Next Hearing Nov. 3

No Objections Heard on Two New TC Sewer Tax Districts

No objections were heard Monday night to formation of two special assessment districts to construct sanitary sewers on Tenth Avenue and Eleventh Avenue in Tawas City.

Six of 13 property owners involved in the two districts were present at a public hearing conducted by the Tawas City Council. Following an explanation of engineering for the proposed two sewer districts, the council adopted a resolution calling for approval of plans and determined that public improvements would be made by establishment of special assessment districts involving property benefited.

The second resolution established Monday, November 3, 7:30 p. m., for a public hearing to review individual assessments in the two districts. Tax rolls would be reviewed at the hearing and objections by property owners in the two districts may be made in writing. The assessments rolls are available for inspection at the city hall.

According to resolutions, it is proposed that 544 lineal feet of sanitary sewer be constructed on Tenth Avenue from Fourth Street to Dead Creek. Total cost of the sewer is \$13,825 with six property owners in the district.

It is proposed to construct 354 feet of eight-inch sanitary sewer on Eleventh Avenue from Harris Avenue to North Street. Total cost of the sewer is estimated by engineers at \$8,955 and there are seven property owners listed in this district.

The city manager said that estimated cost of the sewer construction was \$15 to \$16 per lineal foot, the assessment being based on benefits received according to state law.

The above two sewer extensions were to have been included in the three special assessment districts established last year for a major project completed this summer, but were deleted due to a limitation on the amount of public debt undertaken by the city in a given year.

The city manager said that it is hoped that the Eleventh Avenue project can be completed this fall, but he said much would depend on the length of time required for final establishment of the special assessment district. Because of the fact that the proposed Tenth Avenue project is deeper and of greater length, it is not expected that work would be completed on that main this fall.

Proposed construction on the two projects commenced with petitions signed by property owners and submitted to the city council. Two Eleventh Avenue property owners present said their homes were presently served by septic tanks and hoped that the new sewer could be constructed this fall due to the fact that their present sanitary facilities were inadequate.

Alabaster Decides Against Sewer Plan

Alabaster Township Board formally notified the Tawas City Council Monday night that it was not interested in joining a regional concept for making applications for a federal step one grant to study sewer expansion.

Officials of Alabaster had notified the city in September that the township was not interested in the study at that time and made the action official at its October 6 meeting.

The City of Tawas City had been designated in August by three other local units of government, East Tawas, Baldwin and Tawas Townships, to make applications for the study. At the time, Tawas City had an excellent priority rating for receiving a grant but, since then, a new rating schedule has reduced the priority for all local units of government.

The application for a study has been made but no further work has been received from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, coordinator for the Environmental Protection Agency in making pollution control planning grants.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Monday night that Alabaster Township's action would mean that the township would not be included in any future study and any subsequent participation in sanitary sewer construction should federal-state funds become available.

In August, it was stated that the federal government was considering an allocation of 18-billion-dollars to assist local governments in construction of sewage treatment facilities, in the hope that there would eventually be a zero discharge of effluent into streams.

Engineers said at the time that a waste water treatment system to serve the entire Tawas area would cost in the neighborhood of two million dollars. It is expected that if the first application is successful, a second application for aid in actual construction would have excellent possibilities.

Cost of the preliminary study to local units of government would be \$4,000, financed through 80 percent federal-state participation and 20 percent from the local units.

ET Completes 35 Blocks of Blacktopping

Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert reported to the East Tawas Council Monday night that 35 blocks of blacktopping on city streets had been completed last week at an approximate cost of \$65,000. Central Paving Company of West Branch was contractor for the project.

The superintendent indicated that next year's program would complete the current blacktopping for the entire city south of Jefferson Street and would cover approximately two miles of city streets.

"This year's program amounted to 2 2/3 miles of streets," said Ropert.

The superintendent expects that installation of drains, sewers and the water system in the northern part of the city would allow the council to make plans for blacktopping in that area.

In other business, discussion continued into the problem of solicitation for funds in the business district. The Tawas - Wurtsmithangers were permitted to solicit funds, but the council expressed a growing concern over the number of requests being received from various organizations.

Individual assessments in the Eleventh Avenue district ranged from a low of \$936 to a high of \$2,137, based on the lineal feet of sewer required to serve each parcel. Assessments in the Tenth Avenue district ranged from a low of \$957.50 to a high of \$3,080.

The city manager said that the length of time for individual financing, either 10 or 15 years, would be determined at the next hearing.

Two Appointments of Mayor Approved

The names of two persons submitted by Mayor John N. Brugger for appointment to two boards were approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Guy Lickfelt has been appointed to a three-year term on the Tawas City Water Board, replacing the late Carl Libka, and Roy Bergeron has been appointed to fill a vacancy on the zoning board of appeals.

In other business, sample ordinances governing garage and rummage sales, provided by the Michigan Municipal League, were presented to the council for study. The ordinances provide for licensing and establishment of dates for such sales.

Investigation into possible adoption of an ordinance came about through what councilmen termed abuses of lawn sales during the past two years.

