



Memorial Day

The first of two services honoring deceased veterans of this country's wars was held Monday at East Tawas. Audie Johnson Post No 211, American Legion, conducted services at Veteran's Cemetery. A parade was held on Newman Street and leading marchers was the color guard and flags, right. Youngsters at left were seated near the grave of a Civil War veteran during ceremonies at the cemetery.

The second memorial service is scheduled to be held on Friday, the traditional Memorial Day, in Tawas City. The program will start with a parade from the American Legion Hall at 10:00 a. m. and participants are to muster at 9:30 a. m. Naval dead are to be honored at the Mathews Street bridge. Tawas Area Marching Band and the Wurtsmith Air Force Base color guard will join the parade. Veterans of all wars and their families are urged to walk in the parade and no post affiliation is needed. The program at Memory Gardens Cemetery is to be conducted by Jesse C. Hodder Post No 189, American Legion.



State Electrical Code is Adopted

Coming fast on the heels of the recently enacted state building and plumbing codes in Iosco County is enforcement of the state electrical code, to become effective June 1.

At Wednesday's meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, Francis Block, administrator of the Iosco County Department of Building and Safety Inspection, was appointed as the local enforcing agent for the electrical section of the state code.

The commission established the minimum electrical permit fee at \$7.50, along with a fee scale for electrical work to be performed.

Block's office has been established in the quarters formerly occupied by the branch office of the secretary of state in Tawas City.

In other business conducted Wednesday, it was reported by Joseph Fox that the proposed air commuter service to serve Iosco County had been shelved. Fox said that financing the service would have required four times the amount that could have been provided by the Upper Great Lakes Regional Development Council.

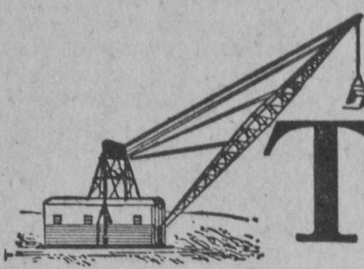
John Mielock, county drain commissioner, appeared before the commission and asked for a resolution from the board to authorize establishment of a special assessment district to finance repairs to

the Long Lake dam. The dam, constructed in 1962, is not maintaining the proper lake level. The request was referred to committee for study and is to be considered at the June 4 meeting.

Representatives of the Tri-County Council on Aging presented a budget for 1975-76. The total budget calls for an expenditure of \$50,000, shared equally by federal and local funds. Iosco, Ogemaw and Roscommon Counties are involved in the council and the assessment to each would be \$8,333.37.

Donald Griffin, chairman of the finance committee, explained that the tax allocation board had found that there was not enough millage available to meet all budgets presented to the county. As a result, it is expected that a number of new programs being proposed by the county would have to be scrapped due to the lack of finances. Representatives of the council were invited to appear before the allocation board on May 29 to explain the program.

It was reported that vans were now on hand to provide transportation to senior citizens and general public. The three counties are to participate with matching money and senior citizens would be transported at a reduced rate. The council operates senior citizen centers at Tawas City, Sand Lake, Hale and Oscoda.

Three Minor Accidents

Memorial Holiday Traffic Heavy, but No Serious Crashes

Despite the expected heavy traffic, Iosco County escaped the three-day Memorial Day weekend without a serious personal injury traffic accident. Two persons were injured slightly in motorbike accidents and three persons received minor injuries when the car in which they were riding struck a cow.

According to state police from

East Tawas, a car driven by Gary L. Hill, 20, Saginaw, struck a cow on Monument Road shortly after midnight Sunday. The cow was owned by Edwin Zaharias. Hill escaped injury, but receiving minor injuries without requiring hospitalization were Michael Steele, 20; William Hanson, 18; Robert Collins, 19, all passengers in the car.

