

# 17 Votes Required for Final Tax Allocation

Seventeen votes were required Friday afternoon on the final tax allocation order for Iosco County. Although only fractional changes were made from the preliminary order adopted May 19, changes were significant because of the county's total valuation.

Despite pleas from officials of several townships, who protested a preliminary allocation of less than one mill, the allocation board stated with its preliminary allocation of .90 of a mill for townships. It is possible that several of the

townships will appeal the allocation. May 21, Pros. Ronald Tyler ruled that the board could only allocate enough millage to meet the budgets shown by townships. This was the result of township officials using the valuation as equalized by the county board of commissioners, not considering that a 10 percent increase would be added by the state.

Six of the 11 townships submitted budgets requiring more than the .90 of a mill allocated and it was indicated Friday that an appeal

may be made by some townships by the June 11 deadline (today).

Members of the allocation board said they were extremely sorry that such a situation had arisen and several expressed the opinion that they did not want to penalize the townships. It was pointed out, however, that state law prevents changing a budget upward after one is submitted to the allocation board. If a budget shows need, state law requires an allocation of one mill of taxes.

According to a table presented to the allocation board, millage requirements were as follows for the townships: Alabaster, .83; AuSable, .97; Baldwin, .92; Burleigh, 1.0; Grant, .83; Oscoda, .92; Plainfield, .95; Reno, .70; Sherman, .79; Tawas, .97; Wilber, .81.

The final order adopted Friday saw county operation losing on its preliminary rate. The county is to receive 4.54 mills, as compared to 4.60 under the preliminary allocation. Picking up the millage was Iosco Intermediate School District, which was boosted from a

levy of .20 of a mill to .26. The loss to the county under the final millage rate is \$11,330.64, the exact figure gained in this county by the Iosco Intermediate School District.

The major losers in the final allocation were three school districts. Although the valuation increase benefits tax revenue of the county and townships, local taxpayers in Tawas Area School District, Oscoda Area School District and Whittemore - Prescott Area School District will be pick-

ing up a larger share of the tax burden because of the state aid formula. Hale Area School District, which received no state aid, will benefit from the higher valuation.

Following proposals which favored either schools or the county, the 12th proposal ended in a tie. That proposal, which called for 4.55 mills for the county, 9.30 mills for the schools, .90 of a mill for townships and .25 of a mill for the intermediate school district, was (See ALLOCATION, page 6.)

## Herriman - Dillon Win Trustee Posts

Clare Herriman and Willard (Bill) Dillon were elected to four-year terms as trustees of Tawas Area Board of Education in Monday's annual school election. A total of 1,154 voters out of a total registration list of 4,000 went to the polls at Tawas Area High School.

Herriman, a 10-year veteran of the board of education, was top vote getter in the election with 520 ballots cast in his favor. Dillon was next with 469 votes.

Next in line were Mrs. Louis (Eleanor) Pfeiffer, 401 votes; Donald Holmes, 355 votes; Mrs. Hugh (Isabelle) Prescott, 214 votes; John Whitman, 177 votes.

A resident of Tawas Township, Herriman has served on the board of education since 1965, when he was elected to fill a two-year vacancy. He was elected Monday to his third four-year term. He is an employee of United States Gypsum Company.

Dillon, a native of East Tawas and a resident of Tawas City, has been active as a leader in youth activities of the area, including Tawas Knolthole League and the boy scouts, as well as being active in sailing and as an officer of Tawas Bay Yacht Club. He is employed as a serviceman for Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

Dillon was elected to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Charles (Joan) Schreck, whose term expires on June 30. She has served the past year of her four-year term as president of the board of education.

Annual reorganization of the board of education and election of officers is to be held Monday, June 23.

## Oscoda Area OK's Millage

Oscoda Area School passed its 7.3 millage renewal proposal Monday in the annual school election. The proposal was adopted by voters, \$1,563-1,498.

Elected to succeed herself as a four-year trustee on the board of education was Mrs. Josephine DiLoreto, who received 1,556 votes. Her opponent, Mrs. Jane Doering, had 1,340 votes.

