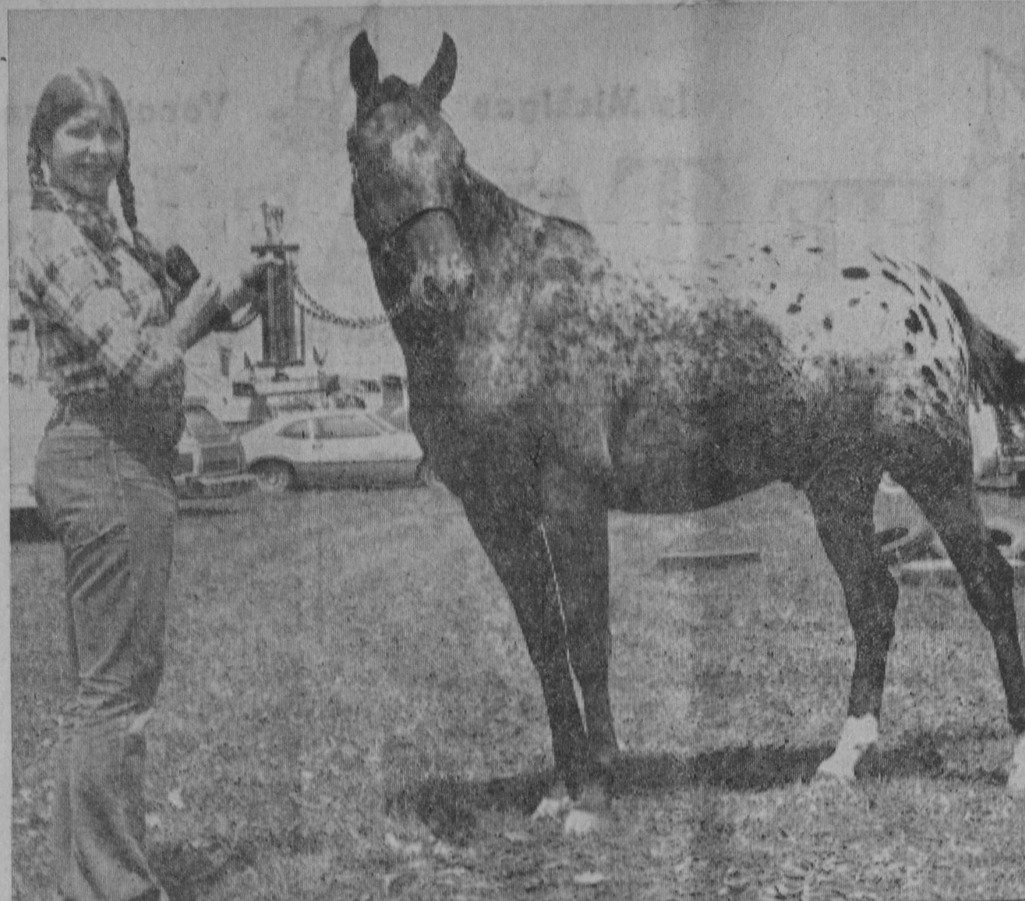

### Five Persons Sentenced in Circuit Court

Five persons were sentenced July 22 in Iosco County Circuit Court by Judge Allan C. Miller. A sixth defendant entered a plea of not guilty and a seventh person entered a guilty plea during arraignments last Wednesday.  
Sentenced to terms of two to 10 years in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, were Walter E. Hammar of Hale and Larry Forsythe, Southfield. The two men were convicted of breaking into the Hale Pharmacy on April 19.  
Daniel E. Price was sentenced to a term of 60 days in the county jail on conviction of possessing cocaine.  
Steven Leuckeman, who entered a plea of guilty to selling PCP, was sentenced to the state corrections commission with the recommendation that he be considered for the Michigan Training Unit to complete his 12th year of school.  
Steven Peacock was placed on probation for three years and is to serve the first five months in the county jail on conviction of selling PCP. He was assessed court costs of \$150.  
Edwin L. McCain, Mishawaka, Indiana, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of negligent homicide. Jury trial was set for September 24.  
The charge resulted from a crash June 16 in which Charles C. Martin of Tawas City received fatal injuries.  
McCain, who is free on personal recognizance, was the driver of a truck which struck Martin's car. The impact drove Martin's car into an oncoming car driven by Henry Zimmerman of Oscoda, who was injured in the crash.  
James C. Stolz entered a plea of guilty to unlawfully driving away an automobile. Bond was set at \$5,000 and he is being held at the county jail while awaiting sentencing.

