Burglars Surprised at Tawas Hardware

An employee of Tawas Hardware, who returned to the store at 108 Lake Street Friday night, apparently surprised one or more burglars in the process of loading a truck with stolen articles. Robert J. Spence told investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department of-

ficers that a pickup truck with a white camper unit pulled out from behind the store building just as he drove into the parking lot at 11:10 p. m. The truck headed east on Court Street toward M-55 and disappeared.

When Spence entered the store, he found that a hole had been cut in the wall on the southwestern side of the steel building. The sheriff's department was notified immediately, but the burglars eluded capture.

About \$160 in cash and a quantity of checks were taken from a cash register. An unknown quantity of sporting goods is missing.

Officers said that 46 shotguns and rifles removed from a display rack and placed in protective cases were stacked outside the building. Arrival of Spence apparently frightened the burglars away before the firearms could be placed in the truck. Duane C. Walters, store owner, said Saturday morning that stocks on a number of guns had been damaged during mishandling by the burglars. Estimated value of the guns was \$8,000.

State Police Investigate Five Area Burglaries

Five burglaries were investigated during the past two weeks by Michigan State Police of East Tawas.

A large quantity of household furnishings was reported stolen October 21 from a cabin owned by Carl Babcock of Tawas City, located near King's Corner, Curtis Township, Alcona County.

Two other cabins in that area, owned by Harold Pfeiffer of East Tawas and Russell Bunker of Florida, were also the scene of burglaries. Household furnishings and appliances were stolen from each cabin.

A burglary was reported Wednesday at a cabin owned by Jack Bretz on Greenwood Road, Plainfield Township. An antique record player, records and a circular saw were stolen.

Breaking and entering of a trailer owned by Frank Swartz of Detroit, located on Esmond Road, Wilber Township, was reported Saturday. The trailer was destroyed by fire later that day and investigation was continued by state police.

Asks Judgment in Iosco Suit

A \$150,000 judgment has been asked in an auto negligence suit filed in Iosco Circuit Court by Wallace K. Burley of Oscoda. Defendants are Steven J. Weate and Martha J. George of Alcona County.

The suit involves an accident April 5 in which Burley was struck while walking along US-23 in Baldwin Township. Weate was driver of the car and Mrs. George was owner of the vehicle.

It is claimed that the vehicle crossed the centerline of the highway at a high rate of speed to strike Burley, who sustained serious injuries.

New Tawas School Budget Shows Decrease in Spending

Operational expenditures of Tawas Area School District are expected to be \$12,849.56 below revenue received during the 1975-76 term, but Michigan's current financial crisis is expected to alter the picture slightly through a reduction in state membership aid to schools.

This was the report Monday night by Dr. Robert Halle, superintendent, during the annual budget hearing conducted by Tawas Area Board of Education. The superintendent told board of education members he expects the \$152,593.99 in state membership aid indicated in the budget Monday night would be from two to six percent lower, once action is taken by the state legislature on budget cuts recommended by Governor Milliken.

The effect of the state budget cut will not hit Tawas Area School as hard as some districts as local revenue from property tax in this district for 1975-76 is \$1,622,695. Last term, this school district received \$486,817 in total revenue from state sources and the new budget shows that revenue from state sources has already dropped \$85,696.

Because of increasing local property valuations, the trend in recent years to lower revenue from state sources means the difference is absorbed at the local level. The board of education adopted an expenditure budget of \$2,101,313.75 for 1975-76, as compared to revenue of \$2,114,163.31. The revenue budget is \$41,996 lower than 1974-75 and operational expenditures are budgeted \$13,527 below the previous term.

Expenditures under the 1975-76 budget call for \$447,170.90 in elementary instructional expense, \$323,924.82 in middle school instructional expense and \$598,496.10 in secondary instructional expense. Other expenditures include \$33,528.10 for vocational education,

\$50,061.70 for community education, \$39,488 for the Prep program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, \$78,105.30 for administration, \$187,420.76 for transportation, \$157,245.90 for operation, \$37,000 for maintenance, \$94,272.27 for fixed charges, \$22,000 for capital outlay and \$24,600 in outgoing transfers to other funds.