Winner in the five-candidate race for the one-year vacancy was Dr. Michael Richardson, who received 969 votes. Next in line were Lloyd Canute, 579; George Hatmaker, 573; Mrs. Judith Gaylord, 507; Ambrose Gauthier, 283.

At Hale Area School, Darrell McGinnis won a four-year trustee post on the board of education with 137 votes. Defeated candidates were Frank Leiva, 124 votes, and Mrs. Lee Cory, 81 votes. McGinnis is to succeed Frederick Wallace, who retired.

At Whittemore-Prescott Area, Archie Howe, incumbent, lost his seat on the board of education to Dorothy Lehman, 124-104. Re-elected to the other four-year term on the board was Howard Wilkins, who received 216 votes.

Roy Kramer, football coach at Central Michigan University, will be speaker tonight (Wednesday) at the annual banquet of Tawas Chamber of Commerce. The program is to be held at the Holland House, East Tawas, with a cocktail hour from 6:00 to 7:00 p. m. Following dinner, Pres. Roger McIntosh will introduce guests and W. D. (Mike) Nunn, executive director, will report on objectives and dues.

## Valuation Hiked, Tax Rate Lowered

With an \$887,181 increase in state equalized valuation brought on by the over-all valuation hike by the state tax commission, Tawas City Council Monday night adjusted its 1975 tax levy downward to raise only enough money to meet its budget adopted last month.

The city council had adopted a tax levy of 15.35 mills on May 19 based on the county equalized valuation of \$9,737,134. With a new valuation of \$10,624,315 for Tawas City, the tax levy was reduced to 14.09 mills.

The new tax levy calls for 11.92 mills to raise \$126,641.83 for the general fund, 1.20 mills to raise \$12,749.18 for the street fund and .97 of a mill to raise \$10,305.59 for the debt retirement fund.

A slight decrease in the amount of money received through federal and state revenue sharing is expected from lowering the tax rate. The formula for returning federal and state revenue is based partially on local tax effort.

Reginald Bublitz, city manager, said Monday night that a change is expected this year in the formula for returning federal and state revenues. Bublitz said that the latest word is the new formula will favor communities with high un-

employment rates and counties can expect a decrease.

In other business at the special meeting, Mayor John N. Brugger reported that he had met with Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas and Sup. Richter Lixey of Baldwin Township to develop tentative plans for paying those communities' share of the water expansion project to be financed by federal and local funds.

In addition, Brugger said that discussion has been held between the three local officials concerning establishment of an economic development authority to work in a cooperative effort toward a secondary sewage treatment facility to serve the entire area.

In order to prevent water bills from becoming excessive to pay for the current expansion, it is being proposed that the project be financed by a minimal property tax levy as well as an increase in water rates, with the tax rate to be eventually phased out as water customers increase through the expansion.

Details of the proposed new water rate structure and tax levy for the three units are to be developed and would be presented at future meetings of the two city councils and township board for consideration.

## Barry to Exercise Tenure as Classroom Teacher

# Dr. Robert Halle Offered TA Contract

A confrontation between Tawas Area Board of Education and Edward J. Barry, whose contract as superintendent was not renewed earlier this year, appears to have taken one more step toward court litigation.

At its regular meeting Monday night, the board of education adopted a resolution offering the superintendent's contract for 1975-76 to Dr. Robert A. Halle, presently the assistant superintendent at Comstock Public Schools.

When notified by telephone of Monday night's board action, Doctor Halle told the Herald he intended to accept the Tawas Area Board of Education's contract offer and awaited receipt of the legal documents for his signature.

He and his family plan to be in the Tawas this week-end to make housing arrangements prior to moving here later this month.

Halle, 43, has served as an elementary school principal at Royal Oak and Homer schools before joining the Comstock Public Schools in 1972. The school has an enrollment of 3,500 pupils and 400 staff members. Halle is administratively responsible for all certified and noncertified personnel and is the school's chief negotiator.

