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*Fourth Friday Count Shows*

**Iosco Schools Have Enrollment Drop**

Although fourth Friday enrollment figures were still unofficial as of Tuesday morning, it appears as though the student count in Iosco County's four public school systems will be slightly lower than last year. Two parochial schools in the Tawas have also shown a slight decrease.

Total enrollment reported by public school administration offices is 8,029 students, as compared to 8,126 last year. The above totals do not include adult education students.

The enrollment in Tawas' two parochial schools is 167, as compared to 177 last year. Emanuel Lutheran School in Tawas City has 47 students, as compared to 53 last year, while St. Joseph's Catholic School at East Tawas has 120 students, down four students from last year.

Not included in the total for public schools are 27 students enrolled in the Bright Horizons Learning Center for mentally handicapped operated by Iosco Intermediate School District.

A review of unofficial enrollment figures for each district is as follows:

**TAWAS AREA SCHOOL**

Showing a decreasing enrollment over the past three years, Tawas Area School continued that trend on the fourth Friday with an unofficial count of 1,973 students, as compared to 2,004 last year.

Supt. Robert Halle said Tuesday morning that official reports would not be received in his office until later this week. The unofficial count lists 388 students in the Tawas City Elementary Unit, 319 in the East Tawas Elementary Unit, 511 in the middle school and 755 in the high school.

The superintendent said the drop in enrollment would have a relatively small effect on the school's total budget as Tawas Area receives only \$63.88 per student in state aid.

The district is now in the process of preparing a comprehensive census of preschool and school-aged children in the district in order to determine the direction for future building needs.

**OSCODA AREA SCHOOL**

An enrollment drop of approximately 50 students was noted Tuesday morning by Supt. Robert Hodges, who said that complete returns had not been received as yet from the various school buildings. The unofficial count on the fourth Friday was 3,949, as compared to 4,001 last year.

However, the change in the formula for state aid to schools, coupled with local budget adjustments and a return slightly higher than expected in federal funds, will greatly benefit this district in 1975. Instead of a deficit of \$210,000 as projected at budget time, the school now expects to have a surplus of \$150,000 on its 1975-76 budget.

"We are tickled to death over our improved financial standing, inasmuch as we are still negotiating contracts with three unions whose members are employed by this school district," said Hodges.

Negotiators for Oscoda Area Education Association and negotiators for the board of education met with state mediators last week and OAEA has petitioned for fact finding in an effort to settle the contract.

In addition to being benefited by the boost in state aid as the district now receives \$345 per child, retirement of several teachers at the top of the salary scale and replacement with starting teachers has meant a savings to the district.

**HALE AREA SCHOOL**

After a number of years with enrollment increases, Hale Area School's enrollment as of September 26 seems to be stabilized at a figure slightly in excess of 750 students.

Supt. Wayne Case's office announced Tuesday morning that the fourth Friday enrollment count for elementary grades was 374 and the count in the high school was 409, for a total of 783. Last year, the

elementary count was 355 and the high school numbered 413 students for a total of 768.

The head count of students Friday had 47 children in the kindergarten, down six; 40 in the first grade, up 11; 36 in the second grade, down 12; 54 in the third grade, up six; 50 in the fourth grade, down six; 47 in the fifth grade, down 14; 65 in the sixth grade, up three students. There are eight special education pupils, the same as last year.

In the junior and senior high school, the seventh grade totals 74, down three from last year; the eighth grade numbers 74, down two from last year; there are 70 students in the ninth grade, 11 more than last year; the 10th grade number 65, down 15; the 11th grade total is 74, an increase of 18; the 12th grade numbers 52 students, down 13.

Because of its high valuation behind each student, Hale Area School receives no state membership aid reimbursement.

**WHITTEMORE-PRESCOTT AREA**

According to a report from Supt. Ray Kessler, Whittemore-Prescott Area School's enrollment showed only a slight decrease from last year. The fourth Friday count was 1,351 students, as compared to 1,353 last year. The adult education program, not included in the above total, has increased to 100 students, 11 more than last year.

Enrollment figures are as follows: Prescott Elementary, 338 students, down 25; Whittemore Elementary, 237 students, an increase of nine students; Sherman Unit (sixth grade), 96 students, as compared to 104 last year in that grade; junior high school, 247 students, down three students; high school, 433 students, an increase of 25.