On recommendation of Ald. Edward Savage and Ald. James Lansky, the city is to again study the possibility of utilizing the "catwalk" of the former Mathews Street bridge as a foot bridge over Dead Creek. Since construction of the new bridge over the Tawas River at Mathews Street, the iron and wood structure has been stored at the city garage property on Fourth Street.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that the city dragline had been used last week to deepen the channel in the Tawas River mouth. The battle against silting of the river mouth is apparently a losing one, however, as the channel is becoming blocked at a point which cannot be reached by the city's equipment.

Information on annual salaries and fringe benefits received by city employees was presented to the council by the city manager for study during the next two weeks. It is expected that a new salary schedule will be discussed at the November 3 meeting.

Four-Year-Old Boy Succumbs to Crash Hurts

A four-year-old Dearborn child, who was injured Sunday night in a two-car crash on US-23, Baldwin Township, in which five other people were injured, died Monday afternoon at St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw.

Receiving fatal injuries was Karl C. Kalandek, who was a passenger in a car driven by his brother, Jeffery A. Kalandek, 17, Dearborn.

Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department deputies said that Kalandek's car was northbound on US-23 and passed a car on a curve. A car driven by Terry L. Hillard, 30, Madison Heights, towing a boat and trailer, was southbound at the crest of the hill when he saw the oncoming car in his lane. Hillard swerved his vehicle but was unable to avoid the collision.

Besides the two drivers and the child, passengers treated at Tawas Hospital were Thomas C. Kalandek, 43, father of the victim, who was transferred to a hospital at Dearborn; Thomas C. Kalandek III, 14 years old; Wendell Doerfler, 56, Berkeley, a passenger in Hillard's car, who was treated and released.

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Injured When Gun Discharged

Kenneth J. Schultz, 45, Saginaw, was treated Sunday at Tawas Hospital following a hunting accident in Plainfield Township. Schultz and his son, Kevin, 13 years of age, were hunting from a duck blind. Kevin moved his 16 gauge shotgun, which had been propped against the blind, and it accidentally discharged, the blast striking his father in the upper leg and thigh hand.

Hale Area Seeks to Back Up Election Promise of 1970

Richard C. Dodge, principal at Hale Area School, said Friday that the board of education and school administrators are anxiously awaiting the formal report on a recent accreditation visit of the University of Michigan's Bureau of School Services.

It was announced last week that accreditation was expected in November. It is the culmination of nearly five years of effort by the district to upgrade its educational program.

"The key element in that move was the approval and construction of a new high school by the district's voters in 1971-72, which has made possible many other changes in improving the school's program," said Dodge.

In pointing up some of the advantages of accreditation, Dodge noted that "we can finally back up a promise made in the 1970 bond issue campaign that a new school would mean accreditation for Hale."

Dodge also commented that "this gives us an evaluation from an outside group to demonstrate to our community and taxpayers that we are meeting acceptable educational standards and that everyone can finally share the pride of achievement that goes with such an accomplishment."

He pointed out that accreditation involves an ongoing, yearly evaluation of the school program. The bureau annually evaluates and accredits over 600 high schools in Michigan, serving as the appointed accreditation agency for the state.

The board requested the visitation to the school, evaluating facilities and total school programs in many areas, including policies, philosophy, objectives, general school organization, salaries, school records, finances and general atmosphere for learning.

Key areas studied included the curriculum, course offerings, the library, counseling program, teacher qualifications and administrative organization.

The school was required to demonstrate it is meeting the criteria through both observation and evidence in written materials.

Funeral Held for Charles R. Pfoutz

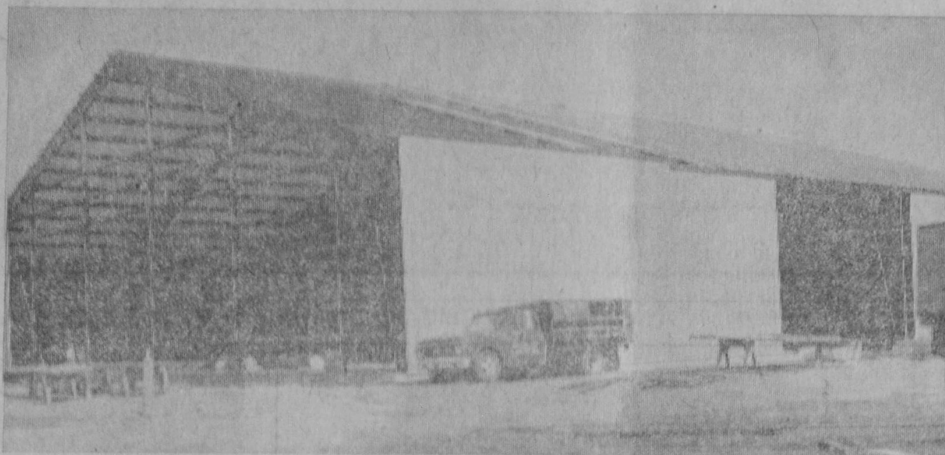

Hale Area scored on the opening kickoff with Brian Denstedt going the distance. The Eagles could not penetrate Arenac Eastern's de-

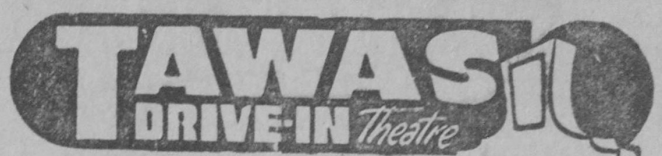
fense again until the third period when Brian Kreiner went five yards for a touchdown.

