

County Equalized at \$172,041,197

Following a two-week delay for study, Iosco County Board of Commissioners Thursday adopted the property equalization report recommended by Robin Allain, county tax equalization director.

The equalized valuation for Iosco County now stands at \$172,041,197, with \$153,131,964 in real estate and \$18,909,233 in personal property. This represents an overall five percent increase over last year, including new construction totaling approximately \$3,695,574.

The equalization report has been submitted to the state tax commission for its approval. Last

year, the state rejected the county's equalization and boosted the valuation by adding a factor to each assessing unit.

Although the new equalized total is based on a 45 percent assessment ratio rather than the 50 percent recommendation by the state, commissioners agreed that Allain's recommendation had a better chance of passage by the state than a report previously considered.

Earlier this year, the commission agreed tentatively to use last year's base valuation of \$164,812,181, plus new construction and

losses, as the 1975 equalized valuation. The majority of assessing units, however, made adjustments in assessments to meet increases recommended by the state tax commission after a sales study. As a result, those units which did not make the recommended adjustments on property values will receive a factor under the county equalization.

The report was adopted in a four to one roll call of commissioners. In favor of Allain's recommendations were Robert Foster, Donald Griffin, Joseph Fox and Mrs. Howard Burdett. Opposed was William Wreley.

Depending on action of the state tax commission, and even that is indefinite at this point due to proposed legislation, the county's valuation is nearly 25-million dollars below the state's recommendation.

The county tax equalization director said Friday he believed the state's appraisal of property during the past year was high and it was his opinion that the \$153,131,964 figure for real property was more in line with present conditions.

Adoption of Allain's equalization report was supported by the Iosco Townships Association.

The nine units receiving a factor are as follows: Baldwin Township, one percent; Burleigh Township, 13 percent; Grant Township, six percent; Oscoda Township, 14 percent; Plainfield Township, 16 percent; Reno Township, 34 percent; Sherman Township, 20 percent; Tawas Township, 13 percent; Wilber Township, 13 percent.

Four units are to receive factors to equalize valuations of personal property. Included are Burleigh Township, one percent; Grant Township, one percent; Plainfield Township, three percent; Whittemore, two percent.

Armed Robbers Hit Two Party Stores

Two party stores in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties were victims of armed robberies over the weekend.

On Saturday night, approximately \$95 was taken in a holdup

at Heddy's Party Store, US-23, Baldwin Township, and between \$300 and \$400 was taken in a robbery Sunday night at Ray's Party Store south of West Branch.

Four suspects in the two robberies were captured Sunday night at a roadblock on M-55 west of Tawas City. Descriptions of the suspects were identical in both robberies.

Walter Heddy told investigating Michigan State Police that a customer walked into his store and pulled out a handgun at 10:26 o'clock Saturday night. The robber told Heddy to take all of the currency out of the cash register and place it in a paper bag. Before leaving, the robber ordered the store owner to get down on the floor beside a beer cooler.

Police said the store owner was unable to determine the direction in which the robber's car left the scene.

While on patrol Sunday night, an Iosco County Sheriff's Department car overheard radio traffic concerning an armed robbery at Ray's Party Store, one-half mile south of West Branch. A car answering the description to the one used in that robbery was later seen by officers one-quarter mile west of the M-65-M-55 intersection in Reno Township and headed east on M-55. The officers radioed for assistance and a roadblock was set up on M-55 at the McArdle Road intersection.

Occupants of the car apprehended at the roadblock were Steven D. Flanagan, 20, Clarkston; Richard A. Wethington, 19, Ortonville; Gary R. Pickwick, 23, Pontiac; Dennis P. Johnson, 22, Clarkston.

Warrants were authorized Monday by the Ogemaw County prosecuting attorney charging Flanagan and Wethington with armed robbery. Johnson and Pickwick were released from custody.

Oscoda-Tawas Groups Woo Cedar Point

Oscoda - AuSable and Tawas Chambers of Commerce, acting in concert, announced Monday that the two organizations are actively engaged in investigating the possibility of interesting Cedar Point, Incorporated, of Ohio in locating its Michigan recreational park in this area.

