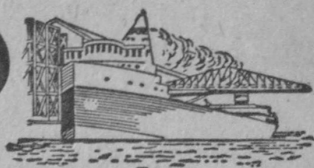

Council Tables Parking Plan; Mayor to Get More Information

Tawas City Council voted six to one Monday night to table action for further study on a special assessment parking district proposed by Mayor John N. Brugger. The lone vote against tabling the action was cast by the mayor.

As the result of discussion between city officials, property owners in the proposed parking district and other interested citizens, Mayor Brugger said he would have a sketch prepared of property involved, obtain the cost of development for property owners involved and present a comprehensive plan at the next council meeting.

The mayor received only minimal support from property owners within the proposed district and citizens attending the meeting, although councilmen and some citizens present expressed a desire to know more about the proposal before any final action is taken.

At its meeting a week ago, the mayor presented a program to create a new special tax assessment district to finance and develop a parking lot-office complex west of the county building. The council tabled action on a purchase agreement which the mayor had obtained for purchase of property from Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron, as well as an option he had obtained with Mr. and Mrs. George Prescott for purchase of their property.

It was the mayor's idea to remove an old dwelling on the Bergeron property and convert it into a parking lot. Under his plan, the Prescott property would be traded to Carl Babcock and his brother, Brent, for construction of additional parking and a new building to house the Iosco Abstract Office, an attorney's office and other offices.

In return for the Prescott property, the present site of the Babcock office buildings, located directly across Lake Street from the proposed new site, would be used for expansion of the city park.

Ald. Robert N. Rollin expressed the opinion that more time should be allowed to make a long-range study of the mayor's proposal and that the city planning commission should be actively involved. The program under consideration had developed following a meeting of the planning commission and the commission only last week endorsed the project.

Rollin felt, too, that it was un-

wise to have the city involved in a property exchange, that the Babcocks should purchase the Prescott property if they were interested in it as a location for their offices. After such a transaction had taken place, he said that the city could then take a look at purchase of the Babcock property for purposes of expanding the city park.

Harold Moeller, a property owner in the proposed district, said he had parking to serve his building and was not interested in the proposed new parking lot. Del Myles,

who owns the present post office building, said he had just returned from Florida and was not fully acquainted with the proposal, although he said he was not in favor of the project at the present.

Several property owners not located in the proposed district voiced opposition to the plan. Mrs. Virginia DePotty, owner of Coyle's Restaurant, pointed out that she had purchased property to provide parking at her establishment. Jerry Snoblen, motel owner, expressed the opinion that more people should be involved in the planning, that any participation by the city in providing parking would be unfair to the people at large, that removal of buildings for parking would mean a loss in tax assessments and that adequate parking was presently provided in that area at the parking lane along the city park.

Richard Powers, a resident of East Tawas and owner of an office building on Lake Street south of the river bridge, expressed the opinion that "people were getting fed up with spending of tax money by the city council." It was his opinion that buildings on the bay side of Lake Street should be removed, should any parking plan be considered.

In explaining his program, Brugger said he had contacted the Bergerons and had obtained a purchase agreement in order to discuss with the council the feasibility of a special assessment district from Whittemore Street to the county building. He said it was his plan to have the city act as a vehicle to develop a parking lot, but the cost would be borne basically by the property owners in that district.

He said that it was his hope that the Babcock property could be purchased, with possible assistance from the state, to prevent any future capital improvements to that property, which would only increase the cost to the city for future park expansion.

"If this program is good for community development, it would seem that now is the time to do it," said Brugger.

The mayor felt that development of parking would benefit adjoining property owners as well as the city at large. He said the community was at a point in time when a move would have to be made to provide additional off-

Supt. Barry's Contract Not Renewed

Tawas Area Board of Education voted Monday night not to renew Supt. Edward J. Barry's contract at the end of the 1974-75 school term. Action on the resolution was unanimous.

No discussion was held on the resolution by board members prior to the vote. Following an executive session preceding a regular meeting about a month ago, it had been rumored that Barry's contract would not be renewed.

