# Norwood Resigns Post Effective December 31

Resignation of M. Jerry Norwood, 55, administrator of Tawas Hospital for the past 8½ years, was accepted Friday by the hospital's board of trustees. The resignation is to become effective Wednesday, December 31, at 4:00 p. m.

Robert W. Elliott, president of the board of trustees, said Monday morning that appointment of a new administrator had not been made as yet by the board of trustees, but an announcement is to be forthcoming.

Announcement that "I am retiring to 'green pastures,'" was made Monday morning to hospital employees by Norwood.

"This ole horse is not going 'out to pasture,' however," said Norwood. "I first plan a vacation in Florida and will then continue work for the Iosco County Chapter of the American Red Cross and other civic activities where I might be helpful to our great community."

Norwood, who served 25 years in the United States Air Force, with 23½ years in hospital administration, was appointed administrator of Tawas Hospital on June 1, 1967.

He had served as administrator of the 25-bed hospital at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, for 27 months before his retirement from military service.

Prior to his assignment to Wurtsmith, he taught in the aviation school of medicine for 8½ years at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas; served as administrator at hospitals located at Goose Bay, Labrador, 1955-1959; Whiteland AFB, Missouri, 1959-1962; Westover AFB, Massachusetts, 1962-1965.

A native of Alabama, Norwood joined the army air corps in 1942, serving in aircraft engineering with the Eighth Air Force in England from late 1943 until the end of hostilities.

"I have been in the health field for nearly 34 years and my wife,

Jane, and I are looking forward to a vacation and some travel," Norwood said Monday morning.

He said, however, that he was going to continue living at East Tawas and wants to keep active in civic matters, particularly with the American Red Cross.

"I will have the time to do the leg work for a number of organizations and hope to be of some service to the community, which I greatly love," said Norwood.

During his administration, hospital facilities, services and personnel here have expanded greatly. A

1.8-million-dollar expansion program was completed in 1972.

In addition to this expansion, Norwood is particularly proud of the hospital's three-bed coronary care unit, establishment of specialist clinics, physical therapy department, hearing clinic and pulmonary therapy department.

Norwood was seriously injured in an automobile accident several years ago and he said this had a lot to do with his retirement.

He and his wife leave Wednesday morning for an extended vacation in Florida.

## Three-County Application for Federal Funds

A three-county application for federal funds to study needs for a joint juvenile facility has been authorized by boards of commissioners of Arenac, Ogemaw and Iosco Counties.

Iosco County is the initiating local unit to prepare a preliminary draft for submission to the Office of Criminal Justice.

Probate Judge William McCready is project director for the application and he is being assisted by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

If approved, the study would be financed by a 90 percent federal grant.

Judge Miller said Friday that a 10-bed juvenile facility, two of which would be maximum security, is being proposed. He said that federal funds are available to aid local units in construction of juvenile facilities.

# Commission OK's ET Sewer Project

Authorization to utilize the Iosco County Department of Public Works to commence legal procedures for a \$600,000 general obligation bond issue to finance sewer construction at East Tawas was enacted Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The bond issue would pledge the full faith and credit of the county in order to obtain a lower interest rate than available to a single unit, but retirement of the bonds would remain the responsibility of the East Tawas Council, applicant.

This project has been under discussion for a number of years and is designed to serve the Tawas Lake area with sanitary sewer. Engineering is nearly completed and it is expected that the project would have an early start next year.

In other business, Farm Bureau Insurance was low bidder on furnishing blanket insurance for county-owned real and personal property, all county-owned premises, property damage and liabil-

ity insurance for county vehicles. Tawas Bay Agency, Incorporated, is to provide public employee bonds and workmen's compensation insurance.

The commission authorized the purchase of four patrol cars from Inglis Ford Service at a cost of \$14,353.84.

A five percent increase in salaries to building custodians, the undersheriff and building code enforcement personnel was authorized.

Lease of one-half-ton pickup for 12 months was authorized from Inglis Ford Sales. The cost is to be \$155 per month for the first 27,000 miles and six cents per mile thereafter.

