Nelkie Heads State Association

Edward Nelkie, Iosco County treasurer since 1966, was elected president of the Michigan Association of County Treasurers during the organization's 43rd annual conference held Wednesday at Mackinac Island.

Nelkie has served the association as secretary, vice president and as a member of the legislative committee and executive committee for the past five years. During the past year, he was a member of the conference committee and is to be chairman for the 1977 conference.

As an added duty, Nelkie will be in charge of the school of instruction for all newly-elected treasurers on December 6-7 at Lansing.

A long time public servant, Nelkie was elected to his first public office, Tawas Township justice of the peace, at the age of 21 years. He served as trustee and township supervisor before becoming county treasurer in 1966, replacing

Mrs. Grace Miller, who had served in that office for 30 years. A charter member of Tawas Kiwanis Club, he served as director and treasurer for many years on Tawas Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of Tawas Council Knights of Columbus, serving as grand knight for two terms and district deputy for eight years.

Before becoming county treasurer, he spent many years in the dairy processing business in this county.

He and his wife make their home on Plank Road, west of Tawas City. Their two children are Gary Nelkie, East Tawas businessman, and Mrs. Judith Ann Rapanos of Midland.

City Land OK'd for Legion Hall

Leasing of a 90 by 180-foot parcel of land at the southwest corner of Tawas City baseball field on North Street as the proposed location for a new American Legion hall was approved Monday night by the city council.

According to terms of the city charter, the lease would extend for 30 years and the property would revert back to the city in the event the organization was ever disbanded. The council authorized the city attorney to prepare all legal work for the transaction.

This action culminates several months of discussion concerning a location for the proposed new building, which ties in with a commercial development along US-23 planned by Dr. John D. LeClair on a parcel of land presently occupied by the Legion hall and the former residence of Dr. E. B. Cavell Jr. fronting on Lake Street east of River Street.

Hugh Prescott, post commander, who appeared before Monday night's council meeting, said that an executive committee of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post No. 189 is to meet tonight (Wednesday) to consider the site on North Street as well as an alternate site on Ninth Avenue as a possible location for the new Legion hall. Members of that committee include Prescott, Jack Bronson, Nelson Thornton, John Brugger and Harold Shover.

A general meeting of the post membership is to be held Thursday night, 7:30 o'clock, to consider the latest proposal from LeClair for the post's two lots on River Street and, if acceptable, to consider the above two locations for a new building.

LeClair has proposed to construct a 40 by 80-foot concrete block and steel building along lines specified by the veterans' organization in a turnkey exchange for property presently occupied by the Legion hall.

The present building was once known as the Tawas City Ward School owned by the public school district. A number of years after use of the building was abandoned by the school district, Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post utilized the building for its purposes under arrangement with the school district. In the late 1940s, the school deeded the property to

the local American Legion post. Extensive remodeling followed and the exterior was faced with concrete blocks.

The city council adopted a resolution several months ago pledging its assistance to LeClair in his proposed commercial development along US-23 and indicated several weeks ago that the city would be willing to cooperate in providing a site for a new building if suitable property could be located. The Tawas City Businessmen's Association went on record as endorsing the project.

Prescott emphasized to councilmen Monday night that the present property owned by the veterans' organization had not been on the tax roll for many years and he believed that a new location should not take additional land off the tax roll. He said that moving the post home to city property would not take land off the tax roll and would result in the present Legion hall site being returned to the tax roll through its proposed commercial development.

It was pointed out by councilmen that the proposed new location of the hall would require a zoning change as the six-acre baseball field is zoned residential. However, Emanuel Lutheran School is located adjacent to the baseball field on the west side and, several weeks ago, zoning was changed along North Street to allow construction of a new nursing home and apartment complex.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the council had given consideration a number of years ago to moving the baseball field to another location, perhaps to city property near the Tawas City Elementary School, and utilizing the present field for a community center concept and as a possible location for a new headquarters building for the volunteer fire department and as a possible site for a new library.

Bublitz expressed the opinion that the proposed site of the new Legion hall would not interfere with present use as a baseball field and would lend itself to future use if a community center concept is ever realized.

Members of the council expressed the view that the city's interest in the property should be protected and stressed that a reverter clause should be included in any lease arrangement.




