## Council Tabled Rezoning Plan

Action on rezoning Block 22 on the south side of Mathews Street from residential to multiple family housing was tabled Monday night following a public hearing attended by interested residents of that area.

It was reported at the meeting that one of the persons involved in development of a proposed apartment building at the corner of Hamilton Avenue and Mathews Street had died. It was stated that the second person involved had indicated that he was not interested in the project at the present time.

On recommendation of the city planning commission, the council had proposed to rezone four lots in that block to RC multiple family housing. One lot in that block, on which is located the former Rolls

Aldermen re-elected included George F. Staudacher, First Ward, 24 votes; James E. Crowley, Second Ward, 29 votes; Jacob C. Montgomery, Third Ward, 34 votes.

apartment building, was to have been rezoned from residential to RCH multiple family housing.

The matter was turned back to the planning commission to await possible action toward renewal of the project.

In other business, Thomas Jacques, a graduate forester, presented a color slide program concerning the possibility of a city program to encourage the planting of trees and shrubs along streets.

Jacques advised that a Michigan State University forestry class was interested in conducting a survey of the community. Approximately 35 students would be involved and he proposed that the city pay the expense of housing and transportation of the students, estimated at \$400.

Jacques said that information gained through the survey could be evaluated for incorporation into a tree planting program. He is to submit a proposal for his services to the city manager for consideration by the council at its next meeting.

Mayor John N. Brugger reported on progress of the application for Economic Development Administration funds by Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township to assist in financing improvements to the water distribution system. He said that while federal funding was less than hoped for, applications are now being prepared for 50 percent of the total cost.

Information is being gathered to send to the EDA's Chicago, Illinois, regional office on April 15 and the three local units hope to receive approval for the grant by June 15.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that the state health department is now questioning construction of a force main to connect the Second Avenue lift station with the waste water treatment plant, which is to be financed through bonds authorized by voters.

The health department has requested that additional engineering be obtained to locate the source of storm water which enters the sewer system and has necessitated construction of the force main. A special smoke device machine is to be utilized to determine points of water infiltration.

### Two Parcels Under Option

## Council OK's First Step for Parking

In the first move toward possible establishment of a special tax assessment district to provide off street parking, Tawas City Council voted Monday night to accept 18-month options to purchase two parcels of land west of the Iosco County Building.

The proposal, which had been tabled a month ago for further study, was adopted by a five to one roll call vote. Favoring the proposal were Aldermen Clark Tanner, William Ezo, James Lansky, William Groff and Mayor John N. Brugger. Opposing the proposition was Alderman Robert N. Rollin.

Under consideration in the plan is the purchase of property presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron and Mr. and Mrs. George A. Prescott. Cost of the \$2,000 option on the Prescott property was paid by Carl Babcock and Brent Babcock, who are proposing to construct a new office building on that site.

Cost of the \$2,000 option on the Bergeron property, which would be converted into a parking lot should the program be adopted, is to be paid by the city. Entire cost of the proposed parking lot for 38 cars would be borne by the special assessment district, including repayment of the city's \$2,000 option to purchase the Bergeron property.

This program was originally proposed March 10 by Mayor Brugger, but tabled by the council until such time as additional information could be presented. A sketch of the proposed parking lot and special assessment district was presented to the council for viewing.

Estimated cost of the parking lot is \$50,000 and would be apportioned to property owners in the special assessment district accord-

ing to benefit received. Included in the district would be an area on the north side of Lake Street from the present Prescott property to Whittemore Street.

Included in the total program, but not included in the proposed special assessment district, would be the purchase by the city of commercial buildings located directly across Lake Street and west of the city park. The buildings presently house Iosco Abstract Office, Tri-County Agency, Incorporated, and the Herbert Hertzler law office.

Mayor Brugger said that application would be made to the state for funds to assist in the purchase of that property for expansion of the city park. Purchase of property at the rear of the three above office buildings and extending to Rainbow Service was made several years ago through a cooperative program between the city and the state.

