Congress Approves \$50,000 to Start ET Harbor Work

The City of East Tawas is in hopes that congress will approve a \$450,000 allocation next year as the federal share of expansion and improvements to the present Michigan Waterways Commission dock at the city park.

A communication from Sen. Philip A. Hart read at Monday night's meeting of the city council indicated that approval had been received on a \$50,000 appropriation to the United States Army Corps of Engineers to initiate preliminary work on the project.

Senator Hart said, however, that it was too late to approve the remainder of the federal government's one-half million-dollar share in the current year's budget.

A meeting is to be held this morning (Wednesday) with representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources concerning development of parking and shore facilities at the expanded harbor facility.

In other business Monday night, Paul Roper, superintendent of public works, reported that construction was to have started Tuesday on repairs at the sewer pumping station near the city garage.

Investigation disclosed that a sewer main had ruptured at a depth of 18 feet. The main is being repaired and a new manhole is to be constructed.

Vernon Eckstein appeared before the council and reported on a sidewalk construction program which is being presented for property owner participation. Similar to a program in Tawas City, federal CETA funds are being used to construct new sidewalks. He said that two property owners had applied for participation.

The council accepted a recommendation from the Michigan Department of State Highways to increase the speed limit from 30 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour from the Newman Street traffic light east on US-23.

The council's land and building committee is investigating a plan proposed to improve parking on city property formerly known as the A and P parking lot.

TC Council OK's Parking Study for Cost Estimate

A preliminary study to obtain an estimated cost on development of a parking lot and improvements to Court Street west of First Street was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

According to the council's resolution, cost of the study is not to exceed \$300.

Under study for several months, the city planning commission had recommended August 20 that a plan be prepared to determine an estimated cost of the project in order for the city council, a proposed special assessment district and possibly the county to determine if it would be feasible to proceed with the project.

The council has obtained options to purchase property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bergeron and Mr. and Mrs. George A. Prescott located adjacent to the county jail.

As part of the development, it is proposed that the city obtain property on the bay side of Lake Street on which the Isosco Abstract Office, Tri-County Agency, Incorporated, and former law office of Herbert Hertzler is presently located.

This property is located adjacent to the city park and would be used for future expansion of parking for that facility. Property to the rear of those buildings and facing on the bay was acquired for park expansion a number of years ago through a cooperative arrangement with the state. The city has filed an application with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to determine if a similar plan could be developed for this acquisition.

Should the plan be acceptable, the city would purchase the Bergeron and Prescott property. An exchange would then be made whereby the city would acquire the Isosco Abstract Office property owned by Carl and Brent Babcock and a new two-story office building would be constructed on the Prescott property by the Babcocks.

A parking lot would be developed by the Babcocks at the rear of their proposed new building, while a 34-car parking lot would be developed on the Bergeron property by the city and a proposed special assessment district.

In addition, Court Street which presently stops at the rear of the county building, would be extended to the proposed new parking lot on the Bergeron property. This would provide an auxiliary route to parallel Lake Street (US-23) and would improve travel from First Street to the rear of the county building.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Monday night that he had contacted the city's engineering consultant to determine work necessary for improvements to Court Street. He said that preliminary engineering had been obtained last year on a storm drain to serve that area.

Bublitz said that the street improvement would probably include curb and gutter on the south side of Court Street starting at First Street and a blacktop surface. The street would be slightly sloped away from the railroad tracks and a storm drain to the river would be required under the tracks.

Ann Arbor Paddlers Won Canoe Race in 'Photo Finish'

A pair of veteran Ann Arbor paddlers won trophies and top prize money in Sunday's 22nd annual Tawas River Canoe Race, but were hard pressed all the way by a young Hale canoe team for the most exciting finish in the race's history.

John Baker and John Swartz bested a 13-team field in a winning time of 59 minutes, five seconds and were only one second ahead of Brian and Steve Krantz at the Ninth Avenue finish line.

The Krantz brothers won the pole position in Saturday's preliminary race, but had to be satisfied with a second place finish. The duo has finished third in most races conducted this year in the Michigan Canoe Racing Association's circuit.

The first two teams were neck and neck until reaching the First Street bridge, where Baker and Swartz moved ahead by about a canoe length. The two canoes held that position over the remainder of the course before the last 100 yards at the finish line when the Hale team closed the gap.

Others sharing in the \$500 prize money were Robert Welsch of Southgate and Jay Stephan of Grayling, third place; David Weiss and Butch Stockton, both of Grayling, fourth place; Carl Raymond and Dan Powell of Grand Ledge,

fifth place; Rick Nesley of Roseville and Jack Kolka of Pinconning, sixth place; Burrell Kolonich and Ken Kolonich of Eaton Rapids, seventh place; Dan Jordan and Richard Smith of Grant, eighth place; Carl Joy and Rick Joy of Fostoria, ninth place; Claude Pangborn and Richard Raymond of Lansing, 10th place.

