

# Tawas Area School in Crucial Millage Vote

"We do hope voters of the Tawas Area School District will turn out in large numbers for the annual school election on Monday June 14," stated Dr. Robert Halle, superintendent of schools.

"We also hope that no voter will cast a ballot without having taken the time to become informed about the issues. Informative articles about the school election and the issues have been pub-

lished in both local newspapers," stated the superintendent.

The school district's request for operational funds of 14 mills for two years, 11 renewal and three additional, is based upon the lowest dollar and percent (5.6%) of increase the district has had in its budget for several years, said Halle. The projected 1976-77 school year budget is close to seven percent below the 12½ percent

average increase of the past 10 years.

"The 14 mills will enable the district to basically maintain its present program," stated the superintendent.

Halle said the public opinion proposition being voted on June 14 "is probably the best opportunity the taxpayers will have of showing that they really want to provide Tawas Area School chil-

dren with a normal school day and that the average taxpayer is willing to spend about \$12 a year in additional taxes to achieve that accomplishment."

The debt levy on the proposed \$1,545,000 middle school addition to the high school will be about 1.1 mills for the next 20 years.

For the sake of this community, its school district and its children, the local taxpayers should not let

such a small expenditure of personal money prevent them from voting favorably on the public opinion proposition," he stated.

The superintendent said that the over-all importance of the school election to the community cannot be overstressed. "Good, sound educational programs do cost money and at this stage in time, the responsibility for providing the facilities and the program is

primarily with the adult population of the community.

"We cannot let the children's educational program and facilities be limited because of adult made problems. It is not the children's fault that the whole manner of financing schools leaves a lot to be desired. It is our responsibility to meet these needs until better solutions are put into effect," he concluded.

## Work Starts Soon on Tawas Harbor

Construction on the Tawas Harbor project at East Tawas, under consideration for nearly 10 years, is expected to start in August. This was the work at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Representatives of the United States Army Corps of Engineers were at East Tawas to secure easements along the lake shore for construction purposes.

When completed, this joint federal-state project will provide protected moorings for upwards of 150 small craft. The inner harbor and boat wells are to be developed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

The present Michigan Waterways Commission Dock is to be lengthened and a protective arm is to be constructed to the northeast.

In addition to this project, the DNR and the city are cooperating to construct small boat launching facilities and a parking area at the city garage site fronting on Tawas Bay.

In other business conducted at Monday night's council meeting, tentative agreement was given to a two-year contract with Hager Sanitation for garbage removal. The council eliminated service to two nonprofit organizations in the contract, the Knights of Columbus

and Fraternal Order of Eagles, feeling that such service would establish an unwanted precedent.

The city clerk was directed to meet with Jacob Montgomery, chairman of the ordinance committee, to advertise for a new building inspector. The city is to revamp its fee schedule for residential construction under the building code.

Wayne White, a home owner on Bay Street, appeared before the council and complained that lights from cars entering the new A&W Drive-In Restaurant shined in his windows at night. The city is to ask the business firm to raise the height of its protective fence to alleviate the problem, along with a request to turn off objectionable signs late at night.

Tentative approval was given by the council to a county-wide mutual aid agreement for fire protection. Involved are volunteer fire departments at East Tawas, Tawas City, Hale, Whittemore, Oscoda and Grant Township.

Ald. James E. Crowley announced his resignation effective July 1. An employee of Consumers Power Company, he is being transferred to the firm's Lansing office.

Discussion was held on repainting the city hall and redesigning landscaping in planter boxes.

## Council Delays Action on Lease

Action on a new lease for the Tawas City Park concession was tabled Monday night for further study by the council.

In April, the council accepted the bid of RO Enterprises, Incorporated, owned by Robert and Jack Brugger, and the fast food service business is presently in operation.

Under terms of the five-year lease, the contractor is to pay a fee of \$11,000 for use of the building, with annual installments of \$2,200. Due to the late date for bidding, purchase of necessary equipment by the contractor and corrections to meet health department specifications, the concession opened later than usual this year.

Under terms of the new contract, payment of the annual installment of \$2,200 would become due on September 1 and payments

for the following years would be due on May 1. The council is to discuss the four-month delayed payment at its next meeting. Acceptance of the contract had been recommended by the park board.

In other business, the council reopened discussion on disposing of options on the Roy Bergeron and George A. Prescott property which had been considered for development of a parking lot and office building complex. Property owners in a proposed special assessment district indicated earlier this year that they were not interested in the project. The city invested \$4,000 in options to purchase the property when the project was discussed originally and may consider selling the options to the highest bidder. The matter was tabled for discussion at the June 21 meeting.

A letter from William H. Groff stated that he was not interested in selling a portion of his property for a proposed access street to connect Mathews Street with the post office. He said that the proposal would lower the value of his property, but he said he would consider selling his entire parcel of land to the city.

