Special Education Director Resigns

Foster Eid, director of special education for Iosco Intermediate School District for the past three years, resigned effective July 30. He is to become director of special education for Eaton County Intermediate School District.

In a prepared statement released Monday, Eid said: "I find

I cannot remain in this capacity under present working conditions or an educational atmosphere that is, at times, cloaked in apathy." Eid said it is very difficult "to see fine, young educators and supportive interoffice personnel grow, nurture and develop, only to see them become more and more frustrated and seeking employment in other districts that will more effectively utilize their talents."

Eid said he leaves with no regrets, but with some sadness, "for not only myself but my family, who have totally enjoyed this fine community. We hope that in the near future, the intermediate school district's excellent potential, both educationally and as an educational leadership organization, will be realized and used productively."

Owosso Man Drowned in Long Lake

A 58-year-old Owosso salesman, George R. Wesolek, drowned Saturday evening in Long Lake, Plainfield Township.

Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that the victim, who was vacationing at the lake, apparently had finished his evening meal only a few minutes before entering the water.

Witnesses believed he suffered a cramp and drowned in about 15 feet of water. The body was recovered by persons on shore and mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration was attempted.

East Tawas to Extend Water Main

Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which last month allocated a portion of the county's revenue sharing money to local units, last week authorized the City of East Tawas to use \$8,265 of its allotment to extend a city water main.

The project, part of an economic development plan, would extend city water from Tom Dillon Park out Wadsworth Street to Fox Street and across to the American House development. The revenue sharing money would cover only a portion of the cost of the project and the remainder would be financed by the city.

Sewer Hookups Urged by Board

Property owners who have not hooked up to new sanitary sewer constructed in Tawas City within the past year are being notified to do so within 90 days.

This action was taken at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Water Board, which reviewed the city's ordinance and past policies requiring such connections.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that 20 property owners in three special assessment districts had not connected as yet to sewer mains. Included are 15 dwellings, four commercial buildings and one motel.

Bublitz said that the 10 dwellings included five summer cottages and two older structures which were no longer occupied.

It was pointed out by the water board that the ordinance establishing the three special assessment districts stated that the sanitary sewer had been deemed a public necessity for health reasons by the city council.

Under established city policy, property owners have one year in which to make connections after a sewer is constructed.

The resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote of the water board with "yes" votes cast by Jack Bronson, Guy Lickfelt, Harold Bublitz, Herbert Blust and Del Myles. Jerry Snoblen, a member of the board, was absent.

In other business, the water board adopted a resolution requesting the city council to allocate \$15,000 in federal revenue sharing funds to supplement a

\$41,000 general obligation bond issue approved by voters for construction of a sewer force main between the Second Avenue pumping station and the sewage disposal plant.

The bond issue was adopted a number of years ago but approval was not received from the state health department until last spring. Since the project was originally proposed, the cost was advanced to \$65,000.

It was the general feeling of the water board that the general public should not be penalized due to the delay and believed the project was entitled to supplemental funds through revenue sharing.

A request for construction of 450 to 500 feet of water and sewer mains on Twelfth Avenue north of Fourth Street was taken under advisement by the water board. The sewer main would be constructed under formation of a special assessment district.

The city manager is to study city finances available for construction of the water main and report back to the board at its next regular meeting.

A. Barry McGuire, formerly of Tawas City and presently the executive director of the Michigan Association of Counties, was toastmaster.

Gould, who took an active part in community affairs during his nearly 40 years as an East Tawas

businessman, is a former president of the East Michigan Tourist Association, served as the first president of Tawas Area Board of Education, conceived and helped to carry out the idea for the establishment of Perchville as an ice fishing village, served as president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was active on the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee and served on the Tawas Harbor Commission, to name only a few of his activities here.