ET Council Adopts Building Fee Schedule; Hire Inspector Next Month

A resolution establishing a new fee schedule for building inspections under the city's building code, along with announcement that a building inspector would be hired in September, was adopted Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

Three members of the city planning commission were present at Monday night's meeting to discuss enforcement of the city's building code. Included were Merton Killely, Robert Elliott and Mrs. Helen Payea.

The fee schedule adopted by the council calls for a charge of 4½ cents per square foot for buildings inspected, with the exception that

a charge of 1½ cents per square foot would be made for residential garages.

It was reported that the city had received five applications for the position of building inspector. Salary of this position would be \$2,500 per year with all fees to be retained by the city.

It was emphasized by the council that inspection fees should not be charged for normal maintenance work.

It was announced that six applications had been received for the position of city superintendent to replace Paul Ropert, who is to retire on December 31. The position is to be filled in the fall to permit

the new person to work with Ropert in order to become fully acquainted with the duties of the city superintendent.

In other business, the city superintendent reported that 1,500 feet of water main had been constructed north of Newman Street and approximately 835 feet remained on that portion of the project. Ropert said that considerable time was involved in the project due to a severe ground water problem.

Approximately 1,900 feet of water main is to be constructed to Eastland No. 1 Subdivision. When water main construction is completed, the city is to sell lots in the subdivision.

It was announced that a new sewer project was now being considered in the northeastern section of the city which would serve lots from Owosso Street east to the Baldwin Township line. A joint venture is being considered with the township to provide sanitary sewer service to lots on both sides of Cranberry Pike. Total estimated cost of the project is \$270,000.

The council approved payment of \$32,728 to Spicer Engineering Company for its work on the new Tawas Lake sewer project.

The council denied a request from a Harrisville resident to use the community building as the site for an auction sale.

Hear Objections from Residents

Council to Review Margo Sealcoating

Sealcoating of a portion of Margo Street from Nanette to Woodward is to be held in abeyance by the Tawas City Council until bids are received on the entire sealcoating project approved two weeks ago.

This action was taken Monday night by the city council following questioning of the Margo Street project by a number of residential property owners on that portion of the street which was not included in this year's program.

It was felt by a number of residents that consideration should be given to sealcoating the entire

length of Margo Street due to the dust problem. The opinion was expressed by some property owners that the section of Margo Street between Nanette and Woodward was not as heavily traveled as the street passing in front of their homes.

Members of the council explained that the portion of Margo Street under consideration was added as an afterthought to the 1976 program at the last meeting of the council and following an inspection of streets by councilmen and the city manager.

It was pointed out that the 2,400

feet included in the program was given consideration as it would require less advance preparation for sealcoat work. It was stated that considerable fill would be required on the remaining portion of Margo Street to bring it to the proper grade.

City officials said that the sealcoating work had been expanded to a cost of \$12,200 and that only \$7,500 was available for this type of street work in 1976. Remainder of the cost would be included in a deferred payment to the successful bidder on the work.

During recent years, the city

has used a major portion of its federal revenue sharing money in construction of plant mix blacktop streets, which has more permanency than sealcoating. Due to the fact that federal revenue sharing money has been utilized for the city's share of sanitary sewer projects, including one project along Margo Street, available money from this source is being utilized on major streets which had been previously approved for blacktop and had been delayed while awaiting construction of sanitary sewer and water lines.



Twp. Voters Rejected Five Tax Proposals

Voters of three townships rejected special millage proposals for added services in the primary election held Tuesday, August 3.

Three different proposals were defeated by narrow margins in Grant Township. A one-mill proposal (two years) for fire protection was defeated, 145-165; a one-mill proposal for two years for garbage pickup (three-quarters of one mill) and one-quarter mill for road maintenance was defeated, 163-146; a proposal to use previously voted police protection money for fire truck equipment (one-half mill), bridge repairs (one-quarter mill) and reappraisal of all real estate within the township (one-quarter mill) was defeated, 156-151.

Alabaster Township voters defeated a two-mill proposal for local road repairs or improvements. The proposal was for a four-year tax levy.