Besides the \$1,622,695 in local property taxes and state aid membership of \$152,593.99, revenue during the 1975-76 year will include \$98,585 in state transportation, \$37,676.75 in vocational education, \$6,330 for driver education, \$39,488 from the Prep program, \$22,882.39 from special education, \$15,074 from remedial reading, \$7,302 from adult basic education, \$4,389 from community education, to name mention major receipts.

Fluctuations in enrollment since 1970-71 are noted in the budget information. The total enrollment six years ago was 1,994. The total jumped to 2,008 in 1971-72, 2,067 in 1972-73, then began to drop with 2,022 in 1973-74, 2,004 in 1974-75 and 1,972 in 1975-76.

State aid will be based on 2,078 students, with an additional 90 adult education students and 16 part time students. The school district has a valuation of \$79,935,733.

13-Year-Old Girl Killed on Townline

Theresa Blackmore, 13, received fatal injuries shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday night in an accident on Townline Road.

Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said the victim was with a group of children headed to play at a neighboring home. The children waited for an eastbound car to pass and started to run along the highway.

Officers said that Theresa ran into the path of a car driven by Terry W. Cowan, 19, East Tawas, who was westbound on the highway. The driver, who was not held, said he was unable to avoid the accident.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Blackmore, she was born August 16, 1962, in Tawas City and was an eighth grader at Tawas Area Middle School. She was a member of Weight Watchers.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday, October 28, from Tawas United Methodist Church with the Rev. Kenneth Tousley officiating.

No contests are listed on the ballot for next Tuesday's general election at Whittemore and only four candidates are listed for six offices.

Visiting Judge Asks Briefs in Iosco Negligent Homicide Case

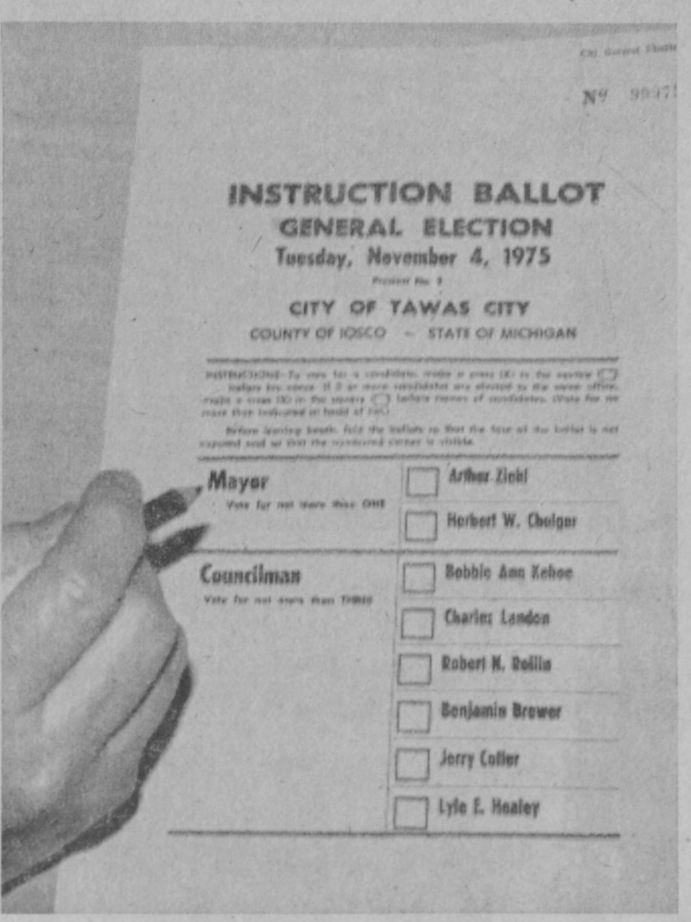
The attorney representing the defendant in a negligent homicide charge and the Iosco County prosecuting attorney's office were instructed Thursday to submit briefs within two weeks concerning a trial held in Iosco Circuit Court.