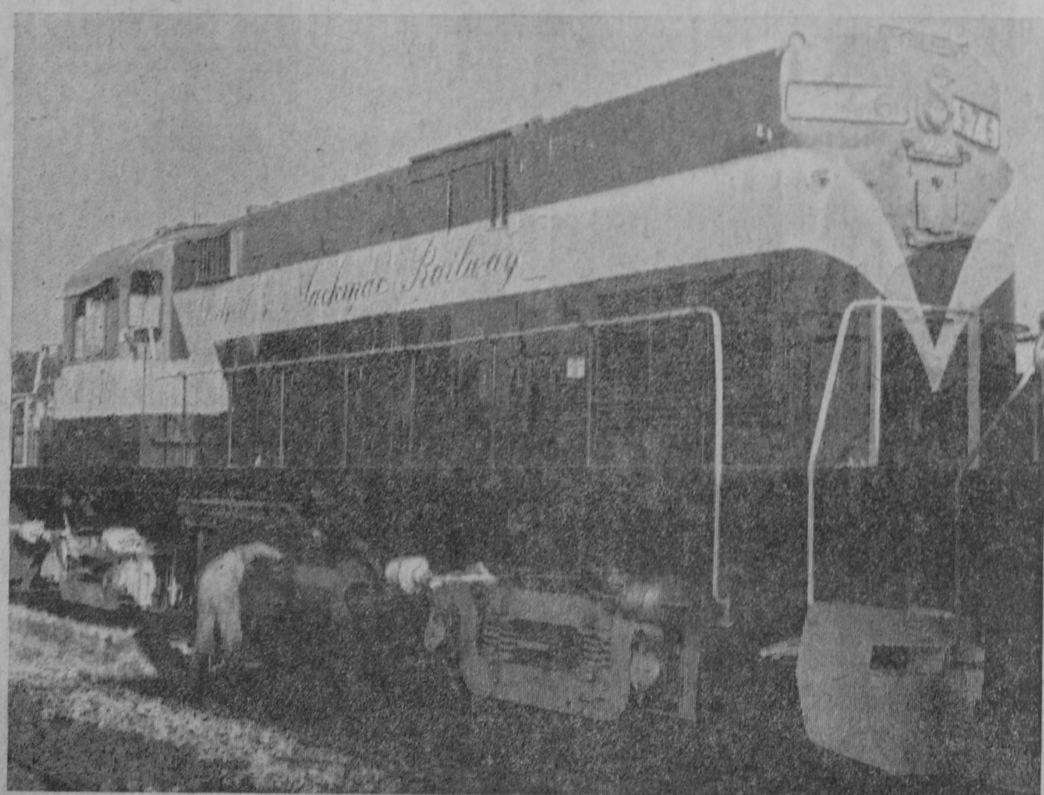

Speakers included William Palmer, president, East Michigan Tourist Association; Robert Bolen, mayor of East Tawas; Jerry Cot-

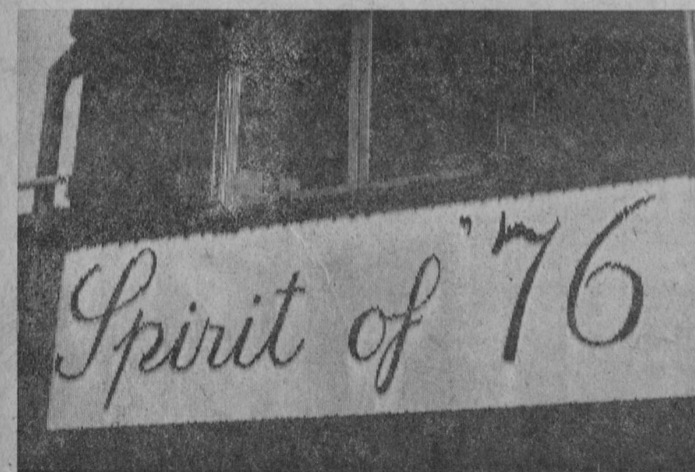

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I would like to make a few comments in regard to your news item, "Attorney General's Opinion Under Question by Iosco County," which appeared in the July 7 issue of The Tawas Herald.

I have attended the Wilber Board of Review meetings for the past four years and have never found Mr. Olsen to be in attendance at any time I was there.

A check of the county payrolls for the board of review dates for the past year will show Mr. Olsen drawing full county pay as appraiser for the county equalization department. According to the opinion of the state attorney general, one of Mr. Olsen's duties as a township supervisor is to serve as secretary to the board of review.

Now, if Mr. Olsen is paid to be a secretary to the board of review and is also paid to be an appraiser for the county equalization department, I am forced to feel that he is drawing double pay during the time his two jobs are in conflict.

In 1974, Mr. Olsen hired a local woman to serve as secretary to the Wilber Board of Review. However, Mr. Olsen didn't pay her for taking his place; the taxpayers paid her salary to the tune of \$150.

When I attended the 1975 board of review and asked to speak with

Mr. Olsen, I was informed that Mr. Olsen was on his "other job" at the courthouse, but he had the telephone hooked up so the board members could call him if they needed his opinion on anything. Once again the taxpayer paid the bill for the phone hook-up—another unnecessary expense due to Mr. Olsen holding conflicting jobs.

Of more importance to Wilber taxpayers: As township supervisor and assessor, Mr. Olsen sets the township valuations for taxing purposes. Then his boss, the director of the county equalization department uses Mr. Olsen's figures to request that the county commissioners increase the valuations in Wilber. How two men can look at such different answers is questionable. However, it isn't hard to understand why the Wilber taxpayers get such poor representation on their tax assessments when you consider Mr. Olsen's position. He can hardly afford to take issue with the director of equalization, who is his boss.