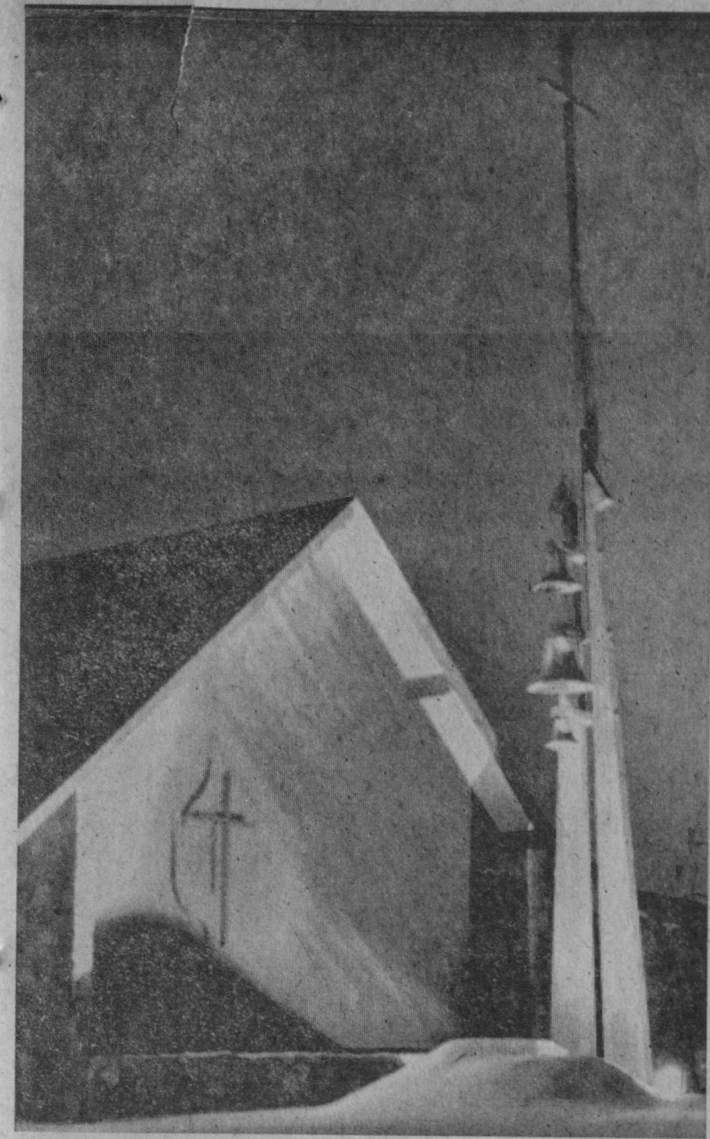
Contacted after the meeting, Barry said he "had no statement to make at this time."

Barry took over the administrative reins of Tawas Area School District in July 1972, succeeding Supt. Reynold Mick, who had served the district since reorganization in 1953.

He had served two years as superintendent of Lakeview Community Schools before coming to Tawas Area. Prior to that he had been superintendent for five years at Vestaburg Community School and spent one year as superintendent of Beal City Schools.

Barry attended Atlanta High School and graduated in 1952. He received his bachelor degree in education at Central Michigan University in 1956, followed by a master degree in educational administration from CMU in 1962. He received his advanced degree in educational administration from Michigan State University in 1969.

Barry and his wife, Marilyn, are parents of four children. Mrs. Barry is a teacher in the middle school.

Tawas United Methodist Church will celebrate the completion of its new building, located at M-55 and Fifth Avenue, Tawas City, Sunday, March 16. The celebration will begin with the consecration service of worship at 10:30 a. m. The Rev. Dr. Ralph Janka, Saginaw Bay District superintendent, and the Rev. Dr. John Mulder, administrative assistant to Bishop Dwight Loder, will be guests for this service.

Following the consecration service, members of the building committee will be honored with a dinner in appreciation of their untiring efforts. Members of the building committee include Howard Burdett, chairman; Virginia Ingalls, secretary; Howard Durant, treasurer; Phyllis Alexander, Allen Chisholm, Harold Knight, William Lyon, Carl Schaaf, Shirley Thornton, Myron Trafelet, Eber Wetzel, Francis Halstead and the Rev. Kenneth Tousey, pastor.

Through the efforts of this committee, the new Tawas United Methodist Church became a reality. The community is invited to attend the open house between the hours of 2:00 and 5:00 p. m.

Architect throughout this project has been Gordon Merritt of the firm, Merritt, Cole and McCallum, Farmington. General contractor has been Davison and Son Builders of the Tawas, with Clarence Michalski serving as project superintendent.

Six long-time members of the congregation were honored Sunday, March 9, during the closing service at the East Tawas church. Among those honored was Miss Kate Dease, who has been a member for 70 years. A rose on the al-

was a long-time active member of the congregation.

Construction of the new church was brought about through a merger of United Methodist Churches of the Tawas in 1968. Originally organized with east and west parishes, the final service was held at the Tawas City church in July 1973. Services have been held since that time at East Tawas.

Following the church merger, a fund raising campaign was commenced for construction of a new building. Preliminary plans were approved by the United Methodist Conference in the spring of 1973 and ground was broken during the Easter sunrise service in April 1974.

The new church of brick and masonry construction has a 300-seat sanctuary with an overflow area in the fellowship room, a nursery, office and youth center.

Exposed beams and natural finish wood feature the decor in the sanctuary. Leaded stained glass windows formerly located in the East Tawas church have been revamped and incorporated into the design of the new church.

A new Rodgers church organ was recently installed and will be heard by the congregation for the first time during the consecration service.

The Methodist Church has a long history in the religious life of the community. Methodists organized the first Sunday School of this county at East Tawas in 1866 and the building which closed Sunday had served as a house of worship for more than 100 years. The former Tawas City church building was constructed in 1873.

