Departing Doctors Honored Sunday

A unique reception honoring two physicians leaving the community was held Sunday afternoon at the East Tawas Community Building. A crowd of more than 500 persons attended the three-hour event.

"We have never felt so important at any time in our lives than at this moment," said Dr. Jose F. Fuertes. "We have dreaded the coming of this moment, but it is now a reality; we feel downhearted knowing that we are leaving so many dear friends and patients."

"I feel sorry that I have not been able to extend all the capacities that I have, and I deeply regret leaving all the people needing medical care in this area; I hope I have done a satisfactory job," said Dr. Edmundo O. Sanchez.

Both physicians were applauded vigorously by the audience, predominated by persons of senior citizen age from various parts of the county.

The two physicians are leaving for their new practice at Douglas in Southwestern Michigan. A committee comprised of members of various senior citizens organizations and headed by Mrs. C. L. Braman of Tawas City thought that an open house and farewell party would be appropriate before the departure of the two physicians.

Doctor Fuertes told those attending that their efforts and support, along with a petition drive, were not wasted and were greatly appreciated by himself and Doctor Sanchez.

Although noting that none of his colleagues in the medical profession were present, Doctor Fuertes said he was not leaving with any bitterness. "We are hoping that the situation at Tawas Hospital will become normalized for the good of the community," he stated.

In late August, when it was announced that both of the physicians would be leaving the area, Doctor Fuertes expressed "distress" over the fact that he was still on probationary status at the hospital after a period of two years. The credentials of Doctor Sanchez have been under investigation by the hospital and he has not been allowed to practice there.

After searching for a surgeon for a number of years, the hospital encouraged Fuertes to locate here two years ago. A year later, Fuertes asked Sanchez to come here to join in his practice. Both men are natives of the Philippines and were classmates at the University of St. Thomas, Manila. Both men interned in New York City, New York, and both were in general surgery residence there.

Following the announcement that the two physicians were leaving, a storm of protests swept the Isosco County area, particularly from newer residents and senior citizens, who felt they would lose the services of a physician due to the extensive practices of other doctors in the area.

A petition campaign was begun immediately asking the two physicians to stay and demanded that they be allowed to work out an agreement to practice at the hospital.

City councils of both East Tawas and Tawas City requested meetings with the hospital board of trustees and medical staff to discuss the situation, but no meetings have been held to date.

At its September meeting, the hospital board of trustees pledged to the community it would do everything possible to "recruit medical doctors to replace those who are leaving."

Doctor Fuertes asked those attending Sunday's farewell party to be understanding in the situation and begged them not to feel they were being deserted. "This has been a most difficult decision and we wish the best of health and prosperity to all," he stated.

Standing with the two physicians in the reception line were their wives and children, along with Doctor Fuertes' mother, Dr. Eugenia Fuertes of California, a physician, who has been visiting her son and daughter-in-law for several weeks.

Study Annexation for City Utilities

Extension of municipal water and sewer mains outside the city limit and annexation of property requesting such service is currently under consideration by the Tawas City Water Department and Tawas City Planning Commission.

This information was contained in minutes of recent meetings of those two groups and read before Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

At its last regular meeting, the planning commission heard a report that the Isosco Board of Commissioners was interested in extending the city boundary to the social services building near the Isosco County Medical Care Facility in order to avail itself of a more economical water and sewer rate.

A letter from Edmands Engineering to Davison and Sons regarding the development of a complex north of M-55 was read at the September 29 meeting of the water board. The letter stated that a portion of that site could be served without a lift station, but it was pointed out the city was reluctant to extend such service without annexation of the property to the city.

The above proposals, along with other inquiries concerning extension of water and sewer facilities outside the city are to be turned over to the planning commission for study.

Mayor John N. Brugger said Monday night that annexation of any property would pose a complex problem and should not be done on a piecemeal basis. He said that any such move would require considerable study by the council and any program developed would be submitted to the state boundary commission for its approval.

At the present time, a water main extends from the city across Townline Road to serve residences in Alabaster Township and both water and sewer has been extended along Plank Road to serve the

medical care facility, Tawas Area School and some homes in that area.

A surcharge is presently made for service received by customers outside the city.