Although no assurances by the officials of the Cedar Point firm have been received by either of the local organizations, notification in writing has been received that the suggested area has been accepted as a possible "alternate site" and placed on a list for that purpose.

Prior to making any type of commitment to the Cedar Point officials, public meetings are to be held to ascertain the public's feeling about such a development. Such meetings will be held only if the Cedar Point officials express a sincere interest in locating in this area.

Officers of the two chambers of commerce assure all citizens that ample opportunity will be given to express views should the project become a reality. As developments occur, local media will be kept fully advised.

Block is Officer of New Organization

Francis J. Block, Iosco County's building and safety administrator, was elected treasurer of the Northern Michigan Building Officials Association. The organizational meeting of this new group was held Friday at Gaylord.

Comprising 28 counties of the northern Lower Peninsula, the purpose of the organization is to exchange ideas, methods and, eventually, a uniform fee schedule and proceedings.

Other officers include Arthur Davis, president, Otsego County; Edward Hadd, vice president, Ogemaw County; Richard Crawford, secretary, Emmet County.

Members of the board of directors include Robert Doyle, Grand Traverse County; Maurice VanGordon, Cheboygan County; C. Howard Yount, Missaukee County; Roy Papenfus, Crawford County.

State Postpones May Tax Sale

Delinquent taxpayers of most Michigan counties gained a six-month reprieve from state tax sales scheduled for Tuesday, but will begin paying a higher interest rate on unpaid taxes effective May 6 until the new date for the tax sale on Tuesday, October 7.

Gov. William Milliken on Friday signed into law Senate Bill No. 4672 which postponed scheduled tax sales in all counties except Branch, Grand Traverse, Ionia, Kalamazoo, Kent, Manistee, Muskegon, Oakland and Ottawa.

Edward Nelkie, Iosco County treasurer, said Tuesday morning that 1972 delinquent taxes had been paid on 253 parcels prior to the scheduled sale yesterday and only 125 parcels would have been placed on the block. Of that number, approximately 80 percent were located in the Lakewood Shores Subdivision at Oscoda.

Open House at Iosco Jail


Second annual open house during National Police Week will be held Saturday, May 17, 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m., at the Iosco County Jail. Sheriff George Westcott extends an invitation to the public on behalf of the department to tour jail facilities. Refreshments are to be served.

Upon receipt of official notification from the state, Nelkie said he immediately questioned a provision that would have increased the interest rate from one-half of one percent to three-quarters of one percent per month from the date of delinquency to the date taxes are paid, sold, or bid off to the state.

The Iosco County treasurer pointed out in a telephone call to the state treasury department that it would be an injustice to taxpayers to add the additional interest prior to Tuesday without proper notification. As a result, the attorney general's office issued an opinion Monday night stating that the additional one-quarter of one percent interest would not be effective on unpaid taxes until Tuesday.

Although the senate bill signed into law last Friday states that lands which had been advertised for sale on May 6 need not be re-advertised for sale on October 7, the new sale date may be complicated by the fact that unpaid taxes and interest have been designated for each parcel in advertised delinquent tax lists.

It is estimated that the state has spent \$125,000 in advertising the May tax sale and counties have spent another \$100,000. The new law did not extend the redemption period for lands sold in the 1974 sale, which were subject to deed May 6.

Tawas Bay Small Boat Harbor Gets Environmental Approval

Confirmation of federal approval of a small boat harbor at the present Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas, was contained in the final environmental statement for Tawas Bay Harbor prepared by the United States Army Engineer District, Detroit.

Received locally last week, the statement had been approved on October 22 by Col. James E. Hays, district engineer, and by Brig. Gen. W. O. Bachus, division engineer, on November 22. Maj. Gen. J. W. Morris, director of civil works, approved the findings on January 20.

Congress has approved its share

of the project, estimated at a total cost of \$1,146,000, and approval of the state's share awaits action of the Michigan Waterways Commission.

Elmer Werth of East Tawas, a member of the Tawas Harbor Committee, said Friday that Keith Wilson, director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, is expected to meet shortly with the harbor committee. This meeting is to be followed by a public session.

Federal participation in the improvement of Tawas Bay Harbor was authorized by congress as long ago as August of 1968.

