

District Asked to Hold Judgment on Survey

Dr. Robert Halle, superintendent of Tawas Area School, Monday night asked residents of the district to withhold any judgment until all facts are gathered in the current study to determine if this school can return to a regular school day.

During the past three years, Tawas Area School has operated on a split session with the high school grades attending classes in the morning and grades six through eight attending classes in the afternoon. The elementary grades have attended a regular school day.

The change to the extended school day was necessitated by the lack of classrooms and other facilities to handle the bulging school enrollment of three years ago.

The superintendent told members of the board of education

Monday night that it now appears there will be 200 fewer students in the school system next fall, with the majority of the loss coming in grades six through eight comprising the present middle school.

In prepared answers to questions submitted by the high school newspaper staff, Halle said "we are taking a close look at potential schedules, room needs and staff needs. Our goals are to maintain or improve program offerings for students, keep class size at a respectable level and provide for the separation of age groups."

He said there is a possibility "that our findings could result in a recommendation to stay on split sessions."

The superintendent, high school and middle school principals, along with counselors, are presently gathering information about the

possibilities of getting off split sessions. Any decisions reached will be discussed with the staff before they are presented to the board of education, which makes all final decisions.

Discussions up to the present time have indicated that the present fifth grades would remain in the elementary school next year as sixth graders. Next year's seventh through 12th grades would, hopefully, have a better over-all schedule with an opportunity to take more classes than just the five now allowed.

The superintendent pointed out that students in other nearby districts, such as Hale or Oscoda, have an opportunity to take anywhere from six to eight classes.

Halle said that the school would have to add classes, not take them (See SCHOOL, page 7.)

Plant Under Construction

Whittemore Area Lands New Industry

A community-wide effort on the part of Whittemore residents, together with financial support from the surrounding area, has landed prospective employment for 50 persons by next spring to improve the economic outlook for the entire Western Iosco County area.

Ground was broken Friday afternoon for a new 14,300-square-foot manufacturing building to be located one-half mile east of Whittemore on Sherman Road. The \$218,000 concrete block building is to be the new home of Valeron Corporation, which presently operates 51 tool manufacturing operations in seven countries.

Destined to house the firm's 52nd plant, the block and brick building is to be completed in 120 days, or about March 1.

The new Whittemore plant will be Valeron's second in Iosco County, having operated its Valcraft Division at the Tawas Area Industrial Park in Baldwin Township for the past three years.

Officers of the newly-formed Whittemore Industrial Development Corporation signed a lease agreement Friday with representatives of Valeron Corporation and a contract was authorized by the IDC with Higgins, David and White, Flint, low bidder among four contractors to construct the new building.

A bulldozer operated by Hal Katterman of Hale began bringing the site to grade Friday and footings are expected to be completed by Wednesday (today).

Idea for promoting the Western Iosco County area as a location for industry was conceived four years ago, according to Albert (Bud) Wrathell, president of the Whittemore IDC.

"Our first attempt to bring in a manufacturing plant was unsuccessful, but it was a good educational experience—we learned a lot," he stated.

When it was learned that Valeron was interested in another plant location to augment its operations

the new plant, which is to manufacture a variety of cutting tools.

Whittemore IDC, patterned after Tawas Area IDC, is a non-stock, non-profit corporation. Membership consists of individuals investing in the corporation. Besides Wrathell and McCluskey, officers include Henry Hicks, Whittemore department store owner, secretary; Paul Raynak, Whittemore hardware store owner, vice president. William Fuerst of Whittemore is the fifth member of the board of directors.

The IDC purchased 3½ acres of land for location of the new building and has an option to purchase additional acreage for establishment of an industrial park.

With success in landing a plant on only its second try, the IDC will now attempt to locate other small manufacturing plants in the Whittemore area.

"We would like to bring in another three or four small plants," said McCluskey. With the kind of enthusiasm and cooperation shown by residents of the Western Iosco County area, officers of the new IDC have good reason for their optimism.

State Investigation Sought in Election

Formal request for an investigation into alleged election irregularities last week at Tawas City was submitted Thursday to the Michigan Department of State's election division.

Requesting the investigation were Herbert W. Cholger, mayor-elect; Robert Rollin, councilman; Lyle Healey, defeated candidate for councilman; Joseph VanDette, president of Tawas Concerned Taxpayers; Jerry Snoblen, a registered voter.

A copy of the letter was filed Thursday afternoon with the county clerk by Healey.

The letter to the secretary of state's office charged that no ready access was given the public after closing of the polls and that counting of the ballots in the mayor's race was finished before the public was allowed in the city hall.

"With the finish of the counting for mayor, the public was allowed access, but an unreasonable barrier distance was established of some 15 to 20 feet," stated the letter.

The letter also stated that after public access was allowed, canvass of votes in one precinct was done in another room not visible to the public.

It was also stated in the letter that there were known cases of votes cast by persons registered in Tawas City, but in violation of the election law.

The letter concluded by stating that verbal agreement regarding certain challengers had been given candidates Friday, October 31, after the legal deadline, by the city clerk. It was claimed that access to the polls was not allowed when polls closed on November 4, "this naturally caused undue resentment."

Mrs. Mary Byrd, city clerk, said Thursday that no verbal agreement had been made with anyone concerning the challenge of votes.

