



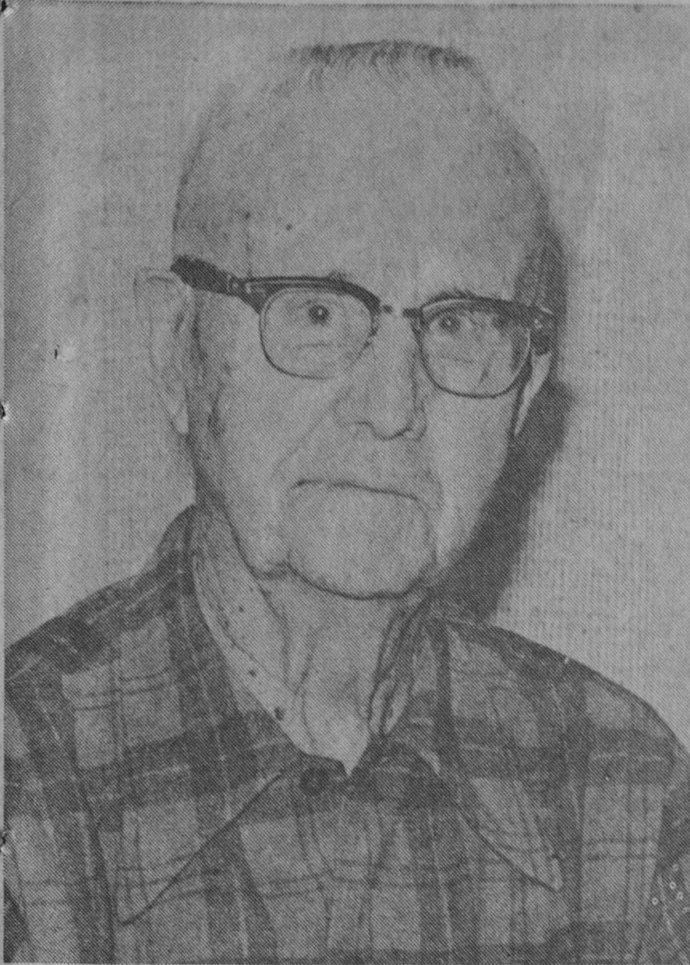

Planted First Tree in Huron

Harry Goodale Marks Birthday

Harry Goodale, the man who planted the first tree in what later became the Huron National Forest, observes his 90th birthday anniversary today (Wednesday). He and his wife, Bessie, reside in Tawas City.

Goodale was born December 29, 1886, at East Tawas. His father, Henry B. Goodale, operated the Aldine Hotel, which was located at the present site of Family Home Furnishings on Newman Street.

He still leads an active life and tends a large vegetable garden each summer. Both Goodale and his wife are avid deer hunters, although they did not "see any horns" during the past season.

Before he was 12 years of age, Goodale accompanied his family to Laurel, Mississippi, in 1898, where his father was an engineer in a sawmill. "As a northern kid, I had a tough time getting along down there and I quit school and got a job working in a store at \$4 a week," he recalls.

He worked in the office of a large general store making change for customers. When the family returned to Michigan, Harry remained in Mississippi for another 1 1/2 years. "When I returned to Michigan by railroad, I was still small enough to buy a half-fare ticket—today, parents would never allow a child of that age to be out on his own," he stated.

Goodale's father homesteaded a farm near the present county airport and operated the Henry A. Goodale farm opposite the Harry Krueger farm in Wilber Township. Harry recalls that his grandfather's farm had a unique pine board fence of almost a mile in length. He later used a portion of the board fence to build a 40 by 60-foot barn.

He worked as a drug store clerk at Detroit for a few months, then returned to this region in 1908 to work in a lumber camp near Milersburg. He married the former Bessie Cornett of Wilber Township in 1909 and she accompanied him to his new job in a lumber camp on the AuSable River. Mrs. Goodale was the camp cook.

He was employed for a brief period working on construction of Cooke Dam and learned that an examination was being given at Oscoda for employment with the newly created federal forest service. Forty men from all parts of the country entered the competitive examination and Goodale received a high recommendation after successfully passing the examination.