Testimony was heard from 11 persons in a case against Edwin McCain, 33, Mishawaka, Indiana, who was driver of a truck involved in a fatal collision June 17 in Tawas City.

Conducting the trial was Judge Charles M. Forster of Traverse City, who was assigned to this circuit when Judge Allan C. Miller disqualified himself.

The charge was the result of an accident at the intersection of Oak Street and Lake Street, Tawas City, in which Charles C. Martin, 63, an employee of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, received fatal injuries.

Martin was headed east on Lake Street and was about to make a left-hand turn onto Oak Street when his car was struck from the rear by a tractor-trailer unit operated by McCain. Martin, who was thrown out of his car in the collision, died of injuries after being rushed to Bay City Mercy Hospital.

Tawas Board OK's 60-Cent Charge for Spectator Buses

Authorization was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education to charge a passenger fee for students riding spectator buses to athletic events.

A 60-cent fee is to be charged effective with the start of the 1975-76 basketball season. Dr. Robert Halle, superintendent of schools, told the board of education that the buses will average 120 miles for each away game during the season. This will require an average employment of 6½ hours for each bus driver.

Two buses will be making most trips, but there will be three buses for the district tournament at Ogemaw Heights. Tawas students had not paid a

fee for riding spectator buses in past years. The district paid approximately \$2,300 out of the general fund this year to provide spectator buses. Six of the seven other schools in the Northern B Conference charge a fee for spectator buses.

Four Surplus Buses Sold by TA School

High bids from three persons were accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education for the sale of four surplus buses. Eight bids were received.

Edward Turnbull entered a bid of \$375 for a 1966 Ford, Edward J. Barry entered a bid of \$502 for a 1964 International, the Rev. Johnnie Johnson entered a bid of \$705 for a 1967 Ford and \$675 for a second 1967 Ford.

In other business, Laurie Deffbaugh, a substitute teacher, was hired as the middle school cheerleader coach at a salary of \$174.

Matters discussed during an executive session prior to the meeting included a request from the athletic department to use a bus to transport varsity players to a football game at Ann Arbor, a property transfer between this school district and Hale Area School District and a grievance with Tawas Area Teacher Association.

A meeting is to be held this afternoon (Wednesday) between negotiators for the board of education and TAEA concerning a grievance filed over transfer of a teacher from the middle school to the high school.

Two Hurt on Motorbikes

Two persons were injured in motorbike crashes in Iosco County and treated at Tawas Hospital.

Michael Schade, 28, was injured Monday when his motorbike struck a hole in a trail in Burleigh Township, three miles west of Whittemore.

Kent C. Smith, 27, Flint, was injured Sunday when his motorbike overturned in Grant Township. Investigating sheriff's department officers said Smith was attempting to climb a hill.

TC Water Board Studies Tax Rolls

Following study of tax rolls for two special assessment districts to finance cost of sanitary sewer construction, Tawas City Water Board Monday night recommended that the city council approve the two proposals at a hearing November 3.

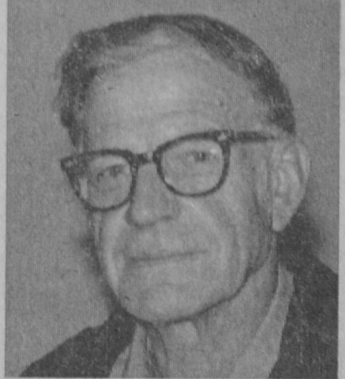
The water board was of the opinion that a construction cost of \$15 to \$16 per lineal foot to the property owner was "just and fair" and recommended that the two projects be handled by the city crew, rather than to hire a private contractor.

