## State-Federal Purchase of River Studied

Michigan's management and budget department is trying to find 12.5-million-dollars as its share of a joint program with the federal government to purchase 50,000 acres of choice recreational land in Northern Michigan owned by Consumers Power Company.

If negotiations are completed with the power company, the state and federal government probably would split the property on a 50-50 basis. Consumers Power Company made the offer in November and Gov. William Milliken revealed Wednesday that negotiations were being held with the power company on the 25-million-dollar land deal.

Included in the sale would be frontage along the AuSable and Manistee Rivers, which was purchased in the early 1900s for hydroelectric development. Total frontage under negotiation is about 350 miles.

A news report from Lansing stated that the utility has had a dismal financial showing recently and needs cash. About 15 years ago, the utility studied the possibility of turning the river frontage over to the state, but federal legislation prevented abandonment of the company's five hydroelectric dams on the AuSable River until 1993 under a federal power license.

It is understood locally that the hydroelectric dams would not be included in the proposed land deal. Charles Smith, supervisor of Oscoda Township, said that the company's land and personal property in that township had a total assessment of approximately \$10,000,000 and Consumers pays property taxes of approximately \$250,000 annually to Oscoda.

eral election. The four successful candidates take over offices on January 1.

At stake in the general election will be three council seats and the office of mayor. All positions are non-partisan.

Filing his nominating petition Tuesday afternoon for the office of mayor was Arthur Ziehl, who will oppose Herbert Cholger, who filed his petition last week.

Candidates filing for seats on the council, listed in alphabetical order, are Benjamin Brewer, Jerry Cotter, Lyle E. Healey, Mrs. Bobbie Ann Kehoe, Charles Landon and Robert N. Rollin. Brewer filed his petition Tuesday afternoon and the others had filed last week.

Two weeks ago, Mayor John N. Bruggen announced that he would not seek re-election, as did Ald. Clark Tanner and Ald. Edward Savage.

A spirited campaign appears to be shaping up for the general election. A group called Tawas Concerned Citizens has endorsed Cholger, Rollin, Healey and Mrs. Kehoe.

The citizens group was organized earlier this spring following a controversy at council meetings over establishment of special assessment districts to finance sanitary sewer construction.

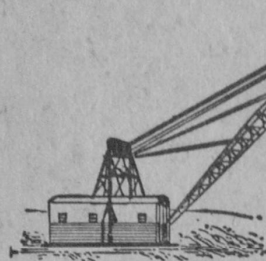
Rollin, the lone incumbent to file, was first elected in 1971. After the new city charter went into effect in January 1972, all seats on the city council were declared vacant due to confusion over the length of terms. Rollin was re-elected in 1973.

Cholger, who was associated for many years with his father and brother in the operation of a service station and garage, is an insurance salesman. Mrs. Kehoe is a housewife and Healey is employed as a truck driver.

Two of the candidates formerly held city offices. Ziehl served on the city council from April 1980 to May 1985, while Brewer was elected supervisor in 1968 and served until 1972 when that position was abolished under the new charter.

Cotter, former city attorney and presently associated with Jefferson Trucking, was elected to the charter commission in 1970 and served as chairman during the one year of its existence. Landon, an employee of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, is a member of the Tawas City Park Board.

## Fatal Injuries Received in Collision

Charles C. Martin, 63, an employee of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, received fatal injuries shortly before 8:00 a. m. Monday in a grinding collision involving a truck and two automobiles at the intersection of Oak Street and Lake Street, Tawas City.

Officers said that after being struck from the rear, Martin's car was pushed headon into the car driven by Zimmerman, who was traveling west on Lake Street toward his office in Tawas City.

The truck unit proceeded in an easterly direction, jack knifed and came to rest in the wreckage of the two passenger cars on the

The sheriff's department said Tuesday that the truck driver was unable to recall what happened at the time of the crash. He was not held. Officers were to interview Zimmerman at the hospital Tuesday afternoon.

Funeral services for Mr. Martin are to be held Thursday, June 19, 2:00 p. m., from Tawas United Methodist Church. The Rev. Kenneth Tousley is to officiate and burial is to be in Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas. The body is at Moffatt-Kobs Funeral Home, East Tawas.

Born January 9, 1912, at Montrose, Colorado, he was married December 25, 1936, at East Tawas to the former Lillian Sedgeman. He was employed by the D&M for 21 years and served as chief clerk of car service. He was a member of the church choir of Tawas United Methodist Church and was past noble grand of Baldwin Lodge No. 377, Independent Order of Oddfellows. He served as secretary of the organization. He was the legislative representative for the Brotherhood of Railway-Airline Clerks.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Charles William Martin of Flushing; three grandchildren; one brother, Robert of Detroit.

