

Retires After 45 Years With Bank

Miss Esther Look of Tawas City, an employee of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas for 45 years, retired last Friday. She had served as Tawas City branch manager and was named assistant vice president of the bank in 1974.

Joining the bank in 1930 after graduation from Tawas City High School, Miss Look first served as a teller and for a number of years was the bank's only employee under G. N. Shattuck, cashier, and L. G. McKay, president, both of whom are deceased.

During her long service with Peoples State Bank, she has witnessed a tremendous expansion in the bank's business. When she started her employment, the bank was located in the office presently occupied by Michael Freel and Thomas Huck, attorneys. Present quarters of the bank were constructed in 1950 and a number of additions have followed. Only last week the bank announced plans for a new branch at Oscoda.

Miss Look moved to the Tawas City branch office in 1961 under John Hosbach, branch manager. When Hosbach was promoted and returned to the main office, she became the branch manager.

'U-Auto-Buy-Now' Sale Being Planned

East Tawas Council Monday night approved closing Newman Street on May 22-23-24 for a "U-Auto-Buy-Now" sale being promoted by Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Appearing before the council was Roger McIntosh of McKay Sales Company, Tawas City, who said that automobile dealers were to cooperate with other merchants in a community-wide sale. He said that an antique car show was planned to generate interest.

In other business, the annual audit of the park commission's finances revealed that income at the city park was considerably higher than a year ago and that an excellent season was anticipated. Mayor Robert Bolen said that income from the park and not tax dollars had gone into expansion and improvements to the Newman Street athletic field and development of the Tom Dillon Park.

A proposal from Tawas Hospital Ambulance Service for purchase of a new ambulance was turned over to the finance committee. It is proposed to purchase an ambulance at a cost of \$13,900. The old ambulance at Hale would be accepted in trade at \$2,200. With \$6,400 on hand through the depreciation account, \$4,900 would be assessed to the various units of local government participating.

Due to objections received, the council voted to prohibit city employees from working on the election board in future elections.

Tax Collection Shows Big Drop

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reported Monday that the 14 local treasurers of Iosco County had collected 82.33 percent of the total tax levy for 1974. This compared to a collection of 85.73 percent in 1973.

From a total tax levy of \$5,324,297.29 in 1974, local treasurers returned \$929,865.08 as delinquent, or an increase of \$342,819.04 over the preceding year. The delinquent tax for 1974 involves making up 5,487 tax receipts.

Nelkie said that delinquent taxes for 1974 amounted to \$153,879.43 for the county, \$125,267.55 for townships, \$592,916.88 for schools and \$57,801.22 in special assessments.

"This large delinquency could create a financial hardship on all local units of government," said Nelkie. "We must remember that

New Controversy On City Parking

Parking in front of the Tawas City Hall has been opened to accommodate the public. This action was taken at a special council meeting Saturday afternoon called by Mayor John Brugger at the request of a nearby property owner.

However, a new move at Monday night's regular meeting by Ald. Robert N. Rollin asks the city attorney to clarify a state law, which that councilman believes could drastically change the council's action.

Rollin told councilmen that he called the fire marshal's office at

Lansing concerning parking near a fire hall. He was referred to the state police at East Tawas for a copy of the law which states that parking is prohibited "within 20 feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station within 75 feet of said entrance when properly signposted."

Rollin said he believes this means that no parking is permitted within 20 feet on either side of the lane leading from the fire hall to Lake Street. If so, it would mean that no parking would be allowed on the west side and it is doubtful if enough room would be available for parking on the east side.

Other councilmen expressed the opinion that the law specifically refers to parking at the entrance on Lake Street. Parking is now prohibited in one slot on either side of the entrance.

Great Day for Methodist Consecration

"It was just a great day with a tremendous community response and a real ecumenical spirit with people from all churches of the community represented."

This was the way the Rev. Kenneth Tousley described Sunday's consecration service and open house for the new Tawas United Methodist Church on M-55. A total of 567 persons attended the consecration service in the morning and the open house held Sunday afternoon was attended by hundreds of area residents.

"The extremely large attendance made it a most moving experience for all of us," said the pastor. The sanctuary seats 300 persons and the large crowd overflowed into the fellowship hall.

