are 48 job openings pending with local units and he had not determined as yet if those openings had been filled. He said that enough applications had been received to fill an additional 36 public service jobs







Look It Over!

How a steer moves may determine what cut of beef you buy. The more an animal exercises a muscle, the less tender it will be.

"Bones indicate where the retail cut was on the carcass and are a chue to a cut's tendersays A. E. Reynolds, Michigan State University Extension meat specialist. "The supporting muscles along the backbone of the beef are generally more tender than those in the shoulders, legs, breasts and flanks."

Bone Shape

In most cases, a cut of meat with a round bone is from a moving limb. Since limbs are exercised a lot, those cuts are usually less tender and should be cooked with moist heat. (But remember, a round-boned sirloin is one of the most tender

Aging, Cubing, Tenderness

Other factors affecting tenderness are aging, cubing and added tenderizer. If beef is aged (held 10 to 14 days before processing) it's more tender and has an aged flavor. Most beef today is not aged. If desired, ask your butcher if he has aged meat. Less tender cuts of beef.