Martin, who was thrown out of his car in the collision, was taken to Tawas Hospital for emergency treatment and died of his injuries later after being rushed to Mercy Hospital, Bay City.

Both automobiles were completely demolished in the crash and Zimmerman was pinned in the wreckage for several minutes before officers were able to remove him.

The Tawas City Fire Department was called to the scene when diesel fuel from the tractor unit leaked onto the pavement.

## Tentative Approval by Local Units for Water Financing

Tentative acceptance of a plan to finance the local share of a \$1,802,000 project to expand water facilities in the Tawas area has been reached by city councils of the Tawas and Baldwin Township Board.

Presentations on the plan were made Monday night by Mayor John N. Bruggen of Tawas City and Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas. The plan was explained last week to Baldwin Township Board by Sup. Richter Lixey.

This program is the culmination of nearly four years of efforts by local officials working with federal, state and county agencies, along with advice from two engineering firms.

Two weeks ago, the county board of commissioners formally adopted a resolution accepting federal grants totaling \$960,000 for the project. The federal money represents a direct grant of \$720,000 from the Economic Development Administration and \$240,000 from the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission.

The project is to provide expansion of water mains in the three communities as well as the installation of three water storage tanks to serve industrial parks in Baldwin Township and Tawas City and for water storage at East Tawas.

The plan being proposed by the chief executive officers of the three local units of government calls for establishment of special tax millage and a new water use

rate to finance the local share. It is expected that not more than one mill of taxes will be required and consideration is being given to a low-interest FHA loan to finance the project.

A professional firm may be hired to develop a new rate structure for retiring a revenue bond issue and a report is to be made in the near future to the two city councils and township board for consideration.

Mayor Bruggen and Mayor Bolen explained to the two city councils Monday night that, inasmuch as the project was aimed at economic development in the area, it was felt that financing through increased water rates alone would place too much of a burden on household and other small water users.

For this reason, it is believed that one-half of the cost should be borne by property taxpayers as it would be the fairest way to spread the cost among the three communities involved.

The two mayors said that expansion of the industrial and commercial tax base would result from the water expansion program and this would have a strong economic impact on the area. At the same time, a reasonable water rate would not discourage development of industrial and commercial users.

It was pointed out, too, that senior citizens can recover a portion of tax payments through income tax rebates. In addition,

property owners of Baldwin Township, which are to benefit from the new water main constructed to the industrial park, would receive a direct benefit.

Because of the potential development in Baldwin Township, it is expected that the millage rate would be reduced in a few years as that area develops with new water users. Construction of lateral mains in Baldwin Township, along with fire hydrants, would be financed through special assessment districts.

Mayor Bruggen emphasized that the people of Baldwin Township should not be penalized because of the industrial park in that unit. He

said that the industrial park benefits the entire Tawas area, as well as Iosco and adjoining counties. "As they pick up users in Baldwin Township, it will apply to the fixed cost of operation," said Bruggen.

It was reported by Mayor Bruggen that efforts are being made to standardize water rates in all three communities. In addition, a special higher rate schedule may be developed for public buildings in lieu of not paying taxes. Such buildings would include the county building, city halls, hospital and schools.

"We should end up with a water schedule that will be quite favorable to all concerned," said Mayor Bruggen.

## ET Studies Boat Launching Site

Development of a boat launching ramp and parking lot on property presently occupied by the East Tawas city garage is being investigated by city officials and representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Cost of the project is estimated at approximately \$200,000, but replacement of the city garage would cost around \$150,000 and city officials believe construction of a

new garage should be considered in the over-all program.

As a possible alternative to removal of the city garage, it was suggested that sheet piling be installed in the bottom of Tawas Bay and the area filled for a parking lot.

A study is to be conducted by the Michigan Waterways Commission and city officials.

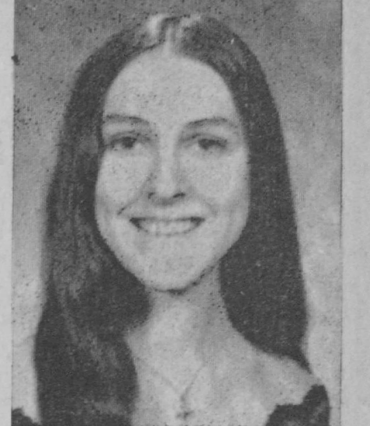

 complaints were received by the council concerning flooding conditions which result annually during

heavy rain storms. A Huron Street property owner said that Sunday's storm resulted in extreme flooding in that area. The city is to study the situation along Huron Street and study the possibility of diverting storm water. One of the prob-

lems being faced by the city, however, is that sanitary sewers are overtaxed by heavy rains.