This conflict of interest issue dates back about four years when Mr. Olsen was hired by Mr. Oates who was the director of the equalization department. When I got no satisfaction from Mr. Oates, I took the matter to the state attorney general. The wheels of justice move slowly, but on June 15, 1976, Opinion No. 5050 was issued by the state attorney general: "...the offices of county assessor and township supervisor are incompatible." On July 7, 1976, the

county board of commissioners refused to uphold the state attorney general's opinion.

Since I firmly believe that no man can serve two masters, I am bringing this matter back to the attention of the state attorney general.

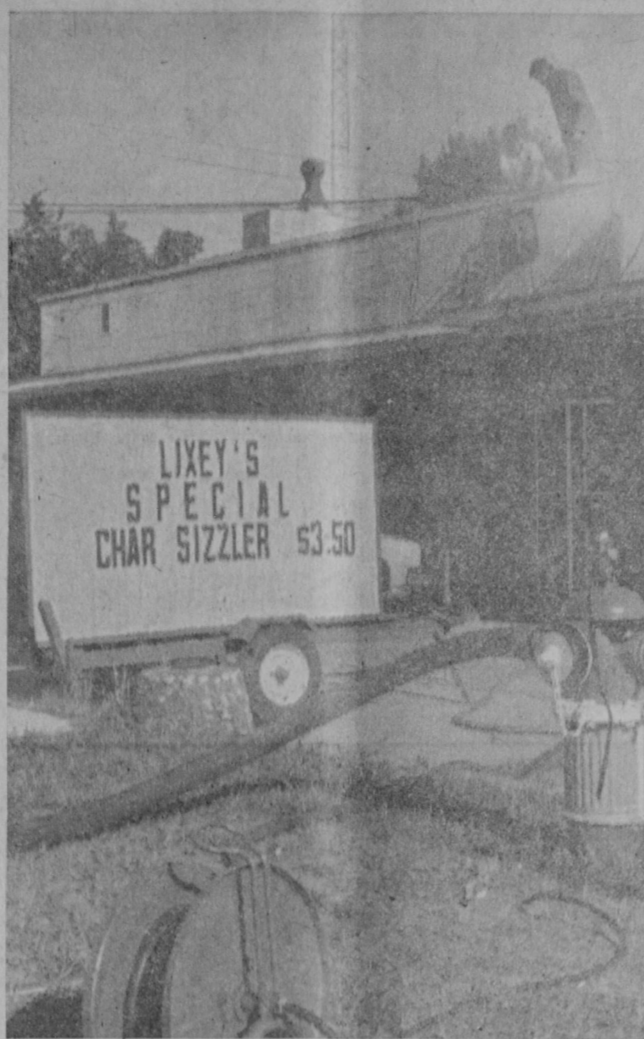

The gymnasium was entered and a can of pop was spilled on the floor, but nothing was found to have been stolen.

TC Water Board Adopts Budget

A budget of \$83,000 for 1976-77 was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Water Board. The budget was to have been adopted several months ago, but action was delayed while a study was being made on new water rates.

Under the new receipts budget, \$74,000 has been established as the figure to be received from water sales. Actual receipts from water sales during 1975-76 amounted to \$59,328 and the increase reflects the added cost of the Tawas area water improvement project, which

did not come into being until the current year.

Rates are to be designed so as to provide the necessary income to pay the city's share of the project. The total Tawas City share is estimated at \$23,000 per year with a portion of this, or about \$9,000, to be raised by millage and the balance of \$14,000 through increased water rates.

A \$41,000 budget was adopted for the sewer department, as compared to actual expenditures of \$47,826 during the past year.

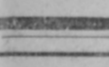

Annual Four-Day Event

Iosco County Fair Opens Today

It is fair time in Iosco County and this year's event has a bicentennial theme.

The 33rd annual Iosco County Fair opens today (Wednesday) at Hale and all of the traditional features of the county fair program are there—from livestock judging, harness racing, youth horsemanship events, displays of farm produce and big midway, to a parade and games for all ages.

The fair is a county-wide event and exhibitors have been urged to participate from each section of the county. Of particular interest is the bicentennial theme for the 1976 county fair and several special events have been added to the program.

"Our program is designed to provide fun for families and gives an outlet for persons interested in exhibiting farm crops, farm animals, homemade items or displays of antiques—but, in order to call this fair a success, we need the attendance and interest of a large segment of Iosco's citizens," said Richard Samson, veteran fair manager.

