## Tawas City Parking Talk Being Re-Opened

At the suggestion of Mayor John N. Brugger, a public hearing is to be held in the near future—possibly at the December 3 council meeting or at a special meeting—concerning a parking proposal made last March. The mayor had proposed in March to create a special tax assessment district to finance and develop a parking lot-office complex west of the county building. The council later approved the taking of options to purchase property presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron and Mr. and Mrs. George A. Prescott at the site for the proposed project.

As part of the plan, it was proposed to exchange a portion of the Prescott property with Carl and Brent Babcock as a site for a new office building to replace a cluster of buildings on the south side of Lake Street. The vacated Babcock property would then be cleared and used for city park expansion and an application was submitted to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to determine its interest in park expansion.

The matter immediately proved to be a controversial topic at council meetings and was submitted to the city planning commission to determine estimated costs of the proposal as well as to give consideration to a plan submitted by Councilman Robert N. Rollin concerning development of an alternate parking lot at the west end of the city park.

A preliminary report was given two months ago by the planning commission, which had been expanded to include development of Court Street from county property to M-55 and added greatly to the total projected cost.

The mayor expressed the opinion Monday night that the council should define its purpose concerning the proposal.

## TC Council Adopts Sewer Tax District for 10th Avenue

Establishment of a special assessment district to finance construction of a sanitary sewer on Tenth Avenue was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

The action came two weeks after a public hearing was adjourned to hear objections from two property owners in the district.

One objection came from Alvin M. Cholger, who questioned the front footage on one of his lots and a written objection was entered by Robert Clayton, owner of three lots which are to be assessed in the district. Clayton asked that the sewer serve two of his lots, but was of the opinion that it should not be extended to serve a third lot on Dead Creek as he had no plans for selling or developing the property and expressed the opinion that it would not appreciate in value due to the effect of the nearby scrap yard.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that he had investigated Cholger's objection and found that

two lots owned by Cholger and Clayton were 73 1/4 feet in width according to survey monuments. Other lots along the street are 60 feet in width.

It was the city manager's opinion that all benefited lots should be included in the special assessment district because any future construction would be costly and, if sewer service was requested in the future, the question would probably arise why property along the creek was not included in this special assessment district.

The sewer is to be constructed from Fourth Street 544 feet to a point just south of Dead Creek. The project had an original cost estimated by engineers at \$19,000, but the sewer is to be constructed by the city crew and the estimated cost is \$13,825. Cost to the property owner would be \$15.96 per assessable front foot and there would be no connection charge.

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City Clerk Clyde Soper said the engineer's report indicated that estimated cost of the total project had increased at a rapid rate during recent years and, should the project be delayed, the cost would continue to increase. It was for this reason that the engineering firm recommended construction of the sanitary sewer by annual stages.

## Propose Tawas Lake Sewer Work by Stages

At the suggestion of the city engineer, East Tawas is to study development and extension of sewer service to the Tawas Lake area over a period of years rather than to undertake a massive single project.

As the result of discussion at Monday night's council meeting, the matter was turned over to the board of public works for study. It was recommended that Spicer Engineering Company be contacted and a special meeting be called in the near future.

Paul Ropert, city superintendent, told councilmen Monday night that Spicer Engineering had suggested construction of the \$650,000 project by annual stages—possibly in segments of approximately \$100,000—to avoid the complications of establishing a special assessment district to finance the total project.

One of the keys to completion of the project under this plan would be the complete understanding and cooperation in the proposal by benefited property owners, who would finance the work through payment of connection charges as construction progresses.

Sanitary sewer service to the Tawas Lake area has long been discussed as the need is recognized due to expansion of residential dwellings in that area and the fact that septic tanks do not prove satisfactory.

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## Fire Marshal Reports on Bulk Storage

In answer to questions raised at its November 3 meeting, a report from the state fire marshal's office concerning gasoline storage tanks of Forward Oil Company was read at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

