

OK Engineering to Complete TC Pier

Updating of engineering plans for completion of the pier at the Tawas City Park was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Engineering for this project is to represent the city's share of a cooperative arrangement with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for completion of the project.

The DNR had agreed last year to cooperate with the city in the installation of sheet steel piling to protect the popular fishing pier. The city went ahead with the project, but never received an allocation of \$15,000 in state funds.

A letter from Dr. Wayne Tody of the DNR indicated that a new written agreement with the city for maintenance of the pier would be required, along with transferring a permit from the corps of engineers to the city to authorize the work.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that work to be financed by state and federal funds would include completion of the installation of protective piling, new lighting, partial hard surfacing of the center portion of the roadway and installation of permanent seating.

In other business, the council authorized engineers to start preliminary work on planning for the joint water project with East Tawas and Baldwin Township. The authorization guarantees payment of the work in the event that federal grants for the project are not received. The city's share would not exceed \$2,000.

Bublitz said the authorization had been requested by the Iosco County Department of Public Works in order that federal grants are not delayed.

The city manager said an application for an FHA loan was being processed at Lansing. The loan is to finance the local share of the project and is to be repaid over a 40-year period.

According to a report from the

city manager, he had received letters from East Tawas, Tawas and Baldwin Townships authorizing this city to make application for a step one planning grant for sewer construction. He said that representatives of Alabaster Township had decided not to join in the application at this time.

Bublitz reported that the latest priority rating for federal funding placed Tawas City at a level of 231 out of 565 projects under consideration in the state. The city's priority rating had been 180 when the involved communities discussed the application last month. It was said that East Tawas had a rating of 321 last month, but has been eliminated from the new list.

The city manager said that should any new revision of the priority list give Tawas City a lower rating, the four communities may not be in line for a step one federal planning grant for sewer construction.

At the request of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, the city is to write a letter to Milton Barkman asking him to cut weeds on his property along First Street. The council also asked that the property owner check his property to determine if an old building is infested with rats, as claimed in a letter from the businessmen's association.

A report on operation of the city's boat ramp on Ninth Avenue indicated that 41 daily launching permits and 41 annual permits had been sold during the past month. The total for annual permits included 24 sold at the city hall. Total receipts amounted to \$225.50 and \$39.35 was paid to the attendant.

Due to recent storm action, the river mouth is again becoming clogged with sand, according to a report from the city manager. Depth of the water has not reached a point as yet where the channel is blocked, but future fall storms probably will again prove to be a problem for boat owners.

Tawas Area Fifth School to Pull Out of NBC

For all practical purposes, the Northern B conference died Monday night when the fifth school in the eight-member league decided to disaffiliate itself effective in 1976.

Tawas Area School joined Standish-Sterling, Pinconning, Gladwin and Ogemaw Heights Monday night in leaving the conference. The five schools are to join the Whittemore-Prescott Area School to form a new conference next year. The Western Iosco County school has been independent since the Northeastern Michigan League folded a number of years ago.

The formal announcement by the five schools is to be made at the regular meeting of the NBC Wednesday morning (today) at Standish.

In a letter to Oscoda Area School, Essexville Garber and Carrollton, the remaining schools in the NBC, Supt. Robert A. Halle stated it was a difficult decision for him to recommend this action and a difficult decision for the board of education to approve.

One of the originators of the NBC in 1962, Tawas Area School officials had pleaded unsuccessfully for nearly a year to retain the conference because of the outstanding competition it afforded member schools.

As the result of the withdrawal of five member schools, Oscoda Area, Essexville Garber and possibly Carrollton will be hard pressed to find another conference alignment. It was stated last week that representatives of Ogemaw Heights would join Tawas officials in an effort to have Oscoda become a member of the new conference.

The motion to leave the NBC was approved by a six to one vote of the board of education. The lone dissenting vote was cast by Trustee Willard (Bill) Dillon.

22nd Annual Tawas River Canoe Race This Week-End

Second annual boat race week is scheduled to start Saturday with two days of canoe racing on the Tawas River, followed by the Griffin Memorial Cup Regatta to be held Saturday and Sunday, September 20-21 on Tawas Bay.

Both events, being sponsored by businessmen of the area, are to benefit mentally impaired children at the Bright Horizons Learning Center. Michael Reed, race chairman, is being assisted by the Tawas Area Rotary Club in this program.

Hand crafted trophies representing Chief Tawas are to be presented to winners in the 22nd annual Tawas River Canoe Race to be held this Sunday. Cash prizes are to be awarded to winners in men's and women's professional divisions.