The county fair has a long tradition in Iosco, dating back to 1875 when the first event was held in the Tawasites. It was held here every year until 1931. In 1944, the Iosco County Agricultural Society was organized and the annual fair

was established at Hale. With each succeeding year, improvements have been made to the grounds and program.

The four-day program opens today at 9:00 a. m. with assembling of exhibits at Plainfield Township Hall and various other buildings on the grounds. The giant midway opened Tuesday and is to continue to operate until Saturday.

A pony pull contest is scheduled Wednesday, 7:00 p. m., at the grandstand. For Michigan teams only, rules of Pioneer Pony Pullers, Incorporated, will govern events. Lightweights, 900 to 1,100 pounds, will be run first, followed by heavyweights, 1,100 to 1,300 pounds. In addition to cash prizes for the first 12 places in each division, the two best dressed teams of ponies of each weight class will receive a first and second place trophy. The first 10 winners in each class will receive ribbons.

Thursday's program includes judging of all 4-H exhibits except horses and judging open class horses.

Friday is a big day in the lives of Iosco 4-H Club members, who have been grooming mounts and practicing for horsemanship events for weeks. Events are to be staged at the fairgrounds arena.

Saturday is the traditional "big day" for fairgoers. The program starts at 10:00 a. m. with games and contests for all ages. There will be pie eating contests, sack races, foot races for children, a foot race for "junior" citizens between the

ages of 60 and 62, a foot race for senior citizens over the age of 62, bicycle races and an egg throwing contest.

The third annual fat steer sale featuring animals grown by Iosco youths will be held at 7:00 p. m. Persons desiring to purchase outstanding animals for the freezer should be on hand to participate in the bidding.

Grand finale to the fair will be a bicentennial fireworks display at 10:00 p. m. by the Independent Fireworks Company.

A total purse of \$14,000 will be awarded owners of winning horses in harness racing events, a traditional event at county fair time. The fair is a member of the Northern Michigan Fair and Racing Association and United States Trotting Association rules govern the events.

There will be 10 races in all under the two-heat plan and each heat is considered a race. A starting gate will be used. Racing starts at 2:00 p. m. Money is divided according to placing, 45, 25, 15 and 10 percent.

Thursday's racing opens with a trot for nonwinners of \$2,000, six years and under; a pace for nonwinners of \$3,000, six years and under; a pace for nonwinners of \$10,000.

On Friday, there will be a trot for nonwinners of \$500, five years and under; pace for nonwinners of \$500, four years and under, pace for nonwinners of \$1,500.

Saturday's program features four races and top horses will be entered. The first race will be a trot for nonwinners of \$5,000, followed by a pace for nonwinners of \$5,000, a trot for nonwinners of \$20,000 and pace for nonwinners of \$20,000.

The bicentennial theme of the fair will be carried out in historical displays in one exhibition building, where valuable antiques are protected by a storefront dis-

play area. This building also features displays of arts and crafts.

The thrills of midway rides and carnival games will attract several thousand persons during the program, all provided by Skerbeck Brothers Shows, Incorporated. Special reduced prices are offered Wednesday and Thursday from 12 o'clock noon to 5:00 p. m. by presentation of free tickets which are available from merchants in the area.

Handling arrangements for the annual fair has been a board of directors of the Iosco County Agricultural Society with Gerald Bellen of Whittemore as president.

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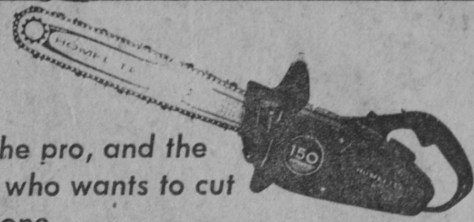

