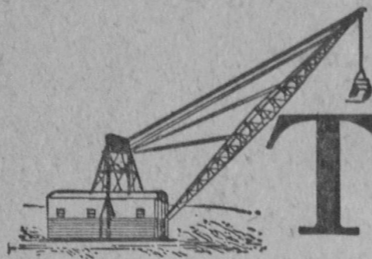


## McIntosh Resigns at Ogemaw Heights

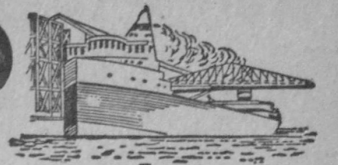

## Fire Demolished Roadhouse Bar Friday South of Tawas City

Fire early Friday morning completely demolished the Roadhouse Bar, located south of Tawas City on US-23. Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Robert O'Dette, owner, estimated the loss between \$150,000 and \$175,000. Fire Chief Daniel Ulrich of the Tawas City Fire Department reported that the ceiling had collapsed and the entire building was engulfed in flames when fire trucks arrived at the scene. Neighbors in the vicinity of the bar were alerted to the fire short-

ly before 3:00 a. m. when an unknown motorist stopped his car in the middle of US-23 and began to honk his horn. The wife of the bar owner told investigating officers that she and her husband closed the bar at 2:30 a. m. and went to their nearby residence. After hearing blasts from the car horn on US-23, she looked out of the window and saw flames coming from the roof of the adjacent building. Darryl Leslie, who lives in the vicinity of the business, was the

first volunteer fireman on the scene. He told investigating officers that flames had been through the roof on the south side of the building by the time he arrived. Herbert Blust, assistant fire chief, told officers he attempted to enter the building by way of the rear door but flames pouring down from the ceiling prevented any entry. He said that the fire appeared to be concentrated above the ceiling at the south end of the building.

Neighbors were reported to have heard an explosion in the building prior to the arrival of the fire department. The 50 by 60-foot concrete block building was constructed in 1946 following a fire on March 15 of that year which completely destroyed Carl's Inn. The business was later owned and operated for a number of years by Edward Davison Sr. The fire marshal's office of the Michigan State Police investigated the blaze later Friday morning.

## Tawas Area Seeks to Restore Accreditation With U of M

Tawas Area School, which lost its accreditation from the University of Michigan in 1972, is to request a study by professionals from that institution to determine if this school now qualifies for accreditation and, if not, what can be done to meet standards.

Because of overcrowded facilities, a sub-standard library for a school of its size and other factors, the school received probationary approval from the U of M for several years and finally lost accreditation in 1972 following defeat of a proposal to build a new library. The board of education later authorized construction of a library under a state law which empowers boards of education to bond for up to five percent of the school district's valuation without a vote of the people, but then dropped that method of financing when it authorized development of a new school master plan.

Following that study, voters defeated a \$5,365,000 proposal in May 1973 to construct a new high school.

As a means of relieving overcrowded classroom conditions, the board of education adopted a split session arrangement in the fall of 1973.

The split session school had been recommended by evaluators from the University of Michigan as an alternative to building classrooms and to improve the school curriculum.

Supt. Edward J. Barry was of the opinion Monday night that the school should seek reinstatement on the accreditation list because of curriculum improvements during the past two years.

He said that service of the accreditation staff was free of charge and it would be well to have a professional agency to make a survey here, rather than to have the local administration or board of education conduct its own study. He said, too, that there may have been changes in accreditation requirements since 1972.

Barry said that two schools, Pinconning and Standish-Sterling Central, presently operate split shifts and have received probationary accreditation.

In other business, the board of education adopted its new code for sports participation which outlines scholastic eligibility rules adopted last year, a citizenship code for participants, attendance and training.

The only change in wording is in the training code which specifies that an athlete is not to use tobacco in any form, prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages and use of illegal drugs is prohibited.

Positive proof of a violation of the above three provisions, conviction for a felony or if an athlete is placed on probation by a court of law will result in the athlete's being immediately suspended from sports for a period of six weeks. Reinstatement would follow if the athlete conforms to the training code during his suspension. A second offense would result in a period of suspension from athletics for a period of not less than one year.

If suspended within six weeks of the end of the school year, the athlete may be allowed to begin playing the following year, pending permission of the athletic director, principal and the coach of both teams involved.

