## Two Persons Die From Injuries on Iosco Highways

Two persons were killed and seven were injured in Iosco County area traffic accidents over the holiday week-end. One other person was injured by an exploding firecracker.

Receiving fatal injuries early Monday morning in a crash on US-23 near Dimmick's Colonial Cottages and Motel, East Tawas, was Larry Sullivan, 22, Osceola.

The victim was a passenger in a pickup truck driven by Thomas Dixon, 19, National City. Investigating officers from the East Tawas Police Department said that Dixon lost control of his vehicle and it struck a utility pole.

Sullivan received emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and died about four hours later at St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw. Dixon was treated for minor injuries at Tawas Hospital and released.

A 42-year-old Detroit woman, Alvina R. Miller, received fatal injuries when struck by a car Saturday night on M-65 north of Galion Road, Plainfield Township.

Investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said the victim was walking south on the east side of M-65 and was accompanied by Bonnie L. Hughes, 30, Farmington.

A car driven by Harold E. Shears, 41, Clio, was southbound on M-65 and attempted to pass another vehicle. When Shears pulled around the car, his vehicle struck Mrs. Miller, who was walking on the traveled portion of the highway. She was declared dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital. The other pedestrian escaped injury.

Injured Sunday and listed in critical condition Monday morning at St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw, was Raymond J. Smith, 23, Bellevue.

The sheriff's department reported that Smith was operating a motorbike and missed a curve on Esmond Road, 300 feet west of Vaughn Road, Plainfield Township. He was given emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and

transferred by ambulance to the Saginaw hospital.

Two children from Westland were injured Sunday afternoon in a crash on US-23, one-half mile south of Turner Road, Whitney Township. State police reported that a car driven by Daniel M. Keast, 24, Farmington, was involved in a rear end collision with a car driven by Alfred S. Prusinski, 31, Westland. Receiving minor injuries in the latter vehicle were Jason Prusinski, six years of age, and Eric Prusinski, four years old.

A nine-year old Warren youngster, Jerome S. Schmid, was treated Saturday at Tawas Hospital after he lost control of a motorbike while riding near his parent's cabin in Wilber Township. State police said the boy sustained burns to his left leg when it came in contact with the hot exhaust pipe.

Robert D. Bissonette, 42, East Tawas, was treated Friday at Tawas Hospital after he lost control of his motorbike on Sand Lake Road.

Jack L. Pace Jr., 34, Lake Orion, was treated Saturday at Tawas Hospital after being injured when his motorbike tipped over on a hill near the Iosco-Alcona County line.

Robert H. Curtis, 39, a vacationer at Little Long Lake, was treated Friday at Tawas Hospital. Sheriff's department officers said he was attempting to take a close-up photograph of a friend lighting a firecracker. He was struck in the neck by a piece of wood.

Neighboring Alcona County recorded one traffic fatality Friday morning when Erick LaCombe, eight years of age, was killed when a car driven by his mother went out of control and struck some trees south of Glennie.

Mrs. LaCombe and another son, Kevin, four years of age, were injured and treated at Tawas Hospital. The crash occurred on M-65, three miles south of Glennie.

## Tawas City Water Rate Hike Was Effective July 1

An increase in water rates to meet the higher cost of water purchase was adopted Monday by the Tawas City Water Board. The new rates became effective July 1.

The minimum water billing per quarter is to be \$11, as compared to the old minimum rate of \$10 per quarter.

Under the new rate, customers are to pay 40 cents per 1,000 gallons per quarter up to 100,000 gallons and 35 cents per 1,000 gallons per quarter over 100,000 gallons.

The meter rate charge is to be \$7 per quarter for a three-quarter inch meter, \$14 per quarter for a one-inch meter, ranging up to \$350 per quarter for a four-inch meter.

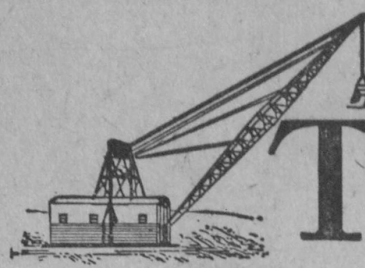
Previously, a \$6 per quarter charge had been made for a three-quarter inch meter, plus a ready-to-serve charge of \$4 to comprise the minimum charge. The first 10,

000 gallons under the old rate was 40 cents per thousand, with a charge of 35 cents per thousand for everything over 10,000 gallons.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that justification of the water rate is the result of a higher purchase cost negotiated recently by the joint water board. Tawas City has purchased its water supply from the East Tawas water filtration plant for the past 15 years.

Bublitz said that another cost to the city this year was its proportionate share of replacing filters in the plant. He said that the new rates would raise an additional \$8,000 to \$9,000 annually to meet the 30 percent increase in cost this year.

Other action Monday saw the water board adopting a resolution allowing persons in the special assessment sewer system to qualify for a \$100 rebate until October 1.

## Citizens Offer Aid in River Dredging

Marina-resort operators, boat owners and citizens interested in the Tawas River mouth indicated Monday night that they were organizing to raise funds to deepen the entrance into Tawas Bay in order to improve boating conditions.

In addition, it was suggested that the city council appoint a committee or commission to work with city officials on a long range river mouth harbor improvement project.

Some 25 residents interested in boating attended Monday night's regular council meeting to learn what could be done to improve boating conditions this year. Spokesman for the group, Martin W. O'Driscoll, suggested that a committee be formed to raise necessary funds to assist the city in completing its dredging project started earlier this year. O'Driscoll and his wife operate a resort marina upstream from the river mouth.

