

City Continues to Seek Option Bids

With no bids received on options held by the city for the purchase of two parcels of land fronting on US-23 and formerly considered for a proposed parking lot-office building project, Tawas City Council decided Monday night to extend bidding to its meeting of Monday, September 20.

In the meantime, the city is to notify all real estate brokers in the area that the council would be interested in any offer concerning the purchase of the two options held by the city.

The property, comprising one parcel owned by Roy Bergeron and another owned by George A. Prescott Jr., is located adjacent to and west of the Iosco County Building.

In other business, specification concerning purchase of a new fire truck were distributed to councilmen for study prior to future discussion on the purchase of a new unit.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the sale of the city property to Emanuel Lutheran Church for expansion of the church cemetery. Sale price was \$2,430.

Authorization was given to hire a person to handle operation of the city's boat ramp on Ninth Avenue during the remainder of the summer and for the fall fishing season.

Martin O'Driscoll, chairman of the Tawas River Harbor Committee, appeared before the council and expressed the opinion that the city was losing money because it did not have an attendant at the boat ramp to collect launching fees.

O'Driscoll said that members of his committee were considering construction of dockage along property recently acquired from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway for expansion of the launching facility.

Mayor Herbert Cholger reported that he had contacted Stanley Stask, new owner of Coho City Marina.

OK Resolution on Tax District

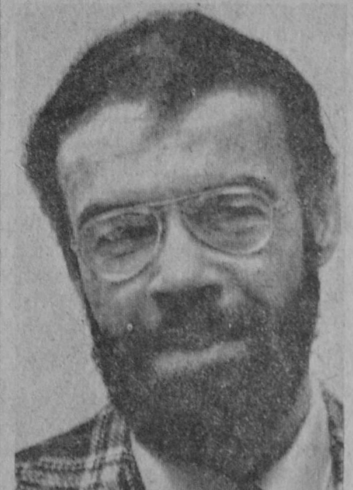
First public hearing on a proposed special assessment district to construct 750 feet of sewer along US-23 south of the Tawas River bridge was held Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

The council adopted its third resolution in the legal process of establishing a special assessment district, under terms of the city ordinance. The council found the project an advisable and necessary public improvement.

The action authorizes an assessment roll to be prepared for property owners benefited by the project. The proposed sanitary sewer main would be located adjacent to the bay side of US-23 and would extend 750 feet from Aca-pulco Beach Cabins and Apartments in a northeasterly direction to Coho City Marina.

No objections were heard on the proposal.

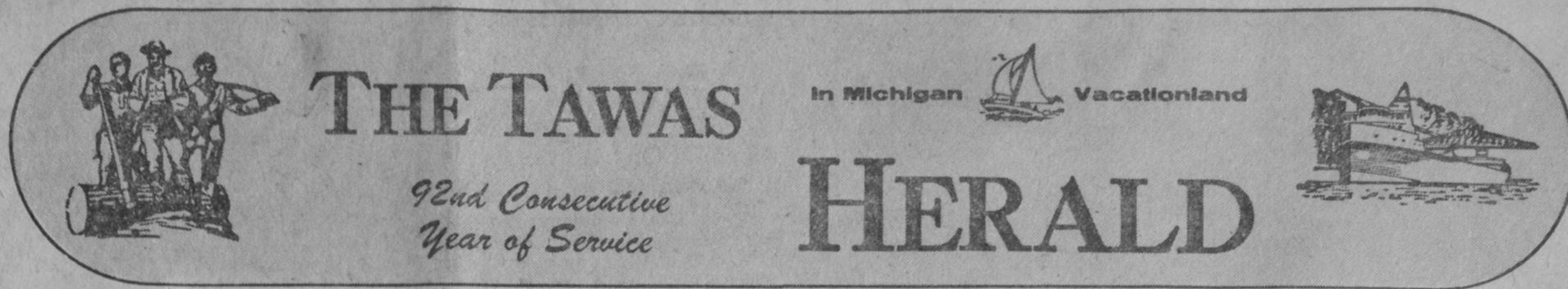

D&M Unveils Charter Excursion Train

A dining car has been added to the list of cars available for charter through a new service of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

The dining car, which the railway purchased more than a year ago, has been completely renovated by the D&M shop crews under direction of Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., chairman of the railroad's board of directors, to provide a comfortable and elegant restaurant atmosphere for train passengers dining during their trip.

First use of the new car came Tuesday when the railroad hosted about 75 business and civic leaders, along with area media, at a noon luncheon. Guests were present from the Tawas, Oscoda, West Branch and other Northeastern Michigan communities.

A trial run of the car is being held this week with visits to the northern end of the line. Today (Wednesday), a luncheon is being held at Alpena, the train will travel to Mackinaw City on Thursday and will stop at Gaylord on Friday.

Kitchen of the new car has been completely remodeled with modern stainless steel equipment. It is in perfect working order for preparing everything from a ham sandwich to Steak Diane, according to a railroad spokesman.

The dining car, along with two passenger cars and a grill car, is available for charter to any group or organization wishing to charter a train trip along the Detroit and Mackinac's Huron Shoreline or its inland trackage from Mackinaw City through Gaylord to Bay City.

The D&M recently began offering the charter service to meet a need for passenger train excursions from area residents. The first charter train ride was held May 2 when Rotarians from the Tawas were transported to Alpena.

The train is powered by the D&M's new locomotive No. 976, painted in a red, white and blue design created by John Edean of Saginaw in honor of the nation's bicentennial celebration. The new engine was turned over to the company on June 29.

Following the inaugural trips this week, the locomotive will be seen pulling freight cars over the D&M's 400 miles of track in Northern Michigan, along with eight other D&M diesel locomotives.

Voting Average

Iosco County had an average turnout of voters in Tuesday's primary election. County Clerk D. Keith Pappas estimated Tuesday night that approximately 55 percent of the county's 13,371 registered voters went to the polls.

A 60 percent turnout was noted in Tawas City with 661 voters going to the polls, while 1,960 voters received ballots at East Tawas, about 55 percent of the total registration list.

At press time Tuesday night, no precincts had reported any results to the clerk's office.