City Mgr. Reginald Blubitz reported that a proposal from a local contractor had been received for furnishing labor and equipment for the project, but he said there would be no savings to the property owner under such a plan.

A hearing is to be held next Monday night on a proposal to construct 544 lineal feet of sanitary sewer on Tenth Avenue from Fourth Street to Dead Creek and 354 feet of sanitary sewer on Eleventh Avenue from Harris Avenue to North Street. Total cost of the Tenth Avenue project would be \$13,825 and the Eleventh Avenue project would cost \$8,955.

The 13 property owners in the two districts will have the opportunity to view special assessment tax rolls and to enter objections concerning the project at the November 3 hearing.

Free Diabetes-Blood Pressure Testing at Tawas Hospital

Free diabetic testing and blood pressures are being taken at Tawas Hospital during National Diabetes Week, Monday, November 10, through Friday, November 14, 8:00 a. m. to 2:00 p. m.

Diabetes is a chronic condition which develops when the body is unable to make use of certain foods, especially sugar and starches, (carbohydrates). It can be fatal, although when properly treated and brought under control, it interferes very little with normal life and activity.

Common symptoms of diabetes are, extreme thirst, frequent urination, constant hunger, loss of weight, itching, easy tiring, changes in vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

However, you could have diabetes without any of these symptoms. Anyone, at any age, can become diabetic. Those most likely to get it are relatives of diabetics and people who are over 40 or overweight. The earlier the disease is discovered and proper control is established, the better the diabetic's chances are of living an active life. It is, therefore, in your best interests to be tested periodically for diabetes. Known diabetics and those who are known hypertensives and on medications for such, are asked not to participate in the free testing. Young people, under the age of 18, must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Diabetes is best detected by testing the patient after he has eaten one of the prescribed meals, either breakfast or lunch. Therefore, one of the two following meals must be eaten before your test and it is necessary to include all the following foods in the amounts listed.

Important: Eat either meal in 15 minutes.

BREAKFAST:

Fruit, which may be a banana, canned fruit or fruit juice
One cup cereal, cooked or flakes
One cup milk
Two slices toast
One tablespoon jelly or jam
Two teaspoons sugar

LUNCH:

Pepsi or other pop (not diet)
One hamburger on bun
French fries or potato chips
Tossed salad
One scoop ice cream
(Sanka if desired)
Do not drink (other than water), eat, smoke, chew gum, eat candy, cough drops, etc., following the meal, until after the blood sample is taken. Report to Tawas Hospital Laboratory for test one hour and 45 minutes after finishing meal so that blood can be drawn exactly two hours from the time the meal is finished.

TO THE VOTERS OF TAWAS CITY:

I decided to run for the Non-Partisan office of Tawas City Councilman because I strongly feel I can contribute to the orderly and efficient management of our city government in a very positive way. I've had experience as Tawas City Attorney in the early 60's, as a member of the City Planning Commission in 1968-70 and as elected Chairman of the Tawas City Charter Commission in 1970-71. Since 1959, I've been an area resident and businessman. With this background and experience I feel my ideas and decisions will be completely independent. At times the Council has neglected the home-owner and I believe a better balance is required on the Council so home-owners get full value for their City Tax Dollars.

The following are a few specific areas I would like to discuss with you, and with the City Council if I am elected:

- LAW AND ORDINANCE ENFORCEMENT:** The City pays the Sheriff's Department for Law Enforcement. It seems to me we need MORE patrols on residential streets and LESS on U. S. 23 without increased cost. The City Charter requires that City Ordinances be set forth in Code Form before 1974. The purpose of course is to advise the people concerning City Ordinances. To my knowledge the council has not done anything to comply with this Charter provision. How can we expect people to obey ordinances when they don't know what they are?
- PRIORITIES:** The City has made progress in recent years in streets, bridges, etc. For Progress to continue in an orderly and logical manner, and at a cost that is affordable, I believe we need a **CRITICAL PRIORITIES COMMITTEE** composed of Citizens, Councilmen, Park Board and Planning Commission members. The Critical Priorities Committee would be responsible for looking at future needs of the City, placing a priority on those needs and the approximate cost thereof. It would then be the duty of the Planning Commission and the City Council to adopt, change or reject those recommendations.
- TAWAS RIVER HARBOR:** Property Taxes should not be used for the River. If we want the Tawas River Harbor developed into a beautiful and practical facility with Federal and State Funds, a Permanent Harbor Committee must be formed by the Council and action started.
- OUR CITY IS BEAUTIFUL...** but we have some very cluttered and unkempt properties including some owned by the City itself! I believe that all City Property and Equipment should be maintained in such a manner that all will be proud of it; it may even inspire others to do likewise. Continuous efforts must be made by the Council and Citizens to make and keep our City Beautiful and Clean.
- BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS:** All of these bodies are composed of very competent people and they do a fine job. However, I think the Council should seriously consider taking over the functions of the Water Board so that the complete and full responsibility for the Water and Sewer Department is on the Council.

In this time of Big Government and Big Spending at the Federal, State and County levels, it is extremely important that we keep our City Government as small, as efficient, and as economical as possible. The City Council is one of the very few governing bodies that can be responsive to the needs and desires of the Citizens without giving into the pressures of the bureaucracies and special interest groups. I hope you will vote on Tuesday, November 4. I will appreciate your vote.

Full Slate of Candidates in Tawas City General Election

Tawas City voters go to the polls Tuesday, November 4, to select a new mayor and to pick three aldermen to fill vacancies on the six-member city council.

The four successful candidates officially take over office effective January 1, upon completion of terms held by present officials.

Polls at the city hall open at 7:00 a. m. on election day and remain open for voting until 8:00 p. m.

All positions for city offices are non-partisan, party affiliations having been eliminated for city offices under the charter and aldermen are elected to represent the city at large, rather than under the former ward system.

A spirited campaign began shaping up for the general election last spring when Mayor John N. Bruger, along with Ald. Clark Tanner and Ald. Edward Savage, announced they would not be candidates for re-election. The third

A group called Tawas Concerned Citizens, organized last spring following a controversy at council meetings over establishment of special assessment tax districts to finance sanitary sewer construction, has endorsed four candidates—Cholger, Rollin, Healey and Mrs. Kehoe.

Rollin, the lone incumbent to file, was first elected to the council in 1971 and was re-elected to a two-year term in 1973. A native of Alabaster Township, he attended Tawas City High School, spent four years in the navy, served in the construction field for 10 years before returning here to establish a gasoline service station and real estate business. At one time, he served as justice of the peace, was a member of the city police department and served briefly on the planning commission before becoming a councilman.

Ziehl is a lifetime resident of Tawas City, graduated from Tawas City High School and was an employee of United States Gypsum Company for many years before entering business for himself, first as owner-operator of a service station and presently the owner of Ziehl's Nursery on First Street. He served on the city council from April 1950 to May 1955 and at one time was a member of the volunteer fire department.

Cholger, who was born in Tawas City and graduated from high school here, attended Iosco County Normal School and taught in rural schools of the county. For many years, he was associated with his father and brother in the opera-

tion of a service station and garage on Lake Street. He presently has a managerial position here with an insurance company.

Brewer has been a resident of Tawas City for 22 years, coming here from West Branch. He was employed by Consumers Power Company for 18 years as a sales representative and entered the appliance business for himself three years ago. He was elected to the county board of supervisors in 1968 and served until 1972, when that position was abolished under the charter. He served five years on the tax board of review.