Braves Demolished Dukes

It was a disappointing way to end a series which started 10 years ago, but Friday night's meeting between the Tawas Area Braves and Essexville Garber Dukes was the last game between the two schools in the Northern B Conference.

With the breakup of the NBC next season, the two schools will not meet in 1976 because of scheduling difficulties and it is not known if the two schools will ever meet again on the gridiron.

The Braves made the best of the situation by defeating the defending champions, 40-0, the first time that Tawas had defeated the Dukes since 1967. During the 10-year series, the Dukes won seven games and Tawas posted only four victories.

Friday night's score was a far cry from some of the other games played between the two teams, with 8-7, 12-8, 16-8, 20-10 and 20-7 scores over the past five years.

Tawas, which is undefeated in seven straight games, appears to be headed for its first football championship since 1963, barring any unlikely upset at the hands of Carrollton this Friday night or Standish-Sterling the following week. The Dukes, on the other hand, graduated an entire squad after the 1974 championship year and are rebuilding with a sophomore and junior lineup.

Friday night's score could have gone even higher, but Coach Dick Look pulled out all of his starters early in the fourth quarter and finished the game by giving experience to his younger players.

The Braves scored nearly every time they had their hands on the ball during the first half. The scoring parade started with six minutes, 25 seconds remaining in the first quarter when Quarterback Earl Parsons capped an eight-play series by hitting End Brad Potts with a 15-yard touchdown pass. Bob Stephenson split the up-rights to give Tawas a 7-0 lead.

Tawas' defense stopped Garber with only three running plays and the Dukes punted to the Tawas 47. Runs by Mitch Lenczewski and Stephenson moved the ball to the 38 and Parsons passed to Potts, who carried to the 10. Parsons went the final distance on a keeper and Tawas had a 14-0 lead

after Stephenson booted the PAT. Garber was forced to punt starting the second quarter and the kick was taken over by Tawas on the visitors' 21. Parsons moved the ball to the five-yard line on third down and Lenczewski scored the touchdown two plays later. Stephenson booted another PAT and Tawas had a 21-0 lead.

Don Reed and Mike Lear turned in good defensive plays to stop the Dukes in the next series and Lenczewski scored a 57-yard touchdown to make it 27-0. The speedy Lenczewski raced into the endzone for another touchdown shortly before the half, but the play was nullified by a Tawas penalty.

A cold rain which made spectator conditions miserable during the first half subsided during Tawas Area Marching Band's half-time performance, which was a warmup for competition Saturday at Bridgeport.

The Braves resumed their brisk blocking and hard running in the third quarter and put together a nine-play scoring series. Stephenson scored a six-pointer from three yards out, then missed the conversion and Tawas had a 33-0 lead.

A few minutes later, the Braves recovered a fumble but the Garber defense finally stopped Tawas on the five-yard line. The Dukes put together four first downs and moved the ball to Tawas' 49 before being forced to punt.

This set the stage for another touchdown to open the fourth quarter when Lenczewski raced 65 yards on third down for a six-pointer. Stephenson was successful on his kick from placement to end the scoring.

Jeff Tousley, second string halfback for the Braves, turned in several good runs in Tawas' last offensive series of the night.