As an outgrowth of the meeting, Mrs. Peter Borsenik, a riverside summer resident, was given official sanction of the city council to visit Lansing Tuesday to determine what state funding might be available to assist in a long range harbor project.

In addition, O'Driscoll said he and others interested in the river mouth were to visit Lansing Wednesday to see what they could do about improving boating conditions here.

Renewed interest by citizens in the river mouth came about primarily through a letter writing and personal contact campaign conducted during the past two weeks by the O'Driscolls. A number of boat owners present at the meeting expressed the desire in strong terms to see action on further dredging this summer.

Although City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told the group that state officials had informed him in the past that no funds were available to assist in a dredging operation, it was O'Driscoll's opinion that the city "should not sit back and say that dredging cannot be done." He believed a percentage of the gasoline tax money paid by boat owners was available for such a project and, if not, enough private donations could be raised to assist the city with the project.

Following receipt of a long-awaited dredging permit on June 1 from the army corps of engineers, the city hired a private contractor to remove a sandbar at the river mouth. The normal river mouth channel had been blocked since last fall and the river had taken a new course across private property on the east side of the entrance into Tawas Bay.

A sandbar was used on the project at a cost of \$1,500 to the city, which included dredging a channel into deeper water. The opinion was expressed by a number of boat owners that a deeper channel should have been dredged

in the first project due to complaints that boats scraped the river bottom and some larger boats could not get out of the river. One boat owner said he damaged the prop on his boat due to the shallow water.

One of the problems which has long existed at the river mouth—lack of public property on one or both sides—was pointed out by Mayor John N. Brugger. The mayor said that a project was started by the city 3½ years ago to develop a harbor. After numerous trips to Lansing to meet with officials of the Department of Natural Resources, the state agreed to a study and engineering was obtained by the city on development of a boat launching project on the east side. The city expended approximately \$5,000 on engineering for the project. He said, however, that DNR officials closed the door on the project when the cost was estimated at \$500,000.

The mayor said that he believed the DNR would not participate in a river mouth project at this time, but he emphasized that it was not necessary for the project to die.

"We will have to organize our forces to carry on this project," said Brugger. "The city council cannot do it alone."

Brugger pointed out that the harbor project at East Tawas was first started eight years ago and many obstacles had to be overcome by citizens working with the city council before a final commitment was received only recently from the federal and state governments.

The mayor expressed the opinion that any further dredging this summer would not be beneficial to boaters as any storm action would again fill the channel with sand due to low water and lack of protection through needed breakwalls.

Persons attending the meeting thought that further dredging would be beneficial, even if only temporary, and one property owner pointed out that the mouth had not been dredged by the city since 1968. Since then, water had been at a record high level until it began to drop last fall. The river mouth rapidly filled with sand to complicate boating.

"I don't say the problem is insurmountable, but without the concerted effort of the community, the river mouth development will never happen," said Brugger.

Ald. William Groff reminded persons attending the meeting that the chamber of commerce had conducted a campaign last summer to interest people in writing letters to the city endorsing the river mouth project. He said that water was at a sufficient depth then for boating and only one or two supporting letters were received, including one from the businessmen's association.

Ald. Robert N. Rollin announced that he had called the Department

of Natural Resources Monday and available for the project.

It is anticipated that after receipt of the new application, along with information gained by visits

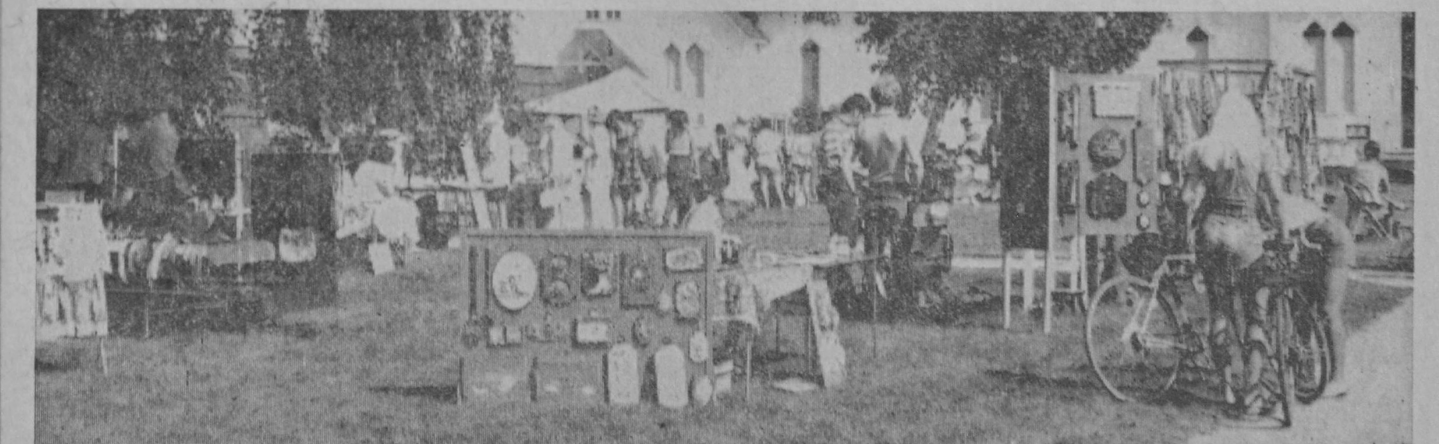
to Lansing this week by citizens, a special meeting of the council may be called to take further action on the project.

