

Goodman Leaves D&M for New Job



EDWARD V. GOODMAN

Edward V. Goodman, president of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway since January 1, 1970, resigned that position effective August 15 and is to join the new transportation department being established by the State of Michigan.

Contacted at his home Tuesday morning, Goodman said his employment with the state would be effective September 2 and an announcement would be made at that time at Lansing concerning his new duties.

In the meantime, the railroad announced this week that William VanMeter, former superintendent of operation, had been promoted to general manager of the railroad.

Goodman has been employed by the railroad since June 15, 1964, when he came here as general superintendent of maintenance. Prior to that he had 25 years of experience as an employee of the Pennsylvania Railroad and served at various points in the Eastern United States.

Rising rapidly in his D&M managerial role, Goodman later advanced to general manager, then to vice president and general manager before becoming president in 1970.

He said Tuesday that he and his wife would be making their home at Lansing, but would maintain their residence here. Their son,

Edward Jr., will be a senior this fall at Tawas Area High School. Their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Michael (Deborah) Frank, are residents of the area. Another daughter, Mrs. Martin (Diane) Schmidt, resides at Saginaw, while their youngest daughter, Susan, will be attending Alpena College this fall.





Council Rules Ramp Stickers Available to All

As a means of improving control of boat launching at the municipal ramp on Ninth Avenue, as well as recouping some of the funds expended for dredging the river mouth, the city council Monday night adopted a new policy in regard to the sale of annual boat launching stickers.

Effective this week, the man employed by the city to direct launchings and parking at the ramp is to be paid on an hourly basis, rather than to collect a percentage of fees.

In addition, he will have a supply of annual stickers for boat launchings. The regular daily launching and parking fee is \$2.50, but printed annual fee stickers at \$3 are to be available at the ramp, or may be obtained from marinas and other business places in the area.

The annual fee was adopted several weeks ago and stickers were available only on week days at the city hall. Martin O'Driscoll, a marina operator, believed that annual stickers should be more readily available to visitors.

O'Driscoll said he had collected money from businessmen and boaters to aid the city in financing dredging of the river, but he said he would not turn the money over to the city until some correction was made on the availability of annual stickers.

Several councilmen expressed the opinion that the low annual fee, which was adopted for this year due to the late opening of the river mouth, should only be available to local residents and taxpayers. After discussion, however, it was decided to make the annual stickers available to all boaters.

Charges for use of the ramp are only in effect on week-ends.

Tawas City to Apply for Federal Funds Aiding Navigation

A resolution taking formal action to apply for federal funds to correct a silting problem impeding navigation at the mouth of the Tawas River was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Even if approved, however, the project would be some years in the future as a reconnaissance study generally takes about two years to complete, depending upon the availability of funds and personnel.

In addition, regulations indicate that public acquisition of property at the river mouth would be required. This has long been a stumbling block for any project as both sides of the river mouth are privately owned and it would appear that public easements or outright public ownership would be required before consideration would be given to such a project.

In a letter to the city read at Monday night's council meeting, Col. James E. Hays, district engineer for the Army Corps of Engineers, Detroit, said his department has, under congressional approval, several continuing small project authorities which permit federal assistance to local agencies in controlling, protecting, or improving certain public features against specified natural effects.

One such small project authority is Section 107 of the River and Harbor Act of 1960. It provides for construction of small navigation projects, not specifically authorized by congress. Colonel Hays said the section may be applicable to the Tawas River problem.

"All Section 107 studies require completion of a reconnaissance report, which establishes whether federal participation in the project is warranted," said Hays. "If the reconnaissance report is approved, a detailed project report, plans and specifications must be completed prior to the start of construction."

Upon approval of the detailed project report, the proposed project is placed on a backlog list. Such ready-to-construct, approved projects are financed in order and as rapidly as practicable, depending on the availability of construction funds.

The district engineer said an investigation of a prospective Section 107 project may be initiated after receipt of a formal request from a sponsoring agency empowered under state law to provide all required local cooperation. He suggested that the city council work with Keith Wilson, chief of the waterways division, Michigan Department of Natural Resources, if it desires initiation of a study in the interest of recreational boating improvements.

