School Bus Bids Show \$2,000 Hike

Bids received Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education indicated that cost of school buses would be approximately \$2,000 higher than last year.

The school plans to purchase two buses and low bids received Monday night revealed the basic price on each unit would be \$15,413. Bids were accepted and are to be reviewed for a comparison of specifications by a committee composed of administrators and members of the board of education.

In other business, a letter from City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz of Tawas City requested use of the Tawas City Elementary Unit gymnasium for holding city elections. The action came as the result of a resolution of the city council.

Dr. Robert A. Halle, superintendent, is to check with the building principal to determine if utilization of the gymnasium for a polling place would cause any interference to the school's regular program.

The board of education adopted a resolution stating it would comply

with federal law which states that "no person shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." The superintendent stated that the school district has complied with this law, but a resolution was necessary to meet federal requirements.

On recommendation of the superintendent, second year probationary status for the 1976-77 term was granted to Roger Joughin, Gail Forbrig, Gary Packard, Allan Ackerman and Paul Becker.

John Alexander, high school principal, was granted permission to start negotiations for purchase of a lot on First Avenue in Tawas City as the site for a building trades house.

It was announced that the building trades house on First Street, Tawas City, is nearly completed and is to be offered for sale.



IOSCO COUNTY escaped the serious damage caused in other counties to the south by the ice storm Thursday night, but the Whittemore area was without electrical power on Friday. That community was particularly hard hit by a heavy crust of ice, which brought down tree limbs and severed power lines in a number of places. Farmers of Burleigh Township milked cows by hand, but dependence on electrical power for operation of equipment was emphasized when milk coolers, water pumps and milking machines failed to operate. Several farmers utilized portable generators during the emergency. Many areas of Michigan were still without power as of Monday in the aftermath of one of the worst sleet storms in nearly 50 years.—Tawas Herald Photo.



Hale Board Hears Report on Jr. High

A report on structuring of the modular schedule for the seventh and eighth grades was given at Monday night's meeting of Hale Area Board of Education by Prin. Richard Dodge.

Dodge told board of education members that the school had found last year that a number of students were not making the adjustment from elementary grades to the modular system used in both the junior and senior high schools.

He said that problems of students who failed junior high school last year had been identified and a strong thrust was being made to reduce those failures.

Dodge said that one of the basic plans being utilized in the transition of a student from elementary grades to junior high school is to explain what is actually expected of the student at the next higher level.

Causing problems for some students moving into grades seven and eight has been the change in the rules, more teachers and a change in the grading system. It has also been found that chapters in various social studies books have different authors and, as a consequence, there are different reading levels in the same book.

In other business, Charles Millard took the oath of office as the new member of the board of education, replacing Herman Maas, who retired recently. Millard is to fill out the balance of Maas' term through June and is to be a candidate in the annual election.

Named to succeed Maas as board of education treasurer was Dale Brumfield, veteran member of the board.

County Garage Plans OK'd Appeals Board Overrules Building Code Inspector

Iosco County Construction Code Board of Appeals ruled Wednesday against the county building inspector concerning construction plans for the Iosco County Road Commission's new garage-office complex to be located south and east of the Sand Lake Road-M-55 intersection.

After review of the plans, Francis Block, building inspector, had interpreted the state building code to require a fire sprinkling system in a truck storage area. Block's ruling of the code was that the area contained 19,756 square feet of floor space and anything over 16,380 square feet must have a fire sprinkler system.

R. S. Scott Engineering Com-

pany, Alpena, contended that the truck storage area is to be constructed of brick and concrete blocks with roof supported by means of a rigid steel frame with steel roof joists and metal deck. Although exposed steel is not considered totally fireproof, Scott said it certainly would be fire resistant.

In addition, Scott said the building is situated on 40 acres of land and completely isolated from other structures.

The engineering firm pointed out, too, that it would not be feasible to install a fire sprinkler system in the building as a pressure water supply is not available at the site and a system operated by pumps would not be feasible as

electrical service is the first utility to be terminated by any fire.

After hearing the inspector's interpretation of the building code and reviewing the architect's plans, the appeals board ruled that the area in contention is to be used only for truck storage and falls under a low hazard area, differing from the section cited by Block.

Members of the appeals board include Jack (Ollie) Johnson, James Zuehlke, Ronald Lamrock, Wayne Vaughan and Dennis Chrivia.