Cotter, a resident of Tawas City since June 1959, came here from Mt. Pleasant to establish a law practice. He served four years in the air force, graduated from the Detroit College of Law and Central Michigan University. He served as city attorney from 1959 to 1963, served on the city planning commission from 1967 to 1970 and was chairman of the city charter commission in 1970-71. He is presently associated with ownership and management of Jefferson Trucking, Incorporated.

Healey, a resident of Tawas City for five years, was born at Glennie and graduated from Flint Northern High School. He served five years in the army during World War II. He served 13 years as a warehouse supervisor under civil service at Wurtsmith Air Force Base and has been the Total distributor in this area for the past 12 years.

Mrs. Kehoe has been a resident of Tawas City for two years and lived in Baldwin Township prior to moving here. Her husband is a custodian at Tawas City Elementary Unit. A former resident of Flint, she was active in politics of that community as a campaign worker. A housewife, she operates Ann's Dance Studio in this community.

Landon, a lifetime resident of Tawas City, graduated from Tawas Area High School and served in the army for two years. He has been a member of the Tawas City Park Board for two years and is an officer of the Tawas Braves Booster Club. He is an employee of Tawas Industries, Incorporated.

IMPORTANT ELECTION

Tuesday, November 4, is election day in Tawas City and it is important that every registered voter cast his or her ballot to name city officers for the next two to four years. Once the voter enters the election booth, all of the rhetoric of the campaign is left behind and it is up to the resident voter to make his decision as to individual choices.

This election is not wanting for candidates or issues as there are two candidates for the two-year term of mayor and six candidates for this four-year term of aldermen. This is a non-partisan election, political parties having been eliminated under the city's charter of 1970 and aldermen are elected at-large.

There have been many accomplishments by the city since the last election, notably completion of two new bridges over the Tawas River, reconstruction of streets, expansion of sanitary sewer mains through special assessment districts to serve the last major areas of the city without sewers, construction of a new parking lane at the city park, improvement to the city park dock and construction of a new breakwall to protect Ninth Avenue along the river, looping of water mains to better serve the area south of the Tawas River as well as the northwestern part of the community, including the line to the medical care facility and Tawas Area High School.

City officials have shown fiscal responsibility in the spending of local tax dollars, along with money received from state and federal sources, including federal revenue sharing funds—the greatest boon ever to local finances, the major portion going to street construction. It should be remembered that city officials are taxpayers, too, and are interested in spending available public funds in the best and most efficient manner possible.

Several major projects have been undertaken which, if carried to a successful conclusion, should prove important to the future growth of the entire area. Those projects include planning for water and sewer expansion to serve the Tawas and outlying townships. In addition, considerable thought and temporary action has been given to a problem area at the mouth of the Tawas River, which remains unsolved at present and the city apparently can expect no help from state or federal sources to keep this waterway open to the public.

Considerable discussion and planning, too, has been given to expansion of parking to serve the business district, which is of primary necessity for future development of the community. Future planning for the city is of considerable importance and citizens appointed to the planning commission have contributed a sizeable amount of time and energy to the program.

There has been agitation over a number of projects, most notably the special assessment districts for sewer construction, but this work has been accomplished through the legal and equitable route established by the city charter and state law and the city at large has participated to a great degree in financing its share of this important work.

Action by the council on all matters has been under a majority decision following discussion and consideration, as it should be in matters of governmental operation and everyone so desiring has had the opportunity to "have their say" at council meetings; preference has not been given to any special interest group.

Now, it is up to the elector to make his choice and he should examine each candidate carefully before making his decision. It should be remembered that most campaign rhetoric is designed to attract votes and issues are not always what they are painted to be at election time.

COUNTY HAS FINANCIAL PINCH

Tawas Chamber of Commerce has taken issue with the Iosco

County Board of Commissioners concerning the commission's recent action in not allocating \$5,000 to each (three) chambers of commerce in the county. Actually, there are four operating chambers in the county, but one, Whittemore, did not present a request. Had there been an allocation, all should have been included.