Tawas Area Promotions, Incorporated, was granted permission to close a number of streets each day during the Michigan Tourist Festival, June 27-29, for bike racing events. The racing program is to be held on the same streets used last year and TAPS representatives are to assist city workmen in installing barricades.

Bernard Nelkie was present and requested that the surface of State Street be included in resurfacing plans for 1975. The request was referred to the department of public works.

The council adopted a resolution requesting the board of commissioners to retain Ronald Turner in the employ of the tax equalization department. This position was created under CETA, which is due to expire soon. Turner serves as city assessor in addition to his work with the county. The city is to study the possibility of a joint assessor to serve East Tawas, Tawas City and Baldwin Township.

A special meeting of the tax board of review is to be held Thursday night to give direction to W. C. Roach, city assessor, concerning appraisal and assessing of property. City Clerk Clyde Soper said that a considerable amount of undeveloped acreage and street frontage in the city was under assessed, according to sales studies.

The council revised its 1975-76 budget following receipt of the new state equalized valuation figures. Because of higher valuation, the appropriations ordinance was reduced to 12 mills. Total general fund expenditures for the next year are budgeted at \$268,870.47.

The council accepted a preliminary plat of Eastland Subdivision No. 1, which is to be located on city property along Airport Road. The property has been divided into 11 lots.

Mayor Robert Bolen urged the street and sidewalk committee to study development of a new sidewalk program for the city. The city had considered the use of federal funds for this project, but the program was dropped when the federal program was vetoed recently by President Ford.

**Garbage Contract Goes to Houghton**

A three-year contract with Leon Houghton for garbage disposal was accepted Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Total annual cost for commercial and residential collection is to be \$12,248.

A second bid was entered by Joseph Kendall of Sand Lake. His combined cost for residential and commercial collections was \$19,060.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that Houghton desired a five-year contract with the city, but the city manager advised against such action. Bublitz said that a contract of that length would not be satisfactory in the long run to either the contractor or the city.

As in past contracts, the new agreement allows for additional payment when new houses are constructed and commercial users are added. A breakdown of Houghton's total cost of \$12,248 shows \$5,200 for commercial and \$7,048 for residential.

In other business, Lyle Healey appeared before the council to oppose establishment of a city building authority which was discussed several weeks ago. It was reported that no action had been taken as yet to develop a building authority for consideration of the council. Should the plan be developed, public hearings would be required prior to any action by the council.

On recommendation of the sheriff's department, a right-hand-turn only sign is to be placed at the city ramp leading from the parking lot behind Keiser's Variety Store at the Lake Street entrance. There have been several auto accidents there in recent years and it was felt that controlling the direction of traffic leading onto Lake Street would be more suitable than reducing parking spaces.

A letter from John C. Solomon, secretary of Tawas Concerned Citizens, asked the council to study angle parking on the east side of First Street north of the Lake Street intersection. The letter claimed that a hazardous condition existed because of the angle parking there and recommended that parallel parking be required.

On recommendation of Mayor John Brugger, the council went on record opposing legislation aimed at requiring elective and appointive officials from revealing personal finances. The mayor and members of the council expressed the opinion that it was unfair to require low-paid city and county officials to reveal such confidential information.

Although city officials said legislation is being sponsored by people with good intent, it was felt that such a plan would not develop "Utopian government." Councilmen and the mayor said the requirement to disclose personal finances of elected and appointed officials, as well as immediate families, would tend to discourage participation in small government.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that in order to arrange a preapplication grant meeting with representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the council would have to make some decision on projects prior to the July 1 deadline.

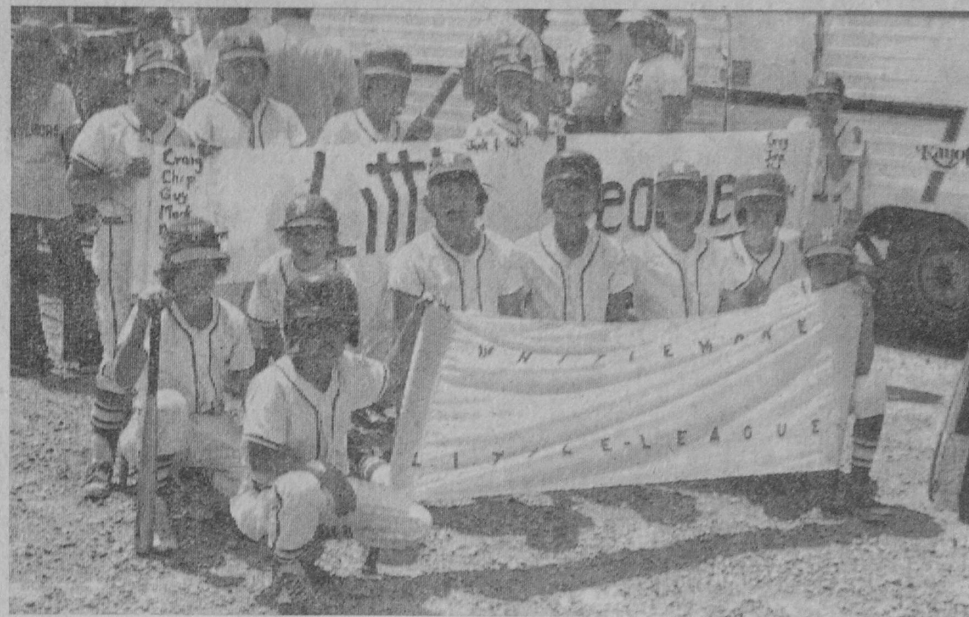
The council has been considering a grant to assist with the expansion of the city park through purchase of the Babcock property as