Board to Adopt Millage Proposal

Citizens to Report Next Week on TA Findings

A subcommittee of the citizens advisory committee currently studying Tawas Area School's program met Monday night with the board of education in a work session to consider financing of school operation for the coming term.

This committee, along with other committees considering school discipline, transportation and space alternatives, are to present formal reports next Monday night at the regular board of education meeting.

Following presentations from committees, the board of education is to adopt the amount of millage which will be placed before voters on August 26. This will be the second attempt to secure additional millage to make up the difference between allocated taxes and a total operational budget in excess of \$2,200,000.

At the annual school election in June, voters rejected a proposal to renew 11 mills of taxes and three additional mills.

At the present time, Tawas Area School has assurance of receiving only \$776,000 to meet its 1976-77 budget. This amount represents

taxes to be received from 9.25 mills earmarked by the Iosco County Tax Allocation Board for all schools in the county.

The board of education recently issued its tax anticipation notes totaling the above amount in order to finance school operation until tax collection time in December.

Preliminary reports from subcommittees were heard at a meeting of the citizens advisory committee held last Thursday night at the high school. Total membership of the committee is in excess of 75 residents of the school district.

Council Approves Sealcoating Two Miles of T. City Streets

A little over two miles of sealcoat work on Tawas City streets was approved Monday night by the city council. This action followed a recent inspection of streets by the city council and city manager.

Total street work approved under the program for this summer amounts to 12,250 feet.

The city selected this type of hard surfacing of streets based on present grade, drainage and sani-

tary sewer structures. Past policy of the city has been to utilize plant mix blacktop only, which is more permanent than sealcoating. However, councilmen felt that a number of streets were badly in need of improvement and that money would not be wasted on the less expensive surface as a number of similar streets here have withstood heavy traffic conditions for a number of years.

Streets included in the sealcoat-

ing program are as follows: North Street, from Harris Avenue to Ninth Avenue, 2,150 feet; Court Street, from First Street to the county building parking lot, 950 feet; Court Street, from River Street to M-55, 2,150 feet; Eleventh Avenue, from Harris Avenue to North Street, 675 feet; Cedar Street, from Oak Street to the city limit, 2,750 feet; Third Avenue, from First Street to North Street, 1,175 feet; Margo Street, from Nanette to Woodward, 2,400 feet.

D&M Takes Over Ferry Operation

Operation of the Chief Wawatam car ferry across the Straits of Mackinac was taken over Tuesday by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

The D&M will be operating the car ferry between Mackinaw City and St. Ignace under a lease contract with the State of Michigan.

The ferry is owned by the Mackinac Transportation Company, which was made up of Penn Central Transportation Company and the Soo Line. When Penn Central went defunct on April 1, the Soo Line took over operation of the ferry.

The state will now lease the ferry from the Mackinac Transportation Company and the D&M will supervise the ferry operations for the state.

The D&M recently purchased Penn Central track from Gaylord to Mackinaw City and does all of the switching of train cars on and off the Chief Wawatam at Mackinaw City.

Tawas Harbor Month Honors Past and Present Commission

Through adoption of a resolution Monday night by the East Tawas Council, August has been proclaimed "Tawas Harbor Month."

This action was taken by city officials in recognition of many "dedicated and talented people, past and present," who helped in bringing a long time dream closer to realization.

It was announced in July by Keith Wilson, director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, that the state legislature had approved a bill authorizing an expenditure of \$625,000 to match a federal al-

location for expansion of the Michigan Waterways Commission dock at East Tawas.

It is expected that this long awaited project will be completed within two years and that the Army Corps of Engineers would take bids on the project in early August. Work is expected to commence this fall.

In addition, Wilson announced that work on the quadruple boat launching facility to be constructed at the present site of the city garage east of the state police post would be commenced in the

spring of 1978.

The resolution adopted by the council commends past and present members of the harbor commission for untiring efforts toward accomplishment of the project and suggested that a meeting be held with the council in the future in order to properly give recognition.

Present members of the harbor commission include Ralph White, Clifford Eppert, Robert Marsh, Elmer Werth, Harold Gould and Ralph Western, who represents the council.

In other business, the council

authorized purchase of a new police car from S&W Ford, Oscoda, low bidder.

The council adopted an ordinance prohibiting fishing from the city's portion of the East Tawas bridge over the Tawas River. It is expected that Baldwin Township will adopt a similar ordinance and authorize the East Tawas Police Department to handle enforcement.

The ordinance was adopted as a means of eliminating the traffic hazard to children fishing from the bridge.

Letter to the Editor

As members of the Wilber Township Board, we feel that we should speak out to the residents in response to certain criticisms made against one of our elected officers, namely, William Olsen, supervisor.

Mr. Olsen has been criticized for neglecting his township responsibility as supervisor, giving preference to his full time position in the county building. We must first realize that township offices in a small organization such as Wilber cannot be considered as full time occupations. All members of the township board have other places of employment as their major incomes. Mr. Olsen's position in the equalization department should be an asset to the township, rather than a detriment. Through his working in this responsible position, he is better able to understand the tax and valuation picture of Wilber Township.

As to specific criticisms: That of hiring a secretary for the board of review. Provisions are made for a secretary in the "Manual For Township Government" page 96. Authorization for the hiring of a secretary for that particular board of review was made at the annual meeting of the township on March 30, 1974. Added responsibilities for that particular year was the preparing of appraisal cards, never before used in the township. There has not been a secretary hired for the board of review since that particular session.

As for a phone installed in the township hall for the supervisor's convenience. This claim is not true. The township board has paid monthly for a telephone in the township hall for several years. The township hall is listed in the telephone directory. This is a "jack-type" phone, carried to the hall and plugged in for meetings and elections. It is not left in the hall to be used at will by renters of the township hall for parties or available if someone should break into the hall and make calls and charge them to the township phone. The phone was not installed for any particular meeting.

We feel that William Olsen carries the duties and responsibilities as supervisor of Wilber Township in a very adequate manner. We feel that the business of the township has been handled in a very

efficient manner since he has been our supervisor. The township should feel proud of the representation we have in the township, in the county and in the state through Mr. Olsen.

