

Councilmen Prohibited from Being in Debt to City

Charter Provision Invoked Against Ald. Rollin

Ald. Robert N. Rollin was directed Monday night by fellow members of the Tawas City Council to pay delinquent property taxes and past due city sewer assessments or face expulsion within 30 days, under terms of the city charter which provides that a member shall not be in debt to the city.

This long smoldering situation, which had been discussed privately and publicly since last spring, but never brought formally to the council table except for brief mention two weeks ago, finally surfaced Monday night and exploded into another controversy involving city matters.

The resolution, with Rollin not

voting, was adopted by a unanimous vote of the council, which included "yes" votes by Mayor John N. Brugger, Ald. William Ezo, William Groff, James Lansky and Edward Savage. Ald. Clark Tanner was not present at the meeting due to illness.

The immediate reaction from Rollin concerning the council action was that he was being harassed for his opposition to a parking proposal under discussion for a number of months, along with his opposition to special sewer assessment districts and other controversial matters over the past two years.

Alderman Ezo, who proposed the

resolution seconded by Alderman Groff, declared that this was not the case. "You took an oath upon entering office to abide by the city charter, which states that no councilman would be in arrears to the city," said Ezo.

The council's resolution declares that Rollin is in violation of the charter by being delinquent in paying his 1974-1975 property taxes, plus being delinquent since April 4, 1973, in paying \$525 for three sewer connection charges. He had paid his 1973 taxes recently.

Payment of the sewer connection charge appears to be a point of controversy between Rollin and

the city. Rollin said Monday night that he had paid for other connections when he improved a row of lots along Fifth Avenue for construction of modular homes, but refused to pay the three remaining charges because he felt the charge was not justified. He has since sold the lots to new owners.

Rollin stated that after purchase of the property, he discovered that two sewer connection mains leading across his lots to the Fifth Avenue sewer had been broken some years previous when gas mains were constructed by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company. In order to connect modular homes on those lots to city sewer,

he said he was forced to construct new lines and had to clean out the main under the street because it was filled with mud caused by the break during the gas company's construction.

"I think it is outrageous that the city should expect me to pay for these connections; the city should actually pay me for the work of a backhoe unit to clean out the city main under Fifth Avenue," declared Rollin. "The gas company was responsible for the break before I owned the property, not I, and I told the city manager so at the time."

Alderman Lansky expressed the opinion that Rollin should have

contacted the city two weeks ago to settle the matter on the sewer connection charge, but he felt that delinquency of a councilman in paying property taxes was a clear violation of the city charter and could only be handled under rules provided by the charter.

"I had to live by the city charter when I was told to get off the fire department and I believe that others should abide by the same charter," said Lansky. The former fire chief resigned from that position when Rollin insisted a number of years ago that provisions of the charter be enforced and obtained an opinion from the city attorney to that effect. The provision was

contained in rules of the council, which provides that no elective officer shall hold any office or employment, compensation for which is paid out of city money, except to that which he was elected.

The matter of the alderman's past due accounts with the city was brought up Monday night by Mayor Brugger, who had alluded briefly to the problem at the regular meeting two weeks ago. He said that the matter had been discussed privately in the community for months, that he and the city manager had met with Rollin several months ago concerning the delinquency and the matter had been discussed publicly on the ra-

dio during the recent election campaign.

Brugger stated that if there was a difference of opinion concerning the sewer connection charge, it should be handled through the city manager's office. "The bill lies against you with the city," he stated. The mayor expressed the opinion that the matter of delinquent taxes by a councilman was a different matter and a violation of the charter.

Rollin claimed that he had received only one billing from the city concerning the connection charges, but the city manager said his office had records to prove that (See ROLLIN, page 4.)

Seek Assistance With Furnishings

A representative of the East Tawas Housing Commission Monday night urged local service clubs to cooperate in a program to aid in providing furnishings for a meeting-recreational room in the new Bay Park Tower, which is scheduled to open Friday.

The new high rise apartment building of five floors is constructed at the corner of Bay and Church Streets and was developed through federal funding. It is to be utilized for low income housing for the elderly.

John C. Elliott of the housing commission told members of the East Tawas Council that furniture and furnishings not provided in the federal grant were needed for the meeting-recreational room on the ground floor of the building. He said approximately \$7,000 would be required.

In addition, Elliott requested city cooperation in snow removal in the driveway off Church Street and a parking lot at the rear of the building.

Ald. Ralph Western expressed the opinion that contributions for the necessary furniture and furnishings would be forthcoming once the building is open for occupancy later this week and the general public will have the opportunity to view this new facility to house elderly people.

The new apartment building consists of 40 apartments on the upper four floors with the lower floor to be utilized by an office and apartment for the manager, a meeting and recreational room and laundry room.

In other business at Monday night's meeting, Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, was directed to prepare plans for development of a special assessment district to finance sidewalk construction in the commercial area. The city attorney is to prepare the necessary legal work for implementation of construction next summer.