The city manager was to contact an Osceola contractor Tuesday to obtain a price for deepening the river channel.

## Automatic Dial Alarm System Slated for ET Waste Water Treatment Plant

A new automatic dial alarm system designed to prevent a recurrence of flooding conditions at the East Tawas waste water treatment plant is to be installed shortly.

According to a report Monday night by Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, the automatic dialing system is to be connected directly with a high water detection system presently installed in the plant.

The new dialing system will contain a series of seven different telephone numbers of city employees, plus the fire department's number. When the high water

alarm is activated, telephone numbers would be dialed automatically to warn of the problem.

Installation of this system is the result of a study conducted by Ropert following a storm on June 15, which disrupted operation of the waste water treatment plant temporarily. Because of the fact that storm water enters sanitary sewers in some areas of the city, the treatment plant was flooded by 20 feet of water.

As a result of the flooding, water backed up in sewer mains and flooded residential basements in the city.

Ropert said he was out of town

the night of the June 15 storm and other city employees were not aware of the flooding condition at the plant.

In other business Monday night, the Rev. Edward Fairbanks, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, appeared before the council and presented plans for a new church and educational unit.

The building is to be of block and brick construction with an estimated cost of \$125,000. It is to have a 42 by 60-foot auditorium and 40 by 100-foot educational wing at the rear.

The building is to be located on property west of the present frame

church and the pastor said that when the project is completed, the old structure is to be removed and the area used for off street parking.

A proposal by Eckstein Construction Company to construct sidewalks under a new CETA program was turned over to the council's sidewalk committee for study.

A price of 60 cents per square foot was submitted by Eckstein for constructing sidewalks. Student labor would be utilized under the program.

### Higher Social Security Means Food Stamp Cost Increase

Social security recipients who also purchase food stamps may find they have to pay more for their food stamps beginning this month, when an eight percent boost in social security payments takes effect.

Since the cost of food stamps is linked to the amount of net income received in each food stamp household, the social security increase may mean an increase in the cost of food stamps for some families.

However, the social security increase generally will not affect the cost of food stamps in a household now receiving less than \$300 in social security benefits.

Persons who believe they may be affected can obtain information from the social services department in the county where they reside.

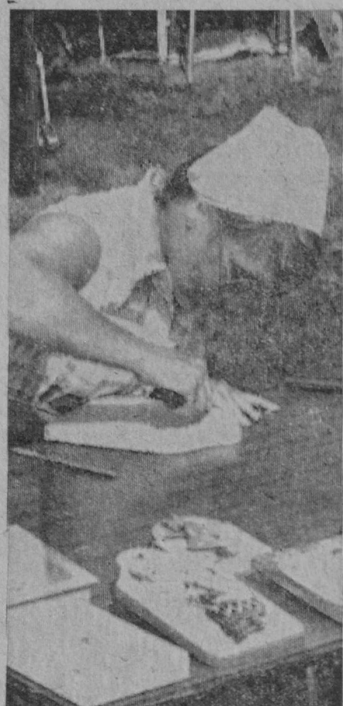

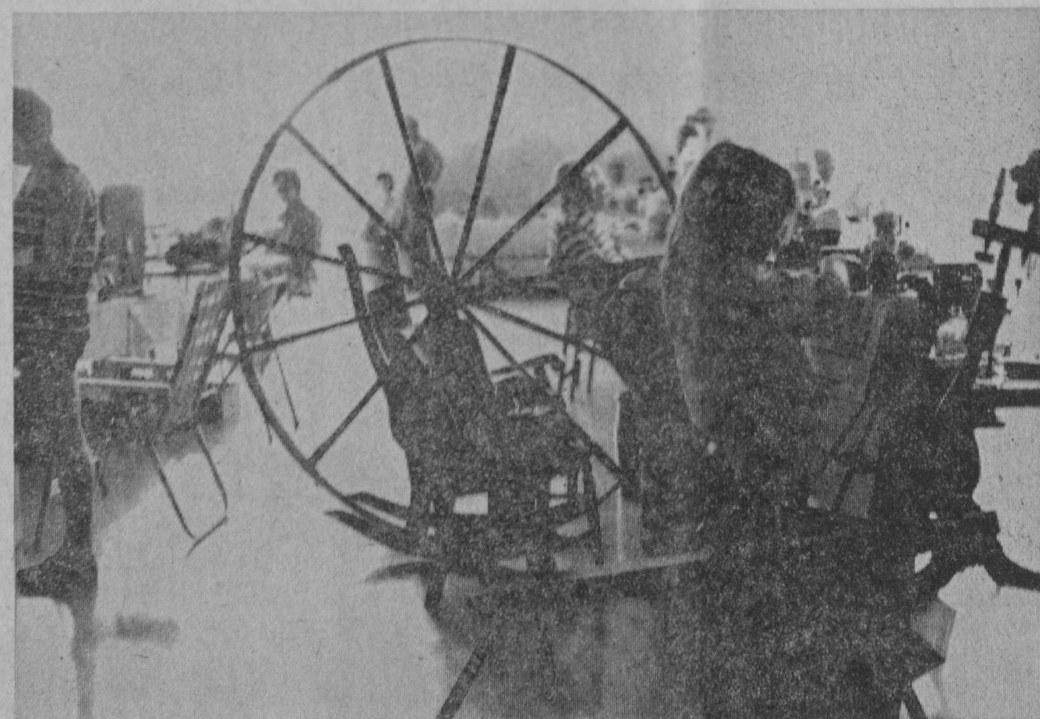

# Council Hears Plans for Proposed Senior Citizen Housing in TC

A developer interested in constructing a 60-unit senior citizen housing project in Tawas City is to appear at the planning commission meeting on July 17.