A letter from Cong. Phillip Ruppe sought support from the city in proposed legislation which would extend federal revenue sharing for another three years. The council is to submit a letter supporting the measure.

The council adopted ordinance

## Six Candidates for TA Board Posts

An outstanding field of six candidates is vying for two vacancies on the Tawas Area Board of Education in the annual election to be held Monday, June 14.

Filing nominating petitions have been the Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury, Randall J. DeWyse, Mrs.

Eleanor Pfeiffer, James Russo Jr., Robert Roach and Robert Curry.

This is the second year in succession that six candidates have filed for two board of education vacancies, the largest number filing in 10 years.

Saulsbury is pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, DeWyse and Roach are insurance agents, Russo operates an engineering design and consulting service, Curry is a Tawas Township farmer and implement dealer.

Mrs. Pfeiffer, active in the

school's music booster club and Braves Booster Club, ran unsuccessfully last June for a trustee position.

Retiring from the board of education June 30 will be two veteran members, Mrs. Helen Payea and Earl B. Davis.

## Dry Weather Causes TC Water Problem

Extremely low water pressure on city mains below the US-23 bridge Monday brought out a plea by the city council for conservative use of water during an emergency period.

At Monday night's meeting of the council, Arthur Wegner, DPW foreman, said that the city's pumping station which transfers water from the East Tawas filtration plant could not keep up with the demand during the hot weather.

The city's deep well on North Street is in service and provides an additional 200 gallons per minute. Water pressure at the stand pipe behind the city hall, which under normal weather conditions maintains 50 pounds of pressure on mains, had dropped to 30 pounds. Pumps were maintaining a 70-foot column of water in the stand pipe, but the tank usually holds around 75,000 gallons of water and was empty.

Because of the emergency situation, the council asked residents to voluntarily refrain from using city water for lawn sprinkling purposes.

Hardest hit area in the city is Elms Gardens and Elmwood Forest Subdivisions at the outer end of water mains, where water pressure dropped to its lowest point in

years. A number of residents from that area attended Monday night's council meeting to seek possible relief from the situation.

No immediate relief is in sight for the area, but a water loop system is in the planning stage by the department of public works and is to be constructed later this summer.

This additional water main to serve the northwestern side of US-23 below the bridge will relieve the low water pressure to some extent. The major cure for the city's water problem will come with a construction program to provide additional water service to Tawas City-East Tawas and expansion into Baldwin Township.

The joint federally-locally funded project is being handled through the Iosco County Department of Public Works and is expected to be completed next year. It will provide new water storage facilities in the Tawas and at Baldwin Centre, as well as extending water mains and a 12-inch main connecting Tawas City with East Tawas' filtration plant.

Due to the expanded water usage since Tawas City began purchasing its supply under contract with East Tawas, the present six-inch main connecting the two cities cannot keep up with the demand during summer months.

## East Tawas Pleased With Bids on Sewer Project

At Monday's bid opening on the Tawas Lake sewer project, East Tawas officials were pleased with competitive proposals received from six different contractors which ranged from a low of \$521,000 to a high of \$725,000.

Total estimated cost of the project in March was \$680,000 and all proposals were turned over to Spicer Engineering Company for study and recommendation of an award.

This project is being handled through the Iosco County Department of Public Works and it is expected that a decision on a contractor will be made at a meeting of the DPW on Thursday.

The city anticipates approval in the near future by the Municipal Finance Commission on a \$885,000 bond issue to finance the project. The city presently has \$95,000 in funds to go toward the construction.

This long awaited development will see construction of four miles of sanitary sewer mains to serve the occupied Tawas Lake shoreline from Owosso Drive to the south end of Rainbow Drive and has been under consideration since 1971.

Discussion on the project has been revived from time to time by

the city council, which took definite steps in February to channel efforts through the county DPW.

"When completed, the sewer expansion into the Tawas Lake area will represent about one-third of the city's total sanitary sewer system. The last major sanitary sewer

er expansion was in 1967, when a new waste water treatment plant was included with sewer main construction.

It is expected that the expansion of sewer service will see great residential development for the city in the years ahead.

## Millage Vote at Hale Area

Voters of Hale Area School District are being asked to renew 14.75 mills of operating taxes for a period of two years at the annual election to be held June 14.

Also to be considered by voters will be filling two vacancies on the board of education. Candidates include Thomas L. Clark, Frank M. Leiva, Charles W. Millard and Franklin N. Smith.

## Postal Opening

Applications are to be accepted until Tuesday, June 15, for a substitute rural carrier of record position at the Tawas City post office. In announcing the postal examination, Postmaster Leonard Hosbach said that applications were to be accepted starting today (Wednesday).

## Three Proposals Going to Voters

Three special proposals will be decided by Iosco County voters at the primary election August 3.

On petition of the Iosco Allocation Board, voters will be asked to peg the 15-mill tax limitation rates for a period of five years for the county, townships and school districts. The rates would be identical to those adopted this year by the allocation board as follows: County, 4.50 mills; townships, one mill; intermediate school district, .25 of a mill; school districts, 9.25 mills.