Koenig Petitions for Recount

The campaign committee to elect John Koenig sheriff of Iosco County has filed a petition with County Clerk D. Keith Papas requesting a recount of ballots in the recent primary election. The petition, signed for the committee by Mary Tepass and Mrs. Joseph VanDette, felt that a "complete investigation is necessary due to discrepancies in the ballots cast, the amount of votes tallied and the large number of reported ballots voided."

The Iosco County Canvassing Board certified the nomination of George Westcott, Republican incumbent, following the election. Unofficial returns the day following the election had Westcott defeating Koenig by more than 1,000 votes, 2,755 to 1,699, and the third candidate, Jay O'Farrell, received 395 votes.

Papas said that the state board of canvassers had not completed its certification of the election as yet and that a recount of the sheriff's race would not be held until about the middle of September. Sealed boxes containing ballots and records from each precinct are to be taken to the county building.


Because of the extensive work involved, Papas said that about

four days would be required for the four-member county canvassing board to handle the recount. While a number of recounts have been held over the years, none has never been held here involving an election with such a wide separation of votes between two candidates.

Koenig, a seven-year member of the sheriff's department, has not returned to his duties as a deputy sheriff since the election. The sheriff's department received a letter Wednesday from Koenig's doctor stating that he was under medical care and could not report for work.

Kasischke Ends Postal Career

Martin Kasischke, 60, a 22-year employee of the United States Postal Service and former Tawas City postmaster, retired Friday as carrier on Route No. 2.

"Nothing really exceptional or spectacular has happened since I have carried the mail," said Kasischke before his retirement. One of his outstanding memories with the department was dedication of the former post office in 1956 by Cong. Elford A. Cederberg.

Kasischke was appointed postmaster in 1954 to succeed John Coyle, who had taken over briefly after the retirement of Lydia King. He served in that capacity until February 4, 1972, when he became a rural route carrier to succeed the late Carl Libka, who retired.

The route is 54.6 miles in length and serves 550 families. Appointment of a successor has not been made as yet, but Thomas Pintkowski, substitute, will be handling the route for a week, stated Leonard Hosbach, postmaster.

A native of Tawas City, Kasischke graduated from high school here in 1934, worked for Pontiac Motors and then spent three years in the United States Army during World War II, with service in Europe.

He was employed by Orville Leslie Ford Sales following military service and then served four years as city superintendent of Tawas City before joining the postal department.

"I get a great deal of enjoyment out of fishing and hunting and I am retiring at an age when I can take the time to enjoy those activities," said Kasischke.

He and his wife, Theda, who live on M-55 west of the Plank Road intersection, are the parents of three daughters and two sons. Two daughters are married and one son attends Michigan State University. Another son plans to attend Ferris State College and the youngest daughter is a student at Tawas Area High School.

Kasischke was honored Friday night at a retirement party attended by fellow postal employees at Tawas Golf and Country Club.

START WITH FIRE

Whether you are grilling steaks, chops or chicken, a well-built charcoal fire is a must. And it does not take an Eagle Scout to do the job.

Begin by selecting lump or briquet charcoal. Briquets are easier to handle since the pieces are uniform. They usually burn longer and more evenly, too.

Now prepare the grill. Line the fire bowl with heavy-duty aluminum foil to catch drippings and speed up cooking time.

Make a pyramid of charcoal in the fire bowl and saturate with liquid lighter. Do not take chances with gasoline or kerosene—they are too volatile. Let the charcoal stand for a few minutes, then ease a match to the side and go all around the pyramid. If the fire is sparse, saturate new briquets and add them to the pyramid. Never squirt lighter fluid directly on hot coals.

Once the fire gets going, allow about 45 minutes for it to burn

In the meantime, gather your cooking utensils. Long-handled forks, turners and heavy-duty pot holders make life easy for the chef. A child's water pistol comes in handy to extinguish unwanted flames. Trim excess fat from the meat and rub trimmings on the grill to prevent sticking.


Now check the coals. They are ready to go if ash-gray by day or glowing red at night. It pays off to wait, if the fire is too hot the meat will dry out. When it is time to cook, spread the coals a half-inch apart to form a shallow bed a bit larger than the area of the meat. Once the food is on the grill, place extra briquets around the edge of the fire. This forms a reserve of hot coals.

