equalization director for this county. The appointment is to be effective September 29.

Beginning salary of the new director is to be \$12,500 for the remainder of 1975. Effective January 1, the salary is to be increased to \$13,700 and, effective July 1, 1976, the salary is to be advanced to \$14,200.

Applications from only two persons were received for this position, according to the board of commissioners' personnel committee. Application from the second person asked to be paid a salary in excess of the county offer.

Rose is to replace Robin D. Al-lain, who resigned last summer after moving to Indiana.

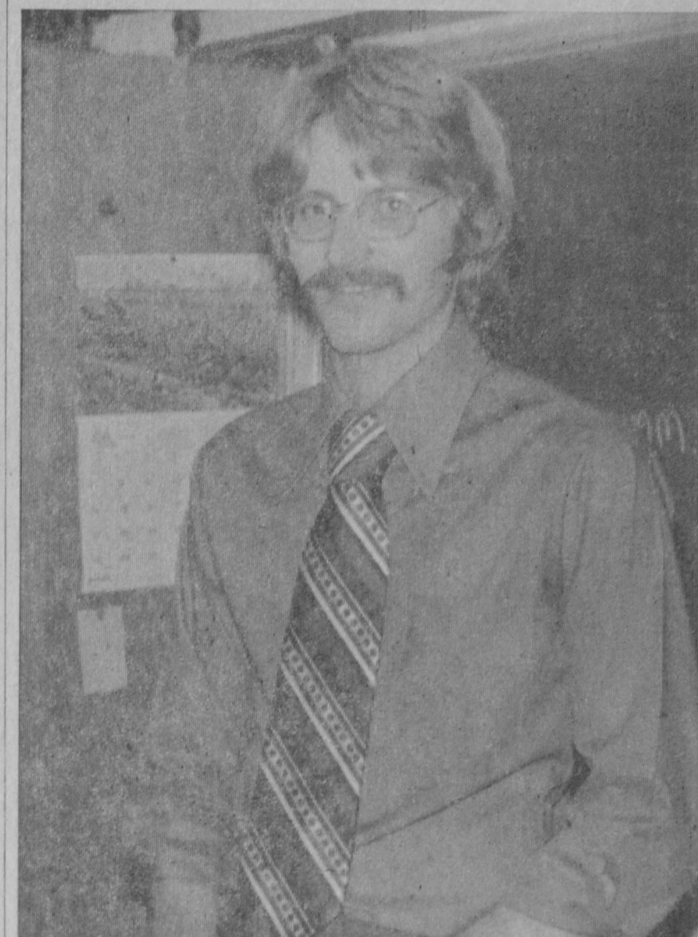
In other business conducted at Wednesday's session, the county board of commissioners authorized the building and safety inspection department to advertise for a secretary for that office.

Robert Hummel, an attorney, was engaged to represent Iosco County in future work related to the AuGres watershed and the county's involvement with Arenac and Ogemaw Counties in the three-county drain.

Authorization was given to the friend of the court to hire part time help as an emergency measure to meet state reporting requirements. A secretary would be hired for 28 hours of work.

Sgt. Kenneth Rynard of the Michigan State Police, civilian defense coordinator for 14 counties, explained a new federal emergency preparedness program for natural disasters. In order to participate, the county must appoint a civilian defense director, adopt a county emergency plan and update its ordinance pertaining to civilian defense.

The county board of commissioners has been notified that Plainfield Township's appeal of county equalization is to be held October 21 before the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

Veteran Iosco Attorney Died September 16

Funeral services for Herbert S. Hertzler, 74, a practicing attorney in Iosco and Alcona Counties for 42 years and recently in the process of retiring, were held Friday, September 19, at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas. The Rev. Alfred Saulsbury officiated and burial was in Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas. Tawas Masonic Lodge No. 274 conducted graveside rites.

Mr. Hertzler died Tuesday, September 16, at Munson Medical Center, Traverse City, following surgery.