The handwriting was on the wall at tax allocation time last spring concerning the above allocations; the requests submitted to the county commission from chambers of commerce, along with several other new programs, which were important to those making the requests, were added to the county's budget as "new" items and were deleted when funds were not made available.

Chambers of commerce of the Tawas, Oscoda-AuSable, Hale and Whittemore have important jobs to perform, but it does seem to this corner that each organization serves a specific area and should be supported by that area, if it is so desired by citizens of each community. It must be remembered, too, that some communities and local units of government are not served by any chamber of commerce.

Several years ago, the county commission included an allocation in its budget to assist in the hiring of one director for chambers of commerce at Oscoda-AuSable and the Tawas, but each of those chambers now have individual directors. While it might be argued that some services provided by the chamber of commerce are of benefit to the entire county—particularly in the field of industrial development and assistance with obtaining state and federal grants—the county, in 1976, is without funds to continue the previous allocations.

Action by the county commission seems to be saying that if expanded or new roles in chamber activities are desired, then it is the obligation of individual organizations and communities served to provide the financing.

Students Should Report Status Changes

Students age 18-22 getting social security checks should report changes in their earnings, school enrollment and marital status to social security, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

Over 680,000 students 18 and over get monthly social security payments because a parent gets disability, retirement social security benefits or has died. Students can continue to get payments to age 22, or slightly beyond for undergraduates, as long as they remain full-time students and unmarried.

"Students getting checks should notify social security immediately if they marry, leave school or start attending on a part-time basis so we can stop their monthly payments as required by law," Carr said. "Changes in total yearly earnings from part-time or temporary jobs can also affect social security payments to students."

"If you are a student getting payments and expect your earnings for 1975 will be over \$2,520, you should report that to social security," he said. "Otherwise, you might get benefits you will have to pay back later."

Social security payments are reduced by one dollar for every two dollars earned over \$2,520 in a year. No matter how much they earn for the year, people can get their full social security payments for any month in which they neither earn \$210 nor do substantial work in their own business.

Students getting social security payments should report transfers from one school to another, according to Carr.

Financial Report of Tawas Area School District
a. The Tawas Area Schools annual financial report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, is indicated below. The publishing of the report is required by the official school laws of the State of Michigan. The school district's general fund revenues for the fiscal year were \$2,156,159. Expenditures from the general fund were \$2,114,840. In addition, there was \$164,678 outstanding in delinquent taxes. Although the school district presently appears to be in a relative stable financial condition, there are some issues that will need resolving in the immediate future. Some of these are:
1. More than one-half of the present operating school district millage is due to expire in June, 1976.
2. The present split sessions for middle school - high school students.
3. The need for additional and more adequate classroom and related activity space.
4. The lack of accreditation for the high school program.
These are matters the Board of Education and the Administration will be addressing themselves to in the months ahead.

A request for increased local service rates will be filed this week with the Michigan Public Service Commission by Continental Telephone of Michigan, it was announced by John J. Gault, company vice president. It represents the first general rate increase sought by the company in more than five years.

The requested amount will vary from one locality to another, depending on the number of telephones that can be recalled on a local basis, the class of service provided and the availability of extended area service to neighboring exchanges. It would affect the average customer bill by about 10 cents per day, Gault stated. Long distance rates are not affected.

"More than half of the additional revenue we are requesting will go for state and federal taxes," Gault explained. "In order to get the additional \$500,000 we need to meet our capital requirements and

satisfy our growing service demand, we must ask for just over one million dollars in additional revenue."

The request for changes in local rates is designed to produce \$930,000 additional annually, plus increased service connection charges producing an additional \$80,000 annually.

"Nobody likes to see service charges go up," Gault observed. "We don't like to ask for increased rates any more than our customers want to pay them, but our operating expenses have risen sharply in the past few months. We see no sign that the situation will improve, although we are continuing to cut costs and improve efficiency wherever we can."