The council directed City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz to make immediate (See COUNCIL, page 6.)

Bright Horizons Learning Center Will Have New Location in October

Construction is expected to be completed by October 1 on a new building to house the Bright Horizons Learning Center and offices of the Iosco Intermediate School District.

The L-shaped building to house classrooms and offices is being constructed on Aulerich Road near the Tawas Industrial Park, Baldwin Township.

"We have been renting quarters in three different buildings in Tawas City and East Tawas for a number of years and, with our new involvement in training all handicapped children in this district, a move to a centralized headquarters was necessary," states Supt. John Tafelski.

The Bright Horizons Learning Center is presently located in the Immaculate Heart of Mary School, while offices are located on US-23 at East Tawas. The district rents

rooms in Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, for one class.

The new building is to be leased from Gordon Schultz, Oscoda contractor and developer.

One wing of the new building, which is of frame construction with aluminum and brick exterior, contains six 24 by 24-foot classrooms for trainable and severely mentally handicapped children. The wing is to include a 32 by 36-foot cafeteria, a kitchen, a 24 by 30-foot crafts center, plus a home economics and health education room. One wing of the building will be devoted entirely to offices.

Thirty children are expected to be enrolled during the coming term in the Bright Horizons Learning Center. The center will be operated by four teachers and four aides.

The intermediate school district staff working with handicapped children throughout the district will include four speech therapists, two social workers, two remedial reading teachers, three psychologists and one teacher each for visually impaired, hearing impaired, home bound physically handicapped, learning disability and emotionally impaired children.

Tafelski said that the district's plan for training handicapped children had received tentative approval from the Michigan Department of Public Instruction, although minor changes are to be made. Tafelski said that a report last week indicating the plan had not been accepted by the state was erroneous.

Teachers are to report for orientation sessions August 28 and 29 and school is to start Tuesday, September 2.

Herald Aids Tawas Hospital Campaign

The auxiliary has a long history of aiding Tawas Hospital, the organization dating back prior to actual construction of the hospital when members sold paper "bricks" to assist with the original financing.

In addition to fund raising projects, members operate a gift shop at the hospital and are always interested in receiving hand made items to be sold in the shop. Members also make decorations for patients' trays during holiday seasons.

A smorgasbord pot-luck dinner is being planned for a Sunday in September and the auxiliary hopes to encourage greater participation by the entire community in its life-saving projects. Membership is open to all women in the area.

Tawas District Campgrounds to Remain Open

National forest campgrounds in the Tawas area will remain open after Labor Day, according to an announcement Tuesday by Calvin Norton, district ranger.

Norton said that campgrounds in the Tawas District would remain open to campers this fall and that a daily fee would be required.

Monument Campground contains 20 sites, there are 19 sites at Rollways Campground, while the Round Lake Campground's Loop No. 1 has 13 sites. The second loop at Round Lake will be closed for restoration work and is to be reopened next spring.

Due to a lack of funding, commercial hauling of garbage will end after Labor Day. Because of this, the garbage bins will be removed and campers are asked to remove their own garbage.

"If campers cooperate by hauling their garbage, the campgrounds will remain open through October," said Norton. "However, if district personnel are forced to remove garbage the campgrounds will be closed much sooner."

Norton said the forest service was sincere in its desire to offer the public as much recreation as possible from the national forest. "Please help us serve you," he stated.




This water line was constructed in the late 1930s and has caused problems during numerous winters when the castiron main was fractured by frost.

ate application through the waterways division.

According to the letter, the secretary of the army is authorized to allot from yearly appropriations made for commercial or recreational navigation for the construction of small projects not specifically authorized by congress.

The federal project can provide only general navigation facilities, which may include a safe entrance channel, protected by breakwaters or jetties if needed; protected anchorage basin; protected turning basin and a major access channel leading to the anchorage basin or locally provided berthing area.