The plan features breakwater

construction for the protection of recreational craft using the harbor and for the accommodation of recreational fishermen. In addition, berthing facilities are to be supplied by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

The harbor would consist of 24-foot wide breakwaters extending a total length of approximately 1,750 feet in a southerly and easterly direction from the existing state pier. A defined entrance channel and anchorage area are provided, even though no dredging is required. Adequate depths of 12 feet in the entrance channel and 10 feet in the anchorage are pres-

ently available.

Colonel Hays stated that Tawas Bay was found to be an ideal location for a harbor because of the protection offered by the curvature of the bay, as well as the fact that the onshore development has been planned not only to serve boaters, but also campers and other vacationers.

"The Tawas area is a center of heavy summertime recreational activity," stated the report. "During storms, the existing state pier is inadequate to offer safe berthing for the recreational type watercraft. Even without protection from the bay, many boaters are drawn into the Tawas area to camp or visit nearby points of interest. The proposed harbor project would serve as a facility offering safe mooring as well as providing access to the Tawas Bay fishery."

The project can be expected to have beneficial community cohesion effects in addition to supplementing the recreational based economy for the immediate area. New seasonal employment will result from the secondary business and service industry development for boaters and fishermen.

The report stated that general local and regional economy would benefit from the influx of recreation money and resultant increase in employment.

Ordinance Would Establish Tawas City Building Authority

An ordinance to establish a city building authority is under study by the Tawas City Council following presentation of a preliminary code at Monday night's regular meeting.

The proposed building authority would provide the means for development, acquisition of land for enlargement of public parking lots, as well as for development of recreational facilities, purchase of fire apparatus, improvement of buildings and development of other city facilities.

According to terms of the ordinance, after a project is authorized by the city council it could be turned over to the building authority for implementation. The city council, however, would retain control of the project.

Possible adoption of the ordi-

nance is to be discussed at later meetings and public participation is invited.

It was reported that forms will be available after May 19 for the city to apply to the state for assistance in the proposed purchase for the Babcock property for expansion of the city park. Property along Tawas Bay and west to Rainbow Service was acquired several years ago through a similar program with the state. A number of steps would be required before an application could be submitted to the state and funding would not be available until after July 1.

A plan for establishment of a parking lot through creation of a special assessment district is currently being studied by the city planning commission and a second

plan calling for utilization of the west end of the city park was turned over to the planning commission for study.

The city presently holds options to purchase property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron and Mr. and Mrs. George Prescott for the proposed special assessment district parking proposal.

This proposal is now in the hands of the city's planning consultant and a comprehensive report is to be made at the June meeting of the planning commission.

It is proposed to establish a parking lot on the Bergeron property and, after extending Court Street across the rear of the Prescott property, to sell that parcel to the Babcocks for construction of an office building.

Tawas Area Band Received State First Division Rating

Competing in the class A category in the state band and orchestra festival Saturday at Traverse City, Tawas Area Symphonic Band received four first division ratings from the judges. The festival was sponsored by the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association.

At the state level, Tawas bands have received eight first and two second division ratings in the past 10 years. The last five of these performances have been in class A.

A first division rating is defined, in part, as "an unusually high standard of performance and musicianship, worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner."

At the festival, bands and orchestras compete against set standards which vary slightly between classes of schools. Each band performs three numbers before three judges, then eight reads two selections before a fourth judge. There are a combined total of 34 categories which the judges adjudicate each band. This year, Tawas received 33 A and one B gradings.

Some of the comments of adjudicators were: Dr. William Rivard, trombone instructor, Central Michigan University, "Well trained, well disciplined band. Very nice, sensitive playing. Very nice performance;" Floyd Mead,

Midland Schools, "Very effective, a fine job. This organization lives up to its reputation as a superb band;" William Root, band director, Ferris State College, "The band did well. The school and community must be very proud. You are fortunate to have such a fine group to play in. You also realize, I am sure, how fortunate you are to have such an outstanding director. The result of the diligence and dedication of band students and director is an outstanding band;" David Merkel, Bad Axe Schools, "You are a well disciplined group. You and your di-

rector are to be congratulated on a fine performance."

After performing at the festival, the band proceeded to the Traverse City Holiday Inn where it participated in its annual band banquet. Kenneth Fenaley, band director at Clare Public Schools and a long time friend of the Tawas bands, was guest speaker.