Rather than being so critical, let's be appreciative of citizens who work hard and do their very best in carrying out the duties and responsibilities that the electors have given to them.

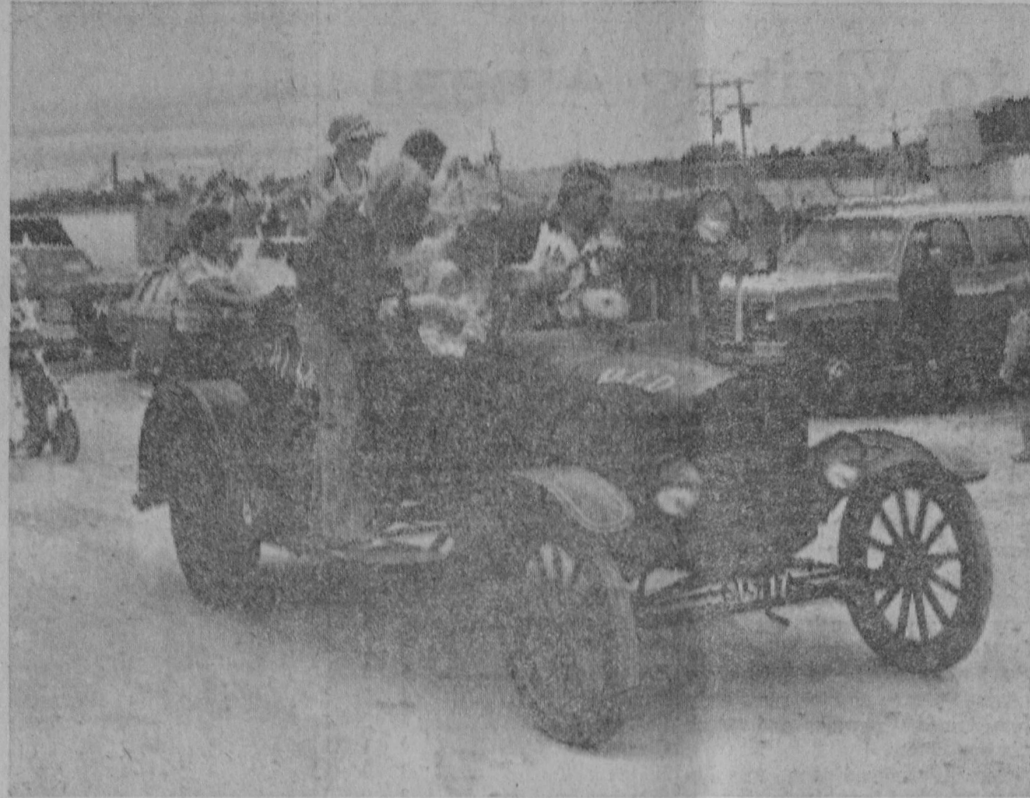

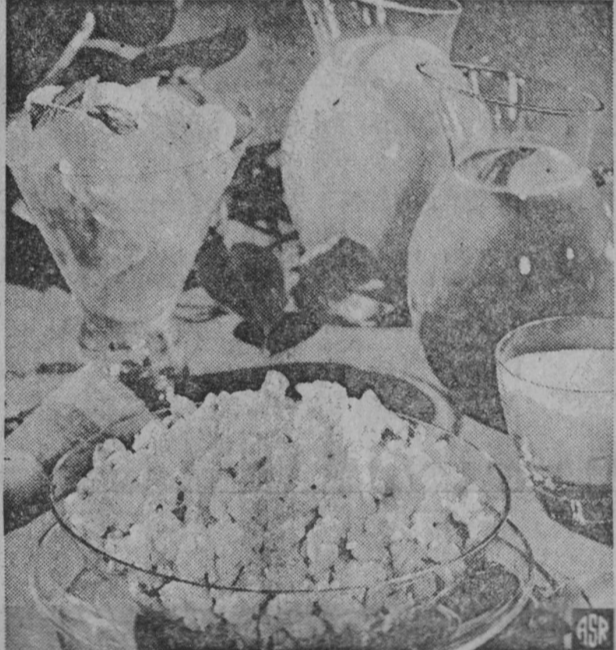
Funeral Held for Dorothy Kelchner

gram, other street work approved by the council for this summer includes plant mix black-topping as follows: Fifth Avenue, from First Street to M-55; First Avenue, from Anna to M-55; Harris Avenue, from Second Street to city limits; Second Street, from Eighth Avenue to Harris Avenue. Preliminary discussion was held Monday night on the future of the Whittemore Street bridge. This structure has deteriorated rapidly during recent years and signs have been posted warning trucks not to use it. Temporary repair has been made to the surface, but it believed that the structure is unsound due to age.