A graduate of Roosevelt High School at Wyandotte, Halle received a bachelor of science degree and master degree at Eastern Michigan University, plus a doctor of philosophy degree in curriculum and administration from Michigan State University.

At the conclusion of Monday night's meeting, a letter addressed to Earl B. Davis, board secretary, from Charles R. MacLean, Barry's Lansing attorney, indicated that the ousted superintendent would "exercise his rights to tenure as a classroom teacher."

However, Barry's attorney stated in his letter that a dispute now exists as to the termination date of his client's contract as superintendent of schools and "we are presently negotiating with your attorneys, Freel and Huck, in hopes

that litigation may be avoided." Following the board's March 10 announcement that Barry's contract would not be renewed, the superintendent stated he was "not looking for another job as I am going to take my attorney's advice and fight it."

A letter received by the board of education in March from MacLean claimed that the superintendent's current contract does not terminate until June 30, 1976. The letter from MacLean stated that six months' notice had not been given prior to the contract termination, claiming this was in violation of Barry's existing contract and established school board policy.

Barry took over the administrative reins of Tawas Area School District in July 1972, succeeding Supt. Reynold Mick, who had served the district since reorganization in 1953. Last month, the board of education retained Mick in an advisory capacity to conduct an evaluation of administrators and assignments.

At two meetings in late March and early April, a citizen appeared before the board of education and asked the board to make public any charges it had against Barry if he violated his contract. The board indicated it had been advised by legal council to remain silent on the matter.

Mrs. Louis (Eleanor) Pfeiffer, who presented a petition April 14 questioning why no reasons were given for not renewing the contract, was later a candidate for one of two vacancies as a board trustee and was defeated in Monday's school election.

A dispute over Barry's attendance at a meeting held at Grand Rapids again came before the board of education on Monday night. Mrs. Norman (Helen) Payea, trustee, questioned why a \$140 bill was submitted by Barry for attending the meeting when the board of education previously had directed that he not attend the meeting.


The superintendent countered by

stating that his attendance at the meeting was mandatory, according to the state department of public instruction, if he was to conduct an evaluation which would return approximately \$13,000 in

funds to the school. It was the superintendent's position that if the bill for attendance at the meeting was not allowed by the board of education, he should not be required to make the evaluation.

On further consideration, a motion by Trustee David Kennedy to pay the bill was approved by the board of education. A dissenting vote was cast by Trustee Clare Herriman.

At the close of the meeting, Barry submitted his written evaluation of John Alexander, high school principal. The matter was tabled with no action by the board of education.

## Instructor Reports to Board on Building Trades Program

According to an evaluation of the building trades program at Tawas Area School by Robert Reasner, instructor, student demand is such that a third building course may be offered at the school next fall.

Reasner told the board of education Monday night that the additional course would provide 50 percent more construction time and relieve students of the monotony of some of the more tedious jobs in the building program.

Although stating he believed the school had completed a fairly successful year in the building trades program, he pointed out there are areas which need improvement "for both the sake of efficiency

and effectiveness of the program from an educational standpoint."

He said there just is not time to complete a dwelling and at the same time provide the classroom type of instruction that students should also be receiving.

"By the time we eliminate the hours used for assemblies, pep rallies, class meetings, student council, class field trips, snow days, senior pictures, caps and gowns and a host of other things, we are fortunate to have 150 school days in which to work," said Reasner. "Of a two-hour scheduled class, by the time we allow 20 minutes for transportation and 10 minutes for cleanup, we are fortunate if we have 1 1/2 hours in

which to work."

Reasner said this means that the class has to complete a three-bedroom home in about 450 hours of actual class time. This is equal to 11 1/2 40-hour weeks or a little less than three months. "Not many of the contractors will complete a home in less than four months," he said.

Following a number of recommendations for improving the program, including replacement of a school bus with a semi-trailer for storage of tools and equipment, Reasner stated the belief that the program had made some progress.

"With a little concentrated effort, the program can be improved next year. The public seems to be very receptive and certainly, the young men who are taking the course are receiving an experience that will benefit them for the rest of their lives."