Carraway Gets Prison Term on Drug Count

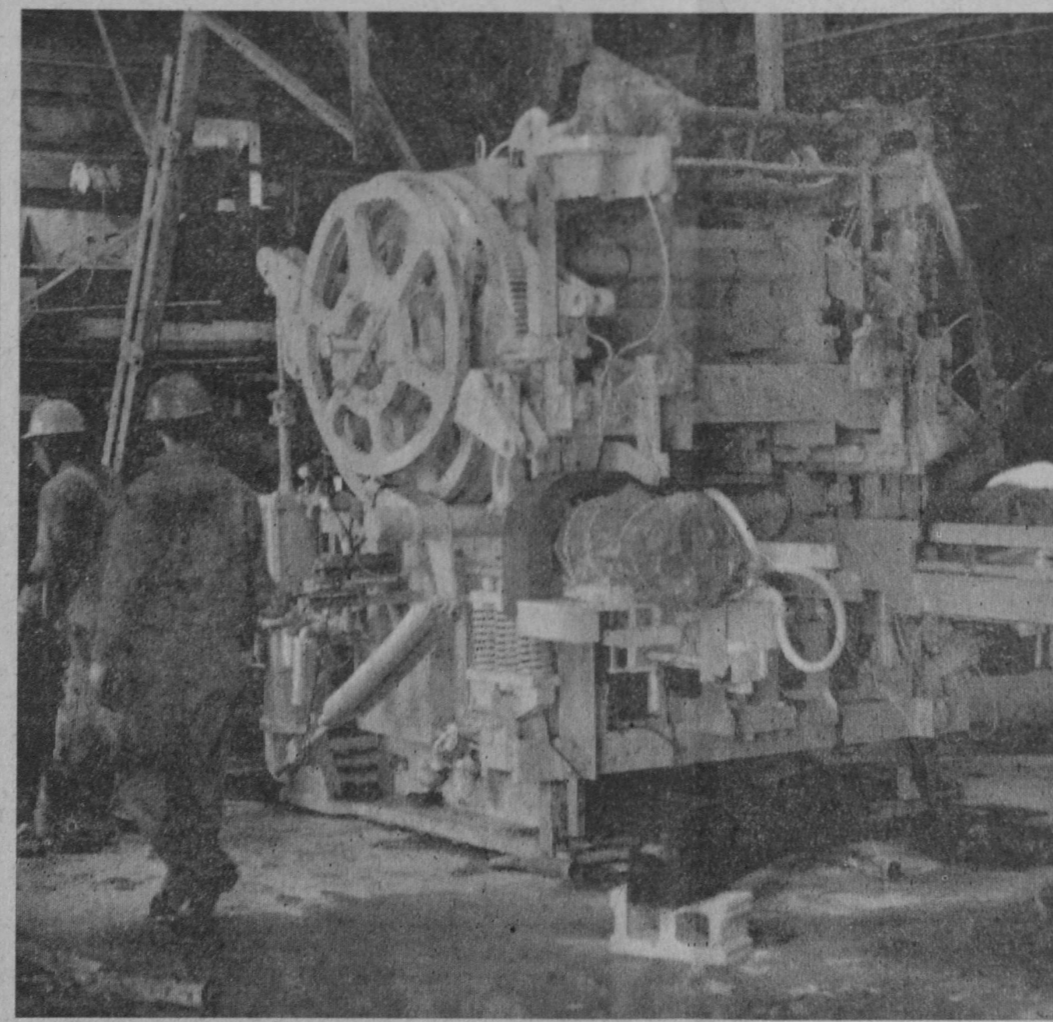
Ronald Carraway, 23, Royal Oak, one of three prisoners who escaped from the Iosco County Jail on February 19 and was later recaptured, was sentenced Friday to serve a three to seven-year prison term for sale of narcotics.

Carraway had been convicted by an Iosco Circuit Court jury in February and was arrested a year ago at Oscoda.

Steven Jozifik of Oscoda, who also escaped from jail and was later recaptured, is to be arraigned in justice court on a charge of receiving stolen property.

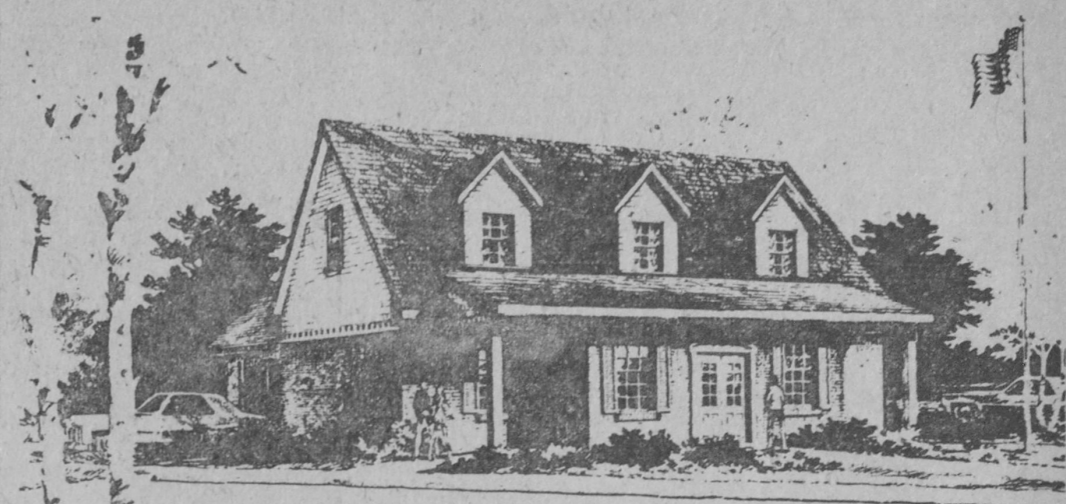
The third escapee, Lance Niebel, 24, Royal Oak, is still at large.