"We had experienced cold and wet weather for both the groundbreaking and cornerstone laying ceremonies held previously and Sunday's beautiful weather just made it a perfect day," said the pastor.

Celebration of the completion of the new building began with a consecration service of worship. The Rev. Dr. Ralph Janka, Saginaw Bay District superintendent, delivered the sermon, "What Do We Consecrate?" The Rev. Dr. John Mulder, administrative assistant to Bishop Dwight Loder, participated in the dedication ritual. Pastor Tousley opened the service with a prayer and conducted the Scripture lesson. The church choir, under the direction of Mrs. Harold Knight, presented several selections during the service.

Among those in attendance at the consecration service was Mrs. Irene Turbin, wife of the late pastor, the Rev. Donald Turbin. The Rev. Joseph Dibley of East Tawas was recognized during the service. Forty persons attended a dinner at Tawas Masonic Temple to honor members of the building committee. Organ music was provided during the open house by Mrs. Alden Phelps, church organist.

In order to again bring the subject up for discussion before the council, Mayor Brugger required that Rollin's motion receive support of the council. Richard Powers, who was in attendance at the meeting, attempted to present the subject to the council, but was ruled out of order by the mayor as he is not a resident.

Ald. James Lansky supported the motion and it was adopted by a voice vote. Following the discussion, Lansky, who formerly served as fire chief, said he believed the act cited by Rollin pertained only to parking at the city hall entrance.

Until action was taken Saturday, parking in front of the city hall had been limited to use by city hall customers and employees. Although no official resolution had ever been adopted limiting parking to the city hall customers, two-hour parking signs had been removed several years ago.

Designation of the lot for transient parking came at the request of Gregory Huck, owner of the former George Myles building west of the city hall. Huck said the county board of commissioners was interested in leasing his building as the new location for the district health department office. Acceptance of the lease was contingent on provision of public parking at the city hall.

Huck said he plans to develop a parking lot at the rear of his building for employees of the district health department and asked for a clarification if parking at the city hall was open to the public.

The mayor said that a letter to the county board of commissioners from Del Myles, who owns an office building east of the city hall, indicated that his parking lot would be maintained for public use. Development of property at the side and rear of the city hall for parking was discussed.

Powers, owner of a building on US-23 south of the river bridge which had served as the location of the district health office, claimed that location of the district health office in Huck's building would be in violation of the city ordinance which requires a specified number of parking spaces based on square footage of the building. He believed the city would be entering into the lease arrangement between the county and a private property owner if the council sent a letter indicating that parking at the city hall was open to the public.

Mayor Brugger said that the city was not entering any lease agreement and that the only action to be taken by the city council was to clarify if parking in front of the city hall was open to the public.

Both Rollin and Lansky expressed the opinion that the city hall parking lot could become congested if it was filled by persons visiting the district health office. They emphasized the need for keeping the ramp open for use by fire trucks and that parking was needed for city hall customers and during elections.

West Branch Man Killed in Crash; Passenger Injured

A Tawas Area School teacher was killed and another teacher was seriously injured Monday night in a crash on Tawas Point Road, 102 feet south of Baldwin Resort Road.

Dead is Karl Leslie Frosh, 23, West Branch, driver, who had been a member of the middle school staff since December. Injured and transferred to a hospital in Saginaw was John F. Bradke, 23, who was in his second year of teaching in the middle school.

Investigating Michigan State Police from East Tawas said that Frosh's car failed to negotiate a curve at the intersection of Tawas

Point Road and Baldwin Resort Road. The car went out of control, veered into the northbound lane, went off the road and struck a tree. The car glanced back on the roadway and rolled over several times.

East Tawas Fire Department was called to the scene, but no fire resulted from the crash. Officers said the driver was thrown out of the vehicle and landed in a ditch on the south side of the road. Bradke remained in the wreckage of the automobile and sustained head injuries.

Frosh was hired as a substitute teacher in December to replace

Philip Ferguson, who was injured in a crash on M-55 and later died. He was an instructor in language arts and grammar. A May 1973 graduate of Central Michigan University, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Frosh of West Branch.

Bradke is a native of Westland and taught social studies in the sixth grade.

Police said the accident occurred at approximately 10:00 p.m. The wreckage was discovered in the roadway by a student from Tawas Area School, who was driving out Tawas Point Road.

