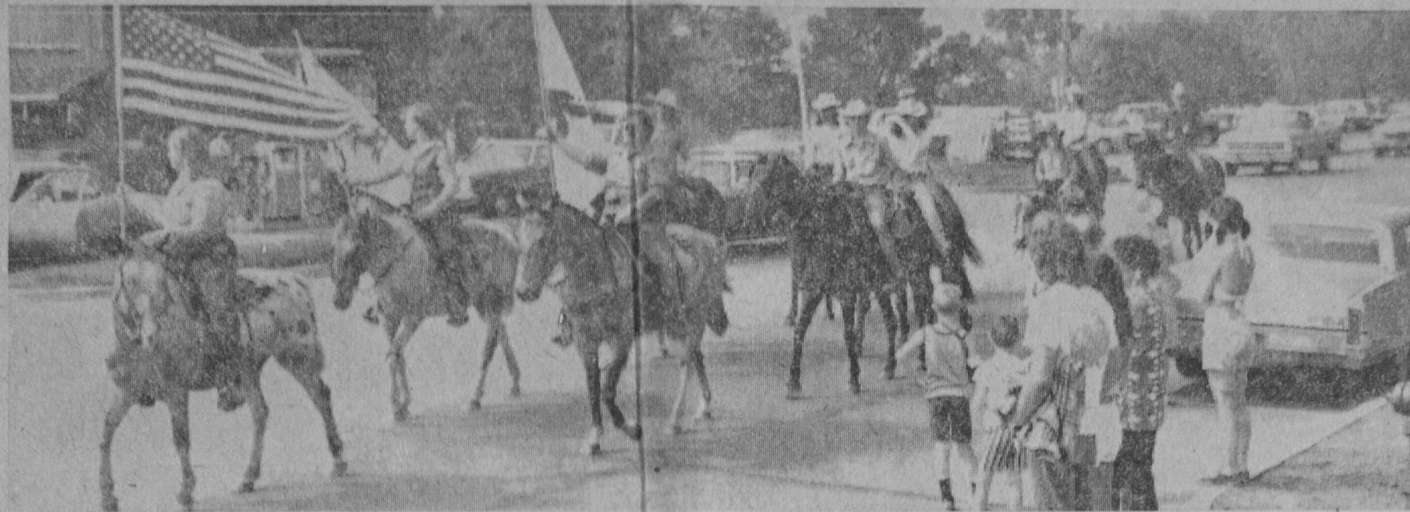




A TURTLE AND FROG RACE, parade and slow pitch softball tournament featured activities during the annual Michigan

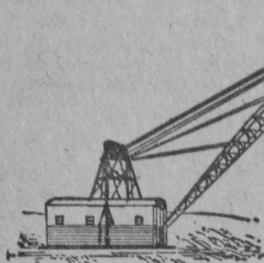

The one-lane bridge has a posted five-ton load limit and steel girders buckled Friday when a truck-



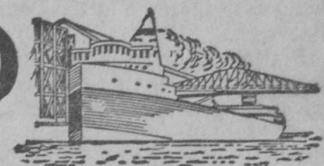

School Borrows Against Taxes

Authorization to proceed with making application to the state for selling \$675,000 worth of tax anticipation notes was given at a special meeting Monday morning of Tawas Area Board of Education.

This action followed a tabling motion only a week ago on a similar recommendation given by the school district's former superintendent, Edward J. Barry, whose contract expired June 30.

Barry warned a week ago that unless action was taken immediately on the four to six-week borrowing procedure with the municipal finance commission, employees of the school district could be faced with a payless payday on August 8.

Carl Babcock, board of education treasurer, said that the board had met Friday to again discuss selling the tax anticipation notes and found that Barry's information had been correct. Representa-

tives of Peoples State Bank and the school's Lansing attorney suggested that the application be made immediately to avoid a cash crisis.

One of the big stumbling blocks to school financing is the fact that the state legislature still has not adopted a membership aid bill. Under terms of the bill presently given the best chance of passage, Tawas Area School would receive \$14,500 in August. If a state aid bill is not adopted, the legislature would use last year's formula, which would mean that Tawas would receive about \$65,000 in August.

Basing school finances on the legislation currently being considered, Babcock said Monday that it appears the school would be short approximately \$8,500 on August 8 to meet its payroll of \$25,000.

