

Mrs. Mary Byrd Resigns T. City Clerk's Position

Resignation of Mrs. Mary Byrd as city clerk was accepted Monday night by the Tawas City Council. She is to continue in her appointive position of city treasurer.

In the meantime, City Manager Reginald Bublitz is to continue as acting city clerk, a role he assumed following a council meeting last month. Mrs. Mary Bergeron is the acting deputy clerk.

Appointment of a new city clerk is to be recommended to the council by the city manager. Bublitz is to accept applications for the appointive position.

The resignation of Mrs. Byrd, who had been appointed acting city clerk in February 1972, was effective January 2, according to an announcement Monday night by Mayor Herbert Cholger. Following her last official action as city clerk in administering the oath of office to four city officials on January 1, Mrs. Byrd submitted her resignation to the mayor.

Action by Mrs. Byrd came after two stormy months following the November 4 general election. The day following that election, Tawas Concerned Taxpayers, along with three candidates supported by that group, filed a letter with the department of state charging irregularities in the election.

Although two different elections specialists were here last month to investigate the charges, no official communication has been received as yet from the election commission.

Mrs. Byrd had submitted her resignation to Bublitz following the November 25 council meeting, but the city manager refused to accept it at the time.

Appointed city clerk in February 1972 to succeed the late Walter Nelson, Mrs. Byrd assumed the dual role of clerk-treasurer under terms of the city charter which permits combining the two jobs. She had been elected to the office of city treasurer prior to the effective date of the charter and filled out the balance of her term until the elective position was officially abolished.

According to information at Monday night's council meeting, splitting the position of clerk-treasurer will make two part-time jobs. The city manager pointed out, however, that the treasurer's position holds more responsibility and work requirements than the clerk position.

Discussion by the council indicated that a new salary schedule would have to be adopted for the two positions. The clerk-treasurer position had received \$6,400 annually. Prior to combining the jobs in 1972, the clerk received \$700 annually, while the treasurer received \$800 plus one percent of taxes collected. This resulted in an annual salary of about \$4,000 for the treasurer.

When the two jobs were combined, the one percent fee for collecting taxes was dropped and the combined clerk-treasurer position was placed on an annual salary.

Mayor Cholger presented a resume from one applicant for the position of city clerk. A resident of Tawas Township, the applicant is a former employee of the City of Southfield.

Councilman James Lansky expressed the opinion that there are residents of Tawas City qualified to hold the position and believed that all applications should be studied before a successor is named.

Councilman Jerry Cotter pointed out that the charter places the responsibility on the city manager for recommending an appointee to the city council and he seconded a motion to the effect that the city manager take appropriate steps to fill the position.

Four Injured

Four visitors to Isosco County, Claire Fossill of Midland, Gilbert A. Bloedel of St. Clair Shores, William N. Walters of Sterling Heights and Roger J. Stewart of Sterling Heights were injured in snow-machine crashes during the past week. All were treated at Tawas Hospital.

Tawas Herald Marks 92nd Anniversary

The Tawas Herald observes its 92nd year of service to Isosco County this week. It was on January 10, 1884, when this newspaper made its first appearance.

In conjunction with the national bicentennial observance during 1976, a series of historical features pertaining to local events and personalities will be appearing in the columns of this newspaper. The first article appears on page 1, section 2, of this week's issue.

The Herald began its life at a time of revolutionary change in the Isosco community. Its lead front page story in the first issue chronicled an event of that change—the first passenger train had just run to Alger over the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad.

Other great changes were in sight—the forests were rapidly being depleted and attention was being called to farming, grazing, the extensive gypsum deposits, fishing and even the infant resort industry was discussed.

There have been many changes in the community and this newspaper since the day when W. N. Miller, founder, brought his printing equipment here on a flatcar of the DBC&A.

Other publishers during the past 92 years have included Michael Murphy, Len J. Patterson, James E. Ballard, P. N. Thornton and the present publishers, Nelson E. Thornton and W. Neil Thornton.

"We extend appreciation to each and every reader for interest shown in this newspaper," state the publishers. "Our gratitude also goes to our advertisers for their confidence in investing their advertising dollars with us, along with a special note of appreciation to our faithful corps of community correspondents."

East Tawas Council Studies Shade Tree Survey Proposal

A proposal by Thomas Jacques of Tawas City to conduct a shade tree survey was taken under advisement Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

Jacques, a Michigan State University forestry graduate, proposed that East Tawas consider a program in May whereby MSU forestry students would be utilized to conduct the survey. The program would be identical to one conducted in Tawas City last

spring and would cost from \$500 to \$700.