All contracts for construction of the building have been signed and work is tentatively set to begin as soon as weather permits.

New TC Post Office Opens on Monday

According to an announcement Tuesday by Postmaster Leonard Hosbach, Tawas City post office will move Saturday to its new building west of the Mathews Street intersection on US-23.

Ground was broken for the new building in October by Liebler Construction Company, Incorporated, Caro. The firm is to lease the building to the United States Postal Service.

Postmaster Hosbach said the lease on the present building, owned by Delano Myles and leased to the County of Iosco, is due to expire on March 15.

The new building contains 2,784 square feet of floor space, approximately one-half again as large as provided in the present quarters. The building has improved facilities for mail handling and provides parking for 13 patrons, plus parking for employees.

New key type lock boxes have been installed in the building, which will result in the change of box numbers for some patrons.

Hosbach said the move was to be made Saturday afternoon in order not to interrupt normal business hours Saturday morning.

TA Band Received 1st Division Rating

For the 17th consecutive year, Tawas Area Symphonic Band received a first division rating in the District IX Festival of the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association. For the sixth time, the band jumped a classification and performed in class A and is the first band north of Bay City ever

to enter class A competition and receive a first division award.

Bands from Clare, Beaverton, Roscommon, Houghton Lake, Argonac Eastern, Au Gres-Sims, Argonac, Gladwin, Alcona and Mio performed at Tawas Area School and Oscoda Area School.

A first division rating is defined, in part, as "an unusually high standard of performance and musicianship . . . worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner."

This rating makes the band eligible to participate in the state festival which is to be held May 1

at Traverse City.

At the festival, bands competed against set standards which vary slightly between classes of schools. Each band performed three numbers before three judges, then sight-read two selections before a fourth judge. Tawas received three first division ratings from the concert adjudicators and a first division rating from the sight-reading judge for an over-all first division rating.

The band played "Sol Y Sombra," the class required selection; "First Suite in Eb," movements two and three, and "Fiesta Del Pacifico."

A new innovation at this year's festival saw each band receive remarks and be rehearsed by one concert judge and the sight-reading judge. The Tawas band chose Leonard Falcone, director emeritus at Michigan State University, to give the verbal critique. Falcone stated that this was a "mature sounding group, one in which not one bad sound was produced . . . you continued the fine Tawas tradition by playing extremely difficult music in a superb and very special manner . . . any possible criticism of this group is extremely minor which shows the fine and sensitive training you have received from your excellent conductor."

Comments were also heard from William H. Rivard, trombone and theory instructor at Central Michigan University; James Bradford, director of bands, Eisenhower

PUBLIC NOTICE—Title IX

Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 of the United States Congress specifically states:

"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any educational program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance . . ." with certain exceptions.

Likewise, no assistance, such as administrative or staff cooperation, faulty sponsorship, use of school facilities on school time, shall be provided to any non-school organization or individual which discriminates on the basis of sex.

All employment decisions will be made in a non-discriminatory manner in relationship to recruitment, hiring, assignment, promotion, transfer, lay-off, termination, reinstatement, job classification, salary and fringe benefits.

In order to facilitate the evaluation of current practices, to investigate complaints, to answer inquiries, and to guide the implementation of compliance efforts, Foster Eid has been appointed the local Title IX Coordinator and John Tafelski the Hearing Officer. 

Braves Defeated Oilers, 63-58, to Win District Championship

Tawas Area Braves were crowned champion of the district basketball tournament Friday night at Ogemaw Heights High School, defeating the Mt. Pleasant Oilers, 63-58.

Last year, the Braves lost to the Oilers, 71-56, in the championship game at Ogemaw Heights, but it was Tawas' turn Friday night and the Braves turned in an excellent

defensive game. Tawas jumped off to a commanding lead in the first quarter, lost some ground in the second quarter and then came back to hold slim margins in the final two quarters.

The real clincher for the Braves came in the fourth quarter when they meshed 17 of 23 foul shots while the Oilers made good on

eight of 15 shots from the charity line.

The Braves made only two field goals during the fourth quarter, but the Oilers drew many fouls in an aggressive move to get control of the ball.

Tawas' 16-8 scoring bulge in the first quarter came on five field goals by Brad Potts, a basket and a foul shot each by Mike Harvey

and Tom Mooney. Potts quickly ran into foul trouble and he had only six points in the second quarter.