Twelve airmen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base who have completed high school graduation requirements in the program being conducted on base by Tawas Area School are to participate in graduation ceremonies February 7 at the NCO Club. Five airmen graduated in the previous program conducted by this school district's adult education program.

A \$561.40 bid from Sears for 133 feet of fencing and installation was approved by the board of education. The fence is to be installed

at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

The board of education authorized the administration to obtain burglary insurance for the three school buildings. Recently, a

number of typewriters were stolen from the high school which were valued at \$2,800 and the loss was not covered by insurance.

A report from Robert H. Crawford, transportation director, indicated that 15 school buses had received minor citation stickers when inspected last week by Michigan State Police. He said that the violations were being corrected for a second inspection next week.

## Hill Billy Snap Shooter to Return for 25th Anniversary of Perchville

Joe Clark, HBSS, noted Detroit freelance photographer who "put Perchville on the map" 25 years ago with a picture series in Life Magazine, is to attend the silver anniversary Perchville USA Festival on February 14-16.

Clark (the initials HBSS stand for Hill Billy Snap Shooter), spent several days on the ice of Tawas Bay in December of 1949 and January of 1950 taking pictures of Perchville, the then new village of ice fishing shanties.

One of his pictures, a fish eye view taken from the bottom of the bay and looking up through a hole in the ice, was a pioneering effort in underwater photography. The picture, which showed a perch biting a minnow on the end of a line, proved to be an instant hit with Life editors, who devoted a full page to the view.

Outlined against the hole in the ice in that picture were Shirley (Nunn) Parkinson and Mrs. Edith Nunn, daughter and wife of the present executive director of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, W. D. Nunn.

Nunn said Tuesday that Clark and his wife had accepted an invitation to attend this year's

anniversary event. Others participating in that first Perchville program are being issued a special

invitation to attend this year's program. Harold Gould, retired East Tawas businessman, who originated

the idea for the fishing village, is in Florida and it is not known if he will be able to return for this year's anniversary event.

## Two Iosco Court Suits Ask Damages of Over One-Million

Two damage suits totaling more than one-million dollars have been filed in Iosco County Circuit Court.

Esther Miller of Arenac County seeks damages of \$200,000 against each of four defendants, the Village Inn in Tawas City, Chum's Bar at East Tawas, Beaver Tavern at Alger and William Lutzke Jr. of Arenac County.

On February 26, 1974, Lutzke shot and killed George Miller Jr., husband of the plaintiff. Mrs. Miller's petition claims that the shoot-

ing death of her husband was the result of Lutzke having been intoxicated through unlawful sales of intoxicating beverages purchased from the defendant tavern owners.

Cynthia (Sprague) Hubbs, Har-lage Inn and Floyd Sprague of Iosco County have commenced a \$600,000 damage suit against Larry B. Tucker and James H. Bratton of Oakland County.

On May 9, 1972, Cynthia Hubbs, then 15 years of age, was a passenger on a motorcycle operated by

Tucker and owned by Bratton. The motorcycle crashed on Plank Road, Grant Township, resulting in serious injuries to the passenger. The operator is charged with gross negligence for allegedly operating the motorcycle at a speed in excess of 80 miles per hour.

Mr. and Mrs. Hubbs seek damages of \$500,000 while Sprague, father of the victim who paid the cost of hospitalization, seeks damages of \$100,000.

## Social Security Lists Answers to Questions

Question: I plan to apply for supplemental security income payments. What kinds of papers will I need to take to the social security office?

Answer: It will save time if you take along materials which show your income and value of property and other resources, such as your checkbooks, savings account books, stocks and bonds, life insurance policies, auto registration cards, latest real estate tax statements, last year's income tax returns and W-2 forms, evidence of all other income and your social security card.

Question: I thought the annual wage reports on my farm employees were due by January 31, but my neighbor said the due date is February 10. Which is the correct date?

Answer: The 1974 wage report and social security contributions for your farm workers should be sent to the Internal Revenue Service by January 31. However, if you deposited your employees' social security contributions in a bank or other approved depository in 1974, you have until February 10 to send in your report.

Question: My mother canceled her medicare medical insurance two years ago, but would now like to have this protection. Can she re-enroll?

Answer: If she has canceled her medicare medical insurance only once, your mother can sign up for the protection during the first three months of any year.

Question: Back in October, I hired a maid. I pay her \$10 a

week. Do I have to report her wages for social security purposes?

Answer: Yes. People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three-month calendar quarter must send a report of wages, along with the social security contributions, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter. Wage reports for the last quarter of 1974 are due by January 31.