He went to work as a summer fire guard and planted the first Norway pine seedling at the head of Buck Creek in 1911. He later worked on construction of fire towers and the Silver Creek ranger station.

In the spring of 1916, Goodale had charge of a crew which girdled all of the oak trees on Charity Islands in the government's effort to promote the growth of pine trees on the islands of Saginaw Bay. After completing the work, Goodale and his crew returned to the mainland on November 21 aboard a commercial fisherman's boat. The return trip provided

much excitement as, due to a faulty engine, the men were stranded overnight on Saginaw Bay and had to ride out a severe storm.

Goodale was employed by the forest service until 1918. It appeared as though he was going to be transferred to Minnesota or Colorado and he decided to return to farming. He went into partnership with W. B. Piper, his former boss in the forest service, and purchased 440 acres of wild land in Wilber Township. He cleared the land and farmed it for 27 years before buying out Piper's interest.

The Goodales and their family of two boys and two girls were engaged in general and dairy farming, operating a Guernsey milk route for a number of years.

During the war years, Goodale had charge of the federal government's AAA program in this county. In 1945, they sold the farm and he entered the insurance business. It was Mrs. Goodale's desire to live on Tawas Bay so they moved to Tawas City.

"We have never had any desire to go South for the winter—we enjoy ourselves right here," said Goodale. His wife has remained active in women's social clubs.

Escaped Injury in Sand Lake Crash

A 22-year-old Saginaw man, Ronald R. Krauseneck, escaped injury Saturday when his car skidded in a parking lot and crashed into the Sand Lake General Store. Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that about \$1,300 in damage was caused to the building.

Lloyd G. Dissmore, 52, Pontiac, was treated Sunday at Tawas Hospital after receiving minor injuries in a snowmobile accident.

Tawas Boundary Petitions Filed

Atty. Brent Babcock, who has spearheaded a drive to obtain signatures on petitions asking the state boundary commission to consider revision of city limits for a proposed consolidation of Tawas City and East Tawas, presented the petitions Tuesday to state authorities at Lansing.

Babcock said that the commission would determine if the petitions were valid and, if in its opinion, any further action should

be taken. He said the next step would be for the boundary commission to contact administrations of the two communities.

A committee comprised of residents of both communities began circulation of petitions early last summer asking for a merger vote. At the present time, Tawas City is a home rule city, having adopted a new charter in 1971, while East Tawas is one of the last fourth class cities in the state.

Grant Increases to City Employees

Pay increases were granted to hourly and salaried employees of the City of Tawas City at a special meeting Wednesday of the city council.

All full time hourly employees were granted a 25-cent hourly increase, retroactive to October 17.

The librarian's salary was increased to \$3,450 annually, while a \$250 annual increase was granted bringing the office clerk's salary to \$6,050 and city treasurer's salary to \$6,250.

The city clerk's salary was increased \$200 annually, bringing that salary to \$1,400.

The city manager received a \$437 annual increase, bringing that salary to \$15,500.

A decision on the assessor's salary was tabled pending action by the East Tawas Council. Ronald Turner serves as tax assessor for each city. The council authorized

hiring Turner at his present salary and that any increase be retroactive to January 1.

In other business, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz explained how additional income received by the city from the state single business tax be included in the budget to cover additional cost of an employee retirement plan. He suggested that the balance be placed in an equipment replacement fund.

Councilman Robert Rollin urged that at the time of quarterly reports, any department which finds itself in need of additional money to approach the council with a request and an explanation.

Fire truck bids received were discussed and the council recommended that the fire department committee visit departments which are using equipment from the various companies which entered proposals with this city.

Cystic Fibrosis Run Scheduled Jan. 29

Fifth annual Cystic Fibrosis "Run for Life" has been scheduled for Saturday, January 29. Greenbush, the defending champion for the club bringing in the most money for the CF Foundation, has challenged all snowmobilers in Alpena, Alpena, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties.