Both teams had a cold third quarter, but Tawas maintained the lead with a 10-9 margin. The final quarter was in Tawas' favor, 21-19.

Neil Warner came off the bench to hold Tawas in the game with four field goals and two foul shots, while Mooney played a steady game with four field goals and three charity tosses.

Potts was high scorer for the winners with 19 points, but sat out most of the third quarter with four fouls. Harvey was next with 13 points.

Bob First was high for the Oilers with 19 points, followed by Bob Hayes' 14 points.

The Braves gained a berth in the championship game by eliminating Pinconning 71-45, in Wednesday night's action. Pinconning had upset Ogemaw Heights in the tournament opener.

Influenza Activity Noted in Eight Michigan Counties

Many cases of influenza, type A, Victoria strain, have been isolated and identified by the state health department's laboratories. Eight counties in the state have had wide spread influenza activity in epidemic proportions. Cases are expected to increase in the first weeks of March and decrease by the end of the month. Several school districts in the lower part of the state have closed due to excessive absenteeism.

This flu virus, first identified in 1975, appeared in Hawaii late last year. Since then it has been identified in at least 14 other states and at least seven health districts in Ontario.

Symptoms include fever, tiredness, muscular aches and pains and respiratory symptoms, such as sore throat and cough. Anyone having recurring fever or respiratory symptoms should see a doctor since this could indicate a secondary bacterial infection such as pneumonia. The symptoms usually persist from five to eight days.

People in good health before contracting the virus should have little difficulty in recovering. However, it is recommended that anyone having congestive heart failure, long standing diabetes, chronic lung disease or any severe chronic illness see a doctor as there is an increased risk of developing complications from the flu.

Students Prepare for Contest

For the past four weeks, students in grades kindergarten through eight in every school district have been busy writing and illustrating stories, poems and essays for the county-wide writing contest. NOTICE OF AUTHORIZATION OF IOSCO COUNTY BONDS

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on March 3, 1976 the Board of Commissioners of Iosco County adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$585,000.00 to finance sewer improvements for the City of East Tawas.

Said resolution describes said improvements, their service area, cost and estimated usefulness, bond terms, manner of bond payments and use of proceeds, and incorporates the contract between the County and the City setting out the details of the acquisition, financing and operation of the project. Said bond resolution also pledges the full faith and credit of the County as secondary security for payment of such bonds in the following language:

"Pursuant to the authorization provided in Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, the full faith and credit of the County of Iosco is hereby pledged for the prompt payment of the principal and interest on the bonds as the same shall become due. If for any reason there are not sufficient funds on hand from the contractual payments to pay the principal and interest on the bonds when due, upon written notification by the Board to the County Treasurer of the amount of such deficiency, the County Treasurer shall promptly deposit into the debt retirement fund for said bonds the amount of such deficiency out of County funds. If it becomes necessary for the County to so advance any such moneys, it shall be entitled to reimbursement from any surplus from time to time existing in the fund from which said principal and interest are primarily payable, or from any other legally available source. The County recognizes and covenants that to the extent necessary to provide funds to meet its full faith and credit pledge herein provided, it is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes against the taxable property in the County, which taxes, pursuant to Section 6, Article IX of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, are without limitation as to rate or amount."



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

New State Law Hikes Cost for Probate Court

A sharp increase in probate court costs was brought to the attention of Iosco Board of Commissioners Wednesday by Probate Judge William McCready.

A new state law became effective in November mandating that mentally ill persons brought before the court are entitled to court appointed counsel. Two hearings are required before the judge and a jury trial may be requested on a commitment order.

McCready said he had handled five such cases since November. Rather than to hold the hearings in his own courtroom and bring in a visiting state psychiatrist, McCready has transferred his court to Traverse City and to Mt. Pleasant. This has involved transportation for himself, the court appointed counsel and witnesses.

When a person is picked up by the sheriff's department and certified by a physician as needing mental treatment, the person is transported to Traverse City for examination by a psychiatrist and, if admitted to that hospital, a hearing must be held in five days. A second hearing is required within 15 days.

A psychiatrist is not available locally and Judge McCready said the best system seemed to be to transfer his entire court to the state institutions to hold the necessary hearings.

If the court hearing is held in this county, two round trips would be required by the sheriff's department and the county would be required to pay transportation and the fee of the state psychiatrist.

If a person voluntarily admits himself to a state hospital, a hearing is not required, but this system apparently is frowned upon by the state. "Perhaps if we held the hearings here, the psychiatrists would suffer some of the inconvenience and perhaps we would have more voluntary admissions," said McCready.