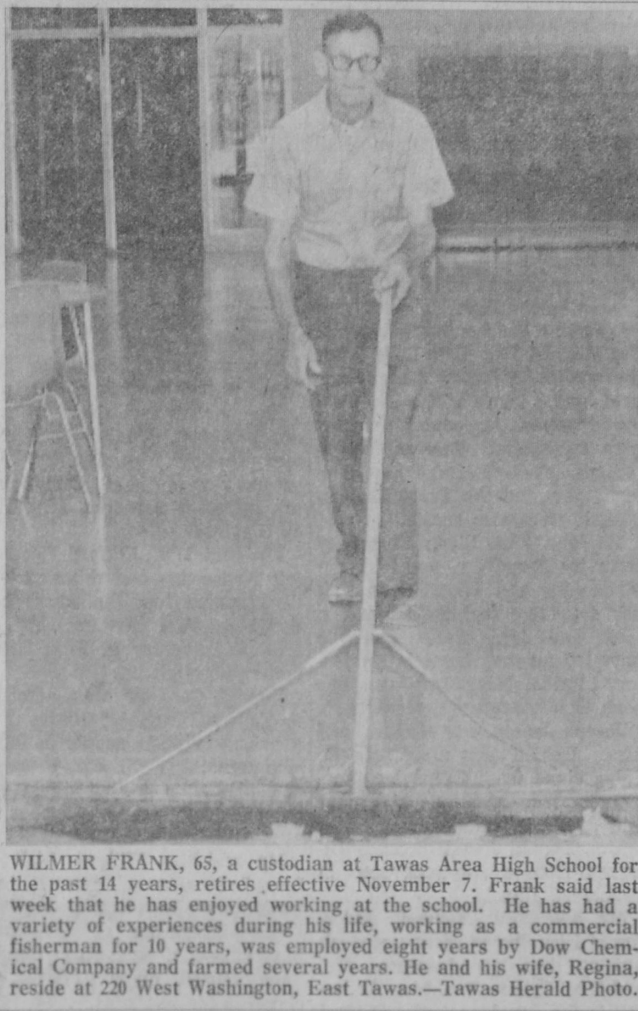
Mrs. Jennie Smith Died October 19

1,400 Acres Owned by MSU

Study County Management of Former J. R. Rood Property

Management of 1,400 acres of farm, forest and prime hunting land in Alabaster and Tawas Townships, formerly the Rood Ranch and presently owned by Michigan State University, is being considered as a county project.

Marvin Davenport, county extension director, told the Iosco County Board of Commissioners Thursday that he had been in contact with MSU officials, who were definitely interested in some form of local public management of the property.

The property was formerly owned by the late John R. Rood, who had operated a dairy farm there for a number of years. At the time of his death, the will of the one-time law professor of the University of Michigan stipulated that the land would become the property of MSU.

Litigation over terms of the will has been settled in the courts and the 1,400 acres was removed from the tax roll a number of years ago upon transfer of the property to MSU. Included are 160 acres in Section five of Tawas Township,

240 acres in Section seven, 520 acres in Section eight, 320 acres in Section 17 and 160 acres in Section 18, all in Alabaster Township. Land in Alabaster Township is bounded on the west by Alpena State Forest.

Davenport suggested Thursday that the matter be turned over to the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission to consider proper utilization of the property, possibly through a long term lease arrangement with MSU, inasmuch as the property cannot be sold by the university.

The property includes a large stand of maturing red pine, which Davenport believed should be placed under a management program with MSU and Michigan Department of Natural Resources foresters.

One possible use suggested by Robert Foster, county commission chairman, was for the establishment of a juvenile detention facility on a portion of the property. He was of the opinion that forest and farmland management opportunities provided by the property would be advantageous as a training area.

The farm house, barn and out-buildings on the portion off Lorenz Road have all been destroyed by vandals during the lengthy period of time the property has been unoccupied.

Members of the county commission accompanied Davenport on a tour of the property Thursday morning. A management discussion meeting is to be arranged with MSU officials, the county board of commissioners and the county parks and recreation commission.

Advise Local Units of Action

Commission Votes Against County Property Appraisal

Iosco County Board of Commissioners voted Wednesday not to have a county-wide property appraisal at this time.

A proposal had been made by Gem Surveys of St. Clair for such an appraisal, but it was the opinion of the commission that the approximate cost of \$200,000 was not justifiable.

In its resolution, the commission advised all local units of government of its action, stressing that county participation could not be expected by those units contemplating entering into individual contracts for the survey.

Two weeks ago, the City of East Tawas entered into contract with Gem Surveys for a complete reappraisal of property in that city for tax purposes. As part of the transaction, the St. Clair firm is to train the city assessor.

Other townships have been in discussion with the firm for similar appraisal work. Gem Surveys conducted the original property appraisal for the county about 10 years ago.

In other business, the county removed its freeze placed on money set aside for the Trio Council on Aging. It was stipulated by the commission that its action of two months ago would be rescinded upon receipt of proof that forms had been filed with the Internal Revenue Service.

The freeze on county funds went

into effect when county officials learned that the former Iosco Senior Citizens Council had not paid employee withholding taxes to IRS. Iosco had allocated \$7,500 to the Trio Council, successor to the senior citizens council, and paid \$1,875 as its first installment.

Since then, \$1,300 has been paid to IRS and \$1,300 was returned to employees, representing social security taxes which had erroneously been withheld from wages. Authorization was given to submit

the \$1,000 to Trio Council and the balance is to be available at a later time.

Authorization was given to pay \$400 as the moving expense for the newly hired equalization director, John Rose, as agreed upon at the time of his hiring.

The commission authorized the purchase of marine safety equipment from Metzler Sport Center, Standish, \$800 for an outboard motor, and \$659 for radio equipment from Jerry's Marina, East Tawas.

An allocation of \$100 was made to the annual banquet November 6 which will honor 4-H Club leaders of the county.

Chester Wilson, who has been a deputy sheriff under the CETA program since June 10, has been given regular status with the sheriff's department to fill the former position of Joseph VanDette.

Authorization was given to the district court to establish a traffic court violation bureau under provisions of state law.