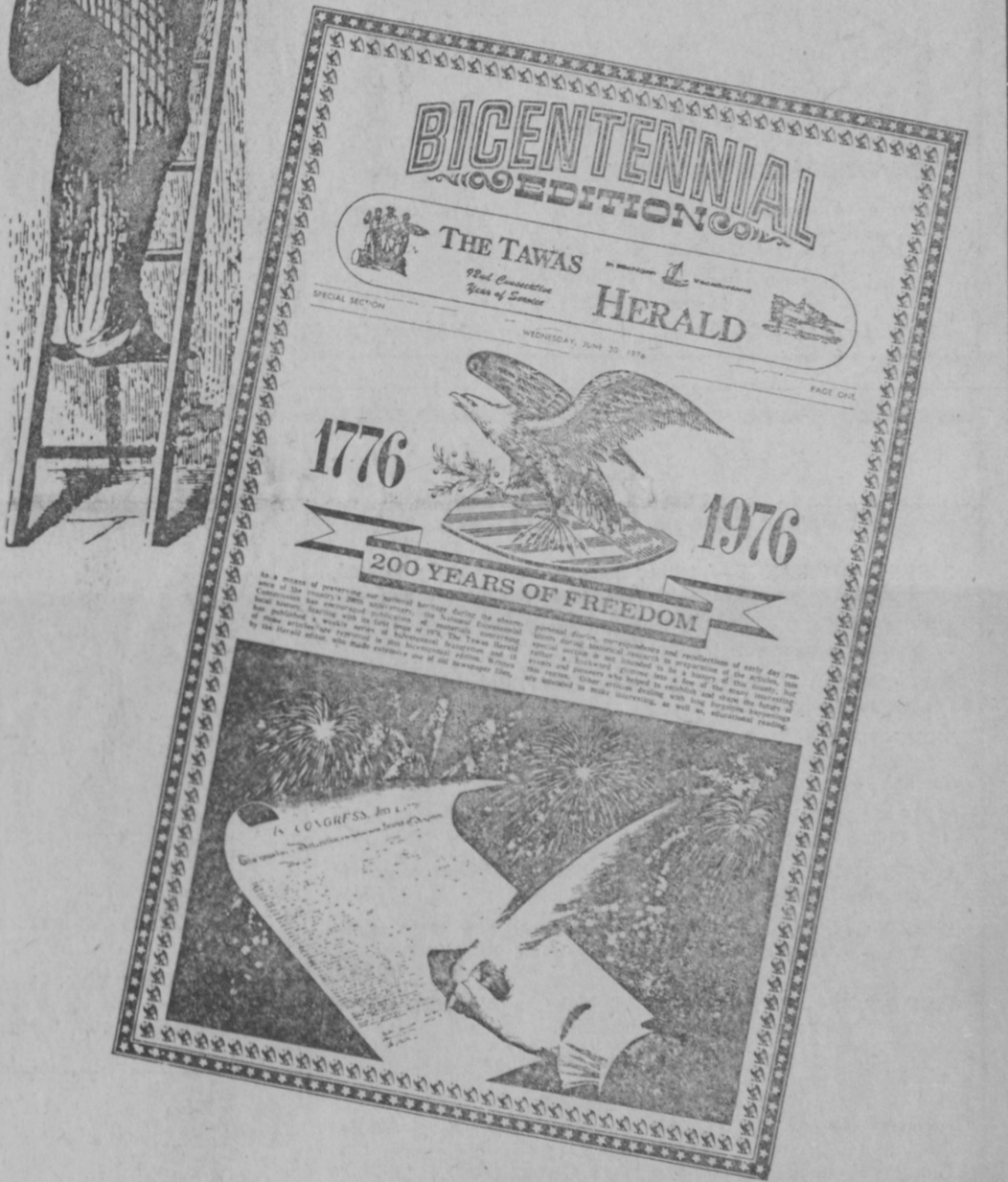
City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said

that he would contact the contractor which constructed wooden bridges at Mathews Street and First Street for an update on the cost of replacing the Whittemore Street bridge.

The Whittemore Street bridge was considered in the replacement program adopted a number of years ago, but local financing was inadequate at that time to construct a new bridge at that point. In addition, Mathews Street and First Street are primary routes in the city's road system and Whittemore Street does not carry as heavy a traffic load as those two streets.

It was suggested that a traffic count be taken on Whittemore Street for consideration during deliberations on a bridge replacement program.

Top hitter for the losers was Tom Kasischke, who had two

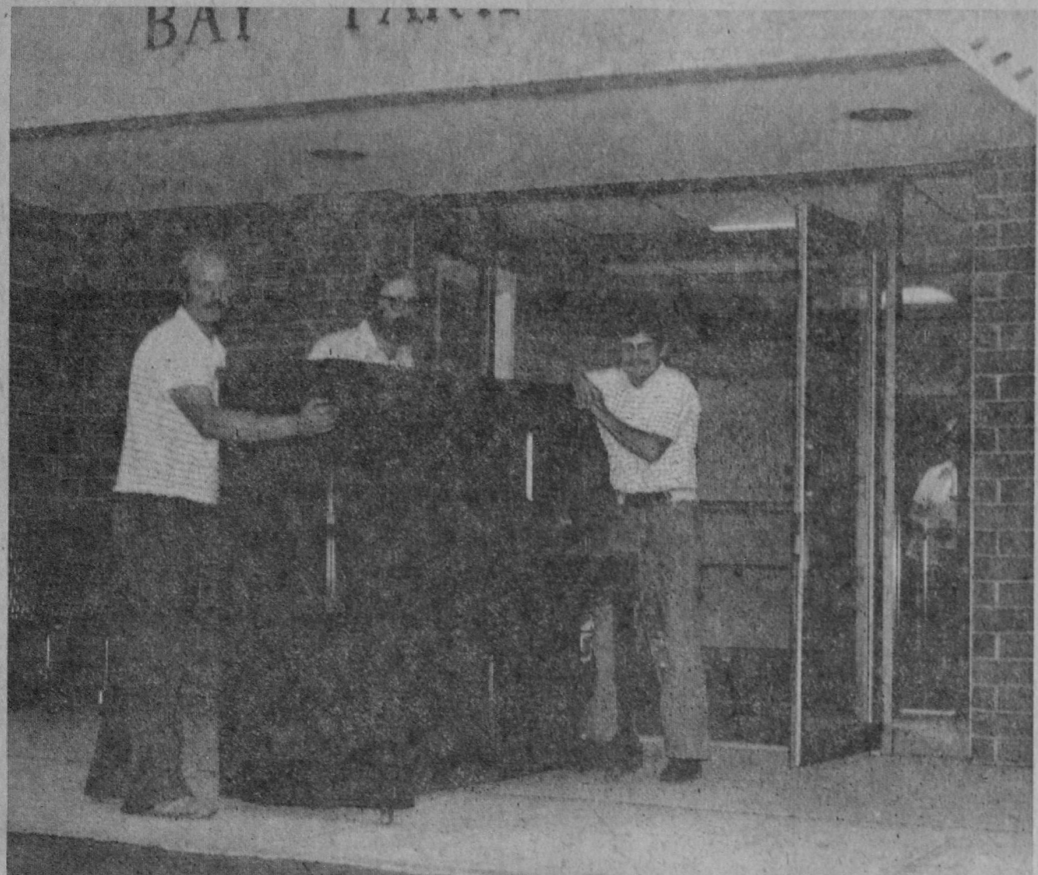
singles in four times at bat.