According to the state election law, any political party, organization or committee interested in establishing challengers must file a statement with the city clerk not less than 10 days prior to an election. She said this was not done by anyone.

Mrs. Byrd stated that prior to the closing of the polls on election night, a large number of persons came into the polling place shortly before 8 o'clock and Roy Bergeron, election board chairman, asked those not waiting to vote to leave the building until the polls officially closed.

She said the front door of the firehall, which serves as the polling place, was not locked at any time.

Mrs. Byrd also stated that the public was permitted in the building during the canvass of votes and, while space limitations in the main room required use of a rear office for counting, election inspectors canvassing ballots were visible to the public through an open door and voices of the inspectors could be heard by the public in the area designated for spectators.

Ballot Recount Slated Thursday

A recount of ballots cast for and Herbert Cholger as mayor-councilmen in the November 4 general election in Tawas City is to be held Thursday, 1:30 p. m., at the Iosco County Building. Conducting the recount will be the Iosco County Canvassing Board.

Filing for the recount was Lyle Healey, a defeated candidate in the general election. According to unofficial results election night, totals received by candidates were as follows: Jerry Cotter, 377; Robert N. Rollin, 324; Charles Landon, 255; Healey, 224; Bobbie Ann Kehoc, 147.

The top three candidates in the election are to take over office effective January 1. Rollin was an incumbent and elected to his third term.

The regular canvass of the election was held Thursday by the county canvassing board, which confirmed the election of Cotter, Rollin and Landon as councilmen

and Herbert Cholger as mayor-elect. Defeated candidates have six days to petition for a recount, which was requested Friday by Healey.

D. Keith Papas, county clerk, said that Thursday's work of the canvassing board consisted of comparing totals in the poll books with the number of ballots issued during the election, checking computation of total votes received by candidates, examining records to determine if poll books were properly signed by election inspectors and to determine if election box seal numbers were properly recorded.

Ballots stored in sealed boxes in the city vault were removed Monday to the county clerk's office for the actual recount on Thursday. No petition was filed for a recount of ballots in the race for mayor and only ballots for councilman are to be recounted.

Iosco Commission Under Fire for County Juvenile Facility Suggestion

A casual suggestion made at a recent meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners has touched off a storm of controversy among Alabaster and Tawas Township residents.

At Wednesday's meeting of the commission, petitions signed by 770 persons were presented opposing establishment of a juvenile facility at the former Rood ranch in Alabaster and Tawas Townships.

Robert Foster, commission chairman, told the more than 20 persons attending the session that the commission had taken no action concerning such a facility and, in fact, had merely inspected the property after a suggestion was made by the county extension director.

Marvin Davenport, county extension director, during submission of his annual report to the commission, reported that officials of Michigan State University had contacted him and stated MSU was interested in some form of local public management of its property in this county.

The property in question is 1,400 acres of farm, forest and

prime hunting land in Alabaster and Tawas Townships, formerly owned by the late John R. Rood. At the time of his death, the will of the one-time law professor of the University of Michigan stipulated that the land would become the property of MSU. Litigation over terms of the will was settled in the courts and the 1,400 acres were removed from the tax roll a number of years ago upon transfer of the property to MSU.

During discussion with Davenport concerning possible county management of the property, should such an arrangement be made with MSU, Chairman Robert Foster suggested that a portion of the property might be utilized as

a site for a county juvenile detention facility.

Foster's chance remark apparently touched off a wave of protest as petitions presented Wednesday were signed by persons in various areas of Northeastern Michigan.

The commission chairman explained to those attending Wednesday's meeting that MSU had directed Davenport to contact the board of commissioners to see if the property could be possibly used to benefit the community, that only a brief discussion had been held as to possible uses of the property and that no action had been taken.

Would Invite Townships and Other Groups to Assist Study

Possible use of the former Rood property in Tawas and Alabaster Townships for agricultural - forestry research, conservation and development is to be studied by county and township governments, along with other interested agencies and groups.

This announcement was made Monday afternoon following a meeting between a representative of Michigan State University, owner of the property, and members of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Robert Foster, chairman of the commission, said one of the first

aspects of the program would be a thorough study of the will of the late John R. Rood to determine how the property could best benefit the public according to wishes of the former University of Michigan law professor.