City OK's Contract With Iosco, but Plans Talk With E. Tawas

A new one-year contract for the Iosco County Sheriff's Department to provide police service was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. However, a new termination clause has been added by the council in the event that Tawas City and East Tawas should enter into an agreement for a combined police department.

Mayor John N. Brugger reported to the council that he had been requested by Mayor Robert Bolen to call a meeting between the two councils for a mutual discussion on the expansion of the East Tawas Police Department to serve Tawas City.

Brugger said that the proposal had no reflection on the service rendered to this city by the sheriff's department over the past two years, but that East Tawas has five or six persons employed in its department and wishes to broaden its program to serve both cities.

Referring to the current cooperative effort between the Tawas and Baldwin Township in an attempt to obtain federal money for expansion of needed water facilities, Brugger expressed the opinion that there should be some reciprocity on Tawas City's part to hear what East Tawas officials have to say about forming a joint police department.

Commenting briefly on the trip to Chicago, Illinois, this Thursday by local officials, who are to meet with representatives of the Economic Development Administration concerning a proposed 1.7-million-dollar federal grant for water expansion, Brugger said it appeared as though Tawas City's portion of the program would not be funded.

On recommendation of EDA officials, the city is now attempting to acquire a 40-acre parcel of land adjoining the city at the end of

Sixth Street to expand its industrial park.

The regional concept developed by the three units of local government would expand water service to the industrial park in Baldwin Township and to the industrial park in Tawas City, along with expansion of water mains in the Tawas and the provision of additional water storage.

In the event that the Tawas City portion of the program is not funded, Brugger said he had received assurances from East Tawas and Baldwin Township officials that this regional concept would be continued. Exclusion of Tawas City's portion could lower the federal grant up to \$700,000. Total government grants being sought would fund 80 percent of the total cost. Should the Tawas City portion be deleted, an agreement has been reached whereby the cost not

covered under the grant would be shared by all three units.

"We have had community action and cooperation in this project for three years and I feel East Tawas should be heard on its police proposal," said the mayor.

A meeting is to be arranged shortly with East Tawas officials concerning the proposal. In the meantime, the council approved the new contract with the sheriff's department. The new annual cost is \$25,340, as compared to \$23,340 under the current contract which expires April 1. It also provides that should there be any salary increase to deputies due to union negotiations, the city would share in the cost.

A 90-day termination clause is to be added to the contract with the county should the new proposal with East Tawas be accepted.

Attorney Says Supt. Barry's Contract Has Another Year

"I am not looking for another job as I am going to take my attorney's advice and fight it."

This was the comment Tuesday (yesterday) morning of Edward J. Barry, who has served as superintendent of Tawas Area School since 1972.

By unanimous action last week, the board of education voted not to renew Barry's contract. The superintendent, however, claims he has one year remaining under his contract.

A letter from Charles R. MacLean, Barry's attorney, states to the board of education that the resolution does not list an effective date for termination of the contract, "but I am informed that one member of the board has announced to the press that said member considers the contract to have been terminated as of June 30, 1975."

MacLean said he differs with that opinion for the reason that, in his opinion, the contract does not terminate until June 30, 1976.

MacLean cited a provision in the superintendent's contract that "This contract shall be deemed to have been extended for a period of one year unless the board shall have given written notice to the contrary to the superintendent prior to April 1, 1974."

Barry's attorney said he advised the board of education on March 6 that, since no such notice was given, in his opinion, the superintendent's contract was automatically extended to expire June 30, 1976.

MacLean also cited a provision of the school board's policy limiting contracts with superintendents to not more than three years that, "If at any time in the opinion of the majority of the board his services are unsatisfactory, he shall be given notice in writing at least six months before the expiration of his contract that his service will not be required."

The attorney said that notice given on March 10 would be effective to terminate the contract as of June 30, 1976, but, in his opinion, could not legally terminate the contract as of June 30, 1975, because it would not give the superintendent six months' notice prior to that date.

Would Discuss Tree Planting

Thomas Jacques of Tawas City, a 1974 graduate from Michigan State University in forestry and resource development, is to present a special program at the Monday, April 7, meeting of the Tawas City Council.