After receipt of Tawas City's shade tree survey, Jacques trained two members of the department of public works in tree trimming techniques. A similar program is being considered at East Tawas.

The proposal was referred to the council's budget and finance committee.

In other business, the council approved an allocation of \$500 for

City Council Hires Gem Surveys

Unanimous action by Tawas City Council Monday night saw the hiring of Gem Surveys of St. Clair to conduct a complete reappraisal of real estate here for assessment purposes.

Contract price for the work is to be \$9.50 per description, or about \$10,127, the same rate under which the firm is currently reappraising property at East Tawas.

Glen Mask, owner of the firm, told the council Monday night that the firm would be completing its field work at East Tawas within the next week and offered the same price per parcel while his employees were still in the area.

Last spring, Gem Surveys had proposed a price of \$12.50 per parcel to conduct the work here. The

firm later proposed a \$9.50 price to the county commission for a complete reappraisal of the county, but funds were not available. The delay since last spring resulted in about a \$3,000 saving to the city.

Work at East Tawas is to be completed in time for use by the 1976 board of review, but Tawas City's reappraisal is not to be ready until 1977.

In his remarks to the council, Mask pointed out that equalization of local property valuation for taxing purposes is a local problem. He said that factors placed on valuations by the state tax commission caused serious internal inequities for equalization in individual units.

Gem Surveys was hired by Ta-

was City about 10 years ago to conduct a complete reappraisal of the city. At the time, different equalization factors were placed on the three wards, which resulted in confusion for neighboring property owners. The county followed the city's lead and Gem was hired to conduct a complete reappraisal of the county.

Mask said that many inequities must now exist between local properties since the original survey is now 10 years old. He felt that a complete reappraisal would be advantageous to both the city and its new assessor, Ronald Turner, who serves both East Tawas and Tawas City.

Turner, who received his second level certification December 19

from the state, became Tawas City's assessor effective January 1. He was appointed to the position last month by the council.

The new assessor said he had been studying appraisal practices at East Tawas with field men from Gem Surveys and would continue in Tawas City when work commences here. He pointed out that working in the field with a professional firm was an invaluable experience for an assessing officer and one that could not be learned in books.

Turner pointed out, too, that it would simplify equalization to have both communities reappraised at the same time. Because of the time required, work can be completed by Gem Surveys in a

matter of weeks rather than a period of months required for one assessor. With the complete reappraisal, Turner said he could devote his time to keeping new file cards up to date and to conduct his own sales studies which are important in the equalization process. He stressed that such records were of great importance when the state tax commission disagrees with local property valuations.

Wilbur C. Roach, who had served as city assessor, said that equalization of Tawas City had been in "sad shape" when he assumed the position two years ago. Roach said that he and the board of review had attempted to equalize valuations. He pointed out, (See APPRAISAL, page 4.)

Delivering Baby—All in A Day's Work for Attendants

"Any other member of the ambulance service could have done the same thing as we all have the same emergency medical technician training."

Speaking was Carl Morrison, 54, a state licensed ambulance attendant at Tawas Hospital, who, on the night of Friday, December 26, attended a young East Tawas woman in the first emergency childbirth delivery of local ambulance personnel.

Although the parents of Matthew Joseph Jordan of East Tawas have lauded the quick action of Morrison, other members of the hospital staff and police officers, the ambulance attendant feels that his training "really paid off," that he just happened to be on duty at the time and that other attendants would have done the same thing.

When Morrison and Mrs. Joan McKenzie, ambulance aide, arrived at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Jordan, 415 Smith Street, shortly after 11:00 p. m. to start their December 26-27 shift, they soon discovered this was no routine ambulance run.

"There was no question that the baby had to be delivered at the

home and the mother could not be transported to the hospital for childbirth," said Morrison.

The two members of the ambulance staff quickly called the hospital for assistance, but before nurses arrived, the three-pound, nine-ounce premature baby had been delivered.

There were a number of complications involved, the most notable of which being that it was a breech birth. Immediately after delivery, the child was given cardiac pulmonary resuscitation and was rushed to the hospital in a sheriff's department patrol car, accompanied by a nurse who had arrived at the scene. A physician at the hospital attended the baby and mother, who arrived by ambulance at the hospital a few minutes later.