In any event, expenses to the county have increased under the state mandate and no provisions for additional funding for transportation have been provided in the county's budget. The matter is to be studied by McCready and the commission's finance committee.


MSU Farmers' Week Slated March 22-26

Problems and potential opportunities within our environment will be examined during Michigan State University's Farmers' Week, March 22-26.

The session, "MSU Natural Resources Days," March 24-26, is sponsored by the fisheries and wildlife, forestry, park and recreation resources and resource development departments. All meetings are open to the public and will be held in the campus Brody complex across from Kellogg Center.

"We put together a program touching nearly all facets of our natural environment. Most of the state's major government and private environmental organizations dealing with natural resources will be on campus," says Dr. Rupert Cutler, MSU resource development specialist.

State regulatory and advisory agencies scheduled to hold public meetings during the session include the Natural Resources Commission, the Environmental Review Board, the Michigan Soil Conservation Committee, Air Pollution Control Commission, Resource Recovery Commission, Water Resources Commission, Recreation Advisory Committee, Essential Lands Committee and Wilderness and Natural Areas Advisory Board.



Had Capt. Avery Davis applied for his license earlier, religion might have enjoyed a more auspicious start in Iosco County. As it turned out, there was nearly a 20-year gap between the initial settlement and establishment of the first church.

The above mentioned license had no actual bearing on religion, nor was its approval necessary for establishment of a church. In 1869, Avery filed application with the county clerk to establish the first and only ferry service across the AuSable River. The AuSable ferry was important to the region's development, as this obstacle to travel was not bridged until 1873 and travelers walking along the Indian's shore route had to cross the river by means of a rowboat.

The Rev. Mr. Marchant, who had been appointed by the Detroit conference of the Methodist Church to do missionary work along the Huron shore, made his home at Harrisville with his wife, Martha. His first visit to Iosco County was in 1861 at a private home at AuSable.

Marchant was an itinerant missionary—he walked. It was his custom to walk from his home in Alcona County to the mouth of the AuSable River, there being no bridge across the river, where he would call out for someone to row him across.

What an idyllic picture this presents—the good missionary being rowed across the river by some stalwart to bring the message of God to those early pioneers. But, when one considers this region in the 1850s and early 1860s, it must be remembered that nearly the entire Lake Huron shore in Northern Michigan was truly a man's world. There were few women here to offer their purifying influence or offer smooth hands to hang curtains in the work of "civilizing" the settlements.

At the mouth of the AuSable River, for example, the settlement consisted of a dozen or more rude shacks. It has been written that life there had but few variations. The staples in those days were whitefish and whiskey, and not necessarily in that order of importance, for the citizens had little interest in the fish other than as articles of merchandise; with whiskey, it was different.

This was the picture when the Harrisville missionary arrived for his Sabbath visits. On being rowed across the AuSable, he would proceed to some dwelling where a few would gather; he then would declare his message of salvation and, after being rowed back across the river, would return to Harrisville on foot.

He continued these pioneering religious efforts for some time, but then the idyllic picture was shattered. He appeared one Sabbath at the river and made his customary call for a rowboat. For a time his call was unheeded, but then a group of men appeared on the opposite bank—all of whom were obviously under the influence of the "spirit," that which came from a jug and not from above. The imbibers of strong drink were in no mood to help this man of the cloth and they cried out for him to "swim across," as well as calling him by some abusive names.

Some person of softer heart in the settlement rowed him across the river. He preached to a small gathering, was rowed back to the north-east shore and he "shook the dust from this ungodly place" from his feet, returning no more. AuSable was without religious services until 1865. This delay might have been avoided had Davis installed his ferry service earlier, as the missionary might not have been so discouraged over his long wait for the rowboat—the five-cent fee for ferry service would have been worth the price.

To the south, the settlement on Tawas Bay was practically the same, the only difference being that pine timber replaced the fish as the merchantable item—whiskey was still a staple. Although originally founded in 1854, religion did not take hold here until five persons gathered to charter the Methodist Church in 1868 and it was five years later, in 1873, be-

fore a house of worship was constructed. At East Tawas, the religious record was somewhat better than that of "Old Town"—the Methodist Church performed its pioneering religious work at "East Town" starting in 1866.