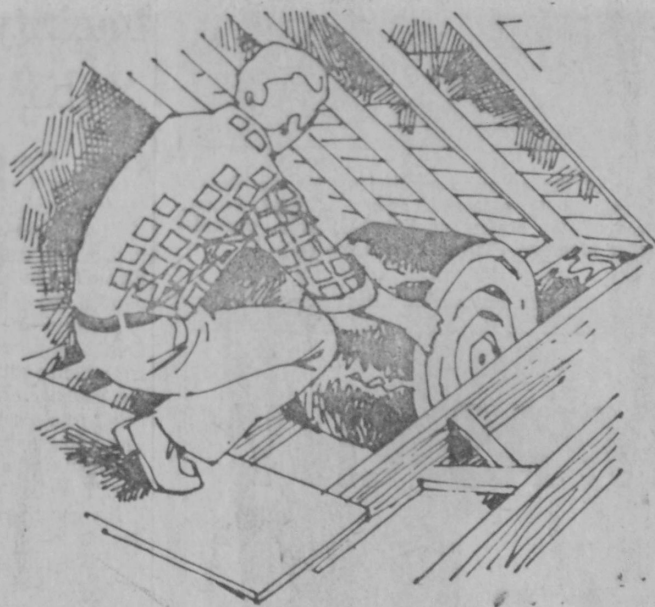

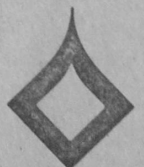

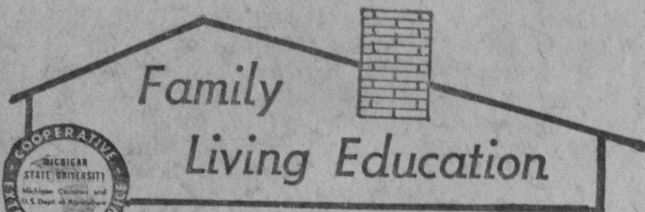

CHOOSING CHEESES

The cheese chosen will be a matter of personal preference. Some people like mild cheese, some the sharp or strong-flavored cheeses. Individuals who are not cheese fans should start by sampling some of the mild ones. Children usually prefer mild cheese, too.

Cheeses come in various forms. Knowing the general categories will aid in making selections.

Natural cheese is made by coagulating milk, then separating the curd (solid) from the whey (liquid). Some natural cheeses are "ripened" or aged to develop their characteristic flavor and texture. Others are used unripened. The ripened ones, such as cheddar, may be labeled mild, medium, mellow, aged and sharp.

Each natural cheese has its characteristic flavor and texture. Flavors range from bland cottage cheese, to tangy blue and pungent limburger.

Pasteurized process cheese is a blend of fresh and aged natural cheeses that have been melted, pasteurized and mixed with an emulsifier. Some have other ingredients such as spices, fruits, vegetables or meats added. Process cheese loses some of the characteristic flavor of the natural

cheese, and the texture becomes uniform and soft.

Pasteurized process cheese food like process cheese is a blend of cheeses that have been pasteurized. Cheese food may also contain flavorings, meat or vegetables. It contains less cheese and less fat than process cheese, but has added milk and whey solids.

Because of the added moisture, process cheese food has a milder flavor, softer texture, spreads and melts more easily. Pasteurized process cheese spread has even more moisture and less milk fat. Otherwise, the two are alike. Process cheese spread is soft and spreadable at room temperature.

Coldpack or club cheese is a combination of fresh and aged natural cheese blended into a uniform product without heating. It has no emulsifier, but spices or flavoring may be added. The flavor of coldpack cheese is usually sharp and characteristic of the natural cheeses used. However, it is softer than the natural cheese it is made from so it spreads more easily.

Coldpack cheese food is prepared like coldpack cheese but contains added milk or whey solids. It may include fruits, vegetables, meats, spices or other flavorings. Coldpack cheese food is milder, softer and more spreadable than coldpack cheese.

County Adopts Operating Budget of \$1,327,351

Following a public hearing Wednesday, Iosco County Board of Commissioners concluded its two-day October session by approving the 1976 county operational budget.

Donald Griffin, county finance chairman, said that the revenue and expenditure budget of \$1,327,351 had the same total as outlined by this newspaper last week, but minor adjustments were made in various categories to meet supplemental salaries in the courts.

A contingency fund of \$25,000 which had been reduced to \$5,577 prior to the budget hearing was further reduced to meet expenditures.

Representatives of three chambers of commerce in the county appeared Wednesday before the commission and asked that proposed appropriations of \$5,000 to each organization be reinstated in next year's budget. Roger McIntosh represented Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Raymond Andrus represented Oscoda - AuSable Chamber of Commerce and John Hill represented Hale Chamber of Commerce.

Appropriations to the chambers of commerce were listed under new programs in the preliminary budget last April but were deleted under the final budget, along with airport expansion and hospital ambulance service, due to the lack of funds.

In other business, the commission re-appointed Wilma McGill and Arden Charters as the Republican and Democratic representatives, respectively, on the Iosco County Canvassing Board. Each party submitted names of three persons to fill the two vacancies. Other Republican candidates included Marion Killingbeck and Margaret Lansky, while Albert Preetz and Robert Miller were candidates for the Democratic vacancy. The vote for Mrs. McGill was unanimous while Robert Foster, Griffin and Mary Jane Burdett voted for Charters and William Weryley was opposed to that nomination.