Two motorbike operators were injured Saturday, according to the Iosco Sheriff's Department. John J. Lukas, 20, Detroit, was treated at Tawas Hospital after losing control of his machine on a trail in Oscoda Township. John B. Farmer, 26, Warren, was injured when he lost control of his motorbike on a sand trail near Five Channels Dam. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

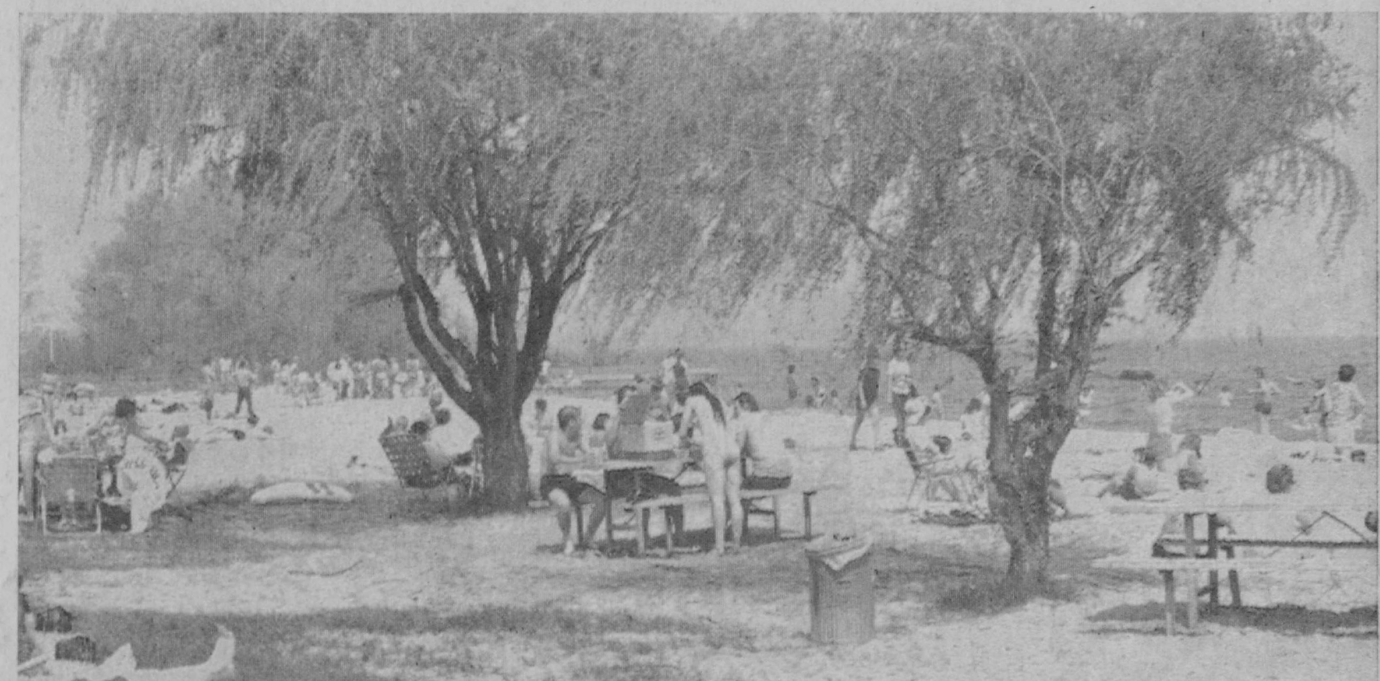

Tawas Area Transportation Money Goes to Detroit Buses

As the result of the recent order by the supreme court for the state to purchase 150 buses for the integration of Detroit schools, transportation money furnished to all schools in the state has been slashed.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told members of Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night that \$3,991 had been cut from transportation funds to be received during the current year.

Barry said that the reduction was for reimbursement to the school for bus attendants. He recommended that the bus attendants, who supervise loading and unloading of buses at the three schools, be retained for the three remaining weeks of school for safety reasons.

Bus attendants were hired by the local school several years ago following an accident at the high school in which a child was struck and killed while a bus was being loaded.