**State Tax Sale Again Set for Next Tuesday**

After a six-month delay, the annual state tax sale is scheduled for Tuesday, October 7, 10:00 a. m., at the Iosco County Building.

The sale is normally held in May, but delinquent taxpayers of most Michigan counties gained a half-year reprieve last spring through action of the state legislature and governor.

Land on which 1972 and prior year's taxes have not been paid and were to have been sold in May will be subject to an interest rate of three-quarters of one percent per month from the date of delinquency to the date taxes are paid, sold or bid off to the state.

Edward Nelkie, Iosco County treasurer, said Tuesday morning that the 125 parcels to have been placed on the block in May have now been pared down to 63, representing the number of parcels on which taxes have been paid since the first week in May.

Lands which were advertised for sale on May 6 have not been advertised for sale on October 7, according to provisions of the legislative act. The new interest rate has been designated for each parcel to be sold.

**Historical Movie in Local Showing**

First public showing of the Michigan Bicentennial Commission's feature movie, "Michigan—Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow," is to be held Wednesday, October 8, 8:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building. There is no admission charge.

In addition, the film is to be shown Tuesday, October 7, at the Tawas Kiwanis Club meeting and on October 8 at the meeting of Tawas Rotary Club and at Tawas Area High School. The showing is sponsored by the Tawas Area Bicentennial Committee.

**Farewell Planned for Two Physicians**

A committee of interested residents comprising senior citizens' groups and other local organizations are to honor Dr. Jose F. Fuertes and Dr. Edmundo O. Sanchez at an open house and farewell party Sunday, October 5, 2:00 to 5:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building.

"Mrs. C. L. Braman, a member of the sponsoring committee, said Friday that all residents of the area are invited and urged to attend.

"The two physicians announced in late August that they would be leaving October 15 for their new practice at a hospital located at

Douglas in Southwestern Michigan. When the announcement was made, a controversy erupted in the Tawas and different citizens began circulating petitions asking the two physicians to stay in the community and demanded that the two physicians be allowed to work out an agreement to remain here and practice at Tawas Hospital.

The two physicians emphasized, however, that they had reached their decision to move and would do so in October. Doctor Fuertes has been on probationary status at the hospital since coming here two years ago, but Doctor Sanchez had not been allowed to practice at the hospital inasmuch as his credentials were still under investigation by hospital authorities.

Both physicians are natives of the Philippines and were classmates at the University of St. Thomas, Manila. Both spent their internships in New York City, New York, and practiced in New York and other hospitals in the Eastern United States before moving here.

"We would just like to give residents of the area and patients of the two physicians the opportunity to bid farewell and to show them our appreciation for their splendid work here," said Mrs. Braman.

**Peoples State Bank's Oscoda Branch Opens**

**Dead Man Found in Van**

Michigan State Police laboratory technicians have been unable to positively identify a man, whose decomposed body was found Saturday afternoon in a van truck parked northwest of the Tawas in Wilber Township.

Sgt. Kenneth L. Johnson of the Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas was traveling through a wooded area east of the former Silver Creek fire tower when he spotted the truck. Stopping to see if the vehicle was mired in the road, Johnson discovered the body in the truck.

It is believed that the body is that of an Ann Arbor man, who has been missing since August 16. Ownership of the vehicle was traced through a registration check. Officers believe that death was caused by a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

**West Branch Man Charged in TC Stabbing**

Kathy Kinnane, 20, Tawas City, who was treated Thursday night at Tawas Hospital for stab wounds to the stomach area, is reported to be in stable condition at the hospital.

Mark H. Woughter, 18, West Branch, who was arrested Monday, is being held without bond at the county jail after appearing Tuesday before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. He is charged with assault with intent to commit murder and assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder.

Miss Kinnane was taken to Tawas Hospital for treatment of her wounds at 10:45 p. m. Thursday. She resides in an apartment at 519 Lake Street in Tawas City.

**Three Suspects in Two Tawas Burglaries**

Iosco County Sheriff's Department is awaiting issuance of a warrant before releasing the names of two adults and a juvenile, whom they believe were involved in breakings and entries Friday night at Tawas Golf and Country Club and the Tawas Mobil Station in Tawas City.

The juvenile was arrested in his car early Saturday morning shortly after the burglary was discovered at the country club. The two adults, 19 and 20 years of age, both of the Lansing area, were arrested a short time later while walking along US-23 in Tawas City.