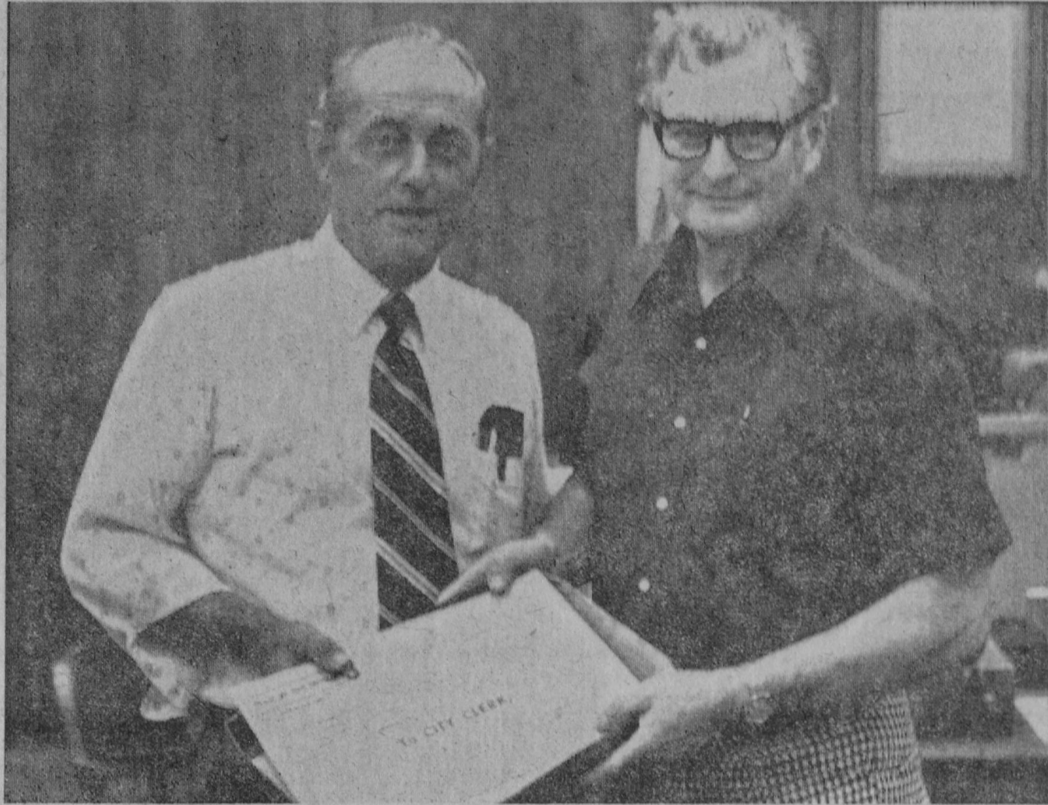

Important Township Races Are Featured

Four townships of Iosco County have races listed on the August 3 partisan primary ballot and six townships will have races in the November general election. Special proposals are to be submitted to voters of at least two townships.

PLAINFIELD TOWNSHIP
 Four candidates seek the nomination of supervisor in three different parties in this township. The list is headed by Ray Kesler, retired school superintendent, a Republican; Lawrence J. Bleeda and Robert W. Pember seek the Democratic nomination and Rob Holzheuer is a candidate on the American Independent Ticket.

Frances Hansen is Republican candidate for clerk and will be opposed by either Richard F. Dobson or Elizabeth (Betty) Timmer, who seek the Democratic nomination. Barbara Malcho is unopposed for the Democratic nomination as township treasurer and Lyle Bielby is unopposed as a Republican seeking re-election to a four-year trustee position.

Candidates for the one constable slot are Norma J. Dobson, Sharon L. Graves and Leon Brunson, all on the Democratic Ticket.

OSCODA TOWNSHIP
 Republicans are campaigning actively at Oscoda, where three candidates are listed for each office with the exception of trustee. Charles E. Smith, incumbent supervisor and a veteran campaigner, is opposed by Robert K. Foster and Rex E. Walters. Foster presently serves as chairman of the county board of commissioners.

Candidates for township clerk include the incumbent, Harry J. Samotis, along with Karen L. Smith and Edward J. Tate. Florence Krefeld, incumbent treasurer, is opposed by Maxine F. Bissonette and Stanley L. Kowalski.

Two trustees are to be named to four-year terms from the following list: Oscar DiLoreto, William C. Christman and Charlot Lee. Glenn C. Highfield is unopposed for the two-year term of trustee.

ALABASTER
 Three races are listed in Alabaster Township's primary election and one race will feature the general election in November. H. Harry Rapson, incumbent supervisor, is opposed by Robert H. Crawford for the Republican nomination. Hope V. Rescoe, incumbent township clerk, is unopposed on the Democratic Ticket but will meet Jeanne L. Fairfield, a Republican, in the general election.

Leona Benson, incumbent treasurer, is being opposed for the Republican nomination by John H. Weible, former township supervisor. Fannie M. Walstead, William H. Lingle and Ralph Rohrbach all seek the Republican nomination to one four-year trustee position. Harry Wellna is unopposed for the Democratic nomination as constable.

RENO TOWNSHIP
 Two races are listed in Reno Township's primary. John D. Webb Jr., incumbent supervisor, is to be opposed for the Republican nomination by James Dobson. Seeking the Republican nomination as treasurer are Winona Redmond and Jimmie Kilbourn, while Laura Kaiser is a Democratic candidate for treasurer. James L. Robinson is unopposed for the four-year term of trustee on the Republican Ticket.

AUSABLE TOWNSHIP
 One race is listed on Ausable Township's primary ballot on the Republican Ticket. Rhea Matthews, incumbent trustee, is being opposed by Raymond A. Andrus. Unopposed are Terry A. Palminter, supervisor; Mornelva Snitchler, clerk; Mary Spencer, treasurer. Candidates for two constable positions are Armin H. Godt and Donald J. Marcoullier.