Born at Smithville, Ohio, in 1901, he moved to Glennie in 1909 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Hertzler.

After attending schools in Alcona County, Hertzler graduated from Ferris Institute in 1925. He was a teacher at Glennie, Mikado and the old Bailey log school before attending Eastern Michigan University. He was later a grade school principal at Leadville, Colorado.

He graduated from the Detroit College of Law in 1932, later receiving the doctor of jurisprudence degree.

After serving two terms as prosecuting attorney of Alcona County, Hertzler was drafted by Iosco Republicans as the 1943 candidate for Iosco County prosecuting attorney. He won that election and served until 1948 before returning to private practice.

He was appointed by the state attorney general to assist Circuit Judge Herman Dehne's one-man grand jury investigation in Macomb County.

His activities in civic, social and professional circles included past president of the 23rd Judicial Circuit Bar Association, past president of the East Tawas Men's Club, charter member of Tawas Community Chorus, Tawas Kiwanis Club and Harrisville Lions Club.

A 32nd degree Mason, he was a member of Tawas Masonic Lodge No. 274; noble of Elf Kurafeh Shrine, Saginaw; member, Scottish Rites, Bay City; past noble grand of International Order of Odd Fellows, Harrisville.

He was a member of Tawas Golf Association, Tawas Bay Yacht Club, Tawas Kiwanis bowling team, Tawas Bay Artists, Christ Episcopal Church, state and national bar associations. He was an avid sportsman and traveler.

He was married in 1933 to the former Helen M. Griffith at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