part of an off-street parking plan discussed for the Bergeron and Prescott property. This plan, along with one recommended by Ald. Robert N. Rollin to use the area west of the park for vehicular parking, is being studied by the city planning commission.

Rollin said that the Tawas Concerned Citizens group opposes purchase of the Babcock property and stated its objection in a letter to the DNR. He said he had received assurances from DNR officials that the state would not participate in a property purchase program.

Bublitz is to prepare the necessary forms outlining tentative plans for both parking proposals for study by the council at its next meeting.

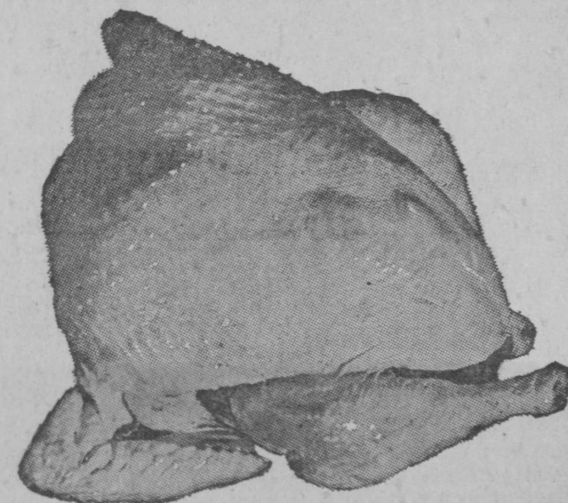

Guidelines for selection include an educator's talents in the classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities, civic service and professional recognition.



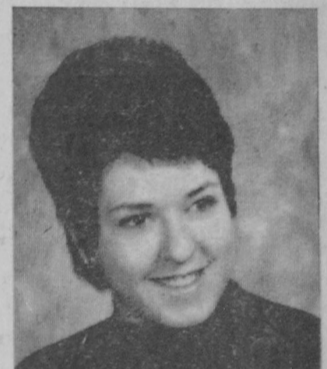

## Continuance of CETA Program A Question Before Congress

Federal CETA programs which have hired 76 unemployed Iosco residents since last December are currently in a state of limbo, unless congress develops a new program to replace the one which expires July 31.

John Peltó, CETA coordinator for Iosco County, said Thursday that his office was sending letters to all persons employed under Title Six of the federal CETA program that their jobs would be terminated July 31. He said that the 19 Title Two jobs had been extended from August 1 to June 30, 1976.

Two weeks ago, a presidential veto of an expanded program to cope with the current high unemployment rate was upheld by congress. Included in that bill was a Title 10 program, designed to expand public works programs, which proved unsatisfactory to congress.

The Title 10 program was mentioned at the June 2 meeting of the Tawas City Council as a possible vehicle to finance small scale public works programs in this city. A meeting was to have been held between Peltó and city officials to consider making an ap-

plication for funds, but was canceled after the presidential veto.

"At this point, we do not know what is going to happen to Title Six funding. Hopefully, congress will fund the program through a new bill, but what is going to happen is anybody's guess," said Peltó.

The two CETA programs have pumped \$319,000 into the economy of Iosco County since last December, including wages of \$287,000. The 76 CETA employees hired under the two programs have been paid an average hourly wage of \$3.