The superintendent reported Monday night that it appears that the school would end its current fiscal year on June 30 with a cash deficit of \$19,696. He said, however, that about \$170,000 was due to the school in delinquent taxes and the financial picture could change for the better in the next three weeks. In addition, no transfers have been made as yet from other funds which could balance the budget.

Two buses which were ordered three years ago have arrived and at least two new buses should be purchased for next year to replace older buses in the fleet. Due to the school's split shift which adds daily bus runs, equipment is wearing out more rapidly than through normal usage.

The superintendent suggested that the board of education study the possibility of long term financing for at least two buses as the transportation account does not have a sufficient amount and the cost of each bus is \$13,000. The board of education may consider a special millage vote in September to finance bus purchases.

Barry said that schools of Northern Michigan could not expect passage of a favorable school aid act this year due to the state's financial problems. He said that another shuffle of school funding could be expected from the state.

In other business conducted Monday night, Herman Rollin, elementary principal, announced that five applications had been received for the position of learning disability instructor. The position is to be filled in June or July.

The board of education authorized a supplemental contract for Robert H. Crawford, director of federal programs for Title One, for the remaining 29 days of the

current school year. Crawford's current contract as transportation director and federal programs director commenced July 1, 1974, and had expired.

Gene Gerber, director of adult education, reported that 16 persons would receive high school diplomas Friday at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The school has conducted a high school completion course at the base during the current school term and 44 persons have received high school diplomas.

Two teachers retiring this year, Mrs. Carl Schaaf and Mrs. Eber Wetzel, are to be honored at a retirement dinner.

Final Approval on Federal Grants for Water Plan

Official announcement was made Tuesday by the United States Department of Commerce that \$960,

000 in federal grants had been approved to help stimulate growth in Iosco County.

School Gets Two New State Flags

In response to letters sent by Tawas City Elementary School children during Michigan Week, two state flags have been received for school use.

The children sent letters to Gov. William Milliken and State Rep. George A. Prescott stating that two flags were needed for school use. The two state officials promptly sent the flags and accompanying letters.

One flag is to be flown outside the school on special occasions and the other flag is to be displayed on an inside wall.

Included are grants from the Economic Development Administration of \$720,000 and \$240,000 from the Upper Great Lakes Economic Development Commission.

The announcement was made by Wilmer D. Mezell, assistant secretary of economic development, through the office of Cong. Philip Ruppe.

The two grants are to finance water expansion in the Tawas and Baldwin Township, serving industrial parks in the area. The local contribution to the project is to total \$802,000.

Governing bodies of local units have voted to accept each individual share of the local financing. A meeting is to be held establishing the share for each unit.

This project, commonly called the Edmands plan, has been in the development for more than three years.

Protest State Valuation Hike

Iosco Co. Officials Appeared Before State Tax Commission

Representatives of Iosco County were to "present their case" Tuesday before the state tax commission concerning the 10 percent recommended hike in valuation after the county equalized earlier this month, but local officials held little hope that Lansing would make any changes.

Tuesday was roll call day at Lansing when officials of counties were to be given the opportunity to present evidence concerning opposition to valuations established by the state tax commission. Every county in the state has received valuation increases recommended by the tax commission, but Northern Michigan has been hit particularly hard with increases in some counties ranging up to 60 percent.

Attending the Lansing session were Robert Foster, chairman of the county board of commissioners; Donald Griffin, finance chairman; Robin Allain, county equalization director, and Ronald Tyler, prosecuting attorney.

Allain said that he was basing Iosco's main argument on the rate of increase for Iosco County as compared to other counties below Townline 16, a line drawn from Bay City across the state to Muskegon.

Since 1970, Iosco's state equalized valuation has increased nearly \$100,000,000. The county had equalized its real estate and personal property earlier this month at \$172,041,197 and the state later recommended the figure be upped to \$189,787,533.

Some of the statistics which Allain presented yesterday included the fact that unemployment in this county jumped from 7.9 percent in 1972 to a current total of 18.4 percent. As a comparison with other counties, Allain said that the average salary for downstate manufacturing concerns was \$12,000 in

1975, while the average income for Iosco residents is \$7,800.