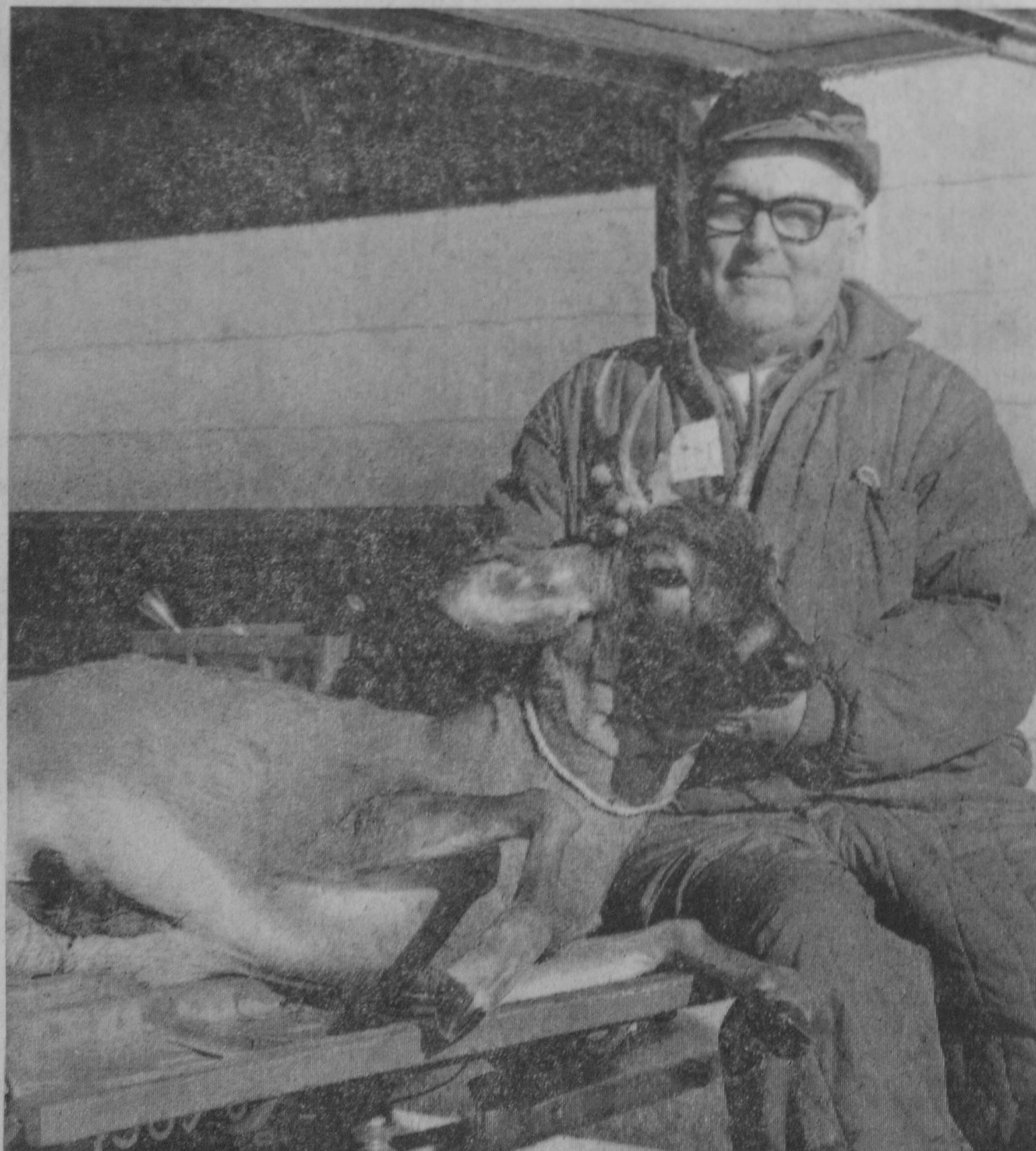
According to the report, the fire marshal's division of the Michigan State Police had inspected the bulk storage plant in October and listed a number of corrections to be made by the owner in order to comply with state laws.

The letter stated that dikes are required around liquid storage tanks, along with emergency venting, removal of weeds, installation of proper warning signs and provision for removing liquids from the top of tanks rather than the present system.

Councilmen expressed the opinion two weeks ago that the bulk storage plant should be inspected because of its proximity to Tawas Hospital.

In other business, the city manager reported that revenue to date from the municipal boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue amounted to \$970. Operational cost to the ramp totaled \$301, which included \$262 in wages paid to the attendant, leaving a profit of \$699.34.

A request from Tawas Area Rotary Club to hold a circus July 17 on the elementary play field and nearby city property was approved by the council. Tawas Area Rotary Club is to clean the grounds following the circus and is to provide portable toilets for the day.

## Reno Road Crash Saturday Night Fatal to Prescott Teen; Driver Injured

A crash on Reno Road, one-quarter mile south of M-55 and about three miles west of the M-55-M-65 intersection, Saturday night claimed the life of a Prescott youth and critically injured the driver.

Dead is Clay Willis Best, 16, who sustained a broken neck in the crash and was trapped in the

burning wreckage. Listed in critical condition at St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw, is Joseph D. Muckenthaler, 17, Prescott, driver of the car.

Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that the driver was rescued from the burning vehicle by residents of Reno Road, who heard the crash

and saw flames from the burning vehicle.

The car was traveling north on the road and went out of control after crossing a bridge at the base of a hill. The vehicle skidded sideways and crashed into a tree stump along the roadway.

Neighbors used a crowbar to pry open the door on the driver's side

to rescue Muckenthaler, but Best was trapped under the wreckage of the dash and the door on the passenger's side was against the tree stump.

Hand extinguishers had no effect on the fire and rescuers were forced to retreat because of the intense heat. The Whittemore Fire Department was called.

## East Tawas to Cooperate With DNR in Construction of Launching Ramp

Approval was given Monday night by the East Tawas Council to cooperate with the Michigan Waterways Commission in the development of a small boat launching facility on city property east of Wadsworth Street.

A communication had been received by Mayor Robert Bolen to the effect that the state wished to undertake the project, despite the fact that funding has not been approved as yet on the total state-federal project for Tawas Harbor.

The proposed \$200,000 boat launching facility would be constructed on the site of the present city garage and the city maintenance facility would be moved to a different location.

The city's cost in the project would be \$20,000, representing 10 percent of the total. The council approved its share of the engineer-

ing plans, to be completed by Edmands Engineering Company of Bay City.

No word has been heard as yet concerning the council's recent resolution asking the submerged lands division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to rescind an access permit presently held by Gordon MacAndrew at the base of Wadsworth Street. The private property owner and the city could not agree on a price to resolve a problem existing with the proposed ramp and parking area due to MacAndrew's access permit to reach the former office of his charter boat operation.

In addition to the above, Mayor Bolen recommended that the lands and buildings committee study formation of a special assessment district to pay for a parking lot east of the proposed ramp and developed by the city a number of years ago at a cost of \$4,305. Property included in the district would include Hester's Market, Lixey's Restaurant and Sail-Fish Marine.

