

# Property Owner Voices Objection

Tawas City officials Monday night disclaimed any city responsibility for a sewer line constructed across private property a number of years ago to serve a private dwelling, but offered the present owner a \$225 refund as payment for the previous hookup charge to be applied toward a special assessment for construction of a new sewer.

Appearing before the council was Warren Kehoe, who resides at the corner of Murphy and Birch Streets. Kehoe said that when he purchased the dwelling a year ago, he understood that the property was served by city sewer. He said, however, he later discovered the sewer had been constructed across private property by the previous owner, Clark Tanner, and claimed the sewer was inadequate in that it ranged from a depth of only six inches to 2 1/2 feet.

It was Kehoe's opinion that the sewer line constructed across private property was now the city's responsibility. He said that the line was later extended across a public alley to serve another dwelling and was approximately one city block in length.

"I purchased the property under the impression I had city sewer and the next month I received a bill of \$1,900 for being in the special sewer assessment district," said Kehoe.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the city's bonding attorney had advised that any property on which a special assessment had not been paid was liable for the new sewer assessment.

Bublitz said the private sewer line had been constructed in 1963 by Tanner and that the water board had authorized the hookup to city sewer as it was the only means of making sewer available in that area at the time. He

said that similar instances had taken place in other areas of the city in past years due to the lack of funds for extending sewers.

Kehoe appeared before the last council meeting and asked for clarification of the city's responsibility in the matter. He said he had not received any word as yet concerning the city attorney's opinion.

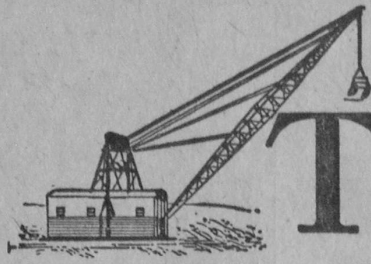
Mayor John N. Brugger said the matter had been turned over to the city attorney immediately after the last meeting and he had assumed the city attorney had contacted the property owner's attorney. The mayor said that the city had made arrangements to relieve the present property owner of the old \$225 hookup charge at the lot line for application to the new special assessment.

Ald. Robert N. Rollin expressed the opinion that the city attorney should be present at the meeting to present his opinion.

Vernon Eckstein, a property owner in that neighborhood, said that he and other property owners in that area were not allowed to hook up to the sewer line in question and he felt this was discrimination as precedence had been established by the original hookup.

Mayor Brugger said that, with the exception of Alderman Tanner, he and other members of the council were not in office when the private sewer line was constructed. He said he was in no position to judge if the alleged discrimination had taken place.

Kehoe said he paid the cost of cleaning out the sewer line and was of the opinion that the city should pay that expense. He said he was not at the meeting to stop the new sewer project, but was of the opinion that he should not be charged a special assessment as he had sewer service when he purchased his property.



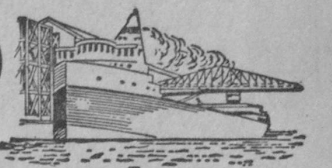

Officials of Tawas Area Promotions, Incorporated, termed the 19-75 Perchville USA Festival as one of the best programs ever held on Tawas Bay. Exceptionally large crowds of spectators were on hand each day and weather conditions were perfect for the week-end.

As it turned out, the festival had a real break from the weatherman. Late Sunday night the weather turned mild and freezing rain caused cancellation of school on Monday.

Friday night's fish fries had excellent turnouts with 250 persons attending stag night at Tawas Golf and Country Club and 175 attending doe night at Lixey's Restaurant.

Attendance at Saturday night's annual Perchville banquet numbered 125 persons and was below the number anticipated. Master of ceremonies for the program was Robert Heinritz, president of TAPS. Edward Sterling, festival chairman, introduced members of his committee.

Highlight of the program was a slide show by Joe Clark, 1975 mayor of Perchville. Clark, whose picture series in Life Magazine 25 years ago kicked off national publicity for Perchville, is a noted Detroit freelance photographer and he used some of his pictures which have won national awards to illustrate his humorous program. He was accompanied here by his wife, Bernice.

Clark was on the ice Saturday snapping pictures of the Perchville program. The swimming pool cut into the ice of Tawas Bay for local polar bears was at the approximate location where Clark snapped his famous underwater fish eye view in 1950. He has been assigned to prepare a series of pictures on seven states which will be incorporated into a book to be published during the national bicentennial observance.