Units participating in the program expiring July 31 are as follows:

Tawas Area School, one visiting teacher and one middle school librarian; Whittemore-Prescott Area School, one physical education instructor; Oscoda Area School, two laundry matrons; Hale Area School, special education aide and vocational counselor;

Michigan Department of Natural Resources, seven rangers and three laborers at Tawas Point State Park; Oscoda Township, three utility workers; AuSable Township, clerk-typist;

City of East Tawas, utility worker; Burleigh Township, utility

worker; Grant Township, utility worker; Alabaster Township, utility worker; Senior Citizens Council, three drivers, a center aide, outreach worker, kitchen aide, cook; City of Tawas City, apprentice appraiser, meter man; Sherman Township, utility worker; Iosco County Parks and Recreation, two utility workers; Michigan Employment Security Commission, personnel technician; Cornty of Iosco, program administrator and appraisal clerk; Iosco County Medical Care Facility, ombudsman, ward clerk and general clerk;

Iosco Sheriff's Department, four assistant jailers, one animal control officer; NEMROC Sheltered Workshop, aide; 23rd District Court, clerk-stenographer.

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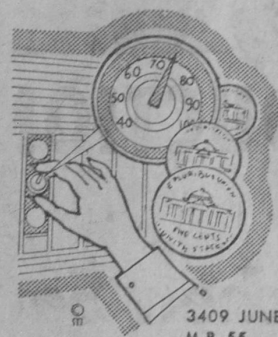

## Supplemental Income Can be Received by the Blind

Question: I am going to apply for supplemental security income. My son, who is 16, is blind. Would he be eligible for payments, too?

Answer: He may be. Supplemental security income payments can be made to a blind or disabled child, or to someone on a child's behalf. The child should apply for payments, or if he is unable to do so, you should apply in his behalf.

Question: I did not work long enough under social security to be eligible for medicare hospital insurance, so I am buying this protection with monthly premiums. Is the premium amount going to go up?

Answer: Yes. Starting July 1, your basic premium rate for medicare hospital insurance will go from \$36 to \$40 a month. The premium rate is based on the average monthly medicare hospital insurance payment for patients

who have the protection. The increase is due to rising hospital costs.

Question: I have been getting monthly social security benefits on my father's record and I started college last fall. Will my payments stop during summer vacation?

Answer: You can continue to get social security payments during your vacation provided that it is not more than four months. But you must have been a full-time student before the vacation period, you must plan to continue full-time after the vacation and you must remain unmarried.

Question: Before my mother died, she had been getting monthly social security widow's payments on my father's earnings record. She had never worked in a job covered by social security. I just finished paying all her funeral expenses. Can I get a lump sum death payment from social security?

Answer: No, you are not entitled to a lump sum death benefit because your mother was getting monthly social security payments on your father's earnings record. The lump sum death benefit is only payable when the person who dies worked long enough in a job covered by social security.

Building inspectors are now requiring that structural lumber be grade-marked in compliance with the rules implementing the State Construction Code Act. This has become a problem to some sawmill operators whose production volumes are insufficient to justify hiring a certified softwood lumber inspector.

A meeting will be held Wednesday June 25, 7:30 p. m., at Grayling City Hall to provide concerned people (sawmill operators, builders, building inspectors) with answers to questions about the act and grade marking services.

The program will consist of representatives of the State Construction Code Commission and one or more organizations which provide grade marking services.

mid-day. They will stay more crisp. Use a sharp knife or shears to cut the flowers. Dull scissors or a dull knife is likely to crush the stem together. That limits the amount of water the flowers can get. Take a bucket of warm water—about 110 degrees—to the garden. Put in the flowers as they are cut and let them stay in the water two hours before they are arranged. If they cannot be arranged after the two hour wait, then cover them—container and all—with a plastic bag and put them in the refrigerator. There is no need to change the warm water. When arranging the flowers, pick a clean container or vase and wash it before putting the flowers in it. Bacteria left from the last flowers can grow in the base. Then, the bacteria can clog the water tubes in the fresh flowers and cause the flowers to wilt before they should. The most unusual—but effective—flower preservatives are "Sprite" and "7-Up." The citric acid and carbonation in the soft drinks control the development of microorganisms that can block water-conducting vessels of rose stems and reduce firmness. Sugar in the soft drinks sustains life. Michigan State University horticulturists recommend mixing one part water with each part soft drink and adding a half teaspoon of chlorine bleach to each quart of solution. The bleach cuts bacterial growth. As a standard procedure, registration of all bookmobile users will be required. Every effort will be made to obtain requested materials not immediately available. # Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners

IOSCO COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS SPECIAL MEETING

June 11, 1975

A special meeting having been called by the chairman of the board for the purpose of taking action with respect to establishment of Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2, AuSable Township, and the issuance of bonds therefor, and notice of said special meeting having been posted more than 12 hours prior thereto pursuant to statute, the meeting was called to order by Chairman Foster at 9:50 a. m. and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: None

Attorney Kenneth Myles addressed the board on behalf of AuSable Township, explaining that, although resolutions were adopted by the board on October 8, 1974, approving establishment of the aforementioned water supply system, the contract and the issuance of bonds therefor, bids received and other projected costs exceeded financing available through the Farmers Home Administration (FHA), thus necessitating that the project be re-initiated after gaining approval for expanded financing. He further explained the urgency requiring a special meeting of the board, indicating that bids have already been taken and that there is a problem with lead time for required publications etc., and that waiting for the next regular board meeting would delay the program by about four weeks. Continuing, Myles advised that the full faith and credit of AuSable Township is being pledged as security for the bonds and that said bonds will not be an obligation of the county.