The second proposal, brought through petitions submitted last week to the county board of com-

missioners, would ask voters to approve a special tax levy of .20 of a mill for five years to be turned over to the Iosco County Commission on Aging for use in maintaining and expanding services to persons 60 years of age and older. Based on the current valuation, approximately \$40,000 would be raised annually.

The third proposal calls for a tax levy of .125 of a mill for a three-year period for expansion of the Iosco County Airport. The \$25,000 raised annually would match federal funds allocated for this purpose.

## School Borrows Against Future Tax

Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night authorized the administration to make application to the Municipal Finance Commission to borrow \$770,000 on anticipated taxes.

Due to a projected cash deficit on December 3 and payrolls to be met, the board authorized borrowing of the money based on 9.25 mills of allocated taxes.

Need for borrowing the money was brought about by the fact that taxes are not due until December 1 and the district would have insufficient funds to meet expenses.

In other business, the resignation of Jane Robinson, elementary reading teacher, was accepted. A letter of retirement from Mrs. Ellen Evans, high school English teacher, was read to the board. A leave of absence was granted to Debra Coffin, community educa-

tion secretary, in order that she might enter summer school at Central Michigan University.

The board approved purchase of a 1972 Chevrolet van which has been leased by the district for the past three years. The district had the option to purchase the truck at a cost of \$500 at the end of the three-year period.

Bernard Nelkie was appointed to a custodial maintenance position at the high school. He has been an employee of the school district for a number of years and has worked at the high school, but his main responsibilities have been in other areas.

It was announced that Harold Knight of East Tawas had notified the board of education that he will not audit the district's records during the coming year, due to a shortage of personnel.





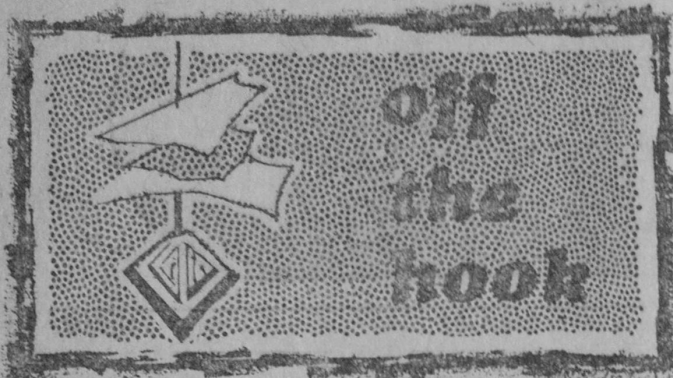

It is the responsibility of adults to meet these needs until better solutions are put into effect for school financing; residents of Northern Michigan cannot wait for the legislature to do anything about the problem of school finances—inquiries in the manner of returning tax dollars to local school districts in the form of state membership aid have been around for a long time and those same problems will continue into the new legislature.

It is too bad that breadwinners, home owners and just plain taxpayers do not have a little more say on just how federal and state income tax money is being spent on a multitude of programs—particularly in the field of social welfare. Despite retorts from those elected to the halls of the federal congress or the state legislature that "people are demanding more services," it is doubtful if those

costly "necessary services" would stand the test of a referendum.

The only vote on such matters is at the local level, where every dollar expended is in public view and substantiated by budgets which are placed before any citizen interested in taking the time to review expenditures and revenues before official adoption. When additional tax money is required for local school programs, citizens have the opportunity to express an opinion at the polls.

Publishers of this newspaper believe that renewal of the school's operational millage, plus three additional mills of taxes, is absolutely necessary to continue the operation of this school district—we believe your children and our children are important to the future of this nation. It is also important that the school return to a normal day to eliminate split sessions. The only way that this can be achieved is through support of the debt levy for a middle school addition.

A "yes" vote on both proposals will require some additional self sacrifice on the part of adult taxpayers, but it will be worth it.

**Annual Meeting  
Held at Boston**

Christian Scientists from around the world were told this week that the only sufficient response to challenges confronting churches in general and their denomination in particular is "more Christianity."

"Not just the Christianity that acknowledges Jesus as the Saviour," said Lenore D. Hanks, chairman of The Christian Science Board of Directors, "or the Christianity that may be a sort of lip service. But, the Christianity that follows the Christ so closely it adds spiritual dimension to everything we do."

An estimated 10,000-12,000 members of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, were on hand to hear the keynote message. Many of the denomination's more than 3,000 branches in 57 countries were represented at the 81st annual meeting.

Accounts of healing solely through prayer were shared throughout the meeting. "In Christian Science, Christianity and healing are forever linked," Mrs. Hanks commented. "We cannot really have one without the other."

In order to involve members more deeply in the meeting, they were invited six months ago to submit talks and questions. More than 250 talks were received and many played an important part in the three days of inspirational discussions and church reports.