According to the schedule arranged with the school's attorney, the school has applied to the municipal finance commission to open bids on August 6 for selling the tax anticipation notes. The bid would

be awarded that same night and notes would be prepared the following day for delivery on August 8.

Babcock said that if there are no delays in the timing—"and that is

a big if—a payless payday for employees would be avoided." Last year, the school borrowed \$500,000 on its anticipated taxes to operate the school until tax collection time in December.

East Tawas Garage Site Set for New Boat Launching Ramp

Adoption of a resolution Monday by the East Tawas Council cleared the way for development of a boat launching ramp and parking area on city property as part of a multi-million-dollar harbor of refuge project being planned by the state and federal governments.

At the request of the Michigan Waterways Commission, the council has made available city-owned property east of the Michigan State Police Post as the site for a new boat launching ramp and parking area.

This property was acquired a number of years ago by the city following a fire which destroyed buildings formerly housing Ander-

son Coach Company. One concrete block building remaining on the property had been used as a city maintenance garage and is to be removed.

Slightly less than one acre of land is comprised in the actual site but Wadsworth Street is located on the west side and extends to the bay shore. The street is 66 feet in width.

According to the council's resolution, the property is to remain in possession of the city. During construction of the harbor of refuge at the present Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, the area would be used as a storage area for materials.

The city presently is studying the possibility of constructing a new garage on city property near the Iosco County garage on West Westover Street. Another possibility being considered is to acquire the county garage, once that building is replaced by a new facility west of the Tawas on M-55.

It has been estimated that cost of construction of the new city garage would be in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

Keith Wilson, director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, has indicated that the state will spend approximately \$200,000 in developing the boat launching (See HARBOR, page 6.)

Tax Equalization Director Resigns

Robin D. Allain of Oscoda, who had served as Iosco County's tax equalization director since October 1, 1974, submitted his resignation Monday to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

In a letter to the commission, Allain listed personal matters as the reason for his resignation and it "would be impossible" for him to continue as equalization director.

Holder of a three level assessor's certificate with the Michigan Tax Commission, Allain succeeded William Weryley last year as equalization director. Prior to his employment with the county, Allain had been an officer of Landmark Title Company at Oscoda.

A native of St. Anne, Illinois, and a 20-year veteran of the air force, Allain had taken a leave of absence and is presently in Indiana.

Robert Foster, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, said the county was presently advertising for a successor to Allain. A three level certificate is required for the position.

Prior to going on vacation and a leave of absence, Allain was in the process of perfecting an appeal of a 10 percent increase in this county's valuation by the state tax commission. In addition, the tax equalization department is to defend the county in an appeal before the state tax tribunal by Plainfield Township.

Burleigh Appeals Iosco Allocation Board's Action

Iosco Allocation Board's decision to levy only .90 of a mill for townships has resulted in an appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal by the Township of Burleigh.

Martin Siegrist, Burleigh Township supervisor, notified D. Keith Papas, county clerk, that the appeal had been filed on June 17.

Burleigh Township is basing its appeal on the fact that it had shown a need in its budget for two mills and, under state law, is entitled to at least one mill of taxes.

Siegrist said Monday that the .10 of a mill raises \$440 in property taxes for the township. In addition, the lower millage rate would mean a reduction in federal revenue sharing of approximately \$1,150.

Officials of several townships appeared before the final meeting of

the allocation board in June to protest the preliminary allocation of less than one mill. The officials pointed out that they had adopted budgets based on the valuation equalized by the county and did not realize a 10 percent increase would be added to the county's equalized valuation by the state tax commission.

As a result of the higher valuation, a tax levy of one mill would have raised more money than township budgets required and Pros. Atty. Ronald Tyler ruled that the board could only allocate enough millage to meet budgets.

It is not known locally what effect a tax tribunal ruling in favor of Burleigh Township would have on the allocation received by other townships.

Fourth of July Program Features Fireworks at Park

Annual Fourth of July fireworks display Friday night and the first annual hobby and antique show Saturday will highlight holiday and week-end activities in the Tawas.

Gerald F. Reitler will have charge of the crew manning fireworks mortar tubes at the Tawas City Park. The program is under sponsorship of Tawas Area Promotions, Incorporated, along with the City of Tawas City and City of East Tawas.

The hobby and antique show is being sponsored by Tawas Bay Arts Council and is to be located at the multipurpose room of the East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Mrs. Herbert Blust, president of the arts council, said Monday that 30 entries had been received and more are expected on Saturday.