Docks and mooring facilities are entirely a local responsibility and local interests also provide all lands, easements, rights-of-way, spoil disposal areas and assure availability of a public landing or wharf.

Silting at the river mouth has long been a problem in local recreational boating. The city council spent in excess of \$1,000 this summer to open the river mouth to navigation.

The river presently provides the safest launching site on Tawas Bay and a minimal breakwater project would probably be requested. A breakwater or jetty extending to deep water on one or both sides of the river mouth could possibly eliminate silting.

Steel for Tawas Harbor Approved by House; Seek Action in Senate

According to a communication from Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, the United States House of Representatives has approved payment of \$500,000 for steel to be used in construction of the new harbor project at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas.

Cederberg's letter to the East Tawas Council said the proposal from the Army Corps of Engineers had now been submitted to the senate for its action. He recommended that the city communicate its desires for passage of the bill to Senator Griffin and Senator Hart.

Although not representing this district since a realignment of boundaries a number of years ago, Congressman Cederberg has taken an active interest in the local project.

The council authorized Consumers Power Company to install 6,500-lumen mercury vapor lights at the following intersections: Wood Street at Tawas Lake Road, Wood Street at Geller Road, Klenow Street at Geller Road, Church Street at Jefferson, Frank Street at Grant Avenue, Lakewood Street at Airport Drive, Lakewood Street at Owosso Drive. Single lights were authorized on Geller Road, South Street and Park Street.

A survey is to be made of the employee parking lot south of Westover Street to determine the number of lights required.

Cities Approve Application for Step One Sewer Study Grant

City councils of Tawas City and East Tawas adopted resolutions Monday night authorizing an application to be made to the Federal Environmental Protection Agency for a step one planning grant for a regional secondary sewage treatment study.

Representatives of three townships involved in this new concept in sewer planning indicated Thursday night that they would join in the application, although some doubt was expressed by two townships concerning the actual study area being proposed.

Need for the study was expressed by supervisors of Baldwin,

Tawas and Alabaster Townships, but representatives of both Tawas and Alabaster Townships said that, while the need for sanitary sewer existed at present in developed areas near the borders of those townships with Tawas City, they questioned the advisability of including farm and forest land areas of the townships in the proposed planning area.

As a result of discussion Thursday night among representatives of the five local units of government and engineers, the proposed plan of study would be submitted by the City of Tawas City which has the highest priority among

three different local applicants.

Daniel Alstott and Ralph Knop of Edmands Engineering reported that, of the 567 Michigan applicants for EPA funds, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had given Tawas City's application a position of 141, based on a point system priority. An application by East Tawas had a position of 321 and Baldwin's application was listed No. 504.

According to the DNR's water resources commission, which has responsibility of delineating the plan of study area for a step one facilities plan, attention is to be given to including the entire area

where cost savings, other management advantages or environmental gains may result from interconnection of individual waste treatment systems or collective management of systems.

According to the state's construction grant rules, whenever two or more applications are received for step one projects, which the commission determines fall within the scope of one facilities planning area, those projects are not to be certified to EPA until one application for the facilities planning area has been mutually agreed upon. If agreement cannot be reached, the state commission would designate the lead applicant.

According to Alstott, grants are awarded in three steps with step one being for facilities planning, step two for plans and specifications and step three for construction.

He felt the proposed project had excellent possibilities for approval by both the DNR and EPA and urged local representatives to reach some agreement on the actual lead applicant prior to the September 15 deadline.

Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw, East Tawas' consultant, and Edmands had been authorized last year by the five units of government to conduct a feasibility study on this proposed project. Representatives of both firms said Thursday night that they found the regional sewer project feasible.

Consideration is now being given to include the cost of this preliminary work under the step one funding.

The engineers said that a good deal of physical work would be required to determine the capabilities of existing waste water treatment plants at Tawas City and East Tawas in the over-all planning to include secondary treatment.

Although no firm commitment could be given on the length of time for actual planning, engineers indicated that it would be from one to two years away and, if the plan is approved by state and federal agencies, as well as receiving approval of local governments, actual construction probably would be at least four years in the future.