During the first 20 years of its existence, this race had been held in June, but the race was changed to a two-day event last year. Originally, the race was a feature of the Tawas City centennial celebration in 1954.

The starting and finish line is at the Ninth Avenue boat launching ramp, located upstream from the US-23 bridge, Tawas City. The City of Tawas is to provide personnel for assistance at the ramp in boats during the various canoe events over the week-end.

Canoe races on Saturday and Sunday will feature three courses, which will allow spectators to witness two and three races at the same time.

Saturday's schedule of events starts with a parade of canoes on

the river, 11:00 to 11:30 a. m., from the Ninth Avenue launching ramp to Mathews Street bridge.

Racing starts at 12 o'clock noon when the men's amateur division takes to the water. Following this race will be men's junior division, 12:45 p. m.; professional men's pole race, 1:45 p. m.; women's junior race, 2:00 p. m.; mixed doubles 3:30 p. m.; senior race, 3:35 p. m.; canoe jousting, 3:45 p. m.

Sunday's program starts at 12 o'clock noon with the men's amateur division. Other races include men's novice, 12:15 p. m.; men's professional, 1:00 p. m.; women's professional, 1:05 p. m.; women's novice, 1:15 p. m.; war canoe, 2:15 p. m.; little professional race, 2:20 p. m.

Trophies are to be presented at

the finish line at 3:30 p. m. Power boat racing the following week-end, September 20-21, will be held on a course in Tawas Bay paralleling US-23. Should rough water prevent use of this course, racing is to be moved to the bite of Tawas Bay near Jerry's Marina.

William Petty, the first Griffin Cup winner of the super stock tunnels, will be back to defend his title this year. Boats from Ohio comprising the Lorain Outboard Racing Association will conduct six to eight races in other classes for V-bottom family class boats and tunnel sprint class boats.

A special Bright Horizons race is to be open to boats of any class and is to be supervised by professionals, who will assist with safety equipment. This race is to operate under a handicap system.

Hospital Board Pledged to Recruit Doctor Replacements

Following its regular monthly meeting last Wednesday, the board of trustees and medical staff of Tawas Hospital pledged to the community, it would do everything possible to "recruit medical doctors to replace those who are leaving."

This statement was made following lengthy discussion at the meeting concerning the recent announcement by Drs. Jose F. Fierres and Edmundo O. Sanchez that they were leaving the Tawas area and had signed a contract to practice in a hospital at Douglas in Southwestern Michigan.

Patients of the two doctors have been involved in a public controversy with the hospital and medical staff over the impending departure of the doctors on October 15. Patients of the two doctors claim that they will be without the services of a physician once Fierres and Sanchez leave the community.

Petitions signed by more than 1,000 persons were presented Wednesday to the hospital administration. The petitions asked the two doctors to reconsider their decision to leave the community and demanded that they be allowed to work out an agreement to remain in the community and practice at the hospital.

Doctor Fierres, who came here two years ago, stated two weeks ago he was leaving the community because of frustration concerning his two-year probationary period at the hospital. Doctor Sanchez has not been allowed to practice at the hospital due to the fact that an investigation of his credentials had not been completed.

In the meantime, patients have

claimed that the two Filipino doctors have been "frozen out" of the Tawas area medical community.

John Neidow of the Michigan Department of Social Services said Monday that a news story Saturday concerning a state probe into allegations that some doctors in the Tawas area are not taking Medicaid patients, or are overcharging Medicaid patients, had been "blown all out of proportion."

Neidow told the Herald that allegations had been made to the department's main office at Lansing and he had asked Benson (Pete) Beck, director of the Iosco County Department of Social Services, to make an investigation. Neidow said he had provided Beck with a computer printout on Medicaid patients handled by local physicians and believed the information contained "nothing dramatic" concerning earnings by Tawas area physicians.

Neidow said that state was working in close cooperation with the Michigan Medical Society in developing an efficient billing system for Medicaid patients based on a regional plan for reimbursing physicians. He said that every attempt had been made to base Medicaid reimbursements on a cost comparable to that paid by the general public for services of physicians.

He said his department had no quarrel with the medical society and he believed that the decision of the two doctors to leave the Tawas area was a local situation and not one which involved Medicaid.

Saturday's newspaper article stated that Doctors Fierres and Sanchez were "frozen out" of the Tawas area medical community "because they accepted too many patients on Medicaid which other doctors would not accept."