Winning the men's amateur division, which had 11 starters, was the team of John Nemeth of Grand Blanc and Robert Cherba of Linden, who finished the course in one hour, four minutes and 22 seconds.

The next five places included Kenneth Brown and Terry Jackman, St. Clair Shores, second place; Bruce Foss and Ken Foss of Holly,

third place; Clair Moore and Tim Bouchard, Alpena, fourth place; Larry Hoffman and Howard Belknap, St. Clair Shores, fifth place.

Only two teams entered the professional women's division and the race was won by Fran Jones and Sharon Thompson of the Tawas.

Vince Beam and Paul Pfeiffer of Tawas City won the senior division race Saturday afternoon.

Rain hampered racing Saturday afternoon, but an excellent crowd of spectators was on hand for Sunday's program.

One-third of the entry fees paid for the race was donated to the Bright Horizons Learning Center and proceeds from several concessions at the finish line went to Isosco Intermediate School District to assist with the center's operation.

General race chairman was Michael Reed of Tawas City, who will again be in charge of power boat racing this week during the second half of Tawas Boat Race Week.

The course for power boat races Saturday and Sunday will parallel US-23 in Tawas Bay. Racing is to be moved to the bite of Tawas Bay should rough water prevent use of this course.

Boats from Lorain, Ohio, Outboard Racing Association will conduct six to eight races for family and sprint class boats.

There is to be a special race for open class boats to benefit the Bright Horizons Learning Center.

An 18-year-old airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base and his 17-year-old companion received fatal injuries shortly before midnight Monday when their motorcycle was struck by a car on River Road west of Oscoda.

Pronounced dead at Tawas Hospital were Warren Elderkin and

his passenger, Locky Pfifer, 17, of Sikeston, Missouri.

The two young people were the county's eighth and ninth traffic fatalities of the year.

Investigating officers of the Oscoda-AuSable Township Police Department identified the driver of the automobile as David White, 18,

also an airman stationed at Wurtsmith. He was not injured.

Police said the two vehicles were eastbound on River Road. The two vehicles became locked together and traveled 570 feet down the road. The two victims were thrown off the motorcycle about 360 feet from the point of the collision.

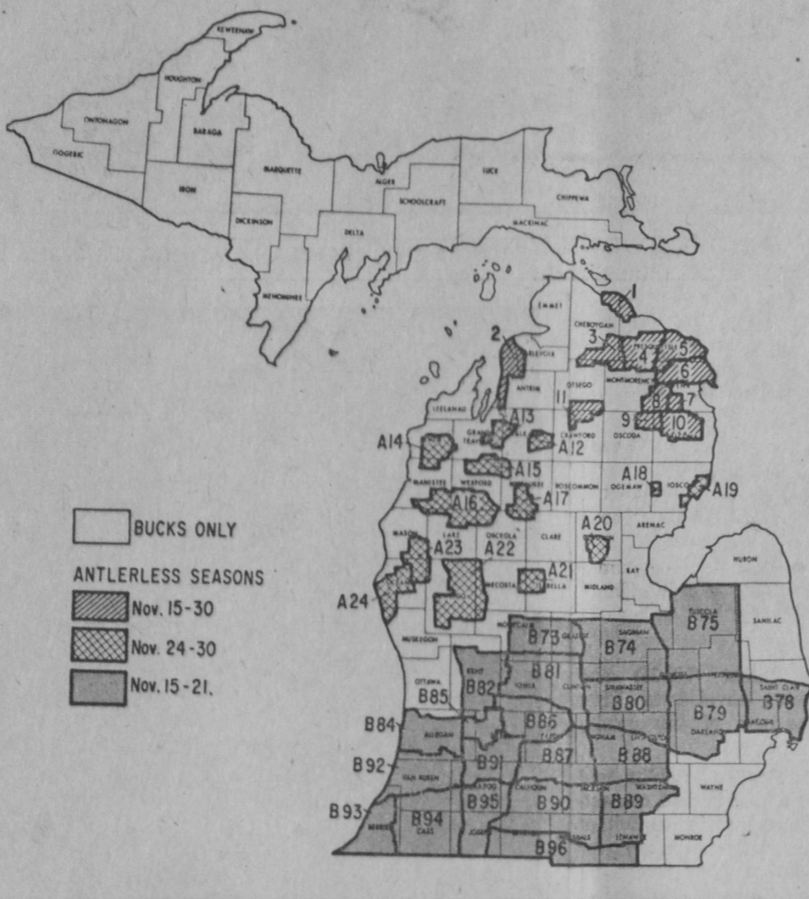

Deer Hunting Format for '75



BUCKS ONLY
ANTLERLESS SEASONS
Nov. 15-30
Nov. 24-30
Nov. 15-21

During Michigan's 1975 deer hunting season November 15-30, there will be, in effect, three different antlerless hunting periods. The collective take of antlerless deer in all areas is expected to be 11,365 with bucks-only hunting in the Upper Peninsula. Of 61,910 permits to be issued, the Department of Natural Resources predicts 49,290 hunters will go after antlerless deer in the various management areas. Hunters are reminded that midnight, October 1, is the deadline to postmark applications for permits to hunt antlerless deer in these areas. Sportsmen will receive application forms at local license dealers when they buy their 1975 firearm deer license. Instructions for filling out these forms are also available at local license dealers.