"Minutes seemed like hours for all of us, but the mother was most cooperative," said Morrison. "It was entirely a new experience for me and, by the time I got back to the hospital, I was ready to look for another job."

The infant was then transferred to Hurley Hospital, Flint, where the family reports Matthew Joseph

is still in intensive care, but is "doing fine."

When reporting for his 11:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m. shift Sunday, Morrison said he had to use every technique which he and other attendants have learned in the normal course of hospital training. All ambulance personnel have completed the basic course given by the American Red Cross and have completed, or are now in the process of completing, emergency medical training.

Morrison has been an instructor at the hospital in cardiac pulmonary resuscitation and has participated in cardiac classes given at the hospital by Dr. Larry S. Kelly. He had observed two emergency deliveries with a physician in attendance.

A resident of Turner, Morrison has been an employee of the hospital for six years. Prior to that, he was a school bus driver at Oscoda, an ambulance driver for Warren Bennett of Oscoda and served 20 years in the army.

"I am just grateful for the training and that everything turned out OK," said Morrison. Parents of little Matthew Joseph Jordan have the same feelings.

Study Proposed Rules of Order for City Council Meetings

Councilman William Ezo, who was elected mayor pro tempore of Tawas City Monday night, recommended that the council establish formal rules to maintain order during its meetings. His suggestion received unanimous support of the council.

Ezo said that council meetings during the past 1½ years had been severely disrupted by persons in

attendance, which served no constructive purpose and prevented the council from performing its duties as duly elected representatives of the city.

He felt that established rules would provide for orderly and civil meetings without "catcalls" and other derisive actions from the audience, which he said had disrupted some past meetings while the council was attempting to conduct its business.

The councilman said that meetings are open to the public, but they are not public hearings. He felt, however, that citizens in attendance should be given the right to address the council at the beginning of each meeting, either through advance notice or through recognition by the presiding officer.

"I am not trying to stifle anyone, or eliminate participation in city business by citizens, but I feel that there should be something down in black and white to make the job easier for the mayor to conduct meetings," said Ezo.

A list of recommendations concerning establishment of formal rules of order was turned over to the city manager and are to be discussed at the next council meeting.

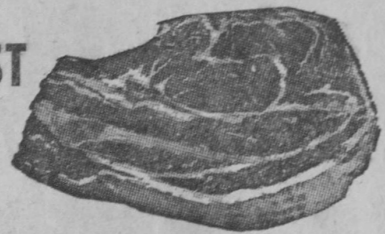

Iosco's General Fund Finished Year With Deficit, as Predicted

A prediction last fall by County Treas. Edward Nelkie indicating that the county general fund would end 1975 with a deficit has proven to be accurate.

According to a preliminary year end financial report Monday by the treasurer's office, the general fund had a deficit of \$9,450.38 when the books were closed December 31. This amount is nearly

\$2,000 more than anticipated by the treasurer.

Nelkie emphasized, however, that when the total budget of slightly more than one-million-dollars is taken into consideration, the actual deficit is minimal.

The treasurer said that he would not have his complete financial report ready for submission to the county board of commissioners until next week. The report is to be

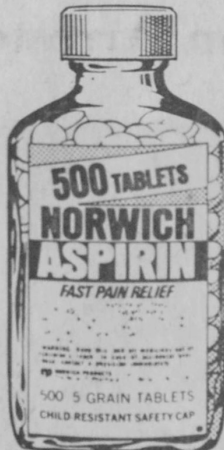
Audubon Held Christmas Bird Count

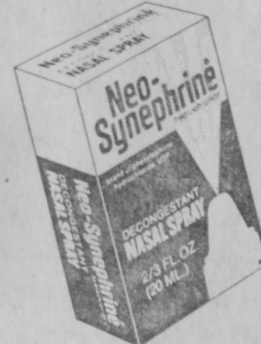

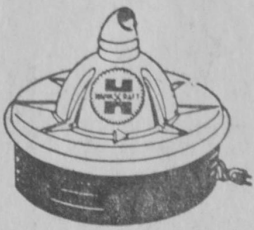

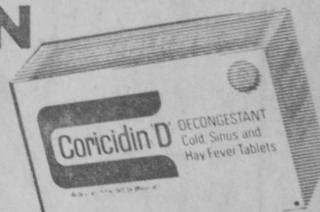

however, that the state had added a six percent factor last year and another increase could be expected this year. The former assessor asked the council to give serious consideration to hiring Gem Surveys and supported the action.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz felt that hiring of the appraisal firm would be a wise move. He said the cost was not included in the current budget, but felt that it could be financed through use of federal revenue sharing money or tax anticipation notes.