Representatives of DeShano Development Corporation were told Monday night by members of the Tawas City Council that they had no objections to tentative plans as outlined and suggested that the matter be taken before the planning commission for required study.

The representative of DeShano stated that the firm had studied the possibility of constructing a senior citizen development at East Tawas, but apparently ran into problems with the ground water level on property under consideration.

Two sites in Tawas City currently under consideration by the firm are owned by Mr. and Mrs. Victor Zaharias. Both are located along Fifth Avenue, one on the east side between Roberta and Anna Drives, and the alternate site is on the west side of Fifth Avenue.

Construction on either site would require rezoning from RA residential to multiple family. A public hearing would be required.

The DeShano representative stated that a one-story project was being considered with eight-unit clusters of houses. The housing units would be of modular construction.

It was stated that density of construction would be 12 to 15 units per acre, depending upon landscaping. The units would be open to persons 62 years of age and older as mortgages would be subsidi-

dized by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In other business, Ald. Robert Rollin and Ald. Clark Tanner were appointed to work as a committee with City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz to study a sidewalk construction program this summer using labor provided by CETA funds.

Bublitz said he had met with John Pelt, administrator of CETA funds for the county, and learned that student labor is available for such a project. CETA funds would be used to hire high school and college students between the ages of 16 and 21 years and the city would provide the materials.

Bublitz said that Eckstein Construction Company had offered a price of 60 cents per square foot for constructing sidewalk under this project. Due to the saving in labor, Bublitz said the price was attractive.

The committee is to survey property owners in the city to determine interest in sidewalk construction. The cost would be divided equally by the city and the property owner.

Bublitz said he did not know at present how many people would be available to work under this new CETA program. He said, too, that legal advice would be required concerning special assessment procedures.

A special meeting is to be held on this project once a survey of property owners is completed.

Forms requesting a preapplication hearing on two projects at the city park have been submitted to the Department of Natural Resources by the city manager. One

application calls for the purchase of the Babcock property on the west end of the city park and the second application calls for development of a parking lot from the Babcock property east to Rainbow Service.

Bublitz said that the next step in the procedure would see DNR representatives visiting the community to inspect the two sites and to determine if one or both projects would be eligible for state participation.

The city manager estimated the cost of each project at \$40,000, although he pointed out that it was only a guess at this point. Both projects would be for development of picnic and recreational facilities.

The city acquired frontage on Tawas Bay behind the Iosco Abstract Office, along with US-23 frontage, a number of years ago under a similar state-city effort.

The council approved an allocation of \$595.84 to Tawas Hospital Ambulance Service as its share of purchasing a new ambulance. An assessment of \$4,900 to the 12 units of local government participating is in addition to the \$6,800 set aside for ambulance replacement, plus the trade-in of the 1969 ambulance at Hale.

Authorization was given to purchase a truck from McKay Sales Company at a cost of \$8,046.90.

A report from the park board indicated that additional grills are to be purchased and prices are to be obtained on a new roof for the bandshell and a proposed new metal building.

# Commissioners Table Proposal on General Fund to Back Bonds

A proposal to use county general fund money to guarantee payment of revenue bonds to finance a new county garage, should there be a drastic drop in state gas and weight taxes, came under the close scrutiny Wednesday of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Following a presentation by James Delahanty, engineer-manager for the road commission, the county board of commissioners decided it would table the matter until the next meeting on July 23.

Three months ago, the board of commissioners authorized the road commission to issue \$900,000 in motor vehicle highway fund bonds for construction of a new central garage, to be located south of M-55 and east of Sand Lake Road.

However, Robert Foster, county commission chairman, along with other commission members, expressed surprise and concern Wednesday when they learned that issuance of the revenue bonds hinged on pledging county general fund money.

It was pointed out by commissioners that news releases earlier in the year reported a drop in the gas and weight tax return to counties. It was also stated that

Wednesday's four-cent-per-gallon price increase on gasoline, coupled with predictions that gasoline prices would zoom even higher, would have an adverse effect on travel and that gas and weight tax money could continue to drop.

Pros. Atty. Ronald Tyler explained the proposed bond issue to commissioners and the risk involving the county. He said the road commission can pledge up to 20 percent of its total budget for bond payment. He said the road commission's budget would have to fall below \$325,000 before there would not be an adequate amount to meet bond payments.

Tyler said the road commission now receives \$1,100,000 annually in gas and weight taxes and only a disastrous drop would result in a risk to the county general fund.

Michael Freel, county road commission attorney, said that to be realistic, he believed the county would be more likely to have fiscal problems than the road commission in the event of a national setback, as gas and weight taxes are collected in advance.

Donald Griffin, county finance chairman, proposed that the road commission make a prepayment

for one year on the revenue bonds as a safeguard to protect the county. He also suggested that, in the event the proposal is approved, the county commission should monitor any future financial commitments by the road commission.

Both Tyler and Freel indicated that if an annual bond retirement payment is not met in full, the county treasurer would be authorized to deduct payment from road commission funds.