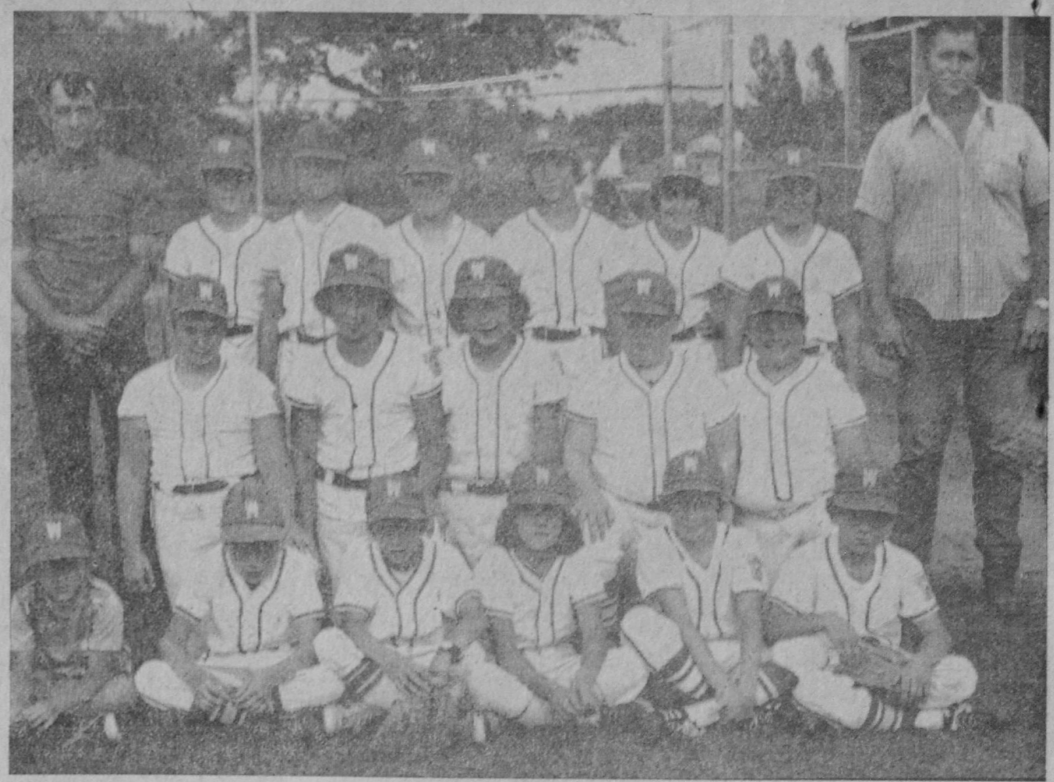

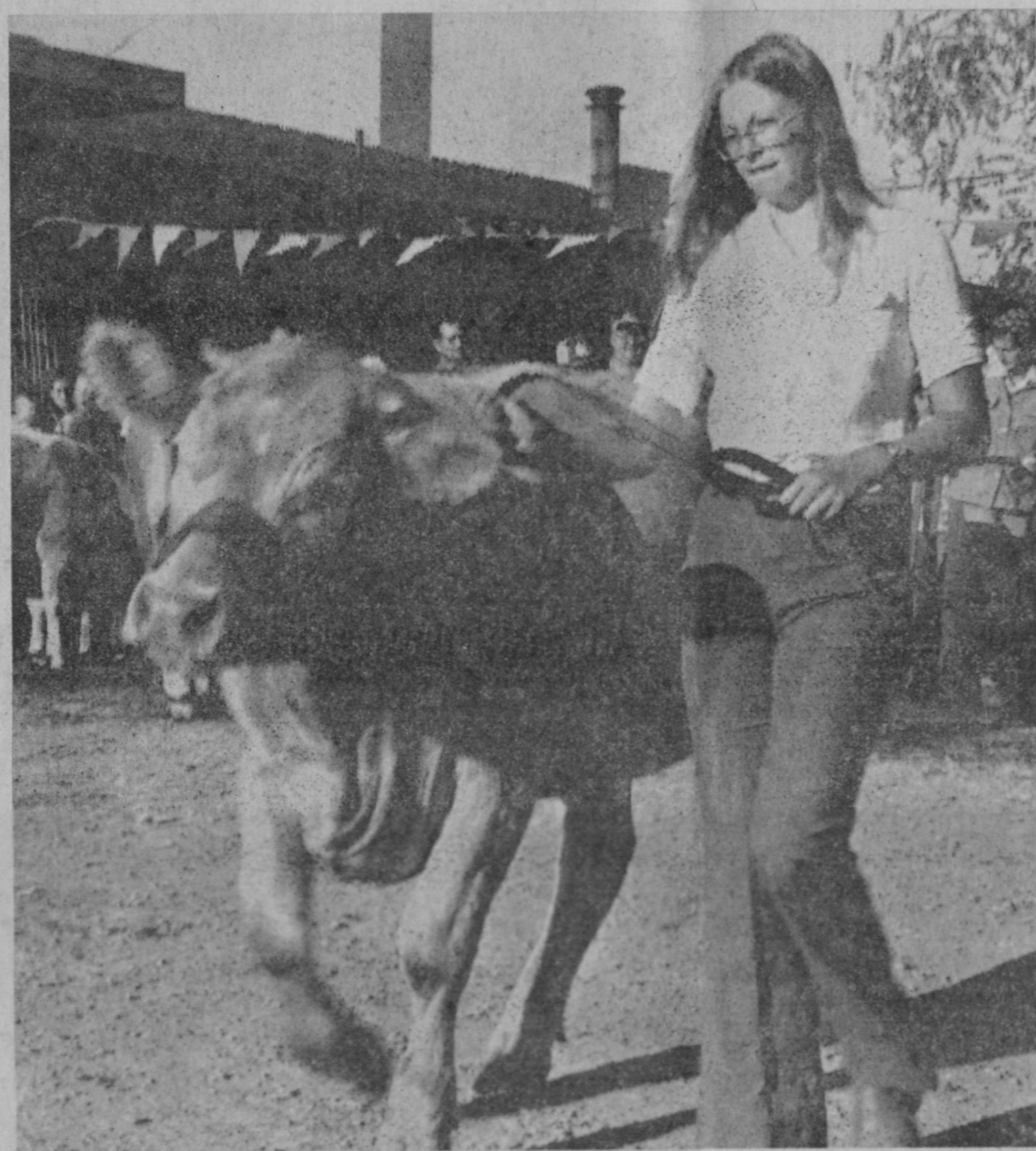

16th Annual Tawas Art Show Has Record Number of Entries

A record number of entries is expected for the 16th annual Tawas Bay Art Show to be held Saturday and Sunday, August 7-8, at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

Mrs. Herbert Blust, president of Tawas Bay Artists, sponsor of the program, said that 275 exhibitors are included in the printed program and nearly 300 are expected to be on hand for opening of the show Saturday morning.