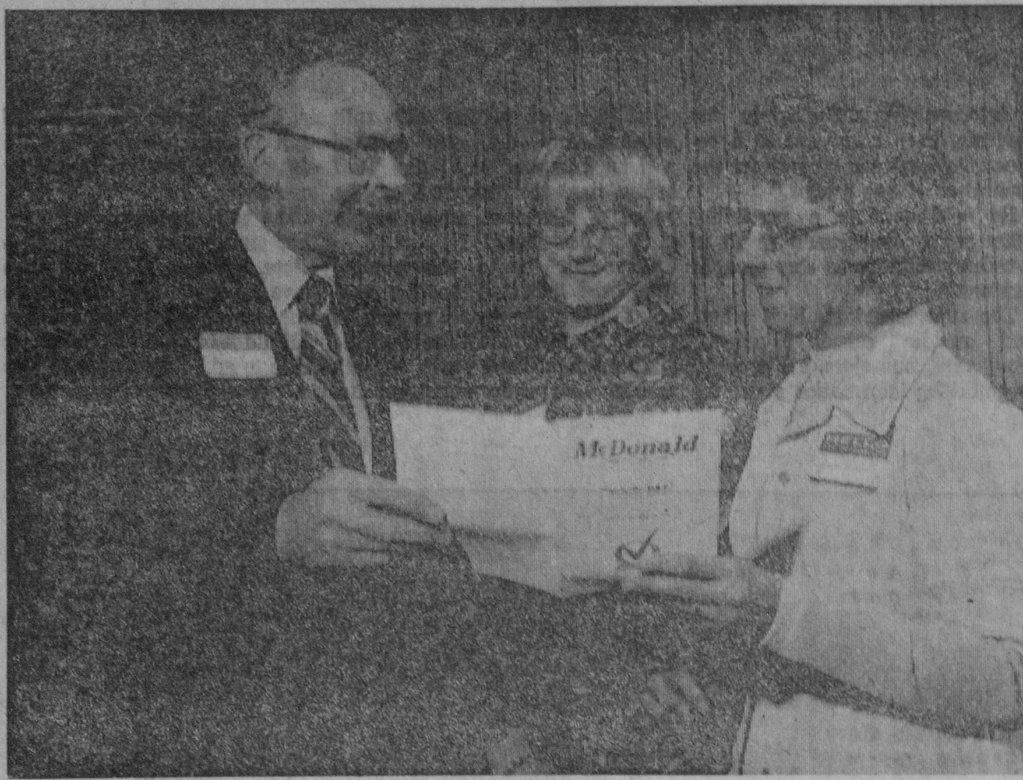
Initial study of Mr. Rood's will indicates he was primarily interested in agricultural research and conservation in the future use of the property.

The chairman of the board of commissioners emphasized that the Townships of Alabaster and Tawas, in which the property is located, along with the board of

commissioners, the county planning commission and such youth groups as 4-H Clubs and boy scouts would be involved in the study.

Action on turning the matter over to the county planning commission, which will coordinate the study, is expected to be taken at the November 18 meeting of the board of commissioners.

Foster said, too, that a study would be made toward obtaining state and federal funds to finance any undertaking on the property as the county would be without funds for use and development.

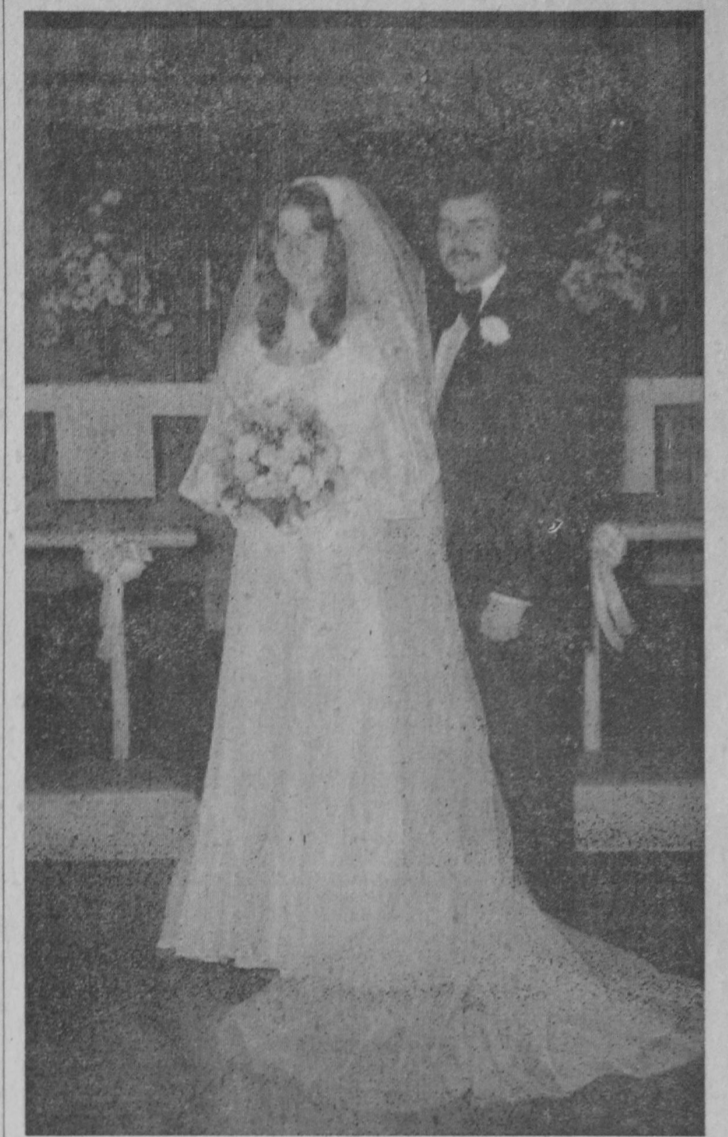
AARP Had Program on Protection

NOTICE OF HEARING ON AMENDMENTS TO RULE 2, RULE 3, RULE 12(K), RULE 13, AND RULE 14 OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY'S STANDARD RULES AND REGULATIONS

On July 3, 1975, Consumers Power Company (the "Company") filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4867 which requests authority to amend Rules 2, 3, 12(k), 13, and 14 of its presently effective Standard Rules and Regulations (MPSC No. 7 - Electric, Consumers Power Company).

