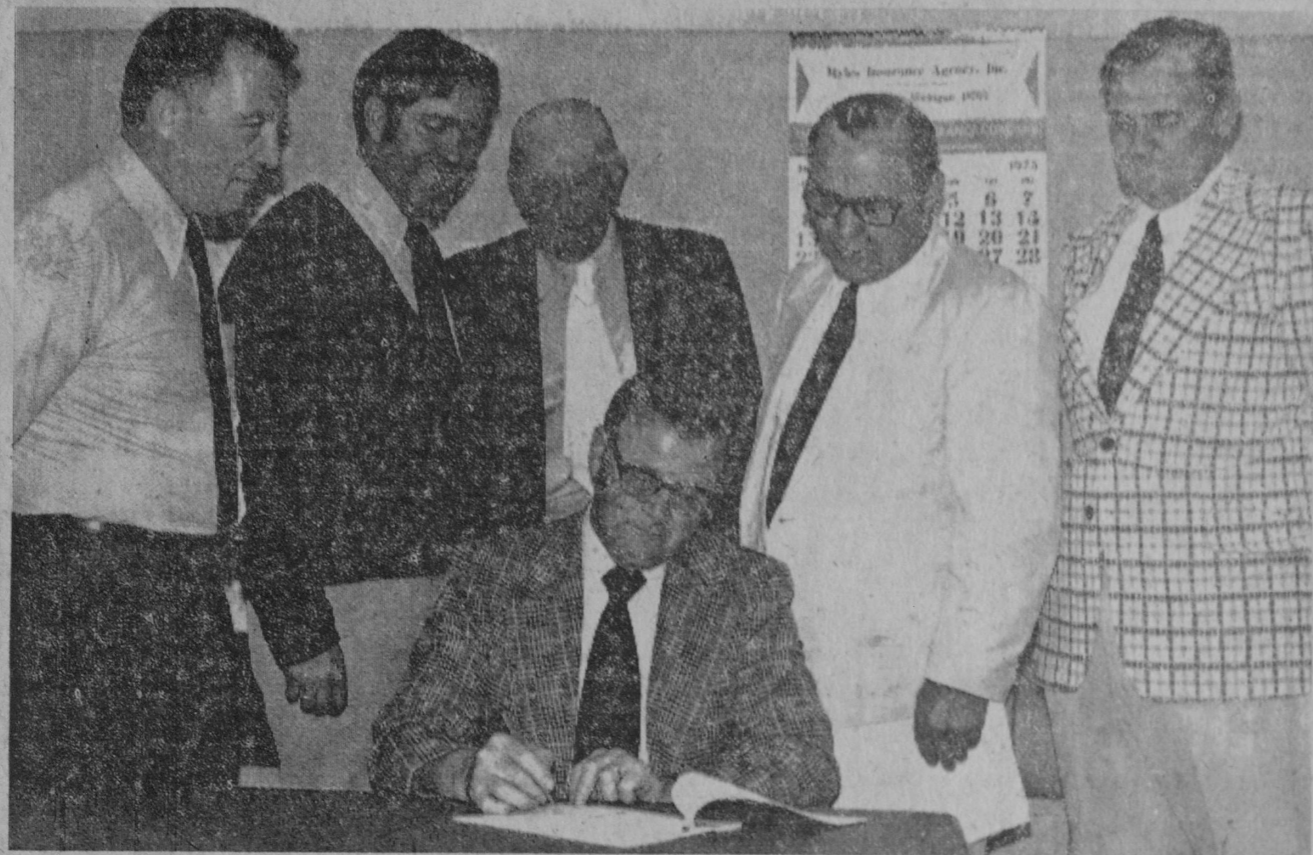

## County-State Study Renovation of Access Highway Serving Wurtsmith

Scott Engineering Company of Alpena has been selected to conduct preliminary studies for renovation and expansion of about two miles of F-41 from US-23 to Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A 1.5-million-dollar contract with the department of state highways was recently signed by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners for this project. The contract designated the highway de-

partment as the administering and consulting agent for the project. Most of the funds for the project are to come from federal defense access highway funds as the route serves the air base and is a main road connecting with US-23.