This year, the 50-mile snowmobile safari will offer a choice of departure points from Tawas, Hale, Rose City, Greenbush and Oscoda with lunch at Glennie, the half way point.

Minimum sponsorship is \$10 per machine or 20 cents per mile. Trophies and prizes are to be awarded on the basis of money raised for cystic fibrosis and related lung diseases, with individual, club and community competition.

An awards dinner will take place

immediately following the run at the Glennie Tavern with special guest, Gene Riley.

Riley, the state CF campaign chairman, emphasizes that this is one of the few events in Northeastern Michigan involving a charitable organization in which snowmobilers have the opportunity to participate.

In the past, snowmobilers have brought in more than \$14,000 for the foundation. "With this money going for research to help find a cure for cystic fibrosis, children afflicted with this tragic disease will have a chance to breathe a little easier," said Riley.

Overflow Creates Beauty, but Nuisance for Utilities

Accidental overflow of the Tawas City water tank behind the city hall early Friday morning turned an old apple tree on adjacent property into a glistening piece of ice sculpture.

But, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reports he is not impressed with this type of winter beauty. It was the third "spill" since automatic controls at the city's water pumping station on First Avenue were damaged by fire earlier this month.

While awaiting receipt of new controls from a Massachusetts firm, Bublitz said Tuesday morning that the level of the water tank was now being controlled manually.

"This last overflow proved to be a real nuisance," said Bublitz. Crews of Michigan Bell Telephone Company, Consumers Power Company and General Cable Television had to be called in to repair or inspect lines which were heavily coated with ice.

Telephone cables parted under the additional weight of the heavy ice, as did a television cable serving the Lake Street area. Although power cables were stretched nearly to the ground, no breaks were reported.

All three overflows were noticed by Iosco County Sheriff's Department patrol cars and the city manager was notified—each time around 3:45 a. m.

Although East Tawas' water filtration plant provides the major source of Tawas City's water supply, well water from the First Avenue station is pumped directly into the mains due to increasing demand.

It is not expected that the problem will be alleviated until late 1977 or 1978 when an expanded water system to serve the Tawas and Baldwin Township will be completed.

Snowmobile Crash Killed Vassar Man

Marvin Lee Taylor, 37, Vassar, was among 11 persons killed in Michigan accidents over the three-day Christmas week-end.

Taylor was pronounced dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital Sunday evening by Dr. Larry S. Kelly, county medical examiner.

Oscoda Township Police Department officers said that Taylor sustained head injuries when his snowmobile went off a fire trail west of Oscoda at 6:15 p. m. The machine struck a tree.

Taylor's death is the first snowmobile fatality reported this season in Iosco County.

Hiking Trail Still Closed to Snowmobiles

Kenton P. Clark, forest supervisor, has announced that the Michigan Association of Recreational Snowmobilers, Incorporated (MARS), has withdrawn its request for a stay on his order to close the Michigan Shore-to-Shore Riding and Hiking Trail to motorized use. The original closure order, effective October 15 of this year, had permitted foot travel only on a newly relocated 45-mile section of trail.

Earlier this month, Clark had agreed to allow snowmobiles to use the trail until MARS had had an opportunity to present its reasons why it believed that the decision to close the trail to motorized use was in error. The meeting had been scheduled for January 7.

"I was very pleased to hear that MARS, the West Michigan Group of the Sierra Club and the Michigan Trailfinders had met and mutually concluded that the trail should remain closed to motorized traffic," Clark stated. "This portion of the trail on the Huron National Forest has in most part been relocated as a single track trail. The former location followed roads and well used two-tracks. These roads remain open to motorized vehicles as part of the 5,000 mile-system of similar roads on the forest."

"The forest will continue to explore the feasibility of planning and developing a shore-to-shore trail for use by snowmobiles, bikes and other motorized vehicles," Clark added.

As a result of MARS' desire to rescind its request for a meeting to review the October 15 decision to close the trail to vehicles, the closure order will remain in effect restricting use of motorized vehicles on that portion of the trail on the Huron National Forest.