Neidow said Monday that 83 percent of the bills from doctors handling Medicaid patients are now authorized within 15 days of receipt by his department and physicians are reimbursed within 30 days. He felt that the problem in the Tawas area was not a matter of doctors not wanting to handle Medicaid patients.

According to Neidow, the Iosco Department of Social Welfare is to determine if there are any specific complaints of doctors overcharging Medicaid patients.

Contacted Monday morning, M. Jerry Norwood, administrator of Tawas Hospital, said that to his knowledge, no Medicaid patients had ever been turned away by the hospital.

Saturday's newspaper article said the investigation would involve "allegations that three physicians are doing some things not exactly proper." Names of the three doctors were not disclosed in

the article, but it is said that Doctors Fierres and Sanchez are not suspects.

A report in last week's Herald concerning "backup" personnel in the operating room at Tawas Hospital was incorrectly attributed to M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator. Norwood said that he had not made such a statement. He

conducted an investigation of records and found that at no time had there been an operation performed without proper personnel in the operating room. The Herald editor regrets this error in reporting, which apparently resulted through a misunderstanding during a telephone interview and makes this retraction and public apology to those concerned.

Braves Won Opener in Three Overtimes

Rain-soaked football fans were happy they stayed to watch the finish of Friday night's season opener with Petoskey; the Tawas Braves battled back to win in triple overtime, 20-14.

Neither team was able to penetrate the endzone in regulation time as defensive units of the Braves and Northmen turned in performances of midseason form. After four scoreless quarters, three tie-breaker periods were required to settle the issue.

Going into the first tie-breaker attempt, the Northmen appeared to have the advantage on the ground due to the hard-running of Halfback Tom Splan, who turned in some outstanding runs during regulation play. Tawas, on the other hand, was at a definite weight disadvantage in a comparison of the two lines and the Braves took to the air in two key plays to win the game.

After the game ended at 0-0 in regulation time, Petoskey won the toss of the coin and had the first opportunity to break the tie from 10 yards out. Splan put the Northmen on the scoreboard by taking a pitch from the quarterback and raced into the endzone. He later turned in a two-point conversion on the same play.

The Braves lost little time in coming back to reach the scoreboard as Coach Dick Look and Quarterback Earl Parsons elected not to take any chances running against the tough Northmen line. Parsons zeroed in on Tight End Kurt Seifert with a good pass and Seifert scored without a hand touching him. The two-point conversion was scored by Mitch Lenczewski, Tawas Area's speedy halfback, and the game was tied at 8-8.

The Braves came back on the next tie-breaker to score a six-pointer. Officials detected a face mask tackle by Petoskey, which moved the ball to the five-yard line. Parsons kept the ball and ran up the middle to score. The North-

men line held on the conversion attempt and Tawas held a 14-8 lead.

The Northmen came right back to tie the game at 14-14. Halfback Mike Doctor picking up six points when he took a pitch from the quarterback and ran outside to hit paydirt. Petoskey elected to kick from placement and the hard-charging Tawas line forced a wide kick.

Tawas' defense turned in an outstanding performance in the third tie-breaker attempt by Petoskey. Quarterback Jim Kan was hit hard as he was dropped for a loss to the 25-yard line. The Northmen lost another two yards, then picked up five yards before attempting a pass on fourth down. Lenczewski turned in a great play to knock down a sure touchdown pass to end Petoskey's chances to score.

The Braves retained their momentum after stopping Petoskey and, after Lenczewski was stopped for no gain on the first play from scrimmage, Parsons again found Seifert wide open in the endzone and hit him with a game-winning touchdown pass.

Tawas' offensive unit was completely shut off by the tough Petoskey line during regulation time and the Braves' defense turned in an equally impressive performance. Leading Tawas defenders were Dave Conn with 11 tackles and Dave Gartland with 13 tackles. Turning in outstanding play on the line were Don Reed, Bob Stephenson and Harvey Herriman.

The big defensive play of the night for Tawas was by Seifert, who nailed Petoskey's quarterback for a 15-yard loss in the third overtime.

The Braves travel to Harrison Friday night for a nonconference game and then open their Northern B Conference schedule September 19 at Gladwin. The next home game will be Friday, September 26, when Tawas entertains Ogemaw Heights in the homecoming game.

Council Requests Hospital Meeting

At the request of Mrs. C. L. Braman, Tawas City Council is to write a letter to the board of trustees of Tawas Hospital requesting a public airing of current problems at the hospital.