A preliminary report has been completed and the application for federal funds is to be submitted early in 1976.

Design of the new highway calls for handling approximately 16,000 vehicles per day. A recent study indicated a rate of 11,000 vehicles per day driving to and from the base on F-41.

Several alternatives are included in the proposal, including construction of a new four-lane access and bridge over the AuSable River, or reconstruction of the present two-lane route.

**Student Exchange Program Ready for Bicentennial**

Youth for Understanding, Incorporated, the largest teen-age student program in the world, is teaming up with Michigan Jaycees to offer scholarships to nine state youths to carry bicentennial greetings to foreign countries during the summer of 1976.

**Free Health Test Offered During January**

Michigan Department of Social Services, in conjunction with the Michigan Department of Health, is sponsoring a free health test for persons who are Medicaid card recipients.

These tests include a physical and dental inspection, vision, hearing and several blood tests.

Tests are to be given by the county health nurse at the health department building, Oscoda. The tests are scheduled for January 15-16 and January 22. Everyone under 21 years of age who is included on the Medicaid card is eligible for this program. To be scheduled or for more information, contact the Iosco County Department of Social Services and ask for the project health staff.

## County Benefits from Securing Child Support

Checks totaling more than \$700,000 were mailed to Michigan counties during December under new federal legislation which offers incentive payments to local units of government in return for efforts in securing child support for families receiving Aid to Dependent Children (ADC).

In addition, almost 30,000 ADC recipients received checks of up to \$20 each, a total of more than one-half-million dollars in return for cooperation in locating absent parents who have been ducking child support payments.

These payments, based on November child support collections, are being made under a new Social Security Act amendment aimed at shifting the burden of child support from taxpayers to those legally responsible and financially able to provide such support.

The law, which took effect August 1, requires each state to institute a program to establish paternity and secure support in ADC-related cases. The law provides help to non-ADC families in locating missing parents who have not been making court-ordered child support payments.

To encourage the states to gear up for this program, the federal government is chipping in 75 percent of the cost, as well as half the cost of the incentive payments to ADC recipients and 100 percent of the incentive payments to local units of government which actually do the work of securing the support orders and collecting the payments.

The ADC recipient receives up to 40 percent of the first \$50 on a support order for which there is a current payment. Counties receive 25 percent of the net child support collection, the amount of the child support collected minus the incentive payment to the client. After the first year the support order is in effect, the county share drops to 10 percent.

Michigan is in a particularly advantageous position to take advantage of the new legislation since the state has been actively pursuing child support collections in ADC-related cases for six years. Iosco County's share of the sup-

port incentive, representing August and September payments, amounted to \$1,585.11.

