
East Tawas to Extend Water Main

Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which last month allocated a portion of the county's revenue sharing money to local units, last week authorized the City of East Tawas to use \$8,265 of its allotment to extend a city water

The project, part of an economic development plan, would extend city water from Tom Dillon Park out Wadsworth Street to Fox Street and across to the American House development. The revenue sharing money would cover only a portion of the cost of the project and the remainder would be financed by the city.