Economy Down but Government Still Growing

Government is the only major sector of the economy that has shown growth over the past year, according to some observations this week by State Rep. George Prescott of Tawas City in a news letter mailed to his constituents in the 105th District.

In late spring of this year, persons on government payrolls in Michigan reached a figure of 573,000 and their votes represented about 40 percent of the total cast in the last election.

More than 900,000 Michigan residents now receive some kind of state welfare check. Their votes in the last election were just as substantial as the first group and both represent about one-half of the total

vote in Michigan's general election. "Do they vote their consciences or their own self interests?" asks Prescott.

The recent shift of power from the executive to the legislative branch of government came with terrible swiftness, triggered undoubtedly by Watergate, said Prescott. "Now there is a new set of young legislators determined to dominate both foreign and domestic policy at state and federal levels."

"Who, then, is left to summon public power to contest legislators backed by the huge and terrifying bureaucracy they now feed—the voters?"

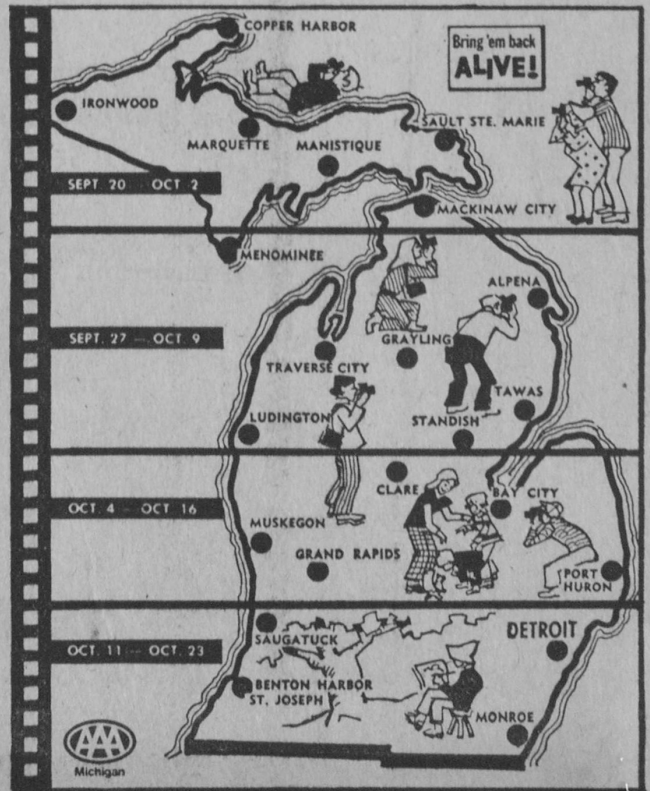

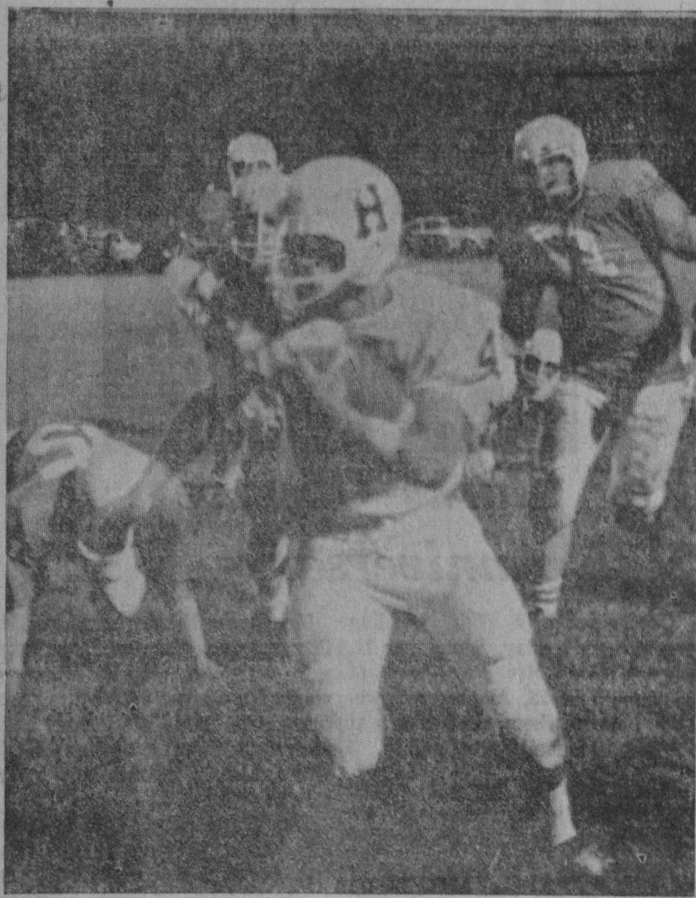

Tawas rang up 11 first downs during the night, three by passing, and had 266 yards rushing. Parsons completed five out of eight