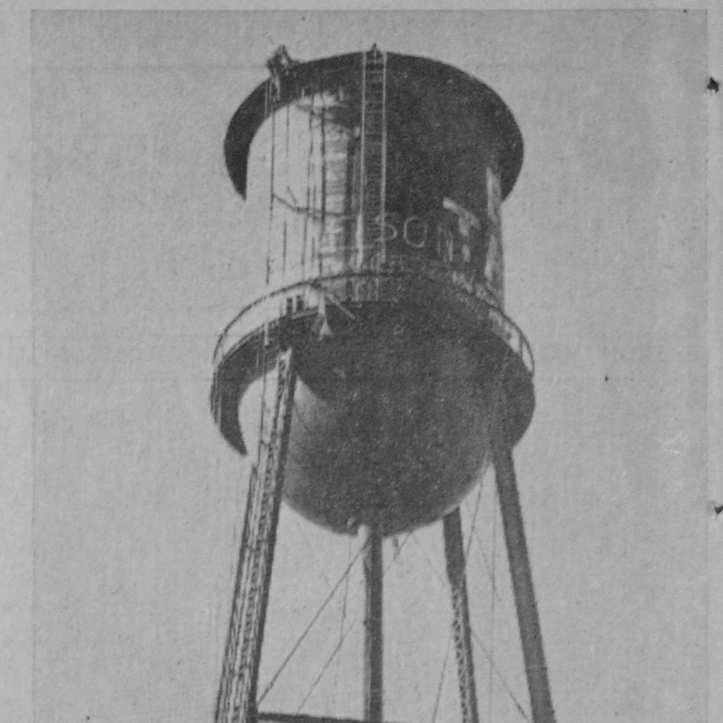

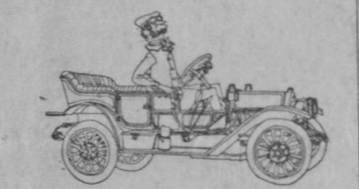

Deep human fulfillment comes through significant relationships with other persons. "It is what happens to you in relationships with others that is important to you. You learn in relationships with other people how to enjoy many experiences on your own; such as, music, art or nature."

The "people-centered" or developmental family recognizes that all family members have important feelings, needs and desires. What happens to one family member has a bearing on what happens to others, individually and in total.

Only by respecting and accepting oneself is a person able to relate positively to others. "If you do not like yourself, it is difficult to

give of yourself to others because you do not have very much to give away."

The quality of parent-child relationships is more important than the amount of time spent together.

Relationships change over a period of time and in varying situations. They either grow and develop or they fall apart. There is no such thing as a static relationship.

The family group with which we spend most of our early lives predisposes us favorably or unfavorably toward different people.

We can become more creative in solving problems within the family as well as with other people.