In his remarks to the council during discussion on the proposal, Mayor Brugger emphasized that good parking was the key to economic stability of the community. He said that a considerable amount of property in the city's business district had not been developed to its fullest potential due to the lack of parking. He said, too, that a sound commercial district was important as it provides employment in the community.

"There is no end to the potential of this development and we are talking about the entire community," said the mayor. He pointed out that the city had expended a considerable amount of money in past years to develop a city master plan and that the council had once spent \$18,000 in local and federal funds to study an urban renewal program which was never adopted. He believed the council would now have to provide guid-

ance in establishment of needed parking districts in the commercial area and expending \$2,000 on the option to purchase the Bergeron property was a step in the right direction.

The entire proposal is to be turned over to the city planning commission for study with property owners involved. Public hearings would be required before a special tax assessment district

can be established. The mayor said that a meeting had been held earlier in the day with officials of Peoples State Bank and financing of the project is available over a 15-year period.

It was indicated at the meeting that the proposal had support of three property owners in the proposed district. Owners of Tawas Lanes were not present at the meeting, but have indicated that they are opposed to the parking district. Harold Moeller, who owns property at the corner of Whittemore Street and Lake Street, was present at the meeting and indicated that he was not in favor of the proposal.

Alderman Rollin expressed the opinion that, while he was in favor of the parking district concept, he did not believe that a special assessment district should be established against the wishes of some of the property owners involved.

Delano Myles and Brent Babcock, both property owners in the proposed district, were present at the meeting and indicated a desire to see the program developed.

Babcock stated that development of the parking district would be a positive good for the entire community. He said that one benefit that could be derived would be extension and improvement of Court Street to the proposed parking lot, which would offer an alternate route for traffic off Lake Street.

## District No. 2 Health Board OK's Office Move to Oscoda

Following a study of three possible locations, District Health Department No. 2 voted Monday to accept a new location for its Iosco County office.

The district health board of directors accepted a proposal from Dale Lamrock to locate the office in a new building recently constructed at Oscoda. Lamrock's proposal called for renting the building at a cost of \$300 per month.

The district health office has been located in a building owned by Richard Powers, located on US-23 south of the Tawas River bridge in Tawas City. Lease on the present quarters expired April 1 and the office is to be moved to Oscoda before April 20.

A third proposal considered for the office was the former George Myles building in Tawas City, now owned by Gregory Huck.

Albert Kinstrey, district health director, said Monday that the new office has 1,600-square-feet of floor space and would provide adequate space for a medical screening clinic operated by the health department, which presently is located at Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas. Six persons are employed in the office and Kinstrey said adequate parking would be provided.

The district health director said the reason for the move was a matter of economics. He said that

the new location would result in a substantial saving in rent over a period of three years.

Possible location of the office in the building owned by Huck touched off a controversy last month at two meetings of the city council. Huck asked the council for clarification if the city hall parking lot was open to public parking. Although no official resolution had ever been adopted limiting parking to city hall customers, two-hour parking signs had been removed several years ago. The council voted to install two-hour parking signs and permit public parking.

Ald. Robert N. Rollin, the lone councilman opposing the move, then asked for a clarification from the city attorney concerning the legality of public parking near a fire hall. The city attorney later submitted an opinion to the council indicating that the state motor vehicle code cited by Rollin applied only to the parking lot entrance on Lake Street and did not apply to the 14 parking spaces on either side of the fire hall ramp.

A resolution from the Tawas City Businessmen's Association adopted March 27 expressed that group's desire to "maintain and support the growth of public and commercial business in the city."

The businessmen's association directed a letter to the council asking for clarification of a state-

ment attributed to Alderman Rollin during an interview over a local radio station.

Although the matter was not brought to the floor of Monday night's council meeting, Rollin appeared before the district health board Monday morning and said his statement made during the radio interview did not imply that he wished to see the district health office move out of Tawas City. A tape recording of the interview was presented by Rollin during that meeting.