The council approved the purchase of a Christmas turkey for each employee of the city.

A meeting is to be held Thursday night at Lansing concerning repeal of the Fourth Class City Act. East Tawas is one of only few remaining cities operating under this act and the meeting is being held to determine methods of city operation until such time as new charters are adopted.

Bay Park Tower to Open Friday

Bay Park Tower, built by Gregory Construction and managed by the East Tawas Housing Commission, will be ready for occupancy Friday, December 5. Because of last minute delays, open house will not be held prior to occupancy. As soon as enough funds are collected for furnishings for the community room, open house will be held. The fund drive is still on and contributions may be sent to Rudolphe Castagner in care of the East Tawas City Hall.

Persons interested in renting a Bay Park Tower apartment may pick up an application at the city hall in East Tawas.

Nominating Petitions Due Dec. 29 at East Tawas

At least one contest for a city office is assured at East Tawas in 1976, according to information at Monday night's council meeting.

Gerald J. Klenow, incumbent First Ward alderman, and Mrs. Donald Miner are circulating nominating petitions for that office.

Ralph Western, Third Ward alderman, announced Monday night that he would not be a candidate for re-election. Robert Johnson, Second Ward alderman, is presently convalescing at home with a fractured leg and his intentions concerning re-election are not known.

Mayor Robert Bolen said Monday night that he would announce his intentions in about a week.

Nomination petitions for the three council seats, mayor, clerk and treasurer are to be in the hands of the city clerk not later than Monday, December 29, 4:00 p. m.

City Clerk Clyde Soper said that if not more than two candidates file for an office, a primary election would not be required in February and voters would make their selection at the annual city election in April.

A special meeting of the Tawas City Council to be held sometime after the Monday, December 15, council session to discuss plans and obtain opinions from property owners in a proposed special assessment district for parking.

The city planning commission recently recommended that an engineering study be obtained to prepare plans and estimated costs for the project. It is expected that the information would be provided at the special meeting by the city's engineering consultant.

Under discussion for months by the council and planning commission, the proposal involves property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron and Mr. and Mrs. George Prescott located west of the county building and under option for purchase by the city.

The proposition has been a controversial matter since it was first proposed in early spring.

Mayor John N. Brugger expressed the opinion Monday night that the council should hold the special meeting in order to obtain the feelings of property owners involved and that a commitment should be obtained from property owners in the district in order that the new mayor and new council can act accordingly after taking office January 1.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that information had been requested from the engineering consultant concerning development of parking on one or both parcels of land, along with a recommendation on establishment of a special assessment district.

The council was notified by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources by letter that no money would be available for state participation in expansion of the city park, which was included in the above proposal. It had been hoped that state recreational money would be available in a cooperative purchase of Babcock property adjacent to the city park.

Dennis Adams, assistant grants coordinator for the DNR, said that

the screening committee had rejected the city's proposal due to a deficiency in funds during 1975. He said that the state had received requests for \$23,000,000 and had only \$3,600,000 for allocations. He said that the application could be resubmitted in July 1976.

Also discussed Monday night was the matter of development of Court Street from the county building to First Street and Court Street

from First Street to a point near North Street. The portion from the county building to First Street is included in the proposed area for parking while the section to the east would be a separate proposal.

After January 1, the council is to study a proposal to construct a storm sewer along Court Street east of First Street, along with other areas of the city which would be included in the project. (See MEETING, page 4.)

Community Held Joseph Barkman in Highest Esteem

"A good Joe." These were the simple, but meaningful words used in 1969 to describe Tawas' citizen of the year, Joseph Barkman, who died Wednesday, November 26, following an illness of several weeks.

Few citizens have enjoyed the respect and love that Mr. Barkman earned in the Tawas area. One of the speakers at the banquet in his honor nearly seven years ago called him the "Angel of the Tawas" and lauded him for his gift of land for Tawas Hospital and Tawas Masonic Temple.

He was first in many ways in his community—first to send his check every year to the Tawas-Whittemore-Hale Area Community Chest, first to pay his chamber of commerce dues and first to help families in times of distress.

One of the prime movers and backers of Tawas Hospital, he witnessed his dream come true for a fine, modern hospital and was a regular contributor since its inception. The hospital room in which he passed away last week overlooked his lumber yard, with which he had been associated for 64 years.

The Barkman Lumber Company was founded in 1911 by Abram Barkman, Joseph's father, who had been a resident of the Tawas since 1883. In 1961, the 50th anniversary of that founding, he made a contribution to each church in East Tawas and Tawas City.

Always interested in the history of his community, he was one of the originators of the Iosco County Historical Society. His Tawas Historical Museum, located in the lumber yard office, had been a standout local attraction and he spent hours escorting visitors through his displays, explaining historical pictures and artifacts. Somewhat shy, Mr. Barkman was a gentle man, who was frequently visited by young and old, both from the community and afar.