In other business, a complaint from American House, Incorporated, regarding distribution of advertising literature in doors, was referred to the chief of police for investigation. It was stated that doors had been damaged during recent high winds when not properly closed by solicitors, who had left advertising materials. The po-

lice chief is to investigate to determine if solicitors had complied with city ordinance which requires a license.

A building application approved two weeks ago by the council for Kenneth Verlac was rescinded at Monday night's meeting. An \$8,000 addition to his real estate office had been approved, but it was later determined that expansion of a nonconforming use is not permitted by the zoning ordinance. The property owner has the right of petition to the zoning board of appeals.

A letter was read from the East

Tawas Garden Club asking the council to enforce local and state ordinances in regard to burning of leaves. The club suggested that a fall cleanup campaign be conducted to pickup leaves. The matter was turned over to the ordinance committee for study.

The city clerk was instructed to meet with City Atty. Michael Freel to establish a special assessment district for construction of sidewalks in commercial areas. In addition, adoption of an ordinance prohibiting fishing from the East Tawas bridge as a safety precaution is to be considered.

## Detroit Motorist Killed Near Oscoda

A 39-year-old Detroit man was killed and two persons were injured Friday in a two-car crash 4 1/2 miles west of Oscoda on River Road.

Killed in the crash was Charles E. Holman, a Detroit policeman, who was alone in his car.

Injured were John J. Dwiwers, 25, Oscoda, and Thomas Lowery, 26, Union Lake, a passenger. Dwiwers was treated at Wurtsmith Air

Force Base Hospital. Lowery was given emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and was transferred to Saginaw St. Mary's Hospital, where he was reported Monday as being in stable condition.

Investigating Oscoda - AuSable Township Police said that Dwiwers was headed east on River Road and attempted to pass another vehicle on a curve. Holman was headed west and a head-on collision was the result.

Also, the question of how many of the subjects to be taught, will be duplications of those already taught in the schools.

It sounds great to hear how much will be supplied by grants, but there is a fact that we are all aware of, but which is usually deliberately ignored and that is that no branch of government whether federal, state or local, can give us anything that it has not first taken away from us, unless it borrows the money, and in that case there has to be a reckoning sometime, as in the case of the City of New York.

If you get the impression from this letter that I am against a skill center, you are right. I have been brought up to believe the purpose of school was to educate the student in the subjects that will be of some use to him in the future, not to baby sit until he reaches voting age without knowing what or whom to vote for.

A good part of the news today does not speak very highly of our educational system. Perhaps we do need a juvenile detention center more than a skill center. I suggest that voters demand some solid facts and figures before buying anything as nebulous as the proposed skill center.