Chairman Foster recommended that the entire matter be tabled for further consideration. He said the proposed bond issue should be reviewed by the county board of commissioners before further discussion on July 23.

In announcing its construction plans in April, the road commission said its new headquarters building would contain 34,000 square feet of floor space. The building would be of concrete block and steel construction with brick veneer on the north side.

When completed, the new headquarters would replace the present garage and offices at East Tawas, along with road commission garages at Whittemore and Hale. The Oscoda garage would be retained.

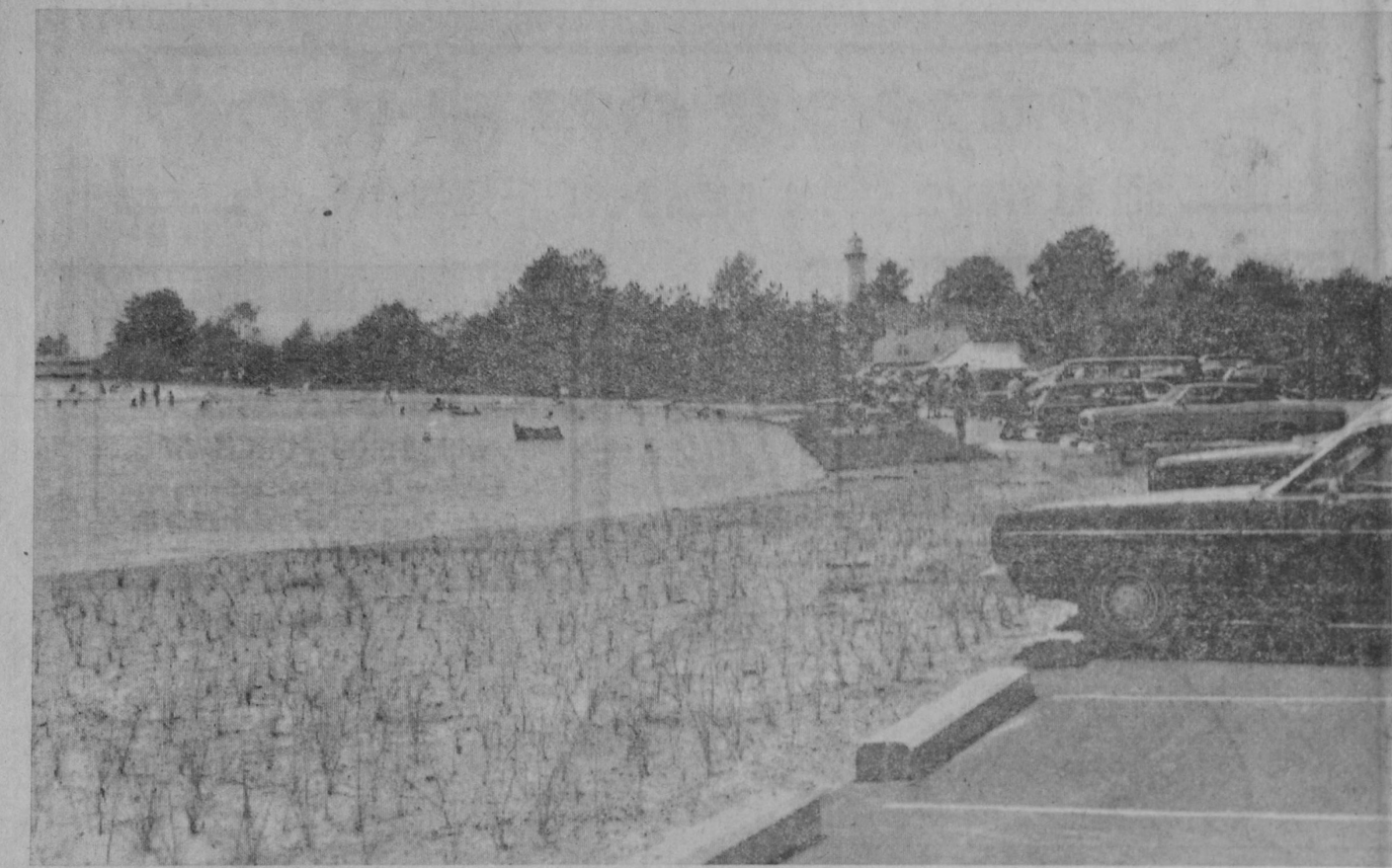

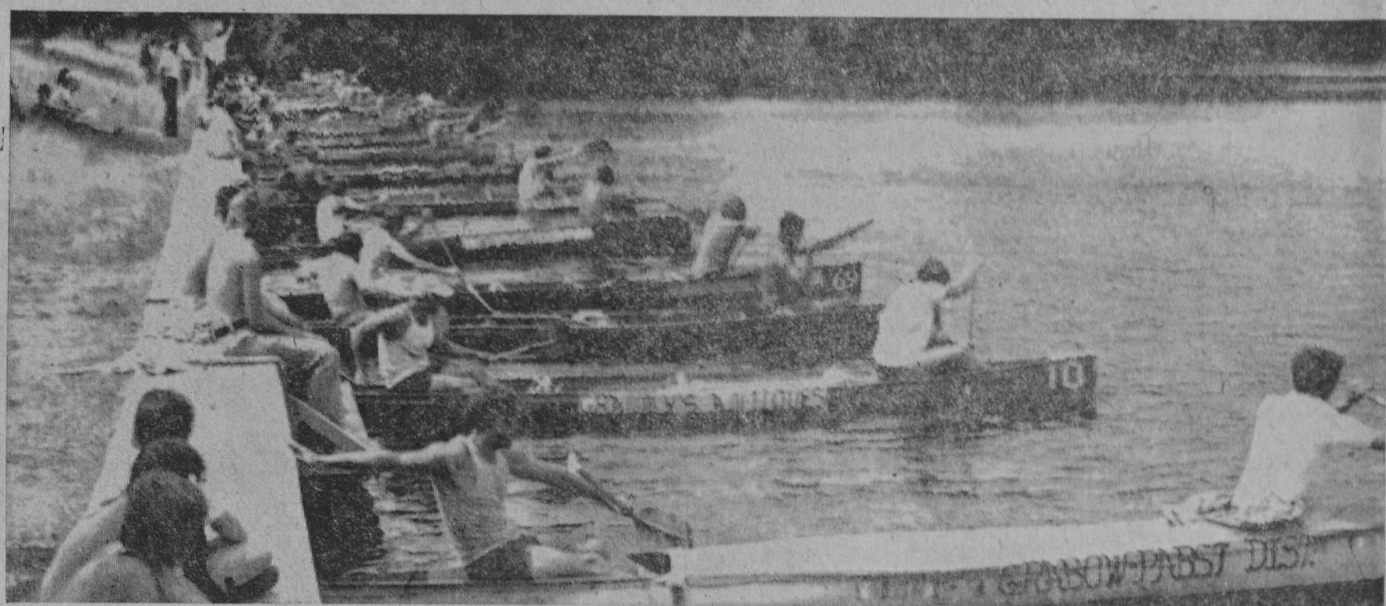

## Veteran Ann Arbor Duo Won First Five Channels Canoe Race Sunday

John Baker and John Swartz of Ann Arbor, veteran Michigan canoe racers, edged Brian and Steven Krantz of Hale by only 24 seconds to win the Five Channels canoe race held Sunday on the AuSable River.

The Ann Arbor duo completed the 16-mile course between Five Channels Dam and Rollways Resort in a time of one hour, 35 minutes. The Krantz brothers paddled in the wake of the winning team and crossed the finish line at Five Channels landing only 24 seconds off the pace.

Nailing down third place was the veteran team of Jay Stephan of Grayling and Bob Welsch of Southgate, president of the Michigan Canoe Racing Association, who completed the course in one hour, 38 minutes, 10 seconds.

A field of 22 professional teams entered this first race, which received the strong support of Hale area businessmen. Brian Krantz was race chairman and his father, William, was the official starter. Saturday's sprint race had the

same finishing results as the main race on Sunday, with Baker and Swartz leading the field of 16 teams. The Krantz brothers won second place, while Stephan and Welsch came in third.

The only other local teams in the professional race included Dan Brandt and Barry Shellenbarger of Hale, along with Craig McDougald and Malcolm McDougald of Glenview.

Local teams winning places in three other divisions included: Brian Kreiner and Gary Bissonette,

Hale, third place in men's novice; Lori Krantz of Hale and Mary Cooney of Commerce, third place in women's novice; Douglas and Duane Brandt, Hale, third place in the junior division.

Brian Krantz and Sue Cooney won third place in the mixed race, which had an entry list of 11 teams.

Hand crafted trophies were awarded in each class in the amateur division and \$500 was split among the first 15 places in the professional division.