Prosecuting Attorney Ronald Tyler reported as to his examination of the proposed resolutions and contract, indicating them to be in order.

It was indicated by Mr. Myles in the ensuing discussion that all costs of this proceeding, together with the costs of publication therefor, would be borne by the project and paid from the proceeds of the sale of bonds.

Commissioner Burdett thereupon presented the following resolution, moving its adoption; motion being supported by Griffin and carried on the following roll call: Ayes: Foster, Griffin, Burdett, Fox and Wereley. Nays: None.

## RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING IOSCO COUNTY WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM NO. 2 (AU SABLE TOWNSHIP) AND APPROVING CONTRACT THEREFOR

Be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of Iosco County, Michigan, as follows:

1. That the Board of Commissioners of Iosco County, Michigan, does hereby approve the establishment of a water supply system in the Township of AuSable in said county, to be known as "Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township)," for the supply of water in the district hereinafter described, said system to consist generally of wells, valves, hydrants, pump house, master meters, together with all necessary appurtenances, attachments, equipment works, instrumentalities, rights in land and properties used or useful in connection with the collection and supply of water in the area comprising said district as hereinafter described.

2. That the contract for the construction, financing, operation and maintenance of said Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township), negotiated by and between the Township of AuSable and the Iosco County Department of Public Works acting for and on behalf of said county under the terms of Act 185, Public Acts of 1957, as amended, is hereby approved and shall be executed as therein provided.

3. That said Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township), and the area to be served thereby, to be known as Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township), shall encompass the following territory:

Municipality: Township of AuSable  
Area to be served: Township of AuSable

Mrs. Burdett then presented the bond resolution for the project, moving its adoption; motion being supported by Griffin and carried on the following roll call: Ayes: Foster, Griffin, Burdett, Fox and Wereley. Nays: None.

## BOND RESOLUTION

A resolution providing for the issuance of bonds to defray the cost of acquiring and constructing a water supply system in the County of Iosco to service the Township of AuSable in said county; providing for the payment and security of said bonds; and providing for other matters relative to said bonds and the security therefor.

### Bond Resolution

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO DEFRAY THE COST OF ACQUIRING AND CONSTRUCTING A WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM IN THE COUNTY OF IOSCO TO SERVICE THE TOWNSHIP OF AU SABLE IN SAID COUNTY; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT AND SECURITY OF SAID BONDS; AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID BONDS AND THE SECURITY THEREFOR.

WHEREAS, the County of Iosco, Michigan, acting by and through its Board of Commissioners and pursuant to the authority conferred upon it by Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, did, by resolution duly adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members-elect of said Board of Commissioners establish a Department of Public Works in and for the County of Iosco for the administration of the powers conferred upon the County by said Act; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authorization of Section 2 of said Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, a Board of Public Works has been appointed and is functioning as the governing body of said Department of Public Works; and

WHEREAS, the County, by and through its Board of Public Works, and the Township of AuSable have entered into a contract for the construction, financing, operation and maintenance of a water supply system in the Township of AuSable in said County known as "Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township)" to provide water supply service for the Township of AuSable, which said contract is herein set forth in full and made a part of this resolution, as follows:

WHEREAS, said contract has been duly approved by resolution of the Board of Public Works, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Iosco, and the Township Board of the Township of AuSable, and have been fully executed by all the parties thereto; and

WHEREAS, plans, specifications and estimates of cost of the water improvements comprising the extensions to be constructed have been prepared by R. W. Petrie and Associates, Inc., consulting engineers of Benton Harbor, Michigan, and have been duly approved by the Board of Public Works; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of said contract, the Township of AuSable has obligated itself to pay that part of the cost of said improvements to be financed by the issuance of bonds of the County by paying the installments, plus interest, as specified in paragraph 10 of said contract, and has further obligated itself to levy taxes annually to the extent necessary for the purpose of meeting said installments, which taxes are without limitation as to rate or amount, all as provided in paragraph 11 of said contract; and

WHEREAS, the County now proposes to issue its bonds, as authorized by said Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, in anticipation of and secured solely by said contractual obligations of the Township of AuSable to provide the necessary funds to pay the cost of constructing said improvements and all things necessary to the authorization and issuance of said bonds under said Act 185 having been done and the County of Iosco being now empowered and desirous of authorizing the issuance of said bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Public Works has approved this resolution and recommended its adoption by the Board of Commissioners of Iosco County.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF IOSCO COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Wherever used in this resolution or the bonds to be issued hereunder, except where otherwise indicated by the context:

(a) The term "County" shall be construed to mean the County of Iosco, Michigan.