A special meeting of the Tawas City Council is to be held Monday, May 12, 7:00 p. m., to prepare the city's operational budget for 1975-76. A second meeting would be held next week, if necessary, to develop the final budget.

A public hearing on the proposed operational budget is to be held at the next regular meeting on Monday, May 19.

In business conducted at Monday night's regular meeting, a bid of \$17.95 per ton for furnishing bituminous asphalt was accepted from Central Paving Company of West Branch. The asphalt will be used to complete the tennis court at the athletic field on First Avenue and about 500 tons will be used in the entire project.

A report from the council's special committee studying a proposed joint police force with East Tawas stated that no definite conclusion could be reached until a cost proposal is received from the City of East Tawas. After a proposal is received, discussion would be held by the council before a joint meeting is called with East Tawas.

A report from Fire Chief Daniel Ulrich stated that the volunteer fire department had three grass fire calls and one house fire call during the past month.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that the city presently has four persons hired under the federal CETA program. Funding for this program is due to expire June 30, but is expected to be continued until December 31.

Prices on dump trucks offered by Inglis Ford Sales and McKay Sales Company are now being reviewed and specifications studied by the city manager. The city presently owns two dump trucks and purchase of a third truck is being considered.

The city manager reported that a communication from an attorney representing Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kehoe had been turned over to the city attorney for a recommendation. Bublitz said the matter was a legal question concerning inclusion of the Kehoe property in the special assessment district for construction of sanitary sewer.



TO BE HONORED at a luncheon Monday, May 19, will be James H. Brickley, president of Eastern Michigan University. Iosco Fees Drop, County Cuts Operating Budget by \$61,760

Due to a reduction in fees to county offices, Iosco County Board of Commissioners has directed all county departments to reduce spending by \$61,760 during the remainder of 1975.

The commission's finance committee said that a comprehensive review of 1975 county finances dictates the need for revisions in budgeted expenditures. The review was conducted by the finance committee in conjunction with the county treasurer.

For the most part, reductions approved by the finance committee represent an 8.5 percent reduction in amounts previously budgeted for departmental expenses.

The finance committee's report said it felt this would be a better approach than the massive personnel cuts being experienced by other counties facing declining revenues. The report stated that the burden of absorbing the cuts would be spread across all departments.

"Adherence to the reduced budget will require the cooperation of all concerned," said Donald Griffin, finance chairman. "We will continue to review the financial picture and, if circumstances warrant, will restore budgets wherever possible."

A cumulative report of expenditures of each department was sent to all department heads. "It is

hoped that this more timely reporting will give you a more effective look to manage funds," said the report to department heads.

"Reporting alone, however, will not do the job; success will depend on our ability to get the most product or service for the dollars we spend."

The board of commissioners adjusted the October budget of \$1,203,654 downward to \$1,141,894 with the following reductions:

Contingency fund, \$11,039; maintenance of buildings, \$6,000; county advertising, \$3,500; mental health, \$780; district health, \$780; unemployment insurance, \$2,900; airport, \$967; courthouse and grounds, \$2,010;

Public safety: Sheriff's department, \$4,341; animal control, \$301;

jail, \$1,814; marine safety, \$1,544. Clerk, \$600; friend of the court, \$86; drain commissioner, \$17; circuit court, \$215; social services, \$3,120; register of deeds, \$895; treasurer, \$674; probation officer, salary supplement, \$1,463 and department expense, \$89; cooperative extension, department expense, \$936; travel of \$250 and rent of \$300; probate court, \$562; district court, \$1,841; prosecuting attorney, \$772; equalization department, \$3,904; board of commissioners, \$780; building code enforcement, salary of \$5,000, clerk-typist of \$3,500, fringes of \$4,000 and travel of \$1,000.

The report allowed for a \$1,000 increase in revolving research fund and \$500 increase in rent for building code enforcement.

"The plan of improvement is in accord with the desires of the State of Michigan and local authorities," stated the report. "State and local interests have indicated that they are both willing and able to comply with the conditions of local co-operation as proposed."

