

### **Judge Grants** 30 Days to File Answers

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller granted 30 days in which to file amended answers in the \$400,000 damage suit brought by Taisto C. Filppula vs. Oscoda Board of Education, individually and severally. The matter had been set for pretrial hearing on January 26.

Filppula, who was discharged April 14 as superintendent of Oscoda Area School, claims he was deprived of liberty and property without due process of law by reason of the defendants acting in concert.

The plaintiff's petition also claims that the defendants failed to provide a written statement listing the reasons for the superintendent's discharge or charges upon which the discharge was based. The petition also claims that the board failed to provide a hearing where the superintendent could respond to such reasons and charges.

Last week, Judge Miller heard arguments by counsel on the plaintiff's motion to compel answers to interrogatories by the individual defendants.








The law, which took effect August 1, requires each state to institute a program to establish paternity and secure support in ADC-related cases. The law provides help to non-ADC families in locating missing parents who have not been making court-ordered child support payments.



Doctor Marshall suggests some basic principles which may help in handling relationships with others-a skill which is "perhaps the most essential art that we will need to acquire in the years


It is people, not things, that are important. "We are concerned with how people feel about each other and how relationships are affected by what we do. We are increasingly aware that it is people that count.