Although stating he did not know if the city could properly delve into hospital affairs, Mayor John N. Brugger said he would be willing to meet with hospital officials.

Stating that to her knowledge no citizens' committee had been formed, Mrs. Braman felt a serious community problem resulted with the loss of two physicians and felt that the council should ask for a full explanation on behalf of the community.

She suggested that letters be sent to the hospital administrator, president of the board of trustees and chief of the medical staff requesting individual meetings with each of the three men. She suggested that a delegation be named comprised of city officials and citizens to attend the proposed meeting.

"The present situation has been created over an extended period of time . . . the snowball has been

actively rolling," said Mrs. Braman. She hoped that all concerned would be prepared with some answers in order to assure "peace and harmony in the community."

The mayor said the current situation was a community problem, but felt the full meaning or full reasons for the current hospital situation were not apparent to everyone. He felt that the two doctors had now made up their minds to leave, but believed some public airing of hospital policies may be needed. He questioned, however, if the city had any real jurisdiction in the matter as "we can't even tax the hospital."

Mrs. Braman said that letters had been sent to various departments of the state and she expressed the hope that the attorney general would conduct an investigation.

"We may be trying to tread where angels fear to tread," said Mrs. Braman, but she was of the opinion that a meeting with hospital officials would "clear up a number of rumors" which are circulating the community.

Brooks' Building Cited Under Code

A new office building at Brooks Auto Parts, Ninth Avenue, Tawas City, was ticketed Monday morning as being in violation of the city's zoning ordinance as well as being in violation of the state building code.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told the city council Monday night that he and Francis Block, director of the county building and safety inspection department, had posted the violation notices.

The scrap yard, established prior to adoption of the city's zoning ordinance, is permitted to exist in a residential area under a zoning variance, but Bublitz said the ordinance forbids enlargement of the variance. The citation from the

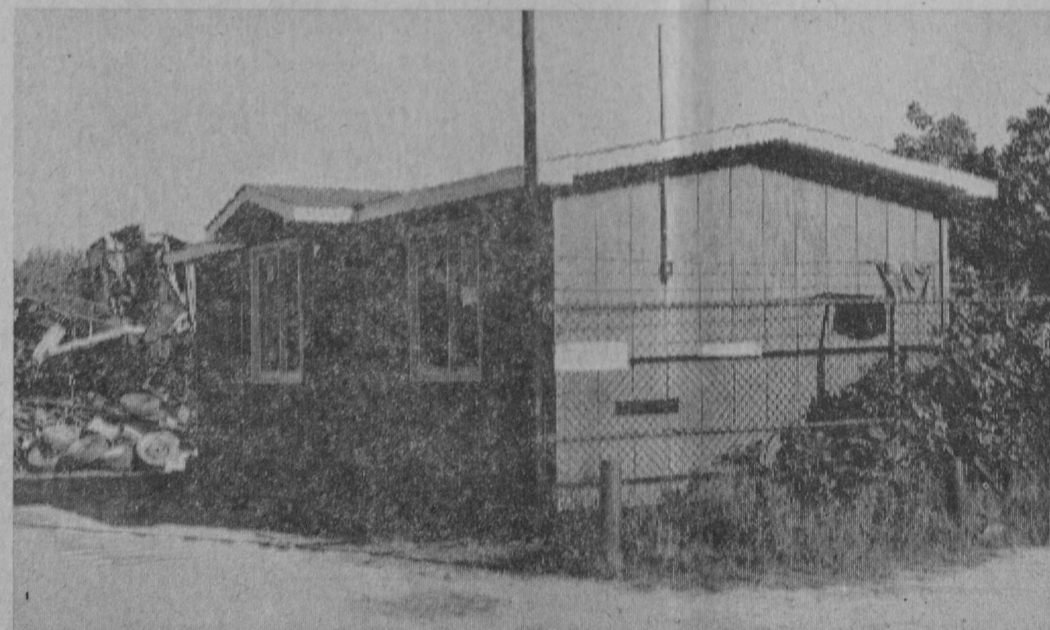
county was based on the lack of a building permit.

The city manager reported that Fred S. Brooks, owner, claims that the building is mobile and not governed by city or state regulations in that it is equipped with a steel frame, wheels and a tow bar. The wheels are not attached.

Bublitz told the council that should the building be considered mobile, it still would be in violation of a city ordinance.

He said the only recourse for the owner would be to apply for an ordinance variation with the zoning board of appeals.