Mrs. Dorothy Gheen, one of the state's top award winning artists, will be judge for the Tawas Bay Art Show on August 2-3.

Working in several medias, including oil and acrylic painting, drawing and photography, Mrs. Gheen has won awards in all areas, ranging from the grand

prize at the Mid-Michigan Show to being the only woman photographer receiving an award at the All-Michigan Photography Exhibition.

A former director of the Hartland Art Show, Mrs. Gheen recently has had three one woman shows, including the Midland Center for the

Arts, the Jesse Besser Museum at Alpena and the Community Art Center at Grand Haven.

In 1974, Mrs. Gheen received the Saginaw News Art Award for her acrylic painting, "Alpha IV." At the present time, she is a full time artist in residence for the Livonia Public Schools.

## Council Hires Dragline to Deepen River Channel; Drop Blasting Plan

Use of a dragline to deepen and widen the existing channel at the Tawas River mouth was authorized at a special meeting Wednesday night of the Tawas City Council.

Roland E. (Bud) Fahselt, local contractor, was hired for the project and started work Tuesday morning. Cost of the project has been estimated at \$515.

This much discussed project is to start at a point where a sand bar was removed in June by a sand-sucker. The starting point where the sand-sucker stopped work is at the entrance into Coho City Marina's docking basin.

The sand bar, which has blocked the normal river entrance since last fall and caused the river to divert its course to the east, was removed in June at a cost of \$1,500.

At best, the new dredging operation will be only temporary as the littoral drift of sand in Tawas Bay, coupled with lowering of the lake level and future storms, will probably again choke the channel.

However, the work this week will allow pleasure craft to use upstream docking facilities and the city's boat launching ramp during the late summer and fall fishing season ahead.

In addition to the problem caused by the delay in federal authorization, the city has learned from local insurance carriers that no liability coverage is listed for the use of explosives in such a project. Local agents are contacting insurance companies to determine if liability coverage is available to protect the city.

## AuGres River Drain Approved at Hearing

The Soil Conservation Service has been instructed by Stanley Quackenbush, state drain commissioner, to proceed immediately with work plans for the estimated 3.2-million-dollar AuGres River Drain.

This move was made July 22 following a hearing at Tawas Area High School, which saw the augmented drain board favoring construction of the drain by a six to four roll call.

A Tri-County Drain Board was formed automatically by the augmented drain board's approval. The Soil Conservation Service has estimated local costs to be \$801,435.

The vote followed protests by Iosco County property owners attending the hearing. Representatives of this county and neighboring Ogemaw County had voted as a block in 1973 to stop the project, but two of the three representatives from Ogemaw County changed their past positions and

sided with Arenac County officials in approving the sufficiency, necessity and practicality of the project.

Iosco's three representatives, Donald Griffin, Robert Foster and John Mielock, drain commissioner, voted in opposition, as did one member of the Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners.

Arenac County officials agreed formally to accept 91 percent of the cost of the drain, amounting to \$729,000. The six percent cost to Iosco County would be \$48,000 and Ogemaw's three percent represents \$24,000.

However, the above costs were estimated about four years ago and it is expected that inflation will substantially raise the expense of the entire project.

The method of determining the shares to be assessed benefited property owners and the county at large is yet to be determined.

Representatives of Iosco County had moved to free Iosco and Ogemaw from any cost sharing in the project, but Arenac officials stated a contempt of court charge would be instituted if the drain project was not approved. A motion by Griffin, a member of Iosco County Board of Commissioners, was defeated.

Attorneys for the three counties had agreed in a recent court hearing before Circuit Judge Joseph Swallow of Alpena to advise authorities of the three counties to accept the 91-6-3 percent cost split.

Harmon Williams, chairman of the Arenac County Board of Commissioners, whose motion to proceed with the project was finally approved after years of frustration, cautioned Iosco and Ogemaw representatives that there was a measure of legal responsibility on those counties to accept the project as agreed before Judge Swallow.

Also adding to the temporary nature of the project is the fact that the dragline, as it moves outward into the bay, is to cast sand to the east of the river channel. This spoil area would erode rapidly in any future storm and the sand probably would find its way back into the channel.