Following the district health board meeting, William Wereley, a member of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, said that a 90-day cancellation clause was included in the new lease with Lamrock. He said this was inserted in the event the county should construct or provide a new office building to house the health department and other county offices presently in rented quarters.

## Full Time Supervisor for Plainfield

During its annual meeting Saturday, Plainfield Township Board adopted a \$122,879 budget for 1975 operation.

The office of township supervisor is now a full time position and the salary of Sup. Bruce Hewitt was increased to \$9,500 annually. A 10 percent increase was granted to the clerk and treasurer and salaries for those offices are now \$5,500 annually.

Ira Scofield addressed the board and urged that the township purchase property for off street parking. At its last meeting, Hale Chamber of Commerce discussed the possibility of removing parking along M-65 and beautifying the area in front of stores by planting of grass.

Barbara Malcho, treasurer, recommended that the township study the possibility of constructing a sidewalk along Esmond Road east of M-65 for the convenience and safety of children walking to school.

It was recommended that charges for reunions held at the township hall be reduced to \$25 and that the deposit required be increased to \$50.

Members of the township board include Supervisor Hewitt, Treasurer Malcho, Clerk Frances Hansen, Trustee Lyle Biely and Trustee Royden Parkinson.

## Fine Arts Festival Planned at TA School

Tawas Area Fine Arts Department will host a fine arts festival Friday, April 18, 7:00 to 9:00 p. m., and Saturday, April 19, 1:30 to 4:00 p. m. and 7:00 to 9:00 p. m., in the Tawas Area High School gymnasium. The exhibit will feature art works from the middle and high school chorus, bands, jazz band and high school forensics class.

The exhibit is designed to show students' artistic talents in the schools. Teachers involved are John Walton, Judith Gidley and Roberta Barbier, art department; Daniel Bergh, vocal music; Charles Bailey, forensics; Carl Brien and Gene Salamony, instrumental music. Salamony is chairman of the fine arts department.

## Await Federal Dredging Permit

Dredging of the Tawas River mouth will not take place until after May 3, according to information received this week by the City of Tawas City.

A public notice was issued April 3 by the Army Corps of Engineers, Detroit District, allowing interested parties and agencies entering objections to this work to file written comments with that office by May 3.

The project has the approval of the Michigan Water Resources Commission, but federal approval is required under the River and

Harbor Act of 1899 and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1972.

The city proposes to dredge approximately 2,000 cubic yards of sand from the mouth of the river. A sand bar was formed there last fall causing the river to divert across private property on the east side of the river mouth.

According to the city's application, sand would be removed by dragline and deposited in the existing diverted channel. Purpose of the dredging is to reopen the normal river channel.

## State Enforces Building Code in Some Units Seek New National City Post Office

Enforcement of the state building code in eight governmental units of Iosco County is presently being handled by Donald Clever, inspector for the Michigan Construction Code Commission.

On April 15, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners is to select one person among eight applicants for the new position of county building inspector. A new office will then be established to enforce the building code and provisions of the soil erosion and sedimentation control act.

Building applications presently being processed by the state building inspector are for Tawas City, Whittemore and the Townships of Baldwin, Burlleigh, Grant, Reno, Sherman and Wilber. Other units of the county have adopted the BOCA construction code and will provide their own inspection and enforcement.

Announcement was made this week that the United States Postal Service is seeking bids for a new postal facility at National City. Bidders may offer either new construction or an existing building modified to postal service specifications.

According to Postmaster George Jordan, the site must contain approximately 9,350 square feet and the building is to have an interior of 1,046 square feet.

Jordan said the preferred site would have a dimension of 85 feet by 110 feet and would be located on Whittemore Road within a mile of the present post office. Bids close on May 30.