If fat drippings cause a flare up, squirt lightly with water. Do not drench the coals. This means ex-

tra time for the briquets to dry out and reheat. To increase heat, raise the fire bowl, lower the grill or push coals closer together. Do the opposite to slow down the fire. Finally, remove the grill soon after cooking and wrap it in wet newspaper. This helps the clean-up crew.

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Any town that would compare its "frontdoor" with the beautiful Bay of Naples could be expected to believe that it had the best sailing waters in the world. It has been that way with the Tawas since a couple of fishermen, on some long-forgotten summer day, agreed to have a race to determine which one owned the fastest sailing smack.

Local history does not record the event, names of the competitors or even the year in which Tawas Bay was established as a future mecca for competitive sailing—certainly it is not within the memory of anyone living today, for sailboat racing had its start even before a community was established on the shore.

Picture in your mind the Tawas Bay region only 125 years ago—there were only a few shacks clustered at the mouth of the Tawas River and a couple of similar weather-beaten structures on Tawas Point. The inhabitants made their living by fishing, a time honored occupation which pioneered development along the shores of the Great Lakes, just as it did along the Atlantic coast before any colonies were established.

The only means of powering the boats necessary to tend nets was sail power and fish have never been known to stay in one spot for any great length of time—fishing has always been a transient occupation for those who have followed it: Competition to be the first on the best fishing grounds has always been a natural instinct of such men and it is easy to believe that competitive sailing originated with the fishing fleet.

Photographic evidence does exist that Tawas Bay fishermen used their sailboats for pleasure cruises on lazy summer days. One picture accompanying this feature shows a fisherman and a party of friends, including their ladies, dressed in their Sunday best enjoying a cruise on Tawas Bay. The picture was snapped in the early 1890s, but competitive yachting on these waters had been well established by that time.

A newspaper account on July 13, 1882, recorded an early day summer ritual: "An excursion to Point Lookout from the Tawas Satur-

day evening and returning Sunday afternoon will carry one passenger both ways for \$1. A sailboat in tow of a tug will carry the party." The sheltered water of Tawas Bay was the front door for this entire region—there were no improved roads leading inland to

any great extent and the region depended upon water transportation.

Exact date of the first competitive sailing regatta on Tawas Bay has not been determined, but it is known that several wealthy lumbermen enjoyed yachting in the 1870s and owned expensive sailboats.


By the 1890s, competition among sailors was commonplace and July 20, 1892, The Tawas Herald recorded the following: "The boat race Monday for a wager of \$5 a side resulted in a victory for the Shamrock, with Tanner's second and the Verve last. Shamrock is owned by Charles Bennett and James Brown of place and was sailed by Boan."

A week later, the newspaper recorded that "the fast sail yachts, Clara and Shamrock, raced a week ago Sunday for \$5 a side. The Shamrock won the money."

The Ottawa Yacht Club was established by that time competitive summer sailing in May 1894, the newspaper noted that the club was having its year repainted and overhauled for coming season. A year later, August 30, 1895, the newspaper noted that N. C. Hartingh and family went to Bay City Monday on yacht, Comanche, for a few days visit with relatives and friends.

Hartingh, circuit court stenographer and owner of the Iosco District Office, was an avid sailor throughout most of his life and was instrumental in formation of the Ottawa Yacht Club. Competitive sailing had greatest surge in 1897 when Detroit and Mackinac Railroad donated a silver cup to be awarded the over-all winner of the annual regatta. "The race is intended to be a good old-fashioned yacht race to furnish fun and pleasure for those taking part for those who witness it," stated the Herald.

Racing that year was held first week-end in September the 10-mile triangular course its starting and finishing line front of the commercial dock (See WHITE WINGS, page

East Tawas. The last leg was along the shore for three miles past Tawas City and East Tawas and extending into the bay opposite the summer resort owned by the railroad.

The cup was won that first year by the Casaline, a brand new fish boat of 32-foot keel launched at West Bay City. Competing in the races were the following boats: Willie, Banner, Comrade, Vim, Casaline, all of Bay City; the Vision sailing out of Saginaw; Jack and Idlewild from Alpena; the Morning Star, Comanche, Walter A. and Evening Star from Tawas.