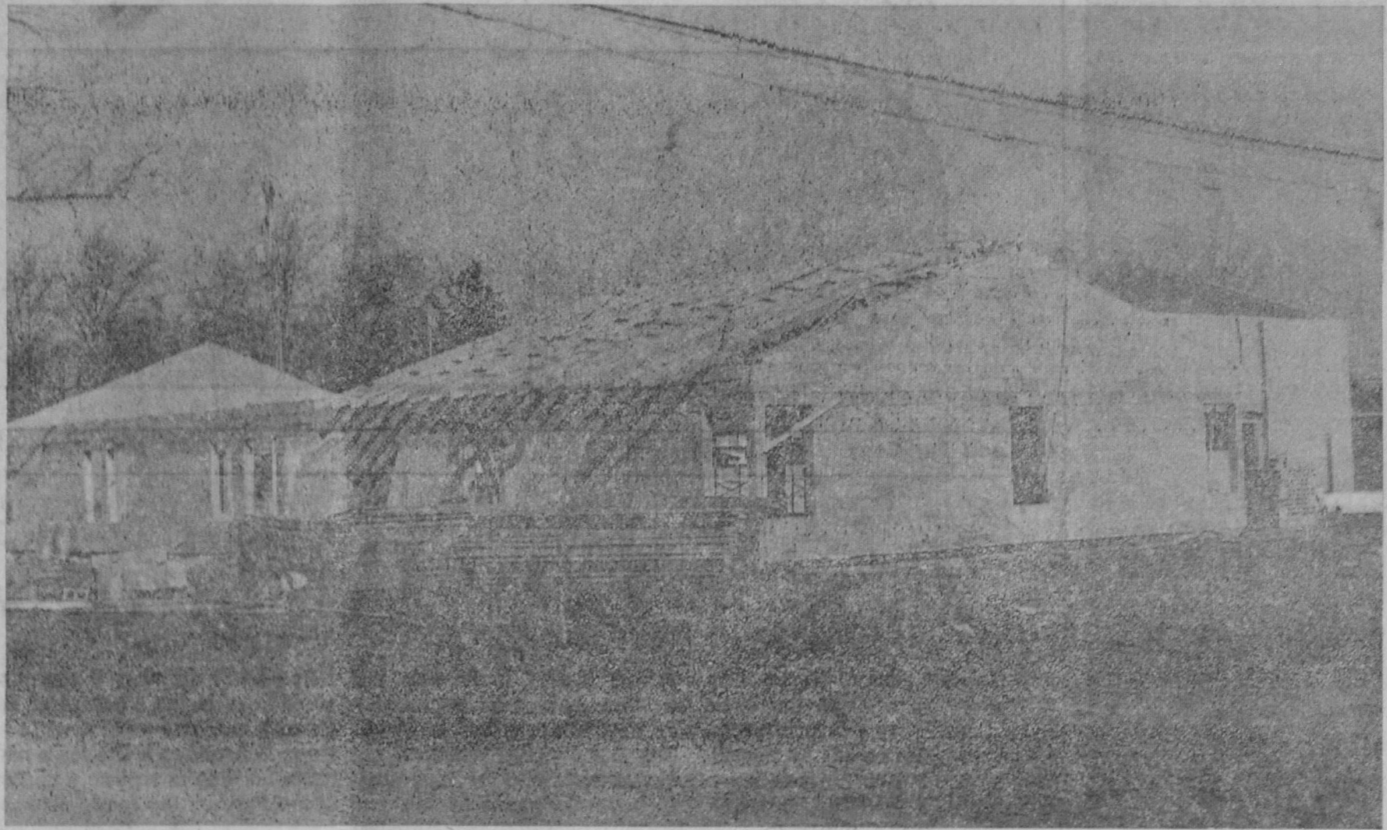

# Discuss Bicentennial Observance Plans Tonight at Tawas Committee Meeting

A report on a tentative program for the bicentennial observance in 1976 is to be made Wednesday night (tonight) at the regular monthly meeting of Tawas Area Bicentennial Committee. The meeting is to be held at the county building, 8:00 p. m.

The program committee held its first meeting Thursday night at the high school library under direction of Mrs. James Machleit, chairman. Larry Wingrove has been named chairman of a committee to handle the parade.

According to a decision made several months ago by the general committee, the week-long program leading up to the major observance on Sunday, July 4, is to be patterned after activities held here

during the centennial observance of 1876.

Printed programs of the two events held during the 1876 centennial observance, along with a detailed account of the celebration contained in a diary of a former sheriff, have been studied by the program committee.

Rather than hold all major events on the Fourth of July, as was the case during the centennial, the committee has decided to incorporate 1876 activities into an expanded week-long program next July.

Some of the events taken directly from the centennial program include a band concert, social events, programs by various clubs, organized games for children and

adults, costume contests, a program by elementary children, patriotic speeches from the county building steps, a bowery in the Tawas City Park for dancing, fireworks and a parade.

Students of Tawas Area High School have suggested establishment of a building as a temporary location to house a museum during the celebration and are arranging details.

An invitation is extended to all organizations and churches of the Tawas area, along with interested individuals, to become involved in planning for the bicentennial observance, and to help carry out the program.

Tonight's meeting and all future sessions of the committee are open to the general public and participation is encouraged.