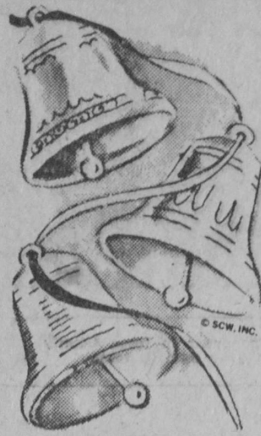

## County Reaches 38 Percent of Its Christmas Seal Goal

To date, Iosco County has reached 38 percent of its goal for the 1976 Christmas Seal campaign, reported Faith Hinton, president of Michigan Lung Association's Saginaw Valley Regional Board. The county goal is \$5,600.

The 68-year-old state organization that began as the "Michigan Association for the Prevention and Relief of Tuberculosis" broadened its scope in 1961 as other respiratory diseases such as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and asthma became more threatening to the population. But tuberculosis is by no means dormant.

The Center for Disease Control's Public Health Service reported 1,271 tuberculosis cases in Michigan last year, a case rate of 13.9 per 100,000 population. The data also shows that Michigan ranks ninth in the nation in the number of new cases of tuberculosis reported.

Because of a revision of criteria in reporting tuberculosis cases, a "case" is reported when a person has one or both of the following characteristics: Positive bacteriology or treatment with two or more anti-tuberculosis drugs. Included are persons who had disease at some time in the past and who have disease with one or both characteristics.

Tuberculosis is not the blight it used to be due to the availability of effective drugs for treatment of the disease. TB patients need no longer endure long hospital stays or the sanatorium. Rather, "they can lead normal lives and keep their jobs while taking medicine at home," said Dr. John G. Weg, president of the Michigan Thoracic Society, Michigan Lung Association's medical advisory group comprised of lung experts.

Michigan Lung Association, Michigan Thoracic Society and Department of Health, Education and Welfare advise everyone to get a tuberculin skin test at least once in his lifetime. If there is a reaction, the person should have his medical condition checked out by a doctor.

According to Doctor Weg, time

was when everyone was advised to get a chest X-ray to check for TB infection and damage; however, he said this advice has changed. "Mass chest X-ray screening for tuberculosis is a low yield practice when compared to the cost in radiation exposure and money," he said. "If your are infected with

TB, the skin test is the best and most sensitive way to identify the disease." "The Michigan Lung Association is grateful for the contribution of Iosco County residents toward the prevention and control of tuberculosis and other disabling diseases," Mrs. Hinton said.

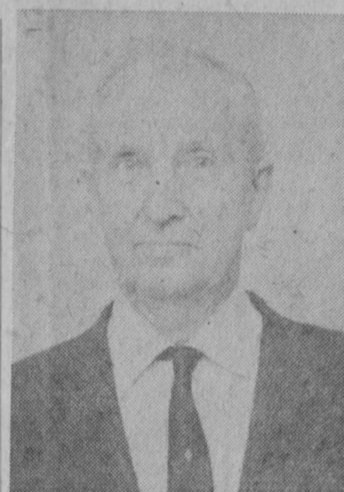

## Last Passenger Run Termed: 'DIRGE JOURNEY'

Some called it a "grief run" or "dirge journey," but there was more of a gala feeling than tears when Conductor Harvey McMurray called "all aboard" for the last time at the railroad depot in Tawas City.

It was Saturday, March 31, 1951, and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway was making its last scheduled round trip passenger run between Alpena and Bay City—67 years after Northeastern Michigan was first opened to through railroad travel.

There were some somber looks and a mood of nostalgia as the nearly 300 employees and retirees of the railroad boarded coaches at depots along the "Huron Shore Route." When the train pulled into Tawas City, the diesel locomotive at its head end was festooned with a large funeral wreath of black crepe, the thought of Norman W. Salsbury, the D&M's secretary-treasurer.

At the general office in Tawas City, employees had been planning for the occasion for days. Awaiting the train were a dozen or more persons in costumes of a long-gone era. As the train pulled into the platform, men and women rode out of the car shop on a handcar and trailer and noisily climbed aboard.