The Comanche skippered by Hartingh won in actual time, but lost in corrected time: "Under the system used, all boats had a chance and only the slowest received no prize. It must be confessed that yachtsmen of Saginaw Bay must build faster boats if they wish to keep the prizes away from the fish boats; the latter certainly took the prizes this year," commented the Herald.

With development of its summer resort at Tawas Beach, the railroad took over complete sponsorship of the annual yacht races and its clubhouse on Tawas Point, along with dockage facilities, became the center of sailing activities. Special trains were operated by the railroad to bring visitors here from the Saginaw Valley to watch the races.

After the railroad went out of the summer resort business on Tawas Point around 1911, competitive sailing was continued for a few years on a local scale and finally died for a lack of interest. It was not until July 1933, that rac-

ing was revived on Tawas Bay. "This year is an opportune time to revive sailboat racing here and the regatta will undoubtedly cre-

ate a widespread interest in this section of Michigan," commented the Herald. Officers of the Tawas Yachting Association organized that year included James Nisbet, commodore; Gerald Mallon, vice commodore, and Hartingh, secretary-treasurer. "The 'Gull' owned by Harold Moeller of Tawas City, skippered by Richard Hartingh of Pontiac, was the 1933 regatta winner.

In order to regain interest in sailing, the yacht club annually organized a series of summer races, with particular emphasis on youth. Names of some of the boats competing included Sero, Duster, Louise, Dale and Gamble.

An event in 1935 helped trigger local interest in sailing. This was the launching of the "Yucatan," a new 30-foot Marconi rigged racing sloop constructed by Gerald Mallon at his Tawas Bay Boat Works for Charles and Harold Moeller. Several hundred people witnessed the christening ceremony held at the boat works located across from the D&M roundhouse.

Designed along American Cup Defender lines by Sparkman and Stephens, marine designers of New York, old yachtsmen, attending the ceremony said it was one of the most beautiful racing sloops ever launched on the Great Lakes. The Moellers won the class A trophy in 1936 and 1937 before the Yucatan was lost in a storm on Saginaw Bay.

Interest in sailboat racing continued to build each year leading up to World War II. National One design sailboats were emphasized starting in 1938 and a perennial winner in this class was Matt Haglund, who was to become national champion in this class about 30 years later, Merrill Pollard, rear commodore of the yacht club, and L. G. (Ladd) McKay, vice commodore, were co-chairmen of the 1938 regatta.


Sailboat races were discontinued during World War II and the Tawas Bay Yacht Club did not be-

come operational again until 1947. The Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company and Charles A. Pinkerton Jr. donated a trophy that year in memory of servicemen in this area who lost their lives during the war.

Sailing and power boat regattas were to increase dramatically on Tawas Bay during the next decade, with particular emphasis on development of the Lightning Class sailing fleet, but it was not until July 1954 that Tawas Bay Yacht Club dedicated its new clubhouse on Tawas Point.

During the 20 years since then, Tawas Bay Yacht Club has been host to Michigan district and North American Lightning regattas, plus major national events in other classes of sailing craft. Power boats now share the limelight with sailboats and, stressing family participation in its events, the yacht club has shown tremendous growth and today offers outstanding dockage facilities on Tawas Point for its members.

It is a far cry from that day in the distant past when two local fishermen got together to decide who had the fastest sailboat.

Isolate All Generators as Precaution for Line Safety

Extreme care must be taken with standby generators to avoid feedback into the electric system of Consumers Power Company, advised J. G. Huck, the company's district manager. Without proper switching equipment to close off the power line, feedback from the generator could shock and injure Consumers Power linemen working on the company's equipment.

Many customers in rural and outlying suburban areas have standby portable home generating units for use during those infrequent occasions when regular electric service is interrupted because of severe storms or an accident. The March ice storm that paralyzed much of Michigan caused many more residents to consider installing home generators.

In all cases the company's supply must be isolated from the point that is served by the home generator plant during the time the home generator is in operation. "We insist that the customer provide a double throw switch connected so that interconnection between the customer's generation and the company system is impossible," Huck said.