Observe Fire Prevention Week

Three area insurance agencies remind area residents that hostile fire is a major drain on national resources and that fire kills. October 5-11 is National Fire Prevention Week.

Any fire, no matter how large it may become, begins as a small fire. In its earliest stages, most fires are easily controlled. The earlier in its history of development that a fire can be detected, the better are the chances of escape for those persons in potential danger and the sooner suppression methods can be brought to bear on the fire.

No Prosecution in Saturday Brawl

Two of five persons involved in a brawl Saturday night at Whittemore, in which gunfire was exchanged between both sides, were released Monday on recommendation of the prosecuting attorney's office.

The sheriff's department said that prosecution was denied as all parties involved were equally guilty and witnesses could not identify persons firing two shots.

State Reluctant to Participate in River Dredging

Reluctance on the part of the Michigan Waterways Commission toward becoming involved in a cooperative program with the city in maintenance dredging at the mouth of the Tawas River has been indicated in a letter from Keith Wilson, chief of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' waterways division.

A letter from the city two months ago asked the waterways commission to consider its involvement with the United States Army Corps of Engineers in a Section 107 study to determine the feasibility of improving the mouth of the river for recreational boating.

Such a project requires the local sponsoring agency to provide 50 percent of the first costs of the project, all lands, easements and rights-of-way required, along with dikes disposal areas on shore if such are required. Wilson said the above items would initially total far more than any annual maintenance dredging project previously accomplished by the city.

"In order to initiate such a study with the corps of engineers, the waterways commission must indicate a present willingness to participate in such a project," said Wilson. "Since the waterways commission has previously refused to participate in maintenance dredging at the mouth of the river and since the desired project is basically of this nature, I seriously doubt the commission would be willing to make such a statement."

Wilson said that planned construction of boat launching facilities in the vicinity of the authorized harbor of refuge at East Ta-

was should greatly reduce the demand for boat launching facilities on the Tawas River.

The city has attempted to obtain federal and state assistance in improving conditions at the river mouth for the past 30 years, but has never met with any success. The latest move came two years ago when city officials asked the DNR to consider construction of a boat launching site at the river mouth, but the state turned down that program as being too expensive.

The city operates a public boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue and it is used extensively as it offers the best protected facilities for public launching on Tawas Bay.

The city has expended approximately \$2,000 this year in removing a sandbar which plugged the river mouth from the fall of 1974 to June of this year. The blockage caused a diversion of the channel across private property. City funds were later used to improve boating conditions for fall fishing.

Two weeks ago, the city dragline was used to clean the channel and, due to recent high winds, the equipment is to again be used in order to keep the channel open for visiting fishermen.

In the meantime, it was suggested by Aid. James Lansky that the city contact those persons who appeared before an earlier meeting of the council this summer and offered financial assistance in keeping the river channel open for boating. He said that money had been collected to assist in the project but had never been turned over to the city.

Property Appraisal OK'd by East Tawas

East Tawas Council approved a contract Monday night with Gem Surveys in which the St. Clair firm will conduct a complete re-appraisal of property in the city for tax purposes.

The firm prepared property appraisal cards for the city nearly 10 years ago under a joint program with the county. Since then, the appraisal cards have become outdated.

Cost of the service provided by Gem Surveys will be \$9.50 per parcel. With an estimated 1,671 parcels in the city, the total cost will be \$15,875.

Under the arrangement with the appraisal firm, \$6,000 is to be due at the start of the work and the balance is to be due October 1, 1976, when the project is to be completed.

The program with the appraisal firm will include training of the city tax assessor in appraisal work.

In other business, a new wage and salary schedule was approved for city employees.

Wages of hourly workers were increased as follows: Heavy equipment operator, from \$3.72 to \$4.02 per hour; medium equipment operator, from \$3.67 to \$3.96 per hour; truck driver, from \$3.61 to \$3.90 per hour; laborer, from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per hour; janitor, from \$2.95 to \$3.15 per hour.

A \$905 increase was granted to the chief of police, whose annual salary now is \$12,215. Four patrolmen received an increase of \$725, bringing salaries to \$9,825 per year.

Other salaries include: Superintendent of public works, \$13,000, an increase of \$1,350; foreman, \$9,600, an increase of \$760; city clerk, \$3,750, an increase of \$400; treasurer, \$5,000, an increase of \$266; librarian, \$3,995, an increase of \$295.

Salary of the chief water plant operator is \$10,500, an increase of \$750; first assistant operator, from \$3.65 per hour to \$3.94; second assistant, from \$3.50 to \$3.78; chief sewage plant operator, \$10,500, an increase of \$250; assistant operator, from \$3.65 to \$3.94 per hour; cashier-bookkeeper, \$6,000, an increase of \$600; office clerk, \$2,850, an increase of \$210; meter reader, from \$2.35 per hour to \$2.55.

The council authorized implementation of a revised parking plan at the city parking lot. Approximately 25 parking spaces are to be gained through angle parking and changing the exit to Westover Street.

On recommendation of City Attorney Michael Freel, sidewalk construction is to be delayed until

next spring. The city attorney recommended that sidewalk construction be handled the same as any other special assessment district.

The council sent a letter to the department of public works thanking the city crew for prompt action in repairing a water main break Saturday afternoon on Newman Street.

Public Hearing October 20 on Sewer District

Public hearing on a special assessment district to construct sanitary sewer on Tenth and Eleventh Avenues is to be held Monday, October 20, 7:30 p. m., by the Tawas City Council.

At its regular meeting Monday night, the council took the second step in the legal process of establishing a special assessment district when it reviewed plans for the project.

The program calls for construction of 344 lineal feet of eight-inch sanitary sewer on Tenth Avenue at an estimated cost of \$13,825 and 354 feet of sanitary sewer on Eleventh Avenue at a cost of \$8,955, both mains running from Fourth Street to Dead Creek. The project would include manholes, service leads and connections to lots and parcels of property abutting both streets.

The council has determined that a part of the cost of the project would be assessed against all property abutting the proposed sewer according to per front foot benefits.

The meeting October 20 would be for the purpose of hearing objections from property owners within the district. Plans for the two sewer mains are available for inspection at the city hall and would be reviewed at the public hearing.

32 Handguns Stolen at Hale

A burglary Sunday night at Hale Hardware remains under investigation by the Isosco Sheriff's Department. When the store was opened Monday morning, it was discovered that 32 handguns had been stolen.

Suit Commenced in Sewer Dispute

Damages totaling \$40,000 plus cancellation of and return of money paid in a real estate transaction, plus relief from paying a special sewer assessment, are asked by a Tawas City couple in a suit filed in Isosco Circuit Court.

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kehoe, plaintiffs, have named Mrs. Margaret Prescott, Mr. and Mrs. Clark Tanner, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz and the City of Tawas City as defendants.

In the summer of 1973, the Kehoes purchased a residence on Birch Street, from the Tanners, who had listed their property with Mrs. Prescott, a local real estate agent. Purchase price of the property was \$12,600.

The Kehoes claim that the house immediately began to experience plumbing problems. They claim that a plumber advised them a sanitary sewer line on their property would require cleaning and allege they discovered that the line ran approximately 270 feet across a city alley and across private property to reach the main line on North Street. It was stated that the sewer line was at a depth of approximately six inches at one point and only 26 inches in depth where it entered the main line.

On March 8 of last year, the Kehoes were notified by the city that their share of a special tax assessment district for construction of sanitary sewer would be \$1,900. The plaintiffs claim that they purchased the property with the understanding that it was served by sanitary sewer and they had, in fact, paid quarterly bills for sanitary sewer service.

Upon protesting the special assessment to the city, the Kehoes' petition states they were told by the city manager that the property was served by a special temporary hookup, which did not meet requirements and the property would be assessed in the new sanitary sewer district.

The Kehoes claim that representations by Mrs. Prescott as to the house having adequate city sewer and plumbing were false and ask for a judgement of \$10,000 against her, plus cancellation of and return of their money paid to her in the real estate transaction.

The petition claims that Tanner, in his capacity as a member of the city council, "induced Bublitz to hook up his residence to city sanitary sewer, knowing that the hookup was temporary and was done as a special favor to him as a member of the city council." They claim that as a member of the council, Tanner was aware that a sanitary sewer was being planned for the area in which the house is located and knew that the property would be receiving a special assessment for sanitary sewer. They claim that Tanner's representations were fraudulent and ask for \$10,000 in damages, plus cancellation of and return of money paid

in the real estate transaction.

The Kehoes' petition claims that the city manager knew the hookup was "illegal and improper and did not conform to necessary requirements and was intended to be temporary." They claim that actions of the city manager in "allowing the hookup contributed to the fraud" and that his actions were outside of his authorized duties. The Kehoes ask a \$10,000 judgment against the city manager.

It is claimed that the city council had knowledge of the transaction between Tanner and Bublitz to install and maintain a special temporary hookup at the property. "Failure to prohibit the special privilege granted to Tanner was an abuse of the council's trust to the citizens of Tawas City and the plaintiff," stated the petition. The Kehoes claim the city did not notify them that the hookup was temporary and would or could be discontinued.

"If the city had not allowed the illegal and improper hookup to continue, Tanner would not have been able to fraudulently represent to the plaintiffs that the house had adequate city sewer," it was stated. A \$10,000 judgment is being asked against the city.

The Kehoes claim they suffered physical and mental distress, have expended great cost for maintenance and repairs, plus the face cost of the special assessment district, as well as considerable attorney fees and costs.

Isosco Farmers Are Cooperating With Hunters

Hunting is available on private lands through the Cropland Adjustment Program. Harold Cholger, chairman of the Isosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, stated there were eight farms with 616 acres in Isosco County available for public hunting. Lists of farms are available through the local ASC Office located in the Federal Building, East Tawas, or at the chamber of commerce office.

Cholger further stated that, throughout the state there are approximately 1,100 agreements of offering over 60,000 acres to public hunting. Lists in other counties can be obtained from the local ASCS Office or through the Michigan State ASCS Office, located in East Lansing.

Cholger stated farms are identified by a large green and white sign posted close to buildings. Hunters are reminded that they should identify themselves to the property owner, if possible, and must obey all state and federal hunting laws.

Disappointed With Letter

City Wants Hospital Meeting

At the request of Mrs. C. L. Braman, Tawas City Council is to send a second letter to the board of trustees of Tawas Hospital requesting a meeting to discuss the situation involving the loss of two physicians in the area.

A reply from the board of trustees to a recent letter from the council asking for a meeting was met with disappointment by some councilmen along with Mrs. Braman, who attended Monday night's meeting.

A letter from Robert W. Elliott, president of the board of trustees, said the board, together with the medical staff, had "mutually pledged themselves to do everything within their power to see that the community has sufficient and suitable physicians."

Elliott said a joint committee, consisting of the board of trustees and medical staff, has been established to evaluate these needs and do such recruiting as may be required to meet them.

"Congressman Ruppe has been kind enough to offer the committee his assistance and support in this enterprise," said Elliott. "You may be assured we will work diligently toward solutions which will continue and improve the quality of patient care which we are

proud of providing." Mrs. Braman said she was not satisfied with the letter from the board of trustees and that her committee had "other plans" for continuing its investigation.

In other business, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the city council and park board should soon consider specifications for bids on the park concession building, the contract for which expires next March.

According to minutes of the planning commission, a proposed 40 by 100-foot addition to Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company's tool and die division on Ninth Avenue has been approved.

According to minutes of the water board, Del Myles has been named chairman of the water board to succeed the late Carl Libka. The vacancy on the water board has not been filled as yet.

The city manager reported that the smoke test on sewer mains had revealed no significant infiltration of ground water into the sanitary sewer system. However, it is believed there is considerable infiltration at some point in the system and the state may require additional tests to determine the source. At the present time, the state health department has with-

held its approval of construction of a force main between the Second Avenue lift station and the waste water treatment plant due to water infiltration.

The council adopted a resolution asking the state to designate the city as an authorized initiating agency under the soil erosion and sedimentation act. The designation would allow the city to perform work on water and sewer construction without the need for a permit on each project, but would still require proper engineering to conform with the act.

A report from the planning commission indicated that reconstruction of Court Street from the county building to M-55 would cost approximately \$82,500. The work under study would include a 22-foot bituminous surface, roll curb on the south side of the street and storm sewer. Contingencies and engineering would add approximately 20 percent to the total cost.

The above project is currently being studied as part of a proposed project to develop a parking lot west of the county building. It was estimated that each parking space would cost \$600 for 34 cars. The planning commission is to continue its study of the project.

Photographer Sues Former Employer

A judgment of \$20,000 and exemplary damages of \$100,000 are being sought by an Oscoda photographer, formerly of East Tawas, against a Harrison studio chain, local operators of the studio chain, a photographer at West Branch and a studio at Oscoda.

Plaintiff in the case is John Smith. Named defendants are his former employer, Leonard Hawks, owner of Guys and Dolls Photography of Harrison; Paul and Jan Tishim, manager of Guys and Dolls Studio, East Tawas; Thomas Stenbeck, agent for Guys and Dolls, West Branch; Ferris Parsons, Artmaster Studio, Oscoda, agent for Hawks.

The damage suit arises over contracts with area schools for senior portraits. Smith claims that on May 28, through competitive bidding, the senior class of Tawas Area High School named him as

the photographer for school portraits. In addition, he was named as the photographer at AuGres-Sims School and Oscoda Area School.

Smith claims that the defendants intentionally and maliciously interfered with his contractual rights through acts of solicitation at Tawas Area School, offering students "at cost" prices for portraits.

The petition said that telephone solicitations by the defendants, along with newspaper advertising, caused a great and growing number of seniors to abandon the plaintiff and go to the defendants for senior portraits.

Smith claims that he was slandered during the solicitations and suffered damages to his reputation, losing profits and income of \$20,000.



Braves Beat Owls in Final Seconds

Scoring with just 15 seconds remaining in the game, Tawas Area Braves turned back the Oscoda Owls Friday night, 21-14, to ring up their fifth straight win and third in NBC competition.

The win puts the Braves alone at the top of the rung in NBC standings as both Tawas and Oscoda had been undefeated going into the battle. Another undefeated NBC team, Carrollton, suffered its first league loss at the hands of Gladwin, 24-14.

The annual grudge match between the two NBC and Isoco County rivals appeared to be going into a sudden death situation when Greg Gotcher of the Braves intercepted a pass and returned the ball 52 yards to the Owl's 30-yard line.

After two passes by Quarterback Earl Parsons fell incomplete, Flanker Jeff Tousley ran 30 yards on a reverse to score the winning touchdown with just 15 seconds remaining in the game. Bob Stephenson booted his third straight point after touchdown to end the scoring.

For the second straight week, Tawas spotted its opponent the opening touchdown and then rallied to take over the lead. The Owls scored first on its opening series when Keith Goins raced 66 yards for a six-pointer and Jim Harrison kicked the first of his two conversions.

Tawas' defense came to the front later in the quarter when the Braves recovered a fumble on

the Oscoda 19 and, eight plays later, Parsons sneaked the final two yards to tie the game.

The two teams were held scoreless in the second period, but Goins put the Owls on top, 14-7, with a one-yard run in the third quarter.

The Braves came right back to score in the same period when Stephenson ran 17 yards for the Braves to knot the score at 14-14.

That touchdown set the stage for Tawas' heroics late in the game.

Halfback Mitch Lenczewski of the Braves was finally stopped short of a 100-yard night by the Owl defense after four straight games at that mark. Lenczewski was still the rushing leader for the Braves with 75 yards, followed by

Goins was the top rusher for Oscoda with 114 yards while Mark Soroka had 87 yards. The Braves totaled 226 yards on the ground to Oscoda's 220, but the Owls had the edge in the air with 153 yards while Tawas had only 107 yards.

Action this Friday night moves to Pinconning where the Braves take on the Spartans, who nipped Standish-Sterling, 7-6, for their first win. However, Pinconning is usually tough on its own field and dealt the Braves an upset two years ago when Tawas was looking for a slice of the NBC championship.

New Equalization Director Inherits Two Tax Appeals

John Rose, 34, took over his new position last week as Iosco County's tax equalization director. He succeeds Robin D. Allain as head of the four-member department. Rose, who was hired for this po-

sition by the county board of commissioners, had served the past 3½ years as director of Schoolcraft County's tax equalization department. He had been with that department for 5½ years.

"I like the work and my only hope and ambition is to insure equity in property appraisals in order that every property owner pays his proportionate share of taxes," said Rose.

Because of the fact that the county's original property appraisal was conducted nearly 10 years ago, Rose said that it would take time and proper staffing of the department to achieve this goal.

The new tax equalization director has inherited at least two problems which have been hanging fire since his predecessor resigned last summer. The first will be a hearing October 21 before the Michigan Tax Tribunal concerning Plainfield Township's appeal on the county equalization. The second item of concern for the new tax director will be the county's appeal of state equalization. There may not be an answer on the second question for some time as the supreme court is to determine if the 23 counties filing appeals have the right to do so before the state tax tribunal.

Rose graduated from Michigan Technological University in a 36-week appraisal course for tax assessing officer and holds a three level certificate from the state tax department. Rose said he entered the tax equalization field quite by accident when the Schoolcraft County director asked him if he wanted to go to work for that department. Prior to that job, he had been a heavy equipment operator.

"I liked the work and decided that I would learn more about the field by attending Michigan Tech," he stated.

He is now in the process of house hunting, preferably a farm house with acreage. His wife, Linda, and their two children, Laura, eight years of age, and Roger, six years old, will move here shortly.

A native of Indiana, Rose spent six years in the United States Navy and came to Michigan in 1964 after his military service.

He said that his job situation in Schoolcraft County was quite similar to his new position in Iosco County and is looking forward to his work here.

Despite the fact that he lost a leg in an automobile accident, he is an active and avid outdoor sportsman, enjoying hunting, fishing and snowmobiling. He said Friday, however, that he probably would not have much time for hunting and fishing this fall because of the time involved in moving his family and household.

New Teachers' Contract OK'd at Hale Area

Hale Area Board of Education Thursday night ratified a two-year contract with Hale Area Education Association representing 37 teachers. Negotiations on the new contract, which had started last April, were completed before it became necessary to go to state fact finding.

Under the new contract, a starting teacher with a bachelor degree is to receive an annual salary of \$8,748. Top salary for a teacher with a bachelor degree is \$13,852 in 12 steps. Starting salary for a holder of a master degree is \$9,504, with a top salary of \$14,653 in 12 steps.

In the second year of the contract, starting salary for a teacher with a bachelor degree would be \$9,360 and a top of \$14,822. Starting salary for a teacher with a master degree would be \$10,169, with a top of \$15,679.

In addition, the board of education agreed to a new dental plan and long term disability insurance, which was added to present hospitalization and life insurance.

Layoff and recall procedures were re-established under the contract. When negotiations began, four members of the staff were not members of HAEA. All teachers are now members of the union and an agency shop clause was accepted by the board of education.

Urge Farmers to Investigate New Land Act

There has been a great deal of misunderstanding of the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act, Public Act 116 of 1974, and only a few farmers have taken advantage of the new legislation.

William Woreley, county commissioner from Hale, said Thursday that he believes more farmers should investigate if they are eligible to enter into this program.

This program allows eligible farmers to receive a possible state income tax refund based on a formula taking into consideration land property taxes and seven percent of household income.

Instructions and applications for filing are available from Marvin Davenport, county extension director, who said there is a great deal of misunderstanding of the act as it does not freeze taxes at the present level.

After an application form is filled out by the farmer, it should be filed with the township clerk, who notifies the county planning commission of the filing. The planning commission has 30 days to notify the township clerk if it has any objections to the application. The township clerk also sends a copy to the Soil Conservation Service before its regular meeting, the second Thursday of each month.

Under the program, a farmland development, rights agreement specifies that the owner and the state agree to jointly hold the right to develop a parcel of farmland. The covenant is an agreement to not develop the property except as specifically stated within the agreement for at least 10 years.

The agreement would provide that a structure would not be constructed on the land or any improvements made to the property, except for use consistent with farm operations or with the approval of the local governing body and the state land use agency. Any interest in the property would be sold only for a scenic, access or utility easement which does not substantially hinder farm operations.

Public access would not be permitted on the land except with the permission of the owner.

Help Brighten Christmas at Traverse City State Hospital

It may seem a bit early to begin planning for Christmas, but not if you had to plan for over 600 people as does Traverse City State Hospital. A great amount of time and effort in behalf of the hospital's patient population are required to insure a "Merry Christmas" for all patients. It takes time for clubs and civic organizations, churches and schools to formulate plans in order to participate in the Christmas effort at the hospital.

Organizations within the 34-county area assigned to the institution are invited to begin now to make plans to take part in the Christmas activities for Traverse City State Hospital's patients. Volunteers will begin wrapping gifts on November 12, and the hospital would like to receive as many of the gifts as possible by that date. Gifts should not arrive later than December 9. The sorting and wrapping of all gifts must be completed by December 20.

Gifts do not have to be expensive but they must be new. Civic groups, clubs, churches, schools and individuals are cordially invited to take part in the 1975 Christmas program. It is suggested that some of the men's service organizations concentrate on gifts for men, school children on gifts for children, etc. Gifts should not be wrapped and individuals are requested to include gift wrapping paper, ribbon, etc. this year. Such items as toiletries for both men and women, inexpensive items of clothing for all ages, from seven years to 90; books, games, puzzles, smoking materials, fruit, candies, etc., are suggested.

Additional information can be obtained by contacting the Community Relations Department, Box C, Traverse City, Michigan 49684. Gifts sent to the hospital should be addressed in the same way, including the name and address of the club, organization or individual.

Break Ground



WORK commenced last week on breaking ground for the new Tawas City post office to be located west of the Mathews Street intersection on US-23. The building is being constructed by Liebler Construction Company, Incorporated, Caro. The firm is to lease the building to the United States Postal Service. Edward C. Liebler, president of the firm, said Thursday that the project has a target date for completion by mid-February. The new building is to contain 2,784 square feet of floor space, approximately one-

half again as large as provided in the present quarters. The new location will have improved facilities for mail handling and will provide additional parking for patrons. The site of the new post office was once the location of the Whittemore sawmill and salt block, the first industrial operation in Iosco County. During excavation work last week, rusted pieces of saws and other relics of the lumbering days were uncovered by a bulldozer.—Tawas Herald Photo.







Proceedings of Iosco Board of Commissioners

SEPTEMBER SESSION
September 17, 1975

Pursuant to published schedule, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3) and Fox (District 4)
Absent: Wereley (District 5)

Chairman Foster reviewed the agenda for the day and the business before the board, indicating the board would recess between 3:30 and 4:30 p. m. to meet at the county airport with Saginaw County commissioners, Buena Vista Township officials and state aeronautics officials making an inspection tour of various airports throughout the region.

The communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

Michigan State Police Sergeant Kenneth Rynard, emergency services coordinator for the 3rd district, Bay City, appeared before the board to discuss an emergency services (civil defense) program for the county, explaining that 50 percent of the salary and expense of the civil defense coordinator is reimbursable. Continuing, Rynard advised that an undersheriff or a deputy could be appointed civil defense coordinator, but not an elected official; commented briefly on the "Crisis Relocation Program", a federal program being developed to evacuate people from designated target areas; and concluded by offering his services in setting up a program, indicating that the cost to the county would be very minimal.

County Drain Commissioner John Mielock addressed the board in reference to the Kuerbitz Drain in Baldwin Township reporting that the road commission submitted a bill for \$1,800 for cleaning the drain in conjunction with a project to raise and resurface Miller Road, after having informed him that the cost would not exceed \$400 or \$500. Mielock further reported on repairs by the road commission to the Long Lake Dam, for which bills have been submitted in the amounts of \$1,897 by the road commission and \$350 by Otis Love for engineering fees, advising that he will have to prepare a special assessment, as there is only \$368.77 remaining in the fund for that dam, adding that money could be borrowed in anticipation of the tax revenues.

Richard Catalano, director of the Region VII Area Agency on Aging, together with Lea Hicks, of the Trio Council, and Vincent Wade, Iosco County Senior Citizens president, appeared before the board seeking endorsement by the county for the permanent designation of their organization as the area funding agency for Title III funds. In response to questions by board members, Catalano enumerated the various functions of the Area Agency, indicating that Title III monies are intended to provide "seed money" to initiate programs and explore other sources of funding.

Board members continued to question Catalano as to county involvement and obligation in the future, seeking to ascertain if the county may be required to provide funding that may not be available or budgeted. There were also questions raised as to the success of the maxi-van program, whereupon Mrs. Hicks reported it to be working out very well, indicating that she will provide a report to the board.

At 12:25 p. m., the board recessed for lunch on order of the chairman, to stand in recess for committee work until later in the afternoon.