## Former Superintendent Reports to Board on Administration Survey

A survey of administrator contracts and assignments for Tawas Area School, conducted during the past month by Reynold E. Mick, former school superintendent, was accepted for study Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

The four-page report consisted of a series of recommendations concerning future administrator contracts and assignments. The board of education authorized retaining the former superintendent in an advisory capacity a month ago.

Mick recommended that contracts be issued from July 1 to June 30 for administrators, that a vacation schedule be established, that contracts for the 1975-76 school year be issued as of June 15 and be written with a salary of at least the amount paid in 1974-75.

The report stated that the contract should contain a clause making it possible to reopen the con-

tract after hiring of the 1975-76 superintendent. Mick said this would establish better rapport between the superintendent and administrators and would "entitle the administrator to legal employment and legal compensation while the superintendent works out the best accommodations for the school and the employee."

Mick said his conference with administrators had yielded a number of concerns on the part of administrators. It was felt that administrators' salary schedule should be developed so that the salary would be more definite in the future, added weeks are needed in some contracts to perform duties in a proper manner.

He recommended that, in further consideration with the 1975-76 superintendent, administrators be furnished with term life insurance, dental insurance, disability insurance and that consideration

be given to health and hospital insurance. He also recommended payment of retirement in 1975-76 and additional salaries, the final increase to be retroactive to July 1.

"The administrators appear to be dedicated, conscientious individuals who desire to add to the programs at Tawas Area," said Mick. "They have a good attitude toward education in general and toward Tawas Area in particular."

Mick said that public relations and credibility are always important and it is thought that "these can be improved if effort is constantly aimed toward telling the story through all possible avenues.

An idea confined within the mind of an individual is a captive which, though in fertile soil, does not reach its greatest potential until conveyed, refined, amended, received, accepted and put to work by others."

The report stated that field trips

by administrators have infinite value. "However, it seems that, for the benefit of the credibility of the individual traveling to conventions and meetings, detailed accounting of expenses and a generalized statement of the meeting attended should be available for examination by all interested parties; thus no questions will develop as to how funds were expended."

The former superintendent said a legal means should be provided whereby the funds for the trip could be secured and be repaid when the trip is finished.

In addition to making other specific recommendations concerning duties of individual administrators, Mick said that coordination of the elementary school programs should be given careful consideration. "Study needs to be initiated to insure closer cooperation between the two elementary schools."

## Expect Drop in School Aid

Although a state aid bill to schools is yet to be adopted by the legislature, Supt. Edward J. Barry told Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night that it appeared that this school district would receive a substantial reduction in membership aid during the 1975-76 school term.

Barry said that the state aid bill currently under consideration at Lansing would not benefit this school district because of its high valuation and local taxpayers would be picking up a larger share of school operational costs.

The superintendent reported that he was making arrangements to borrow \$60,000 against anticipated state aid in order to meet payrolls in August. Last year at this time, the school borrowed \$215,000 against anticipated state aid, but Barry expects that the total amount of state aid to be received in 1975-76 will drop to less than \$100,000.

He recommended that the board of education take the necessary legal steps to borrow approximately \$650,000 against anticipated taxes to operate the school until tax collection time in December.

## State Committed to Tawas Bay Harbor

Michigan Waterways Commission last week indicated it had committed its share of funding in a cooperative federal, state and local project to construct and expand the proposed harbor of refuge at East Tawas.

At the three-day spring conference held at Alpena, Keith Wilson, waterways commission director, said that the state allocation to this project would be made available next year. No dollar amount was listed for the appropriation.

Confirmation of federal approval of a small boat harbor at the present Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas, was announced in April by the United States Army Engineer District,

Detroit. The confirmation was contained in the final environmental statement for the harbor. Federal participation in the improvement of Tawas Bay Harbor was authorized by congress in August 1968. Congress has approved its share of the project estimated at a total cost of \$1,146,000.