# East Tawas Man Awarded \$10,090 for Suggestions

Boris Spiridonow, 875 Jay Street, East Tawas, an employee of Plant No. 6 of the Saginaw Steering Gear Division, is \$10,090 richer, thanks to his suggestion award.

The largest payoff in the history of the division's employee suggestion awards program, Spiridonow's award was included among \$260,259 presented to 1,901 employees for 4,159 accepted suggestions.

Spiridonow's award was one of the two \$10,000 checks presented at Saginaw Thursday morning. He also was presented four small awards totaling \$90 for his suggestions.

The suggestion submitted by Spiridonow involved a change in the materials used to build passenger car steering columns, resulting in a saving of money for

the division. Making the presentation Thursday morning to Spiridonow was Harold T. Ross, a former Tawas City resident, who is works manager for Saginaw Steering Gear.

The presentations last week brought the division's year-to-date suggestion award total to \$764,200 paid to employees for 12,919 accepted suggestions.

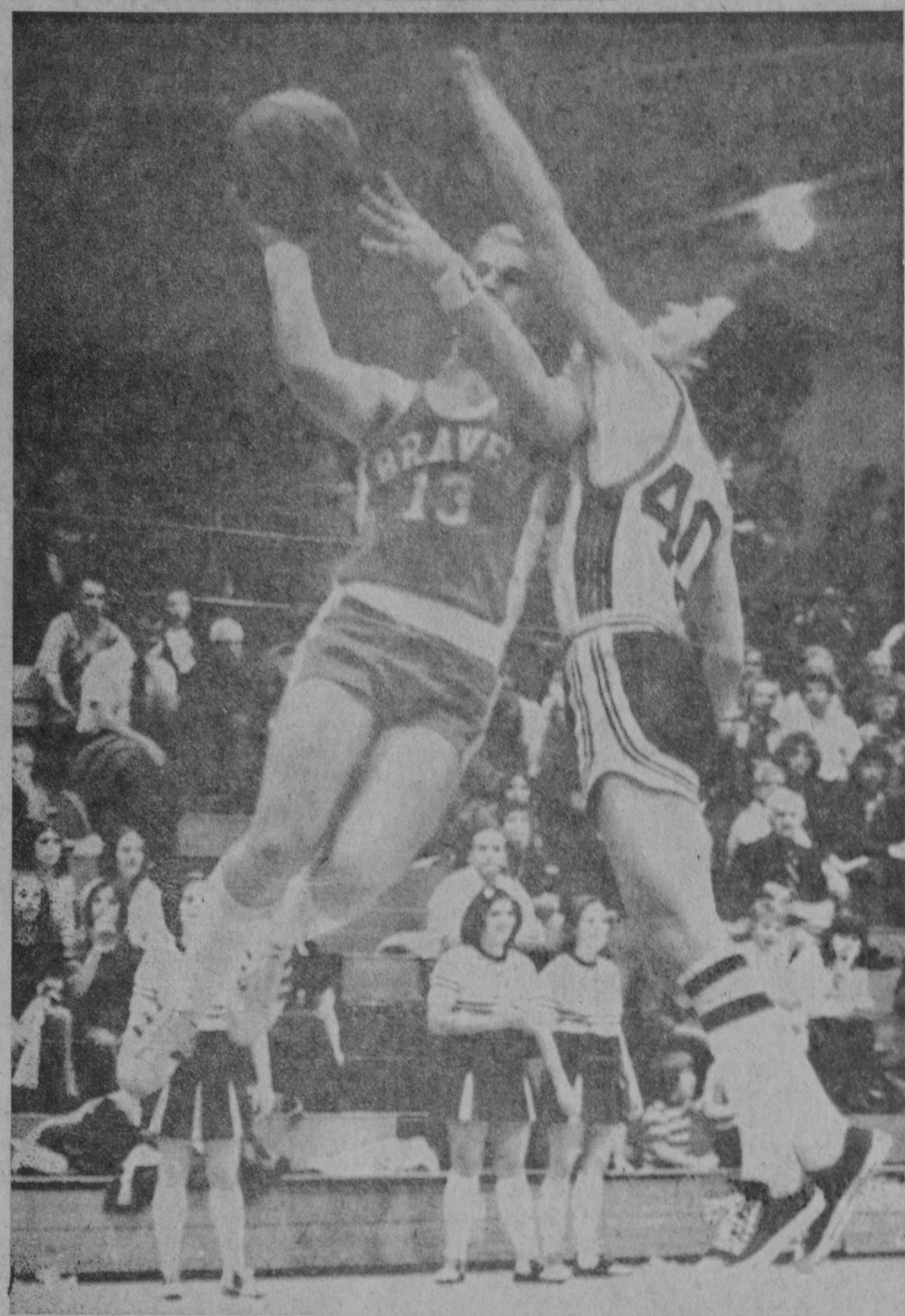

## Braves Defeated Spartans After Five Straight Losses

After losing five straight games to open the 1975-76 basketball season, Tawas Area Braves finally got on the winning side of the ledger Friday night by downing visiting Pinconning, 66-56.



May be Kicking Dead Horse, but...

# Flood Control Opponents Get Control of Drain Board Vote

Opponents of the AuGres River flood project demonstrated Wednesday night that they had enough votes to control the augmented drain board — something which they lacked for the first time last summer when the project finally received approval—but absence of one member due to a sudden illness frustrated any attempt for a showdown.

And, according to Stanley Quackenbush, deputy state drain director, it may be too late for opponents to accomplish anything other than correcting the augmented board's minutes. Even if opponents are successful in stopping or delaying proceedings, they may be "kicking a dead horse" as Quackenbush vowed the matter would be thrown back into the lap of Circuit Judge Joseph Swallow of Alpena.

Wednesday night's hearing held at the Isoco County Building, called by Isoco County representatives on the augmented drain board, was brief. The sudden illness of John Mielock, Isoco County drain commissioner, caused Isoco's representatives to ask for an adjournment to a later date.