In a letter to the council read at Monday night's meeting, Jacques said he was interested in seeing the community develop a program of planting trees and shrubs on city property. He said some direction was needed in such a program and desired to present a program using color slides.

Interested organizations and residents are invited to attend the meeting.

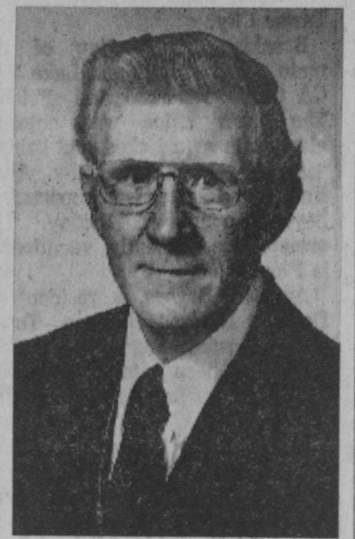

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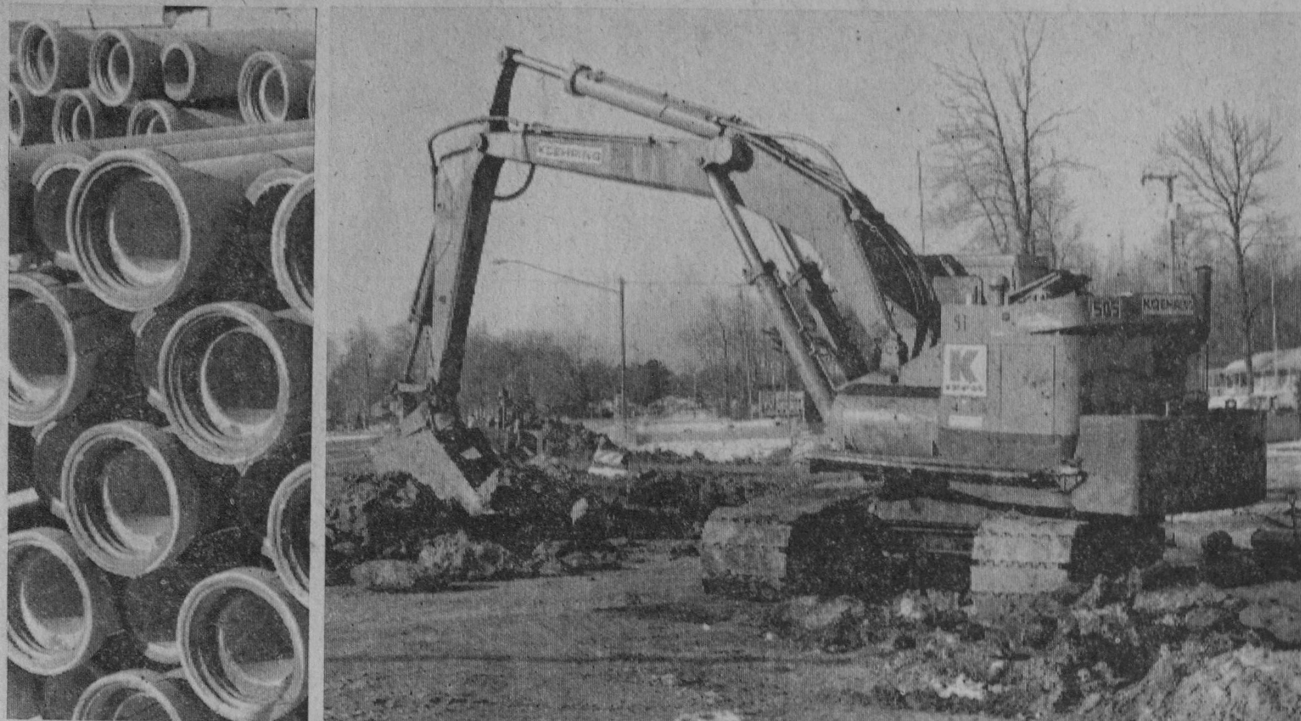

Two Letters Indicate

Tax Assessment Moratorium Seems Unlikely During 1975

Both the Michigan State Tax Commission and Gov. William G. Milliken have taken a dim view of a resolution from Iosco concerning a one-year moratorium on any increase to the state equalized valuation of property.

