A parade was held on Newman Street and leading marchers was the color guard and flags, right. Youngsters at left were seated near the grave of a Civil War veteran during ceremonies at the cemetery.





Standish-Sterling, Gladwin and Pinconning have announced that they have decided to pull out of the league due to the inconvenience and expense of travel to