East Tawas Views Preliminary Budget

A preliminary budget of \$283,959.90 for 1975-76 operation was presented Monday night to the East Tawas Council. Final details are to be studied by Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, and the council's finance committee prior to the public budget hearing on Monday, May 19.

The budget calls for a tax levy of 11.66 mills on a state equalized valuation of \$13,495,254, which would raise \$157,354.66 in local taxes. The total general fund expenditure would be \$265,876.26, which would include revenue from state income tax and other state money.

In addition to the above tax levy, 1.34 mills would be levied for debt service. This would raise \$18,083.64 in taxes and compares to a levy of seven-eighths of a mill last year for debt retirement.

In other business, a letter from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources indicated that federal funds may soon be available to assist communities in construction of secondary sewage treatment projects. Superintendent Ropert said it appeared that the federal money could be made available to fund the regional sewage treatment concept which was studied last year by East Tawas, Tawas City, Baldwin and Tawas Townships. He felt that a regional concept would be in a better position for approval than one small project.

Mayor Robert Bolen appointed

Ald. Gerald Klenow, Ralph Westerman and Robert Johnson as a committee to review land values with the city appraiser. A sales study is currently being made by the city appraiser. The above aldermen are to act on the city's board of review next year.

The city is to advertise for a building inspector to handle enforcement of the building code in a joint program with Baldwin Township.

A report from the fire department indicated that William Look Jr. was re-elected chief of the volunteer fire department. Replacing Joseph Badalucco as assistant chief are Robert Hester and Norman Klenow. Eugene Fernetto was elected captain and secretary-treasurer, while Donald Holmes and Donald McKenzie are lieutenants.

A special meeting of the council is to be called later this week to discuss two bids received for operation of a concession stand at the city park. Bids entered by George VanEvry and Paul Sedgeman both called for a return of eight percent on the gross profit to the city.

A delegation of 15 Tawas Lake property owners appeared at the meeting and requested city action concerning the cleaning of the former Guyette property. The matter had previously been turned over to the city attorney for legal action. The superintendent of public works is to investigate the cleaning of two ditches requested by property owners.

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

Prescott's Bill Would Aid Schools Operating in Red

School districts operating in the red could continue to receive state aid under a bill introduced in the Michigan House of Representatives. State Rep. George Prescott of Tawas City introduced House Bill No. 5086, making it possible for districts to receive state aid while making an effort to wipe out debts. Under current law, districts operating in the red are not eligible for state aid.

"A situation in my own district brought the problem to my attention," Prescott said. "West Branch-Rose City District is faced with deficit spending to meet expenses this year. It is in the same boat with about 50 other school districts in the state." Prescott said these districts were afraid that state aid money would be withheld. Some schools are talking about closing a month early in an attempt to cut down deficits. The bill would give any district two years to eliminate a deficit accumulated as of June of this year. The district must submit a plan for eliminating the debt for approval to the director of department services of the Michigan Department of Education. Schools would be given until June of 1977

to wipe out the debt. Prescott said one reason so many schools are not staying within budgets this year is because of budget cuts on a state-wide basis made by the governor last December.

"Although schools received the smallest cut when expenditures were rolled back, many were hurt by the cut," Prescott said. "Most schools operate right on the edge and this pushed them over the top and into the red."


Mr. Stahl was born November 9, 1923, in Charlotte and was married to the former Betty M. Aldrich November 12, 1949, in Saginaw.

"It is too early to tell at this point, but the level of construction might be ahead of last year at this time," said Salisbury.



Tawas Hospital Plans Tours to Introduce New Facilities




OBSERVING National Hospital Week May 11-17.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Warning: Use Care Installing Antennas

Correctly installing a television or radio antenna can put one in tune for better reception, but the unsafe installation can be disastrous, warns Gordon Huck, district manager of Consumers Power Company's northeast division.

Tragedy can occur if a metal antenna comes in contact with an overhead energized electric line, he cautioned.

Metal television and radio antennas are conductors of electricity. If antennas come in contact with a power line, electricity will flow to anyone touching the antenna, to television or radio sets, possibly resulting in fire or damage to the set.

The overhead hazard can present itself in different circumstances, including lightning. A Roscommon County man recently was helping his neighbor put up an antenna when it accidentally came in contact with an overhead electric distribution line. The charge electrocuted one of the men.