Rule 2 relates to the installation of electric service lines from the Company's distribution system to a point of attachment on the customer's premises;

Rule 3 relates to special arrangements necessitated by the customer's unusual facility requirements;

Rule 12(k) relates to electric distribution systems and service connections to provide service to mobile homes in courts;

Rule 13 relates to the Company's policy regarding the construction of new or modified electric facilities, other than service connections and metering equipment, to serve new customers or to serve changing needs of existing customers; and

Rule 14 relates to the installation of underground distribution systems and service connections.

The Company states in its application that the cost of construction of service connections and distribution systems, whether aboveground or underground, has greatly increased since the present rules and charges made thereunder were approved. However, the Company's presently effective Rules 2, 3, 12(k), 13, and 14 do not reflect these increased costs. Accordingly, the Company proposes to amend such rules to more appropriately reflect the current costs of constructing such facilities.

Proposed Rule 2 would require the customer to bear the cost of installing service connections from the Company's distribution lines to the point of attachment on the customer's premises, and provides that all such charges are nonrefundable and must be paid prior to the commencement of construction. For residential customers (including residential in mobile home courts and dwellings with no more than two living units), the service connection charge would be equal to the system-wide average cost of new residential overhead service connections. For commercial and industrial customers, and multiple dwellings of three or more units, the service connection charge will be based on the Company's estimate of the total construction cost.

Under existing Rule 2, service connections are in most instances provided at no charge to the customer.

Proposed Rule 2 also provides that changes in the route or size of the service connection made at the customer's request, or because of changes in the customer's requirements, will be made at the customer's expense. No ownership rights in any facilities provided by the Company will pass to any person as a result of charges made under proposed Rule 2.

Proposed Rule 3, dealing with unusual customer facility requirements, is reworded for clarity.

Proposed Rule 12(k), dealing with electric service to individually served mobile homes in courts, provides that construction of facilities under this rule may also be subject to contributions and deposits under proposed Rules 2, 3 or 13. Under existing Rule 12(k), construction projects covered by Rule 12(k) would not be subject to contributions or deposits under other rules.

Proposed Rule 13 states the Company's policy regarding construction or modification of electric facilities. For residential customers, proposed Rule 13 provides for a construction allowance equal to one year's estimated revenue from new permanent customers to be immediately served from the new facilities. Where the estimated costs of construction or modification exceed the construction allowance, a deposit equal to the difference between such costs and the construction allowance will be required. Refund amounts are based on one year's revenue from new customers added to the system, and a three-year refund period is provided.

Existing Rule 13 provides for a free extension of distribution facilities up to 1,000 feet in length to serve a new residential customer. For extensions in excess of 1,000 feet, a charge of \$1.30 per foot over 1,000 feet is made. Existing Rule 13 provides for refunds based on three times the annual revenue received from new customers added to the facilities, and the refund period is five years.

Where the construction of electric facilities is required to serve a commercial or industrial customer or any other customer not eligible for consideration as a residential customer, proposed Rule 13 provides for a construction allowance equal to the lesser of (1) \$15,000 or (2) the estimated annual revenue to be received from permanent customers to be immediately served from the new facilities. Where the estimated costs of construction or modification exceed the construction allowance, a deposit equal to the difference between such costs and the construction allowance will be required. Refund amounts are based on one year's revenue from new customers added to the system, and a three-year refund period is provided.

Under existing Rule 13, the construction allowance for commercial or industrial customers is three times the estimated annual revenue to be received from customers to be immediately served from the new facilities. The refund amount with respect to customers later served from the facilities is the amount by which three times the annual revenue contributed by such new customers exceeds the greater of (1) the original revenue estimate or (2) the highest preceding annual revenue. The refund period under existing Rule 13 is five years.

Proposed Rule 14, dealing with underground distribution systems and service connections, differs from existing Rule 14 primarily in that the section of existing Rule 14 covering the underground extension policy is deleted. All extensions, whether above- or underground, will be covered under proposed Rule 13. Proposed Rule 14 also provides that, where electric facilities are placed underground at the option of the Company, the required contribution will be determined according to the provisions of proposed Rule 13. Under existing Rule 14, where electric facilities are placed underground at the option of the Company or pursuant to local ordinance, the Company bears the cost of such construction.

Proposed Rules 12(k), 13 and 14 also differ from existing Rules 12(k), 13 and 14 in that payment of all required deposits and contributions in advance of the commencement of construction is expressly made mandatory. Under existing Rules 12(k), 13 and 14, payment in advance was at the option of the Company.

In addition to the foregoing, other changes to Rules 2, 3, 12(k), 13, and 14 were proposed by the Company. The application of the Company in Case No. U-4867 and copies of existing and proposed Rules 2, 3, 12(k), 13, and 14 are available for public inspection at the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, 525 W. Ottawa, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and at each local office of Consumers Power Company.


Hearings on the application in Case No. U-4867 have been scheduled and notice is given that:

A. A public hearing will be held at 9:30 AM on December 2, 1975 in the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan, for the purpose of determining whether or in what form proposed Rules 2, 3, 12(k), 13, and 14 of Consumers Power Company's Standard Rules and Regulations should be approved by the Commission.

B. Any party seeking to intervene in this proceeding, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission, at least five (5) days prior to December 2, 1975, an original and twelve (12) copies of the petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company. Service upon Consumers Power Company may be made by mailing (First Class) a copy of the petition to intervene to the Company's General Offices at 212 West Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201.