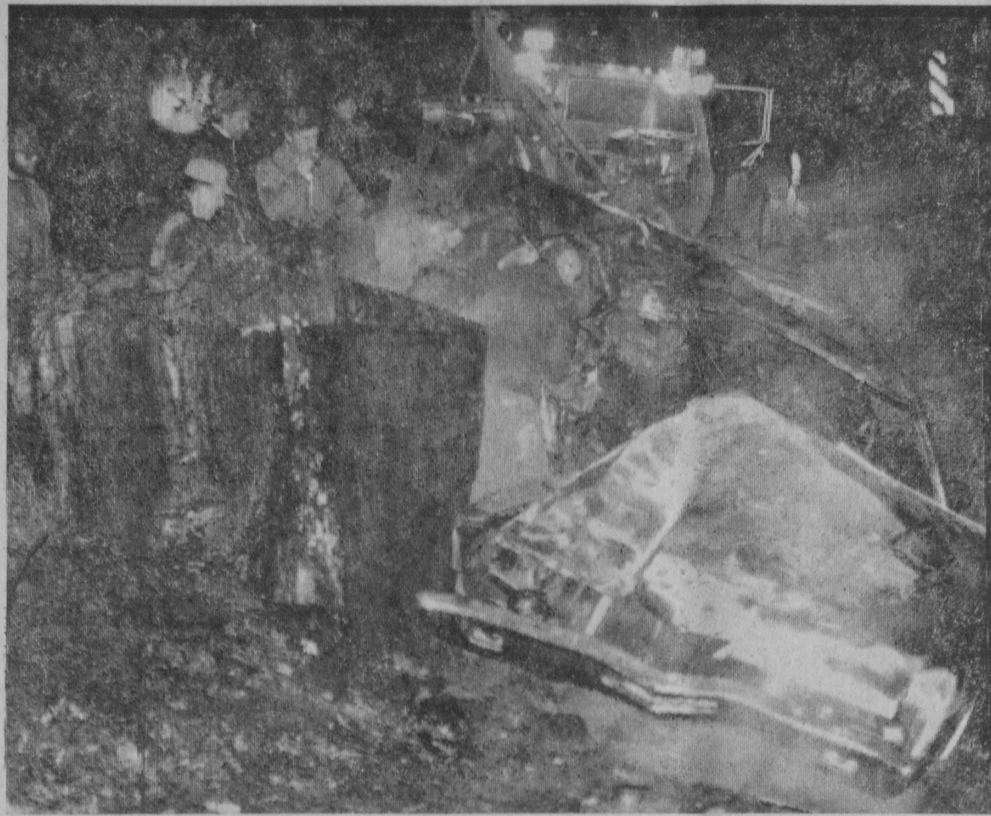

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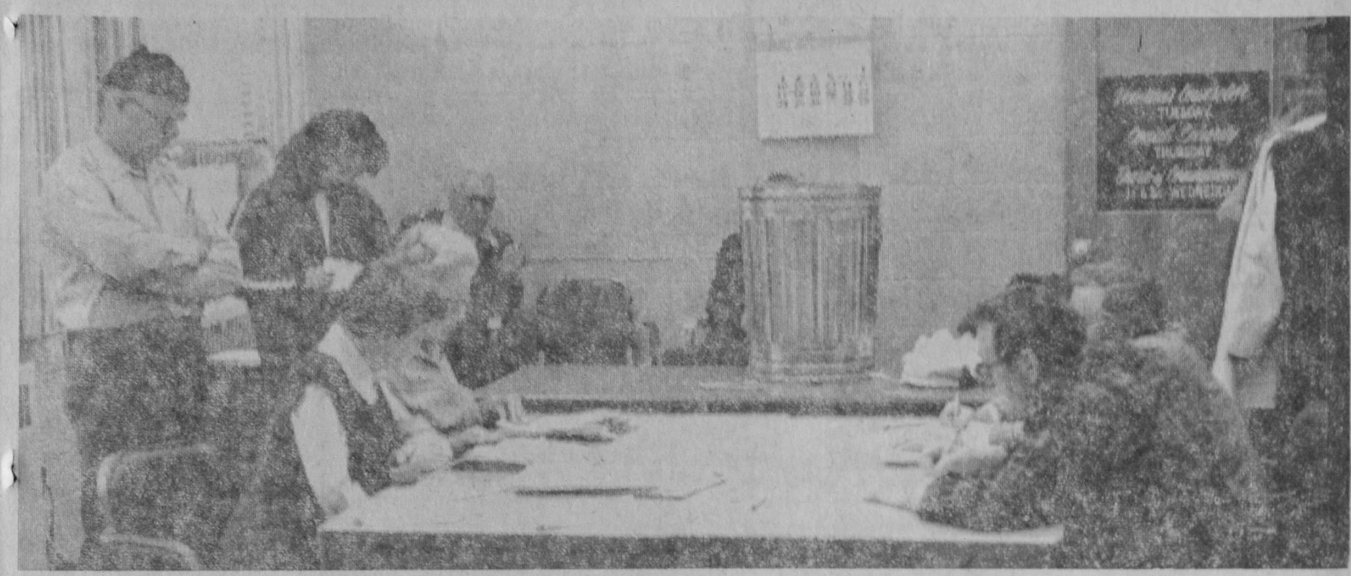

## County Canvassing Board Vindicates Tawas City's Election Night Ballot Count

No significant change was found Thursday by the Iosco County Canvassing Board in a recount of ballots cast for councilmen in Tawas City's general election held November 4.

Totals of three candidates remained the same as determined election night, while the totals of three candidates were reduced from one to three votes. Lyle Healey, who filed for the

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recount, lost three votes, while Robert N. Rollin and Mrs. Bobbie Ann Kehoe each lost one vote. Candidates with slight gains in the final count were Charles Landon, four votes more than counted election night; Benjamin F. Brewer, gain of two votes; Jerry Cotter, gain of one vote.

The canvassing board determined that nine ballots could not be counted on Thursday. Included were four ballots on which voters used a check mark instead of an "X" mark and four ballots were not counted because squares in front of more than three candidates were marked by the voter.

It could not be determined by the canvassing board which of the above improperly marked ballots had or had not been counted by the city election board. In Landon's total election night, the election board apparently failed to credit him with five votes in one precinct, but he lost one vote in another precinct for the final change in his total.

Official seals on the ballot box containing all ballots were found by the canvassing board to be properly locked, but the metal seal on the bag containing the First Precinct ballots had not been locked. The canvassing board ruled the precinct was recountable as the total number of ballots coincided with poll book total for that precinct.

As a result of the recount, official totals for city council candidates are as follows: Cotter, 378; Rollin, 323; Landon, 259. The above three candidates were confirmed as being elected.

Totals for the other three candidates were: Brewer, 243; Healey, 221; Kehoe, 145.

No petition was filed for a recount of the mayor's race and totals remain the same as determined election night with Herbert Cholger winning over Arthur Ziehl.

Cost of the recount is to be approximately \$100, according to County Clerk D. Keith Papas and is to be borne by the City of Tawas City. The filing fee to the candidate requesting the recount is \$5 for each precinct or a total of \$15.

## Henry K. Loud of Oscoda Marked 100th Birthday Anniversary Nov. 17

Henry K. Loud, Iosco County's oldest resident, observed his 100th birthday anniversary Monday, November 17. Despite failing health, he was able to greet friends at an open house held at his home at 410 West Dwight Street, Oscoda.

Two of his nephews and families from Chicago, Illinois, and New York City, New York, along with relatives from the Oscoda area and other parts of Michigan, helped him to mark the occasion.

Loud, whose grandfather, Henry M. Loud, founded a lumbering empire on the AuSable River in 1867, is probably Michigan's last living link with the lumbering era.

He was superintendent of the Loud's two giant mills at Oscoda when the twin towns at the mouth of the AuSable River were wiped out by fire in 1911, ending large scale lumber manufacturing in this area for all time.

Prior to that, he had learned the lumbering business under tutelage of his father and uncles. When pine timber began to wane in the 1890s, he had charge of dismantling the Potts Mill at AuSable—site of the pioneer mill in that community and one of the world's largest—and consolidated the Loud operation as it moved deeper into the interior of Michigan to tap the last white pine timber resources.

Loud served as a young naval officer during the Spanish American War and his ship was under fire at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, while his uncle, George Loud, later congressman from this district,

served at the side of Admiral Dewey in the battle for Manila, Philippines.