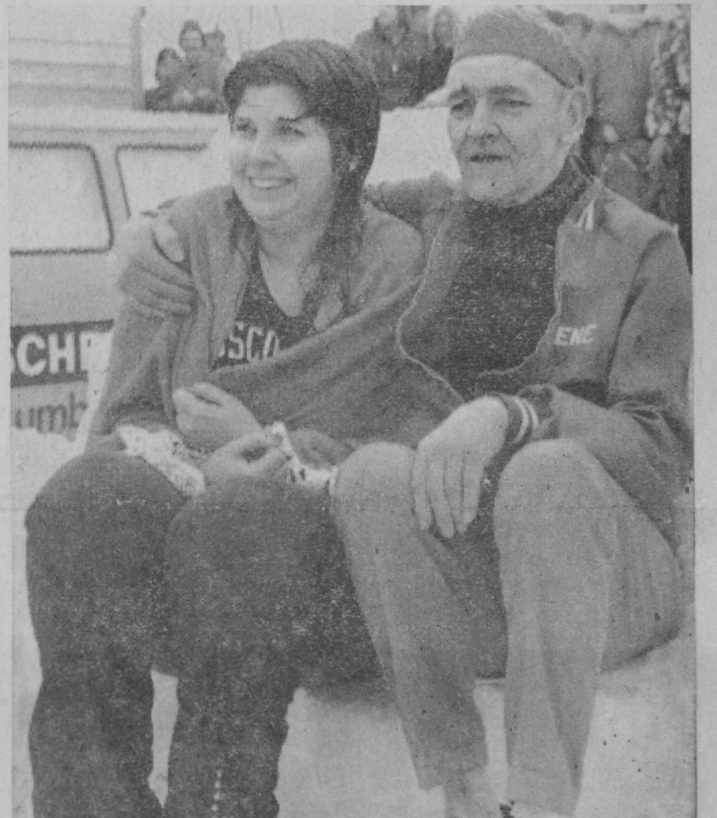
Always one of the top crowd pleasers during the Perchville Festival, performances by the polar bears brought a record number of 34 swimmers on Saturday and 15 swimmers on Sunday. Five of the swimmers participated each day.

Crowned polar bear king was Eugene Fletcher, 57, National City, and Miss Loretta Churchill, 16, East Tawas, was crowned polar bear queen. Fletcher also made swimming appearances this year at Houghton Lake's Tipup Town Festival and the Sand Lake Winter Festival. This was the second year that Miss Churchill has participated in winter swimming at Perchville.

Nearly 60 cars were entered in demolition derbies held Saturday and Sunday. Both programs drew exceptionally large crowds of spectators at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

Officials of TAPS reported that 3,200 festival buttons were sold and operators of concessions reported excellent business during the two days.

Iosco Sheriff's Department and its auxiliary provided excellent handling of parking during the two days.

## New Fire Contract to be Discussed at Future Meeting

A meeting is to be scheduled in the near future between officials of Tawas City, Alabaster and Tawas Townships to discuss a proposed new fire protection agreement under which the city furnishes fire protection to the townships.

The city has furnished fire protection to the townships for a number of years and City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the two townships had been billed at a new rate of three-quarters of a mill multiplied by total property assessments in each township.

Bublitz said this would be the rate of payment to be proposed under the new contract and had been given tentative approval two years ago by the Tawas Township Board. Alabaster Township did not take action two years ago on the proposal due to the lack of funds, but voters approved the special fire protection millage in the November general election.

Ald. Robert N. Rollin suggested at Monday night's council meeting that a complete study be made of upgrading fire department equipment and training of volunteer firemen as a means of improving fire insurance rates. A similar program has already been undertaken at East Tawas. The city manager is to check with the city's insurance carrier to determine equipment needs and training in order to obtain improved insurance rates in the community.

A new member of the tax board of review is to be appointed at the next meeting. A vacancy on the board was created by the resignation of Donald Watson.

The council set dates of March 10, 11, 12, 17, 18 and 19 for meetings of the tax board of review.

Second reading of an ordinance to grant a 30-year franchise to Consumers Power Company for operation of an electrical business in the city was held. There were no protests filed at the meeting concerning the franchise and a special election is to be held at a future date.

The city manager reported that a conditional or emergency permit had been granted by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for the city to remove a sand bar from the mouth of the Tawas River. The city is to apply to the Army Corps of Engineers for a similar permit.