Last week's action by the waterways commission apparently was in answer to a letter from the state health department, received by the City of East Tawas, which objected to provisions in an engineering study concerning an evaluation of the possible effect of the proposed extension of the dock could have on water quality at the city's water filtration plant intake.

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

### May Establish Farm Wheat Allotment

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for the 1976 crop of wheat acreage from farms that did not have a 1975 allotment if they meet eligibility requirements, Harold Cnolger of the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee announced Friday.

A 1976 wheat allotment will be established automatically for most farms that had a wheat allotment in 1975.

To be eligible for a new farm allotment, the operator must expect to receive more than 50 percent of his income from farming. Neither the owner or an operator may have an interest in any other farm which has a 1976 wheat allotment and the person making application must have had at least one year production experience in a prior year.

Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the county office on or before July 1, 1975. Any interested producer who can meet these requirements should contact the county office before the final date for filing an application.



resubmitted later and again lost on a tie vote. The 16th proposal, calling for 9.29 mills for schools, 4.54 mills for the county, .27 of a mill for the intermediate district and .90 of a mill for townships, also ended in a tie vote.

The allocation board had delayed its meeting until Friday in order to receive the new state equalized valuation from the state tax commission. The county was equalized at \$172,041,197 in May, but the new valuation is \$188,843,871, as prescribed by the state tax commission.

Isoco was one of only three counties in the state which made a point with the tax commission during a hearing two weeks ago. As the result of protesting a proposed factor on personal property, that category was reduced by \$900,000.

Real estate valuation as brought in by assessing officers was \$141,875,953. The county added factors to a number of units when it equalized real estate at \$153,131,-

964 and the state added \$28,058,685 to bring the real estate total to \$169,934,638.

Personal property was assessed at \$18,840,813 and the county equalized personal property at \$18,909,233, the same figure used by the state.

The board of education accepted the report for study and authorized purchase of a lot at the corner of First Street and Tenth Avenue in Tawas City for the site of next term's building trades house.

In other business, James Papefus, athletic director, reported that he had heard nothing further on the proposed breakup of the Northern B Conference and believed that all contracts for 1975-76 sports would be honored. The board of education adopted a tentative athletic budget for the next term and new additions are to be considered at a later date.

Supt. Edward J. Barry reported that Peoples State Bank had waived the normal one percent

penalty charge for retiring the 19-70 bond issue for financing construction of the school track. This bond issue was repaid through receipts from football games and the fund had acquired more than the amount needed to retire the remaining \$10,000 owed on the track. New bleachers were purchased with the balance, leaving nearly \$2,000 to be spent on other improvements to athletic facilities.

No action was taken on a proposal by Barry to finance purchase of two new school buses through a three-year financing program with the bank. Cost of the new buses, which were originally ordered three years ago and were never delivered until recently, is \$23,000. The board is to make its final decision at the next meeting.

Prin. John Alexander reported that 105 students had enrolled in the driver education program this summer, but that 145 students were eligible for the program. The school has two cars under arrangements with local dealers and Alexander hopes to acquire a third car, perhaps through purchase by the school.

Ray L. VanHorn, vocational director, reported that the school has \$8,000 remaining in its funds received from the state which must be expended before the end of the school year. He recommended that equipment for the office practice program be purchased with the remainder.

Harold Knight of East Tawas was hired as the school's auditor for 1975-76.

It was reported by Robert McDonald, middle school principal, that CETA funds would not be available next term to rehire a librarian during the afternoon. Because of the improvements in library usage during the second semester since the CETA employee was hired, McDonald asked that consideration be given to hiring an afternoon librarian as a regular member of the school staff.

The board of education granted a two-month leave of absence to Debra Coffman, secretary in the community education program, to complete her freshman year in college. The approval was subject to a recommendation from the school's negotiator, Thomas Basil.

# Commission Has Month to Make Decision

## Iosco May Join Other Counties in Challenging State Valuation

Iosco County has backed off on its plan to challenge a 10 percent hike in its state equalized valuation, but may join other Northern Michigan counties in a combined action through the new state tax tribunal.