Gentlemen in top hats, derbies and frock coats and ladies in equal splendor, typical of the era in which the D&M ran its early passenger trains, boarded the cars. According to a report in The Tawas Herald, they were equipped with all types of traveling accessories, including food for the journey to Bay City. One top-hatted gentleman, A. B. Sherk, carried two long loaves of rye bread and a sack of bologna. Prepared for an emergency, they were accompanied by "Digger O'Dell," the late Arthur Dease, dressed as the friendly undertaker.

At each stop along the way, the above scene was repeated and citizens turned out in a last "let's go down to the depot" to wave farewell to their neighbors who were taking the trip. By the time the train reached the last stop north of Bay City, there were 278 persons aboard. Only five were paying passengers, one a rail fan who purchased the last ticket at Alpena, along with a businessman and his children, who were taking their first train ride.

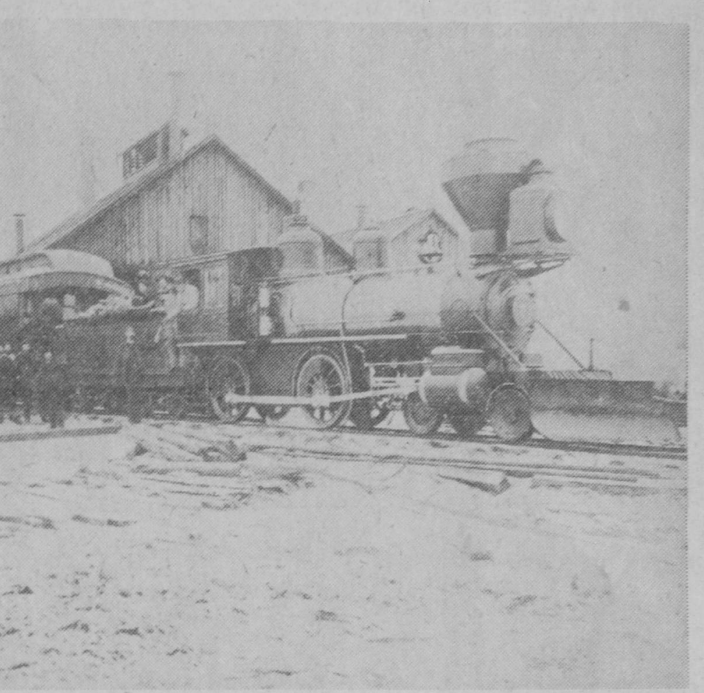
At Bay City, the passengers were guests of the railroad at a luncheon. In the afternoon, buses were provided to take them to theatres and to return them to the depot for the evening return journey.

Behind the engine rolled four mail, express and baggage cars of a vintage somewhere around World War I. Next were two Grand Trunk Western coaches, part of the regular passenger consist since 1950. Behind were three wooden cars, their faded sides bearing the name "Detroit & Mackinac," brought out for this special run.

All three—coach No. 30, parlor car No. 100 and the D&M's official car—long had cheated bonfire. Two of them were finally scrapped in the early 1960s, but parlor car No. 100 has since been sold and restored for display in a museum at Hamilton, Ohio. The cars, originally constructed in 1905, were extravagantly glorious with mahogany woodwork and lavish brass lamps.

The D&M's story began with its parent road, the Lake Huron and Southwestern Railway, begun in 1878 as a narrow gauge logging road between Tawas City and the AuGres River east of Whittemore, a distance of about 21 miles. It later became the Tawas and Bay County Railway and by 1881 boasted 28 miles of tracks, two locomotives and 100 log cars.

In 1884, the name was changed to the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad and the line was extended on the northern end to AuSable. From Prescott, an extension was built to connect at Alger with the Michigan Central. By 1886, the gauge had been widened to standard and the line extended to Alpena. Saw mills were rapidly leaving the region in the 1890s and in 1894 the railroad was sold at auction, acquiring its permanent name.