The city is to make an initial payment of \$3,000 for the work and payment of the balance is to be made during the year.

Should the county commission decide to have a complete reappraisal, it is expected that the city would be reimbursed or credited at the same rate for other units.

TC Council to Discuss Parking Plan With Property Owners

A special meeting is to be held Monday night by the Tawas City Council to discuss a proposed parking lot west of the county building with property owners in that area.

Although the council is particularly interested in hearing from property owners involved in the proposal, which has been under consideration for months, others interested would not be excluded from the informal discussion.

Mayor Herbert Cholger said Monday night that he was very much interested in seeing off-street parking and business developed along Lake Street, but he had some reservations concerning use of the Bergeron and Prescott property.

Cholger expressed the opinion that the city should take a long range look at parking, which he said presently lacks sufficient potential to support an adequate business district. He felt that development of the Baldwin Centre business area, as well as development of proposed shopping centers in other nearby areas, could lead to an eventual loss of tax base for both Tawas City and East Tawas.

The mayor felt that alternate plans should be considered for parking, including development of the west end of the city park and location of parking across the river from the business district between Whittemore Street and Mathews Street. He felt that foot bridges could possibly be used to connect parking areas with the business district. Although admitting that such a development would be costly, he believed it could provide potential for development by outside sources.

In any event, Cholger was of the opinion that the city should exercise its options on the Bergeron and Prescott property and retain the site for parking and eventual location of a new city hall.

The city has until September 1 to decide if it wishes to purchase the two parcels at a cost of \$70,000.

Force Main Finally Gets State OK

Construction of a force main between the Second Avenue lift station and the waste water treatment plant has received state approval, according to the Tawas City Water Board. The project had been approved by voters two years ago, but had been delayed until approval was received from the state.

According to City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz, the water board is now studying a change in the project which would see use of ductile iron pipe for the main rather than use of asbestos cement pipe. If such a change is adopted, an additional expenditure of about \$12,000 would be required.

Route of the force main is along the railroad tracks. The main would be constructed at a depth of 4 1/2 feet and it is felt that vibration along the tracks would require use of the iron pipe.

The matter is to be studied further by the water board and city manager before any action is taken.

The water board adopted a policy that any new water and sewer connections requested and initiated by a customer must have payment arrangements made in advance or before the service becomes available.

Delinquent water and sewer connections have been reviewed and the board directed the city manager to notify those accounts which are delinquent to settle with the city within 30 days.

Lake Solitude Mystery Under Investigation for Bicentennial

L. G. (Ladd) McKay of East Tawas admits he is not a history "sleuth," but he has taken on the task of attempting to solve the legend of Lake Solitude—once and for all, he hopes.

Four months ago, McKay was appointed chairman of a committee to conduct an investigation into a legend which has persistently involved the small inland lake near East Tawas. It was felt by the Tawas Area Bicentennial Committee that 1976 would be a fitting year to set the record straight—if it could be accomplished.

Interest in the local legend concerning the possibility that remains of LaSalle's "Griffin" might be hidden in Lake Solitude was revived three years ago when the late Edna Otis of East Tawas included a chapter on the subject in her book, "Sawdust Days."

Although the local historian-author expressed personal doubts that remains of the old ship would be found here, she pieced together information gleaned from many sources to write the legend and hoped it would be substantiated in the future.

Shortly after McKay undertook the project last fall, the legend received a death blow when it was announced that remains of LaSalle's ill fated ship had been located in the Georgian Bay area.

The legend began in 1679 when Lasalle, the French explorer, and his followers constructed a 45-ton ship, 60 feet long and 20 feet wide and set sail for Green Bay, Wisconsin. After completing the first

leg of a hazardous journey, the ship was loaded with furs and sails were set for the return trip to New York with a crew of five sailors and a pilot.

Two days later, a violent storm swept the Great Lakes and the Griffin was never again heard from, but its fate has been a mystery for three centuries.