Mrs. Hanks spoke frankly about a decrease in numbers of those in the healing ministry of Christian Science and of the need for strengthening branch church membership in many areas.

Historian Robert Peel recalled to members that Mary Baker Eddy's first address in The Mother Church "did not indulge in a paean of triumph. Instead, she gave them the quiet reminder: 'Christianity is not superfluous. Its redemptive power is seen in sore trials, self-denials and crucifixions of the flesh. But these come to the rescue of mortals, to admonish them and plant the feet steadfastly in Christ.'"

Members were asked to commit themselves to four objectives, more Christianity in their lives, better healing, a stronger appre-

ciation of church and greater alertness to rising materialism in the signs of the times.

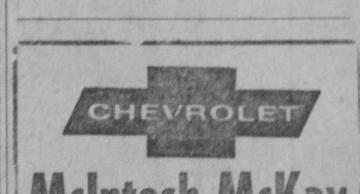

### Arraigned for Armed Robbery

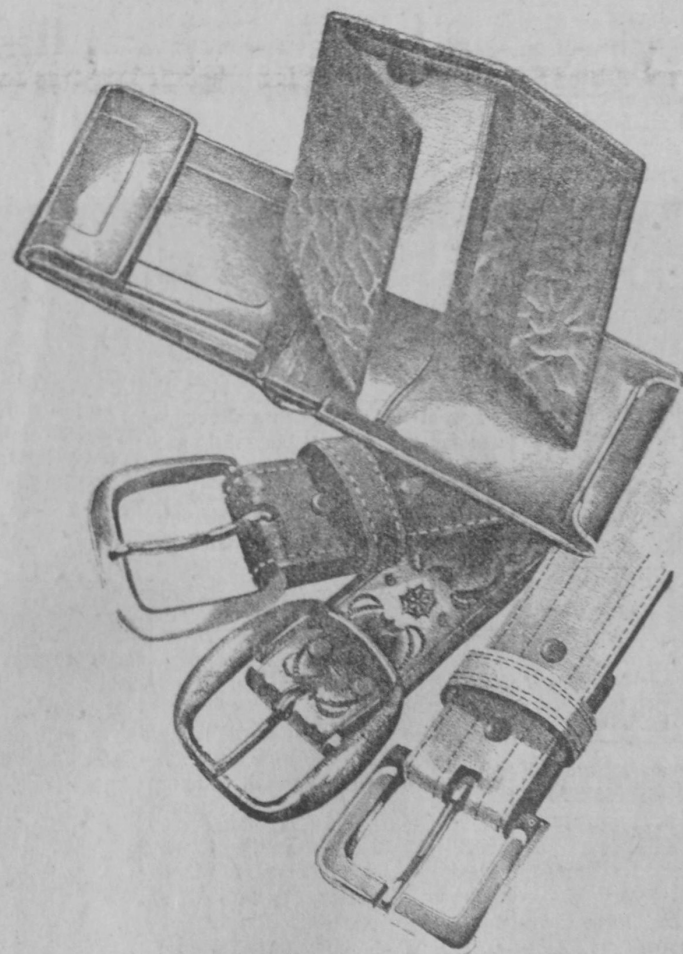
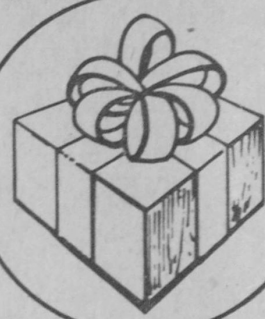