Huck said that company records show where a man was electrocuted while adding lengths to a citizen's band radio antenna when the mast touched an overhead 4800 volt line. Another incident occurred when five men were attaching a 60-foot antenna to the side of a house and a sudden gust of wind blew the structure against

Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners

April Session April 15, 1975

Pursuant to statute, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: Burdett (District 3)

The clerk reported to the board on having been informed by former commissioner, Carl Libka, of his desire to tender his resignation as a member of the Regional Library Board.

At 9:55 a. m., the chairman ordered that the board recess to a committee of the whole board, so that the clerk might be excused to attend to his duties in circuit court.

Upon call to order at 11:00 a. m., the communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

Finance Chairman Griffin read and moved adoption of the following resolutions:

Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your finance committee recommends that, on the recommendation of the personnel committee, Mr. Francis J. Block be hired as the Iosco County Building Inspector and temporary head of the building department, effective April 15, 1975, at an annual salary of \$8,000 for the first 90 days, with advancement to \$10,000 annual salary rate after 90 days if appointment as head of department is made permanent, or retention as an inspector at \$8,400 per year unless terminated. Further, all benefits presently paid to other department heads, including retirement, be authorized; expenses chargeable to the building code department. Further, that the clerk be authorized to effect bonding as required for the building department.

Supported by Fox and carried. Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your finance committee recommends that the Iosco County Building Department join the "Building Officials and Code Administration Association" (BOCA) at an annual cost of \$100; representatives to be Mr. Francis J. Block and one additional person as determined by the board.

At 12:20 p. m., upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., the roll was called, all commissioners being present except Mrs. Burdett.

County Treasurer Edward Nel-

kie appeared before the board and passed out copies of a county financial report, thereupon reporting on tax collections, indicating that collections for the month of March were good and that he expects to have about 125 parcels on the May tax sale. He further reported on a new bill recently passed by the house of representatives which would postpone the tax sale until October, advising that the senate has not yet acted on the bill.

Harris Barkman and Ray Andrus, of the Tawas Area and Oscoda-Ausable Chambers of Commerce, respectively, appeared before the board to report that Cedar Point, Inc., of Sandusky, Ohio, is seeking a location in Michigan to establish a recreational/amenuse type facility, and that the chambers have contacted them to offer several proposed locations in the Oscoda Area, Oscoda Township officials having indicated their interest and receptiveness to the proposal. They further expressed the opinion that it should be a county-supported project and asked for an expression from the board as to its views and feelings in the matter. Executive Director Mike Nunn and President Roger McIntosh, of the Tawas Area Chamber, who were also in attendance, commented on the project — Nunn, with respect to highway development, and McIntosh proposing that it be ascertained if Cedar Point is interested in the area before proceeding further.

Chairman Foster thereupon proposed that the chambers submit a written proposal for the board's consideration, detailing the project and their request for county participation.

Mr. McIntosh addressed the board on behalf of an area flying club regarding hangar space at the county airport for their aircraft, indicating there is not adequate space at the present and asking about the possibility of the county constructing a hangar which they might lease. Chairman Foster thereupon proposed that they lease the land from the county and erect their own hangar, such as has been proposed to the D&M Railway Company. The possibility of the D&M constructing a hangar large enough to accommodate both aircraft was discussed by McIntosh, whereupon it was proposed that he contact Mr. Glen Highfield, of the D&M.

Area newspapers having been requested to submit bids for the publication of the commissioners proceedings pursuant to the requirements of rule 13 of the rules of order, the following sealed bids were opened by the clerk and read to the board, and thereupon referred to the finance committee for recommendations:

The News-Press Publishing Company, Inc.: \$5.00 per folio for publication in both the Iosco County News and Oscoda Press

At 2:25 p. m., the board recessed for committee work on order of the chairman.

Upon call to order at 5:00 p. m., Finance Chairman Griffin presented and moved adoption of the following resolution: The motion being supported by Fox and carried. Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your finance committee recommends that the chairman be authorized to sign all documents necessary to implement the maximum program in Iosco County.

Upon motion by Wereley, supported by Fox and prevailing, the board adjourned until April 16, 1975, at 9:30 a. m. for continuation of the April Session.