C. PROPOSED RULES 2, 3, 12(k), 13, AND 14 DESCRIBED IN THIS NOTICE ARE IN THE FORM REQUESTED BY CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY. THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION MAY EITHER AUTHORIZE THEIR ADOPTION IN THE FORM REQUESTED, DENY THEIR ADOPTION, OR MAY ORDER THE ADOPTION OF NEW RULES 2, 3, 12(k), 13, AND 14 IN A FORM DIFFERING FROM THAT DESCRIBED HEREIN.

State Starts Suit

Against Hart TV

Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley announced the filing of a lawsuit in Iosco County Circuit Court against Hart TV, Incorporated, and C. L. Hart of Oscoda.

The suit alleges that Hart TV is in violation of the new "Collection Practices Act" by use of a so-called "bad check notice" in attempting to collect on accounts.

"This form," Kelley said, "is generally used to notify persons of a no-account or non-sufficient fund check as required by the Michigan Criminal Code, before a complaint is made to the prosecutor. In this case, it was used on a check where payment was stopped. To threaten

criminal prosecution, where a crime has not been committed, to collect a disputed claim is misleading, harsh, oppressive and in violation of the law."

The facts involved a television set that was repaired and consumer who stopped payment on the check. The consumer claimed the television set was not properly repaired. The consumer then complained to the attorney general's consumer protection division which, after several attempts to contact Hart, recommended to the attorney general that this suit be filed.

"The Collection Practices Act," Kelley said, "provides for enforce-

ment of the department of licensing and regulation when a collection agency is involved and by my office when a person not required to be licensed is involved. I feel that this type of joint enforcement effort will effectively and speedily deal with consumer problems in the debt collection arena."

away. Students may be able to take a full year of the basic academic subjects, plus exploratory courses.

He said a concerted effort would be made to receive North Central and University of Michigan accreditation and felt this goal was a realistic possibility.

Halle felt that going off split sessions would have varied effects on townspeople, the staff and the student body. Some people would be less or more pleased than others, he said. The over-all effect on the community should be positive, he felt, and expressed the opinion that being on a split or half-day school session "is nothing for a student body, staff or community to be proud about."

Halle said that with 95 percent of the school districts in the state on a regular school day, split session cannot be an arrangement that the community should be striving to maintain.

At this time, said Halle, it does not appear that staying on or off split session will affect extra curricular activities significantly one way or another, although student organizations and clubs would have more opportunity to hold meetings during the regular school day.

Staying on, not off split sessions would probably cut down on the teaching staff and program, and particularly in the middle school level, where there will be 100 fewer students by next September.

"The community would not consider us to be very responsible if such drops in enrollment were not followed by staff reduction," said Halle. "Going off half days to whole day sessions will enable us to offer additional classes to students, thus creating a need for us to retain staff. It is hoped that any staff reductions that are called for by enrollment decline will take place through normal attrition and not the outright releasing of staff."

Halle said that present discussions call for quite a complete separation of age groups, including separate lunch sessions.

The superintendent said that getting off split sessions would not save tax money, as it is expected that the minimal additional cost will be required. The main reason and the only justification that can be used for getting off split sessions would be to offer students a program within the hours of a regular day, that is as good or better than the one presently received.

He said that dropping of and shifting of enrollment provides the ability now to house 131 sixth graders at the elementary level, along with a drop of about 80 students in grades seven through eight.

Both immediate and long range facility needs are being studied. Although immediate space needs are beginning to surface, said Halle, it will be a few months before long range space needs are determined.

"The public should know that no decision about split sessions has been made at the administrative, staff or board level," he stated.

"Our only request is that we be given an opportunity to do our 'homework' and present the efforts of our work before opinions are formulated. In essence, we are asking the public to have faith and hold judgment until all the facts are gathered, analyzed and presented."

Whittemore Postmaster Retired; 27-Year Service

John A. Dickey, postmaster at Whittemore, retired Friday, November 7, because of ill health, after 27 1/4 years of postal service.

Consideration Again Being Given to Iosco Skill Center

Consideration is being given to the possibility of again asking voters of Iosco County to approve millage to operate a proposed vocational technical training center to serve students of four high schools in the county.

This was the word at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education. Dr. Robert Halle, superintendent of schools, said that consideration was being given by Iosco Intermediate School District to submit the proposal again to voters in March, June or possibly next fall.

The proposal was defeated twice by voters last year, first by a narrow margin and then by a three-to-one vote when the proposition was resubmitted in December.

Halle said the proposal calls for construction and development of the center at a cost of 1.6-million dollars and slightly more than one-million-dollars would be reimbursed either by the state or Upper Great Lakes Commission. The local cost for construction and development would be \$500,000.

He said that another \$532,000 would be required to equip and furnish the center, with \$212,000 to be reimbursed, leaving a local cost of \$320,000.

With 329 full time students expected for the proposed center, operational cost would be about \$460,000 annually with \$100,000 to be reimbursed by the state, leaving \$360,000 to be raised by local taxes.

Halle said this would be the equivalent of 1.6 mills for operation and would require a vote of the people.

According to information from the intermediate school district, a survey of business, industry and

potential students had been conducted showing the need for the center.

Halle believed that should such a center be constructed, it would greatly benefit the educational offering for high school students.