The structure replaces an old bus body which formerly served as an office.

Enrollment Drop Noted at School

A slight enrollment drop was noted Monday night by Supt. Robert A. Halle in his report to Tawas Area Board of Education.

Total enrollment in the school as of Monday was 1,961, as compared to last year's fourth Friday count of 2,004.

Halle told the board of education that there may be some additional special education students enrolled before the fourth Friday, along with new students possibly moving into the area, but the total is not expected to change to any great degree due to the possible loss of some students.

Enrollment in the elementary grades total 704 pupils, there are 507 students in the middle school grades and 750 students in the high school.

As of Monday, there were 145 children enrolled in kindergarten, as compared to 121 at last year's fourth Friday count. As a result of

this increase, the board of education authorized hiring of Mrs. Sandra Wilson as a one-half time kindergarten teacher. Mrs. Wilson is the former Sandra Roach of Tawas City.

Resignation of Roger Spencer as a middle school science teacher was accepted by the board of education. Spencer, who has been a member of the Tawas Area School faculty for about 10 years, is to become the new middle school principal at Whittemore-Prescott Area School. He is to start his new position as soon as a replacement can be hired here.

A recommendation by the superintendent on salaries for administrators was adopted by the board of education. The six administrators are to receive salary increases averaging 10 percent over last year. Halle said the increase amounted to a 7 1/2 percent increase over the past two years.

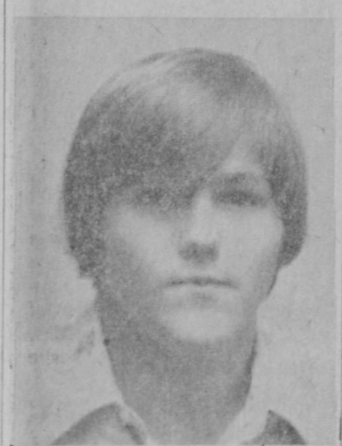

Notice is hereby given that the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, in regular session on September 3, 1975, adopted the following Animal Control Ordinance, which, subject to the approval of the Governor, will become effective November 3, 1975:

STATE OF MICHIGAN
COUNTY OF IOSCO
PROPOSED ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE NO. 75-1
ARTICLE I
PURPOSE

Deeming it advisable to provide for the orderly and uniform administration of the dog licensing provisions of the State of Michigan, and to create the position of animal control officer and to define its duties, authorities, and responsibilities and to regulate and control the conduct, keeping and care of dogs and certain other animals, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners does hereby adopt the following ordinance.

ARTICLE II
DEFINITIONS
ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER means any person employed by the county for the purpose of enforcing this ordinance, or state statutes, pertaining to dogs or other animals.

OWNER means a person, partnership or corporation, owning, keeping or harboring animals.

ARTICLE III
ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER—DUTIES, AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. The animal control officer shall be the sheriff, or one of his deputies, and his salary or fee shall be established and determined by the Board of Commissioners by appropriate resolution.

2. The animal control officer shall fulfill the following duties:
A. The animal control officer may promptly seize, take up and place in the animal control facility all dogs or other animals, livestock or poultry, found running at large or being kept or harbored any place within the county in violation of the provisions of this ordinance or the statutes of the state.
B. The animal control officer shall have the power and responsibility to issue citations or summonses to those persons owning, keeping or harboring dogs contrary to the provisions of this ordinance or the statutes of the state.
C. It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, to destroy or have destroyed in a humane manner, all impounded dogs or other animals which are not claimed and released within 7 days after being impounded; provided however, if in his judgment, said dog or other animal is valuable or otherwise desirable for keeping, the animal control officer may release said dog or other animal to any person who will undertake to remove said animal within the county in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance and the statutes of the state.
D. The bodies of all animals destroyed at the animal control facility or elsewhere in the county shall be disposed of by the animal control officer, in a manner approved by the Department of Agriculture or the Board of Commissioners.

E. The animal control officer shall be authorized to investigate complaints of cruelty to dogs or other animals.
F. The animal control officer shall be authorized to investigate complaints of dogs or other animals alleged to be dangerous to persons or property and shall have the right to seize, take up and impound such animals.
G. The animal control officer shall determine and locate all unlicensed dogs and cause them to be licensed or list the owners thereof with the county prosecutor's office for appropriate action as provided by law.
H. The animal control officer shall be responsible for the upkeep and cleanliness of the county animal control facility and equipment.