Quackenbush, who is chairman of the augmented board under the drainage act, denied seating of Mrs. Mary Jane Burdett, vice chairman of the Isoco County Board of Commissioners. After it was learned Wednesday afternoon that Mielock would be unable to attend the meeting, Mrs. Burdett had been named as deputy drain commissioner by Robert Foster, county commission chairman.

In denying the seating of Mrs. Burdett, Quackenbush pointed out that state statutes governing such an appointment had not been followed due to the fact that a bond

is required for a deputy drain commissioner and the appointment must be made at a full meeting of the board of commissioners.

Following a 15-minute adjournment for Isoco and Ogemaw Counties to decide on a course of action, Russell Mason of Ogemaw County made a motion to adjourn the meeting to a later date due to the absence of Mielock. Quackenbush declared a quorum was present and read minutes of the July 22 hearing into the record. Since that hearing, which saw two of the three members of the Ogemaw delegation siding with Arenac's three officials to approve the project, a controversy erupted in Ogemaw County and the two members voting in favor have been replaced by members who oppose the project.

A disagreement apparently exists between the new Ogemaw members and an attorney appointed to represent that county. Charles Burleigh, the attorney, attempted to correct the minutes of the July 22 hearing by the addition of words to a motion approving the project.

Robert Hummel, an Osceola attorney hired recently by Isoco to represent the county in the drain matter, immediately pointed out to the augmented drain board chairman that the drain law provides that a meeting may be adjourned at any time by a majority vote of members.

Mason of Ogemaw again asked for a vote on adjournment and the question was placed before the entire board by Quackenbush. Despite the fact that Mielock was absent, the meeting was adjourned by a five to four roll call vote. The two county commissioners from Isoco, Foster and Donald Griffin,

plus the Ogemaw delegation of three members, voted in favor of the resolution, while Quackenbush, the two Arenac County commissioners and the Arenac drain commissioner voted in opposition to adjournment.