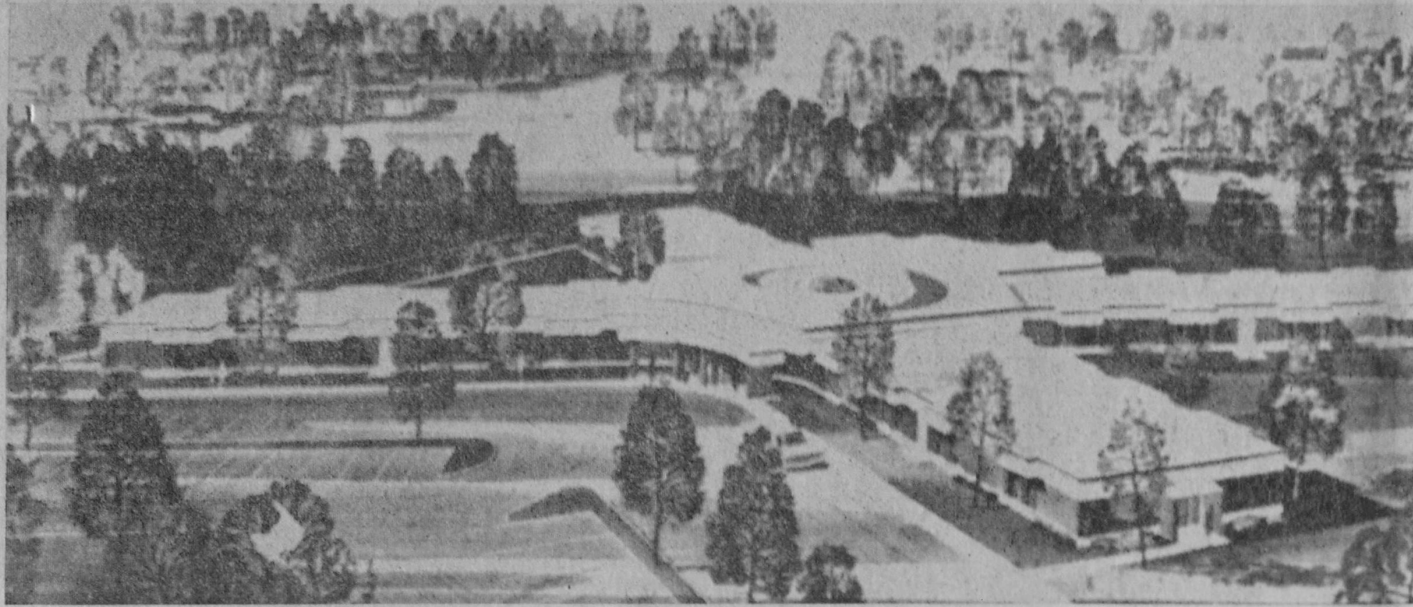

## New Nursing Home Endorsed by Council for Zoning Change

Two different building projects which could add nearly two-million dollars to the property valuation of Tawas City in the North Street-Fifth Avenue area are under consideration by the city council.

At a special meeting held Wednesday night, the council gave its unanimous endorsement to change zoning to permit construction of a 117-bed nursing home proposed by Provincial House, Incorporated, Lansing.

In addition, a second project calling for construction of a 48-unit, two-story apartment complex by DeShano Homes, Incorporated, is being proposed by Jerry Cotter and Kenneth J. Myles.

Construction of both of these projects will require a change in zoning from the residential A category to residential C, which would allow multiple family dwellings.

A public hearing on changing zoning for Provincial House, Incorporated, is to be held at a special meeting Thursday, June 24, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall. All property owners within 300 feet of the project are to be notified.

# FIRES JINXED CURRY HOTELS

Isaiah Curry and his brother, Thomas, Tawas City's pioneer hotel keepers, were persistent in their efforts to stay in business, but they must have been jinxed. Their hotels—and they built three of them here and leased another before turning to other endeavors—were visited by fire with such regularity that it seems amazing today that it took so long for them to get the message.

Tawas City was but a small clearing hacked out of the wilderness along Saginaw Bay when the Curry brothers established their first hotel here in 1868. Appropriately named the Tawas City House, this false-fronted, three-story structure was located just east of the Mathews Street-Lake Street intersection at the approximate location of the vacant property between the building housing the Tawas City branch of the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library and Don's Bopp and Shop.

Although Gideon O. Whittemore's original plat of the city called for the location of a "Union Square" on property presently occupied by the city garage on Fourth Street, the Whittemore mill just west of Mathews Street and fronting on Tawas Bay apparently was the magnet which decided the city's eventual business district—in one instance, it was like a candle attracting a moth, for sparks from the mill's smoke stacks proved deadly, as will be shown later. Problems caused by locating business buildings on both sides of Lake Street remain to this day, due to the narrow spit of land on which the buildings are situated between the river and the bay.

The earliest known picture of Lake Street shows five frame buildings clustered on the north side of the street, extending from Mathews Street to the present day Myles building. Appropriately enough, the immediate foreground in this early view is cluttered with piles of lumber and stacks of shingles manufactured and woven at the nearby Whittemore mill. In the background is the fine residence of C. H. Whittemore, now the site of the city hall; the residential building presently owned by Roy Bergeron and, looming at the outer edge, is the two-story Iosco County Courthouse, a classical structure of wood with its cupola, which cost \$12,000 to build in 1868.

At the left in the picture is the Tawas City House owned by the Curry brothers. Twenty-six men are standing on the front steps of the structure and on sawdust-covered Lake Street. An assortment of empty whiskey barrels has been thrown helter skelter along the side of the building facing the camera.

The hotel was the center of community activity during the early days and was located close to the Whittemore dock to accommodate passengers who used steam boats stopping at that facility. There was no railroad entering Northeastern Michigan at that time and overland traffic during summer months was limited due to the lack of roads. The community was a jumping off point for supplying lumbering operations along the AuGres and Ausable Rivers and the hotel's bar room was a popular hangout for men awaiting transportation.

The Tawas City House had a short life. The city's first major fire hit on March 1, 1869, wiping out the hotel, having been caused by a defective chimney, which was the bane of early frame buildings. The Currys sustained a total loss and carried no insurance.