The next year found the line pushing its tracks through to Omer and Bay City and a campaign was begun to acquaint sportsmen throughout the world with the hunting, fishing and recreational possibilities of its territory. In 1902, H. K. McHarg Sr., a New York banker, purchased control and retained it until his death in 1941.

The new owner purchased heavier rail and two complete passenger trains, including 70-ton high wheeled locomotives, to open through service between Detroit, via the Pere Marquette Railroad from Bay City and Mackinac Island, via boat from Cheboygan. New equipment was placed into service in June 1905, on a schedule that made the run of 197 miles in 4½ hours, a record schedule for Northern Michigan.

The D&M reached its peak of popularity and prosperity in 1911, boasting six daily profitable passenger runs each way. In 1901, the railroad opened its famous Tawas Beach Park, one of the district's (See D&M, page 4.)

# Crop Production Energy May be Exempted from Sales Tax

Farmers using large amounts of electrical energy in crop production may be eligible for exemption from sales tax which the state started itemizing on electric bills in June.

Dr. Carl Hoyt, Michigan State University multicounty agriculture and marketing agent, and Robert L. Maddex, agricultural engineer, estimate that about 15 to 20 percent of utilities' farm customers may qualify.

There are five different ways an

agricultural producer may qualify for this sales tax exemption:

- 1) Have the power company install a separate meter to measure electrical consumption at the farm, or
- 2) If the farmer's total electrical consumption exceeds 1,500 kilowatts

per month, or 2,500 kilowatts per month for home with electric heat during November to March, the consumption in excess will be considered exempt, provided that,

- 3) The farmer provides the power supplier with the prescribed agricultural exemption certificate.
  - 4) All such claims of exemption will be on a prospective basis and subject to audit.
  - 5) The power company may convert the exempt portion of the monthly consumption to a percentage for computation purposes.
- Under each of these items, there are some considerations.

Those farmers most likely to have sales tax exemptions worthwhile are those with a lot of refrigeration, electrical heating for agricultural purposes or a large number of ventilation fans-large dairy operations, poultry operations and some swine operations. Almost all who have three-phase electric

service are on commercial accounts and would qualify for sales tax exemption.

## VA Questionnaires Mailed With Checks

More than half of the 1.2-million annual income questionnaires mailed with Veterans Administration pension checks November 1 have been returned, the agency said today. The remaining 500,000 must be received by the VA before January 1, if pension benefits are to be continued.

The questionnaires are required each year to determine continued eligibility for VA pensions, which are based on financial need. More than 2.7-million veterans and survivors are on the VA pension rolls.

Those who fail to return the questionnaire by January 1 will, in lieu of receiving their January check on February 1, receive a letter from the VA explaining why their pension payments have been suspended.

Pensions are paid to veterans and widows of veterans with non-service-connected disabilities. Amount of the monthly stipend is based on the annual income of the recipient, according to law.

Annual income limitations also govern amounts of dependency and indemnity compensation payments to certain parents of veterans who died of service-connected causes.

Pensioners 72 years of age or older, who have been on the VA rolls for two successive years, are exempt from filing the annual questionnaire. These persons are required to report income changes as they occur, a VA spokesman explained.

Some beneficiaries who ordinarily are exempt from filing will receive questionnaires because of cost-of-living increases in annuities, the spokesman added.

Complete information on the VA pension program is available from any VA office or veterans organization service officer.

most noted early resorts and excursion trains carried from 1,000 to 2,000 visitors on summer Sundays to this resort. The railroad organized the Tawas Bay Yachting association, which for years staged a nationally observed race.

With the advent of the "good roads" movement and development of the automobile, contrac-

tion of railroad passenger travel had set in by the late 1920s. Branch lines were abandoned and rail was removed. In 1929, two combination passenger, mail and express gas-electric units were purchased, as these were considered sufficient to handle the steadily decreasing traffic.