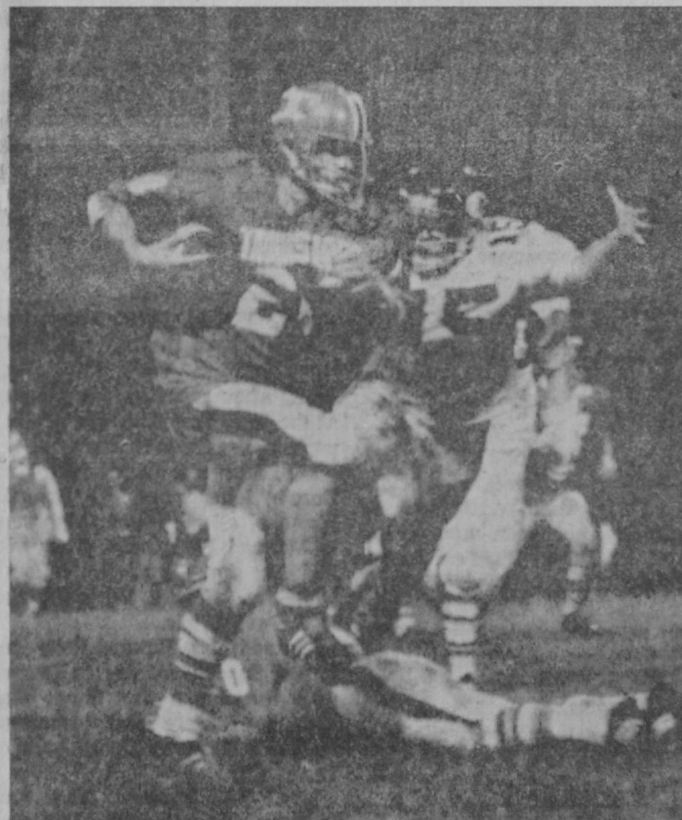
passes and had three interceptions.

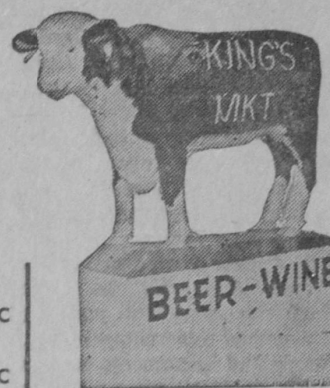

'Super' Trucks on Michigan Highways are Being Opposed

Automobile Club of Michigan labeled the test driving of twin-trailer trucks one-third the length of a football field on state roads a traffic safety hazard that is a threat to motorists.

"We have long opposed oversized trucks traveling our highways because it takes longer to pass them, they are allowed to carry heavier loads and the units may have trouble maintaining freeway speeds on inclines," Richard R. Dann, Auto Club executive vice president, stated.

"Our opposition has been based primarily on the running of 65-foot-long trucks, but the state legislature experimentally is permitting 100-foot, twin-trailer trucks on our highways," he pointed out.

Dann was referring to House Concurrent Resolution No. 78 which permits five Michigan truck transport firms to use two 40-foot trailers plus cab to haul freight on a two-year experimental basis.

The resolution, which has gone largely unpublicized, is an extension of an earlier one which gives the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation permission to issue special permits for these trucks to travel the state's limited access highways.

"It is inconceivable that Michigan would allow trucks 35 feet longer than twin-trailers now permitted to travel our highways," Dann said. "Not only are these trucks a threat to the well-being of the state's six million motorists, but with the extra weight permitted, they hasten the deterioration of our roads and bridges."

DNR Returns Tax Statement to City; Asks for 'Correction'

Are property taxes paid on recreational lands an actual assessment to be included on the tax rolls, or is the state's payment in lieu of taxes and not an actual tax assessment?

This is a knotty question which Tawas City officials are now investigating.

Mrs. Mary Byrd, city treasurer, reported to the city council Monday night that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources has returned a tax statement to her with a note attached stating that state property on Tawas River at the south end of First Avenue was over assessed.

According to verbal information from the county tax equalization department, the state tax commission had reduced the state equalized valuation on the state's three lots from \$3,836 to \$2,891. As a result, the DNR said its summer tax statement was too high and desired a correction lowering the taxes from \$54.05 to \$40.73.

Mrs. Byrd said she had no authority to change a tax statement.

The city probably will be required to assume the \$13.32 loss on the new tax statement, although the board of review can correct the tax rolls in December before the winter tax is mailed. If this action is not taken, the city would be required to make up the difference during tax settlement time in March with the county treasurer.

The state purchased 180 feet of frontage on the river a number of years ago as the location for a salmon weir. Mrs. Byrd said that the DNR had never complained of being over assessed in past years.