## Use Bridge Fund for Aging Program

As a means of financing its share of the Trio Council on Aging Program, Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday authorized closing out of a \$7,500 bridge escrow account and returned the money to the general fund.

This money, along with contributions from Ogemaw and Roscommon Counties, is to match funds which finance operation of senior citizens service centers in the three counties.

Mrs. Lea Hicks, executive director of Trio Council on Aging, had requested a contribution of \$8,500 from this county, but that amount was deleted from the commission's budget when adequate millage was not received from the allocation board.

Robert Foster, commission chairman, said the bridge escrow fund had been established in 1970 as a long range program for bridge improvements. He said that an annual appropriation of \$2,500 was made from the general fund for three years, but was then discontinued due to the lack of finances.

The commission's resolution stressed that its action does not commit the board for funding of the senior citizens' program in future years.

In other business, the commission accepted the resignation of Robin Allain as county equalization director. In his letter of resignation, Allain said he offered it with regret, but that family problems had developed which require immediate medical attention which is not available in the Iosco County area.

Mrs. Janis Bernard of Hale was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Bert Fortune, who resigned last month from the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board.

Three appointments to the mental health board included Charles Smith, Oscoda; Mrs. Mary Jane Burdett, representing the county board of commissioners; Dennis Chrivia, Hale. Dr. L. S. Kelly has been requested to serve on the board.

Lionel Butler was recognized in a formal resolution for his three years of service as county building custodian. The county is advertising for a new custodian, following Butler's retirement.

The commission appropriated \$750 from county advertising to the Iosco Agricultural Society for support of the 1975 Iosco County Fair.

A work study agreement was adopted with Michigan State University, arranging for students to work for the cooperative extension service.

William Ezo resigned from the Iosco County Bicentennial Steering

Committee, due to business and other obligations.

Consumers Power Company announced plans to rebuild electrical facilities within the area of the Iosco County Airport. Existing electrical lines are overhead and run south of the airport administration building across the site of a proposed new hangar. The overhead lines are to be replaced with an underground system.