"It is difficult, at this point, to determine response of exhibitors until the day of the show," said Mrs. Blust. "Our arts and crafts festival started a few years ago with only 15 entries and look at how that event has grown each year."

Separate areas are to be provided for the display of antiques and hobbycraft items. The show is to be an exhibition and sale, with individuals, organizations and dealers invited to participate.

Application blanks are available

at Tawas Chamber of Commerce office, the Tawas Bay Arts Center and at stores selling hobbycraft supplies.

Depending upon interest shown by exhibitors, the show could expand outdoors to the playground of the elementary unit.

Mrs. Blust said that next year's show would be a part of the bicentennial observance.

Leonard Hoshbach, Tawas City postmaster, announced that the Tawas City post office will be closed all day the Fourth of July. There will be no rural delivery.

Expect Boat Owner Protest Over River Mouth Silting

Controversy over boating conditions at the Tawas River mouth is apparently going to come to a head at the July 7 meeting of the Tawas City Council.

Two letters to the editor of The Tawas Herald are published this week voicing concern over silting conditions at the river mouth and one letter urged boating enthusiasts to appear at the meeting.

The river mouth has long been a sore point with city officials who, over the years, have attempted to obtain federal or state assistance with harbor dredging.

Thirty years ago, the city applied to the army corps of engineers seeking establishment of a harbor of refuge at the river mouth, but federal support of the proposal was never received due to the lack of public property on both sides of the river mouth.

Dredging of the river mouth was handled for a number of years by Joseph Lubaway and the former Tawas Yacht Club, located on the east side of the river, and James M. Dickinson, former owner of property on the west side of the river mouth.

In later years, the City of Tawas City financed annual dredging of the river and on several occasions was assisted financially in the project through contributions of local businessmen.

Receding water level of Lake Huron last fall apparently added to the problem as silting has increased since then. The city applied for and received a dredging permit from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, but did not receive final approval from

Saginaw Girl Received Fatal Injuries in Collision

Maureen Ann Timm, 19, Saginaw, received fatal injuries in a two-car crash Saturday morning at the intersection of US-23 and M-55 in Tawas City.

Miss Timm was a passenger in a car driven by Rebecca Ann Schultz, 19, Saginaw, which was struck broadside by a car driven by Robert J. Eppert, 22, East Tawas.

Miss Schultz was treated for injuries at Tawas Hospital. Eppert and a passenger, Bruce Bischoff, 21, Baldwin Township, received minor cuts and bruises.

The Schultz vehicle was east-

bound on US-23 and was making a left turn onto M-55. The driver told investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department officers that she did not see the car approaching from the opposite direction.

Eppert told officers he was unable to avoid the collision when the Schultz car turned in front of his westbound vehicle. Both drivers said a traffic signal had changed to the amber position when their vehicles entered the intersection.

Investigating officers said that traffic on both US-23 and M-55 was extremely heavy at the time of the

accident, which was reported at 11:30 a. m.

Miss Timm's death was the third traffic fatality in this county during 1975 and the second traffic death within 13 days on US-23.

Charles C. Martin, 63, Tawas City, received fatal injuries June 16 in a collision at the Oak Street intersection with US-23, two blocks east of Saturday's crash scene.

Driver of a truck involved in that three-vehicle collision, Edwin McCain, 33, Mishawaka, Indiana, has been charged with negligent homicide and was to have appeared Tuesday in district court.

Two customers over the weekend brought their boats up, hoping to enjoy fishing and boating on the lake. After going out once and nearly getting stranded on the sand, they tied their boats up at our place and "complained" the rest of their stay here. And we cannot blame them!

Marty and I have a 25-foot boat. We paid \$60 for a boat license and filled it with gasoline—50 gallons at 62 cents per gallon. This past Sunday was beautiful boating weather, but we could not get out on the lake. Our "Sunday cruise" was as follows: We pulled out of our boat well, cruised 500 feet up the river to the Dutch Kitchen, turned around and pulled back into our boat well. At the rate we are going, our 50 gallons of gasoline will still be in the tank next summer.

The Fourth of July weekend is fast approaching—what is Tawas City going to do about the boating conditions? We strongly urge boaters and townspeople to go out in full force to the council meeting on Monday evening, July 7, at the Tawas City Hall. Voice your protests—Marty and I cannot do it alone!