He contributed large collections

of historical documents and old newspapers to the state and to Clarke Historical Library at Central Michigan University, which will be of importance to historical research in years to come. When the old Iosco County Courthouse was demolished in 1952 and the East Tawas City Hall was razed in 1960, Mr. Barkman was on hand to insure that public records and artifacts were saved for future generations.

Born June 2, 1889, at East Tawas, he worked with his father and younger brother, the late Nathan Barkman, in the operation of the family mercantile store and later a private bank at East Tawas.

He was associated with his father in the establishment of a mill at the present location of the lumber yard, which manufactured wooden skewers as well as crates and blocking materials for Maxwell Motor Car Company.

A veteran of army service during World War I, he was a member of Audie Johnson Post, American Legion, serving many years as post adjutant, and was a member of the county soldiers and sailors relief commission.

A one-time city clerk of East Tawas, he was a member of the election board of that community for many years.

He is survived by four brothers, Harris of East Tawas, Julius of New York City, New York, Aaron of Chicago, Illinois, and Milton of Flint; two sisters, Mrs. Helena Schram and Mrs. Regina Lewis, both of New York City.

Funeral services were conducted Friday, November 28, from Jacques and Kobs Funeral Homes, East Chapel, East Tawas, with T. George Sternberg of Bay City officiating. Burial was in the Jewish Community Cemetery, Bay City.

A special community memorial service was held Sunday afternoon at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, conducted by the Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury and pastors of other churches of the Tawas.



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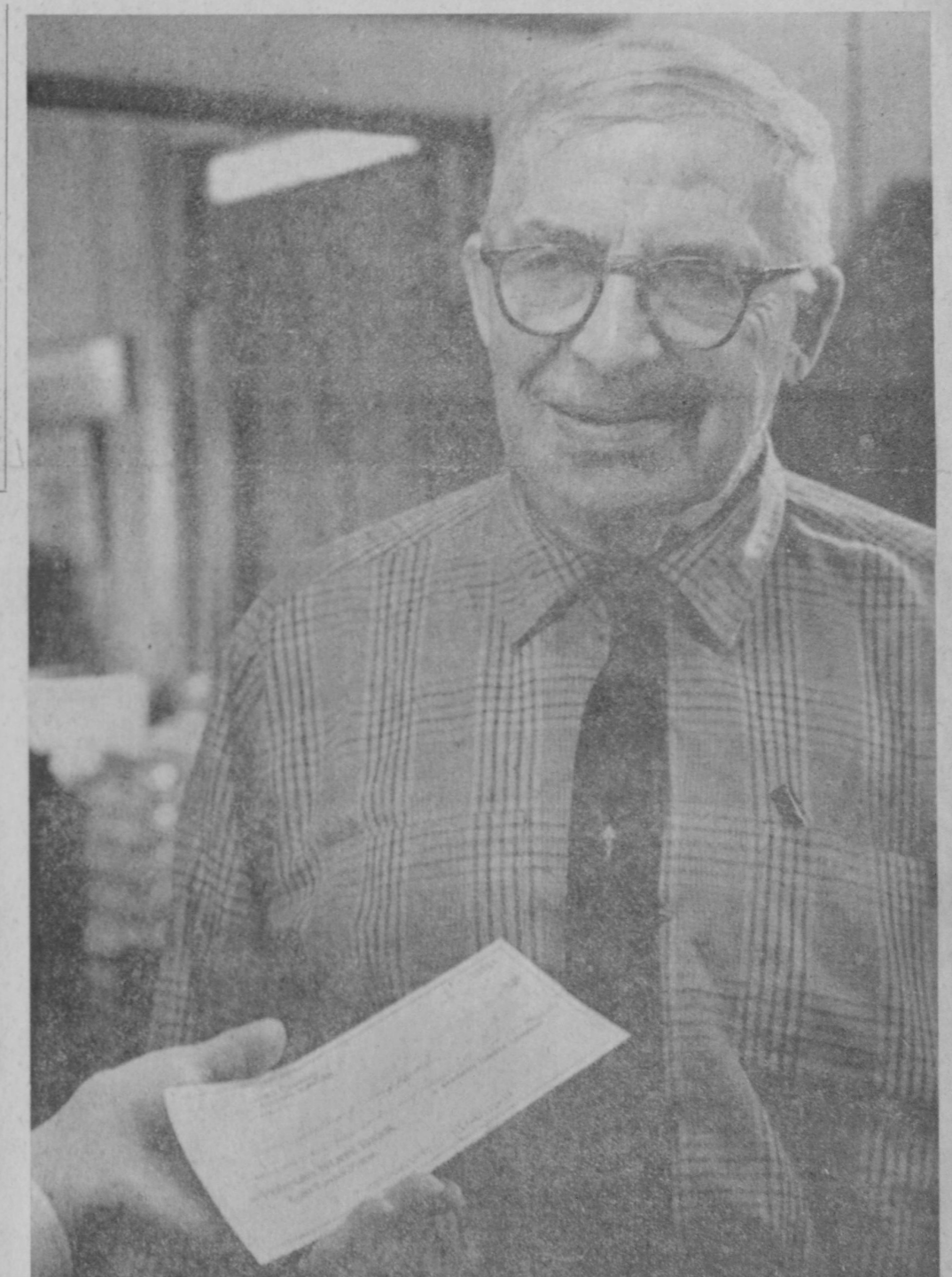