Building applications approved during the past two weeks included: Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, remodel general offices, \$5,000; Acapulco Beach Cabins, 1003 Lake Street, construct storage shed, \$1,000.

A request for an allocation to the Tawas Knothole League was tabled until the next meeting.

Payment of \$997.74 as the city's share of operation of Tawas Hospital ambulance service was approved by the council.

## OK Engineering for Tawas Lake Sewer

Authorization was given Monday night by the East Tawas Council to prepare engineering for future construction of sanitary sewers to the Tawas Lake area.

Cost of the engineering has been estimated at between \$15,000 and \$20,000 and a council resolution directed Spicer Engineering Company to prepare the plans.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, said that the city's application for a low-interest FHA loan had been sidetracked last fall due to the lack of funds. He told the council Monday night that it appeared that new FHA loan money would again be available in August. A new application for a loan is to be submitted by the council.

Ropert said that financing the project, the last estimate of which was \$940,000, could possibly be accomplished through an FHA loan or the city could go through the Iosco County Department of Public Works on a bond proposal. Extension of sanitary sewer service to the Tawas Lake area has been a goal of the city council for many years.

In other business Monday night, City Clerk Clyde Soper reported that the Mio office of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources

had been notified that a recent storm had damaged the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. A 30-foot supporting timber apparently gave way and the decking has sagged.

A permit was granted to Marlin Eaton for demolition of the former Gazette office on East State Street.

The city council notified Baldwin Township that East Tawas is interested in the possibility of reopening Schill Road, which was closed a number of years ago to facilitate expansion of the old Iosco County airport. The airport was later moved to its present location, but the road was officially closed and a new subdivision was developed in that area.

City and township officials have expressed the view that the road should now be reopened as an alternate access route to Tawas Lake.

Third reading of the city's new ordinance prohibiting snowmachines from operating on city streets is to be held at the council's next meeting. The ordinance was adopted by the council after receipt of an attorney general's opinion relative to a state law prohibiting snowmachine operation on city streets and parking lots.

## City Applies for County Bonding

Tawas City made application Thursday to the Iosco County Department of Public Works to have the county handle bonding arrangements for construction of water mains.

The proposed \$75,000 bond issue would finance cost of constructing loops in the city water system to improve distribution.

The city would handle sale of the bonds and would be repaid by the city over a period of 15 years through water revenue.

The city had been awaiting word on a low-interest FHA loan to finance this project but, after a year of delay, the council two weeks ago directed that an application for bonding be made to the county DPW. It is expected that selling bonds on the open market, to be repaid over a period of 15 years

rather than 40 years under FHA, will result in a considerable savings in interest.

Appearing before Thursday's meeting were City Atty, Kenneth Myles and Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

The proposed project would fund construction of a new water main on North Street from Eighth Avenue to Harris Avenue and on Harris Avenue from Eighth Avenue to 10th Avenue. The loop provided under this plan would greatly increase the volume of water to serve the Iosco Medical Care Facility and Tawas Area School.

A second loop system would be constructed south of the US-23 bridge to improve water distribution in that area.

## Councils Take Appraisal Proposals Under Advisement

A proposal of \$12 per land description for a complete reappraisal of property for tax purposes in Tawas City and East Tawas was made Monday night by GEM Surveys of St. Clair.

With an estimated 1,000 parcels, the cost to Tawas City would be \$12,000. Property descriptions in East Tawas total 1,774. City councils took the proposal under advisement and are to announce a decision in two weeks.

Two weeks ago, councils of the

two cities discussed the possibility of hiring a professional appraisal firm as a means of eliminating present inequities in property assessments. The St. Clair firm conducted a property appraisal for Iosco County eight years ago and was invited to submit proposals to the city councils.

Appearing before council meetings Monday night was Glen Mask of GEM Surveys, who said that his firm is certified by the state to train tax assessors. Included in the

proposal was a provision to train an assessing officer for each community at no cost to the cities. The two persons selected would work with the firm during the appraisal and would receive on-the-job experience in all phases of appraising.

Mask said that updating of the card system prepared by the firm eight years ago would result in a 25 percent saving to the cities as the firm's regular fee is \$16 per parcel.

Area Development Corporation reported to the DPW that local officials would be attending a pre-application hearing at Chicago, Illinois, in about three weeks with representatives of the federal Economic Development Administration.

