



Clark Stays Order on Closing Trail to Motorized Vehicles

Kenton P. Clark, forest supervi-sor, has agreed to a request for a Michigan Shore-to-Shore Riding hicles. The stay, granted at the re-




quest of the Michigan Association of Recreational Snowmobiles, Incorporated, will keep the trail open to snowmobiles only. The trail will continue to remain closed to all other motorized vehicles under the closure order which became effective October 15.

"After carefully reviewing the snowmobiles, I have agreed, under certain conditions, to permit the temporary use of snowmobiles on the trail," Clark stated. "This stay will keep the trail open to snowm biles until the association has had an opportunity to present its reasons why it believes my decision to close the trail was in error."

The order that closed the trail to motorized use on October 15 was a result of a yearlong study to an-alyze the need and supply of long distance hiking and riding trails. The trail as now identified has been relocated, taken off major road and well used two-tracks, and clearly marked as a non-motorized trail.

The meeting between the United States Forest Service and the Michigan Association of Recreational Snowmobilers will be held in early January.



East Tawas. "It is a fine piece of architecture, containing upward of 80 rooms, with all of the modern appliances that have been invented in this age of progress and invention," stated one card.

The Holland had a fine ballroom for dancing and excellent dining facilities. A committee of arrangements for a holiday party held there in 1894 included George H. Chamberlain, Charles Gardner, James A. Sayles and Charles R. Lewis. Floor managers were Charles Dimmick, Albert Ash and Roy Dennis, while the reception committee consisted of Herbert K. Oakes, Roy Parker, John B. Dimmick, Thomas Hawley and W. F. McMyler.

The "age of progress and invention" had arrived with construction of the Holland, along with railroad connections with the outside world. The pioneer era had ended and with it the "grand balls" at hotels on the plains.

Today, only a brush-filled hole marks the site of the old Marsh House on State Road; a couple of apple trees and a slight indentation in the ground mark the location of the Schad House on the former route of Thompson Road.