## Dress Properly for Winter Sports

Do you dress to really enjoy winter sports?

"Wear clothes that keep you warm and dry and allow free movement without excess strain on the garment," recommends Joanne Thurber, Michigan State University Extension clothing specialist, East Lansing.

Buy either ready-to-wear sports clothes or save 30-50 percent by sewing at home. Regardless of whether clothes are bought or made, the right fabric is important.

"You will want the fabric to be water repellent, strong, lightweight and fast drying," says Miss Thurber.

Nylon is the most commonly used fabric for snow fashions. Urethane-coated nylon is waterproof, nonporous and does not allow air to pass through (perfect for the outer fabric). However, this fabric would not be suitable for parka linings. Instead, use lightweight, uncoated nylon for linings and windbreakers.

Filling, sewn between the outer fabric and lining, provides even warmth in insulated snow wear. Dead air trapped inside the two layers provides insulation. There are two popular types of filling: Polyester fiber fill and down. Fluffy filaments from the undercoating of water fowl. Polyester fiber fills are generally less expensive and easier to care for than down.

Knit fabrics with double layer construction of knit nylon and light fleece interior provide warmth and comfort. Stretch fabrics made

from a blend of 85 percent wool and 15 percent spandex are ideal for ski pants. The fabric should contain at least 50 percent wool for pants to retain warmth.

Other fabrics used for snow fashions include sail cloth, kettle cloth, denim seersucker, chino and dacron and cotton blend combined with polyester quilt batting and wind-breaking nylon.

There are a number of styles and garment features available in snow clothes.

Miss Thurber suggests "Before purchasing, for example, look at several jackets and compare style features. Some have zippered pockets, others touch seal pockets. Do you want an attached or a concealed hood?"

Whether plans are made to sew at home or buy ready-to-wear sports clothes, select water-repellent fabric, choose styles that give freedom to move and read labels for care instructions.

## ESY Committee Visited Two Schools Tuesday

Fourteen committeemen and administrators yesterday (Tuesday) visited two Michigan school districts using the extended school year program to determine if ESY would be practical for Tawas Area School District.

The visits, authorized by the board of education, were to Northville and Cadillac. The committee is to report its findings and make recommendations to the board of education, possibly within the next two months.

The controversial ESY program was first studied here about three years ago when two educators from a Vermont school made presentations to the board of education and community. Investigation of ESY at that time was being considered as an alternative to constructing additional classrooms to relieve overcrowded conditions.

Following considerable study, a citizens' committee studying all aspects of the school recommended that the board of education ask voters to authorize a bond issue to construct a new high school building.

The proposed construction was turned down by voters, however, and a second alternative was adopted by the board of education.

Two years ago, Tawas Area School adopted the split session day whereby high school students attend classes in the morning and grades six through eight, comprising a new middle school, attend classes in the afternoon.

Although there have been some objections to changing from the traditional school day, the split session met with immediate success as it relieved overcrowded classrooms in the high school and provided needed classrooms for improving the new middle school curriculum.

During recent discussions at board of education meetings concerning future classroom construction or, as an alternative, adoption of the extended school year, it was pointed out that additional classrooms would be required should the present split session arrangement be dropped.

Administrators pointed out that two entire schools are presently using the building on M-55 and regardless of extending the school year, additional rooms would be required under ESY.

One of the problems now being encountered by the split session arrangement is the rapid wear to the school building, because of the early starting time for high school grades and the late hour for middle school grades, as well as use of

facilities at night for adult education.

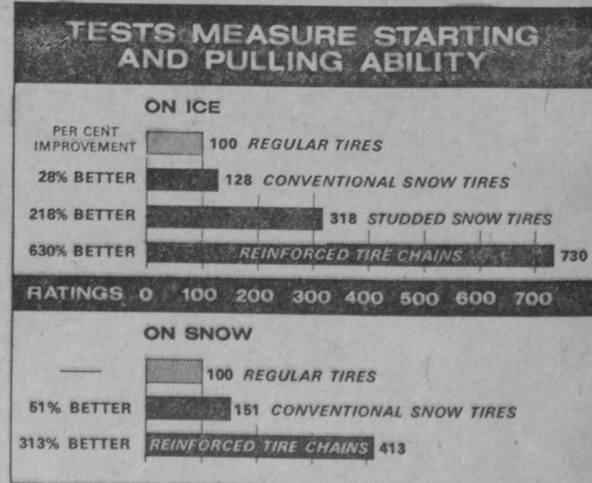
Supt. Edward J. Barry told board of education members Monday night that maintenance of doors, windows, restrooms, corridors, classrooms and equipment was becoming a serious problem. He stated, too, that transportation costs had risen 40 percent since changing from the traditional school day to the split session.