For at least three generations, the origin of a slowly rotting ship said to be in Lake Solitude has been a topic of weighty controversy among local residents. A number of residents, recalling the days of their youth prior to 1900, reported they had seen what appeared to be the ribs of an old ship in the mud of Lake Solitude; others recalled seeing a hulk in Mud Creek, later Pond Lilly Creek, which is about a yard wide and connects Lake Solitude with Tawas Bay; still others were of the opinion that if, in fact, the rotting "hulk" did exist, it was entirely a hoax perpetrated by local practical jokers.

Out of years of discussion has come nothing but conjecture, but the legend was revived during the 1962 centennial observance at East Tawas, one person reported he had seen the old ship while flying over the area prior to World War II.

William Stonehouse, veteran caretaker for Tawas Beach Club, owner of Lake Solitude, reported in the early 1970s that, in all of his

years of roaming the Tawas Point area, he had never seen anything that resembled a ship in Lake Solitude.

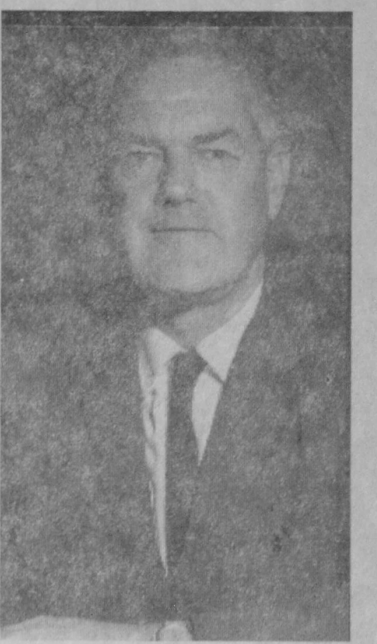
Theories have been presented over the years that Lake Solitude may have once been an arm of Lake Huron; that a violent storm may have driven a ship into the shallow water or through what then may have been a more pretentious Mud Creek; that receding water had caused Lake Solitude to become an inland lake.

McKay said last week that it is difficult to believe that the tiny inland lake contains the wreckage of any ship.

Some people are of the opinion that mention of a "mystery hulk" would have been included in the "History of the Lake Huron Shore" published in 1883, inasmuch as the Josco portion was written by James O. Whittemore, who accompanied his father to Tawas Bay and helped to found Tawas City in 1854. Whittemore touched on other historical aspects of the area in the book, including mention of an Indian burial mound near the area in question.

It seems difficult to believe, too, that the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, which once operated a public park on Tawas Point in the early 1900s, would not have exploited such a story—if it had been around at that time.

McKay said last week that he had received permission from directors of Tawas Beach Club to conduct an on-site investigation in an effort to clear up the mystery.

He has enlisted the assistance of a number of young Tawas area friends in this project and field work is to begin during the winter.

In the meantime, McKay is interested in receiving information from anyone who may be able to shed some light on the mystery, particularly from old-timers, who may recall seeing the rotting hulk of an old ship.

As a starter, a number of newspaper clippings from the 1920s, along with original letters from two persons who, in 1925, claimed to have seen the rotting hulks, one as late as 1914, are to be turned over to the local history sleuths to aid in the investigation.

McKay admits that nothing may ever become of the research, but he felt it would be a good project for the bicentennial year.

"I have acquired several maps showing the Tawas Bay and Lake Huron area in the 1840s, which will be used in our preliminary work," he stated.



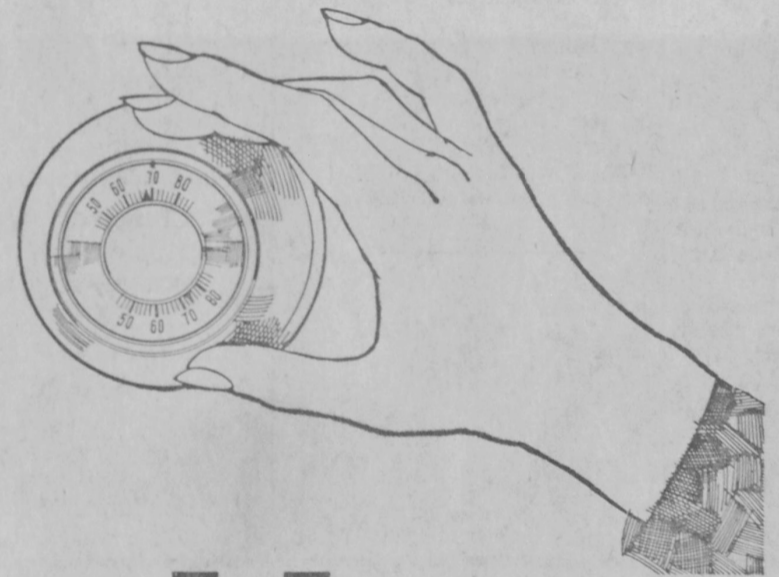

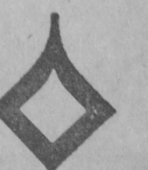

Horse Buying An Obligation for Family

"We are not trying to discourage people from buying horses but make them more aware of the responsibilities that go with keeping one," Dunn says.