Frank Kohler, a trustee at the jail serving a one-year term since July 26, 1974, for violation of the controlled substance act, has been charged with aiding and abetting the escape of felons from the jail. Maximum penalty upon conviction is seven years in prison.

Oscoda Branch Approved for Peoples State Bank

Peoples State Bank of East Tawas has received approval from the state banking commission to open a branch office at Oscoda. John Lippert, president, announced Monday that construction would begin immediately.

The new branch, to be located at 5077 US-23 and called the Oscoda-Wurtsmith branch, is to be open for business about Labor Day.

The bank building will be a 3,000-foot, story-and-a-half structure of Williamsburg design and will

offer complete banking service. It will feature four inside teller stations and four ultra modern pneumatic outside driveup stations with capability of stacking 30 cars.

There will also be an after hours walkup window, a new innovation for the Oscoda area. In addition, the bank will offer safety deposit boxes and full trust service.

According to Lippert, maximum emphasis has been placed on landscaping to create an attractive environment for bank customers.

Richard M. Lee, vice president and cashier of Peoples State Bank, has been named manager of the Oscoda branch. Lee joined the bank in 1959 and was named vice president in 1969. He is a graduate of Oscoda High School and the University of Wisconsin Graduate School of Banking.

Lee is married to the former Audrey Olson and they have two children, Karen, 20, and Brian, 17. The family resides at 612 East State Street, East Tawas.

Tuition Cost Zooms at Hale After Loss of State Aid Money

Hale Area School has received word from the state department of education concerning the annual rate of payment which that school is to charge nonresident tuition students for the 1974-75 term. Supt. Wayne Case said that parents of 16 tuition students would be shocked when they receive their bills in the mail this week.

According to the computerized tabulation by the state, Hale Area's tuition charge for elementary students advanced from \$57 last year to a minimum of \$92 this term; the charge for secondary students advanced from \$49 to a minimum of \$161.

This drastic increase in the rate of tuition to be paid by parents of nonresident students has been caused by the fact that Hale Area School no longer receives any state membership aid and the entire operational cost of the school is borne by taxpayers of the school district. The district is beyond the maximum rate allowed for prop-

erty valuation behind each child under the state formula and receives no state aid money.

Case said Wednesday that he had notified parents of tuition students last fall that an increase could be expected, but he did not realize that the increase would be so drastic.

The department of education computes tuition payments for each school by subtracting state membership aid, state transportation money and salaries received by the board of education from the school's annual budget. This figure is then divided by the number of students to reach a per capita cost for tuition students. This usually results in a tuition rate which is actually too low, in comparison to the actual cost to taxpayers, but when a school does not receive state membership aid, the tuition payment apparently zooms out of sight.

"I think the cost is very unfair," said Case, who pointed out that the

charge to one family with three children would increase from approximately \$150 to \$3,000.

He said he was not sure as to the exact route the school could take in the matter, as any deviation from the state figure could result in a reduction in transportation received from the state, or the school could be cited for non-compliance with state regulations.

Case told members of the board of education Monday night that he was contacting the department of education for further information and he is to consult with the school's attorney.

In other business conducted at Monday night's board of education meeting, the superintendent announced that the school had been approved to receive federal funds to assist with purchase of equipment for the school lunch program. The school has been authorized to spend up to \$8,000 for equipment and receive reimbursement of \$6,000 from federal funds.

Case said that the school was planning to purchase a vehicle to replace a horse trailer which was presently used to transport food between high school and elementary school cafeterias and to replace a dishwasher at the elementary unit.

Local Officials Get Hearing With EDA

Persistence by local officials on a project of long standing and of the utmost importance to the future of the Tawas and surrounding area is taking another step forward.

Flying to Chicago, Illinois, for a meeting Thursday, March 20, with Economic Development Administration officials will be representatives of Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation, the Iosco Board of Commissioners, mayors of the Tawas, the supervisor of Baldwin Township, a representative of Tawas Chamber of Commerce and consulting engineers

hired by the communities involved.

Local officials will be attending a preapplication hearing with the EDA on a federal grant to aid in financing much-needed expansion of water facilities to serve industrial parks in the area.

This \$1,700,000 project has been in the planning stage since June 1972. Hopes for a successful application have been dashed in the past when EDA funds were impounded during a federal fiscal crisis, but the program has again been funded and local officials believe that this application has a good chance for passage.