The usual reply from the state tax commission concerning objections to boosting valuations is that it does not set individual tax levies and that is handled strictly by local areas. What is never said, however, is that legislation controlling state membership aid to schools is controlled by the more populated downstate area and state aid bills favor those school districts.

In the current legislature is a state aid bill with a formula requiring a levy of 27 mills for state aid participation. With voted and allocated millage combined, not one school district in Iosco County qualifies and Tawas Area School, for instance, currently has a levy of 20.25 mills.

Until the Bursley bill "equal-

ized" all school districts in the state, by penalizing low millage districts through reduced state aid, Tawas Area School was the second lowest district in the state for per pupil cost of education.

Officials of counties in the northern half of the state have long argued to no avail that state aid to schools should be based on the ability to pay for equal education opportunities.

Should the state tax commission not lower its recommended valuation increase, Iosco County officials are expected to take their case before the new state tax tribunal. County officials had in week-end to study the ramifications on school finances should they decide to equalize the county at \$172,041,197 in 1975-76, withholding the recommended "penal-

ty" of \$17,746,356 until the follow-

ing year. If the state's recommendation is adopted, the penalty would be added this year "across the board" and based on the percentage of each unit's property valuation compared to the county total, according to a supreme court ruling.

Local officials were discussing the highly speculative move not to levy the full 15-mill limitation on Friday. Hale Area School presently does not receive state membership aid because of its high property valuation and low number of students and Tawas Area School's valuation under the new state recommendation would place it in nearly the same position.

Oscoda Area School could be the loser under such an arrangement, but Whittemore-Prescott Area School's millage is presently pegged by Ogemaw County.

A public meet the candidate program is to be held Thursday, June 5, 8:00 p. m., at Tawas Area High School. Five of the six candidates for Tawas Area Board of Education are to participate.

Gene Gerber, director of adult education, said Monday night that Clare Herriman, veteran member of the board and a candidate to succeed himself, would be on vacation that week and would not be able to attend the meeting.

Other candidates for the two four-year vacancies on the board of education presently held by Herriman and Mrs. Charles (Joan) Schreck, who announced her retirement at the end of her present term on June 30, are John Whitman, East Tawas; Willard Dillon, Tawas City; Mrs. Louis (Eleanor) Pfeiffer, Tawas City; Mrs. Hugh (Isabelle) Prescott, East Tawas; Donald J. Holmes, East Tawas.

The program is being sponsored by the adult education department and Gerber said each candidate would be given 15 minutes to address the group. The program would then be opened to questions from the public.

The annual school election is to be held Monday, June 9, and Gerber said the program should offer voters the opportunity to receive information concerning candidates which should assist in making a decision on election day.

Tornado Alert Was False Alarm for TA

A tornado alert proved to be a false alarm late Wednesday afternoon for 545 students of the Tawas Area Middle School, but safety precautions taken by school administrators could not have been more realistic.

A radio report telling of a tornado alert was received at the school office at 4:45 p. m. and a telephone call to the sheriff's department confirmed that a tornado had touched down at Gladwin and was headed in a northeasterly direction.

"We were told by the sheriff's department that a tornado funnel sighting had been made by a citizen in the vicinity of the Sand Lake Road-M-55 intersection," said Robert McDonald, middle school principal. "The sheriff's department was preparing to notify the school when we called."

Bus drivers were called and told to report at the school to transport students home, but elementary buses had not returned from transporting those children and a decision was made to utilize the school's tornado alert plan.

All doors of the building were opened and students were herded into the north-south corridor leading from the west door of the commons area to the south wing, an area which has the least amount of windows in the building.

Teachers were posted on the roof of the building to watch for tornado funnels and students settled down to ride out the storm.

"Fortunately, no funnel appeared and the alert turned out to be only a drill," said McDonald. He said he was pleased with the conduct of students and everyone concerned. The school plans to hold a tornado alert drill each year to acquaint students and personnel with safety precautions to be taken in the event of an actual storm.