A list of questions was submitted Monday night to the board of education by representatives of the extended school year committee.

Information requested included: Population trends by age groups in

this school district; room requirements for the three different systems, traditional school day, split session and extended school year; an analysis of transportation costs for the three different methods; what effect the split session has had on curriculum offerings.

The committee also asked the actual expense involved for additional classrooms under the extended school year, capital outlay required for the extended school year and finances required for operation and if any state funds are available to assist with operation of an extended school year plan in this district.

# Loss to Falcons Ends Title Hope for Tawas Braves

After losing a pair of games two weeks ago to end its undefeated streak in the NBC, Tawas Area Braves split the decisions in two games played last week to end any remaining title hope for the 1974-75 season.

The Braves downed visiting Standish-Sterling, 78-70, on January 21, but then lost a 66-61 encounter Friday night at Ogemaw Heights.

The loss dropped Tawas to a six and three record, two games off the pace being set by Carrollton,

defending NBC champion, and Essexville Garber. The conference leaders are to meet at a showdown battle this Friday night.

Other NBC action saw Standish-Sterling winning over Oscoda, 74-59, while Garber defeated Gladwin, 65-52, and Carrollton swamped Pinconning, 75-38.

Tawas defeated Ogemaw Heights, 69-59, in the first meeting of the season, but the Falcons jumped off to a 16-11 lead in the first period and the Braves had to play catch up basketball the rest of the way.

The Braves closed to within one point early in the third quarter, but the Falcons pulled in front by six points and were on top by seven with three minutes left.

The Braves controlled the backboards all night, but Ogemaw Heights had the shooting edge from the floor with 27 of 66 for a .409 shooting percentage. The Braves meshed 28 of 72 shots for a .389 percentage.

Brad Potts, Jeff Hemphill and Mike Mooney had 12 points apiece for the Braves, but Jim Jennings scored 18 points and Paul Holmes meshed 17 for Ogemaw Heights.

The Braves are scheduled to host Oscoda on Friday night and then travel to Saginaw St. Stephen Saturday night.

# Schools Watch New Legislation

With an eye on current legislation at Lansing, Tawas Area Board of Education is to adopt a position concerning any new laws dealing with teacher strikes.

Supt. Edward J. Barry, who said that public hearings on proposed legislation are to be held next month, felt that present laws concerning contract bargaining and prohibiting strikes should not be changed. He said that 526 school districts of the state presently have contracts and only 18 districts are on strike.

Barry said the fact that Detroit schools were involved in strikes was the major reason for proposed new legislation. He said that the Detroit school problem had the greatest exposure in the state due to coverage by daily newspapers. He said if the situation was reversed to Grand Rapids or some

other city of Western Michigan, the situation would receive less publicity.

The superintendent said that schools cannot afford binding arbitration in every district of the state and expressed concern about the two major teacher organizations having more "political clout" in writing laws. He said that legislative committees studying new school laws are composed mainly of former teachers.

The superintendent said that every proposal coming out of legislative committees tends to eliminate the incentive for boards of education and teachers to bargain. He felt, too, that it was impossible for the Michigan Education Association to adopt one position which would meet the needs of teachers in all areas of the state.

Bryan J. Hubbs, East Tawas, reported Thursday that a .25 caliber automatic pistol had been stolen from the trunk of his car.