This total compares to 159 exhibitors on last year's program and a registration list of nearly 200 at the start of the show. If expectations are realized for this year's event, it should be one of the largest showings in the state.

"The committee has had some concern where we were going to put all of these entries, but we will be expanding the exhibition area to the west end of the park if

we are cramped for room," said Mrs. Blust.

With two straight years of wet weather to mar the previous events, committee members are keeping their fingers crossed for good weather conditions this year. "If it rains, we will be moving indoors—both at the Iosco County Building and the former McKay Sales Building on Lake Street east of the city park," said Mrs. Blust. The former McKay sales lot will also be used for parking, which should relieve congestion.

"Visitors have expressed amazement over the persistence of exhibitors during our past two shows," said Paula Peterson, chairman for registrations. "Rather than packing up displays and returning home at the slightest hint of rain, as is the case for most shows, exhibitors to this

show appreciate the location and come equipped with large sheets of plastic to cover displays during rain showers—we hope the plastic will not be needed this year."

The show has gained a national reputation and entries have been received from Texas, Arizona, New York, Florida, Wisconsin, Indiana and Ohio. A request for an entry blank was even received from Italy.

Quality of the show has been upgraded during the past two years by screening of entries by the committee, plus staging of a crafts and antique show a month previous to the main event, which allows participation by all craftsmen. As a result, more paintings will be exhibited this year than ever before during the art show, along with photography, wood and metal sculpturing, weaving, pottery, handmade jewelry and some

leather craft.

Success of any show of this type depends greatly on sales and committee members suggest that the art show is an ideal place to purchase gifts for Christmas and other occasions.

The show opens daily at 9:00 a. m. and door prizes are to be awarded to visitors Saturday evening. Cash prizes are to be awarded to exhibitors Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Registration desk is at the Iosco County Building.

Elvis Presley Documentary to be Aired

Radio Station WIOS (1480 on AM dial) will broadcast a spectacular new 13-hour documentary, "The Elvis Presley Story," it was announced today by John Carroll Jr., general manager.

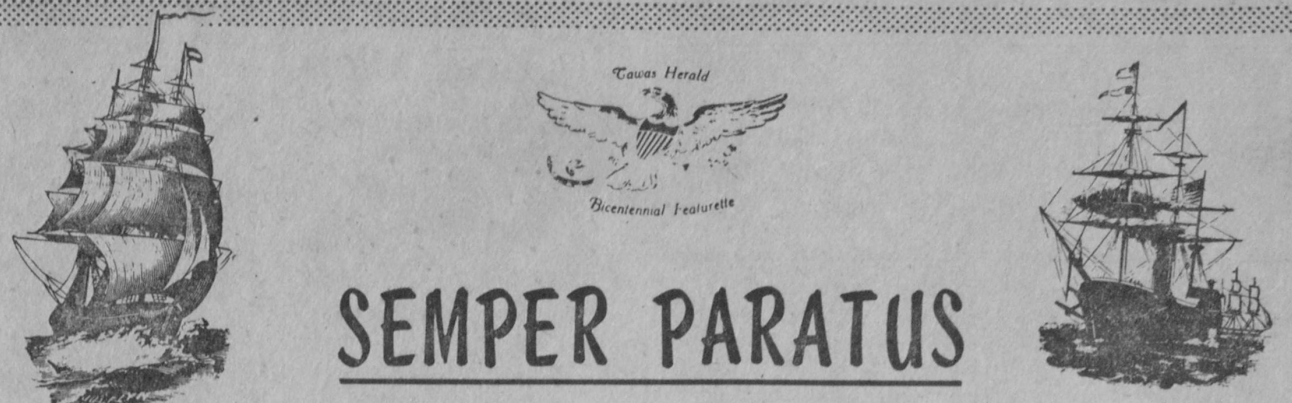
WIOS Radio will air the program August 16 through 20 from 5:30 to 8:30 p. m. Elvis Presley has spent 20 years at the top of the music business and his is a stranger-than-fiction story of the most fascinating show business career of all time. Now an exciting documentary for radio has been produced, based on three years of intensive research by author, Jerry Hopkins. Hopkins' book, "Elvis - A Biography," published by Simon and Schuster, has been hailed as the definitive work on the life of the superstar.

This radio special on Elvis' life features nearly 160 of his songs and in-depth interviews with 80 of Presley's closest friends and associates. The program will be broadcast in over 250 major cities in the United States and around the world.

Narrator of the 13-hour documentary is Los Angeles, California, radio and television personality, Wink Martindale. Martindale was a disc jockey for station WHBQ in Memphis, Tennessee, when Presley first began recording there in 1954 and later interviewed Elvis on several radio and television shows. His tapes of those interviews will be among dozens of rare tapes included in the documentary.

Executive producer of "The Elvis Presley Story" is Thomas Rounds, president of Los-Angeles-based firm, Watermark, Incorporated. Producer-director is Ronald Jacobs, who produced and directed the mammoth 48-hour "History of Rock and Roll" program.

WIOS Radio is the only radio station in the area that will be airing this specially produced documentary.



TAWAS COAST GUARD

Men of the Tawas Coast Guard Station, along with their predecessors, have been on guard at Tawas Point for 124 years of the service's 186-year history.

