The governor's reply to this county's resolution was that a proposed moratorium posed a number of difficulties. "By freezing any existing inequities and preventing increases in valuation in the districts with rapid increases, a moratorium contributes to inequities, said the governor.

An alternative frequently suggested, said the governor, is the reduction of the level of assessment from the 50 percent required by state law. This is more equitable than the moratorium and faces no constitutional barrier, said the governor. "However, this would require layoffs and service reductions at the local and state levels or a tax increase. In addi-