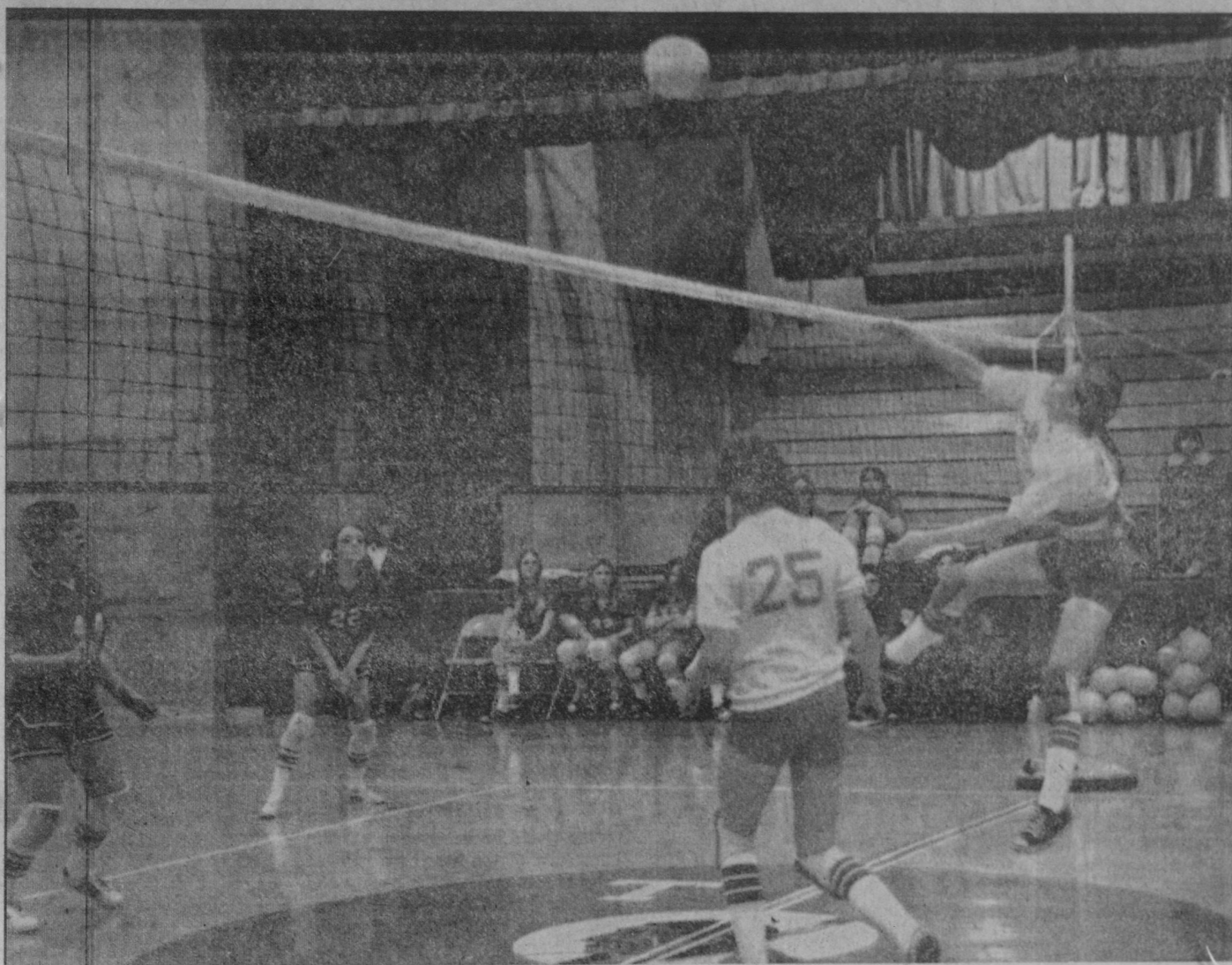

# Create 37 New Public Service Jobs With New Federal Funds

Thirty-seven new public jobs were created in Iosco last week following notification to the board of commissioners that this county had been allocated \$114,175 to help get the unemployed back to work.

The money, released under the Title Six program of the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA), is to be used to fund public service jobs in the county for six months.

Of the total allocation, \$6,000 has been specified for training and the balance of approximately \$108,000 goes to employ persons in public service jobs.

Release of the money came under a bill signed by the president, which is designed to pump an estimated 2.5-billion dollars back into the sagging national economy.

Michigan gets 60-million dollars under the program, which is to be expended by July 13. The program is similar to the Title Two CETA program under which Iosco was allocated \$91,372 last November.

Positions created under the new program include one utility worker each for Alabaster Township, AuSable Township, Grant Township, Oscoda Township, Sherman Township, Iosco Parks and Recreation Commission, Tawas Township, City of East Tawas and two utility workers for Burleigh Township; two senior citizen transportation drivers, Iosco County Senior Citizen Council; one senior citizen aide, Hale Senior Citizen Center; one office technician, Michigan Employment Security Commission office.