K. Berkeley Smith of East Tawas submitted a letter of resignation from the board of canvassers and from the county planning commission. The appointment to fill the vacancy on the canvassing board was referred to the county clerk for his appointment according to state statute.

The commission concurred with a resolution from Lapeer County opposing proposed legislation which would eliminate any control of county juvenile courts or boards of county commissioners over the child care fund. The proposed house bill would establish a commission to set all standards for child care and would provide no matching child care money unless the new state commission agreed to the expenditure.

The term of Richard Pfahl of Hale on the social welfare board, which expires October 31, was extended to December 31. In a move to balance the geographical composition of the board, James H. Gowenlock of Oscoda was appointed to fill the three-year vacancy effective January 1. Other members of the board are John Henry of East Tawas and Mrs. Joan Case of Hale.

The commission approved an allocation of \$500 for landscaping grounds at the county animal shelter in Grant Township.

The commission accepted an invitation from Iosco Soil Conservation District to participate in a tour of farm operations on Monday, November 3.

The commission signed an official application recognizing Iosco County as a bicentennial community.

The commission was informed

by the state labor commission that state mediation on a new county contract has been requested by Teamsters State, County and Municipal Workers Local 214, which represents deputies of the sheriff's department.

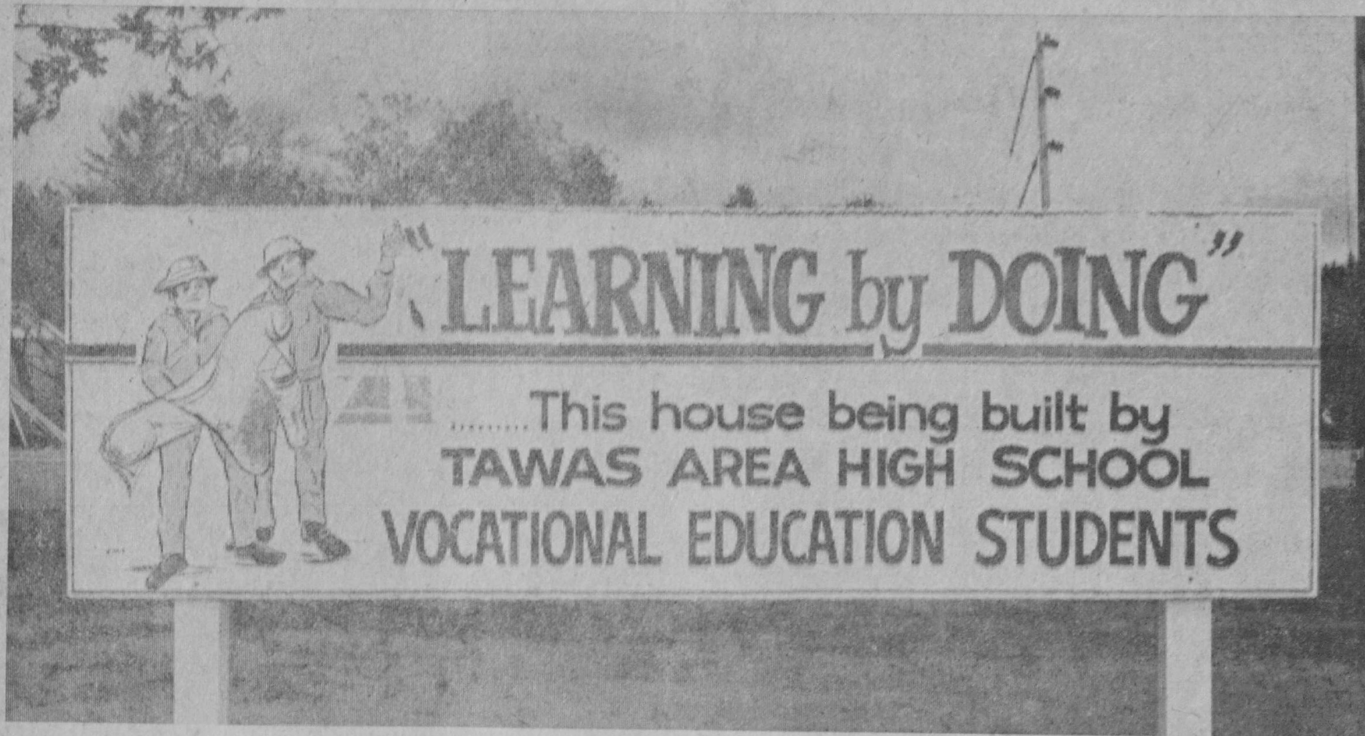
Participated in Track Meet for the Blind

Participants included students from Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