In answer to Carl Babcock, president of the board of education, who questioned if the new center would mean that present vocational operations in the local high school would be cut back if the skill center is developed, Halle said he did not believe it would mean that vocational offerings in the high school would be reduced.

Halle and Prin. John Alexander expressed the view that the skill center would offer more advanced training than presently available in the high school's vocational program.

Halle said the intermediate school district had two possible sites in mind for the new skill center, one 3 1/2 miles west of the Tawas on M-55 and the second four miles north of the Tawas on Aulerich Road leading to the Iosco County Airport.

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Tawas Area Board Approves Wrestling for School Athletics

Alexander said that the schedule would include five league games and four nonconference games, including Oscoda, Sanford and Boyne City. A game with Carrollton has not been confirmed as yet.

The basketball schedule for 1976-77 would be identical to the schedule for this term, with the exception that Whittemore-Prescott Area, a member of the new conference, would replace Saginaw St. Stephen in Tawas' schedule.

The middle school and elementary school are to be dismissed at 3:00 p. m. Friday in an effort to avoid traffic congestion expected on area highways the day before deer hunting season.

Set Public Meetings on College Bill

A series of seven public meetings will be held throughout the state this fall on Senate Bill 1080, the Community College Districting Plan.

The bill is designed to provide equal opportunity for every citizen of the state to have access to community college services and programs. It also provides for an operational tax levy without the vote of the people.

The hearing to serve this area of Northeastern Michigan is to be held Saturday, November 22, 11:00 a. m., at the Alpena Community College.

This districting plan has long been opposed by Tawas Area Board of Education as it places this school district in the Kirtland Community College District, rather than the Alpena or Delta Community College Districts.

Iosco County presently is not included in any community college district, but the proposed plan would place Oscoda Area School District in the Alpena Community College District, while Tawas Area, Hale Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area School Districts would be included in the Kirtland Community College District.

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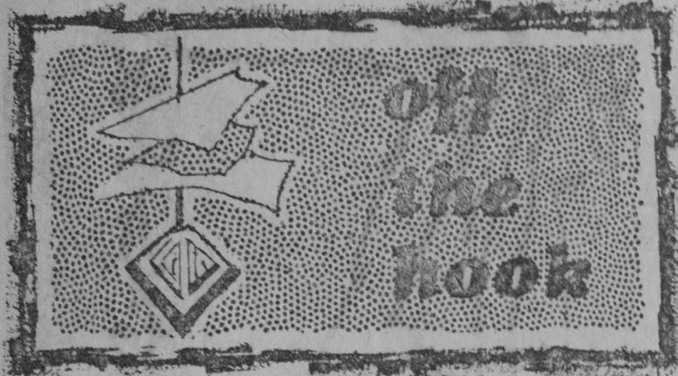

Some residents of Iosco County were again sent into convulsions recently when the Herald reported that Robert Foster, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, suggested a possible use for the former Rood property in Alabaster and Tawas Township, now owned by Michigan State University.

During discussion with Marvin Davenport, county extension director, on a proposal by MSU for county management of the 1,400 acres, Foster commented that it would make an excellent location for a county juvenile detention facility.

His comment was strictly casual, but as a veteran commissioner and former law enforcement officer, he could visualize a portion of the property as a potential site. His remark, however, touched off another controversy, blown all out of proportion, as evidenced by meetings of township boards and petitions submitted to the board of commissioners in protest.

The words, "juvenile detention facility," are apparently tabu in this county, just as they were a number of years ago when the medical care facility property was suggested as a possible site for a juvenile facility.

It is ironic, but not one petition or protest was heard from area residents when local juvenile delinquents torched the old unoccupied house and barn on the Rood property and practically obliterated other buildings through acts of vandalism. What was once a nice farm is no more and other unoccupied buildings in the area have had the same fate.

No petitions of protest were heard in recent months when other old houses in Alabaster Township were torched and those involved, including juveniles, were apprehended by the sheriff's department. Except for the owners of property vandalized, very little is heard when juveniles responsible for breakings and enterings in the area are apprehended.

The above lawless acts were not committed by "outside monsters," but by residents of the local area—some from the townships involved.

Detection of a juvenile delinquent is a serious problem for probate court authorities and law enforcement agencies. State law

prohibits detaining in jail anyone under 16 years of age and juveniles between the ages of 16 and 17 years, committed by probate court, must be kept separate from all other prisoners. This creates a variety of problems at the county jail and, as pointed out by Probate Judge William McCready, there have been two suicide attempts at the jail in recent months by prisoners with adult bodies and juvenile minds.

As for runaway juveniles apprehended in the local area, law enforcement agencies and the courts are faced with a serious problem. In one instance last summer, three juveniles apprehended in a stolen car at East Tawas had to be held at the city hall between 3:30 and 9:00 a. m. until there was a special court hearing and then officers had to babysit for the prisoners until parents arrived in the afternoon. In the meantime, the juveniles actually were hauled off to the courtroom bench.

But the main problem is not with outsiders, it is what to do with juvenile offenders from the local area. Between times of preliminary and formal probate court hearings, juvenile offenders who cannot be controlled by their own parents must either be jailed or transported to Bay City or Saginaw for detention at a rate of \$35 a day.