SHERMAN TOWNSHIP
 One race is listed in Sherman (See ELECTION, page 8.)

Primary Election Has Plenty of Candidates

Twenty-five candidates seek election to 12 different local offices making the 1976 primary election on Tuesday, August 3, one of the "hottest" campaigns in recent history.

Congressional and legislative races on Republican and Democratic sides of the ballot, coupled with several races for township office nominations, township propositions and two county millage proposals, should keep election

boards busy counting ballots well into the next day following the election.

What will happen on election day, however, is unpredictable as voters have notoriously avoided the polls in some primary elections, despite races for nominations. For example, Iosco County's primary election in 1972 featured seven candidates for sheriff, four

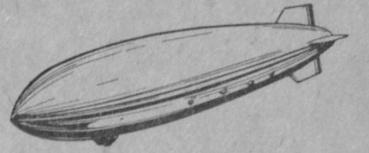

PREACHER'S CRAZY SCHEME REVOLUTIONIZED WARFARE

During the 119-year history of Iosco County, a few of its residents have gained national recognition, only to be forgotten with the passage of time.

One example is Walter Marr, who grew up at East Tawas and spent his youth watching men working at the local foundry rather than attending school. In later life, his interest in things mechanical saw him inventing a valve-in-head engine and he later developed an automobile called the Marr. The name was later changed to Buick and a factory established at Flint helped to put the world on wheels.

Marr's story has not been forgotten as it was recalled by the late Edna Otis in her book, "Sawdust Days."

This story is about an inventor who played an important part in the allies' defense against German submarines during World War I. He was from Iosco County and, of all things, he was a Methodist preacher! The story has not received ink since 1936, when it was recalled by the late P. N. Thornton, editor-publisher of The Tawas Herald, a former resident of Hale.

The Rev. John R. Stillwell is remembered by only a few old-timers today at Hale. John Webb of Londo Lake Road west of the four corners on M-65 recalls that Stillwell came to Hale in 1907, was the second Methodist preacher there and was responsible for holding church services in the old township hall rather than utilizing a previous building sharing arrangement with the Baptist Church.

"During his visits to our home, he took a great interest in me because I could beat him at checkers," said Webb. "He thought I should really go places," chuckled the retired rural mail carrier.

Although a picture does not exist today of Stillwell, Webb said the image of the preacher's face and black beard is still indelibly engraved in his memory. He recalls that Stillwell owned 160 acres of land northeast of Hale and, that when it came time for him to leave Plainfield Township, he tried to sell the property to Webb's brothers.

"In those days, everyone thought the land was useless for farming and it remained in Stillwell's hands for a number of years," said Webb. He recalled seeing him in later years and that the preacher received brief international acclaim, the reason for which presently escapes his memory.

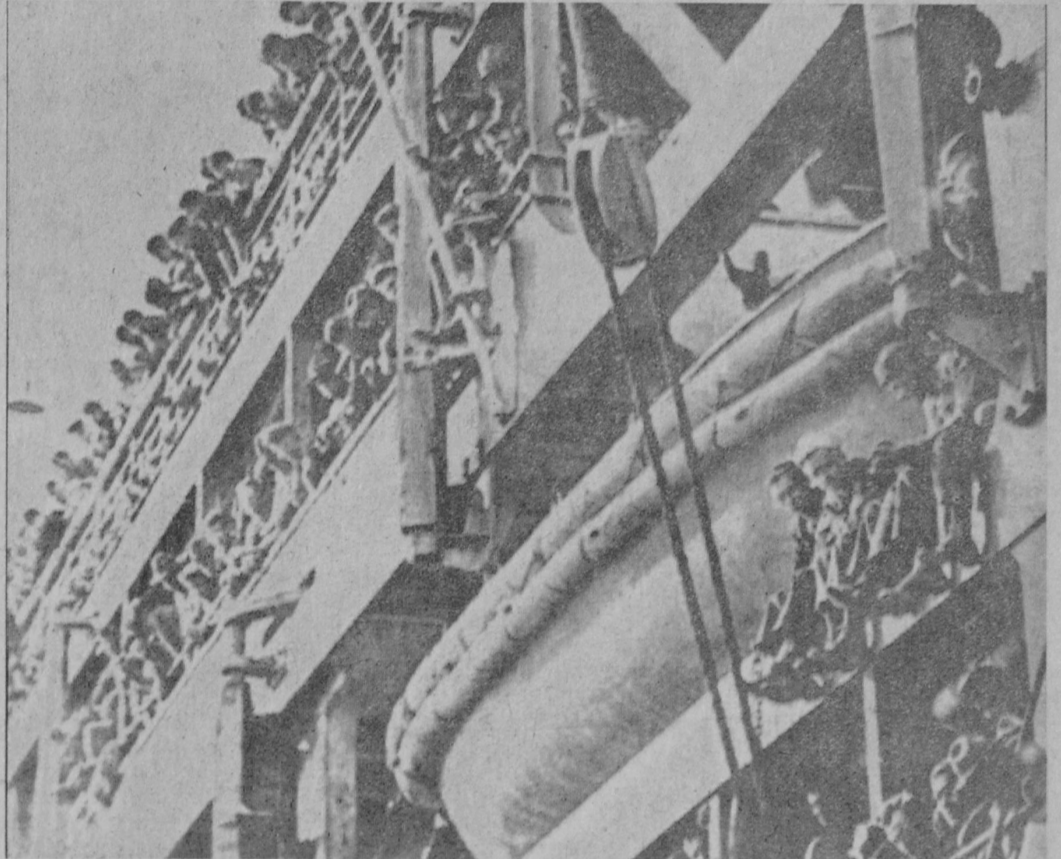
A paragraph in Milton Mackaye's, "This Man Roosevelt," which appeared in 1936, serves to recall the story of this forgotten Hale preacher.