Before the fire had stopped burning, the Currys had timbers on the ground for a new building, the Tawas City Hotel. This building stood at the same location, was a three-story structure and was even more pretentious than the original building. The hotel lasted until October 30, 1873, when it, too, was wiped out by fire. A blaze broke out about 1:00 a. m. in the Tawas Billiard Hall owned by the Currys and a high wind soon spread flames to the hotel, the Currys' saloon and two other

frame buildings in the block. The Currys sustained a \$12,500 loss in the blaze with insurance amounting to \$7,500. Also razed in the blaze was the Simmons House, a hotel owned by Henry Simmons, along with the store of Rhodes and Brookhouser, S. R. Lyons' store and the residence of Mrs. J. J. Brown.

H. E. Hoard, editor of the local newspaper, commented on the fire as follows: "Twice now has the fire fiend been in our midst and will the people not awake from their slumber and look about for a hand engine that may be procured at a low cost in any town that is now provided with more costly engines?" The city did not buy a hand pumper until after 1882 and by then, four major fires had leveled the town's business district.

Wet carpets and blankets had been spread on roofs of structures on the bay side of the street and only the untiring efforts of the bucket brigade prevented the complete leveling of the entire business district. Total loss in the fire was \$22,500, with insurance amounting to \$12,750.

Undaunted by two fires in five years, the Currys were on the site with new building materials before the ashes cooled. By February 1875, the new 46 by 68-foot, three-story Tawas City House was finished, except for outside painting. Other businesses, too, quickly rebuilt buildings destroyed by the fire and the Whittemore mill was kept busy manufacturing lumber to be used locally.

The new 40-room hotel had accommodations for guests on the second and third floors, with a bar, billiard room, baggage room and dance hall on the ground floor. Outbuildings included a 36 by 46-foot horse barn, an 18 by 60-foot shed for teams and an 18 by 30-foot ice house. The new hotel was formally opened to the public with a grand ball on February 23, 1875.

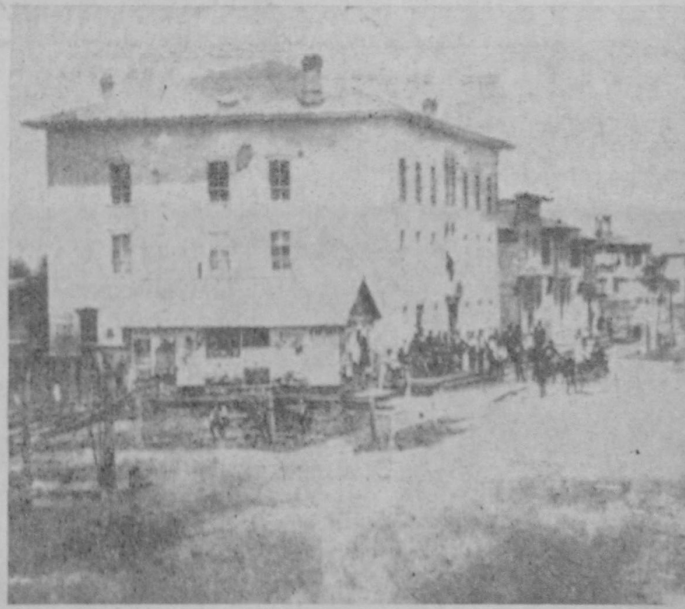
A notation in the diary of Iosco County Sheriff L. B. Smith states that on July 3, 1876, he ordered the Currys, along with other saloon owners in the Tawas, to close their businesses for the centennial celebration of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. His notation for July 4, 1876, said there "had not been much drinking or fighting" on the one-day holiday.

This hotel lasted only two years and seven months—on September 6, 1876, fire was discovered under the front steps of Dupraw's billiard hall and quickly spread to adjacent buildings, despite hard work of the bucket brigade. The Tawas City House was leveled and the local editor estimated that Curry brothers' loss in the blaze at nearly \$20,000.

For the third time in seven years, the Curry brothers were

building another hotel before the ashes cooled, but this time, Fred Scheffler built the hotel building and the Currys wisely leased the property for their Arcade Hotel. The brothers operated this hotel for six years—their longest period without being visited by a disastrous fire, but their luck again ran out on March 23, 1882. Sparks from smoke stacks of the nearby McBean sawmill, successor to the now bankrupt Whittemores, were carried across Mathews Street and started a fire