April 16, 1975

The Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order in continued statutory session at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: Burdett (District 3)

The board thereupon recessed to a committee-of-the-whole-board to hear the annual report of the Iosco County Road Commission and to perform other committee duties, the board to remain in recess until later in the day, so that the clerk might be excused for circuit court duties.

The board was called to order and session resumed at 4:30 p. m., all commissioners except Mrs. Burdett being present.

Commissioner Fox presented a resolution to authorize the issuance of the county motor vehicle highway fund bonds for the proposed new county road commission central garage and office facility, and moved its adoption, the motion being supported by Commissioner Griffin. Following a period of discussion on the matter, Commissioner Wereley requested that the matter be held over until tomorrow, whereupon the motion and support were withdrawn.

The board thereupon adjourned upon motion supported and prevailing, to continue in session at 9:30 a. m. on April 17, 1975.

April 17, 1975

The Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order in continued statutory session by Chairman Foster at 9:30 a. m. and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: Burdett (District 3)

The board thereupon recessed for committee work on order of the chairman, to stand in recess for the balance of the morning.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., the roll was called, all members except Mrs. Burdett being present.

Several township representatives and news media people being in attendance, Tax Equalization Director Robin Allain appeared before the board to present a report on proposed equalized property valuations for the various local units within the county for 1975, indicating the figures to be tentative due to the assessment rolls not having been totaled and finalized.

Allain submitted for the board's consideration three different proposals showing assessed and equalized valuations for each unit: One reflecting the recommendations of the State Tax Commission, representing 50% of true cash valuations as established by their appraisal survey, indicating a total county equalized valuation for both real and personal property of \$188,226,950; one showing a combined total of \$167,711,435, which was formulated by using last year's equalized valuations and applying losses, gains and adjustments; and the other representing Allain's recommendation, at which he arrived by using the State Tax Commission true cash value figures, which were established by an appraisal survey, and applying a 45% factor instead of the 50% used by the state, for a combined county total of \$170,446,613, or about 10% under the state's recommendation.

Township officials joined in the discussion of equalized valuations, wherein Oscoda Township Supervisor Charles Smith indicated his objection to the 1.11 factor applied to the assessed valuation of personal property in his township, claiming it to be unfair, due to assessments having been raised to the state recommendations without the factor. Discussion of the various matters continued for some time, with Allain explaining how the State Tax Commission ar-

rives at its recommended valuations for the county, indicating that he thinks they would accept his proposal of approximately \$170 million, or perhaps apply a small token factor, rather than insist on the \$188 million figure they recommend.

A brief recess was ordered by the chairman at 3:00 p. m.

Upon call to order at 3:15 p. m., Finance Chairman Griffin reviewed the proposed county budget for 1976, explaining it in detail and indicating that it represents approximately a 9% increase over the 1975 budget, excluding \$60,000 of new programs; further indicating that approximately 5.5 mills would be required to generate the necessary revenue, based on a valuation of \$170,446,613.

At 3:40 p. m., the board recessed for committee work on order of the chairman.

Upon call to order at 4:15 p. m., Commissioner Griffin presented and moved adoption of the following resolution: Honorable Board of Commissioners:

Your equalization committee recommends that the equalization report submitted by the director of equalization for Iosco County be accepted for further study and evaluation prior to adoption. A special meeting is recommended for May 1st for purposes of adopting the equalization report.

To \$500.00, \$8.00; \$500 to \$1,000, \$10.00; \$1,000 to \$10,000, \$10.00, plus \$2.00 per \$1,000 over \$1,000; \$10,000 to \$100,000, \$28.00, plus \$2.00 per \$1,000 over \$10,000; \$100,000 and over, \$208.00, plus \$1.00 per \$1,000 over \$100,000.

Plus \$25.00 additional per structure for multiple family and multiple units

Demolition

Sheds, private garages and accessory structures, \$8.00; 1 & 2 family structures, \$15.00; multiple family commercial, \$15.00, plus \$10.00 per \$1,000 of cost of demolition

For work started before a building permit is issued, double permit fee. \$5.00 for extra inspections in case of locked building or job not ready for inspection when called for.

Charges levied by the state for plan review will be charged to the permit applicant.