NEWS ABOUT WHIPPING CREAM

A number of dairies in Michigan are offering their customers the convenience and security of "ultra-pasteurization" . . . a process that extends freshness beyond the average six-day period for whipping cream and half and half. This process extends the life from between 30-60 days. When reading the date stamped into the tops of whipping cream or half and half cartons one may, at first glance, think there is an obvious error in the last recommended date of sale listed.

Ultra-pasteurization is a high-speed heat process that destroys the microorganisms that cause spoilage in dairy products. In the three-step process, the cream is sterilized; the cartons (which are lined with foil because of the high temperatures involved) are sterilized, and the two are brought together and sealed under sterile conditions.

Dairy products processed this way will remain sweet and uncontaminated for up to 90 days, but most dairies use a recommended last date of sale between 30 and 60 days beyond the actual date of packaging. The forward date applies only so long as the packages remain unopened. Once the seal is broken, ultra-pasteurized whipping cream and half and half are as vulnerable to souring as conventionally processed products. However, the extended refrigerator life of the unopened cartons allows the convenience of buying ahead and assuring against the disappointment of running out of an important ingredient in mid-meal or mid-recipe. It also allows buying when products are on special, as they traditionally are at holiday time.

Some consumers have found that ultra-pasteurized whipping cream takes longer to whip than conventionally processed cream. Dairies recognize this difference and most include special instructions for its use. They recommend thoroughly shaking before use and that the

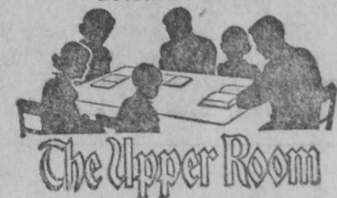
user attempt to whip no more than one-half-pint at a time, using a chilled bowl and chilled beater blades.

If the total amount of whipping cream cannot be used in the recommended time after it is opened, simply whip the remainder and freeze dollops of whipped cream for use on other desserts and beverages later. Freeze the spoonful of whipped cream on waxed paper lined cookie sheets until frozen and package in plastic bags. Keep frozen for future use, which should be within two to eight weeks.

This ultra-pasteurization process has already brought a lot of questions from consumers who can hardly believe their eyes when they see the much longer dates. Once they have tried the product and kept it unopened, they have been extremely pleased with the "rightness" of the date.

European consumers have long been able to purchase sterilized whole milk that can be stored without refrigeration. American dairymen could market a shelf-stable product now that is similar to the European versions, but the slight "cooked" flavor makes it unacceptable to American consumers. With modifications in this new ultra-pasteurization technique, better quality sterilized whole milk could soon be available in this country. If so, the changes in American dairy marketing will be dramatic. Keep watching labels closely.

Jesus said we must die before

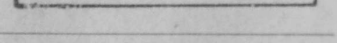

Social Security Sets State Cash Record

A record \$2,867,000,000 was paid out in social security cash benefits to residents of Michigan in calendar year 1975 according to John Carr, social security district manager. This was an increase of \$377,000,000 over the total paid out in 1974.

An eight percent benefit increase effective June 1975, an increased number of people on the social security rolls and benefits payable based on high average earnings all contributed to the increased payments.

Of the social security benefits paid to beneficiaries in Michigan during 1975, \$1,764,000,000 went to retired workers and their dependents and \$714,000,000 to the survivors of workers who have died. Another \$388,000,000 was paid to severely disabled workers and their dependents.

Nationally, social security cash benefit payments in 1975 totaled 67-billion dollars. This was about

8.4-billion dollars higher than the previous year.

"At the end of December 1975, approximately 32-million men, women and children were receiving monthly social security benefits. The number of persons on the benefit rolls increased by over a million during the course of the year," Carr stated.

"Social security is not only a program for the elderly," Carr said. Almost 24 percent of all beneficiaries are under age 60, and 15 percent are under the age of 22.