The hearing was rescheduled for Tuesday, January 13, 7:30 p. m., at the Isoco County Building.

In his remarks at the conclusion of the meeting, the deputy state drain commissioner said that the augmented board had been disbanded as soon as it cast its vote for approval last July. He said, however, that members had the right to call a meeting to correct the minutes of that meeting, but declared that such a meeting could only concern correcting the record and, in his opinion, there could be no reconsideration of the vote which saw approval of the project.

Even if Isoco and Ogemaw's representatives are successful in overturning the July 22 vote, Quackenbush declared the matter would be placed in the hands of Circuit Judge Swallow. The matter had gone before Judge Swallow on petition of AuGres area farmers interested in the project and tentative settlement was reached last May when attorneys representing the three counties agreed in court to an apportionment percentage for assessing costs of a flood control project.

This apportionment agreement is apparently the basis for Wednesday night's hearing as Isoco's members contend that it should not have been included in the augmented drainage board's July 22 motion approving the project as such action was properly the responsibility of the three-county drainage board formed after that hearing.

In addition to "correcting the minutes," Isoco's members hope to get another crack at voting on the project, especially since the recent change in thinking of Ogemaw's delegation. Two affirmative votes are required from Ogemaw County in order to approve the project.

Both of the upriver counties have long opposed the proposed flood control project which would mainly benefit a few farmers in the AuGres area and it came as a surprise last summer when two of Ogemaw's representatives voted in favor of the project. That action immediately proved to be controversial and the two members were replaced by the Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners.

Isoco County has opposed being included in the project from the first, regardless of what percentage of the total cost might be as-

signed to this county. Property owners on the western side of the county have continued to voice opposition since approval of the project last summer.

The next move will apparently come at the meeting adjourned to January 13, when it is expected that a new vote will be sought on the project. The entire matter, however, may again go into circuit court as indicated by the deputy state drain director.

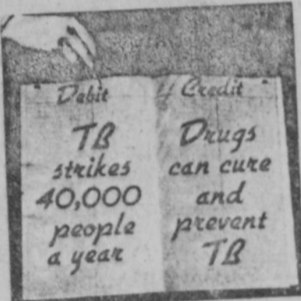

## Family Living Education

### CHRISTMAS PLANTS

Though a member of the cactus family, the Christmas cactus should not be kept dry. To promote flowering, keep the soil moist, advise Michigan State University horticulturists.

Give plants full sunlight during the day, temperatures of 60 to 65 degrees Fahrenheit at night and fertilizer when they are actively growing.

To have a plant in bloom for Christmas, preparation must begin in September. Keep it in total darkness for 12 to 14 hours each night until buds form. Temperatures over 70 degrees will prevent flower bud formation.

On the other hand, temperatures around 55 degrees will cause flowers to form, even if the plant does not get its extra-long nights.

Flower buds will fall off if the temperature is too warm or the light intensity is too low.

The Christmas cactus can spend the summer outdoors in cool, shaded areas. Just be sure to take it out after the danger of frost is

past and to bring it in early in the fall.

To keep your holiday poinsettia plant blooming, give it full sun, temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit, good drainage and water when the soil feels dry.

A sunny window where the plant will not touch the cold glass is ideal. The spot should not be too cold—chilling will damage the plant—or too warm—temperatures over 70 degrees will shorten the life of the flower bracts.

Keep your poinsettia out of both hot and cold drafts. Avoid spots near radiators, fireplaces, warm air registers and often opened doors and windows.

Water only when the soil is dry to the touch, but thoroughly soak

the entire soil mass. Never let the plant stand in water. Fertilize once a month using a water-soluble houseplant fertilizer.

By February or early March, side stems will have grown up above the flower bracts. Cut back the original stem to four to six inches and remove the flower and one or two side branches. Keep the plant in a well lighted area or a sunny window and at temperatures of 60 to 70 degrees. Water when the soil is dry and continue to fertilize once a month.