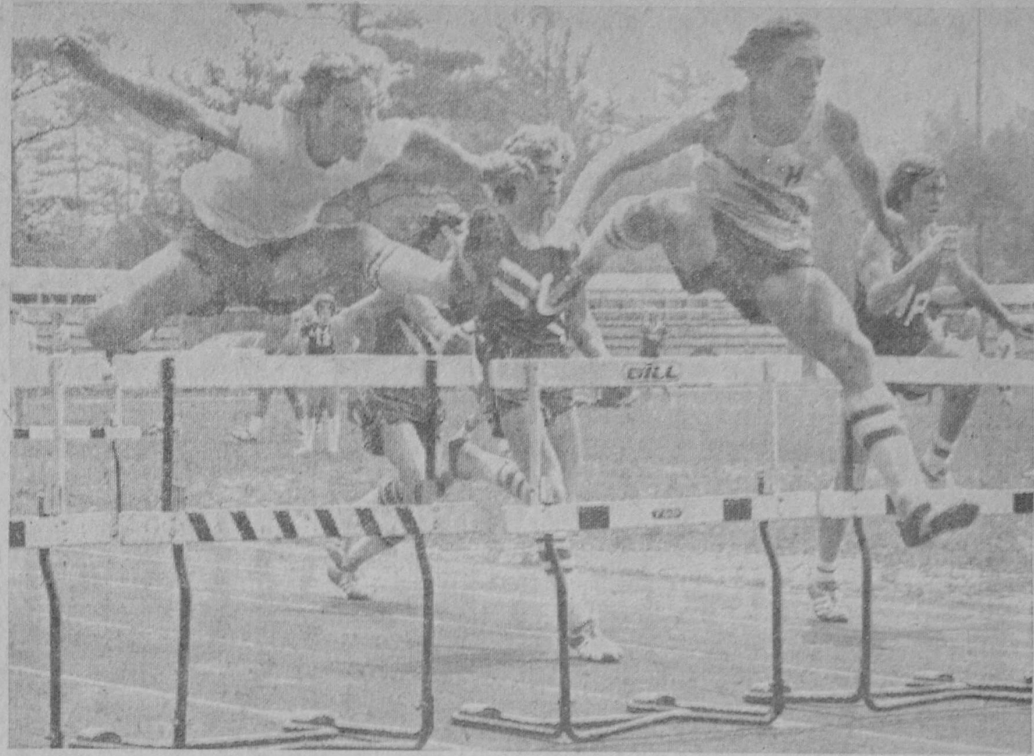

NBC Status Unchanged After Meeting

Status of the current alignment of schools in the Northern B Conference remains unchanged following a recent meeting of school administrators, but formal statements are expected from three schools at the next league meeting in July seeking to leave the conference.

Principal John Alexander of Tawas Area High School told board of education members Monday night that dissolution of the NBC was not formally discussed by principals and athletic directors attending the meeting. He said, however, that superintendents attending a different meeting had discussed the possibility.

Standish-Sterling, Gladwin and Pinconning have announced that they have decided to pull out of the league due to the inconvenience and expense of travel to schools and unequal competition.

Carrollton and Essexville Garber have indicated they would not favor a five-school NBC should the above three schools drop out and would join other conferences.

Resolutions have been adopted by boards of education of both Tawas Area and Ogemaw Heights stating those schools would affiliate with a new league which would include Standish-Sterling, Gladwin and Pinconning. Such a move would mean that Oscoda would not be affiliated with any of the present NBC schools.

Tawas Area School officials have emphasized that they favor retention of the NBC as it was formed in 1962, but would affiliate with the proposed new league rather than going to an independent status.

Alexander told board of education members Monday night that he was concerned about scheduling of athletics this fall should the NBC be dissolved.