"We hold detention of juveniles to a minimum, but who are we penalizing, the offenders or the sheriff's department?" asked McCready. "There have been many times in the past when youthful offenders should have been given the opportunity to think over their wrong acts through detention, but we just do not have a place to keep them."

At some point in time, Iosco County must address itself to the serious problem involved with detaining our own juvenile delinquents, perhaps even the future youthful offenders who will torch or vandalize the property of persons who signed petitions last week, or in some other way be hauled into probate court.

This county may even have to cooperate with adjoining counties in order to build and operate such a facility in order to reduce costs. What then?

Tawas Area Bravettes Upset Undefeated Gladwin, 45-43

Tawas Bravettes ended a four-year drought against Gladwin Thursday night by upsetting the visitors, 45-43, who had been undefeated going into the game. The Tawas squad, undefeated at home, turned the tide against

Gladwin with excellent passing, shooting and rebounding in the first quarter and a come-from-behind surge in the fourth quarter. It was Tawas' first win over the Gladwin girls in four years. Utilizing a fast break to good ad-

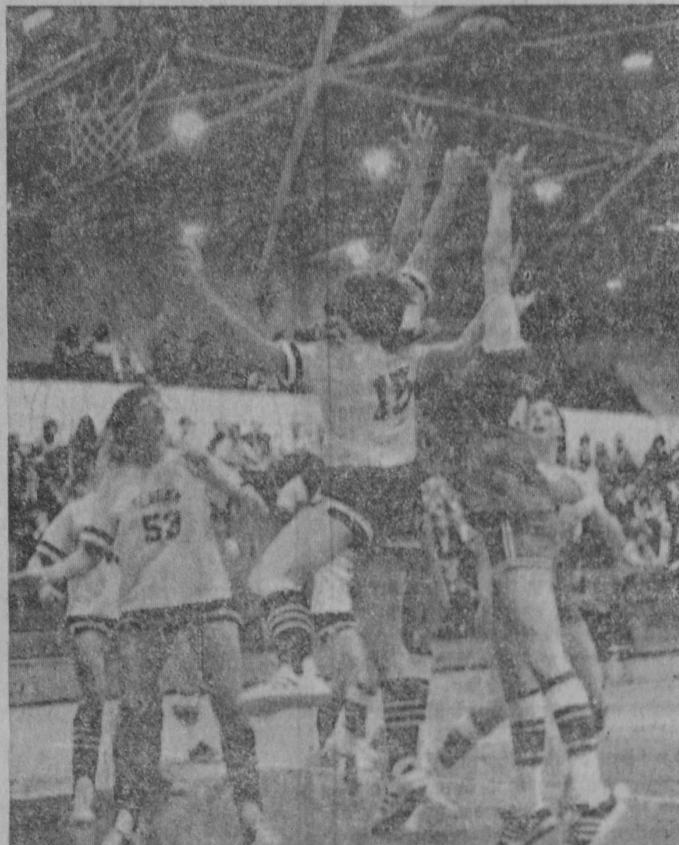
vantage, the Bravettes jumped off to a 20-10 margin in the first quarter as Mary Jane Williams hit the hoop for eight points, while Helen Anschuetz and Jacquie Johnson were contributing four points each and Tammie McKenzie added two.

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: Since my wife and I both will reach age 65 early in 1976, we plan to apply for retirement benefits next month. What papers should we take with us to the social security office?
Answer: You should take your social security card or a record of your social security number, proof

of your age and your wife's age (preferably a birth or baptismal certificate made at or shortly after birth) and your marriage certificate. If your wife is applying for benefits on her own work record, she should also take her social security number.
Question: I know that my social

security retirement benefits may be reduced if my income for the year is over \$2,520. Do I have to count all income I have in figuring the total amount for the year?
Answer: You must count earnings from work of any kind—whether or not the work is covered by social security—except tips amounting to less than \$20 in a month from one employer. Total wages, not just take-home pay, and all net self-employment earnings must be added together. However, you do not have to count income from savings, investments, pensions, insurance or royalties. This income does not affect your social security checks.

Question: My husband has been unable to work since he was severely injured in an auto accident about two months ago. Our family doctor suggested he apply for social security disability benefits. Will my husband have to have any special medical tests or examinations to get payments?
Answer: Probably not. Medical reports will be requested from his doctors and from hospitals, clinics or institutions where he has been treated. He is responsible for paying any charge for the medical reports. If additional medical in-

formation is needed to determine whether he is disabled, he may be asked to undergo special medical examinations or tests. The government will pay for any such supplemental examinations.

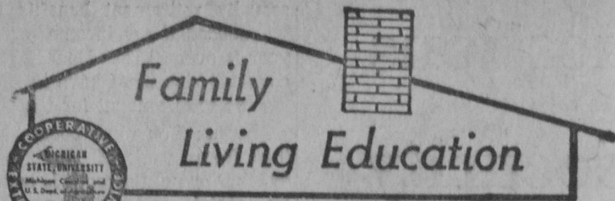

QUICK AND EASY DESSERTS

The coming weeks will be busy with extra activities for most families. Deer season is just around

the corner, with Thanksgiving popping up quickly, followed by the Christmas holiday rush. Quick and easy recipes can help bridge the time gap. The dessert recipes suggested below do just that. Do not be confused by the raisin pie recipe. It is not a typical

raisin pie but more like a pudding mixture.