After the danger of frost is past in the spring, repot the plant if necessary. Take the plants indoors again before the first frost and place it in a sunny window. For flowers during the Christmas season, give the plant complete darkness between 5:00 p. m. and 8:00 a. m. daily from the end of September until color shows in the bracts (about mid-December). Keep temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees.

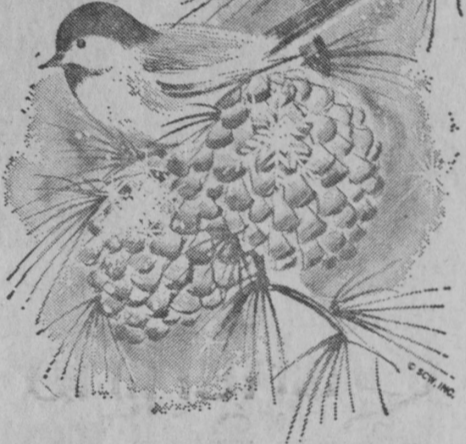

## Indians Had a Sacred Spring Festival Tree Upon Which They Hung Gifts

In early pioneer days in America, Indian children were invited to see the Christmas tree and were given extra food. On one occasion — in fact, probably on many more than just one — Indians were found dancing around the tree, stamping and whooping in the familiar manner of ceremonially excited braves.

One can imagine the shock and dismay on the part of some of our pioneer ancestors.

American Indians were accustomed to the idea of giving among themselves, though the habit was

prompted less by ideas of doing good and sharing with the less fortunate, than the more human one of raising one's prestige.

They had, also, a tree upon which they hung gifts. This was considered a sacred spring festival tree, not a Christmas tree. A tribe in North Dakota would plant, each year, a young cedar near the big medicine lodge. Children brought gifts of moccasins, pelts, shawls and so forth to hang on the branches of what was called, with the simplicity of so-called primitive peoples, Grandmother.

In the fall, Grandmother was uprooted and set afloat on the Missouri river for a long journey into the Great Beyond. Much in the way that Alaskans are reported to have set adrift their old folks, upon the icy water floes.

The Indians of course recognized that the white brothers' Christmas was an important occasion. It came to be called by tribes The Big Eating. By others, in districts frequented by French trappers, who kissed each other as they exchanged gifts, it was known as Kissing Day.

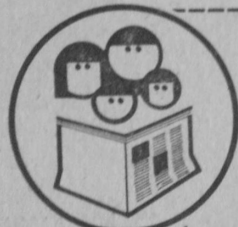

# Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners

DECEMBER SESSION  
December 3, 1975

Pursuant to published schedule, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:45 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called:

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: None  
The communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

The clerk reported briefly on the following items:

\*Reported on having received from the U. S. Postal Service the amended lease agreement which was executed by the board on August 6, 1975, increasing the rent on the Myles Building to \$456.25 effective August 1, 1975. Further reporting in connection therewith, that he received a check in the amount of \$456.25 covering rent for the month of November, plus a check in the amount of \$318.75 to make up the difference between the former monthly charge of \$350.00 and

the current figure for the months of August, September and October.

\*Reported on having received only two insurance bids to date, one being from the Myles Insurance Agency of Tawas City, and the other from Oscoda Realty and Insurance, of Oscoda.

\*Reported on having received statements from M. E. S. C. indicating unemployment benefits paid to former employees.

The board recessed for committee work at 10:15 a. m. on order of the chairman.

Upon call to order at 11:00 a. m., Cooperative Extension Director Marvin Davenport and his deputy, Jackie Moeller, appeared before the board. Mr. Davenport addressed the board in reference to the following matters:

\*Submitted suggestions for the formation of a committee and procedure to be followed for a study to develop recommendations for public utilization of the Rood property, the 1,400 acres in Tawas and Alabaster Townships bequeathed to Michigan State University by the late John Rood. Following a

comment by Commissioner Fox that, reportedly, Rood heirs have initiated a court action to contest the bequest to M. S. U., it was proposed that the suggested study and any other matters relating to the Rood property be held in abeyance pending final resolution of the court proceedings.