An investigation of city records Monday night indicated that the state equalized valuation on that property had been lowered last year from \$4,222 to the present SEV of \$3,836. It was stated that no complaints on the assessment had been heard during the 1975 board of review.

The city treasurer is to investigate further and report at the next council meeting.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized payment of \$225 as the city's share for providing a senior citizens' center located at the American Legion Hall.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that the department of public works was having considerable problems with vandalism on its Harris Avenue sewer project and sidewalk construction projects. He said that safety flare pots had been stolen from the sewer construction site and barricades had been damaged.

Iosco Happy With CETA Employment Opportunities

After six months of operation, Iosco County officials have nothing but praise for the CETA programs that have been so successful during the past six months. Over 75 persons have participated in the programs administered by Region 7-B, Manpower Consortium.

"We think these programs have been very helpful, but not without problems," said Donald Griffin, chairman of the finance and personnel committees on the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. "There have been problems, but nothing serious, and it has certainly helped our economy as well as providing employment for many of our citizens who might otherwise have been unemployed," he pointed out.

Funds for the programs, Title II and VI, totaled \$245,820 during the past six months, a sizeable sum which added to the local economy and provided needed employment opportunities.

Three persons were placed with the county equalization department and all have since been certified as level one assessors, Griffin points out. Six were placed with the county road commission, nine with the department of natural resources, 10 with the TRIO Council for Aging, plus utility workers in various townships during past six months.

Of the nine employees placed with the DNR, seven were assigned to Tawas Point State Park, one of the most popular facilities in the state. "It is the best federal program we have ever had," said Michael McLavy, assistant manager. "We have been able to complete a lot of projects that otherwise would not have been done until next year and we have had a lot of compliments on conditions at the park," he said.

CETA employees at the park were utilized as patrolmen, office and contact station personnel, park maintenance and repaving and improving nature trails. "They were all good workers and we were really pleased with the program," McLavy said. One of the participants was retained as a ranger.

The TRIO Council for Aging, which includes Roscommon, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties, was given 10 slots. Four were used as transportation drivers, one cook in Os-

coda, three kitchen aides at Oscoda and East Tawas, a center manager at Hale and one outreach worker. Another employee, who handles bulk buying and distribution of produce, was provided by Ogemaw County.

"The latter employee and the outreach worker were most valuable people," declared Beverly Fister, secretary-bookkeeper, and Doris Crowe, vice chairman of the TRIO Board of Directors. Leah Hicks is the senior citizen director of the council.

Charles Smith, Oscoda Township supervisor, indicated they like the program and had no complaints.

"The CETA programs have helped us out materially and financially. They have taken up the slack, started and finished jobs that otherwise might not have been done. We prefer programs like CETA be-

cause they provide labor rather than actual funds," Smith added.

Iosco County is looking forward to over \$219,000 in Title II and Title VI funds and programs for the coming fiscal year, with plans to employ over 40 persons during the 12-month period.

Region 7-B, Manpower Consortium serves nine counties, Arenac, Clare, Gladwin, Gratiot, Isabella, Midland, Ogemaw and Roscommon. Its administrative board is comprised of a representative from each of the nine counties while an executive director heads the office at Mid-Michigan Community College. The consortium directs and administers federal funds provided by the Comprehensive Employment Training Act of 1973. It functions with the cooperation of the Bureau of Manpower, Michigan Department of Labor.

