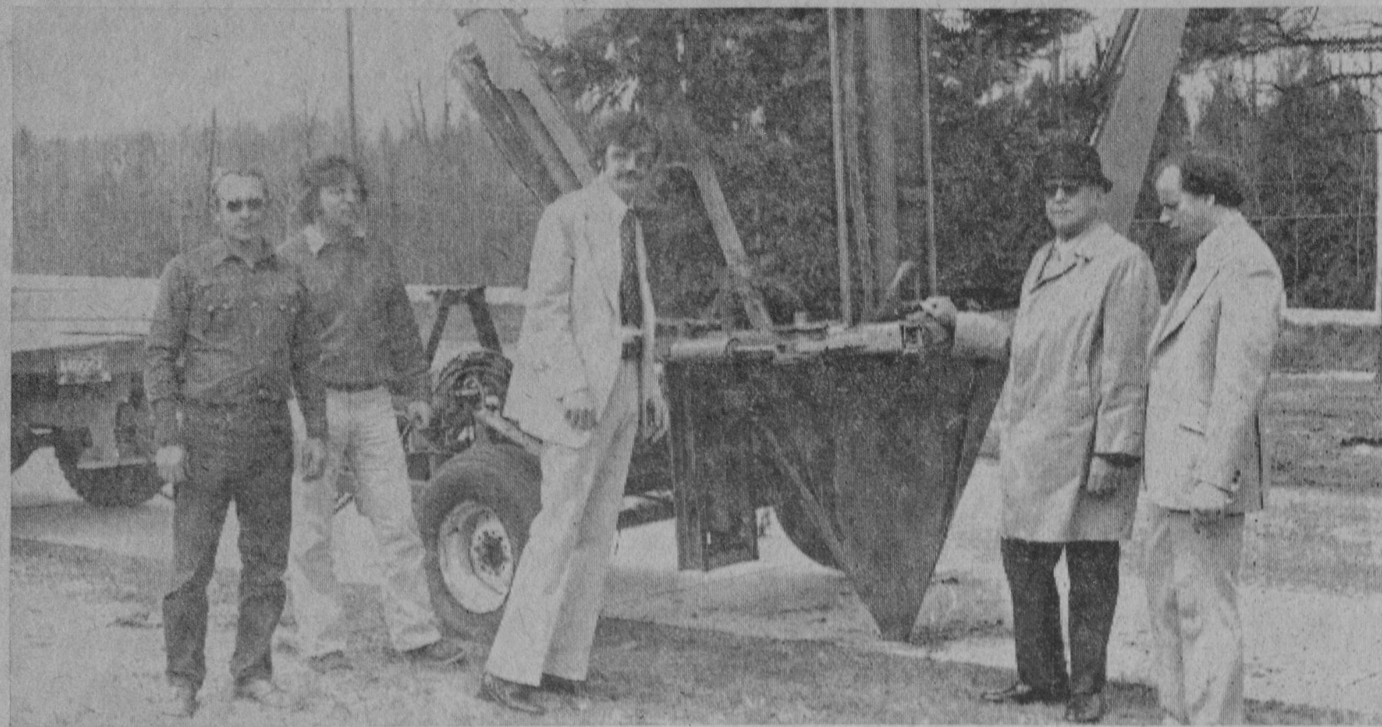

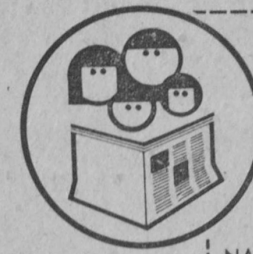
Funeral Held for Henry G. Fahselt

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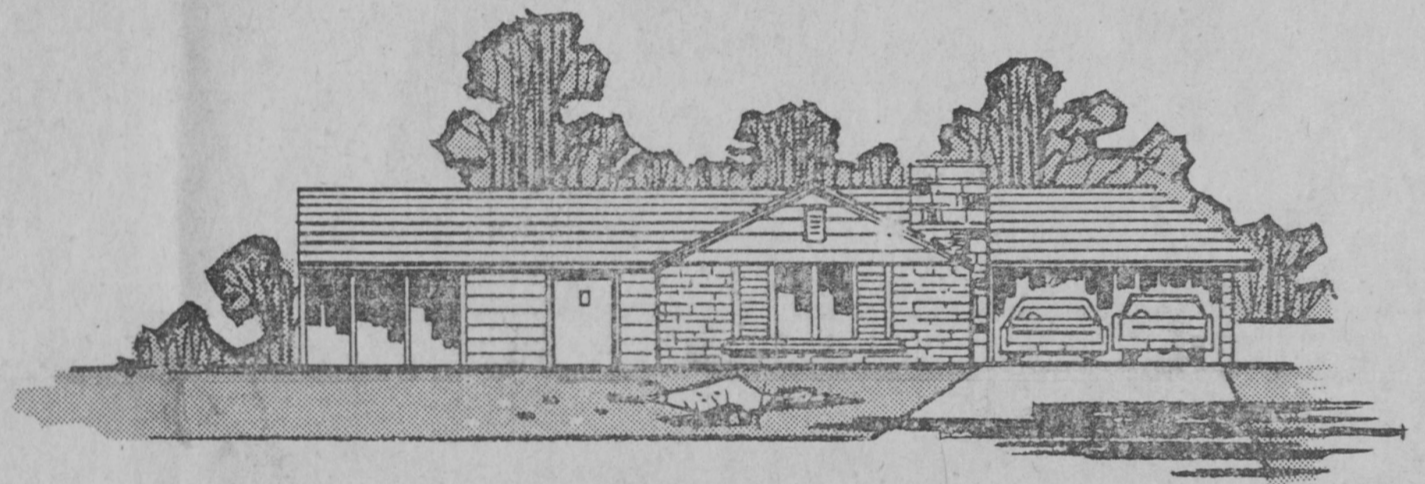
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