Motto of the coast guard, "Semper Paratus"—always ready—is as meaningful today as it was in the heyday of shipping when Tawas Bay was crammed with wooden sailing vessels. Instead of keeping a watchful eye on ships carrying cargoes of lumber, salt and fish, the coast guard today has the responsibility of protecting the thousands of small pleasure boats which ply the inland waterway, as well as to assist the huge lake carriers plying Lake Huron in times of distress.

The coast guard and its predecessors, the United States Revenue Service, United States Lighthouse Service, United States Life-saving Service, have been a part of the Tawas area since its beginning.

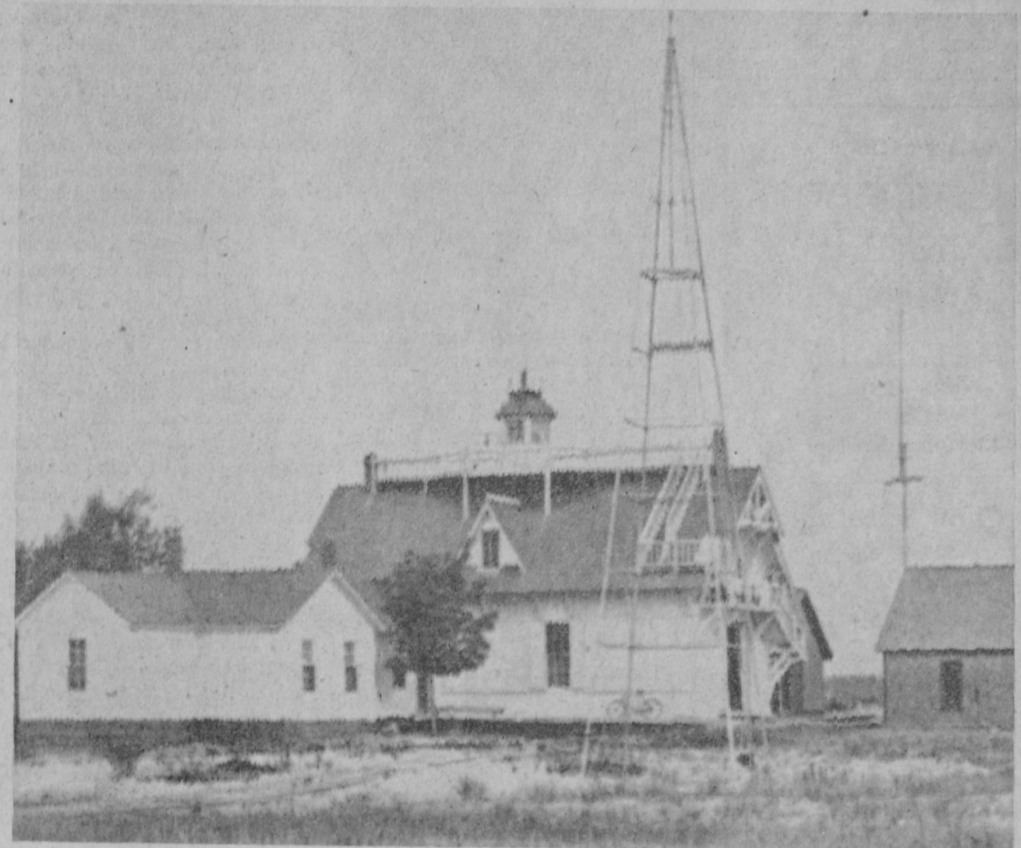
One of its forerunners built the first lighthouse on Tawas Point in 1853. When the Whittemores founded Tawas City a year later, they were guests of Capt. Collin Graham, then keeper of the light.

The spit of sand projecting out into Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay was originally known as Ottawa Point and that spelling was still in use as late as 1894, according to an old copy of the life saving station's wreck report.

Throughout the years, many Tawas men have been numbered in the ranks of the coast guard and several of them retired to make their homes here.

The station at Tawas Point has always had a close affinity to the Tawas area, and during earlier days, residents followed competition between surfmen from this station and other Great Lakes stations in annual contests to determine outstanding crews. Following one competition, Capt. David Small and his crew were adjudged to be the best on the Great Lakes and were entertained royally at a reception held at the Holland Hotel on their return to East Tawas.

Although most of the old records of the United States Life Saving Service have been destroyed over the years, Frank Morey, retired chief and former commander at Tawas Point, rescued three old books from the scrap heap a number of years ago and has preserved them.

Morey was stationed at Tawas Point from October 1929 until his retirement on October 1, 1954, and recalls that pulling surfboats were still in use as late as 1935. Members of the crew that year included Surfmen Palmer Burrows, Jacob Messer, Morey, Herbert Hasse, along with BMIC Peter Jarvis, first mate, and Ernest Larson, ENIC, second mate. Small was officer in charge.

The importance of the life saving station to the Tawas area is readily apparent when one realizes that Tawas Bay was a major port during the lumbering era. As a consequence of this shipping activity, the life saving station was called upon many times to protect the lives of seamen and property threatened with disaster.

The first entry in the wreck report now in the possession of Chief Morey is dated July 13, 1884, and tells of the routine work of the crew. At 6:30 a. m. on that day, Henry Cleary, being on watch, discovered a raft of pine logs hard aground on the point. The raft, towed by the tug, Laura Gibbs, out of Oscoda, was bound from East Tawas to AuSable and ran aground at 3:00 a. m., "it being very smoky from large forest fires" on the mainland.

"When the tug blew four whistles, we went out to them," stated the report. "Found her too hard on to be moved without assistance; took the owner, John Gram, ashore and, as his steam barge, Missouri, was loading at the dock, he had her come out to take the tug off." (Gram operated one of the large sawmills along the AuSable River.)

Other entries tell of the burning of the barge, Iosco, which was in tow of the tug, Music, on August 24, 1885; saving of the crew of the D. K. Cluit, a three-masted schooner out of Buffalo, New York, bound for Milwaukee, Wisconsin, as well as for 47 other ship wreck reports dating to September 23, 1894.

One of the reports dated October 29, 1887, concerned the three masted schooner, W. A. Sherman, sailing out of Ogdensburg, New York. A steam barge towed the ship around two miles above Oscoda. The previously named George Cleary, who had advanced to station commander, and his crew loaded their lifeboat with beach apparatus and rowed through a heavy sea and a gale laced with snow to East Tawas. There, the crew was met by the superintendent of the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad.