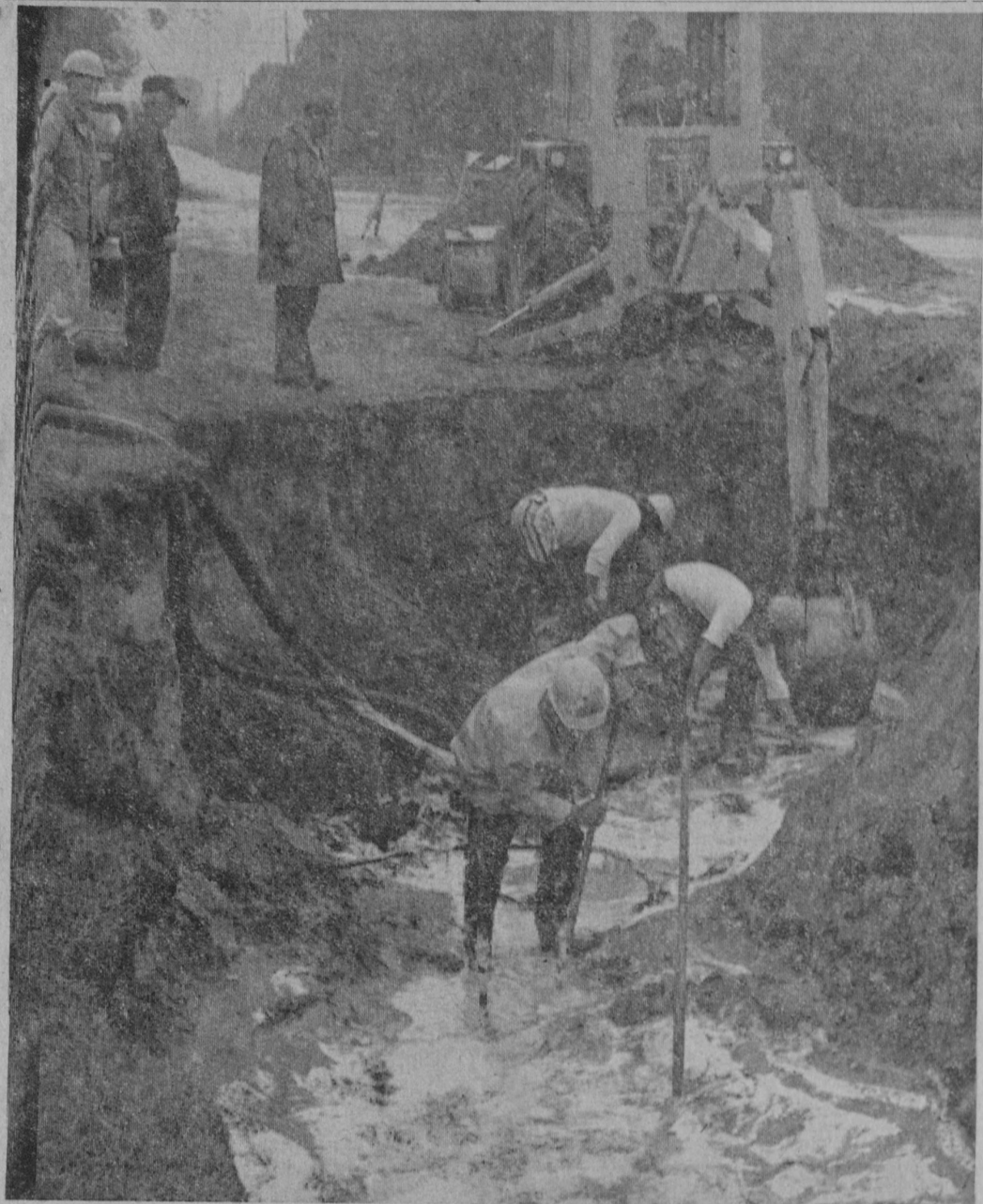

'The Guns of Autumn' TV Show Under Fire from Cong. Ruppe

In a sharply worded letter, Cong. Philip E. Ruppe criticized CBS Television for not giving a "balanced view of hunters and sportsmen" during its recent special, "The Guns of Autumn."

"Frankly, the scenes which were shown came as something of a surprise to me, as they were a distortion of the hunting life I have known as a resident of Northern Michigan," Ruppe said. "I do not believe that the 20 million hunters and sportsmen in America will accept this program as anything except an unrealistic portrayal of a sport and way of life that is as old as mankind."

The opening scene of the program focused for several minutes on the hunting of bears in the Copper Harbor garbage dump during the opening day of hunting season. In his letter to CBS, the Houghton lawmaker commented, "Had there been a sincere interest in providing a balanced view of the sport and a realistic portrayal of hunting in Northern Michigan, your cameras would have recorded hundreds of fathers and sons or groups of friends spending long hours walking through the woods in search of the game which inhabit the area."

Ruppe further stated, "In conclusion, I can only emphasize that your program, with only few exceptions presented a false image of hunting as it is known by most sportsmen. I can only compare it to a special on basketball which would only show the errors committed during the course of a game. Even though these errors would have occurred, the program would hardly be an illustration of what the game of basketball is all about."

Iosco County Board of Commissioners' Proceedings

AUGUST SESSION

August 20, 1975

Pursuant to published schedule, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:45 a. m. by Chairman Foster and the roll called.

Present: Foster (District 1), Griffin (District 2), Burdett (District 3) and Wereley (District 5)

Absent: Fox (District 4)

The communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

A brief recess was ordered by the chairman at 10:15 a. m.

Upon call to order at 10:35 a. m., Mr. Glenn Mask, of GEM Surveys, Inc., appeared before the board to present a proposal for a county-wide re-appraisal of property valuations, indicating that they could, in the process, train a person selected locally by the board, for the position of equalization director, thus obviating the necessity of having to pay a higher salary to obtain a trained assessor from outside the area; further indicating that they are starting equalization assessors schools to encourage better appraisers throughout the state. Continuing, he explained the details of the proposed re-appraisal, estimating the cost at approximately \$200,000. In the ensuing discussion and questions by board members and others, Commissioner Griffin posed the question of: Why should the county spend a quarter of a million dollars for a new appraisal if everything will deteriorate like it did after the 1966 survey? Whereupon Mr. Mask replied, that it's the board's responsibility to equalize the county and that things deteriorated because the records were not maintained properly and appraisals kept current by an active equalization department.