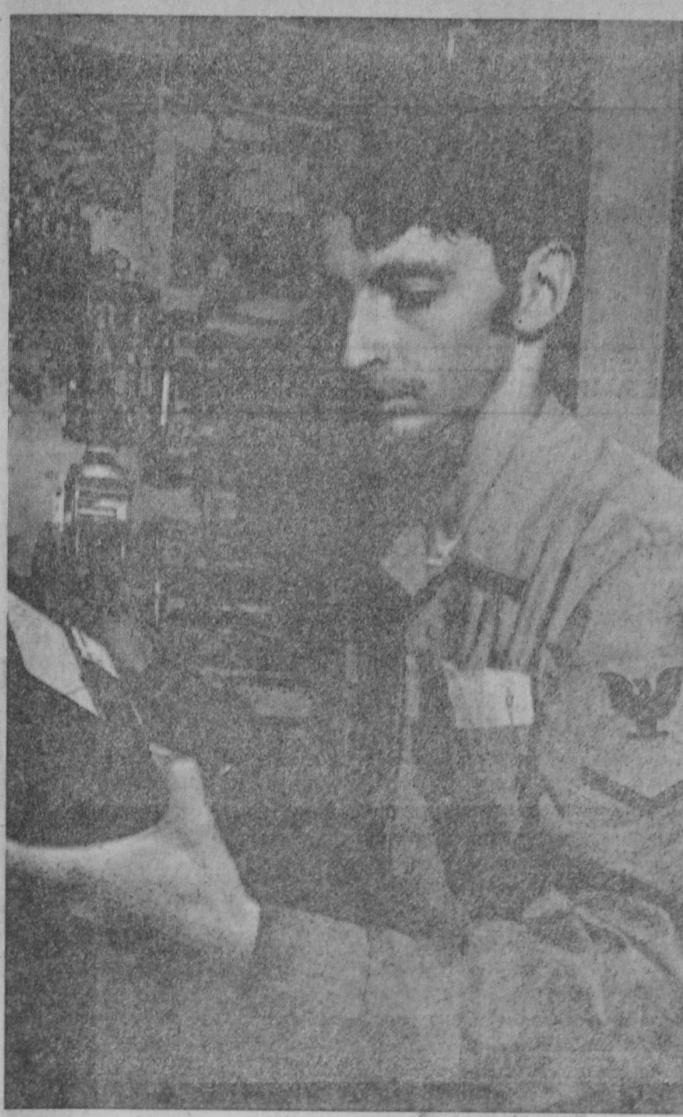

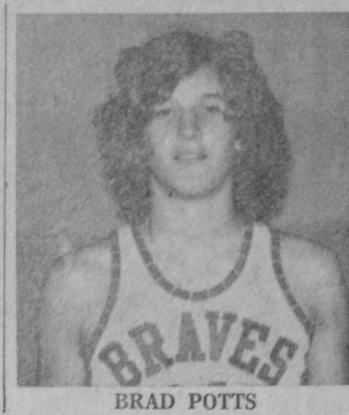
### Brad Potts Named to All-Star Squad

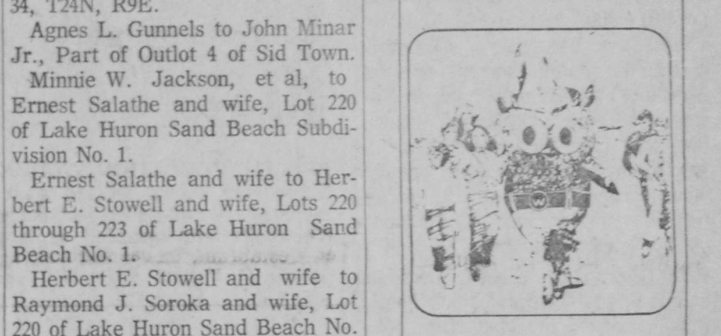
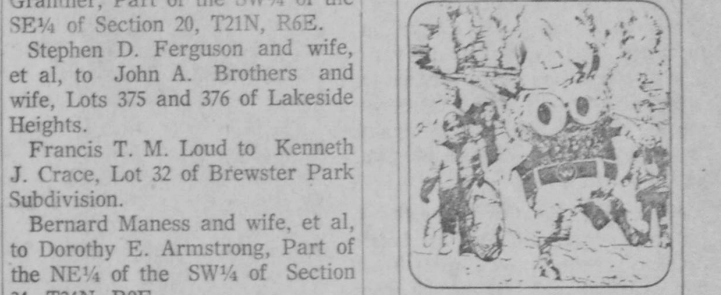

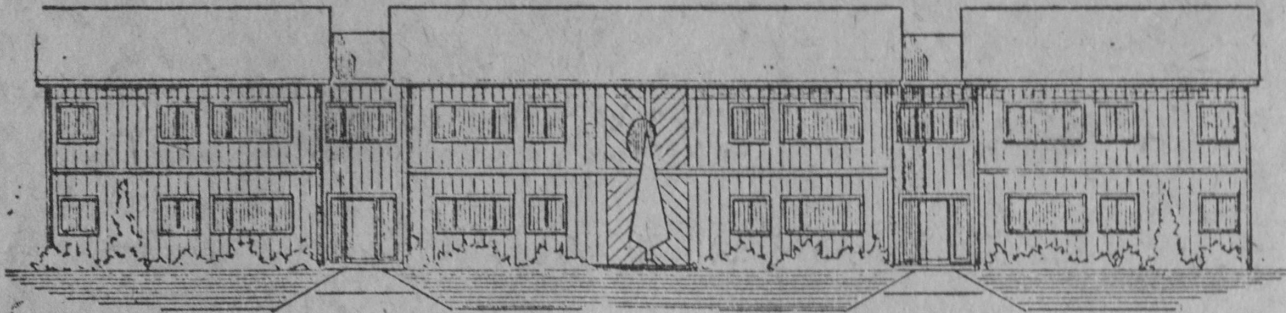
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FRONT VIEW of a two-story apartment building being proposed by Jerry Cotter and Kenneth Myles is pictured above. The build-