Council Grants Wage Increase to Hourly-Salaried Employees

A 30-cent-per-hour increase in wages was granted Monday night to hourly city employees by the Tawas City Council. The council also granted a seven percent increase to salaried employees.

A new wage and salary schedule had been presented last month for council discussion. Hourly employees, represented by Richard Pfeiffer, appeared before the council meeting and asked for a 10 percent raise in wages, representing a cost of living increase and an addition to regular wages.

The council settled on the 30-cent-per-hour increase, which represents slightly more than a seven percent cost of living increase. Wages had ranged from a low of

\$3.50 per hour for laborers to \$4.15 per hour for the heavy equipment operator.

In addition, the council amended its sick leave policy to allow an employee to accumulate 45 days of sick leave rather than the previous amount of 30 days. Employees are credited with one day of sick leave per month.

The city employs one laborer, three truck drivers and one heavy equipment operator. Salaried workers, including the city manager, clerk-treasurer, office secretary, foreman and librarian received a seven percent increase plus the same extension of sick leave benefit. Former salaries paid to those employees

were: Clerk-treasurer, \$6,200; office secretary, \$5,424; foreman, \$10,057; city manager, \$14,125; librarian, \$3,051.

In other business, the council approved paying \$1,156.30 to Tawas Hospital as its share of ambulance operation for the 1974-75 year.

A letter accompanying the bill stated that purchase of a new ambulance to replace an old unit depended upon prompt payment of bills by all units involved. Cost of the new ambulance is \$13,800.

Assessments to other units are as follows: Alabaster Township, \$489; Baldwin Township, \$1,094; Burleigh Township, \$381; Grant (See COUNCIL, page 4.)

the past due account had been billed a number of times.

Rollin said that he pays his taxes every three years and believes it would be discrimination on the city's part not to allow him the same privilege as allowed to other citizens in payment of property taxes. "As long as I am penalized by paying interest for being delinquent in my taxes, I can take advantage of that low interest rate," said Rollin.

Rollin said he had always been behind in payment of taxes and had done so since becoming a member of the council. He felt that, after sitting on the council for four years, he was now being harassed for his opposition to a number of city projects. "I am not cheating the city," he declared.

A member of the council since 1971, Rollin was re-elected in the November general election and was the second highest vote getter among candidates for city council. He was one of a number of persons signing a letter to the state election commission asking for an investigation of the election. A recount was conducted which showed only minor errors in tabulation, but no word has been heard as yet on other charges of irregularities.

It was suggested by Rollin that the city obtain legal opinion on the charter before implementing the provision applying to his case and said that he would obtain the opinion of his own attorney.

The mayor said that the council sits in judgment on its own regulations according to terms of the city charter.

Rollin expressed the opinion that the city charter should be changed to eliminate the provision being enforced, as well as the provision that prohibits councilmen from serving on the fire department.

The rule being enforced is listed on page 7 of the city charter, concerning eligibility for office in the city.

"No person shall be eligible for any elective or appointive city office who is in default to the city. The holding of office by any person who is in such default shall create a vacancy unless such default shall be eliminated within 30 days after written notice thereof has been served at his last known place of residence according to the records of the city by the city clerk upon the direction of the council, or, unless the officer contests his liability for the default in a court of competent jurisdiction."

Similar wording concerning default of an elective or appointive city officer is contained in the Fourth Class City Act, under which the city operated until adoption of the city charter.

The council is to advertise for bids concerning leasing of the concession in the city park. The present lease expires in March.

Two plaques were presented to the city by sponsors of the Tawas River Canoe Race and Griffin Power Boat Regatta held during September on Tawas Bay. The awards were made in recognition of the city's assistance during the programs.

drainage problems.

The mayor said he was aware that a petition was being circulated opposing establishment of a special assessment district to finance a storm sewer on Court Street from First Street east, but he pointed out that the plan was in line with past action of the council.

Brugger said that the city had expended approximately \$200,000 for streets and bridges in recent years, derived from federal revenue sharing and three mills of city taxes earmarked for streets. When the council embarked on the program, he said the city agreed to pay for streets and such improvements as storm sewers were to be borne by property owners.

Appeals Board Approves Two-Year Zoning Variance for Brooks Auto

Tawas City Zoning Board of Appeals approved a two-year permit for a temporary office building at Brooks Auto Parts on Ninth Avenue. Four adjacent property owners attended a hearing Thursday night, November 25, at the city hall.