In further discussion, Mask indicated his willingness to meet with the local taxing units and the Township Association, whereupon it was proposed that a meeting be arranged to hear the opinions of, and get input from local unit assessors regarding a re-appraisal of the county.

A brief recess was ordered by the chairman at 11:30 a. m.

Upon call to order at 11:35 a. m., Mr. Harry Bacon, of Edmands Engineering, and Attorney Kenneth Myles appeared before the board in reference to the grant being sought for the proposed new water supply system for Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township. Mr. Myles addressed the board, explaining the procedure to be followed and requesting that the board adopt a proposed bond resolution. Mr. Bacon added his comments with respect to advance field work before winter, whereupon it was indicated that action on the proposed resolution would be deferred until later in the day.

Commissioner Foster addressed the board briefly in reference to a request by Circuit Judge Allan Miller for consideration and study of the possibility of establishing a juvenile detention facility in the area to perhaps serve several counties, advising that he was informed by the office of criminal justice programs that planning funds may be available, and proposing that the matter be explored in conjunction with one or more adjacent counties.

The board recessed for lunch at 11:50 a. m. on order of the chairman, to stand in recess until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., the roll was called, all commissioners except Mr. Fox being present.

Committees were thereupon ordered to their respective duties, the board to stand in recess subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 2:25 p. m., Commissioner Burdett presented Miss Karen Tripp, of East Tawas, with a plaque from the county board of commissioners on behalf of the citizens of Iosco County in recognition of her heroic life saving feat performed in rescuing a swimmer in Tawas Bay on July 19, 1975.

The board recessed for committee work at 2:30 p. m. on order of the chairman.

Upon call to order at 3:05 p. m., Commissioner Wereley presented and moved adoption of the following resolutions:

Whereas, the Cities of East Tawas, Tawas City and the Township of Baldwin all situated in Iosco County, Michigan (hereinafter referred to as "Local Units"), have presented to the Iosco County Department of Public Works a request that the County of Iosco, through the Iosco County Department of Public Works, issue bonds, to be payable primarily from contractual payments to be made by said local units to the County of Iosco through said Department of Public Works, to finance the cost of necessary water supply improvements for said local units; and

Whereas, the Iosco County Board of Public Works has reviewed said request and the financial and engineering aspects of the proposed project and has determined the same to be within the scope of the authority of said County and Department of Public Works, to be feasible if under taken through said county agencies but not feasible or practical if undertaken by the Local Units alone, and to be necessary for the public health, safety and welfare specifically of the said Local Units and their inhabitants and generally of the County; and

Whereas, the Iosco County Department of Public Works has recommended to this board that the project be given tentative approval and that the Board of Public Works be authorized to undertake initial steps toward the financing and construction of the project, subject, however, to certain conditions.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that:

1. This board does hereby give its initial and tentative approval to the aforesaid project and does authorize the Iosco County Board of Public Works to undertake the financing and construction of the project, subject, however, to final approval of this Board of Commissioners upon submission to this board of the documents evidencing agreement between the Local Units of and the Iosco County Department of Public Works, acting for and on behalf of the County of Iosco, for the acquisition, construction, financing and operation of the project.

2. The Iosco County Department of Public Works is hereby authorized to employ the following as consultants in connection with the aforesaid project:

As bond attorneys: Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, Detroit, Michigan

3. The Iosco County Department of Public Works shall contract for the necessary engineering services to draw plans for the project and shall enter into negotiations with the local units for the execution of a contract covering the acquisition, construction, financing and operation of the project by the Iosco County Department of Public Works for and on behalf of the County of Iosco.

4. The Local Units shall undertake to provide by contract for the payment of all costs of retiring the necessary financing, presently estimated to be \$1,900,000.00, and shall further reimburse the Iosco County Department of Public Works for all expenses incurred in connection with the project should the financing and construction of the project not be completed for any reason whatsoever.

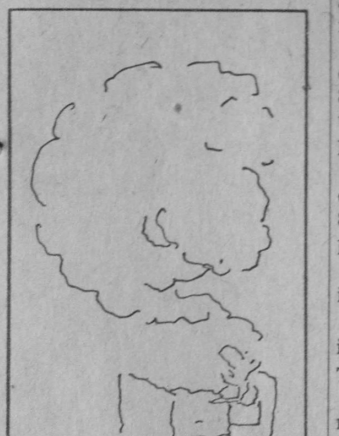

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Direct SS Deposit Has Advantages