Following many years of residency at Detroit, Loud and his wife, who passed away last year, made their home on a bend of the AuSable River.

He has greatly enjoyed his role as the family's patriarch at Oscoda and has delighted Oscoda area children, as well as adults, with stories from his vast knowledge of Michigan's history. He has been a major benefactor to the Oscoda Township Library, the United Methodist Church and cultural activities of his community.

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## Teacher Topic: Changing Behavior in the Classroom

Dr. Hunt Reigel, member of Western Michigan University's special education staff at Kalamazoo, was guest speaker at a recent inservice conference at Tawas Area High School. Reigel's topic was "Changing Behavior in the Classroom."

The audience related specific behaviors found to be inappropriate for the classroom and Reigel outlined different methods of changing or decreasing the behavior. Most of the management techniques dealt with decreasing negative behavior, but techniques for increasing positive behavior were also discussed.

Although many of the procedures centered around the behavioral theory, empathy training and reality therapy were also a part of this presentation. Reigel stressed that it is necessary to label the child's feeling for him in a non-threatening or condemning manner, such as, "It looks to me like you are really angry."

It is important, said Reigel, that children know their feelings and that these feelings are normal, but one must give alternative ways to vent and deal with these feelings.

Hyperactivity and violence on television were touched on in the course of the day. Reigel related that 90 percent of the cause and the cure of hyperactivity is in the environment, not in medication. He felt that violence on television was having a desensitizing effect on society toward violence.

He associated a lack of group

belongingness to a peer group, with a decrease in school achievement and increases in the dropout rate, drug and alcohol abuse and suicides in school age children. An alternative or solution was the re-instatement of effective education in schools.

The day-long presentation was attended by teachers from Hale, Tawas and Oscoda areas with psychologists, social workers and special education consultants and directors from mental health and Iosco Intermediate School attending.

The program was provided to local school districts through the intermediate school district.

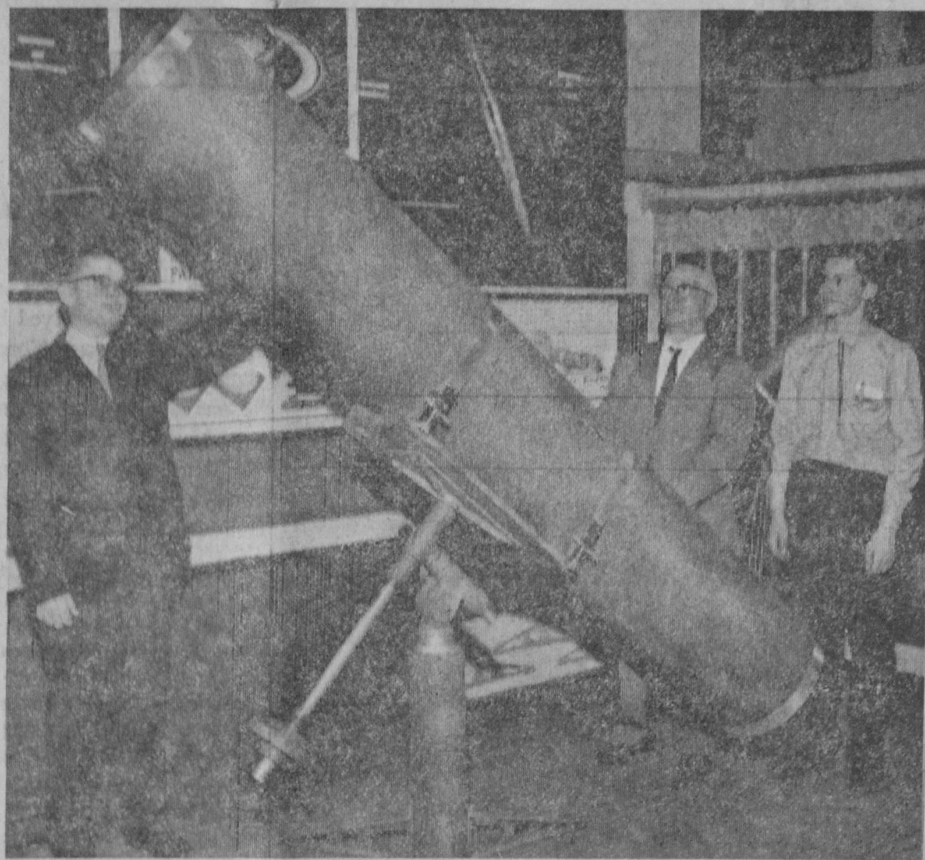
In other business, the club decided to hold its annual Holiday Cheers party Sunday, December 14, 5:00-7:00 p. m., at the American House, East Tawas.

## Name School Observatory Honoring Grant Resident

The Huff Intermediate School of Lincoln Park claims the distinction of being the only intermediate school in the state and possibly in the entire United States that has its own observatory, housing a 12½-inch reflecting telescope.

The observatory was dedicated November 7 to Hector J. Robinson, now a resident of Grant Township, for his vision and efforts on behalf of the citizens of Lincoln Park.

A teacher and administrator in Michigan public schools for 40 years, Robinson and his wife retired to their home near the East Branch of the AuGres River in 1968.

While a member of the faculty of Huff Junior High School at Lincoln Park, Robinson's science classes had built several small telescopes and the idea arose to construct a complete and much

larger instrument which, when completed, would prove to be among the largest and finest instruments available to pre-college students anywhere.