John Pelto, director of public service employment for the county, submitted a request for a salary increase effective August 1. His present salary is \$9,100 annually and he asked an adjustment of \$900 to bring the salary to \$10,000. No action was taken on the request.

Beverly K. Rayment submitted her resignation as assistant appraiser for the equalization department effective July 3. She said her position as a CETA employee is to terminate July 31 and she is to seek steady employment.

Robert J. Russell, supervisor of facility inspections for the Michigan Department of Corrections, reported on his inspection of the county jail on June 12. In his letter, Russell said that members of the board of commissioners "deserve a great deal of praise for your effort in bringing the jail up in the fashion you have, as well as furnishing the sheriff with necessary employees to properly operate the facility."

The county board of commissioners authorized advertising for a new animal control officer.

### Joseph Stepanski Died July 1

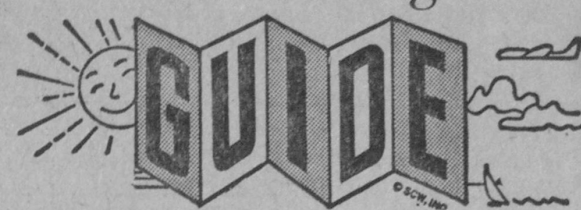
Joseph Phillip Stepanski of Tawas City, a retired Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company employee, died suddenly at his home Tuesday, July 1.

**Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners**

June Session (cont'd) June 18, 1975

Pursuant to established schedule, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)  
Absent: None

Mrs. Friebe and Mrs. Thayer, of the Hale Senior Citizens Group, were in attendance to pursue the matter of the appropriation being sought by the Trio Council on Aging for their 1976 programs.

Chairman Foster reviewed the agenda for the day and thereupon ordered that the board be recessed for committee work, so that the clerk might be excused to attend his duties in circuit court.

Upon call to order at 11:20 a. m., Lea Hicks, project director of the Trio Council on Aging, and Vincent Wade, president of the Iosco Senior Citizens Council, were in attendance to seek a commitment from the board with regard to the 1976 appropriation being sought, indicating they must have a firm commitment by July 1, 1975, to assure approval by the area agency on aging of \$23,000 in federal funding and the continuation of their programs; further indicating that federal funds will finance their operation from July 1 through the end of 1975 and that they will not require the local funding being sought as match until the first of next year. Upon learning from Mrs. Hicks that the full \$8,333 being sought from each of the counties would not be required to guarantee the \$23,000 of federal funding, Finance Chairman Griffin requested that Mrs. Hicks ascertain the minimum local match that would be required to assure their federal funding. Chairman Foster thereupon advised that the matter would be referred to the finance committee and that they would try to have a decision as to the appropriation later today; if not by today, by the July 2nd meeting.

Dr. David Lindemulder, director of the Northeast Michigan Mental Health Services Board, appeared before the board to discuss the requirement to re-establish mental health services and reorganize mental health boards under Act 288 of the P. A. of 1974, which repeals the present "Act 54" boards, effective August 6, 1975.

East Tawas City Assessor Wilbur Roach appeared before the board in reference to action taken by the East Tawas Council on June 16th appealing to the county board to extend CETA funding for assistant to the assessor, Ron Turner, until he gains the necessary experience and qualifications for a level II rating, whereupon he will in all likelihood be placed on the city payroll; urging that the request be given serious consideration, inasmuch as Turner is scheduled to be terminated at the end of June under present CETA programming.

Chairman Foster indicated that the matter would be taken under advisement, thereupon ordering that the board recess for lunch until 1:30 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**  
Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., the roll was called, all members being present.

Prosecuting Attorney Ron Tyler reported to the board in reference to a settlement agreement he engineered and negotiated with Schaafe Heating and Plumbing Company and Engineer Otis Love with respect to the water supply system project at Old Orchard Park that was halted by the health department due to the use of improper size pipe, said agreement providing for the county to pay Schaafe \$4,000, Schaafe to turn over all unused material to the county, and Engineer Love to pay the county \$2,000.

The communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

Commissioner Wereley, reporting for the health and public safety committee, advised that the District No. 2 Health Department has requested that each of the four counties appoint an alternate delegate to the District Health Board.

At 2:50 p. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, the board to stand in recess until 4:00 p. m.

Upon call to order at 5:00 p. m., discussion continued with CETA Director John Peltz with regard to a report presented earlier to board members in committee session, relating to the termination of certain CETA employees due to curtailment of funding, the discussion centering around priorities and a plea by the City of East Tawas to extend Ronald Turner to the first of the year, at which time they

would place him on their payroll as an assessor. The clerk thereupon proposed the transfer of a CETA position from his office, so that Mr. Turner might be continued until January 1st. Further discussion of the matter continued for some time.

Commissioner Wereley reported in reference to the letter from State Representative Clodfelter seeking information with respect to proposed revisions to Michigan's Juvenile Code and the letter from the Solid Waste Management Division of the Department of Natural Resources pertaining to the rejection of Iosco County's Solid Waste Management Plan, indicating that the former has been referred to Probate Judge William McCready for his recommendations and that he will pursue the latter with Engineer Otis Love and report at the next meeting.

Continuing, Mr. Wereley presented and moved adoption of the following resolution, motion being supported by Griffin and carried. Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your legislative committee recommends that the chairman be authorized to sign the agreement between the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission and Schaafe Construction Company for construction of the water wells and distribution system at Old Orchard Park, the total cost of the project to be \$23,457.99.