Dear Editor:

I was appalled by the passage, in the house, of HB 5181 this past week. This is another step toward state control of local school districts. I am opposed to the bill for the following reasons:

1. It allows a three-week "Free Strike Period" for all teachers in Michigan.
2. The only economic penalty for both teachers and boards of education is for an additional two weeks.
3. This bill actually authorized up to five weeks, a strike by the teachers in our districts.
4. The factory worker does not have a three-week strike period where there is no loss of pay.
5. The idea of a court solving school problems is absolutely contrary to the philosophy of local control of our school districts.
6. This bill actually encourages strikes rather than discouraging them.

If we need a strike bill at all, it should include Representative Keith's amendments.

I would urge the local taxpayers to contact their senators and Governor Milliken to let them know you oppose HB 5181, in its present form and encourage the addition of the Keith amendments to the bill.

Finally, any legislation that is passed should not be passed with only the "Special Interest Groups" having all the input into this important legislation.

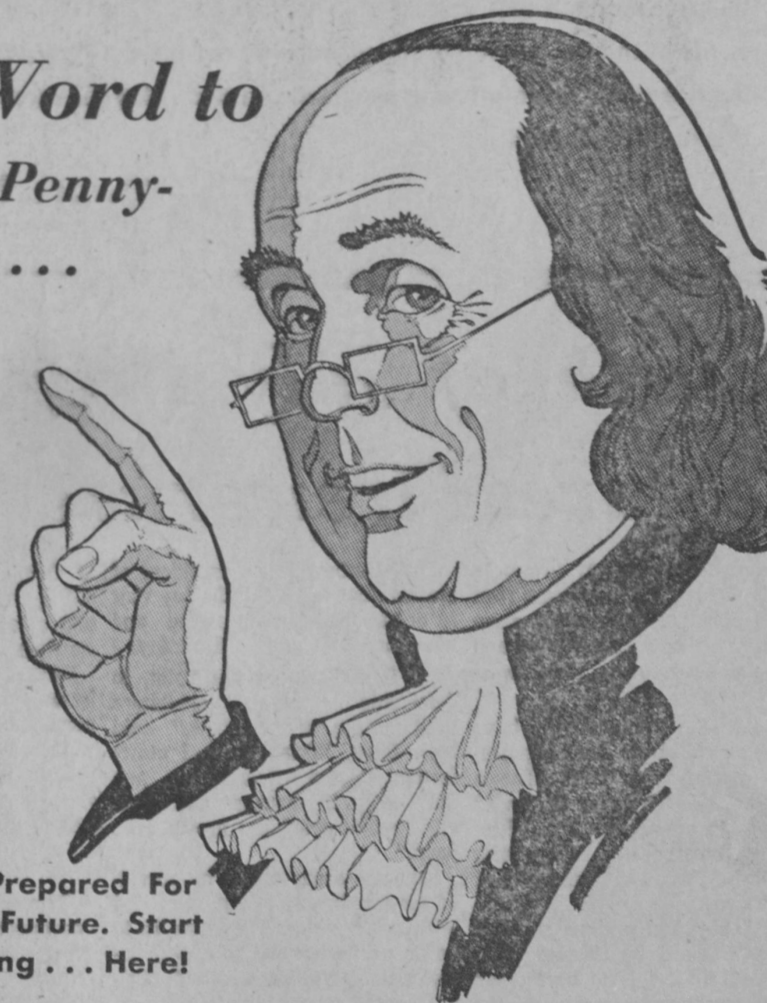

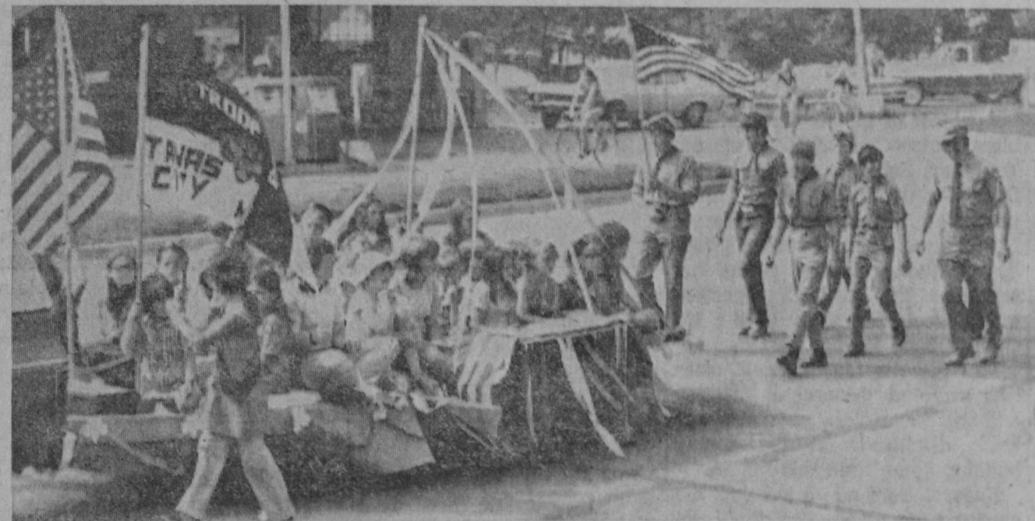

Seek Relief for Counties Losing Taxes on Land Sale