The local project, formulated by Edmonds Engineering Company of Bay City, seeks federal participation in the amount of 60 percent of the total cost. In addition, assurances have been given that the Upper Great Lakes Regional Development Administration will contribute \$350,000 to the program, leaving 20 percent of the project to be financed by the local area.

This plan calls for construction of water storage facilities in East Tawas, Tawas City and Baldwin Township, along with water main construction in the Tawas and a line running to the industrial park

Charged With Burglary Attempt

Keith J. Faust, 44, Bay City, was charged with attempted breaking and entering March 3 after being apprehended by a Plainfield Township resident and later arrested by the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Officers said that a resident noticed a vehicle parked on Vaughn Road at the John Wick cottage. He investigated and found Faust in an open breezeway.

Attempts had been made to pry open a window in the cottage.

Old Anshuetz School Razed by Blaze

The former Anshuetz School on Kobs Road in Tawas Township, owned by Russell Nelkie, burned to the ground Saturday night. The Tawas City Fire Department was called to the scene, but fire had broken through the roof of the one-story frame building before the fire department was notified.

The blaze was investigated by the Iosco Sheriff's Department. The building was not in use and electrical power had been disconnected for some time.

During investigation at the scene, a gasoline filler cap was stolen from a sheriff's department patrol car. Two Pinconning men were later arrested after their vehicle missed the curve at Fourth Street and Sixth Avenue in Tawas City. The two men had been at the fire scene and the missing cap was found in the car. One person in the vehicle later admitted the theft.

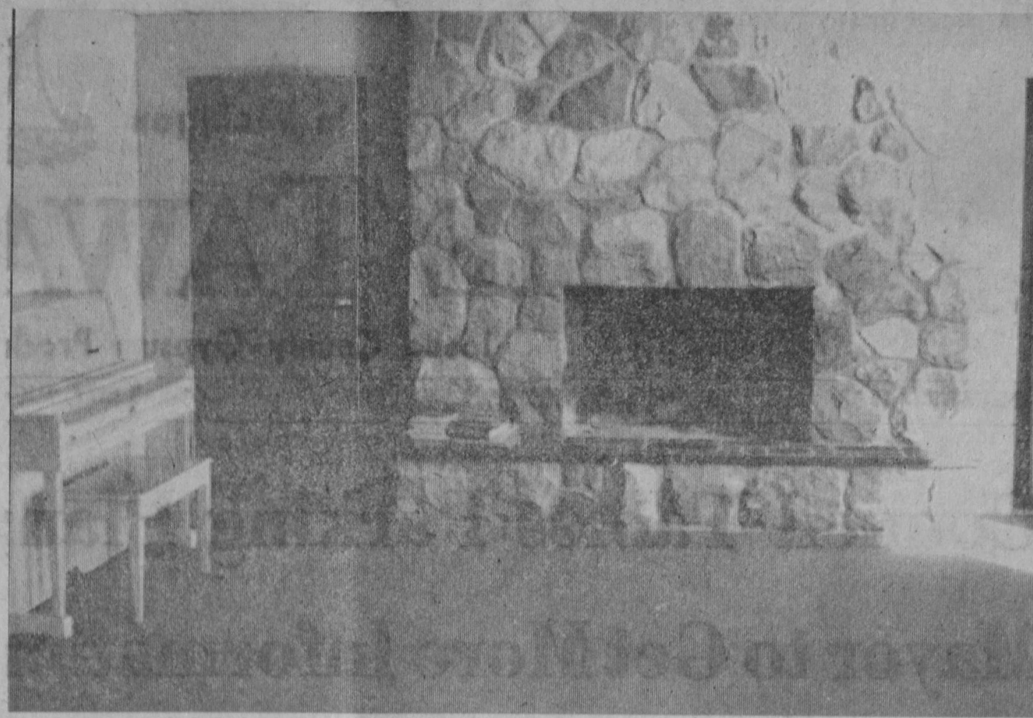

School Makes 4th Try With CETA

Tawas Area School will make a fourth try at obtaining federal CETA funds being administered by the county board of commissioners.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told members of the board of education Monday night that he had been notified that regulations prohibited the hiring of a permanent substitute teacher with CETA funds, as requested by the school district.

As a result, the school is to change the classification of the teacher already hired as a permanent substitute to one which will complement areas of special need in enlarged classes.

Barry said it was his hope that the new classification would meet the requirement as he did not want to see the school lose its participation in the program.

In other business, the superintendent recommended that the board of education take no action on a resolution normally passed at this time of year to notify teachers of possible release from contracts due to a lack of funds. He said that school operational millage approved by voters was in effect for one more term and administrators would make recommendations concerning the hiring of new teachers at the next meeting.

Tenure was granted to three teachers at the meeting. Included were Mary Wajda, second grade teacher at the East Tawas Elementary Unit; Harry Cook, fifth grade reading, and Cathy Grienke, kindergarten teacher, both at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

A request of payment of \$135 for physical examinations for students participating in the special education olympics was approved.