In 1933, the late Charles A. Pinkerton Sr., who started as a car clerk in 1899, became general manager and later president and general manager. In 1945, the McMurray interests were purchased and the new owners began a general rehabilitation of equipment. Charles A. Pinkerton Jr. was named president and general manager, all steam locomotives were replaced with diesels, wooden freight equipment was replaced with new steel box cars, gondolas and hopper cars. Wooden passenger equipment went into retirement and all steel baggage, mail and coaches were purchased.

Despite a passenger spurt during the war years, the pinch was beginning to be felt and passenger operation dropped to one train each way daily between Alpena and Bay City. In 1946, the line was permitted to drop its gas-electric unit and passenger revenues slipped far below operating costs. At the end, passenger service was costing the railroad \$10,000 a month.

In 1949, permission to abandon passenger service was granted by the Michigan Public Service Commission, but this was met by storms of protests all along the line. In February 1950, the line withdrew its request and contracted with the Grand Trunk Western to provide through service to Detroit, connecting with the GTW at Bay City. This run was continued for a year, but it failed to become popular and the abandonment pe-

ting to all short line railroads," said Pinkerton. "It is indicative of the change in the times that has taken place due to development of good roads and other methods of transportation. We know that the railroads cannot compete with changes in man's methods of travel; we cannot go back to the days of the 1890s, as some of us did in dress today, for we must go ahead and progress."

"We know there are many openings for railway transportation, the greatest means of mass transportation yet devised. We know, too, that the other agencies of transportation can never supplant the railroads. So, while I regret we have had to do this and this is the last 'varnish run' on our railroad, I know we will benefit in other ways," he stated.

Since 1951, the railroad has helped to spark an economy in Northeastern Michigan that continues to grow and expand. Today, the D&M is one of the most profitable short line railroads in the country, moving the products of paper mills, machine shops, lime-

stone quarries, wood product manufacturers, agricultural products, pulpwood, gypsum and is the basic mover of fuel and other supplies utilized by Wurtsmith Air Force Base. In March 1976, one of the largest land acquisitions in Michigan's history was recorded when the D&M formally assumed outright ownership or control of 182 miles of Penn Central System tracks from Bay City to Mackinaw City. The line purchased 66.7 miles of track between Cheboygan and Mackinaw City, along with tracks between Bay City and Linwood. A 105-mile section of Penn Central tracks between Linwood and Gaylord, formerly scheduled for abandonment, was leased by the D&M under a state subsidy program.

In recent years, the railroad has upgraded its equipment through the purchase of larger locomotives and new rolling stock. Associated with operation of the railroad since the fall of 1975 has been Charles A. Pinkerton III, the third generation of the family directly involved in D&M management.

With the energy crunch and oil embargoes of recent history, railroad passenger travel may again be a reality at some future date as the nation attempts to cope with one of its most perplexing problems.

In the meantime, the D&M earlier during this bicentennial year inaugurated a new charter excursion train service which could prove to be one of the most popular tourist attractions in the area's history. Many persons among the large crowds of onlookers on hand to inspect newly purchased and restored rolling stock and locomotives for the excursion train recalled the "grief run" of 1951 and are looking forward to future excursions next summer.

A number of years ago, the railroad began a program of acquisition and restoration of antique rolling stock and a steam locomotive for its round house museum. A nostalgia run by this equipment between Tawas City and East Tawas was a highlight of the community's observance of the bicentennial in 1976.

Permission to end the two passenger trains running daily was granted under an order issued February 3, 1951, leading to the "grief run" on March 31 of that year.

Conductor McMurray, with 45 years of service behind him, had as his crew: Henry Timreck, engineer; Amos Galbraith, fireman; Frank Wojewski, brakeman; Frank Ludwicak, baggagemaster. The last run had a passenger list that was once common on railroad employees' picnic trains. There were retired engineers, conductors, brakemen, telegraphers, mechanics, maintenance men, dispatchers, clerks and typists, many of whom had spent from 30 to 50 years on the railroad. There were also the younger men and women who had been filling their shoes; with most of them were their wives and husbands.

In his remarks during the luncheon at Bay City, the president and general manager explained the line's decision to discontinue passenger service: "What is happening to us is hap-