The funds would provide one apprentice property appraiser, East Tawas; one transportation secretary and two laundry matrons, Oscoda Area School; one vocational coordinator and one special education aide, Hale Area School; one permanent substitute teacher and a middle school librarian, Tawas Area School; an elementary physical education instructor and elementary art teacher, Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

District Health Department No. 2 would receive one family planning worker and a licensed practical nurse; AuSable Township would get a clerk typist; Iosco County Airport, one utility worker for three months; Iosco County Board of Commissioners, a federal program administrator; Iosco County Medical Care Facility, six nurses aide trainees.

Complete information on job openings and instructions for applications are printed on page 6 of this section.)

The board of commissioners' official notice stated that "hopefully, temporary employment under CETA will lead to permanent employment, but continued employment after July 13 is dependent upon availability of funds and opportunities for public employment within the county."

Priority will be given to applicants who have been unemployed for 30 days, veterans of the Korean or Vietnam conflicts and persons whose unemployment benefits have expired.

No relatives of officials of employing units or relatives of any full-time employees of the employing unit will be considered. Applicants must be residents of the county for 30 days.

## American House Retirement Village to Open at East Tawas

American House - Tawas Area, under construction for the past three years, is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy within the next two weeks.

A private retirement community located within the city limit of East Tawas near Tawas Lake, American House is unique in that it offers two different life styles for retired persons.

The lodge, which has four residential wings of 12 apartments each, offers hotel-like, full service living to 48 individuals; carriage houses are available to meet the needs and wants of couples or individuals seeking the privacy and comfort of their own home.

The colonial style complex, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rosenberg, is situated in a rustic wooded setting and in an area abounding with deer and other wildlife.

"American House is designed for retirees able to take care of themselves and in no way does it relate to a nursing home," said Mrs. Rosenberg. "We believe that couples or individuals who have realistically pondered their future in retirement will find exciting opportunities for dignified independence, new social relationships, personal security, long delayed pursuits, as well as ideal surroundings for the gathering of children and friends."

In black letters along the west wall of the lodge's dining room are these words: "Do not begrudge growing old—many are denied that privilege." Theme of American House is to offer a lifestyle to meet the varied and often complex needs of those couples or individuals who are in retirement and of moderate means.

Residency in American House is available on a month-to-month rental basis.

Central to the four apartment wings of the lodge is a service center, containing administrative offices, a large dining room capable of seating 200 persons with three meals served daily and the main lounge with a fireplace along one wall. Each apartment wing has its own family room with Franklin fireplace, as well as an old-fashioned veranda for summer use. The large dining area, which is to be open to limited use by community groups, is being decorated with historical prints.

Carriage houses located near the lodge are actually twin apartments, each with a large living room, a Franklin fireplace, a large bedroom, all-electric kitchen and adjoining dining area. Carriage house residents have the option of dining at the lodge and all utilities are furnished including electric heat.

Rosenberg said that all exterior and interior maintenance is to be performed by the staff, which is to number 36 persons. At the same time, snow removal, grounds care, window washing, painting and rubbish removal will be handled by the staff. Personal laundry service and all basic linens are to be furnished. Each carriage house apartment has its own patio and space for a garden plot.

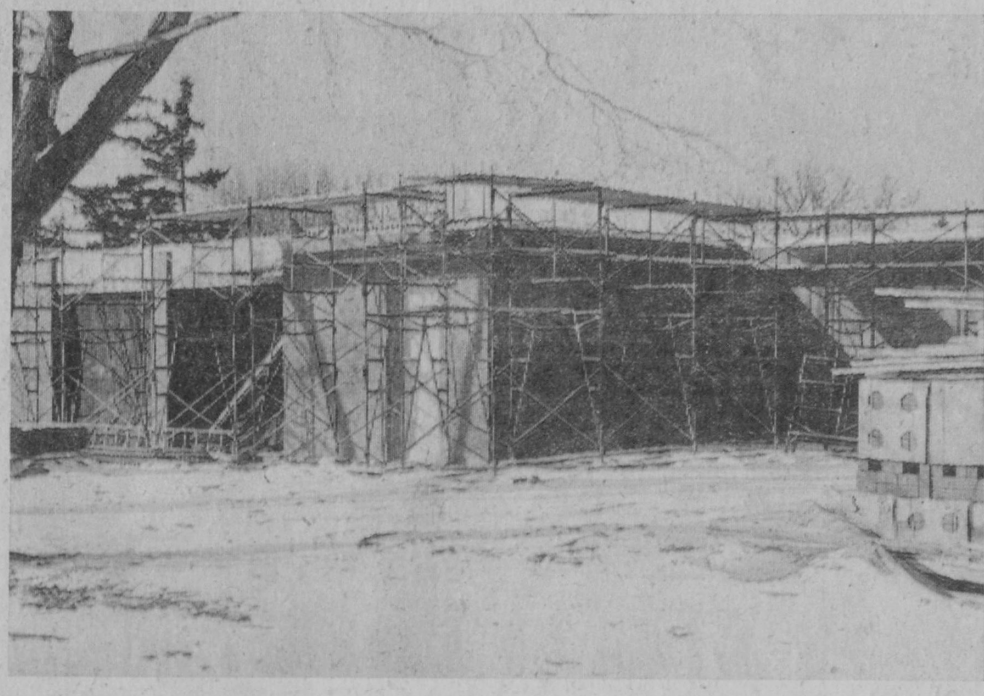
The 48 apartments in the lodge are equipped with beds, but residents are to provide their own furniture.