on the Arcade's roof. A strong southwest wind blowing at the time instantly spread the fire over the entire top of the building.

"Without the aid of proper protection against such disasters," stated an eye witness, who sprinted from East Tawas to Tawas City at the first sign of heavy smoke. "It was useless to attempt to save the building and all efforts were spent in rescuing as much of the furniture and stock as was possible; but so rapidly did the fire progress that only a very small portion of it was saved."

Also flattened by the fire was the McBean store and the residence of S. G. Taylor. Other smaller fire losses incurred included one of \$1,200 by Dr. G. S. Darling. His drug store stock was damaged, along with household furniture and combination residence, office and store, presently occupied by Lad's Padd, formerly the Iosco Hotel, which was again visited by fire on May 25 of this year.

All totaled, the Curry brothers lost more than \$45,000 in hotel property in the four different fires between 1869 and 1882—which was no little sum in those high dollar value days. Dupraw's Commercial House, later known as the Bayside, was the only hotel in Tawas City for a number of years, but local pine timber supplies began to dwindle and there really was no need for a hotel to serve transient visitors until the advent of the tourist industry.

The Currys toyed with the idea of building a fireproof brick hotel, but abandoned the idea after looking to the future of the Tawas and possibly recalling all of their losses. Thomas moved to his farm on the Hemlock Road, but an undaunted Isaiah had the hotel business in his veins—he moved to East Tawas and became the proprietor of the American House, a hotel on Newman Street at the present location of Mooney's Ben Franklin Store.

The Currys' bad luck with fire apparently ended in 1882 for the building which housed the American House had a long life and was finally removed in the 1950s, after serving as the location for Carlson's Grocery Store. Curry later moved to Saginaw and spent the rest of his life there as the owner of a bakery. His body returned to Tawas City on his death and his grave is in Memory Gardens Cemetery.

subcontractors. Water and sewer to serve the site would be provided from the Fourth Avenue-North Street intersection. North Street will also be the route of the new trunkline sewer which is to be constructed in the near future.

The apartment complex being proposed by Myles and Cotter would have one and two-bedroom units and would be designed to serve persons with moderate income or who are elderly. It was reported at the meeting that Myles had been considering such a project for the past three years.

Poorman said that Provincial Home, Incorporated, has always encouraged others to build apartment house complexes near its

nursing homes, inasmuch as visiting nurses and dietary programs can be made available to elderly persons living in the apartment complex at reduced cost.

Members of the water board and planning commission, who attended the special meeting, shared the council's enthusiasm for the two privately financed projects. It is expected that the projects would speed residential development in that area.

## County Will Share Federal Money With Local Units

Iosco County will again be sharing a portion of its federal revenue sharing money this year with townships and municipalities of the county.

The county board of commissioners voted Wednesday to share \$95,000 of its revenue sharing funds with the stipulation that the money be spent in accordance with federal revenue sharing guidelines, with emphasis on projects furthering economic development.

Last year, federal revenue sharing money received by the county was used for township and city recreational purposes, administered through the county park commission. The major portion of the money was used for development of tennis courts at Oscoda, East Tawas, Tawas City, Hale, Sand Lake and Whittemore.

The money is to be allocated on the basis of population and state equalized valuation of the following amounts:

- Alabaster, \$3,030.50; AuSable, \$7,163; Baldwin, \$5,719; Burleigh, \$2,147; Grant, \$4,218; Oscoda, \$35,625; Plainfield, \$11,466.50; Reno, \$1,548.50; Sherman, \$2,061.50; Tawas, \$4,588.50; Wilber, \$2,156.50; East Tawas, \$8,265; Tawas City, \$5,785.50; Whittemore, \$1,254.

## Iosco and Ogemaw Counties to Form Own Mental Health Service Unit

Iosco and Ogemaw Counties are to withdraw from the Northeast Michigan Community Mental Health Service effective June 30, 1977, and form a two-county unit.

Ogemaw are involved in a seven-county configuration. A resolution adopted Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners said the action was being taken after careful re-

view of the associated benefits, programs, services and objectives of the present group.

"The commission believes the citizens of the respective counties could better be served by a with-

drawing from Northeast Michigan Community Mental Health Service and by the formation of a joint community mental health service between the two counties," stated the resolution.