At its first session in February, the Iosco Board of Commissioners concurred with resolutions from several other counties seeking the moratorium. The resolution stated that home owners and small business proprietors "are experiencing great difficulty in paying real property taxes" and that it would serve the best interest of taxpayers and citizens of the state if tax payments would be stabilized by not increasing the assessed valuation.

A letter from the commission states that it "does not have any authority to delay the application of any equalized valuation to any county for the purpose of a moratorium from an increase in taxes because of the present economic straits in which the state finds itself."

The commission cited the state constitution, which requires that all property be assessed at 50 percent of market value, which means that equalized valuations both by the county board of commissioners and the state tax commission must also be established at that level.

The governor's reply to this county's resolution was that a proposed moratorium posed a number of difficulties. "By freezing any existing inequities and preventing increases in valuation in the districts with rapid increases, a moratorium contributes to inequities," said the governor.

An alternative frequently suggested, said the governor, is the reduction of the level of assessment from the 50 percent required by state law. This is more equitable than the moratorium and faces no constitutional barrier, said the governor. "However, this would require layoffs and service reductions at the local and state levels or a tax increase. In addition,

low assessment levels could result in inequity when seemingly small errors were magnified by higher tax rates.

The governor said that property tax rates are the responsibility of local government. "Any unit can cut its millage when assessments rise or to give property tax relief. It must be noted that increased assessments may not mean any new money for some school districts and all local governments face inflationary pressure on service costs. Nevertheless, only local control of tax rates allows cutting

budgets selectively in areas of greatest growth in valuation without inflicting layoffs on neighboring units," said the governor.

The governor pointed out that the property tax credit program of the state will be of considerable assistance during this economically difficult period. If a person's homestead property taxes rise above 3.5 percent of the household income, that household is immediately eligible for a credit under the property tax relief program.

The governor's comment that

increased assessments may not mean any new money for some schools touches on the local problem. Because of the high property valuation behind each child, Hale Area School does not receive any state membership aid and a valuation increase in Tawas Area School District will place that district in the same position.

In addition, any reduction in the tax rate for schools would mean a reduction in state membership aid as the local millage rate is one of the factors determining the state aid return.

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Studded Snow Tires Are Out

March 31 is the last day that existing studded snow tires can be used on Michigan roads, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

Public Act 138, passed in 1973, bans metal tire studs of the type now in use in Michigan on and after April 1, Joseph Ratke, Auto Club touring manager, points out. "However, if the studs are removed, the snow tires may be used on highways after this winter," Ratke added. He noted that persons with a pair of pliers and a

strong wrist can remove the studs or most tire dealers will do the job for \$3 to \$5 per tire. Michigan Department of Highways and Transportation is now empowered to establish rules regulating the use of highway traction devices after this winter. Auto Club points out that if studs are developed which will reduce road surface damage to 25 percent of that now caused by tungsten carbide studs, the highway department could approve their use.

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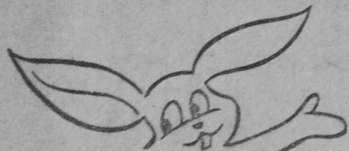

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Lake Huron Sport Fishing Guide Available from EMTA

Following several years of intensified fish plantings in Lake Huron and thousands of hours of experimental fishing, the secrets of Lake Huron sports fishing have unfolded, according to the East Michigan Tourist Association (EMTA). The key is a chart of the shoreline from White Rock to Mackinac City. The multi-colored Lake Huron Sport Fishing Guide, published by the EMTA, locates the fish, shows water depths, provides information about launching facilities and provides a calendar of the best time to fish for the dozen major species in Lake Huron. A description is furnished of each fish's habitat, feeding pattern, the most likely depth and water temperature at which it will bite. Credit is due Stanley Lievens, natural resources specialist with the State of Michigan Tourist Council. Lievens provided much of the information and a "tub-full" of enthusiasm which now makes Lake Huron the "hot spot" for record brown trout, fantastic chinook fishing from July to ice-up and near-year-around steelhead (rainbow) opportunities.

A companion brochure, East Michigan Guide to Camping-Fishing-Boating which names the inland lakes and streams for best summertime fishing, is also ready for distribution. The folder provides information on private and public campgrounds, canoe liveries and marinas, sport shops, guides and fishing services in the 28-county East Michigan region.