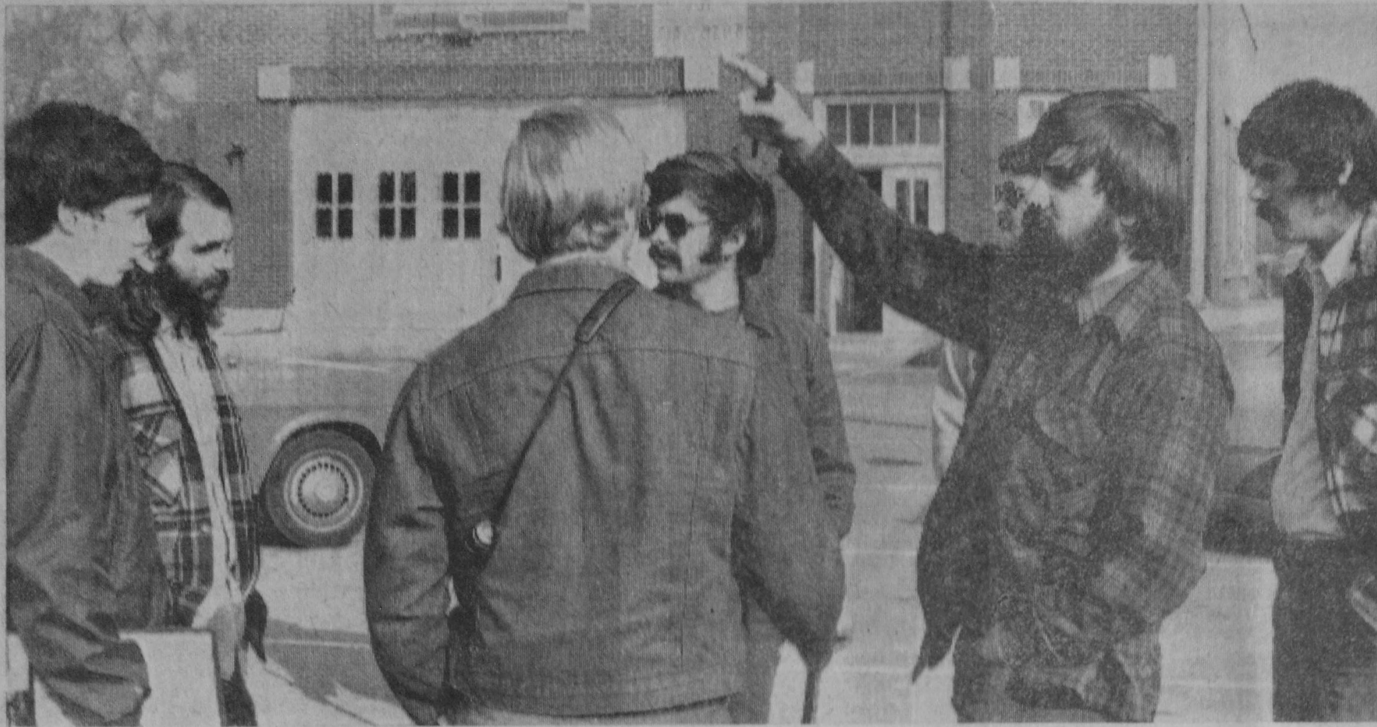

# State Forest Campgrounds Open for Winter

Several state forest campgrounds in the northern Lower Peninsula will be open for winter camping this year, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources announces. Although many of these primitive camping areas will not be plowed of snow, they will be accessible — by snowshoes, cross-country ski or snowmobile. These campgrounds are outfitted with minimum facilities—tables, box toilets, hand pumps and trash receptacles. There are more than 100 forest campgrounds in the northern 33 counties of the Lower Peninsula.

Some forest campgrounds which will be plowed include Carrieville, three miles west of Luther; Sunrise Lake, six miles east of LeRoy; West Pike Lake, 10 miles northwest of Farwell; Pigeon Bridge, 11 miles east of Vanderbilt; House Lake, three miles northeast of Meredith, and Chub Creek, six miles east of Waters.

Michigan has 33 state forests with a total of 3.8-million acres, of which 75 percent was reverted to the state for nonpayment of taxes. These forest lands are managed

under a multiple-use concept by professional foresters and other specialists to yield the best possible benefits to the public.

The campgrounds listed are free to the public for camping, picnicking and other recreational activities. Registration is required on tags provided at each campground. Reservations are not needed.

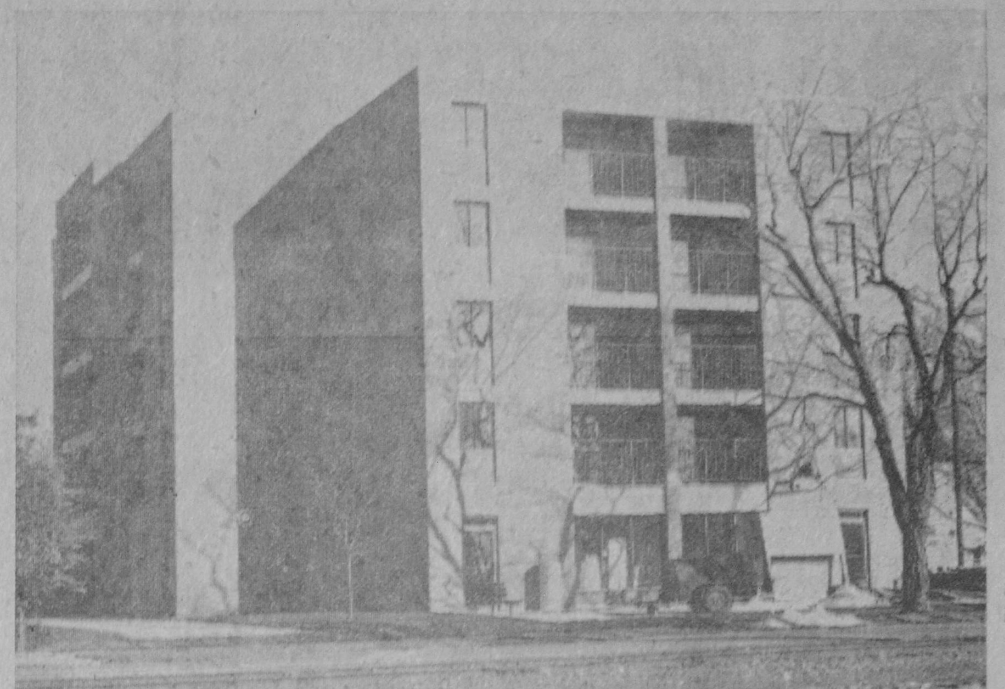

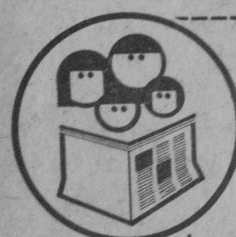