Other features of American House include houses for guests of residents, a three-acre fish pond to be used for ice skating during winter months and nature trails.

"American House will emphasize courtesy, service and comfort and will stay away from the stereotyped 'old folks home' approach," said Mrs. Rosenberg.

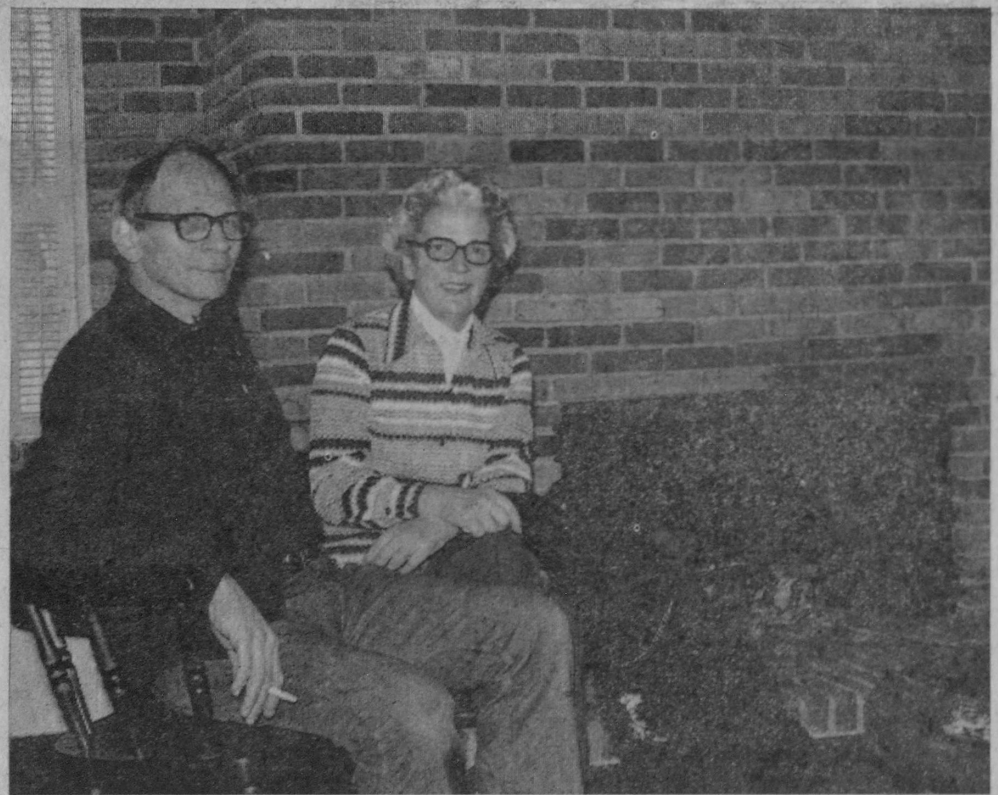

### Wage Reports Due January 31

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by Friday, January 31, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

"People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three-month calendar quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter," Carr said.

People who employ household workers can file the wage report on a form, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security)," available at any Internal Revenue Service office. The 1974 social security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 percent of covered wages. The employer pays a matching amount. "Some household employers may prefer to pay the full 11.7 percent social security contribution," Carr said.