Herman Rollin, elementary principal, announced that he had received a check Friday night in the amount of \$1,266, which represents the school's share of the concession stand operated during the recent Perchville Festival. The money is to be used in the purchase of playground equipment at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

The board of education authorized an expenditure of \$694 as payment for burglary insurance at

the three school buildings, including the high school, the two elementary units and the administration office.

The board of education authorized a payroll deduction plan for members of the staff interested in participating in a life insurance program. The superintendent reported that 75 percent of the staff had entered the program, the cost of which is to be borne entirely by the participants.

The board of education authorized Prin. John Alexander to exceed his budget for expendable teaching supplies. Alexander said he had reviewed this account and found that the high school had been invoiced for numerous teaching supplies which were being shared with the middle school. He said that as a result of billing procedures, the high school appeared to have exceeded its budget in this category by \$6,100, but had found \$6,316 worth of materials which had been credited to the high school rather than to the middle school.

Alexander reported that the school band had qualified to participate in the state festival following its performance in the district festival held here. He said this was the only band trip being planned this term.

Robert H. Crawford reported that he expected the school would receive a 20 to 25 percent increase in federal title one funds this year, based on the allocation which has been announced for Isosco Intermediate School District. He said that the school's program for 1975-76 was to be completed by April 28.

Authorization was given to Gene Gerber, director of community education, to purchase two movie projectors and a duplicating machine from funds received through conducting a high school completion program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

James Lansky, student council representative, announced that students had raised \$500 for muscular dystrophy through a program conducted last week at the school. Miss Amy Savage, student council representative, reported that wooden electrical spools had been donated to the school and would be painted to serve as tables in the court area at the high school building. She said that the student council was now planning a tree planting program for the school grounds.

Building Inspector Position Open

Isosco Board of Commissioners has authorized applications to be taken for the position of inspector to enforce the state building code and the soil erosion act.

Applicants must have at least five years of experience in the building construction field.

The commission accepted a bid of \$1,845 submitted by Eckstein Construction Company, Tawas City, for construction of a building to house the sheriff's department radio transmitter.

Due to the lack of funds, the commission turned down a request from the county extension agent for printing of a county hospitality guide and a request from the soil conservation district for publication of its annual report in newspaper supplement form.

street parking, stating that removal of parking on Lake Street (US-23) by the state highway department was a distinct possibility, although there had been no indication as yet of a state directive to that end.

The mayor said that chances now appear excellent that a regional concept for water expansion involving East Tawas, Baldwin Township and Tawas City would receive federal assistance. He said this would mean that the area north of East Tawas to the industrial park would be open to commercial development and that Tawas City would have to compete with that area and other areas for development.

He believed his proposal was only the first step toward development of off street parking in the city and that the next step would be to develop parking in the area between Mathews Street and Whittemore Street. He said this, too, should be handled through establishment of a special assessment district and that it would be up to the city council to establish the city's share, if any, in any of the proposed parking districts.

The mayor pointed out that his plan was similar to that now being developed at Oscoda to provide off street parking before the state removes all parking on US-23 in that community effective June 1.

In answer to a question concerning possible condemnation of the Babcock property for city park use, the mayor said experience has shown that the purchase price under circuit court condemnation usually results in an increased purchase cost. It was his opinion that should they desire to do so, the Babcocks would have a legal right to develop offices at their present location and use existing parking.

Damage Suits Filed in Isosco

Two damage suits involving the Isosco County Road Commission were filed last week in circuit court.

Ward G. Drexel of Oscoda seeks \$100,000 damages against the road commission, Oscoda Township and John Gilardino concerning a dispute over land in Oscoda Township.

Drexel, who claims he has owned the property since July 8, 1966, said in his petition that the defendants had unlawfully excavated his land for installation of a sewer main to serve Gilardino's property. He said the defendants did not have a right-of-way or easement across his property.

Drexel's petition said that the defendant's claim to his property constituted a cloud on his title and demanded that he be adjudged the owner of the land.

Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City, instituted a suit against Clark Equipment Company of Oscoda, the Isosco Road Commission and the Maryland Casualty Company for the balance of \$17,450 owed on construction of roads, storm sewers, curb and gutters.

Investigate Two Isosco Burglaries

Two breakings and enterings were investigated Wednesday by the Isosco Sheriff's Department.

in Baldwin Township. It also includes a 12-inch main to connect Tawas City with East Tawas' water filtration plant.

Of prime importance in the plan is the water main to serve manufacturing plants in the Baldwin Township industrial park, which provides employment for more than 300 persons. Only recently, the IDC lost the possible location of a new plant there because of the lack of adequate water facilities. Water storage in the three locations is also of prime importance and the 12-inch main connecting the Tawas would supplement the present six-inch main, which is inadequate during times of peak demand.

Need for this grant has been well documented by the engineering consultants and local officials will be called on to answer many questions expected at the meeting.

Following input by Cong. Philip Ruppe last year, local representatives held a preliminary meeting with EDA officials last fall.

As one local official put it: "At least we now have our foot in the door and EDA has the funds. Many communities will be competing for this federal money, but our chances appear excellent."