Legislative relief from Michigan's congressional delegation is being sought by Michigan Association of Counties for six Northern Michigan counties which would lose more than \$80,000 in local tax revenue should the sale of Consumers Power Company's 50,000 forested acres to the state and federal governments be completed.

Negotiations between the power company and United States Forest Service-Michigan Department of Natural Resources for the sale of 50,000 acres to the governmental units are near consummation. Each governmental unit would acquire about 25,000 acres, divided on the basis of present forest ownership.

The lands involved in the sale are located in Iosco, Oscoda, Alcona, Crawford, Kalkaska, Missaukee, Wexford and Manistee Counties. Consumers Power does not own federal forest acreage in either Kalkaska or Missaukee Counties, however.

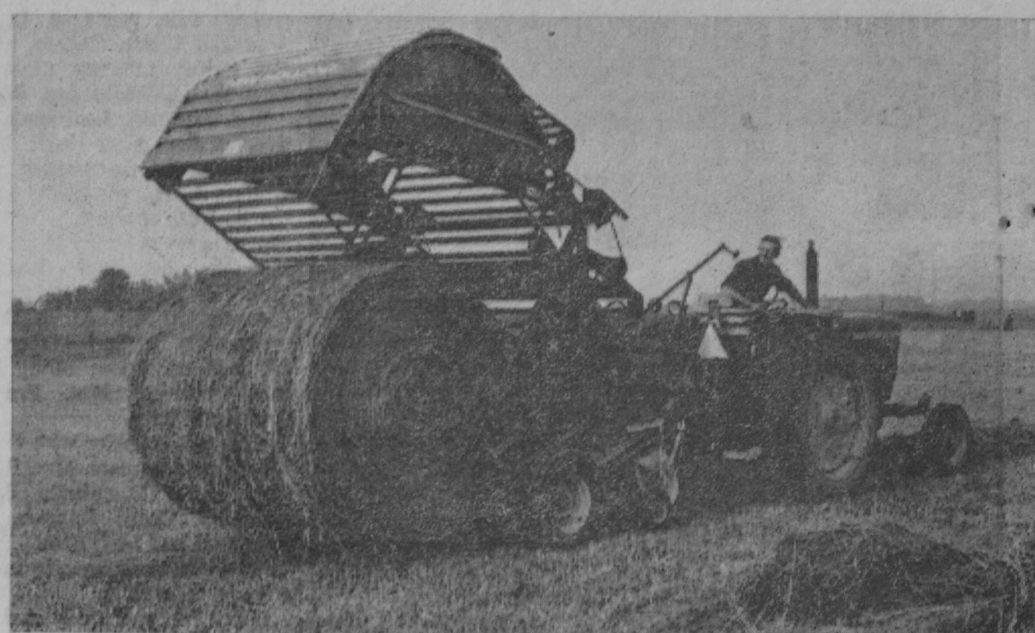
The revenue loss which will be suffered by the six counties stems from the difference in payments made in lieu of taxes by state and federal governments. The DNR will remit payments at the same rate as a private taxpayer. However, only income in lieu of taxes from the federal government will be approximately 10% cents an acre under the so called stump tax.

The payment formula is based on 25 percent of the returns for sale of stumpage. The 10%-cent rate for the 25,000 acres located within the national forests would return the counties about \$2,500, approximately \$80,000 short of the payments made by Consumers Power Company.