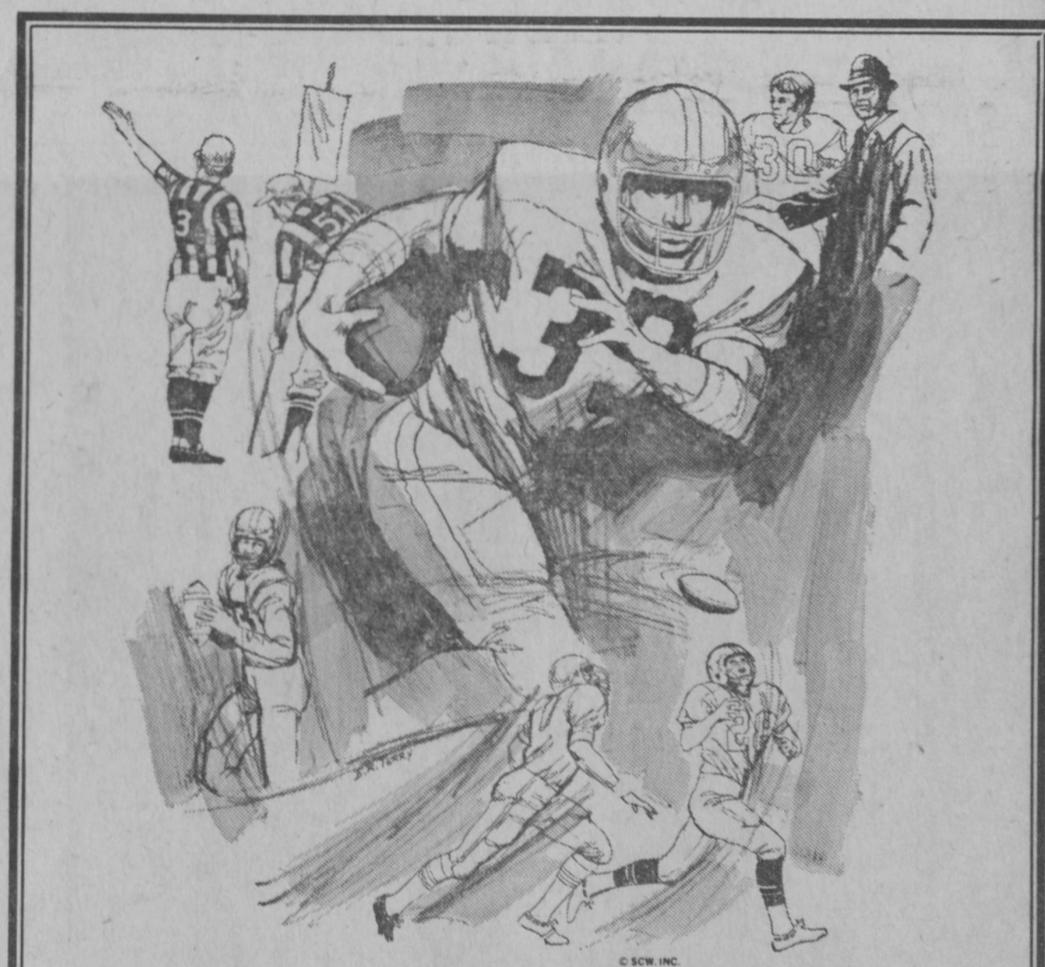

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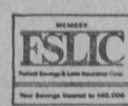

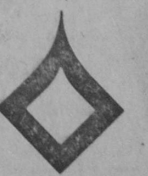

FRAGILE—HANDLE WITH CARE

Defects in babies, now blamed on birth injuries or birth defects, may be due to rough handling the baby receives during the first weeks or months of life.

Picking up babies roughly and swinging or jerking them, causing their heads to make whiplash movements occur commonly in all levels of society, in a wide variety of motives, according to Dr. John Casey, radiologist, University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine.

An infant's head should be handled as little as possible. The relative heaviness of the baby's head, weak neck muscles and immaturity make it especially vulnerable to whiplash injuries.

A baby should not be shaken or jolted. Never toss baby up in the air for fun. Do not bounce baby up and down on your knee or ride in a grocery basket without supporting his head.

A baby's head can be supported by placing a hand behind his head, neck and shoulders, or by laying the baby in the crook of your arm.

Knowledge that the baby no longer needs to have his head supported is evident when he begins to be able to roll over and pick up his head to look around. Even then, be careful not to jerk or shake him as permanent brain damage and mental retardation could be the result.

Babies need gentle loving care.

Widowed Father May be Eligible for SS Benefits

Question: My nephews have been getting social security benefits since my sister-in-law died about a year ago. According to an article, I recently read, the supreme court has ruled that widowed fathers can get social security payments. Does this mean that my brother is eligible for monthly checks on his late wife's work record?

Answer: He may be. Under a supreme court decision made in March 1975, monthly benefits can be paid to a father if he: Is the widower of a woman who died while insured under social security; has not remarried; has in his care any unmarried child under 18 (or older if disabled before 22) who is entitled to benefits. Your brother can apply for father's benefits at any social security office.

Question: My wife and I just learned that our 15-year-old son has kidney disease and needs dialysis treatments. I have heard that people with kidney disease can get Medicare. If this is true, would my son be eligible?

Answer: He might be. If you or your wife have worked long enough under social security or the railroad retirement system, or if either of you is entitled to monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits, your son could be eligible for Medicare. However, under the kidney disease provision of the law, only the person with kidney disease is eligible; the rest of the family is not. For more information, call any social security office.

Question: A friend of mine told me that I can have my monthly

supplemental security income check deposited directly in a bank instead of sent to my home. Does it have to be a bank?

Answer: No. People who get monthly supplemental security income or social security checks can have them deposited directly into an account in a bank, a savings bank, a savings and loan association or similar institution, or a federal or state chartered credit union.

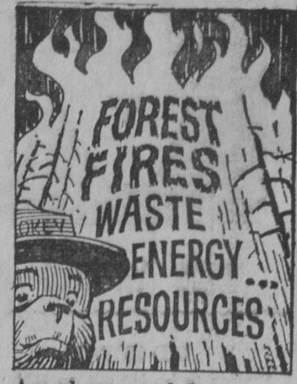