Attorneys Reach Accord on Drain, but Public Has Say

Attorneys for Iosco, Ogemaw and Arenac Counties have agreed on a solution to the ultimate apportionment of benefits to be derived by the proposed AuGres River drain and have recommended to the two upriver counties, Iosco and Ogemaw, that those two units join with Arenac to determine that the drain should be built.

Although the two-year legal hassle between the two upriver counties and Arenac County appears to be coming to a close, the present agreement is primarily between attorneys following preliminary study and a public hearing would still be required to determine if the drain should be constructed.

"Attorneys for the respective parties will be urging their respective clients to adopt this proposal as a fair and equitable settlement, but we realize at this time that we cannot formally and permanently commit ourselves, inasmuch as we cannot foreclose the right of the public to be heard," stated Ronald Tyler, Iosco County prosecuting attorney.

A tentative settlement was reached during a special session of Arenac County Circuit Court held before Judge Joseph P. Swallow of Alpena, who was assigned to the case. The litigation had been brought by AuGres area farmers in 1973 to force cooperation of Ogemaw and Iosco in the proposed tri-county drain.

According to the agreement between counsel for the three counties, members of the augmented drain board representing Arenac County are to recommend that ultimate apportionment of the cost for constructing the proposed drain, over and above a federal grant, would be based on a ratio of 91 percent for Arenac County, six percent for Iosco County and three percent for Ogemaw County.

The Arenac members would make that recommendation at the next meeting of the augmented drain board, which is to be preceded by a meeting at which representatives of the three counties would discuss with the department of agriculture the general range of the cost.

One of the stumbling blocks to the proposed drain, which has been under consideration for a number of years, was that Iosco County would be apportioned 15 percent of the cost of construction. Major construction would be in Arenac County where a network of flood control devices would relieve flood conditions.

After an engineering study commissioned by Ogemaw and Iosco, the two counties agreed recently that the project was practical. Representatives of the two counties had stopped the project in the summer of 1973 during a meeting of the augmented drain board.

If the project is approved, extensive planning would be required before work can begin. Actual excavation work is at least two years away and the matter of who would be assessed and at what rate must be established.

In 1971, cost of the project was estimated at 2.8-million-dollars, of which local costs to the three counties were estimated at \$563,000. Because of inflation, the cost is expected to be much higher.

Therapist Must be Certified for Medicare Payment

Question: My doctor is going to send me to a physical therapist. I will receive services in the therapist's office. Will my Medicare help pay for this?

Answer: Medicare's medical insurance can help pay for the therapist's services if he is certified by Medicare and your doctor pre-

scribes the treatment. However, Medicare can pay no more than \$80 in a year for covered services from independent physical therapists.

Question: What happens if I have to go to a hospital that does not participate in Medicare? Will Medicare help pay for the care I receive?

Answer: Medicare's hospital insurance can help pay for care in a non-participating hospital if you are admitted for emergency treatment and the hospital is the closest one equipped to handle the emergency.

Question: I am a junior in college and I am going to work for

the first time this summer. I have never had a social security number so I want to apply for one. Do I need to take any papers to the social security office?

Answer: People applying for a social security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity and citizenship. Your birth certificate and driver's license or something similar bearing your signature will generally serve as proof. If you do not have those, call or write any social security office for information about other papers that may be used.

Question: Because I work and get social security retirement payments, I had to give social secur-

ity an estimate of my 1975 earnings. Now it looks like my earnings will change. Do I have to report this?

Answer: Yes, you should. If you are earning less than you originally estimated, you may get additional benefits during 1975 if you report the change. If you do not report the change, however, and you earn more than you originally estimated, you may get payments not due you and have to pay back some money at the end of the year.