At the present time, a narrow channel snakes its way along the east side of the river mouth. According to soundings taken by Fahselt last week, the depth in this channel ranges from five feet to two feet and is difficult for boats to negotiate.

A permit revising a March 25 authorization to deepen the channel was received last week from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the permit was rather vague in that it states the spoil is to be placed in the existing diverted river channel, which conflicts with a later statement that the sand should be placed landward of the normal ordinary high water of Tawas Bay.

The DNR's revised permit, which expires August 15, authorized dredging of the use of controlled explosives, but revision of the city's existing permit with the United States Army Corps of Engineers to allow blasting would have required a 30-day posting period.

Rather than to wait until late September for this permit revision, the council decided to utilize

the meeting that the proposed blasting operation was not as simple as some people believe. He presented engineering statistics to the city manager that indicated that blasting into the clay river bottom could endanger property a considerable distance from the river.

Deepening of the channel will stop at the point where it reaches the clay bottom as it would be impossible for the normal dragline operation to penetrate the hardpan.

Martin O'Driscoll, who has been spokesman for marina operators and boat owners in efforts to deepen the river channel, expressed pleasure that the council had taken this action to improve boating conditions for the remainder of the summer and early fall.

He advised the council that his committee was to raise funds through private donations to assist with the project.

Because of the expenditure for dredging the river mouth, the city is to institute its \$2.50 boat launching fee at the municipal boat launching site along Ninth Avenue. Persons desiring an annual boat launching sticker at a cost of \$3 for the season may obtain one shortly at the city hall.

The city manager said that once the channel is deepened and widened, the range light system used to guide boats into the river would again be placed in operation.

## Widower May be Eligible for SS Survivors Benefits

A widower with one or more children in his care may be eligible for social security survivors benefits under a recent decision of the United States Supreme Court.

Widowers can get information about applying for the benefits by calling or writing any social security office, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

Under the court decision, a widower taking care of his wife's children can get monthly survivors benefits on her record if she worked long enough in jobs covered by social security. Previously, a widow with children in her care could get survivors benefits, but a widower could not unless he proved he was dependent on his wife and was either 60 or over or

60 to 60 and disabled.

A widower's survivors benefits can be affected by his earnings and only about 15,000 widowers are expected to get payments under the court decision according to Carr.

Children continue to get social security survivors benefits on either their mother's or father's record.

Generally, a widower who does not remarry can get survivors benefits until the children in his care are 18. If there are sons and daughters 18 or over who were severely disabled before 22, he can get benefits as long as they are disabled and cannot work.

"The amount of a widower's monthly survivors benefit is based on his wife's average earnings over a period of years and it may also be affected by his earnings," Carr said. "He can earn \$2,520 or less for this year and still get his full social security benefit. Over \$2,520, his benefit will be reduced by \$1 for each \$2 earned—no matter how much he earns for the year, he can get his full social security benefit for any month he neither earns \$210 nor does substantial work in his own business."

The children in a widower's care can get social security checks until they are 18, or 22 if they are full-time students and remain unmar-

ried. "The amount of their monthly social security payments may be affected by their earnings but not by their father's earnings," Carr said.

# Taxpayers Spend More for Welfare Than State Allocates for Education

Once again, Michigan taxpayers will spend more to support the welfare load than to educate children.

At least that is the picture as it now stands with the 1975-76 social services and school aid appropriations bills waiting for state senate approval, said State Rep. George Prescott, Tawas City.

"I think there is a message here for us about the kind of system we have when we pay more to support those on welfare than we do to educate our youngsters," said Prescott.

The house passed versions of the two bills calling for 1,795.1-billion-

dollars for social services programs and 1,385.3-billion-dollars in state aid to the K-12 public schools.

"That is 400-million-dollars more to run our welfare program than we will spend on school children," Prescott said. "Where are our priorities?"

There was one thing about the bill as it passed the house that surprised and pleased Prescott. That was the fact that the social services bill was about 21-million-dollars under the governor's recommendation.

"It has been very rare this year when the house has approved a budget bill that came in under the

governor's recommendation," Prescott said. "Naturally, I liked this part of the situation because I like to see us cut costs where we can."