Finance Chairman Griffin reported on the minutes of the statutory finance committee meeting of June 17, 1975, thereupon moving that the report be accepted. Motion supported by Fox and carried.

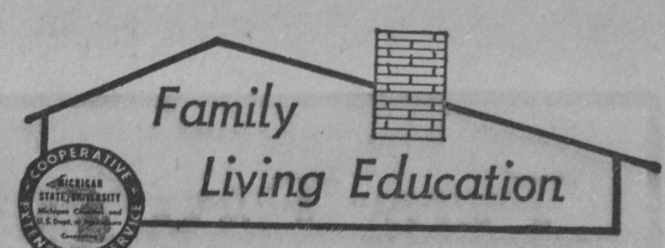

Why not preserve just a bit of summer's bounty in the form of jelly, jam, conserve, marmalade or preserves? These products provide a good way to use fruit not at its best for canning or freezing—the largest or smallest fruits and berries and those that are irregularly shaped.

All of these products are fruit preserved by means of sugar and usually all of them are jellied to some extent.

Jelly is made from fruit juice; it is clear and firm enough to hold its shape. Jam is made from crushed or ground fruit and is generally less firm than jelly. Conserves are jams made from a mixture of fruits. Marmalade is a jelly with small pieces of fruit distributed throughout; it usually contains citrus fruit. Preserves are whole fruits or large pieces of fruit in a thick syrup slightly jellied.

Four ingredients, fruit, pectin, acid and sugar, are essential for these products. Fruit gives the product its characteristic flavor and furnishes some of the pectin and acid needed for successful jellies. Some fruits require added pectin particularly when used for jellies. All fruits contain more pectin when they are underripe. Most

homemakers prefer to use recipes which call for added pectin (either liquid or powdered) because fully ripe fruit can then be used, cooking time is shorter and standardized so that there is no question when the product is done and the yield from a given amount of fruit is greater. Fruit pectins should be stored in a cool dry place so that they will keep their gel strength. They should not be held over from one year to the next. Acid is needed for flavor and gel formation. The amount of acid in fruit varies. There is more in underripe fruit than in fully ripe fruit. With fruits low in acid, lemon juice is commonly added in making jellied products. Sugar serves as a preservative, helps in gel formation and contributes to flavor.

The correct combination of these four ingredients is important to successful jellies. Follow tested recipes as they are designed to allow for naturally occurring acid, pectin and sugar in fruits.

Jellies should be stored in a cool, dry place, the shorter the storage time, the better the eating quality of the product.

Uncooked (freezer) jams may be stored in the refrigerator or freezer. They can be held up to three weeks in a refrigerator, up to a year in a freezer. If kept at room temperature, they will mold or ferment in a short time.

## Answer Social Security Questions

Question: I will be 65 in a few months. I have never worked under social security but I have heard that I can buy medicare's hospital insurance through monthly premiums. Is this true?

Answer: Yes. People 65 or older who are not eligible for hospital insurance coverage on their own work record or their spouse's can buy the protection. You will

have to pay a monthly hospital insurance premium and will also have to enroll in medicare's medical insurance and pay the premium for it. The basic premium rate for hospital insurance is \$40 a month, which was effective July 1. The premium for medical insurance is \$6.70 a month.

Question: I am 64 and have been getting monthly social security

payments since I was 62. I am engaged to a 55 year old widow and we plan to marry in September. When she reaches 60, will she be able to get social security checks on her first husband's record?

Answer: No, your fiancée will not be eligible for social security on her first husband's earnings record. A widow who remarries before she reaches 60 is not eligible for benefits on her first husband's record unless the second marriage ends. However, she will be eligible for monthly payments on your earnings record when she reaches 62.

Question: I get social security payments as a student. Starting

this month, I will be working full-time until summer vacation is over. How will my earnings affect my payment?

Answer: If you earn \$2,520 or less for the year, your benefits will not be affected. If you earn more, your payments will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 over \$2,520. But, regardless of your total 1975 earnings, you can get your full social security payment for any month in which you neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in your own business.

# Premium Rate for Medicare Hospital Insurance Boosted from \$36 to \$40

Starting July 1, the premium rate for medicare hospital insurance went from \$36 to \$40 a month for people who pay for this protection. The increase is due to rising hospital costs, according to Joint Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

Premiums are required for only 10,000 of the 23.5-million people

who have medicare hospital insurance.

Hospital insurance is extended automatically, without premium charge, to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security or railroad retirement benefits, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecu-

tive months or more and to many people with chronic kidney disease.

But people 65 and over who are not eligible for social security benefits can get medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium if they also sign up for medicare medical insurance, according to Carr.

Medicare hospital insurance helps pay hospital bills and many related expenses. "The hospital insurance premium rate is based on the average monthly medicare hospital insurance payment for patients who have the protection," Carr said.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other

medical expenses. "The basic premium rate for the medical insurance is \$6.70 a month," Carr concluded.

Over 23.5-million people have one or both parts of medicare. In fiscal 1974, the hospital insurance program paid over 7.7-billion dollars in benefits and the medical insurance program paid over 2.8-billion dollars.

People can get information about signing up for medicare by calling or writing any social security office. The Bay City social security office is at 1009 North Madison. The phone number is 892-3554.

Medicare is administered by the

Social Security Administration, an agency of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