Under this program, projects approved receive 75 percent funding from the federal government, five percent from the state and the remaining 20 percent would come from the five participating units.

The local share would be based on benefits received and the cost to unsewered areas would be significantly less than to the two cities.

The proposed area of study starts at the northeast boundary of Baldwin Township on Lake Huron and extends 13 miles west along Galion Road, the line between that township and AuSable Township, to Lorenz Road. The west boundary line of the study area extends south along Lorenz Road through Tawas and Alabaster Townships to the Iosco-Arenac line.

Representatives of both Alabaster and Tawas Townships pointed out that the area comprising the planning proposal includes a considerable amount of the Alpena State Forest in Alabaster Township and farm land in Tawas Township, which would never require the service of sanitary sewer. The same could be said for the northern portion of Baldwin Township, which borders the Huron National Forest along part of the route.

Charles Sessner of Spicer Engineering felt that the entire area as projected by the DNR in the planning study should be included as any deletion could hinder future development in the townships,

Veteran Iosco County Teacher Won't be Returning to Classroom This Fall

Chester Roberts of Whittemore, a teacher in four Iosco County Schools since 1942, will not be returning to the classroom this fall, having retired at the end of the 1974-75 term as a member of the Oscoda Area School faculty.

He was honored at a gathering of family members and friends at the Reno Township Hall on Sunday, August 10.

Included among those present were his wife, Evelyn; his five daughters, Mrs. Philip (Linda) Nelson of Clarkston, Mrs. Rick (Doris) Bow of Saginaw, Sharon, Joyce and Gaynell, all of Whittemore.

"They gave me a nice reclining rocker as a retirement gift and it looks like it will come in handy," quipped Roberts.

A fifth grade mathematics teacher in the Oscoda Area School since the 1963-64 term, during the past 32 years Roberts has been a teacher in Tawas City Public School, Whittemore-Prescott Area School, Hale Area School, Tawas Area School and Oscoda Area School.

Born in Owendale, his father, John Roberts, operated a 400-acre farm in Huron County. He graduated from high school at Owendale and then attended Michigan Normal College at Ypsilanti for three years. He later received his bachelor degree from Central Michigan University at Mt. Pleasant.

During the depression years, teaching positions were hard to find and he went on the road as a salesman. He later worked at the Kelsey Wheel plant, Detroit.

His first teaching assignment was in 1938, when he joined a rural school system at Smith Creek, St. Clair County.

In the meantime, his parents had moved to a farm in Reno Township. He came to Tawas City in 1941 and operated a feed store and cream station at the rear of The Tawas Herald office.

When that property was purchased from James H. Leslie by Rudy Gingrich, Roberts became a salesman for the Michigan Farmer.

"I had parked my car in front of Keiser's Drug Store and overheard Supt. E. C. Carlson asking Russell Rollin, county school commissioner, if he knew where he could find a shop teacher," recalled Roberts.

"The school's former shop teacher had left for military service and, when I told Carlson I was available for the job, I was hired on the spot."

Roberts was shop instructor in Tawas City during the 1942-43 term and then left to teach shop at Prescott and at Lake. Upon the death of Otto Rahl in 1944, Roberts returned to Tawas City to succeed him as shop teacher and boys' athletic coach. He spent two terms in Tawas City and his basketball team won the district championship in 1945 then won the league championship in 1946.

Roberts taught half-days at Hale in 1946 and coached basketball, returned to Whittemore in 1947 as instructor of agricultural education and basketball coach. "We did not have a gymnasium at Whittemore in those days and I remember that the team practiced outside of the school. We even won a few games, which was something under those circumstances."


He left teaching for several years and was employed as a draftsman at General Motors' Gray Iron Foundry at Saginaw. He later took a summer job as a draftsman at Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company in Tawas City and it was while he was employed

there that he was hired in 1954 as a fifth grade mathematics teacher in Tawas Area School.

Roberts remained here for three years, then taught two years in the O'Connors School, Ogemaw County, before joining Oscoda Area School.