Michigan Association of Counties' executive director, A. Barry McGuire, pointed out in a telegram to Michigan congressmen this week that the six affected counties were in an almost impossible position to absorb the prospective loss of the tax revenue and asked for equitable relief based on state payment in lieu of taxes.

He added that relief legislation had been invoked in similar situations where the federal government took local lands off the local tax roll by purchase.

In Iosco County, Consumers Power Company paid \$3,000 in taxes on land owned in state forests and \$12,956 on its land situated in the national forest.

Iosco County Medical Care Facility, Tawas City, will undergo a 1.2-million-dollar expansion program, if the State of Michigan approves the project.

The long term care facility at 1201 Harris Avenue wants to add 70 patient beds, which would increase the total bed count to 134. In addition, the dietary, laundry, storage and nursing administrative areas would be expanded and the ventilation system would be improved to the laundry and dietary areas.

Besides expanding the facility, the changes that are proposed would contribute toward the facility's compliance with the nursing home standards of the medicare and medicaid programs.

The estimated cost of the project is \$1,250,000. It has a projected completion time of July 1977.

Because federal regulations require prior state approval of such capital cost projects, a request for approval has been filed with the Michigan Health Department, Division of Health Facility Planning and Construction.

the army corps of engineers until June 1.

The city authorized use of a sanducker owned by a local contractor to remove a sand bar blocking the river mouth, which had diverted the channel.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Monday that cost of the project to the city was \$1,500. He said, however, that dredging could never be considered to be a permanent project because of continued silting and the need for sheeting out to deep water.

Earlier this year, the city proposed to the Michigan Waterways Commission to purchase the Lubaway property on the east side of the river for a boat launching site and parking area. Two different proposals were submitted for harbor improvement but were not accepted.

The Army Corps of Engineers is currently conducting a survey of Michigan streams to determine those which are navigable according to law. A supreme court ruling has held that a navigable stream is one which floated logs during the lumbering days and the corps of engineers is seeking data to support its findings.

According to a report from the Detroit district office three months ago, the Tawas River was not considered as a navigable stream, but it was a logging stream during the lumbering days.

ramp and parking area. An additional expense might be involved in tying the launching area into the main harbor facility.

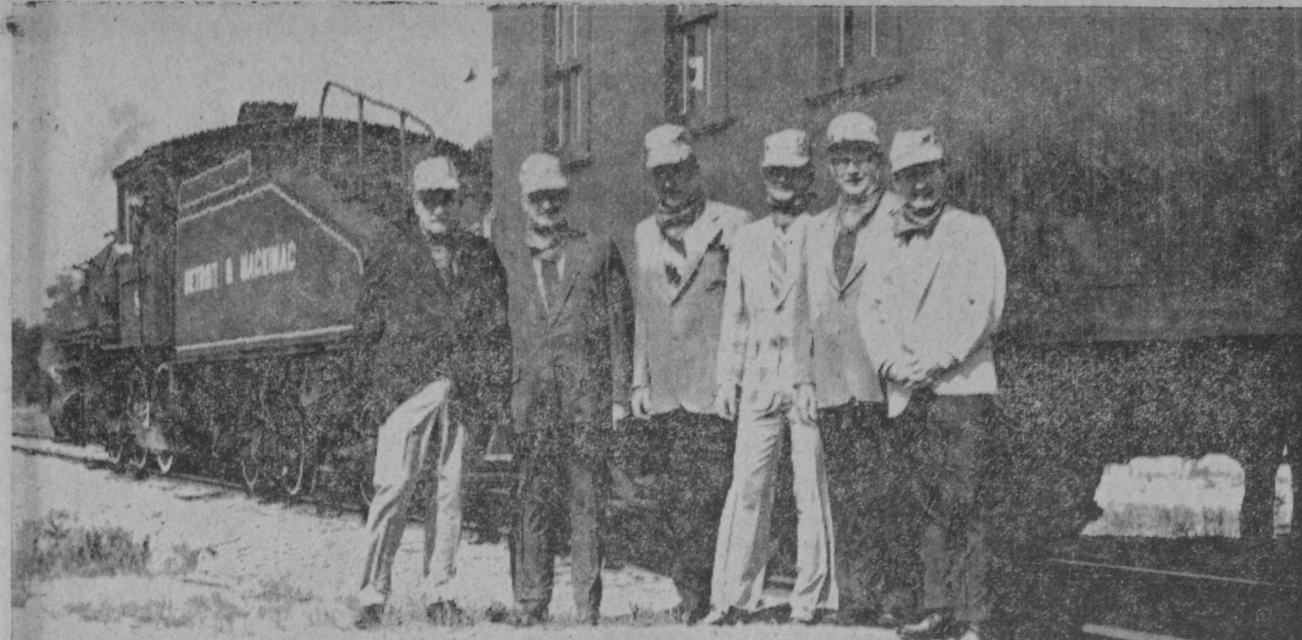
As its part in the development of a boat launching facility, the city is to make a 10 percent cash contribution amounting to \$20,000.