Acting on a petition for a zoning variance requested by Fred S. Brooks, owner, the zoning board of appeals ruled that the two-year permit was subject to periodic inspection of the premises by the city manager to insure that state laws and city ordinances were being complied with by the owner. The property owner was directed to resubmit an application for a building permit to the county building and safety inspection department to determine if the structure meets the state building code.

Brooks had been cited by the county building and safety department for failure to obtain a building permit. In addition, the structure was in violation of the city's zoning ordinance due to enlargement of a nonconforming scrap yard use in a residential area. The firm had been established a number of years prior to adoption of the zoning ordinance. The building in question replaces an old bus body, which formerly served as an office. Adjacent property owners present expressed the opinion that the new frame building improved the appearance of the property.

Testimony was limited to the requested zoning variance as the appeals board was without jurisdiction to hear further discussion concerning the property.

County to End Year in the Red

County Treas. Edward Nelkie said Monday that it was still too early to determine the exact deficit facing the county's general fund at the end of the year, but he believed his office would be using red ink on December 31.

The treasurer anticipated a deficit of \$7,500 in his projection last September, but in early November the county's board of commissioners' finance committee projected a deficit of approximately \$16,000 at year's end.

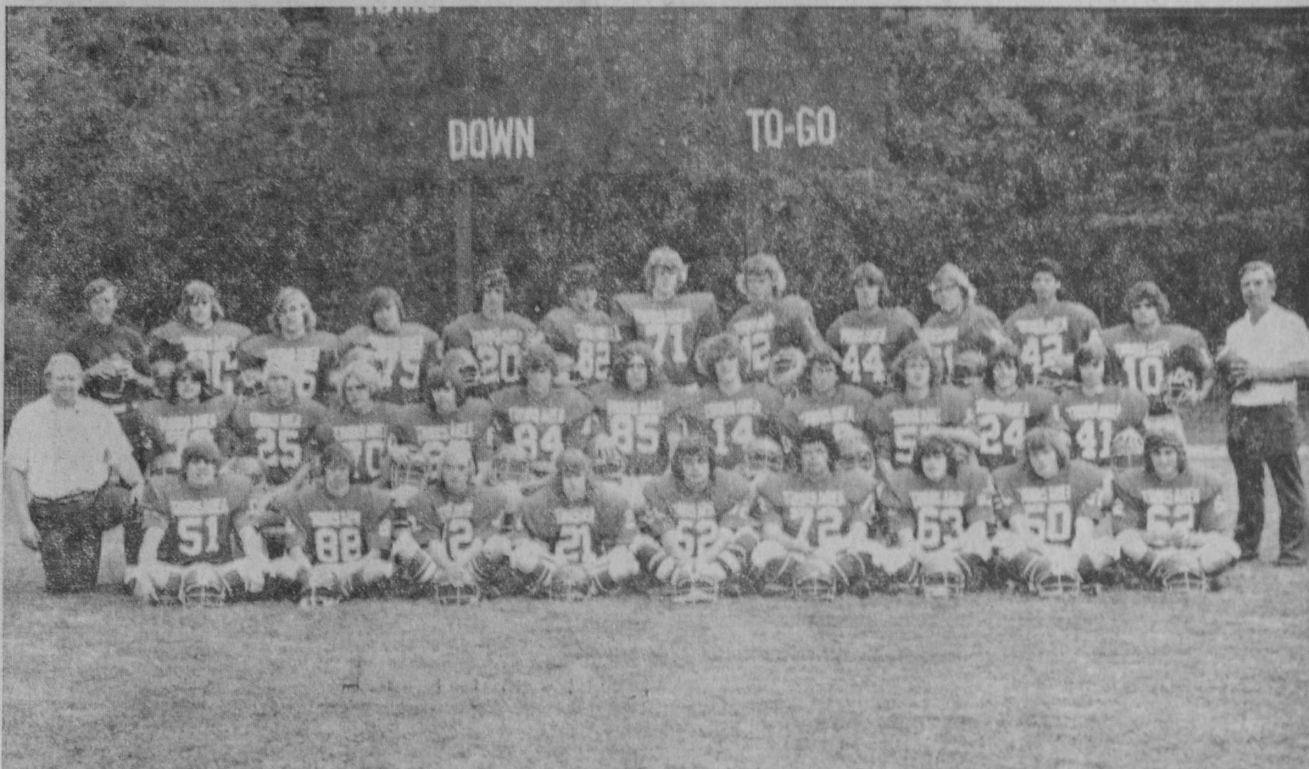
In predicting the above deficit, Donald Griffin, county finance chairman, recommended to the county commission that all departments refrain from making capital expenditures, as well as not replacing any terminating employees and not to hire any new employees.