"I tried to find a different type of job each summer and it gave me a variety of experiences which later proved useful in the classroom," said Roberts.

From salesman to feed store operator, factory worker, draftsman, accountant and other jobs, Roberts retires with a varied background, but he said last week that he "enjoyed teaching elementary mathematics about the best of any of my different positions."

should sanitary sewer services ever be needed.

Special meetings of township boards involved are to be held within the next two weeks to review the study area as proposed and to reach a formal decision on which units would actually join with Tawas City and East Tawas in making an application for funding.

The engineers reported that federal and state funding for the studies would not be made to all 567 of the applicants, but believed that the cutoff point should be somewhere in the 200s on the list. It was stated that EPA has 18-billion-dollars which must be spent prior to 1977.

Actual cost of the planning cannot be determined at the present time, according to the engineers, but cost factors would be developed for the review of local governments. Prior to submission of plans for state and federal approval, public hearings would be required locally to review the proposal.



Children's Shoes

School time is not far off. This usually means shopping trips for clothing and shoes for the school year. While "new shoe" time is exciting for children, it can put a strain on the pocketbook and be frustrating for parents. Knowing what to look for and how to check for fit can ease the strain somewhat.

A new shoe should be well-fitted, protect the foot, hold it steady and secure and allow for room to grow, room to wiggle and room for the foot to breathe.

When buying children's shoes, do not ask for the size you think your child needs. Have both feet measured while the child is standing.

There should be one-half to three-fourths inch space between the end of the longest toe and the tip of the shoe to allow for growth and wiggle room.

Fitting a shoe is more than a matter of foot length. Feet of the same length may differ in shape and thickness. The widest part of the shoe should match up with the widest part of the foot (across the ball of the foot). One should be able to slightly pinch up the upper part of the shoe across the widest part of the foot when the child is standing.

The heel should fit snugly and firmly so that a finger can not be inserted between the heel and the back of the shoe. Be sure to check the back of the shoe. See that it does not cut into the heel. Check the sides too to be sure they do not cut into or rub the ankle bone.

Take a look or "feel" inside the shoes. Lined or unlined, a shoe should be smooth inside with no wrinkles, ridges, rough surfaces, bulky seams or tack ends coming through. The inside of a shoe

should be smooth all the way to the toes.

Do not accept or buy new shoes which need "breaking-in." This is a poor fit; the poor feet will have to make the adjustment rather than the shoes.

When deciding whether old shoes are still wearable, ask yourself if the shoe still fits the foot. If a shoe is too short, it will show wear near the toe end. Are heels and heel counters run over and no longer keeping the heel and foot in place? Can you feel any nails or sharp edges?

Do not let a child wear hand-me-down shoes, even if the shoes seem to be big enough for the younger child. Remember, it is shape as well as length that needs proper fitting.

Social Security Offices are Busy

Question: I visited the social security office during the first week of last month. It was really busy and I had to wait quite a while before I got to talk to someone. Is the office always so busy?

Answer: Usually, social security offices are busiest on the first few days of the week and during the first two weeks of the month. Unless your business is urgent, the

best time to visit the office is at the end of the week or during the last half of the month. And it is a good idea to call the office first. Often, business can be handled by phone and you will not have to make a trip.

Question: I started getting social security student benefits this month. I work part time and know my earning can affect my monthly

payments but does this include earnings I had before my benefits started?

Answer: Yes. In determining your social security benefits for the year, earnings for the entire year are counted. This includes months before your benefits begin, as well as months after your benefits end. If you earn over \$2,520 for the year, your benefits will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 over \$2,520. But no matter how much you earn for the year, you can get your full social security benefit for any month in which you neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in your own business.

Question: My brother was se-

verely injured in a boating accident two months ago. He has not applied for disability benefits yet because he says there is a five-month waiting period. When should he file?

Answer: Even though there is a five-month waiting period before disability benefits can begin, people should apply for benefits as soon as they become disabled. By filing early, the claim may be completely processed during the waiting period and benefits can begin at the earliest possible time for the sixth full month of disability.