The juvenile admitted to officers that he was involved in the two burglaries and implicated the two older men. Identification of fingerprints at the scene are being awaited before a warrant is issued.

A quantity of change was stolen from vending machines at the two business places. Three other burglaries last week, along with five larcenies, two personal injury accidents and a bus-car property damage accident were investigated.

**Health Department Warns of Poisonous Mushrooms**

Two Michigan persons have died and six others have been hospitalized in Michigan within the last week as a result of having eaten fresh-picked poisonous mushrooms, according to the Michigan Department of Public Health. The mushrooms involved in five cases including one death have been identified by University of Michigan botany professor, Dr. Alexander Smith, as including the Amanita group, referred to as the "destroying angel," and the Galerina group or stump mushroom.

The Amanita group of mushrooms includes some edible varieties but most are poisonous. Two of the poisonous varieties identified by Doctor Smith are the Amanita Virosa and the Amanita Muscaria. Because the Amanita group includes both toxic and edible varieties, experts urge that none of the Amanita group be picked. Most of the victims have been

from the Ogemaw-Roscommon-Arenac County area where the problem was called to the attention of state health authorities by Dr. Robert Libke, health officer of the District Health Department in Rose City. Most of the victims were of retirement age and have picked mushrooms in the vicinity for many years, without any previous problem in identifying them. Six of the victims were admitted to West Branch hospital and then transferred to University of Michigan Hospital where one died. The other two were admitted to the Standish Hospital, Arenac County, and then transferred to a Saginaw hospital where one died.

Although the poisoning has been confined so far to upper Lower Michigan, state health authorities emphasized that these mushrooms can be found throughout the state and the problem extends across the entire state.

Symptoms of mushroom poisoning include severe abdominal pain, vomiting and diarrhea, and usually begin within two to 18 hours after eating. The poison affects the nervous system, the liver and kidneys. Recovery for those who survive takes up to a week or more. Unless you are an expert, the department warned, picking and eating mushrooms can be extremely dangerous. Because of the excessive rains this season, mushrooms are growing abundantly and apparently areas which formerly were free of poisonous species are now showing them. Although the current poisonings are a result of eating fresh-picked mushrooms, the department said that home-canned mushrooms are equally poisonous. Anyone who has home-canned mushrooms and is not certain of what they are, should destroy them because the canning process does not destroy the toxin.

Tawas Area School Marching Band will travel to Mt. Pleasant Saturday to perform in the third annual marching band symposium at Central Michigan University. The Marching Braves will be one of six outstanding bands from the state to perform at 1:00 p. m. at Perry Short Stadium.

Clinic sessions for the bands and directors will be offered in the afternoon following the band's performance in order to discuss and evaluate each unit's show. The afternoon performance will also include a program by Central Michigan University Marching Band.

This will be first year in field competition for the Tawas band and members are working hard under the leadership of Carl Brien, marching band director, and Gene Salamony, director of bands, to represent Tawas Area School in a most outstanding way.

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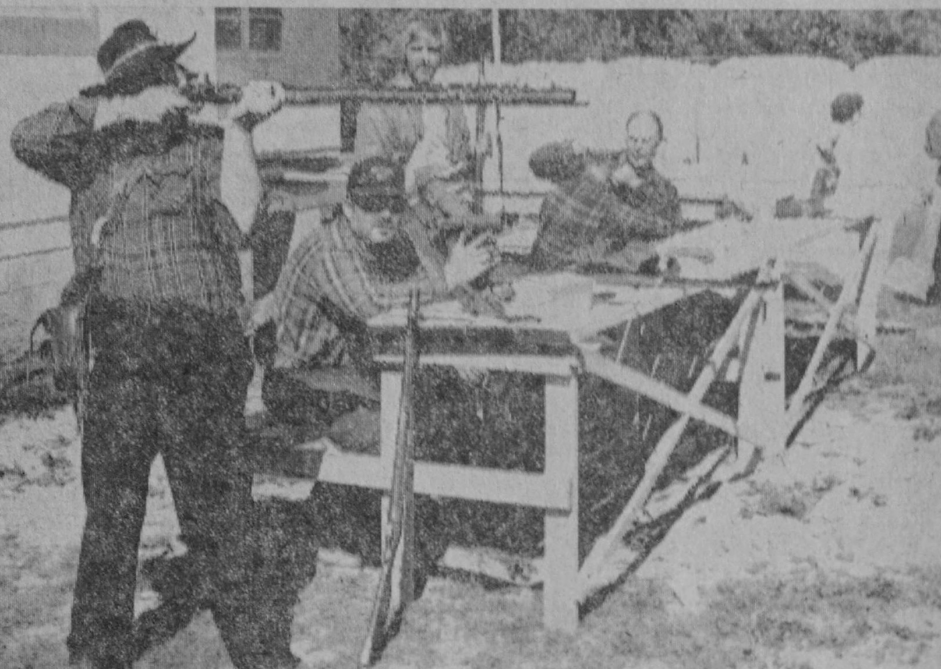