The commission adopted the above recommendation and or-

dered that no part-time work be utilized in any department without commission approval, instructed department heads not to attend conferences or seminars which would involve travel and ordered that compensatory time off be utilized to preclude payment of overtime.

In its letter to department heads, the county commission noted it was necessary to reduce the budget of all departments in April due to reduced revenue projections. Despite a \$1,141 reduction in budgeted expenses, there was an increase in expenditures.

"Many departments have done an outstanding job in curbing expenditures in response to the April budget reductions," stated the commission's letter. "Others have been unable to do so for a variety of reasons and we are faced with the above deficit."

Tax Tribunal to Hear Appeal on Plainfield Twp. Valuation

Following a preliminary hearing last week, the Michigan Tax Tribunal is to hear a petition from Plainfield Township vs. the County of Iosco and Michigan State Tax Commission concerning that township's equalized valuation. No date has been set as yet by the tax tribunal to hear the petition.

The township has asked for a complete review of activities of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and the state tax commission and asks that the township's assessed valuation be set at \$22,148,954.

The above figure was adopted by Bruce Hewitt, township supervisor, following his assessment procedure last spring and was submitted to the county's tax equalization department. The figure was later increased to \$25,692,786 during county equalization and boosted to \$28,511,972 by the state tax

commission which rejected the county's equalization.

The township's state equalization in 1973 was \$18,707,803 and Hewitt claims that the new figure represents a 45 percent increase between the time of assessment by himself and the final valuation established by the state.

The township's petition claims that the county has, by its equalization, treated Plainfield Township unfairly, unjustly, inequitably and has used discrimination in its equalization process.

The petition claims that the township's increase in equalized valuation came at a time when the actual value of assessed property, which took into consideration new property and losses, had increased in a significantly lesser value.

The township had been informed by the county in January to increase property valuations by the

following percentages: Timbercutover, 46 percent; farm land, 35 percent; residential, 12 percent; commercial, 40 percent. Hewitt said he had applied those percentages to all property except where current sales indicated a higher value, or a determination had been made by the board of review.

The petition claims that a number of errors were found in the county sales study conducted in 1974 and that the state tax commission, by letter to the township, evaluated Michigan Department of Natural Resources property at \$23 per front foot while the county assessed the property at \$42 per front foot.

It was also claimed that the county had not made an allowance for lowering the valuation of house trailers through a determination factor. With 1,500 trailers in the township, it is claimed that the as-

essed valuation should show a reduction. The petition also submits a claim that comparable property of the same class in an adjoining township has been valued at a lesser amount than in Plainfield, which results in discrimination.

In regard to the claim on house trailer valuations, the county is expected to show that it is the responsibility of the township assessor to determine any deterioration factor and make adjustments as the county deals only with total assessments and not individual assessments. The county also expects to show that a letter from the tax commission indicating the appraised valuation for DNR property is not within the state's jurisdiction and that certain factors were not considered in the petition when a comparison was made of property between townships.

Iosco has been placed in a difficult position in defending the county equalization in the above case as it has protested the rejection of its equalization by the state tax commission and subsequently higher valuation placed on the county's total by the state. The county's case against the tax commission is currently in limbo before the tax tribunal.

Lila M. McGinley, Mt. Clemens, was treated November 25 at Tawas Hospital following a crash on Curtis Road, one-half mile west of Putnam Road, Plainfield Township. The car hit an icy spot on the road and the driver lost control. The vehicle rolled end-for-end into a ditch.

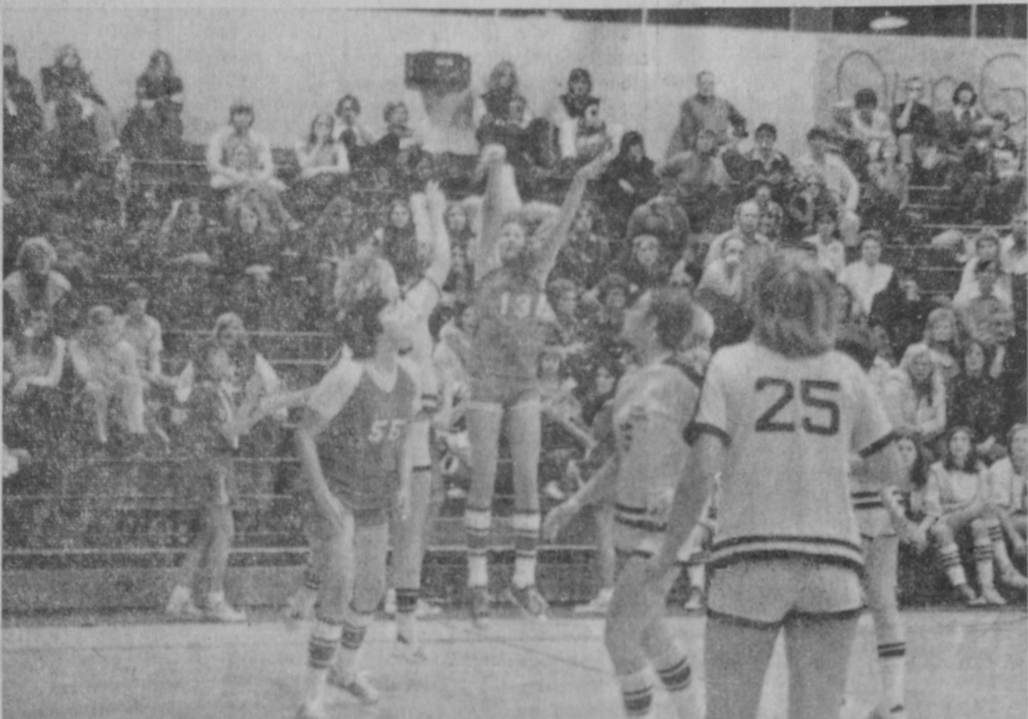
Leading scorer for the winners was Dawn Bryant, who had 22 points.