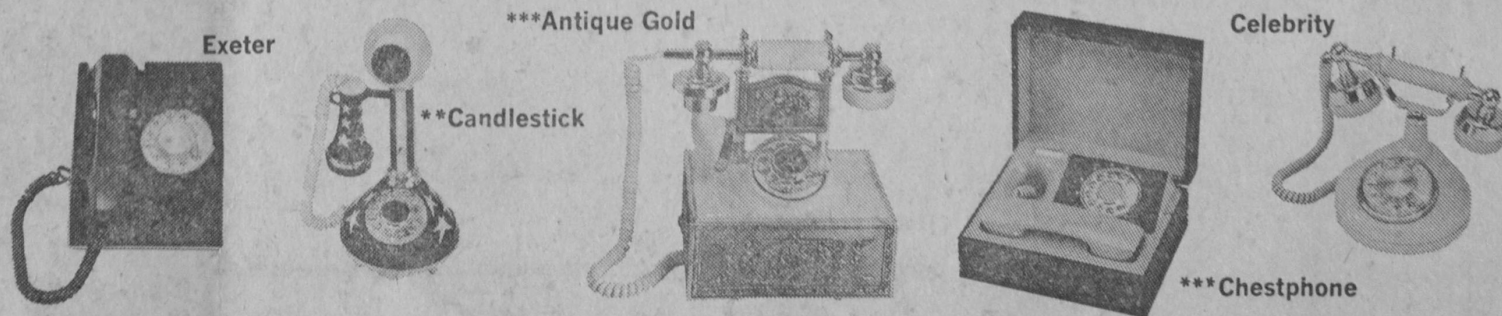

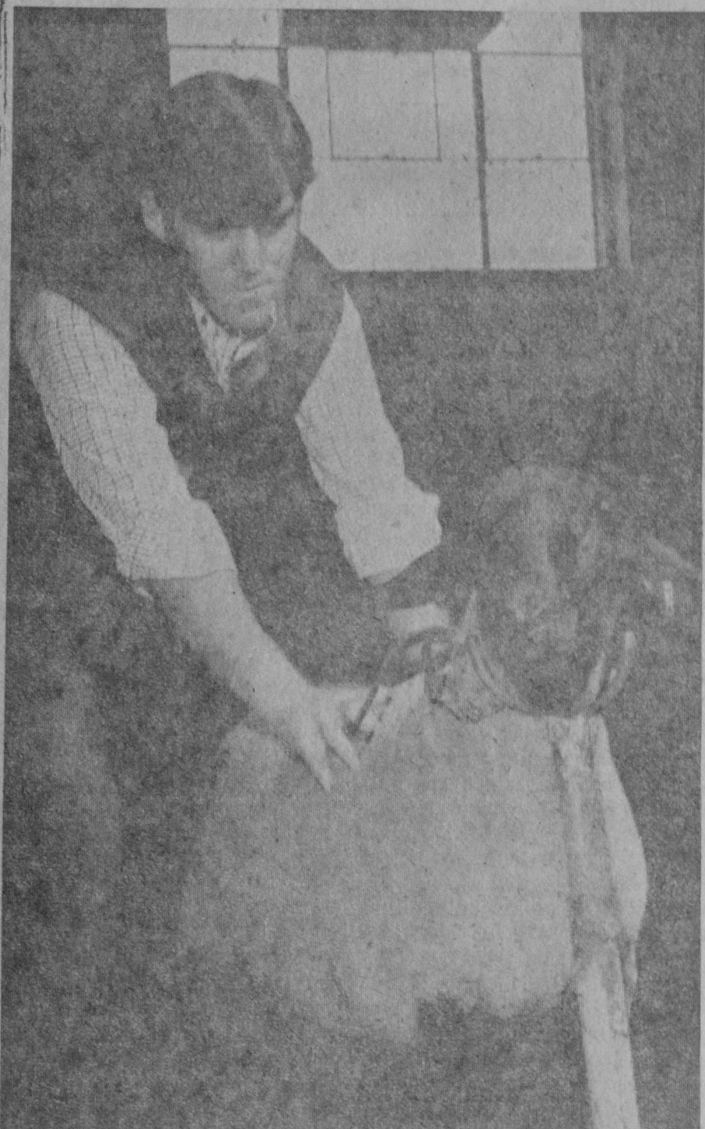

Whittemore Area Student on MSU's Judging Team



RUSSELL WHITE of Whittemore is a member of Michigan State University's livestock judging team which is in competition with teams from other parts of the country.

Russell White of Whittemore has joined the Michigan State University livestock judging team which is competing against other university teams from around the country.

This fall, students will stage a mock session with Ohio State University and then go to Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee.

Dr. David Hawkins, associate professor of animal husbandry and coach for the team, said that students learn to evaluate beef cattle, sheep, swine and horses. They attend classes to learn about livestock and tour farms in Michigan and the Midwest.

White, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell White, 3901 South Hottis Road, is a MSU senior majoring in animal husbandry. A 1971 graduate of Whittemore-Prentiss Area High School, he is the president of Farmhouse Fraternity, a member of the MSU Block and Bridle Club and the Rodeo Club.