I. All fees and monies collected by the animal control officer as herein provided shall be accounted for and turned over to the county treasurer under the standard practices of the treasurer's accounting system.
J. Upon request, the animal control officer may pick up unwanted cats and dogs at the residence of the owner. The fee shall be \$5.00 per pick-up, plus a \$2.00 fee per animal for disposition (either destroyed or put up for adoption). If the owner transports the animal

ARTICLE V
CONFINEMENT
1. Any animal which bites a person shall be quarantined for ten days if ordered by the director of public health. During quarantine, the animal shall be securely confined and kept from contact with any other animal. At the discretion of the director of public health, the quarantine may be on the premises of the owner. If the director of public health requires other confinement, the owner shall surrender the animal for the quarantine to the county animal control facility or shall, at his own expense, place the animal in a veterinary hospital.

2. If the animal is confined at the county animal control facility, a \$2.00 per day board will be charged.

ARTICLE VI
ANIMAL IMPOUNDMENT
1. Immediately upon impounding any dog hereunder, it shall be the duty of the animal control officer to record the date of impounding, reason for impounding, a description of the dog impounded, and a record as to whether or not such dog has been licensed and tagged as required by this ordinance.
If the owner of impounded dog can be identified the animal control officer shall notify the owner of the violation.
If the owner cannot be identified, public notice of the impounding of such dog shall be given by posting one copy of the description of such dog and date of impounding at the animal control facility. Any such dog, not redeemed by the owner thereof within 7 days after the posting of such notice, shall be, and is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. The animal control officer may immediately thereafter dispose of the dog in a humane manner.
2. The owner or owners of any dog impounded hereunder may redeem the same by paying all the

costs, charges and penalties assessed that have accrued up to the time of making the redemption, and when the same are paid to the animal control officer, it shall be his duty to release the dog from the control facility to the owner.

3. Any animal may be destroyed immediately with written consent of owner. Fee will be \$2.00.

ARTICLE VII
ENUMERATION OF CERTAIN VIOLATIONS AND PROCEDURES
1. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog of any age, licensed or unlicensed, to permit the dog to run at large beyond the premises of the owner, unless the dog is held properly in leash. A licensed dog engaged in hunting need not be leashed when under the reasonable control of some person.

2. It shall also be unlawful for the owner of any livestock, poultry, or other animals to permit the same to run at large beyond the premises of the owner.
3. No person owning any dog shall suffer or permit such dog to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood by barking, making other loud or unusual noises, or by running through or across private or public property.

4. For a dog running loose and picked up by the animal control officer a fee of \$5.00 and boarding expenses of \$2.00 per day shall be paid by the owner to redeem their dog. The second offense shall be \$10.00 plus \$2.00 per day board. The third offense shall be \$15.00 and so on. After the fifth offense the county prosecutor may declare the dog a public nuisance and have it destroyed.

ARTICLE VIII
PENALTY
Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than ninety (90) days or be subject to a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or by both such fine and imprisonment.

ARTICLE IX
FEES AND EXPENSES
1. The fees and expenses as established by this ordinance may be changed from time to time on or before November 1 of each year and for subsequent years by action of the Board of Commissioners. All fees and expenses herein provided for shall be paid in accordance with this ordinance.
2. All other fees relating to the animal control officer shall be determined by resolution, through the Board of Commissioners. This ordinance shall take effect November 3, 1975, after submission for approval by the governor and publication thereof as required by law. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

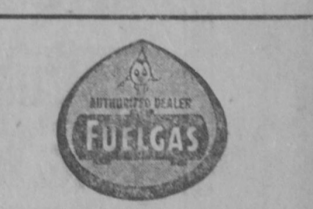

Iosco County Commission OK's Animal Control Ordinance

Preliminary draft of an animal control ordinance was adopted Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. The ordinance is to be submitted to the governor's office for approval and regulations would become effective 60 days after publication.

The ordinance creates the position of animal control officer, defines his duties, authorities and responsibilities, as well as regulating and controlling the conduct, keeping and care of dogs and other animals.

Under terms of the new ordinance, the animal control officer would remain under jurisdiction of the sheriff's department, as is the case at the present time.

Responsibilities of the animal control officer would be similar to the present operation under state law in that he would "promptly seize, take up and place in the animal control facility all dogs or other animals, livestock or poultry, found running at large or being kept or harbored any place within the county in violation of the provisions of the ordinance or the statutes of the state."