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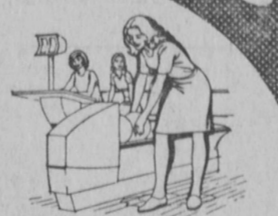

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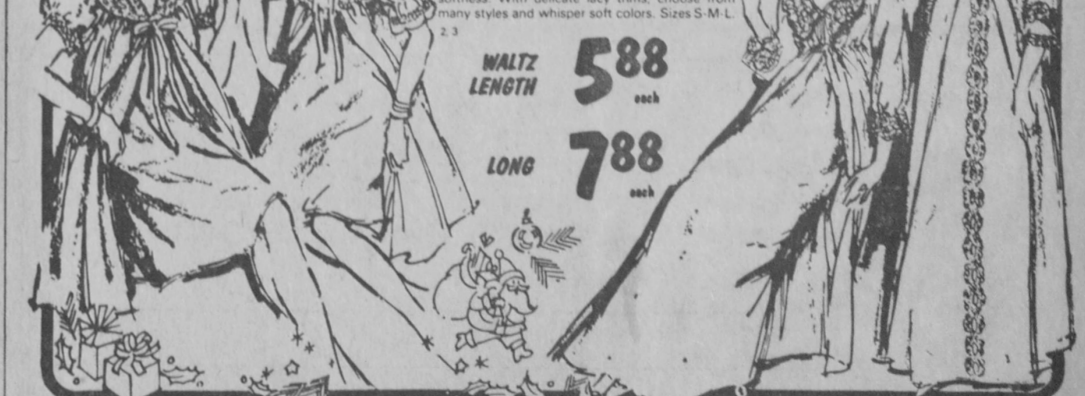

Tawas Area Enrollment Projections Discussed

A discussion on enrollment projections and the possibility of additional classrooms to meet the needs of the district was held Monday, November 24, during a work session held by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Dr. Robert A. Halle, superintendent, reported that enrollment projections for next year are showing some decline, but not as substantial as previously anticipated.

The superintendent said he was making use of the school census recently compiled and the best techniques available to develop a full presentation of enrollment projection at the regular meeting of the board of education Tuesday, December 8.

At the board of education's last regular meeting, it was announced that a survey was being conducted to determine if the school could return to a regular school day next year rather than to utilize the split session which has been in operation for the past three terms.

The study would include a recommendation concerning the number of additional classrooms necessary to achieve the change. Due to overcrowded conditions three years ago, an extended day was adopted whereby high school grades attend classes in the morning and grades six through eight, comprising a middle school, attend sessions in the afternoon. The elementary grades retained the regular morning and afternoon schedule.

Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners

NOVEMBER SESSION

November 5, 1975
 Pursuant to published schedule, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:40 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called:
 Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)
 Absent: None.
 Chairman Foster reviewed the agenda for the day and the business before the board, following which the communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees:

The reading of the communications was interrupted at 10:00 a. m. for an audience with a group of residents of Alabaster and Tawas Townships, who appeared before the board to proclaim their opposition to a rumored proposal to construct a juvenile detention facility on the Rood property, a 1,400 acre tract located in Alabaster and Tawas Townships which was bequeathed to Michigan State University by the late John Rood and which has been offered to the county for utilization in some way that would benefit the community.

James Quarters, of Tawas Township, presented a petition containing 770 signatures and addressed the board on behalf of the group to register their disapproval of the location of any such type facility in their area. In addition, a letter from the Alabaster Township Board reporting action taken in opposition to the placement of a detention facility on the Rood property in Alabaster Township was read to the board, as well as a letter from Michigan State University to the Tawas Township Planning Commission indicating there to be no objection to having the Rood property designated for potential future recreational usage. In the ensuing discussion, other concerned residents expressed their opposition to the rumored facility and their criticism of board members for considering such a proposal without first contacting the area residents, whereupon Chairman Foster and the other commissioners assured the group that the alleged proposal was merely a casual suggestion and that there is no plan to locate a juvenile facility on the Rood property; that, in fact, there would have to be a thorough study, and approval by township planning and zoning officials, before any proposal could be considered seriously; further emphasizing, however, that there is a genuine need for a juvenile detention facility somewhere in the county. In further discussion, the proposed posting of the Rood property was raised by some of the residents, whereupon Chairman Foster explained that County Extension Director Davenport has been ordered by the university to post the property to prohibit trespassing.