RAISIN PIE
 1/4 cup butter or margarine
 3/4 cup sugar
 3 eggs
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 1/2 cups seedless raisins
 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
 1 stick pie crust mix
 Whipping cream or ice cream

Cream butter and sugar together until well blended. Beat in eggs and vanilla (mixture will look slightly curdled). Add raisins, walnuts and crumble in the stick of pie crust mix, stirring until well distributed. Pour into a greased nine-inch pie plate; bake at 325 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream. Makes six to nine servings.

APPLE STACK CAKE
 1 can (1 lb.) applesauce
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 45 graham crackers (halves of double crackers)
 1 pint frozen whipped topping, thawed
 Red and green marachino or candied cherries or chopped salted nuts

Combine applesauce, cinnamon and nutmeg in a saucepan and cook on medium heat until heated through. Place nine graham crackers

together on a plate. Spread one-fourth of the applesauce mixture on them. Top with nine more crackers then another one-fourth applesauce mixture. Build two more layers and place the last nine graham crackers on top. Frost top and sides of the cake with whipped topping. Garnish as desired. Refrigerate at least one hour or overnight. Makes nine servings.

OCTOBER SESSION

October 14, 1975

Pursuant to statute, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:45 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley

Absent: None
The communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

The clerk called attention to the great disparity of water and sewer rates between the county building and the jail. The rates for the county building being almost double those of the jail and usage of the county building being only a fraction of that of the jail. Although the matter was explored before and found to be due to the larger (3-inch) inlet for the county building, the matter was referred to Commissioner Fox for further investigation.

Following a brief recess at 10:25 a. m., Regional Library Director Mark Ames appeared before the board to present a financial report and to discuss their budgetary needs, enumerating for the board the many repairs needed on their building. He further submitted a list of library material and equipment needs and cited the many increases in their costs such as salaries, postage etc., proposing that federal revenue sharing be considered as an additional funding source. Following a discussion of the matter with Mr. Ames, Commissioner Foster proposed that the board make a tour of county facilities, including the regional library, during the October session.

At 12:00 noon, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. on order of the chairman.

AFTERNOON SESSION
Upon call to order at 1:45 p. m., the roll was called, all commissioners being present.

Following the completion of the communications, the board recessed at 2:05 p. m. on order of the chairman, for a discussion with Equalization Director John Rose on the 1975 tax levy.

Upon call to order at 5:15 p. m., the board recessed until 9:30 a. m. on October 15, 1975, on motion supported and prevailing.

The Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order in continued statutory session at 9:45 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3), Fox (District 4) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: None
The board thereupon recessed upon order of the chairman, for a discussion with Equalization Director John Rose in reference to the local units that do or don't have certified assessing officers, the clerk being excused to attend to circuit court duties.

Upon call to order at 10:00 a. m., the budget hearing was officially declared open by Chairman Foster.

Roger McIntosh, John Lippert and Harris Barkman, representing the Tawas Chamber of Commerce; Ray Andrus, of the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce; and John Hill, executive director of the Hale Area Chamber of Commerce, appeared before the board to discuss their programs, activities and accomplishments, requesting continued financial support from the county. Discussion with chamber representatives in reference to county participation continued for some time, it being proposed by Commissioners Foster and Griffin that chamber representatives meet with the allocation board, as that body determines the millage which generates the funds on which the county must operate.

The clerk submitted and discussed a report prepared by his office showing unemployment benefits that have been paid to date to former county employees, segregated as to CETA and regular employees, which are accruing as an obligation to the county, submitting the possibility of CETA funds being no longer available when the obligation becomes due for reimbursement of benefits paid to former CETA employees. In further discussion, Commissioner Griffin reported that there is a provision for reimbursement to the county in the event the CETA program is terminated before the ob-

ligation becomes due.

County Treasurer Edward Nelkie appeared before the board to discuss the recently adopted animal control ordinance, expressing the opinion that the \$1.00 additional charge for dog licenses, effective after March 1st each year, will not produce the desired effect of inducing owners to purchase licenses, but, rather, will promote delinquency; further proposing that license fees be doubled after March 1st, beginning with 1976, as statements are already printed for this year. He further requested that board members meet with him prior to any changes or amendments to the dog laws because of the involvement with his office.

Circuit Court Reporter William Gay appeared before the board in reference to the hearing on the proposed 1976 county budget, noting that the budget does not reflect any increase in his salary and requesting that the board reconsider the matter. Mr. Gay noted in his presentation that a recent statutory increase for salary minimums of circuit court reporters actually results in a decrease in his supplemental salary from the county. The matter was discussed at some length, wherein board members explained the board's procedure for determining salary increases, Finance Chairman Griffin commenting with respect to the statutory minimum and supplement, that the supplement is justified only when the statutory minimum is not adequate.

With respect to the budget hearing, the clerk raised the matter of unknown cost for administration of the new campaign finance law and the fact that there will be three major elections next year, proposing that the allocation for election expense for 1976 be reviewed and perhaps increased.

At 12:00 noon, the budget hearing was declared closed by the chairman, who further ordered that the board stand in recess until 1:30 p. m.

Having remained in recess to complete committee duties, the board was called to order at 4:10 p. m. and the roll taken, all commissioners being present.

Finance Chairman Griffin reported, representing and moving adoption of the following resolutions:
