\$450, he said. The most common reason for an undelivered check, according to Plate, is that the taxpayer has moved and left no forwarding address with the United States Postal Service.

In cases where the taxpayer suspects his check may have been lost or stolen, Plate urged the person to get in touch with his local IRS office as soon as possible so that the IRS can put a tracer on the missing check.

Some refunds may have been delayed because of errors or omissions on tax returns. Taxpayers affected should follow the instructions received from the IRS in order to speed up issuance of their checks.

Plate stressed that in all refund inquiries to the IRS, the taxpayer should be prepared to provide the name and address as it appeared on the return, the actual name and address, if different, the social security numbers and the type of form filed.

While the IRS can remail an undelivered refund check within a few days to the new address, Plate