This hearing concerns an application for federal assistance to aid in financing extension of existing water systems to serve the industrial park in Baldwin Township and the industrial park in Tawas City. In addition to water main construction, the project would include overhead storage facilities in Tawas City and Baldwin Township, plus underground water storage at Tawas City.

Representatives of EDA and the Upper Great Lakes Economic Development Administration met Wednesday with officials of the three units of local government and officials of the industrial development corporation.

It was stated that chances for approval of this application now appear to be excellent as Upper Great Lakes has indicated it will fund up to 20 percent of the project.

The next federal funding for EDA is due July 1.

# Tax Assessment Information Cloudy

A clear picture of 1975 tax assessments in Isoco County probably will not be available until after meetings of boards of review in March, but property owners interested in learning tentative assessments should attend those meetings.

Local units of government this week began announcing dates and times for meetings of boards of review through public notices printed in this newspaper. Following initial meetings the first week in March, property owners have the opportunity to review assessments starting the second week in March.

Failure to make a complaint at the board of review concerning an assessment would result in the loss of the right to appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal. The only problem confronting taxpayers will be the fact that assessments shown at the board of review meeting may not be the final ones.

Property assessments in Isoco County are currently in a state of flux, which is not unusual when last year's confusing situation is considered. Following meetings of boards of review in 1974, the state tax commission added a factor increasing assessments on all residential property by an average of 15 percent in Isoco County.

That increase, which varied from a low of two percent in one unit to a high of 29 percent in another unit, resulted from an assessment study conducted by the tax commission. The state tax commission recommended the "penalties" after conducting a sales study of Isoco residential properties, the results of which disagreed with findings of the county tax equalization department.

The main problem last year, however, was that the factors on assessments were added after boards of review had met and some taxpayers did not realize the full impact of the increase until receipt of property tax statements in December.

What will happen in 1975 is anybody's guess at this point. In January, the county board of commissioners accepted a starting real estate valuation base of \$148,194, 896—identical to the state equalized total of 1974—on recommendation of Robin Allain, tax equalization director.

Despite the fact that the starting base total is expected to run into trouble with the state tax commission, Allain is of the opinion that land sales which have skyrocketed

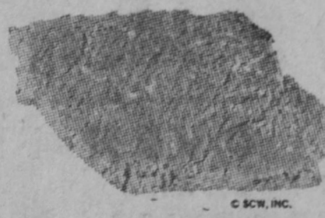

## John Pelto is Iosco County's New Coordinator for Federal CETA Funds

John Pelto is the new CETA coordinator for Iosco County. He was selected by the county board of commissioners from a list of seven applicants and assumed the position last Wednesday.

Primary function of this new administrator will be to coordinate federal funds allocated by the county to local communities under Title Six of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

Last month, the county was allocated \$114,175 in federal funds to help get the unemployed back to work. The money is to be used to fund public service jobs here for six months.

It will be the new coordinator's responsibility to determine if the federal funds are being expended as allocated and to create and fill new jobs where it appears the money will not be expended prior to the June 30 termination date.

Pelto said Thursday that there are 48 job openings pending with local units and he had not determined as yet if those openings had been filled. He said that enough applications had been received to fill an additional 36 public service jobs.

The new director said that he was to contact state officials to make application for an additional \$87,408 to finance the possible hiring of additional persons.

Although Pelto's office is located in the county building, he said that applications for job openings must be filed with the local office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission. The office is located in a trailer near the Social Services building on First Street in Tawas City.

A resident of Alabaster Town-

ship since August of last year, Pelto had been a student at the University of Arizona and majored in sociology before coming to Iosco County.

A native of the Mt. Clemens area, he attended high school at Armada. Prior to attending college, he was employed by Western Electric at Plymouth as a tele-

phone switching systems installer. He and his wife, Bonnie, are parents of two children, Michael, 11 years of age, and Christine, 10 years of age.

Look It Over!

How a steer moves may determine what cut of beef you buy.

Bones indicate where the retail cut was on the carcass and are a clue to a cut's tenderness.

Bone Shape

In most cases, a cut of meat with a round bone is from a moving limb.

cuts—see drawing.) Meat with flat, T-shaped bones are the more tender cuts and may be cooked with dry heat.

Lean, Fat, Bone

"Besides the location, look at the lean, the fat and the bone," suggests Dr. Reynolds.

Next look at the fat. Fat along the outside of the meat should be trimmed to 1/4 to 1/2 inch to reduce waste.

"However, marbling is not as essential for tenderness as once thought," he says. Now check the bone.