Elmer Werth, former mayor of East Tawas and long active on the city's harbor commission, told councilmen Monday that development of the harbor of refuge would provide one of the best boating facilities on the Great Lakes and he believed it would be a great boom to the area's economy. Werth suggested that the city earmark city park profits and parking meter money as the city's contribution to the boat ramp project.

A resolution recommending that the council accept the Michigan Waterways Commission's request for the site was signed by Werth, Harold Gould, Ralph White, Robert Marsh and Clifford Eppert, all members of the city's harbor committee.

It was announced last week that the United States House of Representatives had approved an allocation of \$50,000 for the purpose of obtaining bids and other preliminary work on the 2½-million-dollar harbor of refuge project, which is to be shared equally by the federal government and the state.

Work on the project, which will see a 500-foot extension on the present Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, plus a boat mooring arm toward the east, is expected to start in 1976. Development of a boat mooring area on the interior of the dock is to be handled by the waterways commission, along with construction of a 200-car parking lot at the foot of the dock and other onshore facilities.

Hale Area Volunteers Pitch In to Build New Tennis Courts

Nearly 75 Hale area residents pitched in Tuesday, June 24, to complete a community recreational project.

Under sponsorship of the Hale Lions Club, work was completed on pouring a 105 by 110-foot concrete slab for two tennis courts. The new facility is located north of the township hall.

Prior to the work bee, local contractors had donated use of bulldozers to level the land for the tennis courts and a parking lot.

"We had from 25 to 30 volunteer workers on hand from 7:15 a. m. until 6:30 p. m., demonstrating once again the outstanding cooperative attitude and community spirit of our residents," said Bruce Hewitt, township supervisor.

The work force was not limited to Lions Club members, according to William Wereley, Hale businessman and county commissioner. "We had people from all sections of the township working in wet concrete," he stated.

The crew of men worked all day spreading and smoothing 154 yards of concrete.

The spirit of the volunteers was best summed up by Homer Roberts, director of the YMCA Camp at Loon Lake north of Hale, who spent a hot day on the project. "You couldn't hire me to work all day in wet concrete, but a community project like this is something different," said Roberts, who was still nursing skinned knees the following day.

The women of the community did their bit by providing a pot-luck picnic supper under the trees at the township hall grounds after the project was completed.

The project was financed by a \$7,500 grant from the county parks and recreation commission's federal revenue sharing money. This project, along with tennis courts in the Tawas, Sand Lake, Whittemore and the Oscoda area, was authorized by the county board of commissioners in 1974.

It is expected that the Lions Club will raise additional money to pay for the costs of nets and paint.

Township residents, particularly the youngsters, will get multiple use from this new facility as it has been designed with curbing around the outside for use as a skating rink during the winter months.

Supervising the project were Alfred Baker and Dale Brumfield, local contractors, and Peter Holly, elementary school principal and president of the Hale Lions Club.

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: I just returned from a visit with my sister in Florida. While I was there, I had to go to a doctor. Should I send my medicare medical insurance claim to the carrier in Florida or to the carrier in my home state?

Answer: Medicare medical insurance claims should always be sent to the medicare carrier for the state in which you received

covered services. "Your Medicare Handbook" contains a list of all medicare carriers and their addresses. If you do not have a copy of the handbook, you can get one at any social security office.

Question: I am getting married this month. Should I change my name on my social security card?

Answer: You should call or write any social security office for

information on how to have your name changed on your social security record. This is especially important if you are employed. After you are married, your employer should report your earnings to social security under your married name.

Question: I started getting supplemental security income payments last year. Do I have to file an application for these payments every year?