\*Discussed office space required to house the Cooperative Extension Service, expressing the opinion that the Myles Building will not be adequate for both his department and the building and safety inspection department; that, in fact, the latter would probably require the whole building in the near future. In furtherance, he reported on having received a quotation from Mr. Adkins, of the U. S. Postal Service, of \$4.50 to \$5.00 per square foot for the 1,385 square feet they now occupy in the East Tawas Federal Building, including utilities, custodial services, etc., indicating his belief that equivalent space and services could not be obtained elsewhere for less money. In the ensuing discussion, the matter of statutory barrier-free design requirements for county-leasable building was raised and referred for investigation with Building Inspector Block, as well as the possibility of negotiation with the postal service for a lower rate for the space in the Federal Building.

Discussion continued for some time in reference to the matters of providing space for the Cooperative Extension Service and the building and safety inspection department, disposition of the Myles Building in the event the department of social services elects to move from their county-owned quarters—thus making that space available, and the Rood property, whereupon Davenport indicated that he will contact Michigan State University to have them investigate the reported court action with respect to the will before proceeding further with efforts to determine an acceptable and viable use for the property. In further discussion, it was proposed that the department of social services be served with a notice to vacate the county-owned building if the state refuses to pay the rent as established by the board of commissioners.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties at 11:35 a. m., the board to stand in recess until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION  
Committee work not having been completed at 1:30 p. m., the chairman ordered that the recess con-

tinue, subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 3:20 p. m., the roll was taken, all members being present.

Chairman Foster reported in reference to the recent appointment of Stanley Kowalski, of Oscoda, as civil defense-emergency services coordinator, advising that Mr. Kowalski accepted another position and that the vacancy still exists. Continuing, he advised that Harold Schmidtke, an air force retiree, is interested in the position, but would like to consult with State Police Sergeant Kenneth Ryland, emergency services coordinator for the third district, to see if he can qualify.

County Equalization Director John Rose appeared before the board to discuss the possibility of his department performing assessing services for those local units that do not have a state certified assessor, and a method of formulating an equitable charge for the service, proposing either a per-parcel charge or a charge based on percentage of state equalized valuation, expressing a preference for the latter as being more commensurate with the unit's ability to pay. Following a lengthy discussion with board members concerning the method most fair to all units, it was proposed that an initial charge of \$3.50 per parcel be adopted, with an adjustment based on actual cost to be made at the end of the work period, but not to exceed the \$3.50 charge. In further discussion, Rose recommended that the county assume the assessing duties under a contractual arrangement for any units not having a certified assessor and requesting the service.

Commissioner Wereley presented and moved adoption of the following resolution, motion being supported by Griffin and carried. Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your legislative committee recommends that Iosco County concur with the resolution from Manistee County opposing Michigan H. B. 4399 and Michigan Senate Bill 355 which would increase the cost of workmen's compensation, and that copies of this resolution be sent to Representative Prescott and Senators Davis and Young.

Commissioner Fox reported briefly regarding the annual cost to operate the Myles Building, indicating the cost to be \$5,085 exclusive of any custodial services and snow plowing, etc., including only the rent, electricity and heat. A

discussion of the matter followed.

Finance Chairman Griffin presented and moved adoption of the following resolutions:

Honorable Board of Commissioners:  
Your finance and equalization committee recommends that the county equalization department be authorized to perform assessing functions for local units at a rate not to exceed \$3.50 per parcel. Rate to be reviewed at end of each calendar year, and if actual per parcel cost is lower, total cost per local unit to be adjusted to reflect the lower cost and refund made if appropriate. All services to be performed under contract with local units for minimum periods of 1 year and covering the complete tax cycle.

He expressed his gratitude to county departments for their efforts in curbing expenditures, indicating that the projection at this juncture appears good.

Upon motion by Fox, supported by Wereley and prevailing, the

minutes of the November 5th meeting were approved as drafted and presented by the clerk.