The ordinance outlines power for issuance of citations or summons to those persons violating provisions of the ordinance and statutes, gives authorization to investigate complaints of cruelty to animals or complaints of dogs alleged to be dangerous to persons or property.

The ordinance prescribes that the officer would destroy or have destroyed in a humane manner all impounded dogs or other animals which are not claimed and released within seven days after being impounded, or the animal may be released to any person who would take the animal.

Upon request, the animal control officer may pick up unwanted cats

and dogs at the residence of the owner. The fee would be \$5 per pickup, or if the owner transports the animal to the control facility, the fee would be \$2 per animal.

The ordinance prescribes that it is the responsibility of the owner to annually obtain a license for every dog. License fees for dogs six months old or over on or before March 1 of any year would be \$3 for male and unsexed dogs, \$5 for female dogs. If the license is obtained after March 1, the fee would be increased \$1.

It is unlawful for the owner of any dog, licensed or unlicensed, to permit the dog to run at large beyond the premises of the owner, unless the dog is held properly in leash. The ordinance provides that no person owning any dog "shall suffer or permit such dog to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood by barking, making other loud or unusual noises, or by running through or across private or public property."

For a dog running loose and picked up by the animal control officer, a fee of \$5 and boarding expense of \$2 per day is to be paid by the owner to redeem his dog. The fee increases with additional violations.

Former ET Pastor Died at Sandusky

The Rev. Paul E. Sutton, 61, Sandusky, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church of that community and vicar of St. Peter's by the Lake, Forester, passed away at McKenzie Memorial Hospital, Sandusky, on August 28.

He had served as rector of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, for four years.

Born at Jollytown, Pennsylvania, August 19, 1914, he attended public schools in West Virginia and graduated from West Virginia Wesleyan College in 1937 with a bachelor degree. From 1938 to 1942, he attended Boston University and received a bachelor of Sacred Theology degree in 1941, followed by a master degree in 1942.

From October 1942 to June 1955, he served Methodist churches in West Virginia. He came to the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan in 1955, serving at St. Aidan's Mission, Michigan Center, as a lay vicar. He was ordained deacon on January 14, 1956, and priest on August 4, 1956. He served as rector of Christ Church, East Tawas, from 1957 to 1961, served St. Andrews Church, Flint, for nine years and moved to Sandusky in 1970.

He and Dorothy L. Mildram of Melrose, Massachusetts, were married June 28, 1943.

A member of the Fraternal Order of Masons and Order of Eastern Star, he was a past patron of Iosco Chapter No. 71, OES, East Tawas.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Paul L. of New Jersey and Mark U. of Texas; two grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Ruth S. Nichols of St. Albans, West Virginia. He was preceded in death by a son, David L., in May 1968.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, September 2, at the Raysin Funeral Home, Davison, with the Rev. Milton Austin officiating. Cremation followed at Flint Memorial Park and the ashes were interred in Wyoming Cemetery, Melrose, Massachusetts.

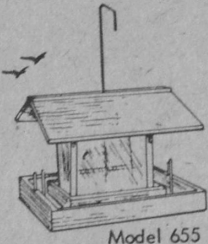

IRS Has Checks for Taxpayers Who Have Moved

Some several thousand Michigan taxpayers have undelivered refund checks waiting for them at the Internal Revenue Service.

Any taxpayer who has not yet received his refund should call or visit his local IRS office as soon as possible, R. L. Plate, district director of Internal Revenue for Michigan, said today. The dollar value of the average undelivered refund check is approximately \$450, he said.

The most common reason for an undelivered check, according to Plate, is that the taxpayer has moved and left no forwarding address with the United States Postal Service.

In cases where the taxpayer suspects his check may have been lost or stolen, Plate urged the person to get in touch with his local IRS office as soon as possible so that the IRS can put a tracer on the missing check.

Some refunds may have been delayed because of errors or omissions on tax returns. Taxpayers affected should follow the instructions received from the IRS in order to speed up issuance of their checks.

Plate stressed that in all refund inquiries to the IRS, the taxpayer should be prepared to provide the name and address as it appeared on the return, the actual name and address, if different, the social security numbers and the type of form filed.

While the IRS can re-mail an undelivered refund check within a few days to the new address, Plate

Pinter and his wife, the former JoAnn Legg, are both former residents of East Tawas.

The car represents 2½ months of family labor which included the "mechanical expertise" of their 10-year-old daughter, Jody.

The car, a Bradley GT, was nothing but pieces a year ago when the manufacturer delivered it to the Pinter garage. There was only the instruction booklet.