Question: The people at the savings and loan association I deal with told me that I can have my supplemental security income check deposited directly into my account if I want to. How would that help me?
 Answer: Direct deposit of your check has several advantages. Even if you are away from home, your check would be deposited instead of sitting in your mailbox. You would not have any problem in cashing your check because it will go directly into your account. You would not have to stand in line to cash or deposit your check. And you would not have to worry about losing your check after you receive it.
 Question: I have heard that I can have my social security check

deposited directly into my bank account. Is there a special form I have to fill out to arrange for direct deposit of my check?
 Answer: You can get a direct deposit authorization form from your financial organization.
 Question: My son gave me \$50 for my birthday. I have decided to put the money in my savings account, rather than spend it. Is this \$50 considered income under supplemental security income?
 Answer: No, not if you save it. Under the law, money you save (accrued income) is considered a resource and it would not affect your payments as long as your total resources do not exceed \$1,500. If you do not save the \$50, it would be considered unearned irregular income. You can have up to \$60 of unearned irregular income in a calendar quarter without affecting your supplemental security income checks.
 Question: I get social security student benefits and I am transferring from the school I have been attending to a college out of state. Do I have to report this change to social security? I will be attending school full time.
 Answer: Yes, you do have to report the transfer. The type of institution you attend can affect your monthly payments. You should also notify social security if

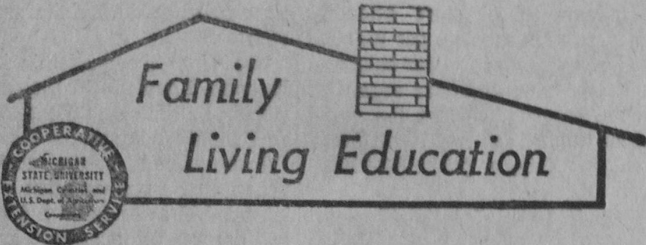

QUESTIONS ABOUT FREEZING

If you cannot find lids to can tomatoes, can you freeze them? That is one of the most often asked questions these days, and the answer is yes and no.

Whole, fresh tomatoes do not freeze well at all, for the temperatures of home freezers rupture the watery cells of tomatoes and turn them into "tomato smush" when they thaw. But cooked tomatoes or tomato juice freeze well, if freezer space is available.

To freeze cooked tomatoes, simply wash, remove stem ends, peel and quarter ripe tomatoes into a saucepan. Cover and cook the tomatoes until tender, about 10 to 20 minutes. Place the pan containing tomatoes in cold water to cool. Pack cooled tomatoes into freezer containers, leaving about one inch headspace. Cover and freeze.

To freeze tomato juice, wash, sort and peel the tomatoes. Cut them into quarters or eighths before simmering five to 10 minutes. Press the cooked tomatoes through a sieve to obtain the juice. Season with one teaspoon salt per quart of juice, if desired. Pour into containers, leaving one inch headspace, cover and freeze.

No matter whether canning or freezing tomatoes, use good quality ones. They should be mature but not overripe. Use ones that are plump, smooth and free of blemishes. Do not ruin the whole batch because of an unwise decision to use one tomato with a bad spot. It is impossible to be certain that all the spot was cut out and may later result in spoilage. Play it safe.

Another freezer question these

days is whether or not to freeze cold cuts? Yes, freezing unopened vacuum packages of cold cuts for up to a month, if the package has not been broken, is possible. The high salt content of cold cuts, however, makes a low freezing temperature necessary (zero degrees or below). The high moisture content of many cold cuts may cause undesirable changes in the texture of the meat after freezing, however. With many specials on cold cuts these days, it is perfectly alright to buy a few packages in anticipation of school lunches and the many sandwiches soon to be fixed. Remember though to use cold cuts within one month.

State Senator Suggests LH Salmon Derby

State Sen. A. J. DeGrow of the 28th District has suggested to Eastern Michigan communities bordering Lake Huron to promote a salmon derby similar to the one conducted by 13 communities along Lake Michigan.

Fisheries' experts of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources rate Lake Huron as the greatest fishing habitat of the Great Lakes. But, states DeGrow, "a terrible injustice is now being done to Lake Huron—there are too many fish and not enough fishermen."

As hard as it is to believe, Senator DeGrow can foresee in the near future the DNR drastically cutting back fish plantings if more sportsmen do not take advantage of this tremendous fishing opportunity.

He believes that Western Michigan communities are on the right track regarding promotion of the Lake Michigan fishery. "However, I fail to see how it can be a true Michigan salmon derby without full representation from our east coast."

Senator DeGrow said he would welcome any thoughts or suggestions on promoting salmon and trout fishing in Lake Huron. His address is Sen. Alvin J. DeGrow, Post Office Box 240, Lansing, Michigan 48902.

Standish Bank Buys Assets of AuGres Bank

An agreement to sell the assets of the AuGres State Bank to the Standish Bank of Standish has been approved by the boards of directors of the two financial institutions.

Officers of the two banks executed the agreement September 5. Announcement of the sale was made jointly by John Sivier, president of the Standish Bank of Standish and Irvin Reichle, president of the AuGres State Bank.

Under the agreement, the Standish institution would take over all the deposit, loan and investment accounts of the AuGres State Bank.

The agreement is subject to approval by the stockholders of both institutions, plus state and federal regulatory agencies.

Management and operating personnel at the AuGres State Bank would be retained following the anticipated approval of the sale of the bank to the Standish firm. Officers said they were hopeful the sale could be completed by December 31.