This was the word late Wednesday afternoon as the Iosco County Board of Commissioners weighed its chances of successfully defending its own SEV total before the state tax tribunal, which has only acted on appeals from individuals and has yet to act on its first valuation appeal from a county.

As a result, the county board of commissioners told the tax allocation board to use the state's higher valuation figure during deliberations Friday on the final split of 15 mills of allocated taxes to schools, the county and townships.

The immediate effect will be that the 10 percent SEV increase from the state will be spread at large across the entire county, based on each unit's percentage of the county total. The end result will mean higher taxes than previously anticipated for individual property owners.

This increase will be in addition to the over-all five percent hike in county valuation which was adopted last May when the county board of commissioners adopted its equalization report.

In taking this action, the county board of commissioners said, however, it had 30 days to perfect an appeal and will contact other counties to determine if it should join in a combined action against the tax commission. The Counties of Clinton, Emmett, McComb and Montmorency have indicated they would protest proposed SEV increases through the tax tribunal.

A number of factors led the county board of commissioners to reach this action, but the principal reason was that three of the county's four school districts would be the losers, regardless if the challenge was won or lost before the state tax tribunal.

The problem was further complicated by the fact that had the county decided to go with its own valuation figure and then lost its case, taxpayers could have had a double assessment the following year. Because of the length of time expected for the tax tribunal to reach a decision—at least seven months—the time for preparing 1975 tax statements would have passed and an adjustment would have been required the following year.

The most disturbing factor of all in this controversy over state equalized valuation is that 1964 legislation designed to standardize property assessment procedures throughout the state has apparently not proven effective.

Besides the requirement that all taxes were to be assessed at 100 percent of the state equalized valuation, or 50 percent of true cash value, effective in 1966, the law required counties to establish tax equalization departments by 1967. Later legislation required that local assessors were to use the state approved manual for assessing and that assessing officers were to be certified by the state.

While all of the above requirements have eliminated annual arguments in Iosco County over which local units were assessing properly, the same old argument over assessment procedures and property appraisals used from county-to-county, which has been around for more than 100 years, again has raised its ugly head.

In explaining his position on a possible appeal of the SEV hike, Robin Allain, county tax equalization director, said he really could not argue with the state tax commission on the higher state equalized valuation—the valuation is here, according to findings of local sales studies conducted by the state.

In addition, the county may have placed itself in a poor position to appeal when it admitted its equalization was based on a 45 percent assessment ratio rather than the 50 percent recommendation by the state, regardless of its apparent good reasons for challenging the state sales study conducted locally.

Allain pointed out to the board of commissioners that while Iosco County was checked very thoroughly last year by state tax commission crews, the state has failed to conduct a sales study in many other counties to check on appraisal methods being used in those counties.

And, despite all of the legislation over the past 10 years, Allain declared that equalization procedures were not standardized throughout the state. He backed up this statement by using the state's own 1975 report which indicated that 13 counties had not submitted annual sales studies and 26 counties had submitted only partial studies. In addition, he noted inconsistencies between counties and the state in using one, two and three-year sales studies.

One northern area county which did not submit a sales study and was not checked by the state was hit by only a five percent increase in its state equalized valuation. Another larger county below Tawline 16 did not submit an annual sales study and only received a six percent increase.

"Another county to the north of us submits a sales study every other year and it is accepted—the state tax commission is just not consistent from county-to-county and there is no standardization for gathering sales data,"

said Allain.

The county tax equalization director said that, in order to perfect an appeal, he would have to visit many different counties to determine if appraisal and assessment procedures were standardized. An additional load would be placed on the county prosecutor's office to perfect an appeal.

While valuation increases in Arenac and Ogemaw, along with other area counties, are at or nearly equal the 87 percent increase tacked on Iosco's SEV during the past five years, Wayne County's valuation during the same period is up only 24 percent and the average valuation of counties in the state has increased 47 percent.