Only 5,000 Bradleys are on the road in the country. Almost no two Bradleys are alike because the car kit is put together individually.

Pinter, an airline pilot, had the urge to build the car once he saw the kit advertisement in a pilot's magazine. "It was either building that or a helicopter," Mrs. Pinter says. "Could you imagine building a helicopter in our garage?"

The parts along with an old VW chassis and engine cost about \$4,500 and Pinter values the car at \$5,500. He points out a production sports car still cannot be purchased for that price.

Although Mrs. Pinter had no previous mechanical experience before the project, her late father, D. L. "Tiny" Legg, operated a garage at East Tawas for many years. Her mother resides at 414 Tawas Street.

Lack of Can Lids Need Not Waste Bountiful Harvest

The bountiful harvest from gardens need not go to waste because of a shortage of jar lids for canning. According to Michigan State University horticulturists, many vegetables will keep for weeks or

quality. However, storage cannot improve the quality of the crop. In fact, some lessening of quality will occur, so select only top quality produce for storage.

For best results, harvest vegetables while they are cool, being careful not to injure them. Be sure storage areas and containers are clean to prevent the spread of disease organisms or molds.

For turnips, rutabagas, salsify, parsnips, beets and carrots, the best storage conditions are temperatures between 32 and 40 degrees Fahrenheit and relative humidity of 90-95 percent. One way to provide these conditions is to store the crops in moist sand or leaves.

A large, clean garbage can may be used alternating layers of straw and vegetables. If a cool basement is not available, bury the can, covering the top with straw and a layer of soil to keep the material inside from freezing.

Potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower and Chinese cabbage need temperatures between 32 and 40 degrees but slightly lower humidity—80 to 90 percent. The average unheated basement storage room usually provides these conditions. The strong odor of cabbage may prompt storing this vegetable outdoors, though. Potatoes must be protected from sunlight to prevent greening.

SOME CONVENIENCE FOODS DO SAVE MONEY

Do you think you are short-changing your family by serving convenience foods?

"Studies done by the United States Department of Agriculture show the cost per serving of many convenience foods is the same or less than their homemade counterparts.

For example, instant mashed potatoes, instant coffee and tea and

some of the prepared skillet main dishes cost less per serving than the homemade ones.

You can save with certain convenience foods because they cost less to produce—through expanded product lines, mass production and distribution systems and reduced waste.

High spoilage cost in distributing fresh produce raises the price at the supermarket. Seventy percent of canned and frozen vegetables cost less per serving than fresh.

Convenience items have about the same nutritional value as the homemade products. There is no

way to compare acceptability of convenience items because your family may prefer homemade soup to a particular brand of frozen dinner.

But do not feel guilty about serving convenience items to your family—nutritionally the products are good, you save time, and in some cases you save money.

Social Security Questions are Answered

Question: I rent a small apartment and I have very little income. The only things I own are my household goods and a car. Would my car make me ineligible for supplemental security income?

Answer: Under the supplemental security income program, a car is not counted if its retail value is \$1,200 or less, or if it is used for transportation to a job or to a place for regular treatment of a specific medical problem. Even if the value of your car is more than \$1,200, you may still be eligible if your total resources do not exceed \$1,500.

Question: Both my wife and I get supplemental security income payments. We are thinking of moving in with our son. If we do, will our payments be affected?

Answer: Supplemental security income payments to people who live in another household may be reduced. If you do move, you should report the change in your living arrangements to a social security office immediately. You should also report any changes in your income or resources.

Question: My brother told me that medicare's medical insurance pays for the services of suppliers. What is a supplier?

Answer: A supplier is a person or organization—other than a doctor or health care facility—that furnishes equipment or services covered by medicare medical insurance. For example, ambulance firms, independent laboratories and pharmacists and organizations that rent or sell medical equipment are considered suppliers.

Question: My mother-in-law wanted to go into a nursing facility after a recent operation because she had no one at home to take care of her. The doctor would not send her, though, because he said she did not need skilled care. What did he mean by skilled care?

Answer: Medicare can pay for a stay in a skilled nursing facility only if the patient needs daily skilled nursing care or skilled rehabilitation services. Skilled nursing care means care that can only be performed by, or under the supervision of, licensed nursing personnel. Skilled rehabilitation services are services performed by, or under the supervision of, a professional therapist. Since your mother-in-law did not need skilled care or services, medicare would not have paid for her stay in the facility.