Mackaye said that one of Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt's prepossessing qualities was his willingness to listen, even to bores, on the chance that they had an important idea to contribute and this accessibility had more than once done the president a good turn.

The author illustrated the point with a story of the hectic days of early 1918, when Roosevelt was assistant secretary of the navy. The principal figure in the story was the Iosco County man.

"A tall gentleman with a beard and black bag dodged the guard at the Navy Department one day and got into the assistant secretary's office," said Mackaye. "The visitor calmly announced that he could win the war. Roosevelt felt sure that the man was a crackpot, but he could not bring himself to refuse an audience. This was fortunate: The navy at the time was looking for a way to make mine fields more effective in blockading submarines at German bases.

The bearded visitor had just what was needed—a system of nets and mines and a device by which the explosives were detonated when a vessel touched any part of the elaborate mesh. The scheme was immediately added to the English Channel defenses and, by late summer of 1918, the North Sea was full of nets. The assistant

secretary's eccentric visitor had revolutionized submarine defenses!

The eccentric visitor with the beard and black bag from Iosco County, who crashed the assistant secretary's office, made it possible for several million American doughboys to enter French and English ports with some degree of security from watery graves. (The late Herald editor, who recalled the story in 1936, was one of those doughboys.)

Shortly after the war, Stillwell received a citation from the British government, was thanked personally by King George V for his meritorious service and was acclaimed by the British press as one of the saviors of the Allied cause.

Stillwell died in 1930 at Lynn Haven, Florida. Following the war, he had been an instructor at St. Andrews School for Boys and DuBose Training School, both in Tennessee.

The story does not end there, however. Roosevelt, who became president of the United States in 1933, always remembered his visit from the bearded eccentric, whose idea revolutionized submarine defenses.

During World War II, a special office was established at Washington, D. C., where such inventors—no matter how weird their schemes may have seemed—were given the opportunity to explain their ideas.

Some of the ideas were simply fantastic, but worthless; others such as a three-pointed metal

stamping suggested by one inventor proved to be useful when dropped behind enemy lines for disrupting enemy transportation. The Allied forces soon found that the sharp, three-pronged pieces of metal did not discriminate when it came to truck tires and played havoc with their own rapidly ad-

vancing troops. The Hale preacher is now forgotten, but his insistence that he had a far-reaching effect on the military — seemingly crazy schemes by inventors are not dismissed today without a full investigation.