Predicted spending in both areas is increased over the previous year's budget figures. The social services budget is about 117-million-dollars over the 1974-75 revised figure, while the state aid is about 42 million over last year's figure after the governor issued his cuts.

# Coronary Care Course for Nurses at Tawas Hospital

A 12-week coronary care course for nurses is scheduled to start September 8 in the classroom at Tawas Hospital.

Any nurse interested in taking this course, for which there is no charge, may register by contacting Janice Wheaton, staff development director at the hospital.

This course, which is conducted by Dr. Larry S. Kelly, has been approved by the Michigan Nurses Association for earning continuing education credits.

More and more states are beginning to require these units before relicensing in the field of nursing. The Michigan Nurses Association has had a pilot program for the past year and Tawas Hospital has been one of the participants.

If the program proves feasible, MNA is expected to extend it to the entire state by November. The association is certain that it will be approved and this means that any nurse taking courses approved for earning continuing education units can build a bank of credit at MNA to be used to renew licenses when the state passes this requisition.

It also means that the nurse would have these units available for use should she transfer to another state that has this requirement at the present time.

The program conducted by Doctor Kelly was approved for credit last September. Anyone taking this course and passing it successfully may have two credits added to her record at MNA.

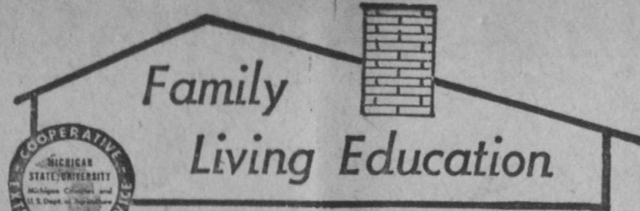

#### KNOW YOUR MELONS

When is a cantaloupe a muskmelon? The answer is always. To the botanist, muskmelon refers to a group of melons. This group includes other varieties such as honey dew, Casba, Cranshaw, Persian and cantaloupe. However, to most of the people a "muskmelon" is the same thing as a "cantaloupe." Regardless of terminology, Michigan consumers have many melons from which to choose.

Selection—The outside of a melon is the best guide to internal quality. Look for the "eating-ready" signs of the different varieties as listed below.

Cantaloupe—Small, oval shape. Rind is course and heavily netted; grayish with light background. When ripe, there is a softening at blossom end. Scar (stem) end is smooth and slightly sunken with no pieces of stem remaining (at-

tached stem fragments indicate that melon was picked before maturity). The flesh is salmon to orange in color. It has a pungent aroma and sweet taste.

Honeydew—Oval with velvety smooth, creamy yellow rind. When ripe, a slightly oily film covers the rind and there is a softening at the blossom end. The flesh is pale green, fine textured and very sweet and juicy. This is the sweetest of all melons.

Casba—Large, globe shaped with a pointed blossom end. Rough furrowed yellow rind with no netting. Flesh is creamy white with very little aroma but a soft, juicy sweet and slightly spicy flavor. When ripe, rind color deepens.

Cranshaw—Pear shaped with pointed stem end. Smooth green and gold skin with no netting. Flesh is salmon color with a juicy, spicy taste only moderately sweet. Softening at blossom end when ripe.

Persian—Similar in shape to cantaloupe but larger. Rind has

even, fine netting over deep green background. Flesh is orange-pink and has a pleasant aroma and mildly sweet taste. When ripe, there is a softening at blossom end and rind color lightens.

Watermelon—Firm and symmetrical in shape. At peak quality, the side of the melon that has lain on the ground should show a yellowish-white color. The rind is rough to touch when ripe, smooth when immature. General shape and color indicate melon variety, not quality.

Generally, the largest melons of any one variety are the best choice for top flavor.

Consider price per serving when comparing melons, not price per melon. Allow two pounds of watermelon per serving; one-half to one-third pound per serving for most other varieties.

Hold melons at room temperature until the blossom end is slightly soft to touch; then cover and place in refrigerator.

Different varieties of melons are available from May through October. Most are good sources of vitamin "C" and offer the advantage of being relatively low in calories.

It enjoys the support of the Michigan Academy of Family Physicians, the Michigan Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of Physicians and the Society of Internal Medicine.

Jacques and Kelly are two of more than 265 carefully selected physicians throughout the state who volunteer their time as preceptors in this program. Each year, more than 400 students work with and observe their preceptors as they see patients in the office