Answer: No, but social security will review your case to re-determine your eligibility and payment amount. You will receive a letter from social security telling you when it is time for your re-

termination. Question: I get social security payments as a student. Starting this month, I will be working full-time until summer vacation is over. How will my earnings affect my payments?

Answer: If you earn \$2,520 or less for the year, your benefits will not be affected. If you earn more, your payments will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 over \$2,520. But, regardless of your total 1975 earnings, you can get full social security payments for any month in which you neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in your own business. If you have questions regarding

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Insurance Hike Forces Hospital to Up Room Rates

Officials of Tawas Hospital, who announced Friday that room rates were to be increased \$2.50 per day effective July 1, said the hike was "mandatory" due to an increase in malpractice insurance rates to the hospital.

"In recent discussions with our auditors and insurance companies, we find that our malpractice insurance has increased from \$13,000 to \$48,000 per year for the same coverage, which is an increase of 275 percent," said M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator.

As a result, the daily room rate has increased from \$67 to \$69.50.

A survey of other hospitals in this area showed that, in February, one hospital's malpractice insurance jumped 237 percent over the previous year, from \$36,560 to \$123,842.

"To cover this and still be able to operate," commented Norwood, "there was only one avenue open and that was to raise room rates \$2.50 per day to compensate for the increase."

Another hospital has been forced to raise rates \$4 per day effective July 1; still another hospital has been notified that insurance premiums will increase considerably when the policy comes due in October.

As a comparison, Tawas Hospital's malpractice insurance in 1967-68 was \$1,091; in 1970-71, it jumped to \$4,435 and in 1971-72 it almost doubled at \$8,027. The rate in 1972-73 jumped to \$9,962, moved up to \$10,082 in 1973-74, \$13,175 in 1974-75 and then zoomed to \$48,108 in 1975-76.

"Our auditors have reviewed the hospital's financial statements to determine the expected effect of these increased malpractice insurance costs on the hospital's fi-

nanial position," said Norwood. "Their findings show that the increased malpractice insurance premium will result in increased general service costs of at least \$3 to \$4 per patient a day."

Norwood said the increase is not uncommon and other hospitals have experienced similar effects from increased insurance premiums. "Obviously, at current rates, the hospital is barely breaking even and it can readily be seen that an increase in room rates of at least \$2.50 per day is mandatory; otherwise, it would result in operating losses which would be extremely poor management in any type of business."

The hospital director pointed out that business margins must be sufficient to provide for the effects of inflation on operating costs and equipment replacement costs. "Hospitals are affected by the same economic trends as you, the consumer, face in your daily living," said Norwood. "While hospitals are distinct from business and industry, we feel the same growing effects of inflation and rising costs on all items used within the hospital."

Few fields see equipment get more use or become obsolete faster than the field of medicine, but this equipment saves lives and shortens hospital stays. The cost for this equipment must be allocated among patients the same as the grocer and other businesses raise prices to the consumer when wholesale prices go up.

"Greater skills are also required by today's 'miracle' techniques," said Norwood. "Technological advances demand more and more specialized training of hospital employees; so, we must continually seek to expand and update,

not for the sake of appearance, but to provide the means for the best health care for all patients." At one time or another, most people try to compare a hospital with a hotel. Both provide use of rooms, housekeeping, utilities, maintenance, but there the comparison ends.

"We are a special place providing room service, meals, special diets, 24-hour nursing care, drugs and medicine, supporting medical services and life-saving equipment," said Norwood. "We keep a running inventory of all hospital supplies and foods, so we are able to keep inventories at the lowest

possible level. Every possible means is employed to contain costs in all departments. This is difficult to maintain because everything depends on the high and low census level of patients, which is, of course, unpredictable."

The hospital administrator pointed out that if inventories are too

low and suddenly the hospital is filled to overflowing with patients, it would be out of necessary items. On the other hand, the inventory cannot be too high because it could have a very low census with an over abundance of items.

Hospitals were under federal price controls last year, but not

the supplies which had to be purchased for necessary patient care. Food costs, alone, went up 11 1/2 percent. As a result of these factors, the hospital auditors strongly urged that consideration be given to raising the rates for routine or other services to cover the hospital's increased costs.

"The board of trustees and the administrator regret the necessity of this increase but, please be assured that everything is being done and will continue to be done to keep costs at their lowest and still give the community the very best health care possible," concluded Norwood.