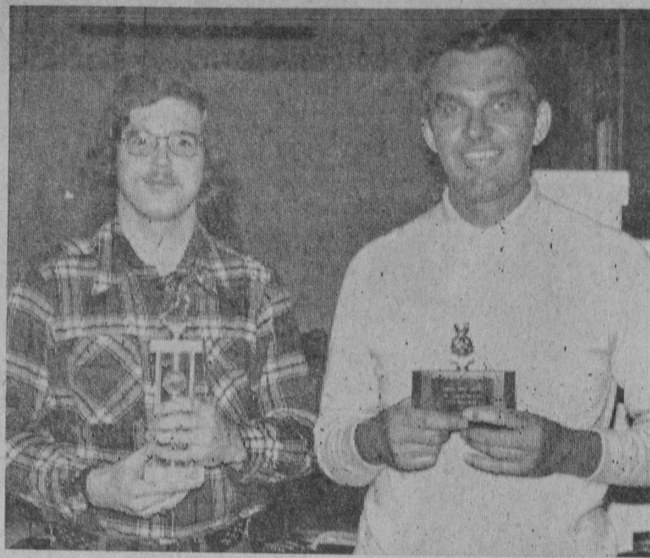

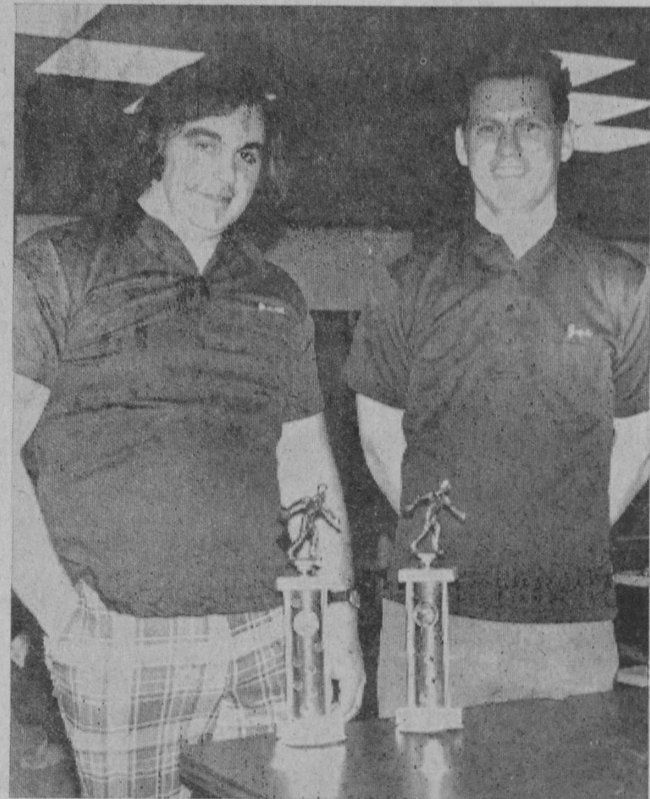

## Weight Restrictions Enforced to Prevent Damage to Roads

Weight restrictions on county roads went into effect March 3 and truck weight limits are still being enforced.

James Delahanty, engineer-manager for the Iosco County Road Commission, said Friday that the lack of thawing weather this spring probably would result in a longer than normal period for enforcement of weight restrictions.

Handling enforcement of the restrictions is Harold Funk, a county road employee stationed at

Hale. Funk, who is deputized by the Iosco Sheriff's Department, makes spot checks of trucks traveling on county roads.

The enforcement officer uses a portable platform scale to check the axle loads on trucks which are stopped.

During the weight restriction period, trucks are allowed to carry 75 percent of the normal load transported during summer months, depending upon axle configuration.

If the truck is overloaded, the

owner can be cited into district court and fined.

"We are not looking to hamper the operations of truckers, but serious damage can result to county roads in the spring if weight restrictions are not enforced," states Delahanty.

He pointed out there is only one class A road in the county net-

work and this is F41 from US-23 to the main gate at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Delahanty said that M-55 and US-23 are all weather roads and weight restrictions are enforced by the state. He said that M-65 from Shellenbarger Road north into Alcona County is included in the weight restriction area.

