The first came when he left the door open leading to the garage from the cellblock corridor. The second mistake came when Arnold asked for a mop to clean his cell. The CETA employee opened the door of the cell, handed Arnold a water bucket and then went to a closet to get a mop-leaving the cell door open.

Arnold, who apparently figured he had nothing to lose, escaped by the rear door. He was wearing blue jail clothing and had no

The CETA employee reported Arnold's escape to the main office and said he had been knocked uncious for about 30 seconds after being struck over the head. Arnold later denied hitting the jail Sheriff Westcott, who was in the

main office conferring with other department personnel, alerted patrol cars of the escape. An immediate search was made of jail grounds, but Arnold had a head start, crossed the railroad bridge behind the jail and headed south. Barry Bucholtz of the Oscoda Police Department joined the search with his tracking dog, but the dog apparently became confused due to the large number of persons joining the search and lost Arnold's scent near the Mathews Street railroad crossing. Use of Oscoda's tracking dog has been remarkably successful in recent cases, having aided in the recent apprehension of four burglars near East Tawas.