### Active Civic Leader Died September 24

Funeral services for Carl W. Libka, 67, Tawas City, were held Saturday, September 27, from Zion Lutheran Church. The Rev. Robert E. Beyer officiated and burial was in Memory Gardens Cemetery, Tawas City.

Born September 19, 1908, in Tawas City, he died Wednesday, September 24, at Tawas Hospital.

Mr. Libka had long been associated with city, county and federal government activities, both as an employee and elected or appointed official.

At the time of his death, he was serving as chairman of the Tawas City Water Board, an appointive position. He was elected to serve one two-year term to the Josco County Board of Commissioners, retiring in 1974. He was a member of the Tawas City Board of Education during reorganization of the school districts.

He retired January 7, 1972, after serving 14 years, 10 months, as mail carrier for Rural Route No. 2, Tawas City. Prior to that, his federal service had included two years as a timber cruiser and map maker for the United States Forest Service at East Tawas and he served with the United States Army in Africa, Sicily and Italy during World War II.

He attended high school here and graduated from the Ford apprenticeship school at Dearborn. He returned here in early 1930s to serve with the CCC at Camp Silver Creek.

Libka was married December 19, 1945, at Bay City to Dorothy Bonsecours and they have lived on Third Avenue, Tawas City, since their marriage.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Gary and Dennis, both of Tawas City; two daughters, Mrs. Bonnie Davis of Saginaw and Mrs. Carol Puniska of St. Petersburg, Florida; a sister, Mrs. Julia Finch of Tawas City.

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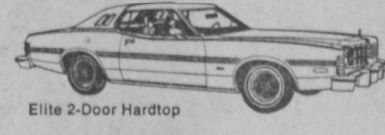

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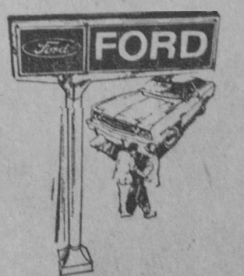

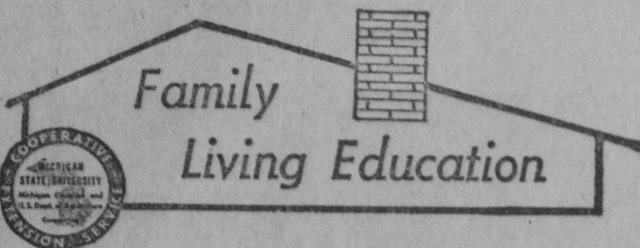

**PLANT A BOTTLE GARDEN**

Indoor plants seem even more appealing as the green foliage of summer is lost. A simple way to brighten your home with living plants and recycle your empty bottles and jars is with a bottle garden.

We are all familiar with the sweet potato vine growing in a jar of water but quite a few other plants will also root and grow in water. Geranium, peperomia, impatiens, wax begonia, hibiscus, coleus, ivy, aglaonema and grape ivy are well suited for bottle gardening.

Any waterproof container can become the start of a garden. The choice between an empty pickle jar and a dainty vase depends, of course, on the location of the intended garden. The pickle jar might look right at home on the windowsill above the kitchen sink but look somewhat out of place in the living room.  
Prepare the container by washing it with warm soapy water, rinsing thoroughly and drying. Wash the plants, too, in soapy water.  
Cut off any leaves that would be

below the water line and any dead or damaged foliage. Cut the plant stem just below the node, the point where a leaf originates. Make a sharp cut without damaging the stem.

Then, place the plant in the container of your choice, provide it with water and watch it grow.

Replace the water lost to evaporation. Change the water about once a month to control algae growth and keep the container clean and clear.