## Two More Steps Toward Goal

Two more steps in the required procedure for making application on a federal grant to assist in construction of a 1.5-million-dollar water distribution system in the Tawas area were taken last week by the Iosco County Board of Public Works.

Robert Foster, chairman of the county board of commissioners, signed applications for a basic federal grant of \$720,000 and a \$240,000 Upper Great Lakes supplemental grant.

According to the application, the two grants would be matched by local funds from a revenue or general obligation bond issue amounting to \$790,000 for construction of water lines and storage facilities in Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township to serve two industrial parks.

Signing of the two applications last week follows a meeting three weeks ago between local officials and representatives of the Economic Development Administration. Local officials and the project engineering consultant, Edmands Engineering Company, attended a preapplication hearing with EDA officials at Chicago, Illinois.

## Power Co. Franchise Up for Renewal

Voters of Tawas City will have the opportunity Wednesday, April 23, to voice their approval or disapproval of a 30-year franchise allowing Consumers Power Company to operate within the community.

The ballot asks voters to ratify and approve an ordinance adopted March 3 by the city council granting Consumers Power Company the right to construct and commercially use electric lines along and across highways, streets, alleys, bridges and to do a local electrical business in the city.

Although 300 ballots have been printed for the election, it is expected that renewal of the franchise will be routine and probably less than 100 voters will go to the polls.

## Too Cold, Kite Flying Delayed at Oscoda Park

Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce has announced that due to the unusual severity of lingering cold weather, the kite flying contest scheduled to be held at McQuaig Park, Oscoda, on April 12 will be delayed until Saturday, April 26. Details for entering the contest and rules governing this event will be announced.

As the chamber wishes to make this event highly-successful with family participation, open to everyone in the community, it is felt that this slight delay might improve weather conditions for such a contest. For further information, call the chamber of commerce in Oscoda, 739-7322.

## Safety Rules Important in Kite Flying

Youngsters are cautioned that unsafe kite-flying practices could result in unfortunate accidents. Each year, accidents occur when youngsters forget safety rules. Children are injured when trying to free kites that have become entangled in trees and wires.

Accidents also occur when youngsters fly their kites in the rain or use metallic string. Wet string or any metallic wire that crosses a power line can become a conductor of electricity. This can result in a high voltage shock that could seriously burn or even kill a youngster.

To promote kite-flying safety, Consumers Power Company's general safety department annually sponsors a poster contest in elementary schools to encourage children to observe the basic safety rules.

Basic rules which will help kite flyers have fun and avoid trouble are: (1) Use dry string, not wire or anything metallic; (2) use wood and paper in kite construction, not wire or metal; (3) fly kites on days when there is no rain; (4) avoid busy streets and highways while flying kites; (5) fly kites far away from television and radio aerials; (6) keep away from overhead electric lines; (7) if an electric line falls, stay away from it; (8) call the power company if a kite gets snagged in a line, do not pull the string or climb the pole.

## ACP - FIP Approved for Applications

June Scott, county executive director of the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, announced the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) and Forestry Incentive Program (FIP) for 1975 have been approved. ACP is designed to encourage the application of enduring soil, water and woodland practices.

FIP is aimed at improving timber production by stimulating better forestry management practices on the vast acreages of small private timber tracts.