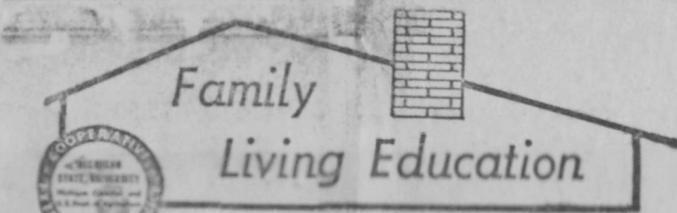
Under Robinson's guidance from 1961 to 1964, his students worked long hours grinding the mirror and then assembled a fine reflector telescope. Before Robinson's retirement, work was started on a building to house the instrument and a number of improvements have been made in recent years.

This equipment is in use daily and hundreds of young people are learning about the universe because of its existence.

Robinson was honored November 7 as creator and curator emeritus of the observatory.

In addition to his long career in education, the 73-year-old Robinson is a naturalist, craftsman, expert bowman and sportsman. He

is still interested in astronomy and has constructed several reflector telescopes since his retirement here in Iosco County.

### FREEZE YOURSELF SOME SPARE TIME

With Thanksgiving rapidly approaching, it is time to think of ways to cut down time spent in meal preparation on the festive day itself. A freezer can help with this. Time saved can be enjoyed on Thanksgiving Day visiting with family and friends.

Below are some do-ahead recipes that can be prepared now and enjoyed with the traditional turkey.

### FROZEN CRANBERRY SALAD

1 can (16 oz.) jellied cranberry sauce  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
¼ cup mayonnaise  
¼ cup confectioners sugar  
Crush cranberry sauce with fork. Add lemon juice. Pour into waxed paper containers or metal molds. Combine remaining ingredients and spread over cranberry mixture. Package for the freezer and freeze. Makes six to eight servings.

### SPICY COMPANY PIE

1 - 9 inch "plain pastry pie shell (baked and cooled)  
½ cup light brown sugar

1 cup canned pumpkin  
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice  
1 quart vanilla ice cream, softened  
Combine sugar, pumpkin and pumpkin pie spice in medium-sized bowl. Fold softened ice cream into pumpkin mixture until no streaks of white remain. Spoon into cooled pastry shell, making soft swirls all over with back of spoon. Freeze at least two hours or until firm.

\*Add three-fourth teaspoon nutmeg and one-fourth teaspoon cinnamon to pie dough recipe.

### FREEZER COLE SLAW

1 medium head cabbage, shredded  
1 green pepper, chopped  
1 carrot, grated  
1 teaspoon salt  
Mix salt with cabbage, let stand one hour, squeeze out excess moisture, add carrot and pepper.  
While cabbage is standing, make this dressing:  
1 cup vinegar  
2 cups sugar  
¼ cup water  
1 teaspoon whole mustard seed  
1 teaspoon celery seed  
Combine ingredients and boil one minute. Cool to lukewarm and pour over slaw mixture. Put into containers, cover and freeze. Thaw in just a few minutes for serving. Leftovers may be refrozen.