There being no further business, it was moved by Griffin and supported by Wereley that the board

adjourned until December 17, 1975, at 9:30 a. m. Motion carried.

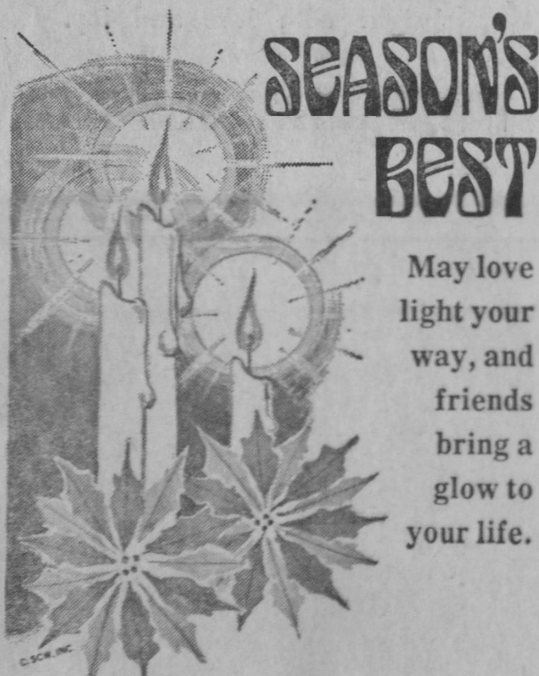

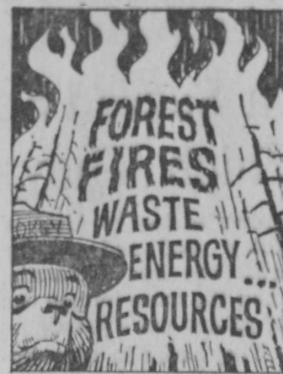

## Tree Trimming Techniques Are Studied by Two City Employees

A forestry management program commenced last summer in Tawas City has progressed well into its maintenance phase, according to Thomas Jacques of Huron Consulting Company.

The firm, hired by the council earlier this year to develop a street tree management program, has been training city employees in the maintenance of trees.

Although work on this project by city employees has been limited due to regular duties, two employees, David Baker and Bruce Fisher, have received training in trimming and pruning work.

As part of the training, the two city employees assisted by Edward A. Brenner, a local tree trimmer specialist, in the removal of five dead trees on city property located east of Elms Avenue and north of Bay Drive.

This property was deeded to the city in 1948 by the late N. J. Crocker when he developed a subdivision in that area. When the land was turned over to the city, there were 92 trees located on the small plot of land and no management program was established. As a result, many trees have been lost over the years.

The city plans to follow tree trimming recommendations contained in a survey conducted last summer by forestry students from Michigan State University and eventually develop the land for a neighborhood park.

Removal of five dead elm trees was undertaken on a voluntary basis last week by Brenner and the work offered excellent experi-

ence for the city employees as Brenner demonstrated proper methods to be utilized.

According to the tree inventory compiled by MSU students last summer, approximately 150 dead or diseased trees are to be removed from city streets and it is hoped that the city crew can accomplish a portion of this work during the winter.

Jacques said there are presently 1,079 trees on city streets with an estimated value of one-half-million dollars, according to the states shade tree evaluation chart. He pointed out, however, that it is difficult to place a monetary value on shade trees due to the esthetic value to a community.

Besides implementation of the tree trimming and removal program once the training is completed, the city is to give consideration to a tree planting program next spring.