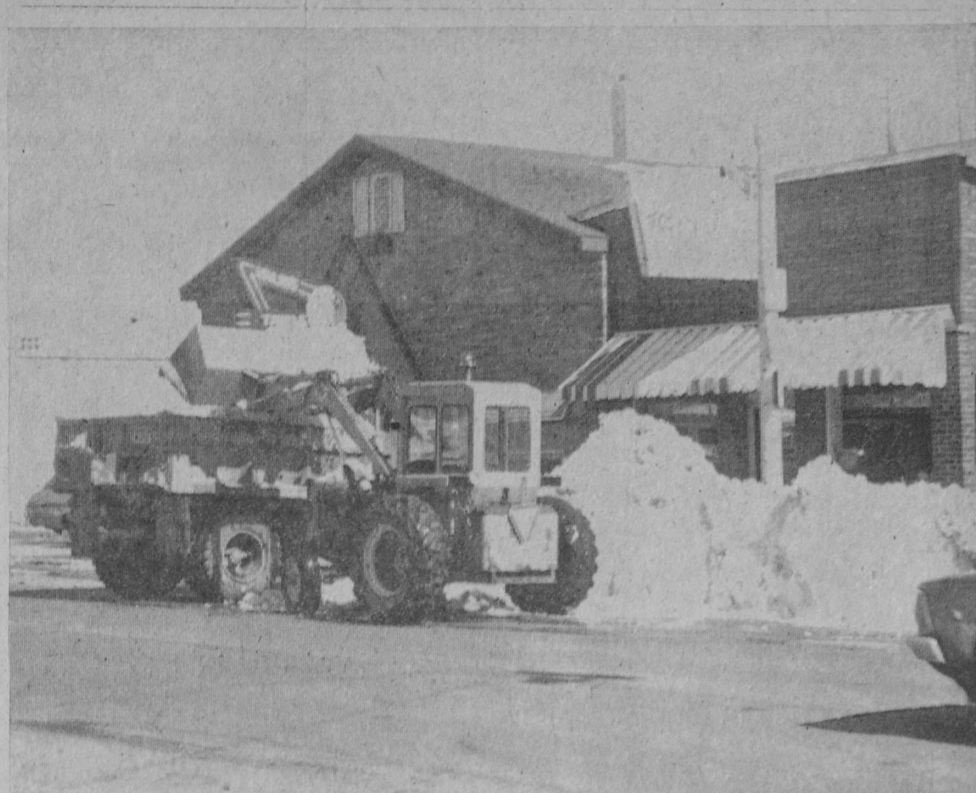
Annual and long term agreements will be offered to eligible owners or operators under both programs. Under long term agreements, cost-sharing will be scheduled over a period of three to 10 years. Soil conservation service and forest service will furnish the technical assistance in developing farm plans and servicing practices.

## SS Recipients Earning Over \$2,400 in '74 Must File Return

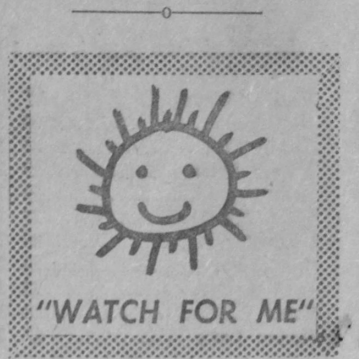
People getting social security checks, who earned over \$2,400 in 1974, must file an annual report of their earnings with social security by April 15 of this year, according to John Carr, district manager of the Bay City social security office. "Only earnings, from wages and self-employment, are to be included on the annual report," Carr said. "Your income tax return will not fulfill the social security requirement that an annual report must be filed."

The annual report form has blocks to be completed showing which months, if any, a person did not work, or his earnings were \$200 or less. This information is used to determine if he was paid the correct total amount of social security benefits during 1974. Anyone eligible to get social security benefits who earned less than \$2,400 in 1974 should have received all of their social security checks for 1974 were over \$2,400, benefit checks still can be paid for any month in which earnings

were \$200 or less. If a self-employed person made over \$2,400 net income during 1974, he can receive checks for any month in which he did not perform substantial services in his business. Anyone who estimated that they would earn over \$2,400 in 1974, and received even one social security check during the year, should receive an annual report form automatically in the mail. The report should be completed and mailed back in the envelope included with it. If an individual did not receive an annual report form in the mail or if he has any questions about

how to complete the report form, social security employees will be glad to help. Most questions can be answered easily over the telephone, Carr added. "By calling," Carr said, "you can save yourself a trip to the office and avoid waiting in the long lines you may find there." The number to call in the Bay City area is 892-3554. Anyone eligible for social security benefits who is still working may want to file an annual report even though he did not receive any social security checks last year. Partial benefits may be payable based on total earnings for the year.