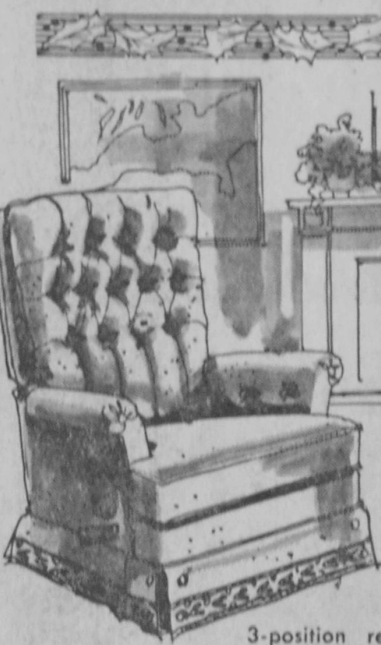

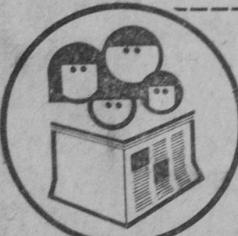

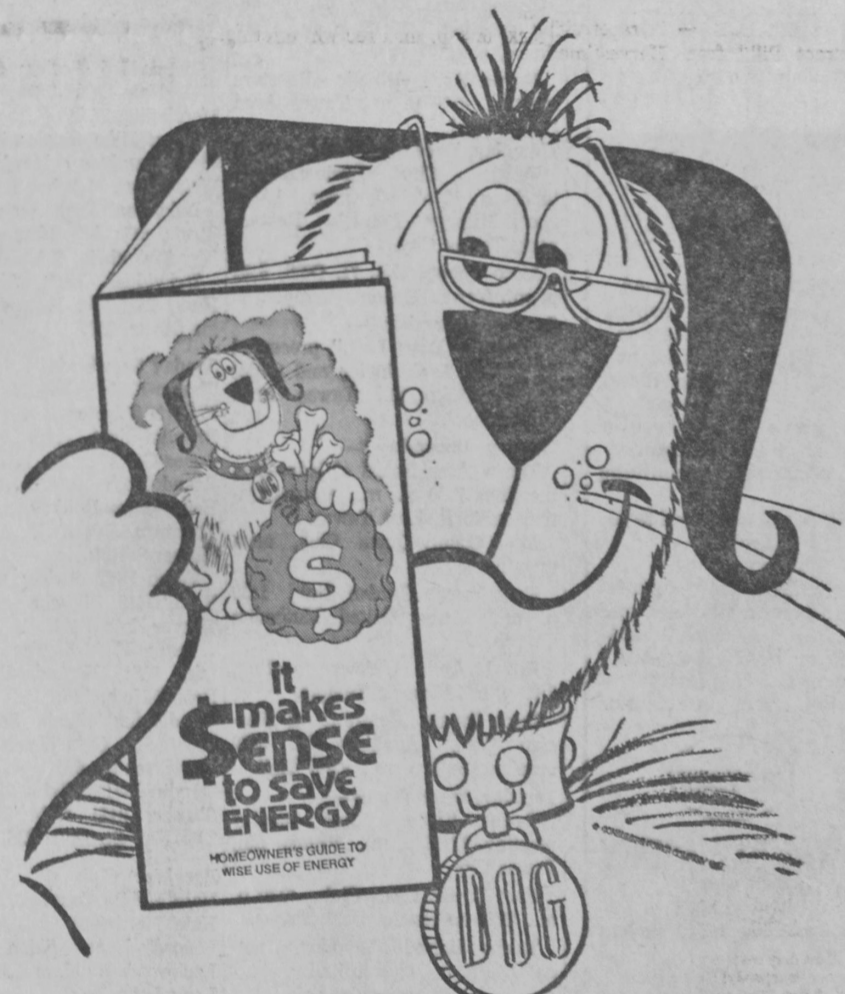

## Explain Rule on Payment for Kidney Illness

Question: My husband, who is 47, has kidney failure. He is going to a social security office next week to apply for Medicare. If he is eligible, will our children and I also be eligible?

Answer: No, not unless you too have permanent kidney failure. Under the kidney disease provision of the law, only the person with permanent kidney failure is eligible.

Question: When my husband was laid off from work last month, I took a job as a waitress. My employer has just told me that I have to pay social security contributions on my tips. Is this true?

Answer: If your cash tips add up to \$20 or more in a month of work for one employer, they are covered by social security and you are required to give your employer a written report of your tips. The report is due within 10 days after the end of the month in which you receive the tips. Your employer will collect from you the social security contributions due on the tips you report to him. For more information, contact a social security office and ask for a copy of "Social Security and Cash Tips." This leaflet tells how and when to report tips.

Question: My mother was very ill recently and the doctor had to come to the house to treat her. Will Medicare pay for his visit or does it only cover office visits to the doctor?

Answer: Medicare's medical insurance helps pay for covered services your mother receives from her doctor no matter where she receives them—in her home, in his office, in a hospital or skilled nursing facility or in any other location in the United States. The Medicare handbook explains what doctors' services are covered and how medical insurance helps pay for them. If your mother does not have a copy of the handbook, she can get one at any social security office.

# Forest Fires Were Devastating in 1871

Notes from Michigan's Attic

The year 1871 witnessed what was probably the most devastating fire that ever struck Michigan. All across the state during that long, dry summer, forests were ablaze.

An Alma man who made the trip from that place to East Saginaw in October 1871, over the Plank Road noted that he had passed 17 dwellings, eight barns, two school-houses, one shingle mill, one saw mill and innumerable fences that had been consumed by fire.

For days on end, the skies over Saginaw throughout the summer of 1871 were covered with a dense, yellow cloud of smoke. Fear was felt that the city itself would be destroyed.

Autumn came without the much needed rains; and the fires continued, laying waste huge areas of forest.

"Yesterday, the atmosphere was dark and murky," the Saginaw Courier reported on October 8, 1871, "The smoke pervading the atmosphere in such an extent as to be almost intolerable to weak eyes. The smoke during the evening was absolutely painful, hanging over the earth like a pall. The accounts of the ravages of the conflagration to the north and west of us afford a solution that is well calculated to excite the most serious apprehensions."

What Saginaw was experiencing under its smokedarkened skies was being duplicated throughout the state. The Thumb area to the east was ablaze, whole towns being destroyed. Ships hovered along the Lake Huron shore to receive refugees who escaped into the water.

To the west, a large portion of Gratiot County had been wiped out and across the state the destructive fire ravaged community after community. One man recalled in later years that at night he needed no lamp in his house, the skies were so bright with flames.

The Cities of Manistee and Holland were nearly totally destroyed by flames. Hundreds were left homeless.

A witness of the Holland fire recalled that on Sunday, October 9, 1871, the woods in almost every direction were on fire and hot ashes were falling within the city limits. At 2:00 p. m., the wind turned toward the city and began to increase in velocity. The fire alarm was sounded and men fought fires all along the outskirts of the city. By midnight, winds of hurricane force were blowing and the fire moved closer to the city.

It hit with full force about 1:00 a. m. Monday, sweeping through the downtown section, leveling almost every building in two hours. Destroyed were 210 dwellings, 75 stores, offices and shops, 15 factories, five churches, three hotels and 45 miscellaneous buildings.

Although over 300 families were left homeless, only one death resulted from the fire, that of an aged widow.

On the same Sunday, the fire in Manistee started and in the same manner was spread by a gale which rose in the evening. Piles of blazing sawdust and wood slabs filled the air and spread the fire

throughout the city. Destruction was nearly complete. The ashes in Holland and Manistee had not cooled when word came of the destruction of the great city of Chicago, Illinois, and

the horrible fire at Peshtigo, Wisconsin, where hundreds perished. Ten years later in 1881, the state was again visited by fires which destroyed vast areas and towns. Again in 1891, fires swept across

the cut-over lands of the north causing extensive damage. (Written by John Cumming, director of Clarke Historical Library, Central Michigan University.)