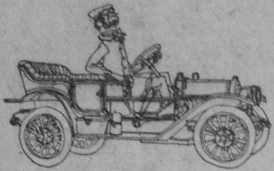

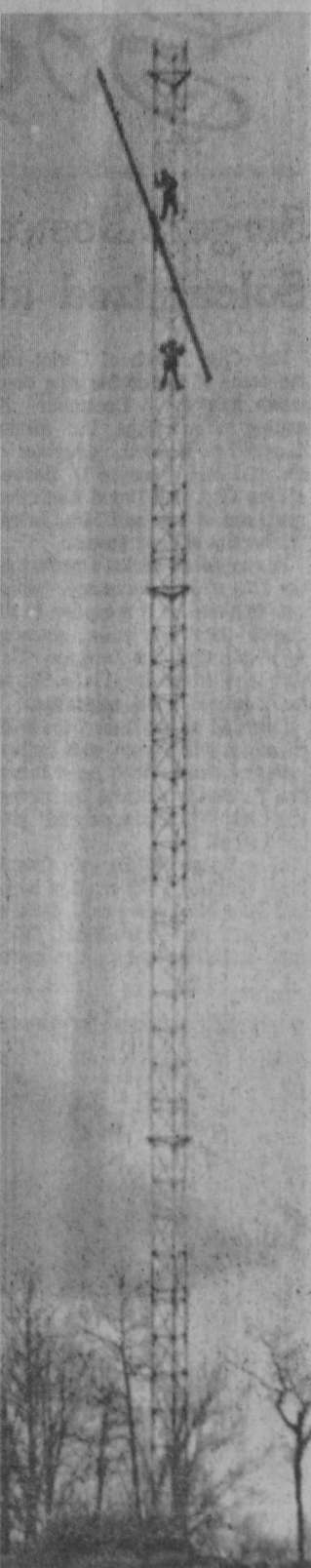

## Hospitals Want Voice on Insurance

Hospitals voted overwhelmingly Thursday to have a voice in the determination of Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Michigan payments to hospitals. The action came at a special house of delegates meeting of the Michigan Hospital Association held at East Lansing.

Under the current contract with BCBSM, hospitals have had little say in what Blue Cross pays hospitals, but when Blue Cross recently announced that it will pay hospitals an estimated \$60,000,000 less than it costs to adequately treat patients with Blue Cross coverage, hospitals had no choice in the matter.

This action was of particular concern since hospitals, in order to continue serving communities, will have to reduce needed services, lay off employees and postpone replacing outdated equipment.

The Michigan Hospital Association was authorized by its member hospitals to establish a negotiation process and to represent hospitals in the negotiations with BCBSM.

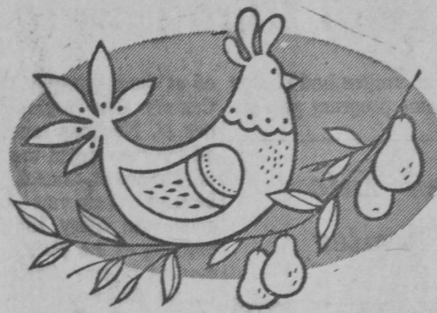

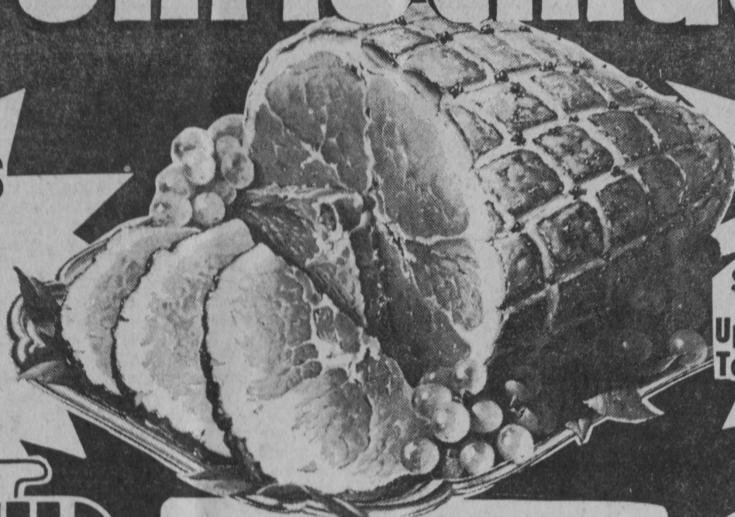