As one can readily see, it was not necessary for churches of the southern part of the state to look to such far away places as China

to save souls—the raw materials for salvation were contained right here in Iosco County. To the credit of those earlier pioneers, once the initial step toward establishment of religion was undertaken, it was not long before other denominations joined the Methodists and various houses of worship became a permanent and lasting part of the communities.

God's work had arrived on the shore, but there was still much ground to be broken and cultivated here—vast portions of the male population disappeared into the backwoods of the interior each fall for the winter's work of cutting pine timber—never returning until spring. The first freset brought a flood of sawlogs down the principal

County Asks State to Cancel May Presidential Primary

Iosco County Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution Wednesday calling on the state legislature and governor to repeal the state-mandated May presidential primary election.

Noting that the cost to local units would be in excess of \$3,000,000, the county commission pointed out that cost of the first preferential primary election in 1962 had been


borne by the state. The state now lacks funds to finance the election and has mandated the cost as a local responsibility. The cost to Iosco County will be \$1,600 for ballots and supplies and local units will pay the cost of election boards.

"Precedent has determined, not only in Michigan but throughout the nation, that the current plan of preferential presidential primaries


is less responsive to the people than the caucus convention system," said the resolution.

"More importantly," said Iosco officials, "the cost of a presidential primary far exceeds any benefit."

The resolution called for the state to either repeal the act mandating the primary, reimburse local units for the cost or allow local units to exercise the option of holding or not holding the election.

Family Living Education

WHICH TRICKS WILL MAKE YOU SLIM?

Almost everyone will tell of some tricks to make the loss of weight easier and less painful. But which ones work? To learn those which experts find pay off, test your own knowledge. Are these statements true or false?

1. Eating before meals makes for less total food intake.
2. True. A low-calorie snack, such as an orange, two carrots or per-

haps a salad, eaten 30 minutes before a meal, will make one tend to eat less. The reason? In about half an hour the carbohydrate from the food has begun to enter the bloodstream and the brain's appetite controls have been appeased to some extent. (Do not use low bulk, high-fat foods, like cocktail nuts, in this role.)

3. Eating slowly, one eats less.
4. True. For the same reasons as above. Often the adolescent feels stuffed after a meal because he has gobbled down his food too fast for his body to let him feel satisfied.

5. Periodic starving is a good way to lose.

False. The scales go down at once partly because the digestive tract is emptied. But this does not signify so much lost fat. Starving may also burn body lean, which is not good. So the deprivation which does this is wasted suffering. Starving has other dangerous aspects, as have been seen.

6. True. As the body loses fat and plump storage cells shrivel, water tends to fill out the tissue. The extra water you hold replaces the poundage lost or may even exceed

it. Often, the first three weeks of reducing discouragingly show nothing. Then, suddenly the water is let go in extra urination and a sharp drop in weight will occur. This phenomenon is one of the chief reasons why diets are abandoned. Be patient and stay with it.

7. "Dietetic" foods are always lower in calories.
8. False. Remember, "dietetic" refers to low-sugar content, for those who are diabetics. Calorie totals are something else. Consider dietetic cookies. In one study, the calories-per-ounce of regular oatmeal cookies were 128, of dietetic 98. But the dietetic had no raisins, so were not as complete a food. Regular coconut cookies had 140 calories per ounce, dietetic 154. Regular chocolate cookies were 82 per ounce, dietetic 109. Similar findings were made among dietetic candies. Regular ice cream is hardly different in calories from the dietetic.



Trees Suffered Winter Damage

Mouse and rabbit damage to fruit trees and ornamentals has been heavy this winter, according to Marvin Davenport, Iosco County extension director.

What can a homeowner do about it? He can learn from his experiences and plan on protecting his trees next fall by wrapping them with aluminum foil, use of tree guards, painting them with white water based latex paint impregnated with rodent repellent or even clipping off buds and lower scaffold branches of young trees.

above the graft union. A shoot will develop from a latent bud, forming a new tree this year.

Crafting the damaged area is quite simple and a novice should experience a degree of good luck if he follows these recommendations. Gather scions now that the tree is dormant, keeping them in a refrigerated area until used later in April or May.

Trees that are one inch or less in diameter need not be grafted but simply cut off just below the girdled area and at a point well

providing feed for the mice and rabbits to keep them away from his fruit trees.

Bridge grafting is recommended for larger trees. In some cases, the damage will be so severe that the homeowner is advised to remove the tree and start over.