Stone pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 20 days in jail, was assessed fine, costs and damages of \$257 and was placed on probation for six months. He lost his deer hunting privileges for three years.

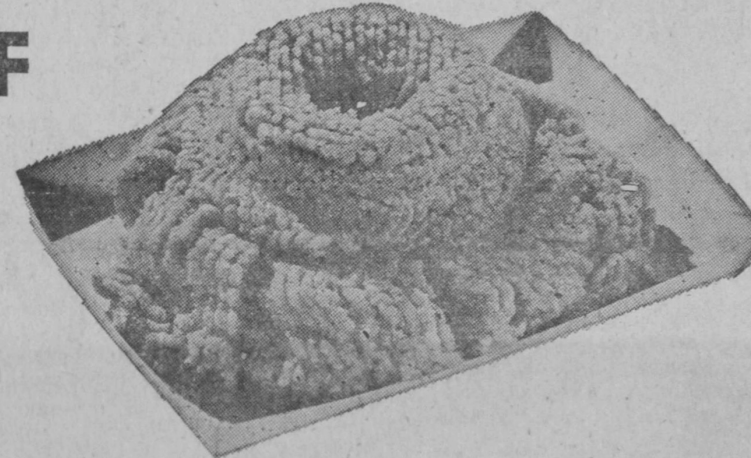

Seek School Aid Amendment Considering Income Level

The Northern Michigan Association of School Administrators, unanimously voted to support an amendment to the state school aid law which would take into

Would Benefit Northern Area

consideration the income level of people within a school district as well as the value of their property.

State Sen. Robert Davis and State Rep. Daniel Stevens have agreed to introduce legislation before the house of representatives and the senate which would use an income level adjust factor in determining additional state aid to school districts where the family income is below the state level, according to Raymond Kesler, superintendent of Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

Simply stated, the proposed legislation would provide \$5 per child in additional revenue for every \$100 a school district is below the state average in family income.

"The problem is that, under the present system, people living in a given area of the state may be paying taxes based upon a high state-equalized property valuation without any regard to their earning power or ability to pay," states Kesler.

The problem has become more evident in recent years because of the tremendous influx of downstate buyers, earning high incomes, who have paid inflated

prices for property causing the "on paper" value of all local property to increase. In some cases, these valuation increases have gone up 1,000 percent or more," he stated.

The above situation cited by Kesler has been very noticeable in Iosco County, particularly in the sales of timber cutover (recreational hunting land), along with frontage on inland lakes and Lake Huron.

While sale prices had advanced steadily over the years on agricultural lands, hunting lands and lakefront cottages, prices have skyrocketed during the past three or four years. Many persons who have owned such property for years and desire to retain ownership say now they cannot afford to pay property taxes, which increase each year as assessments are based on sales.

Inflated sales have also hit older residential dwellings, particularly in cases where persons with above-average retirement benefits moved to this area and have paid, apparently without any hesitation, highly-inflated prices for older homes which were once a drug on the market.

As a result, assessments on all older homes have been adjusted upward to keep pace with sales, as required by the state tax commission. Property owners of Tawas City, for instance, will find this out when they attend current meetings of the board of review. A 17 percent factor on assessments brought by the state tax commission and spread at large over the city has been equalized by the board of review. Older homes have received the major increase, as newer residential dwellings have been assessed at or near the state equalized valuation.

The present property tax system calls for an annual equalization of property values throughout the state by the state tax commission, making the value of a home in Oakland County and the value of an equivalent home in Iosco County the same. The major purpose of this system is to provide a distribution of state school aid based upon the need of the school district.

"One factor is not considered in the above distribution plan," states Kesler, "and that is the ability of the local taxpayer to pay property taxes compared to his counterpart in higher income areas."

For instance, data provided by NMSA indicates that the per family median income in Oakland County is \$13,826, with 3.8 percent of families below the \$3,000 poverty level income; in Iosco County, 18.3 percent of the families are below the \$3,000 poverty level income and the average income of \$7,165 is \$1,769.56 below the state average of \$8,900.56.

School administrators pointed out that residents of most of their districts do not earn as much money as their downstate counterparts. "The fact is that people living in some sections of the state have to pay a much higher percentage of their income for property taxes than do others," states Kesler.

What the school may propose would be to provide extra state aid for the school districts whose residents have lower than average incomes, thus allowing the local boards of education to adjust their tax millage requests accordingly.

Based on the proposed plan which would give an allowance of \$5 per \$100 below the family income, Iosco County's 8,898 students would be eligible for another \$771,475 in state aid.

Cold Water Dangerous for Fishermen

A special danger to early-season fishermen is immersion in cold water. A person who falls into extremely cold water loses body heat rapidly and the resulting numbness in the limbs reduces the ability of even good swimmers to save themselves.

Therefore, the victim should not stay with the boat or other floating objects. He should get out of the water as soon as possible.