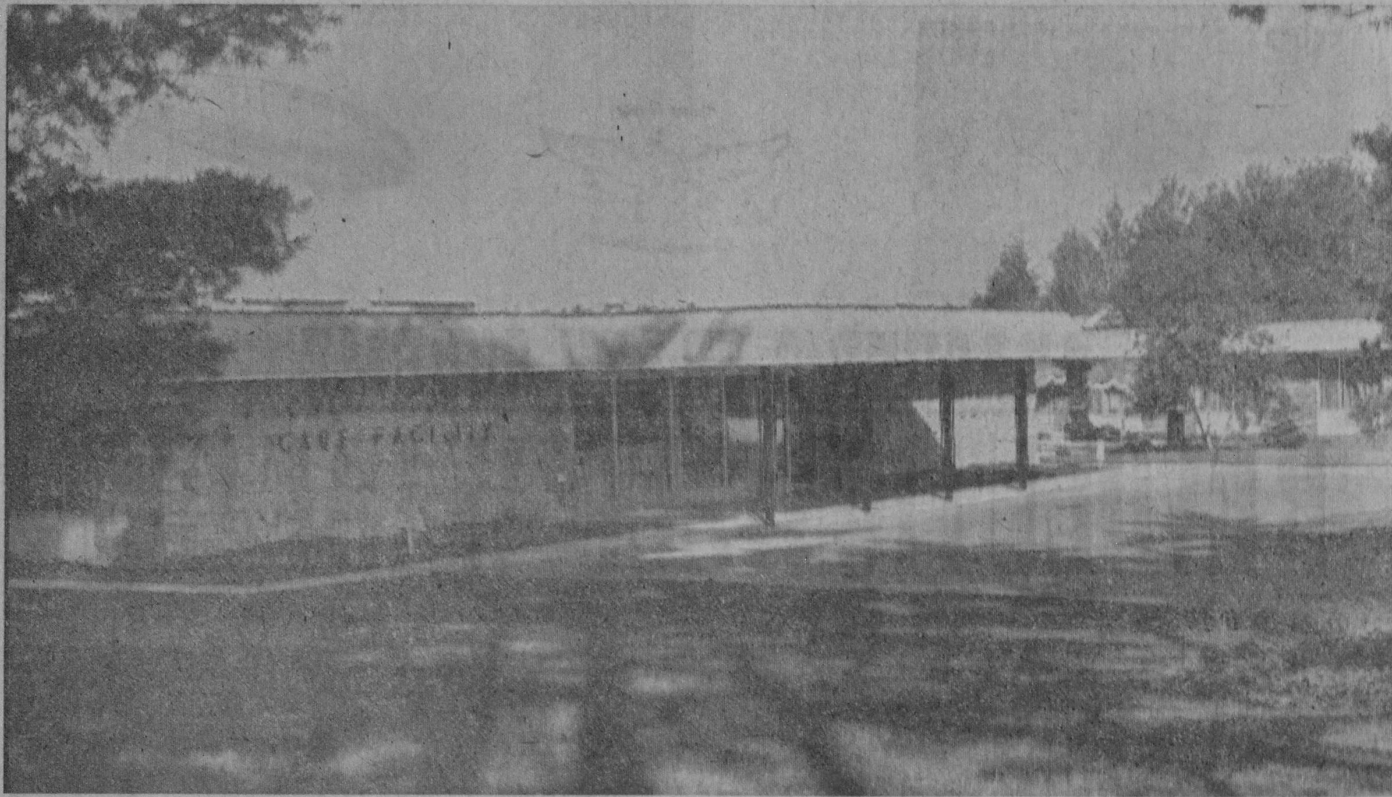

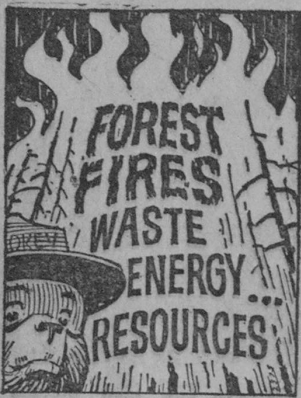

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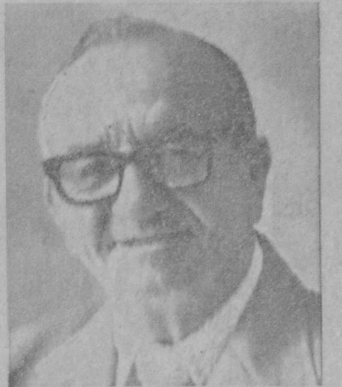

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Tri-County Juvenile Justice Program Now Under Study

Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday adopted a resolution authorizing this county to join Arenac and Ogemaw to establish a tri-county program to develop and implement services relating to juvenile justice.

Act 280 of Public Acts of 1975 provides for an annual basic grant of \$10,000 in state funds to each county having a population of less than 75,000 to supplement existing juvenile justice service, develop new services and encourage devel-

opment of prevention and diversionary services.

The act also provides that when two or more counties establish a joint county program, each county is eligible to receive an additional \$5,000 grant annually.

A committee from the three

counties, consisting of juvenile court judges, county juvenile officers and representatives from the county departments of social services, would develop the program.

The counties would share the costs equally not to exceed the limits provided by the grant.

Judge William McCready of Iosco County said Friday that one meeting had already been held between the three counties and a second meeting was to have been held on Monday of this week at West Branch.

He said that general agreement had been reached as to the principle that state licensed group foster homes would be utilized in the program with private facilities to be operated in Ogemaw and Iosco for four to six youngsters in each home.

Professional counseling service would be provided for both foster parents and children.