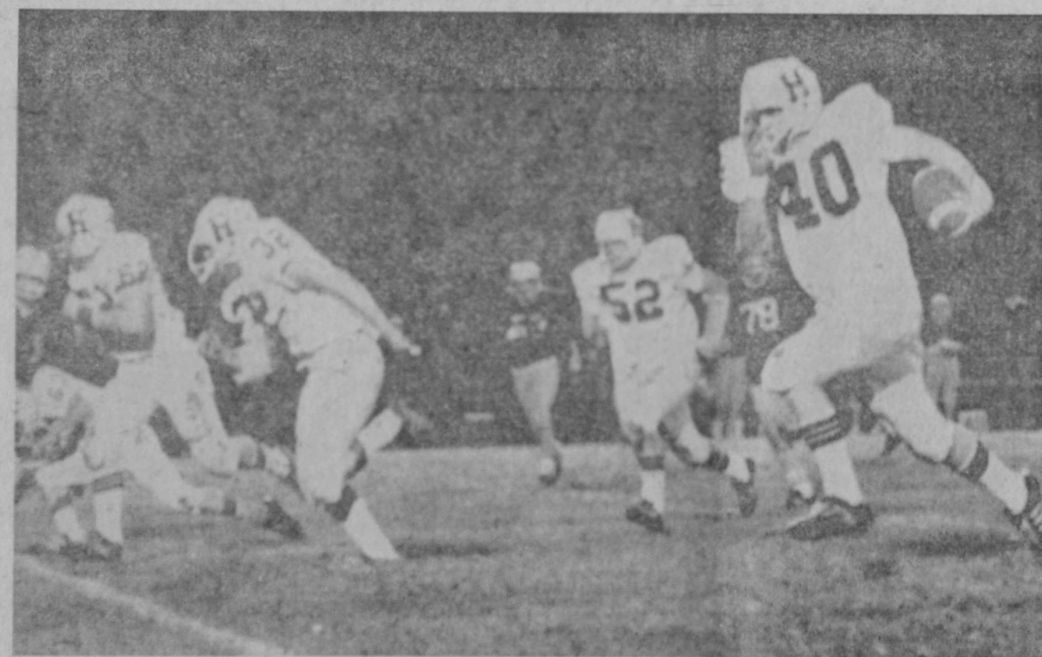

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
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Family Living Education

EASY ON THE COOK

As the cold weather arrives, it seems fitting that meals should be heartier. Unfortunately, many of these kind of foods seem to take a longer preparation time—time that many of us have a difficult time finding.

The French have been known for ages for their art of food preparation. I would like to share two favorite French-style recipes. In each of these recipes, the hearty beef flavor is enhanced by the addition of a full-bodied liquid (cider or wine), a flavor trick often used by the French. The recipes are quickly put together and, therefore, time-savers.

FRENCH BEEF BAKE

2 cups cubed roast beef
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon thyme
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 cup apple cider
2 cans (1 lb. each) white kidney beans, drained
1 can (1 lb.) small boiled onions,

drained
½ cup chopped parsley

Brown beef in butter or margarine in a medium-sized frying pan; stir in salt, thyme, pepper and cider; heat to boiling; Spoon into a six-cup baking dish; stir in beans and onions; cover. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 30 minutes or until bubbly hot. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve with French bread, if you wish. Makes four servings.

FRENCH BEEF STEW

1½ pounds stewing beef
2 medium onions, cut into quarters
2 tablespoons tapioca
2 beef bouillon cubes
1 can (8 oz.) mushrooms, undrained
½ cup water
1 cup cooking sherry (dry)

Place all ingredients in a large size casserole in the order listed. (Liquid will tend to bubble up during cooking so a casserole with extra room is needed.) Cover. Bake in an oven at 350 degrees for three hours. Serve with rice, noodles or potatoes. Garnish with thin onion rings browned in butter.