Here are some general fishing safety tips:

- (1) All fishermen should be able to swim, but if they cannot, they should wear an approved flotation device while fishing;
- (2) Fishermen should know first aid and how to give artificial respiration. They should also carry a first aid kit with them;
- (3) Hooks and gaffs are also dangerous. When in a boat with others, use an overhead cast to avoid snagging someone;
- (4) Carry needlenose pliers, wire cutters and a pocketknife in a tackle box to free hooks;
- (5) If someone is snagged deeply with a hook, do not risk further injury by trying to get the hook out. Instead, cut off the line, bandage the wound and seek medical attention;

(6) Learn how to hold a fish properly while extracting a hook. Many species of fish have sharp teeth, spines or fins that can cause painful wounds;

(7) Do not fish alone. Someone who does fish alone should tell someone where he is going and when he will return.

To have a second chance, he needed two pints of blood for an operation to close a hole in his heart.

Blood is the magic gift of life. There is no substitute for it. Scientists do not know how to make blood. It does not come in packages at the drugstore like soft drinks and aspirin. When people need blood, they have to depend on other people for it.

When blood is given, it only takes about an hour, although the actual blood donation takes less than 10 minutes. After answering a few questions, a person has his temperature and blood pressure taken, plus a pinprick sample to determine the iron content in his blood. Then, he lies down and about 10 minutes later is on his way to refreshment tables for fruit juice, coffee and cookies.

It is simple and it gives one a great feeling to know he is helping. The only battle scar is a little bandage strip.

For an hour of time, a person might be giving someone like Jimmy Logsdon a complete life, yet it does not cost a cent. It is the magic gift, the ultimate gift, the gift only people can provide. It is life.

Own Home And Still Get SS Supplement

Question: I am 69 and have very little income, but I own my own home. Will I have to give up my home to get supplemental security income payments?

Answer: No, you can own a home of reasonable value and still get supplemental security income and the federal government does not put a lien on your home because you get these payments. The supplemental security income program is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Question: My husband was seriously injured in an auto accident and the doctor says it will be a long time before he can go back to work. How long should he wait before he applies for social security disability payments?

Answer: He should not wait. People can miss out on some dis-

ability payments if they delay applying. Back payments can only be made for up to 12 months. Your husband can get information about applying for benefits by calling or writing any social security office.

Question: My doctor is going to send me to a laboratory for some diagnostic tests. Will my medicare pay for these tests?

Answer: Medicare medical insurance can help pay for diagnostic tests provided by some independent laboratories. Your doctor may be able to tell you whether the laboratory is certified and whether the tests are covered by medicare. You can also call or write any social security office for information.

Question: I opened my own business last year. I know I have to report my self-employment earnings and pay social security contributions on them, but when should I do this?

Answer: A report of your 1974 earnings and the social security contributions should be sent with your income tax return to the Internal Revenue Service by April 15.

Break in Weather Aided Repair of City Water Main

Mild weather last Wednesday aided greatly in repairing a water main break under the Tawas River, normally a hazardous operation at any time of the year, but particularly dangerous for workmen during the winter.

"The mild weather permitted ex-

cellent compacting of clay fill and the job was completed in about seven hours," said Reginald Bublitz, city manager.

As a result of the break in the weather, commercial and residential water users in the area south of the Tawas River bridge were inconvenienced with low water pressure for six days. A similar break five years ago required two weeks to repair.

Water service to that area was continued through a six-inch main along Ninth Avenue and two fire hoses were stretched across the river bridge between two hydrants to add more water. A new loop system is to be constructed on Ninth Avenue in the summer to provide additional water.

After discovering the break in the six-inch main on Thursday, February 27, the city crew began hauling clay the following Monday for construction of a coffer dam upstream from the Tawas River bridge.

Clay dumped into the river was compacted by a bulldozer and a 13-foot-deep trench was excavated in the river bed. The broken main was located and repairs were made with a special gasket.

The break was located at a point where the main was joined when originally constructed in 19-37. Two cast iron mains had been welded together with a brazed joint and iron around the weld had apparently become weakened.

"We were lucky that the compacting was benefited by the lack of frost in the clay and we had no water leaks in the excavation . . . I would not care to see another break of this type," said the city manager.

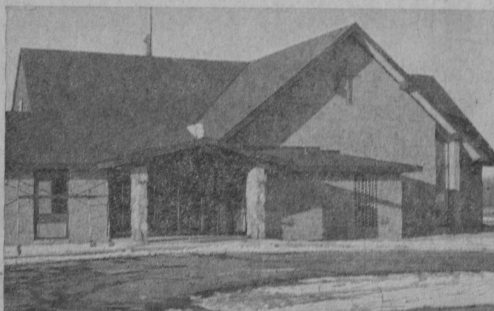

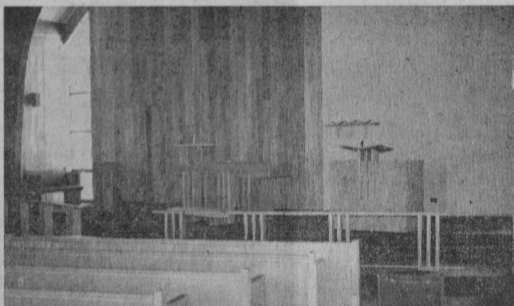