The equipment was placed on a flat car and was taken to Oscoda by a special train. A wagon met the train and hauled the equipment and men to Lake Huron. The crew

saved the men aboard the doomed schooner and, after working all night, the storm subsided and the men "pulled" a distance of about 13 miles on their return to the station. Cleary noted that they reached Ottawa Point at 3:00 a. m. "tired and hungry."

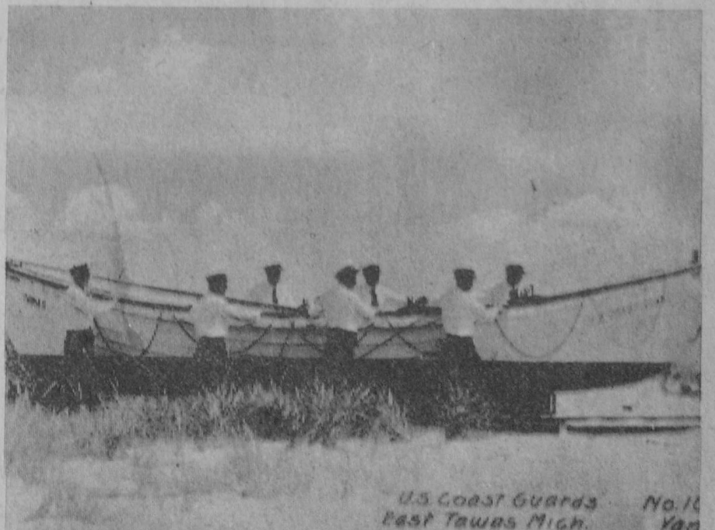
A similar report book of wrecks in Morey's possession lists numerous calls for assistance from sailing and gasoline powered fishing

boats in Tawas and Saginaw Bay from 1903 to 1908. By then, times were changing and gasoline engines were being used to power surf boats, but muscle power was still utilized in Tawas Bay rescue operations.

One local resident said that as a small child living in Tawas City, she recalls the night about 70 years ago when a three-masted (See STATION, page 6.)

"It does not yet appear what we shall be." (I John 3:2, RSV)

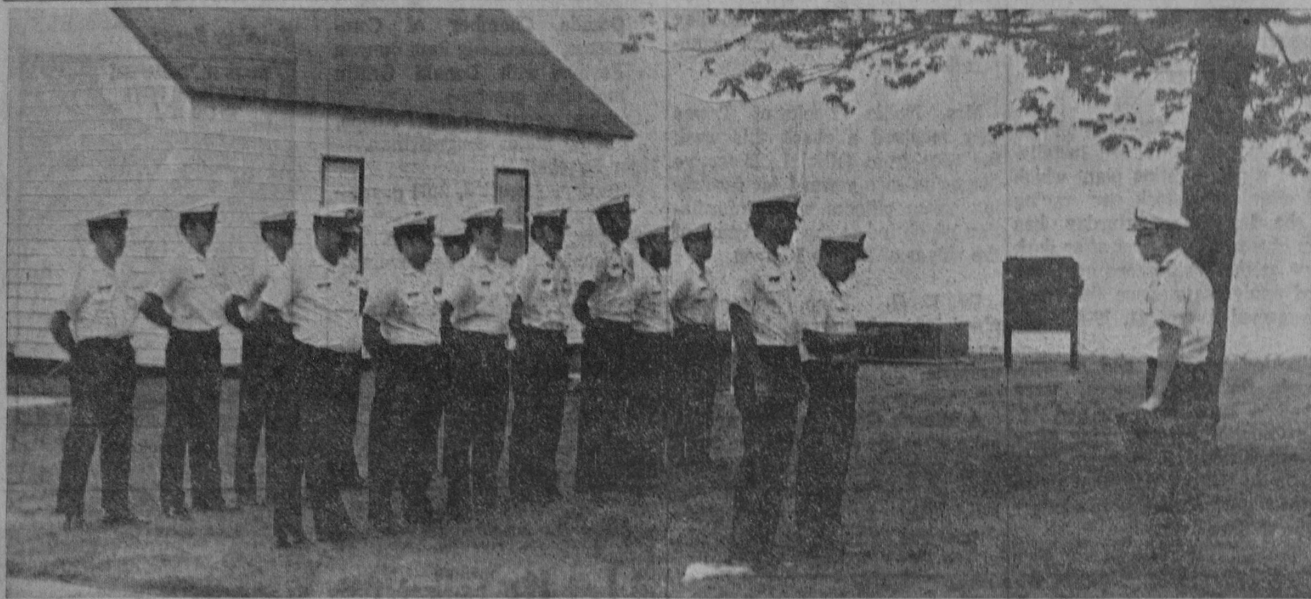

(Continued from page 1.) schooner was burning in Tawas Bay almost directly off shore from today's city park. The scene permanently engraved in her memory was the surfboat and its crew from Tawas Point pulling across the bay to rescue men aboard the burning ship. It was a beautiful sight with the men rowing in a beam of light cast by the moon reflecting on Tawas Bay.

Many changes have taken place at the Tawas Point station over the years. The original building, constructed in 1879 was enlarged in 1932 and the station was remodeled in later years. Waters patrolled by modern power boats from the local station extend from Point AuGres to Thunder Bay at Alpena, a distance of approximately 80 miles from one extremity to the other. The area actually encompassed extends out to the international boundary in Lake Huron, thus making Tawas Point responsible for the largest single area of the Great Lakes.

In addition, the station has responsibility for operating the Tawas Point lighthouse and fog signal. The lighthouse, constructed in 1876, replaced the original structure commanded by Captain Graham. The present fog signal was installed in 1970 and replaces the steam driven diaphone horn

signal, which was originally installed in 1900.

The coast guard today is a maritime law enforcement agency actively engaged in enforcing all

federal laws on the sea; during times of war, as during the recent conflict in Vietnam, the service is prepared for military duty.

The Tawas Point station pres-

ently has a complement of 17 coast guardsmen, whose primary mission still is search and rescue of human life and property on Lake Huron.