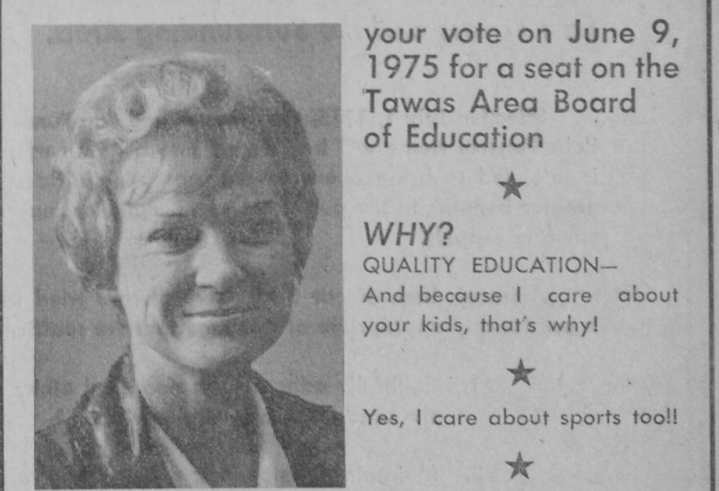

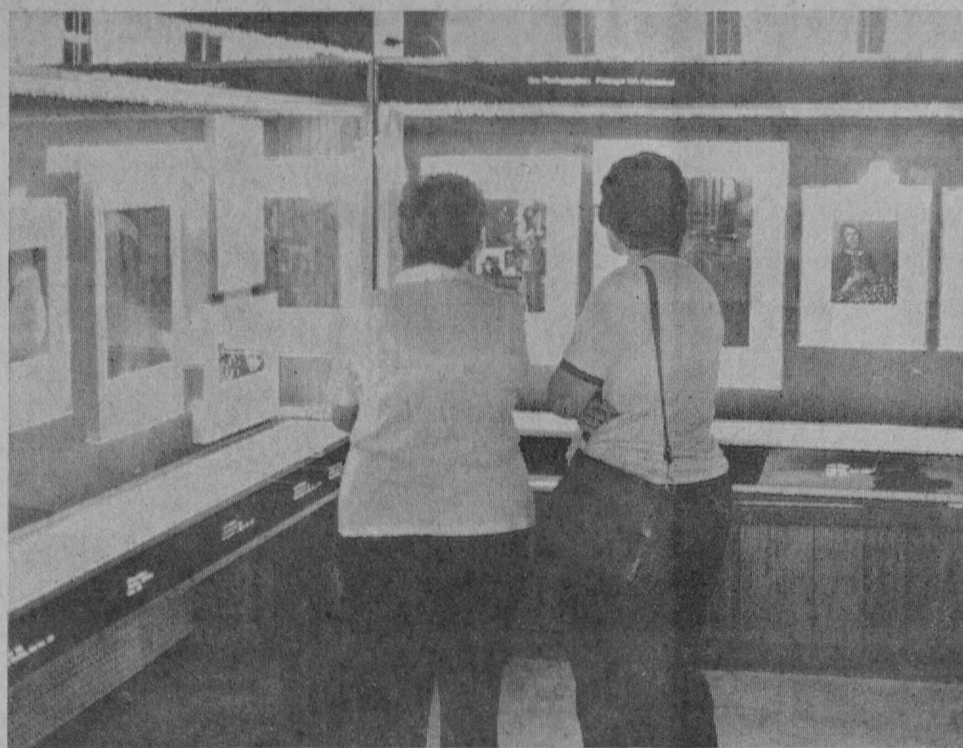

18-Year-Olds No Longer Register for Military Draft

For many years, young men were required to register for the draft within a few days of their 18th birthday. The registration procedures, however, were changed on April 1, according to Arthur A. Holmes, state director of selective service, and since that date no one can be registered during the remainder of 1975. Although public announcements were made about this change in April, selective service offices are still getting calls from 18-year-olds asking if they still have to register.

Instead of registering within a few days of their 18th birthday, it is planned that they will register during a single annual registration period of a few days in early 1976. Any such new registration procedure would be announced by a presidential proclamation at that time. A nation-wide campaign would

then be launched simultaneously to give information of the dates of the annual registration and the places where the young men would go to register.

Men, therefore, should not attempt to register with the draft until next year when the new registration procedures are placed in effect.