For best results, add a water-soluble house plant fertilizer at one-fourth to one-fifth the rate recommended for potted house plants.

## Social Security Answers

Question: One of my boarders is an elderly man who lives on the salary he gets from a part-time job. I think he might be eligible for supplemental security income.

Answer: To be eligible for supplemental security income, a person must be 65 or older, or blind, or disabled, and have limited income and resources. An individual is eligible for some payment if his income is less than \$170 a month and his resources are \$1,500 or less. Not all income and resources are counted, however, in determining these amounts. An applicant must also be a United States resident and either a United States citizen or an alien, lawfully residing in this country. Your boarder can apply for supplemental security income at any social security office.

Question: My wife died six months ago. My daughter already gets social security checks on my late wife's work record and I am going to apply for father's benefits next week. If I am eligible, how will my earnings affect our payments?

Answer: If you earn more than \$2,520 in a year, \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 in earnings above that amount. You can get your benefit, however, for any month in which you either earn more than \$210 in wages for perform substantial services in self-employment. Your earnings will affect only your benefit. They will not affect your daughter's payments.

Question: I recently heard that people who get social security payments can have their monthly checks deposited directly to a bank or other financial organization. Where can I get more information about this procedure?

Answer: If you get monthly social security checks, you got information in the mail with your check delivered this month. You can also get information by calling your financial organization or any social security office.

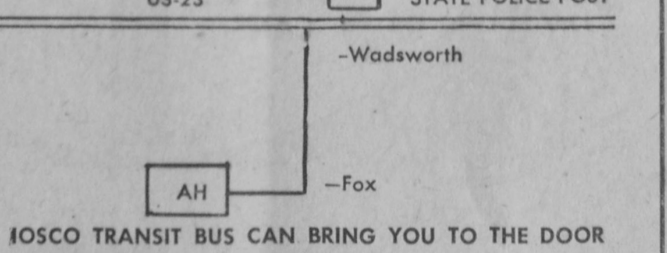

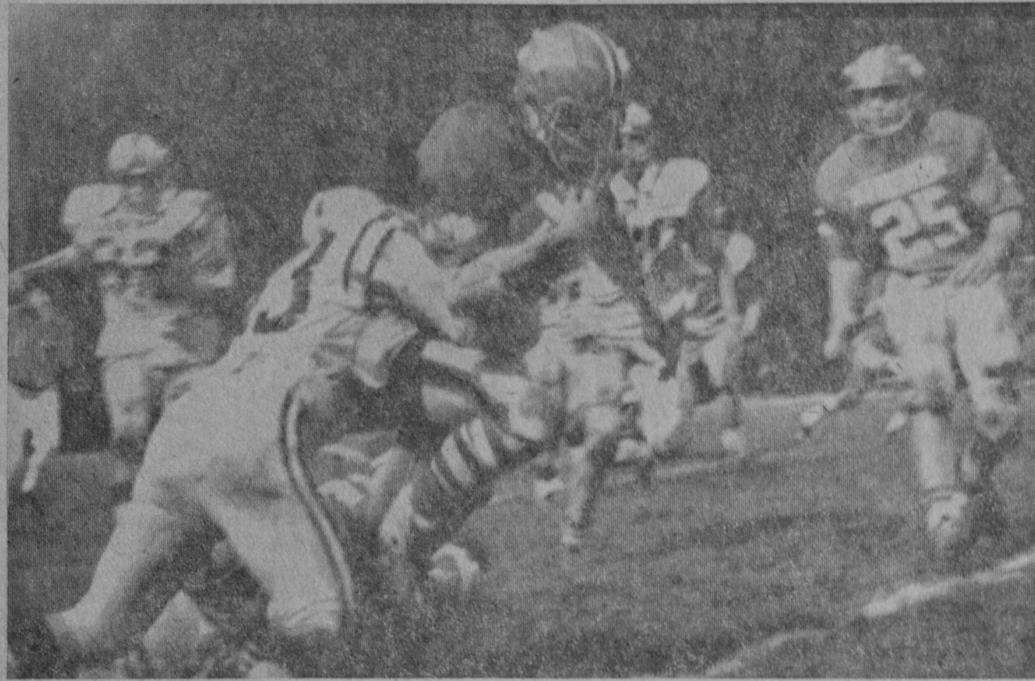