Despite the usual argument from the tax commission that local units set individual tax rates and the tax rate can be lowered when the SEV is increased, uniformity in assessment procedures is necessary because the state aid formula for schools is affected. Increasingly higher property valuations in Northern Michigan has

resulted in a loss in state aid to those schools, while school districts with larger populations have benefited.

In view of all the problems which can be encountered in perfecting an appeal, Robert Foster, chairman of the county board of commissioners, expressed the belief Wednesday that the board should wait for 30 days before taking any action.

The problem may not end there as some local units may appeal the county's final valuation and individual property owners, whose property was assessed at 50 percent of the true cash value, could appeal the increase.

Allain said there is a stipulation in the state tax law that a property owner must appeal his assessment to the board of review in his local unit before going to the state tax tribunal. Allain pointed out, however, that action of the state came after meetings of the board of review and he was not certain what effect this might have on an appeal.

## County Accepts Federal Grants for T. Area Water Expansion

Iosco County Board of Commissioners formally adopted a resolution Wednesday accepting federal grants totaling \$960,000 to provide water service and install three water storage tanks to serve industrial parks in the Tawas area.

During a ceremony before officials of Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township, Robert Foster, chairman of the county

board of commissioners, affixed his signature to the applications.

The federal money represents a direct grant of \$720,000 from the Economic Development Administration and \$240,000 from the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission. Remainder of the \$1,802,000 project cost is to be furnished by the three local units of government.

After the original contact by Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City joined with the township in seeking the grant. Edmands Engineering Company of Bay City was hired as the consultant to develop the plan.

Despite numerous delays since 1972 due to the unavailability of federal funds, followed by numerous meetings with EDA officials and governmental leaders, the United States Department of Commerce announced on May 23 that the grant had been approved.

The project is to furnish water to industrial sites being developed in the Tawas area to attract light manufacturing plants which can provide year around jobs for workers in Iosco County and communities in the surrounding counties of Arenac, Ogemaw and Alcona.

County, city and township officials are working with the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation in making long range plans for development of the communities.

Additional manufacturing sites will help to expand food processing associated with farming in the

area and to attract industries related to gypsum mining, according to the application.

### JoAnn J. Hatcher Received Honors

JoAnn Jean Hatcher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. James Hatcher of Tawas City, was numbered among those receiving the Beta Honors recognition at Charles Stewart Mott Community College, Flint.

Members of the Beta Honor Society are those freshmen who have completed at least 28 hours of work in two semesters at the college and have achieved at least a 3.5 grade point average.

James Collison, representing EDA, told the delegation present to witness the ceremony that culmination of a successful grant was the "most enjoyable part of his business."

He said that his interest in the project extended back more than five years, when Baldwin Township approached him when he was regional director of EDA.

Collison expressed the opinion that it was remarkable that four local units of government—the township, two cities and the county—were able to join forces to overcome the many hurdles necessary to achieve their goal. He paid particular tribute to the local leaders participating.



## Be Consistent With Name in SS Reporting

**Question:** My social security record is in my maiden name and I was recently married. I have always heard that a woman should change her name with social security when she gets married, but I plan to continue using my maiden name for business and legal purposes. Which name should I use for social security?

**Answer:** It depends on which name you use in your employment. If you plan to consistently use your maiden name for your employment, you do not have to change your name for social security purposes. Just be sure that your employers report your earnings to social security under your maiden name, not your married name.

**Question:** We have a grown son who has been severely disabled since he was born. I know he can get social security benefits when my husband retires next year, but I am only 58.

**Answer:** A wife can get monthly benefits on her husband's record regardless of her age if she is car-

ing for a son or daughter who is under 18 or who became disabled before age 22 and remains disabled. Call or write any social security office for more information.

**Question:** My neighbor is severely disabled so it is very difficult for her to do any housework. She cannot afford to hire someone because her only income is a supplemental security income payment. Is there some place she can get help?

**Answer:** States provide social services to people getting supplemental security income payments. These services can include help with household chores, meal preparation, laundry and marketing. Tell your neighbor to contact your

local public assistance office for more information.