"By participating on the team, students gain exposure to livestock industry and job opportunities," Hawkins said. "While traveling, they learn to get along with other people."

Students evaluate the animals and though they may take notes during each session at the contests, they may not use them while presenting the reasons for their choices. Winners are determined by how well their evaluations correlate both individually and as a team to government grading.

"Students learn to verbalize their decisions and organize themselves," Hawkins said. With a background in animal husbandry, students may work as livestock buyers, as 4-H agents, as herdsman, pursue graduate study in animal husbandry or go to veterinary school.

The Block and Bridle Club and the department of animal husbandry pay for MSU students' travel expenses.

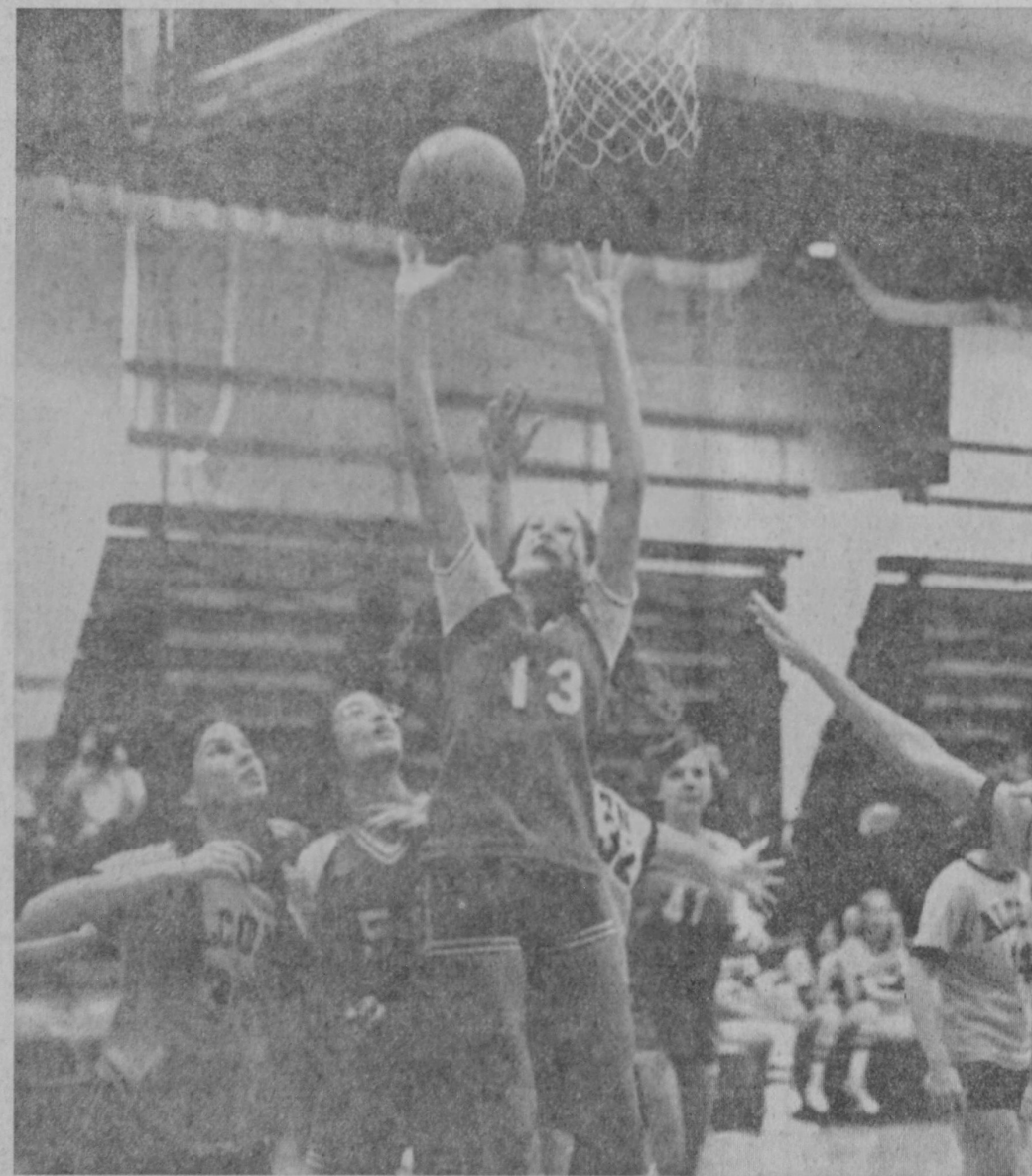

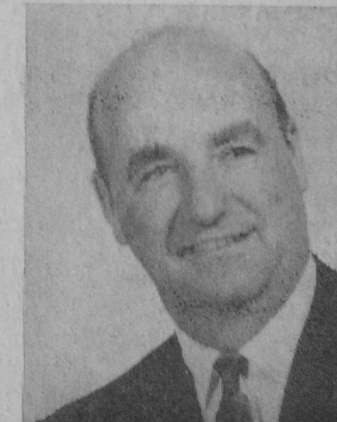