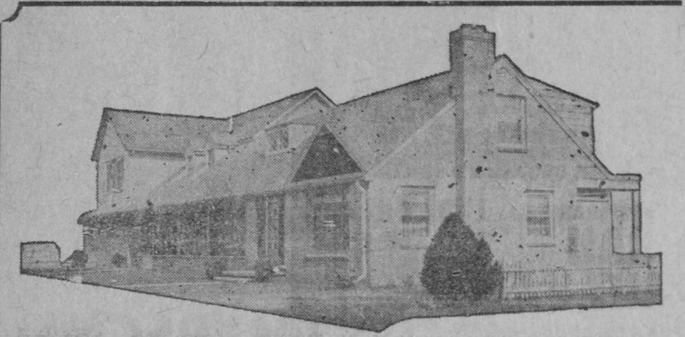

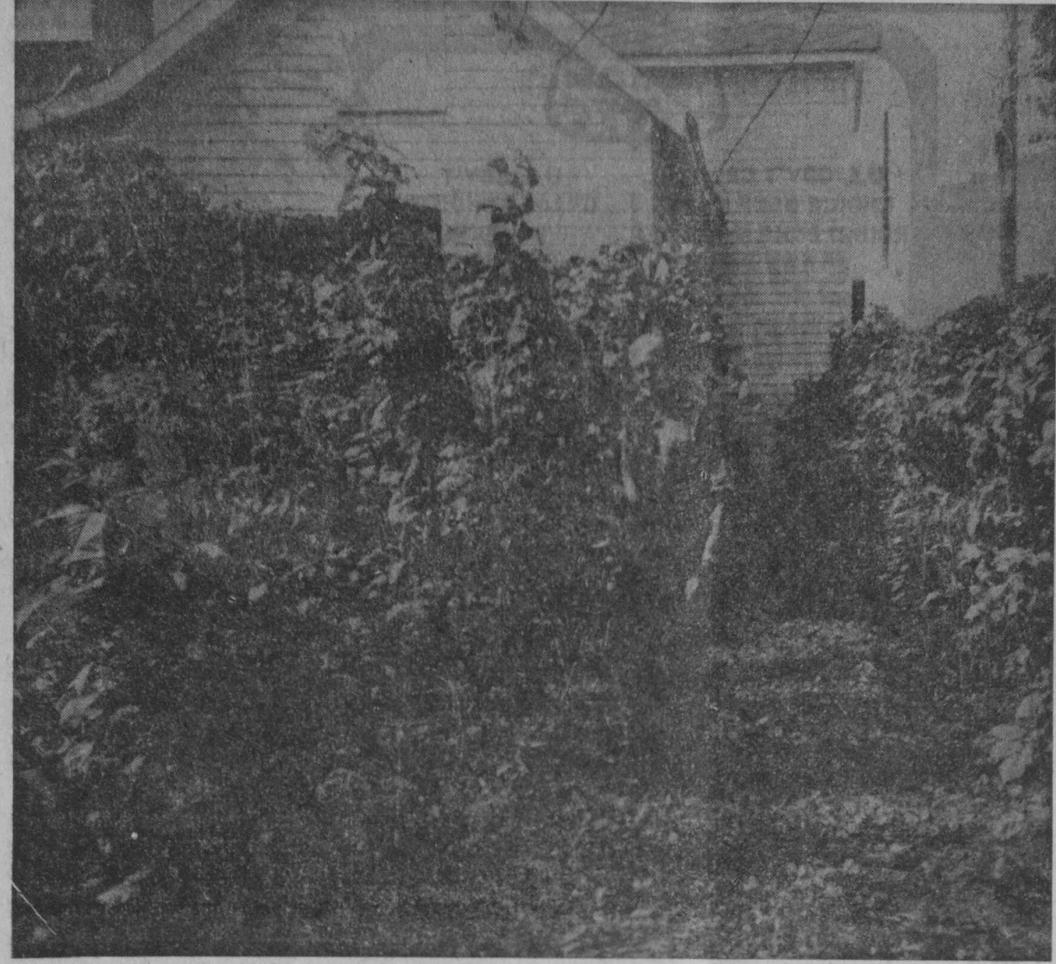

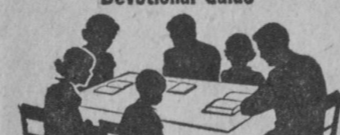

If not registered with MESC, individuals should register at MESC office, end of First Street, Tawas City (behind Medical Care Facility), from 8:15 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. Monday through Friday. Hiring is planned for sometime after February 1, 1975, upon approval of Iosco County's CETA program.