(b) The term "Township" shall be construed to mean the Township of AuSable, Iosco County, Michigan.

(c) The term "Board" shall be

construed to mean the Board of Public Works of the County of Iosco, Michigan.

(d) The term "System" shall be construed to mean the Iosco County Water Supply System No. 2 (AuSable Township).

(e) The term "Project" shall be construed to mean the water supply facilities consisting of wells, valves, hydrants, pump house, master meters, mains, attachments, appurtenances, equipment and rights in land comprising the System as described in the contract set forth in the preamble to this resolution.

(f) The term "Contract" shall be construed to mean the contract made and executed between the County and the Township as set forth in the preamble to this resolution.

(g) The term "Contractual Payments" shall be construed to mean the debt service installment payments required to be made by the Township to the Board pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 10 of the Contract and pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds authorized by the provisions of this resolution.

(h) The term "Government" shall be construed to mean the United States of America.

Section 2. The plans, specifications and estimates for the Project as prepared by R. W. Petrie and Associates, Inc., consulting engineers of Benton Harbor, Michigan, are hereby accepted and approved, and it is hereby determined to be advisable and necessary for the public health of the County to acquire, construct and complete said Project as provided in said plans and specifications.

Section 3. The Contract as set forth in full in the preamble hereto is hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Section 4. The total estimated cost of acquiring and constructing the Project, including payment of incidental expenses as specified in Section 6 of this resolution, which total estimated cost is \$875,000.00, is hereby approved and confirmed.

Section 5. The estimated period of usefulness of the Project is determined to be not less than fifty (50) years.

Section 6. For the purpose of defraying the cost of the Project, including payment of engineering, legal and financing expenses, there be borrowed the sum of \$875,000.00, and in evidence thereof be issued the bonds of the County in an equivalent aggregate principal amount, which bonds are sometimes hereinafter referred to in this resolution as the "Bonds."

Section 7. Said Bonds shall be designated IOSCO COUNTY WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM NO. 2 (AU SABLE TOWNSHIP) BONDS, the principal of and interest thereon to be payable solely out of the Contractual Payments required to be paid by the Township pursuant to the Contract, and shall consist of one hundred seventy-five (175) bonds of the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 175, all dated as of the date of delivery thereof, and payable serially as follows:

- \$10,000 February 1, 1977;
- \$25,000 February 1st of each year from 1978 to 1984, inclusive;
- \$30,000 February 1st of each year from 1985 to 1991, inclusive;
- \$20,000 February 1st of each year from 1992 to 2015, inclusive.

The Bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, payable on February 1, 1976, and semi-annually thereafter on August 1st and February 1st of each year. Provided, if the bonds are not delivered prior to February 1, 1976, then interest shall be first payable August 1, 1976, and semi-annually thereafter.

Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at Oscoda State Savings Bank, Oscoda, Michigan, or, at the option of the holder, at a bank or trust company located in the City of Bay City, Michigan, to be designated by an original purchaser of the bonds, with approval of the County. Bonds may be registered as to principal only or as to principal and interest. In the case of fully registered Bonds, payment of interest shall be made to the registered holder at the address shown on the registration books of the County.

Bonds maturing in the years 1977 to 1985, inclusive, will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing in the years 1986 to 2015, inclusive, will be subject to redemption prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order, at the option of the County on any interest payment date on or after February 1, 1985, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption.

Thirty days' notice of the call of any Bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds, and in case of registered Bonds, thirty days' notice shall be given by mail to the registered holder at the registered address. No publication shall be necessary if all Bonds of the issue are registered. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said Bonds.

The Bonds and coupons will be payable to bearer, or, at the option of the purchaser, the Bonds may be registered as to principal only or registered as to principal and interest on the books of the County kept for that purpose by the County Treasurer upon presentation thereof, which registration shall be noted thereon by the County Treasurer and the interest coupons, if attached thereto, shall be removed by the County Treasurer, after which no transfer shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted on the Bonds. No charge shall be made for registration.