Following a brief recess, the board was called to order at 11:07 a. m., whereupon Roy Kinney, of Rockford Map Publishers, Inc., addressed the board in reference to a new order for county plat books, advising that of the 1,500 purchased in 1973, there are only about 150 remaining unsold. He

submitted a proposal to furnish 1,500 books at a cost of \$7,263, recommending that they be sold at \$6 each, which would produce \$9,000 in revenue, indicating that is the price being charged by most counties. The possibility of selling advertising in the plat book to help defray cost was discussed with Mr. Kinney, who indicated that this would add approximately \$1,000 to the cost of 1,500 books, whereupon the chairman announced that the matter would be taken under advisement and requested that Mr. Kinney leave the price information with the board.

Undersheriff Basil O'Dell and Animal Control Officer Charles Linneman appeared before the board in reference to the following matters:

Requested permission to exchange CETA personnel at the jail and the animal shelter due to the need for someone with record-keeping ability at the latter.

Discussed a proposal to lease a pickup vehicle for the animal shelter for \$150 per month, including all maintenance except gas, oil and insurance, and the purchase of a fiberglass box for the pickup to transport animals, at a cost of \$1,145.

Reported that a concerted effort to license dogs has netted \$700 so far this year, as opposed to \$73 last year.

Reported problems with the heating system and resultant fumes at the animal shelter.

Reported that the euthanasia pit that was constructed to destroy animals with gas doesn't work and they are using the injection method successfully.

Reported that they are holding an average of 24 dogs per day at the animal shelter and need additional space, requesting permission to double deck pens.

Discussed the possibility of amending the animal control ordinance to provide for the holding of dogs for rabies determination in bite cases involving dogs from outside the county.

Discussion continued in reference to such matters as the difficulty in controlling cats and the education of the public, it being proposed that bids be sought on the proposal of leasing a vehicle, and Commissioner Fox indicating that he is to meet with Engineer Otis Love and Contractor Floyd Schaff with regard to resolving the construction and heating problems at the shelter.

In further discussion, O'Dell referred to the need for a facility to detain mentally ill persons, reporting that every time they have attempted to utilize the Alpena Mental Health facilities they have been informed that there is no room. Chairman Foster thereupon requested that O'Dell furnish him with a list of dates and names so that he may take the matter up with the mental health authorities at the next meeting.

County Airport Manager Wilbur Roach appeared before the board for a discussion in reference to a request by Chairman Foster that he discontinue to provide transportation for airport fly-in visitors due to the liability risk involved, urging that the board consider some alternate means of providing transportation. Commissioner Griffin proposed that perhaps some arrangement could be made with the maxi-van program to provide transportation for airport patrons, whereupon the matter was referred to committee for consideration.

The time being 12:00 noon, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. upon order of the chairman.

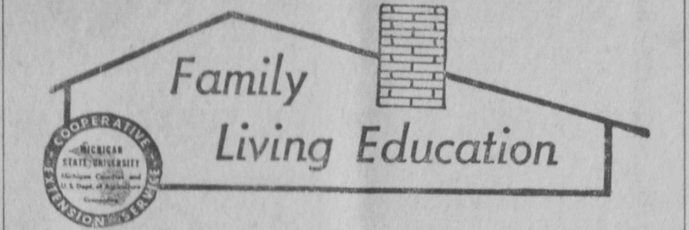

WHAT DO YOUR CHILDREN KNOW ABOUT YOUR FAMILY'S HISTORY?
 In many families today, the father has a job that keeps the family on the move. This may give the child an opportunity to see other parts of the country and an exposure to other people's values and attitudes. Yet, it may also keep them from getting to know older family members who remember the "good old days" and could tell children first hand experiences as surprising and interesting as they see on television.
 Family history has a very cold sound! Maybe it sounds too much like a required course rather than a fun family activity. Nevertheless, many families find that this is of interest to most children nine or 10 years old and nearly always to the parents.
 Children have access to excellent books that help them learn something about the attitude of people at the time that their an-

cesters went west with the Gold Rush and Grandmother carried a picket sign to win the right to vote.
 Ordinary happenings like all the neighbors coming to help thresh wheat or getting a new-fangled washing machine to replace the tub and washboard may not mean much if you have never seen a threshing machine or an old washboard. Yet, as these are identified, the activities have more meaning.
 What is the real value of helping children become interested in their family background? This may be one way to help children learn respect for their family and, as a consequence, greater respect for themselves.
