



Safety Rules Important in Kite Flying

Youngsters are cautioned that unsafe kite-flying practices could result in unfortunate accidents. Each year, accidents occur when voungsters forget safety rules. Children are injured when trying to free kites that have become entangled in trees and wires.

Accidents also occur when youngsters fly their kites in the rain or use metallic string. Wet string or any metallic wire that crosses a power line can become a conductor of electricity. This can result in a high voltage shock that could seriously burn or even kill a youngster.