Transferability by delivery may be restored at the expense of the holder by registration to bearer, and in the case of Bonds registered as to interest, attachment of unmatured interest coupons or surrender of the Bond and issuance of a new coupon Bond.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and the County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute said Bonds when issued and sold for and on behalf of the County and to affix the seal of the County thereon and to execute the interest coupons to be attached to said Bonds by causing their facsimile signatures to be affixed thereto. Upon the execution of said Bonds and the attached coupons, the same shall be delivered to the County Treasurer of Iosco County, who is hereby authorized and directed to deliver said Bonds to the purchaser as hereafter determined by the Board upon receipt of the purchase price therefor.

Section 9. Said Bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable solely from the Contractual Payments received by the Board on behalf of the County, for the payment of which the Township in the Contract has pledged its full faith and credit pursuant to the provisions of Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 6, Article IX of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, the Township has covenanted and agreed to levy taxes annually to the extent necessary to provide the funds to meet the Contractual Payments when due in anticipation of which the Bonds are issued, which taxes are without limitation as to rate or amount. All of such Contractual Payments are hereby pledged solely and only for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds. Said Bonds will not be a general obligation of Iosco County.

Section 10. The Treasurer of the County shall be custodian of all funds of the County belonging to or associated with the Project, and such funds shall be deposited in Oscoda State Savings Bank, Oscoda, Michigan, a bank insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. In the event that the Government is a holder of any of the Bonds herein authorized, all moneys in excess of \$30,000.00 in the supervised bank account shall be secured by the depository bank in advance in accordance with the United States Treasury Department Circular No. 176 and the County Treasurer shall be covered by a fidelity bond in an amount not less than \$80,000.00 with a surety company approved by the Government and the United States and the County shall be named as co-obligees in such bond, and the amount thereof shall not be reduced without the prior written consent of the Government.

Section 11. It shall be the duty of the Board after the adoption of this resolution and the sale of the Bonds herein authorized to open a special depository account with a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, hereafter referred to as the "Depository Bank," to be designated DEBT RETIREMENT FUND - IOSCO COUNTY WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM NO. 2 herein sometimes referred to as the "Debt Retirement Fund," into which account the Board shall deposit all Contractual Payments as received, including moneys paid for deposit into the Bond Reserve Account created by paragraph 10 of the Contract. The moneys from time to time on hand in said Debt Retirement Fund, including the Bond Reserve Account, shall be used solely and only for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds.

Section 12. The operation, maintenance and administration of the Project, and the acquisition and construction thereof, shall be under the overall jurisdiction and control of the Board as the agency

of the County. The provisions in the Contract relative to the leasing of the Project to the Township and the operation, maintenance and administration thereof are hereby recognized, approved and confirmed. The provisions of the Contract making operation of the Project subject to the loan agreement with the Farmers Home Administration, so long as the Government is holder of any of the Bonds, are also hereby recognized, approved and confirmed.

Section 13. Said Bonds and the coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

Section 16. The provisions of this resolution, together with the Contract, shall constitute a contract between the County and the holder or holders of the Bonds from time to time, and after the issuance of such Bonds, no change, variation or alteration of the provisions of this resolution and the Contract may be made which would lessen the security for the Bonds. Not later than three (3) months after the end of each year, the Board shall cause to be prepared a statement, in reasonable detail, sworn to by its chief accounting officer, showing the application of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds, the cash receipts from the Contractual Payments or advanced by the County during such year and the application thereof, and such other information as may be necessary to enable any taxpayer or any holder or owner of the Bonds, or any one acting in their behalf, to be fully informed as to all matters pertaining to the construction of the Project and application of funds therefor or for the payment of the Bonds during such year. A certified copy of said statement shall be filed with the County Clerk of the County of Iosco and the Township Clerk of the Township of AuSable and a copy shall also be sent to the manager or managers of the account purchasing the Bonds and the Farmers Home Administration, as long as the Government is holder of any of the Bonds authorized herein.

Section 18. The Board is hereby designated, for and on behalf of the County, to (a) prepare and submit application to the Municipal Finance Commission for its approval of the issuance of said Bonds; (b) privately negotiate the sale of the bonds to the Farmers Home Administration at a price equal to the par amount of the bonds at a rate or rates of interest not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum; and (c) do all other acts and take all other necessary procedures required to effectuate the sale, issuance and delivery of the bonds.

Section 19. If at any time it shall appear to the Government that the County is able to refund upon call for redemption or with consent of the Government the then outstanding Bonds by obtaining a loan for such purposes from re-

sponsible cooperative or private credit sources, at reasonable rates and terms for loans for similar purposes and period of time, the County will, upon request of the Government, apply for and accept such loan in sufficient amount to repay the Government, and will take all such actions as may be required in connection with such loans.

Section 20. All resolutions and parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this resolution are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

Section 21. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.
